A letter was read from Belleview Church, (constituted by Elders W. N. Chaudoin and W. J. Hughes, on the second Sabbath in August,) asking admission into our body.

SABBATH.

A Sabbath-School mass meeting was held at 9 o'clock A. M., and was addressed by Bro. F. S. Yager and Elder A. W. Peck.

At 11 o'clock A. M. Elder J. H. Curry preached the Annual Missionary

Sermon. Text: Matthew, 6th Chapter, and 10th verse: "Thy Kingdom Come." After which a collection was taken up for missions, amounting to \$40.34.

After partaking of a bountiful repast, a meeting in the interest of the Woman's Missionary Societies was held in the meeting-house, and addressed by Elder N. A. Bailey, and a children's meeting was held in the grove, and addressed by Elder G. W. Hall.

At night Elder L. C. Musick preached at the Church. Text: Acts, 2d Chapter, and 38th verse, and Elder G. W. Hall preached at Watulla.

MONDAY.

The Association assembled at 9 o'clock A. M. Prayer was offered by Bro. L. L. Aiken.

Read, corrected and approved the Minutes of Saturday and Sabbath. Invited Corresponding Messengers from other bodies to seats with us. The following brethren accepted: Elder N. A. Bailey, of Marion Association, also Vice-President of the Foreign Mission Board, member of the State Board of Missions, and Assistant Editor of the Florida Baptist Witness; Elder G. W. Hall, of Santa Fee River Association, and Children's Missionary of the State Convention, and Bro. H. H. Hudgens, of Marion Association.

REPORT ON TEMPERANCE.

Your Committee on Temperance beg leave to offer the following:

We are glad to report that we believe the Temperance reform is gaining ground within the bounds of this Association, as well as throughout all our country. But there is still much for God's people to do before we can hope that the great evil of intemperance will be driven from our land. Therefore we suggest that the following resolutions be adopted and put into execution:

Resolved, That we cannot consistently pray and offer the petition of the Lord's Prayer: "Thy Kingdom Come!" while we support men at the ballot-box, who are in favor of the liquor traffic.

Resolved, That we vote as we pray, and pray as we vote, that the manufacture, sale and use of intoxicating drinks be driven from our land, because this is one of the greatest foes to the spread of the Gospel, and the coming of Christ's Kingdom into the world, that the people of God have to contend against.

Resolved, That we use our influence to elect such men to office as will favor the passage of such laws as will abolish the liquor traffic from our land.

Bro. F. S. Yager read the report on Sunday-Schools, as follows:

REPORT ON SUNDAY-SCHOOLS.

Your Committee find, on examination of the Church Statistics for the past Associational year, that there are in the Association 13 Sunday-Schools, 12 Baptist and one Union school. In these there are 578 persons enrolled, with 87 officers and teachers. Of these schools there are eight that are evergreen, or hold forth every month in the year. We find six churches in the bounds of this Association without Sunday-

While we feel encouraged at the present condition of the churches in this respect, we would be rejoiced to see all of our churches sustaining flourishing Sunday-schools. We would recommend to the brethren in the churches without schools, to organize them at once, and support them. Too much importance cannot be attached to the Sunday-school work and influence. It is the nursery of the church, and from it the churches draw their supply of trained workers that make active and useful members. We therefore deem it the duty of every member of the church, that is not feeble or infirm, to attend and work in the Sunday-school. None are too old. We advise the formation of adult classes, of classes for the old and for the young. This work we regard as of paramount importance.

In conclusion, allow us to urge upon all followers of the meek and lowly Saviour, that we consecrate ourselves anew to this precious and

important work.

. Your Committee further recommend that this body consider the propriety of putting a Sunday-school Evangelist in the field, to work up and organize Sunday-schools in this Association.

MISSIONS.

Dear Brethren: We feel that this subject is of such vast importance that no human tongue has ever described, nor has human mind ever grasped this subject in all its consequences, nor can we, till we fathom eternity, survey God's vast domain, view the glories of heaven, and awful doom of the lost. If we want directions, go to God's precious Word, lay ourselves, with all we have, on the altar of Christ, and we will find both the will and the way. If we want objects, the home and foreign fields come in for our aid, and the more we do for one, the more will we wish to do for all others.

In view of the great destitution, the worth of immortal souls, and the glory of God, we recommend that the churches raise at least one dollar for each member for missions during the present year. We also request that the churches set apart a special day to raise a church building fund.

WOMAN'S WORK.

Christian duties are generally the same for all, irrespective of age, sex, or nationality. Love to God, a living faith in Jesus Christ, work-

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ing obedience to his commands, should lead the servants of God, whether men, women or children, to do good unto all men as they have opportunity. The Scriptures speak of all true believers as "sons of God," according to the revealed truth, that in Christ there is neither

male nor female.

Women were among the most devoted followers of the Saviour, while he toiled on earth, and they were recognized as efficient helpers to the truth during the apostolic days; and in the later history of the church, they have usually composed the larger number of members, and have been the more devout and faithful workers in the church. The Lord repeatedly expressed his appreciation of woman's work. It was of a woman's devotion that Jesus said: "Wherever this Gospel shall be preached in the whole world, that which this woman hath done shall be spoken of as a memorial of her."

The first and most important field of Christian labor for a woman is her own household. It is a homely proverb that "the hand that rocks the cradle rules the world;" but "train up a child in the way he should go, and when he is old he will not depart from it," is a heavenly precept, and the promise is, to the third and fourth generations the influence shall be felt. The Sunday-school opens up a most fruitful field for the exercise of Christian women. Pious, intelligent females make the best teachers for children, or for young men and ladies, in our Sunday-

schools; a work worthy of the angels of heaven.

Women often make the best collectors of finances for church, missionary and charitable purposes. Churches and Sunday-schools would do well to employ and improve the gifts and talents which the Master has bestowed upon them in the additions of pious women to their organizations. Women's Missionary Societies and Bands have proved efficient auxiliaries to the great missionary work, at home and abroad, and we recommend that our sisters continue their labors of sacrifice and love, and that new societies be organized wherever it is practicable to do so.

REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

Your Committee would respectfully report that in accordance with the instructions given us at your last meeting, we employed Elder W J. Hughes to preach one-half of his time. He has preached regularly at Belleview, Wildwood and Rutland's Ferry, and occasionally at other points. At Belleview the result has been the organization of a promise ing church, which has been admitted into your body. At Wildwood the church has been enabled to turn all her strength towards the securing a house of worship, and have a commodious and substantial edifice so far advanced as to ensure them a spiritual home. At Rutland's, while there are evidences of good being accomplished, an organization has not yet been effected.

Bro. H. H. Sturgis was employed for one-fourth of his time, (being also in the employ of the State Board for another one-fourth,) and has labored faithfully and laboriously in the destitute parts of Hernando County, preaching at Bayport, Rural School-house, Spring Hill, Floral City and Tompkinsville, and we confidently expect that several churches

will sooner or later be gathered on his field of labor.

We herewith summarize the reports of both our Missionaries, and also our Treasurer, (Bro. W. R. Matthews.)

Bro. Hughes reports: Months employed, 11; miles traveled, 1,680; sermons preached, 50; family visits, 114; baptized, 3; received by letter, 5; churches supplied, 2; other stations, 4; churches constituted, 1; with a Sunday-School at each station. He reports many localities where Baptist preaching is acceptable and prospects good for the organization of several new churches, and urges upon the Association the importance

of keeping alive the interest already aroused.

Bro. H. H. Sturgis reports as follows: Weeks labor, 38; sermons preached, 134; miles traveled, 1,402; prayer meetings held, 27; stations occupied, 8; baptisms, -; families visited, 125; Sunday-Schools organized, 1; Bibles and Testaments sold, 28; amount collected on field, \$62.88, half to be credited to Associational Board, \$31.44; amount paid by the Board, \$38.75; amount of pledges collected, \$42.50; total collections, \$112.69; amount due for ten month's services, \$97.50; balance overpaid,

Both Bros. Hughes and Sturgis were commissioned by the State Board. We recommend that in view of the faithful services of Bro. Sturgis, that the balance of \$15.19 overpaid him be added to his salary.

We urge the brethren throughout the Association to foster, with their money, that which our kind Father has enabled us to establish.

The Christian Index of Atlanta, Ga., cannot be praised too highly as a great Christian medium. It is healthy, vigorous and Christian to the hub. We would recommend it to those who desire to take more than one religious paper. Too much stress cannot be placed upon the importance of selecting sound Sunday School literature and able helps. We deem this paramount to all other departments of our Christian labor. We would recommend Kind Words, The Child's Gem, and the publications of the American Baptist Publication Society, and the Baptist Book Houses of St. Louis. Mo., and Memphis, Tenn.

In our Mission work, we recommend the Foreign Mission Journal and Heathen Helper, and last, but superior to all, is the great radiator, the Bible, for in it are the precious promises of eternal life.

LETTERS AND QUERIES.

We notice that the letters from the churches this year are wanting in much valuable information. Some clerks have used the blanks supplied by Bro. Chaudoin, but with one or two exceptions, they have not been properly filled out, and it will be impossible to get a true statement of our year's work from the letters. We advise that the clerks, or those appointed to write the Associational letters, be requested to be more explicit in the future.

From the letters, we learn that the following churches report Sabbath-Schools, to wit: Pleasant Plains, Leesburg, Midway, Eden, Union Level, Pine Level, Oclawaha Bridge, Sumterville, Belleview and Brooksville, which has two, one being at Spring Hill, Lecanto, Shady Grove and Lake Kerr, have Union Schools, and Harmony aids in three Union Sabbath-Schools,

We notice that Midway reports a Young Men's Prayer Meeting, and that Wildwood, Pine Level, Union Level, Shady Grove, Brooksville, Leesburg and Belleview, report weekly prayer meetings, and Oclawaha Bridge once a month. We would urge the brethren to be earnestly engaged in prayer, and in meeting together on the first day of the week.

We also notice with sorrow, that the churches have not reported the work done by the Ladies' Mission Societies and Children's Mission Bands. Can it be possible that these great helps to the cause, that every Baptist should love, have been neglected and permitted to die? Brethren and Sisters, we appeal to you, do not forget your duty to your Saviour's cause, and to the memory of one who devoted the last years of her life (Sister A. B. Bailey,) to this noble cause. Let us foster with more care the Mission cause among the sisters and children, and we urge upon the ministry to urge and help to organize these Societies in all their churches. We also notice that Midway, Eden and Sumter-ville report special revivals. Several report that they are in a live and growing condition and advancing in the cause, while some, as being in a lukewarm or cold condition, and they petition to be remembered in prayer by this body, and we recommend that special prayer be made for them by all the sister churches. We notice that Wildwood Church has been enabled to build a house of worship, and that Equity has onehalf of the amount raised necessary to build, and we recommend that sister churches render such assistance as is possible in helping them to

From the reports we would say that upon the whole we are still on gaining ground, and there is great cause for thankfulness to the great Head of the Church for His blessings, and we urge that we make a more persistent effort in this year for a grand forward move in the cause.

Two churches request that this body meet with them, and we recom-

mend that the next meeting be held with Leesburg Church.

MINISTERIAL EDUCATION.

While we as Baptists believe in a special call to the ministry, and that such only as have this special call will continue to preach the Gospel under all varying circumstances, at the same time we recognize the great necessity of an educated ministry. The age in which we live, in which the people at large are being educated, that other denominations are educating their ministers, demands of every young man who would enter the ministry, that he should be as thoroughly prepared as possible. An education gives position and commands respect among the higher classes, and by no means disqualifies for usefulness among the unlearned.

The great object of a classical education being to expand the mind, or lay a broad foundation, at once shows the necessity of those who would

study the Book of Books, and be a leader of God's hosts, to avail themselves of its advantages. Nor should we lose sight of a Theological Education. Its objects are at least two-fold. One to continue the expansion of the mind, and the other to give special instruction in God's Word. How to study the Bible most profitably, to explain difficult passages, instructing in pastoral duties, in short, specially to train for ministerial duties. Thus the beginner is permitted to start off almost with all the advantages gained by years of study and experience on the part of our Theological Professors.
