

#### REPORT ON SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

Your Committee on Sabbath-schools beg leave to report as follows: We conceive the object of Sunday- schools to be the education of all, both children and adults, in the Scriptures. And since a knowledge of the Bible enables us to meet our obligations, both to God and man, we deem it a duty of each church to establish and maintain a Sabbath-school. of the above, it is very important that each school should be thoroughly organized, having a full set of officers and teachers, the most competent that can be had, and they should carry out

a nice and well defined system, ever keeping in view the important fact that the obligation to make the Sunday-school a success rests upon each one of them alike, and each one should pray for, and expect the conversion of pupils. It is of vast importance to have good literature in our Sunday-schools, and it should be denominational. We believe that the International Lessions are the best for our schools, and so we recommend them. We recommend that all the churches in the Association be requested to report in their letters whether they have Sunday-schools, and if so, what their statistics are.

#### REPORT ON PERIODICALS.

This is an age of newspapers, both secular and religious, in which the current events of to-day are being published, hence they are being sought after by the masses of the people. Much is

published that the world would be the better for by not know-= z but who shall stay their publication, and give us such while these evils cannot be suppressed yet much has been and is being done by the religious newspapers in meeting the general demands of the people. Many of our people do not feel able to take but one paper, and the religious press is striving to make its publications, as far as racticable, meet the demands of this class by giving us a varlety, and our Witness is thus trying to meet the demands of our Florida Baptists, and it can better do this than any other paper. We would urge upon all our people the necessity of beloing to sustain our State paper, and that it is not only a privilege, but a duty, one that we owe both to ourselves and our posterity. If we can take but one paper, let that be the Witness, thus furnishing our families with good and wholesome reading. It is certainly a duty of Christian parents to give their children that which is good, and guard against the evil. We would impress upon our brethren the importance of using Baptist literature in their Sunday-schools, wherever it is practicable. We would recommend the use of Kind Words, pub-Ished by the Home Board of the Southern Baptist Convention, and the Sunday-school literature of the American Baptist Publication Society, either of which will meet the demands of our schools. Let us realize that as Baptists, it is our duty to see that our children have wholesome literature in the Sundayschool as well as at home. We would also recommend the Foreign Mission Journal and Heathen Helper.

Bro. R. G. Hood read his report as Sunday-school Evangelist as follows:

Though doubtful of my ability to properly do the work assigned me a year ago by the Association, I entered upon it at once, trusting in the Lord for the needed help, as it was a labor of love. I have been warmly received by the pastors and people, and have found everywhere an eagerness to hear more about Sunday-school methods, and a zeal manifested that is encouraging. I am convinced that the people only need to be informed and encouraged to bring this great work to the front as it should be, being the foundation of all our church enterprises, for if the young are properly instructed in the Word of God, they will, when they come upon the stage of action as active workers in the church, be ready in every good word and work. I have traveled 704 miles, delivered 32 lectures, visited 75 families, organized 2 Sunday-schools, received \$18.43; and paid as railway fare \$18.40.

#### MINISTERIAL EDUCATION.

This is an age of skepticism, infidelity and science, falsely so called. In order that the Gospel may have free access to the minds of the people, it is sometimes necessary that these "seducing spirits and doctrines of devils," by which we are so sorely beset in these latter days, be exposed and refuted; and to this end an educated ministry is clearly a necessity. We affectionately and earnestly recommend that all young brethren just beginning the ministry be given whatever educational advantages may be practicable. We can well afford to do this as our denomination is rapidly growing in numbers and material prosperity. We must certainly account to God for the Lord's share of the money which He is giving us, and we cannot make a better disposition of a part of that money than

to have it go to educate young men to preach the Gospel. We would remind you, brethren, that our young brethren, Geiger and Sessoms, are yet at Mercer University, and are looking to us for the means to enable them to graduate. But we must not be content to help these alone; we must look for opportunity to help others. Surely somewhere in this vast State, God is saying to his people: "Separate me this or that young Barnabas or Saul, for the work whereunto I have called him." Let us not be slow, dear brethren, to see and follow the pointings of the Divine finger.

To our young brethren preparing for the ministry, who may be in need of more thorough literary training, we recommend DeLand College. In making this recommendation, we do not depreciate Mercer University, nor any other institution of learning. Nor are we unmindful of, or ungrateful for the good that these have done. We trust we appreciate to a very considerable degree the manifold blessings that our denomination has received from the careful training given many of our young preachers in Mercer University. But we cannot think it right to send our boys to other States to educate them now that we have a good college within the borders of our own State. To those needing a Bible course we recommend our Theological Seminary at Louisville, Ky.

#### EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

Your Committee would respectfully report that at the adjournment of the last session of the Association, impelled by the very liberal subscription made for the work, and the warm interest manifested by the brotherhood in it, they determined to continue both Bros. Hughes and Sturgis in the field, and to employ them for one half their time each, but at

the close of the first quarter, after a thorough survey of the situation, and of future prospects, we concluded that it would be best to reduce the time to one-fourth each, so that we would be sure not to incur any indebtedness. The stringency of money matters during the summer, and the consequent small collections have proven the wisdom of our decision. Much as we disliked to deny to any locality the preached Gospel, we regarded it as a lesser evil than promising our missionaries money which we had no evidence would be forthcoming.

Both our missionaries have occupied much the same field as last year. Bro. Hughes has succeeded in organizing a church near Rutland's, and Bro. Sturgis one at Tomrinsville. Much interest has been shown at other points, but these brethren have no doubt acted wisely in not hurrying up the formation of churches that would be weak and inefficient. These points however should not in our opinion be neglected, but occupied, and worked up, till success crowns our efforts.

Both our missionaries have been commissioned by the State Board. Bro. Hughes has been paid a small amount by said Board as missionary pastor at Bellview, and Bro. Sturgis has also received some pay from the same source, and also \$50 per quarter by an unknown brother in a Northern State, but as he has devoted his whole time to missionary work he has not received the remuneration his services deserve, and we recommend to the Association to supplement his salary in such amount as they see fit. We present herewith the reports of our missionaries, and also our Treasurer, which we hope you will consider as a part of our report, and a synopsis of each be published with this report.

We recommend that an effort be now made to secure pledges and a cash collection to pay the amount due Bros. Hughes and Sturgis, and also that if necessary so much of to-morrow's collections as may be needed, be used for the same purpose.

## LETTERS AND QUERIES.

We find that a majority of the churches use the Associational statistical blanks for letters, and we recommend them to all the churches. We recommend greater care and brevity in the preparation of church letters. We note an increased interest in Sunday-school work among the churches, but there are four churches without any Sunday-school. We find that out of seventeen letters examined only four churches report pray-

er-meetings. Thirteen churches do not report prayer-meetings. We earnestly recommend prayer-meetings and Sunday-schools to each and every church. We do not find enough spiritual growth reported in the letters of the churches, to make it worthy of special mention. We have much to be thankful for, and nothing to boast of. We ought to thank God, and work and pray more. We truly and heartily endorse Bro. R. G. Hood's work as a Sunday-school Evangelist, and recommend his continuance in the labor as we hear of good results. Brethren, let us appreciate our opportunities, realize our responsibilities and do more voluntary work for the Master.

Adjourned for refreshments.

#### NIGHT SESSION.

Eld. L. D. Geiger preached a sermon at 7 P. M., text 1st Cor. 16th chapter, and 1st and 2d verses.

The Association then resumed its business.

Bro. H. H. Sturgis then read the following

#### REPORT ON MISSIONS,

We, your committee, believe that the subject of missions is the most important one which can engage the attention of the churches of Christ, because in every work done for Christ, some one must be sent to do it, that so the work may be divided, the senders and the sent standing equally and individually responsible to the great Head of the Church for the faithful performance of the work. With this view, and the world lying before us, as Christians, where is it our duty to work? Evidently not everywhere, for God does not expect impossibilities; hence the necessity for Boards who know the wants of the various fields and can, with Divine guidance, direct to the accomplishment of this object, the obeying the command, "Go ye into all the world and preach the Gospel to every creature." The duty to go rests equally upon each individual Christian as upon those who, having left all, are following the great Missionary into the nations sitting in darkness and death. Go or send a suitable substitute, is our duty.

You cannot? Then hear the cries which come from every field. Africa, the dark continent, stands with open arms to invite us to tell them of Jesus. India, China, Japan, Italy, Mexico, Brazil, and Cuba are reckoned as our especial fields in foreign lands, while our western plains, with the struggling remnants of a once mighty people, whose hunting grounds we now build our cities upon, ask as a dying request, the Gospel of Peace to make the red man happy, by changing his nature. The advancing civilization crowding the red man, and pushing west-ward must be accompanied into those mountain fastnesses and fertile plains by the missionary, or they will endanger civilization, and anarchy, rapine and murder will mark their course. Our near lying fields in our own State, rich with possibilities, call loudly for earnest work, faithful workers, to go into the highways and hedges. The work rests with especial weight upon us, as many coming from other States want their church homes, and Sunday-schools; this want the missionnary is to supply as far as possible; will we help him?

Nor is it alone or empty-handed that he should go forth. Let our missionaries have Bibles, Testaments, and Hymn-books, and other religious works to open the door of the cabin, and the heart, and he will be thoroughly equipped for the work of conquering Florida for Christ, by establishing Sunday-schools and prayer-meetings and preaching places in the rural districts. They call for only a little help, but they call loudly. Will we answer their calls? Or, recreant to our trust, unfaithful to "Him who though he was rich, yet for our sakes became poor, that we through His poverty might be made rich." As Christians, we cannot refuse these calls.

#### WOMAN'S WORK.

We think it must be evident to all, even the most indifferent and skeptical, that the aid of the Christian women of the South, of all denominations, and especially Baptists, is demanded by the spirit and activities of the present times. To lay aside their conformity to the world, and come out from under its maxims and trainings, and give themselves and money to aid the brethren in the great effort now being made throughout the Christian world to send the Gospel to every creature. The call of God is evidently upon them. Shall we repress or encourage them? Not encourage to an unscriptural position, but to occupy the plane laid down in the Word of God for them, helpers to the brethren in carrying forward the Gospel of the Kingdom. Woman's Work has made gratifying advancement during the past year. The Lord has blessed their labors with grand results, yet there remains much to be done in this field of Christian labor. There are many churches which have not organized Ladies' Mission Societies. It is not so much for a want of interest in this work as knowing how to carry it forward. What is needed most is having some one to properly instruct them in this matter. We have a noble sister-hood here in Florida, who are willing to work where the cause is brought properly before them. This is shown in the hearty response to the calls of sisters Bailey and Telford, where they have lectured and talked with the sisters, and we suggest and urge that this work be fostered with more zealous care. Shall not the dear sisterhood make an entire consecration of themselves, with all that they have, to Him who purchased us with His own precious blood?

#### REPORT ON TEMPERANCE.

In view of the widespread sentiment for prohibition throughout our State, and in view of the hearty co-operation of all the Baptist pastors throughout the State in temperance work, we desire to express thanksgiving to God for the blessings that have attended their labors, and for the success of the efforts made for the suppression and extinction of the liquor traffic. We express our conviction that every member of our churches should give support to all expedient measures employed to the end that all saloons be forever exterminated. However, we deplore the use of the regular services of the church on the Lord's day for popular union temperance meetings, that are often used by designing persons for political purposes, thereby desecrating the Lord's house and the Sabbath. We recommend that parents instruct their children by precepts and example in the Christian virtue of self control.
