Board shows great progress and prosperity in mission work,

their work, and we would earnestly suggest the co-operation of our Executive Committees with the State Board. We be-

lieve the State Board have not fully understood our pressing needs, and the great extent of destitution in our territory. Wewould further suggest that our Executive Committee make special appeals to every church for mission funds to enable us to occupy our fields, and to become self-supporting as soon as possible. But while we work at home, let us never forget "tl.e field is the world." Our churches, as a rule, have no system, but the Indian Springs church, under the system of giving ten eents per member per month, have contributed during the present year over one dollar per member. What they have done others may do by system, but will never accomplish by spasmodic effort. A. M. Manning, Chairman.

Your committee would therefore recommend: 1, the Baptist Witness for Florida Baptists, because it alone contains whatever of denominational news we get; 2, for Sunday schools we recommend the "Kind Words"

series, published at Atlanta, because it is directly the creature of our Southern Convention, and as such we are in a measure committed to it. We would also mention the American Baptist Publication Society series as worthy and deserving patronage. We leave it to our schools to choose for themselves; we recommend both series. Your committee would respectfully suggest to the editors of the Baptist Witness that a fair, honest and fearless presentation of Baptist principles is the only way to merit the support of the denomination, and that such a spirit and principle alone are worthy of our support.

Dear Brethren; Your committee have done but little work this year in the missionary field. We employed Bro. E. Trice one-fourth of his time to preach at Carabelle at a salary of \$10 per month, and for a fractional part of this year we have assisted Mt. Bezor church in securing preaching at that point, appropriating \$20 to that work. But the call for assistance has been distressing. Our Association is a vast destitution, being, portions of it from the Suwannee to the Chattahoochee, without the Gospel, and we think this Association would do well to inquire into the cause and try to provide a remedy for our present destitute connition. Dear Brethren: Your committee, having no information to govern them in their report only that which is furnished by the letters sent up, may fail to set forth the true condition of the churches. We believe, however, that there are no divisions, and but very little strife among us; but from some cause there seems to be very little interest in the spread of the Gospel. This we suppose to be for the lack of preaching, as there is so much destitution in our boundary, or a failure upon the part

Your Committee on Sabbath Schools beg leave to report a growing interest in this Divinely sauctioned work. Our report shows for last year only four Sabbath Schools; now we have reports showing ten. But, Brethren, this still incicates far too little general interest, when we remember the number of churches composing this body. While we rejoice at improvement, we hope each Minister and every Brother will be led to see our lack in this work, and resolve by precept and example to encourage active Sabbath Schools in every church and neighborhood within our bounds. We are taught to "train up a child in the way he should go, and when he is old he will not depart from it." Now we have not failed to observe a tendency of some to disregard the teachings of the Scriptures in doctrine and in practice. Ignorance of the Word of God is moral and religious weakness. Would that each of us could say of our children, and all children in this Gospel land, that say of our children, and all children in this Gospel land, that from their youth they have known the Scriptures. We recommend as literature in our schools, Kind Word series of Southern Baptist Convention, printed at Atlanta, Ga.

They took courage and went to work to pay the debt and to commence to replace their loss.
