CONSTITUTION OF THE FLORIDA BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

ARTICLE 1. This Association shall be known by the name of The Florida Baptist Association. The object of this Association shall be to conduct the work of missions, colportage, Sabbath School enterprises and other work that will tend to the spread of the Gospel.

Article 2. This Association shall be composed of white male members chosen by the respective churches in its union, in the proportion of two members for each church of fifty or less, and one additional delegate for every twenty-five members over fifty. No church, however, shall have more than four delegates.

Article 3. The letters sent by the churches at each session of the Association shall express their respective members in full fellowship, those baptized, received by letter, restored, dismissed, excommunicated and dead since last session.

Article 4. Believing it to be proper, on account of the diversity of opinion among men as to the import of Scripture contained in the Old and New Testaments, to declare our belief and understanding thereof, we therefore append our belief in twelve Articles and present them, with our minutes, to the Baptist denomination.

Article 5. The Association, when convened, shall be governed by a regular and proper decorum. A Moderator and Clerk shall be chosen by the votes of the members present, who shall hold their offices until the next session of the body, and until their successors are elected. The Moderator shall preside at the meetings of the Association, and the Clerk shall record the proceedings thereof and prepare them for the press,

Article 6. The Association thus organized shall have no power to lord it over God's heritage nor infringe upon the internal rights

Article 7. Newly constituted churches may be admitted to this union on application by letter and delegates; and if, upon examination, found to be orthodox, shall be received by the Association Moderator.

Article 8. The Association shall furnish the minutes of their proceedings in proportion to the funds sent up for that purpose by the churches.

Article 9. The minutes of the Association shall be publicly read (and corrected, if necessary) and then signed by the Moderator and Clerk before adjournment.

Article 10. Any amendment or ratification of this Constitution may be made by the votes of two-thirds of the members present at any two regular successive meetings of the Association. All other matters of fellowship shall be decided by a majority of votes. In matters of fellowship the Association must be a unit.

Article 11. The Association shall have power, first, to provide for the general union of the churches; second, to give the churches advice in matters of difficulty; third, to inquire into the cause of any failing to be represented at the meetings of the Association; fourth, to withdraw all connection from any church or churches in this union who shall violate the rules of this Association, or shall deviate from the orthodox principles of the revealed Word of God; fifth, to appropriate the money contributed and sent up to the Association as specified by said churches, and when not specified it shall be appropriated to promote the best interests of the Master's cause; sixth, to adjourn to any future time and place they may deem most convenient to the churches in the union.

RULES OF DECORUM OF THE FLORIDA BAPTIST ASSOCIATION.

- 1. At every meeting of the Association the Moderator shall call the members to order and cause the Clerk to read the minutes of the previous Association.
- 2. The Moderator shall preserve order, and shall speak on any point of order with reference to the other members, and shall decide questions of order, subject to an appeal to the Association, when requested by any two members.
- 3. The Moderator shall put all questions distinctly in this form: "As many as are in favor (as the question may be) say 'Aye.'" And after the affirmative vote is taken, "As many as are of a contrary opinion say 'No.'" If doubtful which voice is in the majority, it shall be decided by rising and counting.
- 4. The Moderator shall appoint the committees, except in cases of appointment by ballot.
- 5. In all cases of ballot the Moderator may vote. In all other cases he shall not vote unless the Association be equally divided, or unless his vote given to the minority will make the division equal. In that case the question shall be lost.
- When any member is about to speak in debate he shall rise and address the Moderator.
- 7. If any member, while speaking or otherwise employed, transgress the rules of decorum, the Moderator shall, or any member may, call him to order.
- 8. When two or more members shall rise at the same time, the Moderator shall decide who is first entitled to the floor.
- 9. No member shall indulge in unkind remarks in debate, nor shall any member speak more than twice on the same question without leave from the Association, nor more than once until every one choosing to speak shall have done so.
- 10. While any member is addressing the Association, it shall, be the duty of the Moderator to suppress all private discourse that may be entertained between the members, and require strict attention on the part of the members.
- 11. When a motion is made and seconded it shall be stated by the Moderator before debate.

- 12. Every motion shall be reduced to writing if desired by any member of the Association.
- 13. After a motion is made and seconded it shall be deemed in possession of the Association, but may be withdrawn at any time before being discussed or amended.
- 14. When a question is under debate no motion shall be entertained unless to amend it or refer it to a committee, or for the previous question, or for adjournment.
- 15. A motion for adjournment shall always be in order, and decided without debate.
- 16. Any member may call for a division of a question when two or more distinct propositions are set forth, and when the substance will admit of division.
- 17. Motions and amendments may be referred to a committee at the pleasure of the Association.
- 18. Every resolution shall receive two statements or readings in the Association previous to its passage. The first shall be for information, and the second when the decision of the Association is to be made.
- 19. These rules may be changed or amended at any full meeting of the Association.
- 20. The Association shall be opened and closed with prayer each day by the Moderator or some other member.
- 21. All queries shall be fairly stated in writing and approbated by two-thirds of the members present before they shall be acted on.

ARTICLES OF FAITH OF THE FLORIDA BAPTIST ASSOCIATION.

Article 1. We believe in one only true and living God, and that there are three in the Godhead—the Father, the Son and the Holy Ghost.

Article 2. We believe the Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments are the Word of God, and the only rule of faith and practice.

Article 3. We believe the doctrine of particular and eternal election.

Article 4. We believe in the doctrine of original sin.

Article 5. We believe in man's impotency to recover himself from the fallen state in which he is by nature, by his own free will and ability.

Article 6. We believe that we are justified in the sight of God only by the imputed righteousness of Christ.

Article 7. We believe that God's elect shall be called, regenerated and sanctified by the Holy Ghost.

Article 8. We believe that the saints shall persevere in grace and never finally fall away.

Article 9. We believe that baptism and the Lord's Supper are ordinances of Jesus Christ; that nothing is baptism except immersion; that believers are the only subjects of this ordinance, and that none but baptized believers are entitled to partake of the Lord's Supper.

Article 10. We believe in a general resurrection of the dead and a general judgment.

Article 11. We believe that the punishment of the wicked shall be everlasting, and the joys of the righteous will be eternal.

Article 12. We believe that no minister has a right to administer the ordinances only such as are regularly called and have come under the imposition of the hands of the presbytery.

MADISON, FLORIDA, Sept. 29th, 1903.

TUESDAY MORNING.

The election of Moderator and Clerk.—On motion of T. J. Faulkner, seconded by Rev. A. M. Manning, Rev. F. M. Wells was re-elected Moderator.

On motion of Rev. A. J. Reamy, seconded by G. W. Young, that Rev. Stephen Crockett be re-elected Clerk by acclamation. The same carried, and both officers made brief remarks appropriate to the occasion.

Visiting brethren were invited to seats with us, and responses were received in the persons of Rev. T. J. Sparkman, representing Stetson University, Rev. J. B. Holly, representing The Southern Baptist, Rev. E. P. Mickell, D. D., pastor of the Madison Presbyterian church, Rev. T. C. Bradford, pastor of the Madison M. E. church, Rev. W. F. Wagner, of Jasper.

Corinth church, Taylor county, presented a petitionary letter for membership in the Association, and the church was voted into fellowship, and Rev. F. M. Wells as Moderator extended the right hand of welcome to the pastor, Rev. H. T. Austin.

In the "Financial Table," as appearing on page 20 of the Minutes of the Association for the year 1902, there be inserted the following columns after the column "For Baptist Orphanage," a column denominated "For Bible School Expenses," to be followed by another column marked "Total Expenses."

Then in the table "Statistics of Membership," a column, preceding the column denominated "By Baptism" under "Increase," to be marked "Membership Reported Last Year."

The time of meeting was fixed that the Association adjourn to meet at 9 a. m., and adjourn at 12; meet at 1:30 p. m., and adjourn at will. Rev. Frank W. Cramer spoke tenderly in regard to the death of Deacon T. A. Williams, of the Tallahassee church. The Association adjourned with prayer by Rev. A. M. Manning. At 7:30 Rev. W. F. Wagner preached the Introductory Sermon; text, Deut. 1:6, John 11:25.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON FOREIGN MISSIONS.

Your Committee on Foreign Missions would respectfully beg the privilege of submitting the following report, to-wit:

The past year has been fraught with great blessings to all our mission fields in foreign lands.

Never in the history of our mission work have the results been more encouraging or the prospects more bright.

This is true not only in regard to the results obtained in the mission fields themselves, but at home many of our larger and most influential churches are realizing the duty of giving to the support of this work as never before. In many of our Southern States—possibly with a few exceptions—in all of them the offerings to this work were larger during the past year than in any year in the history of our work.

The Board of Foreign Missions of the Southern Baptist Convention has said that to accomplish the work necessary to be done during the current year we must have \$300,000. This will involve earnest effort and most liberal giving on the part of all.

Brethren of the churches of the Florida Association, shall we do our part in this great work? The showing during the past year has not been very encouraging.

Out of thirty-seven churches composing our Association, only ten gave anything to this cause. Comment on these facts are unnecessary. Less than \$100 was given by the entire Association—about five cents per member.

What we would recommend to all of our churches is that we give over ourselves to more earnest prayer for this great cause.

That our pastors become better informed in regard to this work and seek to instruct their churches in the duty of supporting the work. The Foreign Mission Journal in every home.

That during the coming year at least two or three Missionary Institutes be held within our Association and at centrally located points. That at these Institutes competent and well qualified speakers shall be secured who will be able to instruct us in the work. That by wise planning these institutes be made the source of missionary intelligence and enthusiasm, and that all our pastors, official church members and every person be earnestly urged to attend these meetings. All of which we most respectfully submit.

Dear Brethren: We, your Committee on Sunday Schools, regret to find so little interest manifested in Sunday School work, as we consider the Sunday School one of the most important steps in laying the foundation of religious training in the young mind. However, we find that in many sections of our country false doctrine is being

taught according to Baptist views, and for that reason we recommend that nothing but distinctive Baptist literature be used in our Sabbath Schools. We find that very few of our churches report Sabbath Schools; twelve being the total reported in the Florida Association.

The licensed saloon must go. The making and sale of domestic, spirituous drinks of every class should stop. Do not cultivate in the young a taste for these drinks, which lead to the use of stronger bever-

age and to drunkenness. Do not help make drunkards by influence, example or encouragement of any kind.

We should scatter temperance literature in our families, churches and communities. We should fight intemperance everywhere by well ordered lives and Godly conversation. Let us deny ourselves all unrighteousness and worldly lusts and live righteously, soberly and Godly in this present evil world,

The following report on Periodicals was received:

We cannot overestimate or overvalue the importance of religious periodicals, which carry from week to week, sound doctrines and profitable reading matter into every household where they are invited and provided for. They interest the children; they offer useful suggestions to heads of families; they provide instruction for the young; those of middle age and those who are advanced in life. The Sabbath School literature and the weekly religious papers are a valuable addition to the Sabbath School library in furnishing religious reading for the Sabbath Day; and where they are regularly found the day is more likely to be kept sound. In training our children in the way they should go we should feel it a duty to provide these aids and those families and communities are

blessed where the religious periodicals have a recognized flow, and is a religious visitor.

The Baptists of Florida have room to rejoice that they have two well conducted papers in the State that give to their readers from week to week interesting accounts of what goes on in our different fields of labor. Truthful reports of our convention and association work and valuable items from other states and communities; our denominational views are clearly taught and ably defended and they are valuable allies to the pastors, to the Sabbath School superintendent and teacher and to the dear sisters in their field of labor they have laid out for themselves.

We recommend the Baptist Witness and Southern Baptist to the churches throughout the limits of the Association and their membership. We hope that the circulation and usefulness of these two papers will be constantly on the increase. The Kind Words, The Lesson Leaflets and other Sunday School literature by the Southern Baptist Convention and the American Publication Society are doing good work in the Sabbath School and family circle. The Sabbath School paper should be in every household and its Gospel teachings and instructive stories often make impressions upon the minds of children and youth that are life-long and ineffaceable.

We are glad to note of late years that there has been a large increased interest in this class of religious literature, and a wide circulation of religious papers for old and young, but there is still room for improvement, and we hope that pastors and heads of families will constantly feel that it is incumbent upon them to aid and promote the circulation of religious periodicals.

Rev. W. A. Bryan was received as a correspondent from the West Florida Association. On motion of Rev. E. L. Wells all speeches on reports be limited to three minutes.

The report of Finance Committee was received and adopted. (The report is found in Table No. 1.—Sec'y.).

The Treasurer's report was read and adopted with the proviso that \$7.50, credited to Brother A. S. White, be credited to the Quincy church, and any discrepancy concerning amounts credited to Quincy church be adjusted by Brother White and the treasurer.

Dear Brethren-Your committee, acting on instruction received at the last meeting of this body, looked around for some available minister to place as missionary in the Association for all his time, and found that the most of our brethren were at work for all or part of their time. W. A. Bryan, of Chipley, was recommended to us as a useful and able worker, so he was employed in January at a salary of \$50 per month, he to pay his own traveling expenses. For work done, and its results, we refer you to his report. The church at Chaires sent in a special plea for help, and after due consideration, we agreed to assist them to the amount of \$50 for the year, with Brother Crockett to do the work at that point. We have used the money placed in our hands for work above mentioned, and find a deficit of near \$150.00, and we urge the continuation of work and earnestly appeal for the hearty cooperation of the entire Association, that we may more fully develop the resources of our field.

We recommend that our pastors try to bring their flocks up to a higher standard of world-wide missions, also to their duties to their pastors, as we are taught that the laborer is worthy of his hire. We further recommend that our pastors specially dwell upon the doctrinal principles of the Bible, and not be influenced by ideas and suggestions of men. We further recommend that they make special efforts to establish Sunday schools in every church and section.

The following brethren were by vote of the Association elected members of the Executive Committee by acclamation: A. J. Reamy, F. M. Wells, E. Trice, A. Reams, W. F. Cowan, John R. Campbell, Rev. W. A. Bryan read his report as missionary, and the same was adopted.

To the Florida Association, Session of 1903:

Dear Brethren—At the solicitation of your Executive Committee, I began work for you as missionary evangelist at a salary of \$50.00 per month on the tenth day of January, and have labored eight months. I was instructed to visit the churches, assist the pastors in awakening a deeper interest in missions on all lines. Also to visit such destitution,—if there was any,—as I could reach, and do all I could for the cause generally. These instructions I have carried out to the best of my ability. I have visited

the following churches, viz: Providence, Sunny Dell, Quincy, Mt. Pleasant, Carrabelle, Arran, Aenon, Fort Braiden, Lake Ellen, Mt. Bezor, Ebenezer in Leon county, Harmony, Flat Creek, Greenville, Elizabeth, Mt. Elon, Ebenezer in Jefferson county, and Concord. Also the following destitute points: Sopchoppy, River Junction and Ashmore. Some of the churches I have given two meetings, hoping thereby to deepen the interest awakened at our former meetings, which was done. I have made two visits to River Junction, where we have no church or meeting house, but where we ought to build a neat but inexpensive house of worship. I have pledges on the ground \$50.00 to start it, and feel sure I could raise double that amount once work was begun. Sopchoppy, a thriving little town on the C. T. & G. R. R., composed of splendid people, intelligent and refined, should have a house of worship also, and there is some talk among the brethren of moving Mt. Bezor church to this point and building a house. I have preached 7.1 sermons on missions, have attended six special prayer services and made 74 visits to hold prayer and give religious instructions. I have distributed 1400 tracts and established seven agencies for our denominational organs, i. e., The Florida Baptist Witness. The Foreign Mission Journal and Home Field. I have traveled 2466 miles in the performance of my labors. I have received from the committee, direct and indirect, \$259.56. The pastors with whom I have labored have been "true yoke-fellows" and "faithful ministers of Jesus Christ." I have found a great field and a splendid people awaiting development. The spirit of anti-missions is the barrier, and much prayer, faithful and judicious work the remedy. I have found your committee competent and courteous. Your treasurer's report will give due credit for all funds received.

I desire to thank the committee and all the churches of the Florida Association for personal favors and their hearty co-operation in our work. I desire also to thank Bro. J. C. Porter, editor of our Witness, for sample copies for distribution, and Bro. L. D. Geiger for kind-

nesses and the transportation companies for valuable assistance.

I feel a profound interest in our Lord's kingdom in all the earth, and I pray that the results of our year's work may be at last a crown of rejoicing for us all and that our dear Master may say to us, "Well done."

Hancock and your missionary, I have been able to hold services regularly each month with the church at Chaires. Not being able to secure help we have not had any protracted meeting; but one has been added to the membership. The church asks the Association to help them for another year.
