## WOMAN'S MISSIONARY UNION REPORT

### APALACHEE ASSOCIATION

The Woman's Missionary Union of the Apalachee Association has four churches with Missionary Societies, two churches with Girl's Auxiliaries, and two churches with Sunbeam Bands; a total of eight organizations.

We have had each of the Societies represented at our four quarterly rallies this year: In February 1, at Lake Mystic; April 16, at Poplar Head; July 16, Bristol; and, our annual meeting October 8, at Corinth.

Fourteen Mission Study books have been taught this year. All four Societies have earned a recognition certificate and have had one hundred per cent of the people reading a mission study book. All the Societies observed all three Seasons of Prayer. Results have been made manifest in an increase in all our special gifts to Missions.

The Lottie Moon Offering for Foreign Missions reported was \$158.87. Annie Armstrong Offering for Home Missions was \$98.50, and State Missions was \$96.27. The Burney Gift was \$8.00, making a total of \$361.54.

All Societies have been represented at the Day's of Instruction, and State Convention. The Association was represented at the advanced Leadership Conference at Stetson University, Deland.

In November 1962 we observed B.B.I. Day with all eleven churches in the association participating. Contributions of money, clothing, and food was given to the school. We will observe B.B.I. Day this year on November 26.

We have taught the W.M.S. Leadership Course and organized one new Missionary Society in a nearby association this year. We have two new Girl's Auxiliaries, and two new Sunbeam Bands in the Lake Mystic Church.

The W.M.S. Leadership Course will be taught associational wide at the Bristol Church November 5, at 9:00 a.m. until 4:30 p.m., and night classes will be on November 18 and 19 from 6:00 until 9:45 each night.

Rallies will be held this year: February 3, 1964, Lake Mystic Church; April 21, Poplar Head; July 14, Corinth; and, the annual meeting will be held October 13 at the First Baptist Church in Bristol.

State W.M.U. Convention will be held April 14 and 15 at St. Petersburg, Florida.

## ANNUAL REPORT OF UNITED CHRISTIAN ACTION, INC., TO THE CHURCHES OF THE FLORIDA BAPTIST CONVENTION

Although the economic, social and cultural wastage seems tremendously high, when you consider that Americans spent \$1,369,360.00 every hour in 1962 on Beer-Wine-Whiskey, the real loss is seen in the "Spiritual Dwarfism" produced in the drinker, the seller, and the compromising citizen who accepts without protest the alcohol way of life.

And yet, for the first time in several years, very encouraging signs appear on the horizon indicating a renewed willingness to take forceful action to halt the destructive inroads being made by alcohol, gambling, indecency, and related moral evils in Florida.

United Christian Action, Inc., is the service agency formed and supported by Baptists and representatives of 12 other Evangelical denominations to seek Christian solutions to these problems in our communities. A brief report follows. More detailed information will be gladly supplied to anyone interested.

A strong and concerted effort was launched by Baptists and other Evangelical Christians in Florida for action by the 1963 legislature to improve the moral tone of our state.

Activities included:

1. A Legislators-Pastors Prayer Breakfast, the second day of the legislative session, in the Florida State University dining hall. With UCA as host, the breakfast was attended by Governor Farris Bryant and members of the State Cabinet, over 100 members of the Senate and House of Representatives, and a large representative group of pastors from churches throughout Florida.
2. Legislation was sought to remove all beer, wine, whiskey sales from grocery, drug, filling station, and other retail family shopping outlets.
3. Sunday Observance Laws were sought to close non-essential businesses on Sunday.
4. Strong opposition was expressed against any extension of gambling, including bingo, and any loosening of restrictions on the alcohol industry.

Both the Beer Ban and Sunday Observance bills were defeated by our legislators, as a result of strong and direct pressures by a small army of lobbyists employed to protect the interests of those who profit from the sale of alcohol and the desecration of Sunday. Legislation to permit bingo and state lotteries was defeated, although some extension of gambling was approved by the legislature.

Although the full objectives we sought were not achieved, a strong and widespread expression of concern was directed at our state officials and legislators. For the first time in many years, the moral forces of Florida mounted a strong attack, requiring the liquor traffic and allied interests to marshal their utmost power to turn back the tide of concern expressed by citizens from the walks of life throughout the state.

The following signs of an awakening conscience on the part of many churchmen and concerned citizens seems encouraging: (1) In spite of an unprecedented advertising and promotional campaign to secure increased sales of beer, wine and whiskey, statistics show the liquor traffic is barely holding its own, rather than forging ahead, in the per capita consumption of alcoholic beverages. Although

more young people are beginning to drink at an earlier age, an increasing number of adults are throwing off their drinking habits and becoming vocal and militant total abstainers. (2) In spite of the persistent and unrelenting pressures of the liquor trade to gain more privileges and more liberalizations, an awakening public is beginning to count the cost of alcoholism in human suffering, in disintegration of family life, in economic attrition to the individual and the community, and in wasted human and economic resources resulting from the advertising sale and use of beer, wine and whiskey.

### THE PART YOU CAN PLAY IN PROGRESS

1. We must do a better job of acquainting our own members and the public at large with the cause and cure for the constantly increasing alcoholism, crime, domestic conflict, juvenile delinquency, drunken driving, etc. UCA will be glad to provide free to any individual or church unlimited quantities and varieties of materials covering alcohol, gambling, smoking, indecent literature, and related moral evils of our day. Speakers, films, charts, and other helps are also available upon request. 2. As individuals, and as church families, we must give our young people regular, clearcut, uncompromising leadership through positive teaching and example of church leaders, both pastor and people, to understand and accept total abstinence as the practical, happy, constructive, Christ-like approach to the moral problems of our day. Recognize that as concerned individuals and churches in Florida unite their efforts, progress will be made. Dollars for decency, votes for public officials strong enough to withstand the pressures of the liquor lobbyists, courage of conviction to stand up and speak out for total abstinence as the only realistic approach to alcohol, gambling, indecency, etc., pastors who will lead their churches and people who will follow -- these are ingredients for victory.

By the end of 1963, Florida will have more than 17,500 legalized beer, wine or whiskey outlets, in which those who drink will spend over \$500,000.00 to purchase and consume more than 70,000,000 gallons of beer, wine and whiskey. With more than 250,000 alcoholics and problems they create for their own families and communities in which they live, a challenge for action on the part of the church is urgent. Without doubt, pressures will increase for statewide lotteries, bingo, unrestrained and unlimited gambling to be added to the 29 dog tracks, horse tracks and Jai Alai gambling frontons now legalized, glamorized, and popularized in Florida, with the express approval of the voters.

Churches of the Florida Baptist Convention have consistently been in the forefront in providing the financial support and energetic leadership needed for the work of United Christian Action, Inc. In 1962, Florida Baptists generously provided the following financial support:

1. The Annual State Missions Offering - \$8,400.00; 2. Budgeted and special items from individual Baptist Churches - \$17,131.12.

The program of UCA activities which you helped make possible, includes the preparation-printing-distribution of several million pieces of educational literature, plus speakers for churches, youth camps and schools, in the area of alcohol education. Information and leadership in legislative activities, local option elections, and rehabilitation of alcoholics round out the program.

We gratefully acknowledge the concern, support, and active leadership given to this cause by Dr. John Maguire and all members of the professional staff of the Florida Baptist Convention, the dynamic leadership of Dr. Edgar R. Cooper, president of UCA, and a large host of fine pastors and laymen who serve on the Board of Directors, or who share in activities in their own communities to make possible

the program and services rendered by this interchurch Christian Action organization.

## STEWARDSHIP REPORT

### SUGGESTED REPORT STEWARDSHIP AND THE COOPERATIVE PROGRAM 1963 ASSOCIATIONAL MEETING

The Cooperative Program is the fundamental, effective, indispensable channel for the support of missions at home and around the world. It is the basic finance program of Southern Baptists, and demands the continual support of all Southern Baptist churches. Through it, we achieve the purposes of our denomination, and make it possible for every gift, regardless of size to go to the support of all our common endeavors.

In support of the Cooperative Program, the Stewardship Commission of the Southern Baptist Convention has developed three programs that will continue to be of immeasurable value to our churches.

The Forward Program of Church Finance, now called the Forward Program of Christian Stewardship, is the oldest program, and has served well the churches

that have chosen to use it through the years.

Last year the Forward Program of Christian Stewardship was joined by a new stewardship development program primarily for churches with up to three hundred members, called Growth in Christian Stewardship. These two programs aid churches in developing giving congregations. More and more churches are finding that when a person gives of his possessions, he will give more of himself to the service of God.

Early in 1964, a third program entitled, Year-Round Stewardship Development, will be available for churches to use in keeping Christian stewardship before the people all through the year.

### RECOMMENDATIONS:

We recommend:

1. That our churches focus attention upon world missions by observing October as Cooperative Program Month. Through this means, we want our churches to use Wednesday prayer services as an opportunity to pray for world missions needs.
2. That every church put the Cooperative Program in the church budget on the percentage plan.
3. That the 2 Plus Plan be used, by which a church gives at least 2% more of the total church budget to missions through the Cooperative Program.
4. That churches select the stewardship program best fitting its needs, and use that program for its promotional plan. The plans available are: Forward Program of Christian Stewardship and Growth in Christian Stewardship.

## SOUTHERN BAPTIST HOSPITALS

Baptist hospitals are concrete demonstrations of a Christian response to human need. They came into being as a result of the teaching and example of Jesus, the Great Physician. They are channels of communicating the Gospel to the sick and troubled, and to their anxious families and friends. They are evidence of Baptist concern to experiences of disease, disability and death.

At this time there are 48 Baptist Hospitals located from Miami, Florida, to San Antonio, Texas. Most of these are owned and operated by State Conventions of Southern Baptists. The ownership of some is in the hands of local associations. Southern Baptist Hospital in New Orleans and Baptist Memorial Hospital, Jacksonville, Florida, are owned by all Southern Baptists and operated in their behalf by a Southern Baptist Convention agency.

During the year covered by this report, the Convention's hospitals operated at near-capacity. The combined total of 800 beds were occupied by 35,953 patients. An average of 97 new patients were admitted each day.

More than 1500 individuals received part-pay care in the two institutions during the year. Cared for without charge by staff physicians, these people were encouraged to pay hospital costs as they were able, and they did so. Still, the net cost of this program amounted to \$429,570. The allocation of \$25,000 from the Convention Cooperative Budget was applied fully to these costs, leaving a balance

of over \$400,000 to be supplied from other sources, mainly operating income of the hospital.

Lest too much emphasis be given to projects and buildings, statistics and dollars, a final word should recall that through their hospitals, Southern Baptists minister to people. Hospital personnel are mindful that, along with skill, Christian compassion requires large resources in understanding and faith. This degree of concern for each and every patient and his family makes a very Christian difference.

## 1963 ANNUAL REPORT OF SOUTHERN BAPTISTS' RADIO - TELEVISION COMMISSION

Radio and television have been given to the church of Christ as powerful tools of mass communication--media through which the saving Gospel can be brought into the hearts of great numbers of people over vast areas.

For the first time in the history of the world as we know it, it is possible to reach virtually every person with the Good News of our Lord Jesus Christ. In our own country there are 49,800,000 television homes (nearly 91 per cent of all homes). There are 51,690,000 radio homes (nearly 94 per cent of all homes).

The Commission had a banner year in 1962, with continued recognition from the radio and television industry in terms of increased time allocations. This applied both to network time and to independent station time.

Special program production for all three networks, both radio and television,

is at an all time high this year. For instance, four half-hour programs for NBC-TV have been allotted Southern Baptists through the Commission from September 1 to December 29 this year. CBS-TV has scheduled three television programs for the denomination. ABC-TV has already produced two.

Cooperative film ventures with the networks and production of a number of documentary films on missions enabled your Commission to offer television stations all new material in "The Answer" for 1963 for the first time since 1960.

In the area of radio there was a net gain of 244 stations carrying Southern Baptist programs in 1962 for the greatest annual increase and the highest station total in the Commission's history.

The Commission currently services a total of 1220 radio and television stations weekly (plus 205 Armed Forces Network radio outlets) with a dozen different weekly radio programs and a weekly television series.

Half-hour radio programs, with the station count for each, is as follows: The Baptist Hour, 495; "Master Control" \*(domestic), 282 and AFN, 205; "Master-Control" \*(international), 2; La Hora Bautista, 55; Multiplex Music, 1; Patterns, 156.

Quarter-hour programs for radio are: International Sunday School Lesson, 79 Chapel Upstairs, 21; Music To Remember, 12; Control "Central," 22; Chinese Baptist Hour, 1; Mississippi Baptist Record, 12; "Momentos De Meditacion," 1. Oklahoma Baptist News on five stations is a five-minute program produced by the Commission for the state convention.

Technical aid in radio-television production to individuals, churches, state conventions, and associations is also on the rise. Two weekly radio programs for state conventions and one in Spanish for an association are currently being produced by the Commission. Technical aid in planning and establishing two tape recording studios was given last year. One was at the Baptist seminary in Zurich, Switzerland, and the other at Clear Creek Baptist School, Pineville, Ky.

The Commission's constant effort is to meet the needs of stations and to provide new and different religious programming. By so doing, Southern Baptists' agency for radio and television is able to get its figurative foot in the door. Following the initial programming in an area, there is often an opportunity to add another program. An evangelistic program such as "The Baptist Hour" is always pushed into the opening, or "La Hora Bautista" for Spanish speaking areas.

An up-to-date accounting of the annual value of the time given Commission-produced Southern Baptist programs throughout the nation shows it comes to the astounding figure of \$3,701,988. This does not include the 93 stations overseas which receive our programs.

This past year the associational music ministry organization showed 43 out of 47 associations held Associational Festivals. 255 churches participated in the festivals with 602 choral groups, totaling 12,544 choir members--207 hymn players--50 song leaders--1 instrumental ensemble with a total of 7 participants. Our Associational Festival was held at Bristol on January 31st, 1963, with Sumatra and Bristol receiving certificate of awards. Sumatra in recognition of Choir singing, and Bristol, Duet. We are planning to have a festival during 1964.

There will be 11 State Music Festivals in 1964. The 1963 report of the State Festivals is as follows: There were 322 choral groups with 7,229 members--146 hymn players--31 song leaders--1 instrumental ensemble with 8 participants. A grand total of individuals participating in the State Festivals was 7,414. There were 153 churches participating and 505 certificates of award issued. ## ANNUITY BOARD OF THE SOUTHERN BAPTIST CONVENTION

The Southern Baptist protection plan now provides a special death benefit for all members, both ministers and denominational workers, under 40 years of age. It covers both natural and accidental death.

If the member dies a natural death before age 40, the benefit provides a cash settlement to the member's widow or estate equal to the average salary on which dues were paid. If he dies because of an accident, the cash settlement will be double average salary.

There is no added cost for this special death benefit, which is in addition to the regular retirement, widow and disability benefits of the protection plan.

Benefits Paid. Last year more than \$3 million were paid to more than 4,500 ministers and denominational workers or their families, who were members of a retirement plan, and to approximately 750 on the relief rolls.

Membership in Retirement Plans. April 1, 1963, there were 15,964 or 49% of the total churches in the Southern Baptist Convention participating in the Annuity

Board's retirement program for their pastors. Out of a total of 212 educational institutions, hospitals, children's homes and houses for the aged, 121 are enrolled in an Annuity Board retirement plan with their employees. Total membership in all the Board's retirement plans is approximately 25,000.

## REPORT ON BAPTIST LITERATURE AND THE FLORIDA BAPTIST WITNESS

"Forasmuch as many have taken in hand to set forth in order a declaration of those things which are most surely believed among us...it seemed good to me also...to write...that thou mightest know the certainty of those things, wherein thou hast been instructed." These excerpts from Luke 1:1-4 set the pattern for the writing of the Gospel that the early Christians might be more perfectly instructed in their faith.

These same words seem an appropriate background for the work of those who edit and publish Baptist literature that has become vitally important to our Christian living and to our churches and denomination. Not only do these publications seek to instruct us more perfectly in our faith and doctrines, but they become a vital stream of valuable information about the religious and moral trends in our swiftly changing world. These same publications become tools of evangelism, missions and stewardship, both in the churches and in the missions established by them.

One will not find any denomination's literature surpassing that of Southern Baptists in its quality, attractiveness, doctrinal soundness and ease of understanding.

Southern Baptists continue to increase and speed up their publication efforts and the circulation of their periodicals just as rapidly as our constituency will use the publications. For example, during nine months of 1962 (the fiscal year was changed) the Sunday School Board printed and mailed to the users in 50 states and 92 foreign countries 63,003,152 copies of its periodicals, 1,521,149 copies of new books and related items, 151,817,875 reprints of similar old items, and 11,520,615 Baptist bulletins.

The other boards, agencies and auxiliaries of the Southern Baptist Convention have growing subscriber lists for their particular periodicals such as The Commission (foreign missions journal), Home Missions Magazine, Brotherhood Journal, Ambassador Life, and all the Woman's Missionary Union publications.

The 28 Baptist state papers, at the 1963 Convention in Kansas City, reported a total circulation of 1,513,194 copies per issue as of January 1, 1963. Thus, of the state papers alone, some 78,000,000 copies were mailed last year.

The FLORIDA BAPTIST WITNESS, our own state paper, (as of August 1, 1963) is going into 65,189 homes in 895 different churches, with 759 of these churches using the budget plan for at least a portion of their membership. An increasing number are sending the paper to every resident family. One hundred thirty-six other churches have small clubs of subscriptions. Some thirty to thirty-five thousand Baptist homes in Florida, however, are not yet receiving the paper. There are also still 432 Florida Baptist churches which are saving a little and losing a lot by

failing to take advantage of the most economical medium of information which they can possibly provide their members, a subscription to the FLORIDA BAPTIST WITNESS.

We would urge every church which now sends the WITNESS into only part of its homes to enlarge its subscription list to include every resident family, and every church which does not now have the WITNESS in its church budget to promptly consider sending the paper into the homes of all its members. In spite of all the increases in production costs during recent years, the paper is still available through the church budget plan for the low cost of \$1.20 per year, which may be paid in installments of only 10¢ per month for each family on a church's subscription list.

There is no more speedy or economical means toward a better informed, more completely enlisted, more thoroughly generous, more genuinely missionary membership than for a church to send the BAPTIST WITNESS to every family in its membership through the simple church budget subscription plan.

## REPORT ON CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

It has been well said that Christian Education means "Education with a plus!" This means that the content and process are presented and interpreted in the light of the Christian Religion. Not only is it concerned with the physical, mental and social development of the young but is vitally concerned with their spiritual development. Huge sums of money invested in our institutions of higher learning can be justified only in the light of the contribution they make to this development and in the service they render the Kingdom of God and Baptists.

Southern Baptists today are keenly interested in a sane, happy Christian balance between academic freedom in the classroom and a practical sense of responsibility on the part of all teachers and professors in our schools. The Denomination and our schools must work together in building this two-way street.

With the opening of Mobile College and Houston Baptist College this fall Southern Baptists will be operating seventy-three schools: 6 Seminaries and a joint operation with National Baptists of another Seminary, 35 senior colleges, 19 junior colleges, 7 academies, and 5 Bible schools. Two of our junior colleges are now in the process of becoming senior colleges.

Only two senior colleges and one junior college remain unaccredited. All three of these are working toward full accreditation by the Jubilee Year of 1964. The Education Commission reports that the shortage of qualified teachers continues to be the number one problem of administrators. There is an oversupply of teachers in Bible and religion but a critical shortage in every other area.

Baptist Colleges now enroll about one in five Baptist students in college and the ratio will probably be about one in ten in the next eight years. This will largely be due to the unlimited expansion of facilities of public institutions as over against limited expansion of our Baptist schools to meet the demands of the day. This places upon our Baptist institutions added responsibility in recruitment. Total enrollment in Baptist Colleges 1962-63 reached a record high of 80,987. Graduates during the academic year totaled 10,922. Total assets of Southern Baptist educational institutions now stands at \$392,408,610, of which \$97,654,943 is endowment.

## FLORIDA BAPTIST EDUCATIONAL INSTITUTIONS

Florida Baptists have two schools: Stetson University, the oldest university in Florida, located at De Land, and Baptist Bible Institute, located at Graceville. During the 1962-63 term there were 2,686 students enrolled in Stetson. Five hundred of whom were Baptist young people. Eighty-seven of these were committed to some church related vocation: 43 ministerial students, 4 Home and Foreign Mission volunteers, 13 studying to be Ministers of Education and 27 Ministers of Music.

Baptist Bible Institute offers special training for students who cannot attend college. Total non-duplicating enrolment for the year 1962-63 was 225. Members of the student body came from 18 different states, with 121 of them from Florida. Baptist Bible Institute is ministering to a large segment of the southeastern part of the United States. The affairs of the Institute are administered by a Board of Trustees (15) elected by the Florida Baptist Convention. We are very proud of the high quality work being done by both of our schools.

A joint committee from the Stetson Trustees and Convention, authorized by the Florida Baptist Convention, has been working in the direction of bringing about a closer relationship and understanding between Stetson and the Convention. This committee was continued by the Convention last year in Daytona and will report at the Convention this fall in Jacksonville.

## REPORT ON EVANGELISM

Florida is growing as few states are growing. We face challenges in area of evangelism that we have never faced, and we feel the burden of reaching people for Christ as we have never felt.

Southern Baptists have been blessed by God as no other Evangelical group in all history. However, along with these blessings there are inescapable responsibilities. We are Christians and we must share with those who are not Christians. We are the children of light and we must share with those who sit in darkness.

During the year association had a total of 34 baptisms and a total of 57 additions received by transfer of letter. The eleven churches in the Apalachee Association had a total of only ten revivals. Two churches reported no revivals at all, only one church had two revivals. The 963 Baptists in the Apalachee Association reached only 34 souls for Christ. It took 28.3 persons to win one soul for Jesus.

In the light of need and tremendous challenge we recommend:

1. That we strive to reach the "Evangelism Standard of Excellence" for our association annually.
2. That our association have an evangelistic clinic on a suitable date.
3. That our association participate in the simultaneous Baptist Jubilee Revivals, either in March or April.

Our Children's Home continues to render services to the needy families of our state. Assistance was given to 436 children during the year.

Mother's Aid is one of the most satisfactory and successful methods of child care. Under this plan the children remain at home with their mother who is given financial assistance.

This type of assistance is dependent upon the cooperation of the parent with the policies of the Home which require that the children attend and become a part of the local church and its services.

Some children need more personal attention than is available in group living. These are placed in foster homes that will give them Christian training. All foster homes and children in their care are supervised by workers from Lakeland or the Miami branch.

The Woman's organizations, Missionary Circles, Sunday School classes, and Training Unions provide some help by giving spending money, clothing, and other personal needs of the children. This is an excellent way to foster and maintain an interest between the members of our churches and the Home. Interest in a child is as important to those who are giving as to the child himself. It teaches him that others are interested in him and want to help him. Children learn best by personal relationship with Christian adults, and those who give to help him are enriched more than the child.
