D—Report of Executive Committee.

In the month of November, 1883, we held our first meeting, and after looking over the vast field of destitution appointed Bro. J. W. Faulkner as missionary in the southern part of Taylor at fifteen dollars a month for half his time. In December Bro. A. M. Manning accepted the a opointment of missionary in Wakulla county for half his time on a salary of fifteen dollars per month. The appointment of Bro. Faulkner was discontinued in January, 1884, after two months of service, and Bro. S. S. Proctor was appointed for three-fourths of his time with a salary of twenty-two and a half dollars per month. It was found necessary to change from some preaching points in Taylor county to points in Jefferson county, west of the Aucilla. Bro. Proctor's field we may denominate the Taylor-Jefferson Mission. For results of labor performed we refer you to the printed reports of our own missionaries. Looking over these reports we are encouraged by what has been done, and hope that we may be able to accomplish still greater things next year. We have collected sufficient funds during the year to pay off our missionaries in full, and have a balance in the treasury with which to begin operations next year. The churches have been earnestly appealed unto through printed circulars and we feel confident that a development of the missionary spirit is going quietly on. Still, the progress is not in proportion to the demands upon us. We carnestly appeal to the churches again, in this report, to awake and contribute more liberally than ever before in view of the vast destitution which still exists. Instead of two we should have as many as four or more missionaries within our bounds. We earnestly urge upon the churches and pastors of the Florida Association the devising of some better and more determinate plans for the raising of funds for missionary and other purposes. We recommend that the churches continue to send up to the Union Meetings regular contributions

E—Report of Missionary No. 1.

As missionary of the Florida Association, I submit the following as my report: Miles traveled, 1,815; sermons preached, 71; families visited, 137; exhortations, 25; Bibles on the field, 50; Bibles to Sunday-schools, 40; Testaments on the field, 50; Testaments to Sunday-schools, 100; Sabbath-school addresses, 12; Sabbath-schools organized, 3; received by baptism, 5; received by letter, 5; restored, 2; churches constituted, 1; pages of tracts distributed, 1,000; amount collected on the field, \$4 40; amount collected for distribution of tracts, 50c. Rev. J. B. Forster was with me the latter part of March and first of April, and rendered valuable service in the Sabbath-school work. Respectfully submitted.

By Foreign Missions is meant all that work in saving souls which is performed in heathen countries, or countries wherever untrue and unwholesome forms of Christianity have been foisted upon the people. The spirit of missions in all its wide field of exercise is calculated to work down superstition and lead the soul up to the blessed worship of the only true and living God. We have a great work to do in our own Association, and it is hoped that a greater interest will be taken in the work than ever before. At the same time, to be true missionaries, we must not forget the other At the same time, to be true missionaries, we must not forget the other fields occupied by God's people. Our hearts should take in the whole world

of unconverted mankind. As a means of fostering the missionary spirit in all our hearts we would earnestly recommend the reading of missionary literature, earnest prayer for sinners everywhere, and active service of the missionary cause, along with fervent and hearty contributions for the spread of the gospel. While the spirit of missions is being formed and developed in the hearts of the people to a greater extent than ever before, we have the great satisfaction of knowing that the results accruing from missionary labors are larger and more encouraging than ever before. We would most earnestly recommend to our churches the great importance of adopting some system for collecting, and that every Baptist belonging to tais body lay by him in store five cents per month, if not more, to be sent up at the next meeting of this body for missionary purposes.

ARTICLES OF FAITH OF THE FLORIDA BAPTIST ASSOCIATION.

ART. 1. We believe in one only true and living God, and that there are three in the Godhead—the Father, the Son and the Holy Ghost.

ART. 2. We believe the Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments are the Word of God, and the only rule of faith and practice.

the Word of God, and the only rule of faith and practice.

ART. 3. We believe the doctrine of particular and eternal election.

ART. 4. We believe in the doctrine of original sin.

ART. 5. We believe in man's impotency to recover himself from the fallen state in which he is by nature by his own free will and ability.

ART. 6. We believe that we are justified in the sight of God only by the imputed righteousness of Christ.

ART. 7. We believe that God's elect shall be called, regenerated and sanctified by the Holy Ghost.

ART. 8. We believe that saints shall persevere in grace and never finally

fall away.

ART. 9. We believe that baptism and the Lord's supper are ordinances of Jesus Christ; that nothing is baptism except immersion; that believers are the only subjects of this ordinance, and that none but baptized believers are entitled to partake of the Lord's supper. ART. 10. We believe in a general resurrection of the dead and a general

judgment.

ART. 11. We believe the punishment of the wicked shall be everlasting,

and the joys of the righteous will be eternal.

ART. 12. We believe that no minister has a right to administer the ordinances, only such as are regularly called and have come under the imposition of the hands of the presbytery.

RULES OF DECORUM OF THE FLORIDA BAPTIST ASSOCIATION.

1. At every meeting of the Association the Moderator shall call the members to order and cause the Clerk to read the minutes of the previous

2. The Moderator shall preserve order, and shall speak on any point of order with reference to the other members, and shall decide questions of order, subject to an appeal to the Association when requested by any two

members.

3. The Moderator shall put all questions distinctly in this form: "As many as are in favor (as the question may be) say, Aye." And after the affirmative voice is taken, "As many as are of a contrary opinion say, No." If doubtful which voice is in the majority it shall be decided by rising and counting.

4. The Moderator shall appoint the committees, except in cases of appointment by ballot.

5. In all cases of ballot the Moderator may vote. In all other cases he shall not vote unless the Association be equally divided, or unless his vote be given to the minority will make the division equal. In that case the

6. When any member is about to speak in debate he shall rise and address the Moderator.

7. If any member while speaking or otherwise employed transgress the Rules of Decorum, the Moderator shall, or any member may, call him to

When two or more members shall rise at the same time, the Modera-

tor shall dec'de who is first entitled to the floor.

9. No member shall indulge in unkind remarks in debate, nor shall any member speak more than twice on the same question without leave from the Association, nor more than once until every one chosing to speak shall have done so.

10. While any member is addressing the Association, it shall be the duty of the Moderator to suppress all private discourse that may be entertained between the members, and require strict attention on the part of the

11. When a motion is made and seconded it shall be stated by the Moderator before debate.

12. Every motion shall be reduced to writing if desired by any member of the Association.

13. After a motion is made and seconded it shall be deemed in possess sion of the Association, but may be withdrawn at any time before discussed

14. When a question is under debate no motion shall be entertained un less to amend it or to refer it to a committee, or for the previous question, or for adjournment.

15. A motion for adjournment shall always be in order, and decided

16. Any member shall call for a division of a question when two or more distinct propositions are set forth, and when the substance will admit

17. Motions and amendments may be referred to a committee at the pleasure of the Association.

18. Every resolution shall receive two statements or readings in the Association previous to its passage. The first shall be for information, and the second when the decision of the Association is to be made.

19. These rules may be changed or amended at any full meeting of the

20. The Association shall be opened and closed with prayer each day by

the Moderator or some other member.

21. All queries shall be fairly stated in writing and approbated by two-thirds of the members present before they shall be acted on.

CONSTITUTION OF THE FLORIDA BAPTIST ASSOCIATION.

ART. 1. This Association shall be known by the name of the Florida Baptist Association. The object of this Association shall be to conduct the work of missions, colportage, Sabbath-school enterprises, and other work that will tend to the spread of the Gospel.

ART. 2. This Association shall be composed of white male members chosen by the respective churches in its Union, in the proportion of two members for each church of fifty or less, and one additional delegate for every twenty-five members over fifty.

every twenty-five members over fifty.

ART. 3. The letters sent by the churches at each session of the Association shall express their respective members in full fellowship, those baptized, received by letter, restored, dismissed, excommunicated, and dead since the last session.

ART. 4. Believing it to be proper, on account of the diversity of opinion among men as to the import of Scripture doctrine contained in the Old and New Testaments, to declare our belief and understanding thereof: we therefore append our belief in twelve Articles and present them with our minutes to the Baptist denomination.

ART. 5. The Association, when convened, shall be governed by a regular and proper decorum. A Moderator and Clerk shall be chosen by the votes of the members present, who shall hold their offices until the next session of the body, and until their successors are elected. The Moderator shall preside at the meetings of the Association, and the Clerk shall record the proceedings thereof and prepare them for the press.

ART. 6. The Association thus organized shall have no power to lord it

ART. 7. The Association this organized shall have no power to lot it over God's heritage nor infringe upon the internals of any church.

ART. 7. Newly constituted churches may be admitted to this union on application by letter and delegates; and if, upon examination, found to be orthodox, shall be received by the Association, and the right hand of fellowship extended to the delegates by the Moderator.

ART. 8. The Association shall furnish the minutes of their proceedings

in proportion to the funds sent up for that purpose by the churches.

ART. 9. The minutes of the Association shall be publicly read (and corrected, if necessary), and then signed by the Moderator and Clerk before adjournment.

ART. 10. Any amendment or alteration of this Constitution may be made by the votes of two-thirds of the members present at any two regular successive meetings of the Association. All other matters of fellowship shall be decided by a majority of votes. In matters of fellowship the Association must be a unit.

ART. 11. The Association shall have power, first, to provide for the general union of the churches; second, to give the churches advice in matters of difficulty; third, to inquire into the cause of any failing to be represented difficulty; third, to inquire into the cause of any failing to be represented at the meetings of the Association; fourth, to withdraw all connection from any church or churches in this union who shall violate the rules of this Association, or shall deviate from the orthodox principles of the revealed Word of God; fifth, to appropriate the money contributed and sent up to the Association as specified by said churches, and when not specified it shall be appropriated to promote the best interests of the Master's cause; sixth, to adjourn to any future time and place they may deem most convenient to the churches in the union.
