REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON FOREIGN MISSIONS.

DEAR BRETHREN: We are devoutly thankful to record that great advances have been made in connection with this phase of the Master's work. The recent visit of our beloved Corresponding Secretary of the Foreign Mission Board, Rev. R. J. Willingham, D. D., to the various fields of missionary operations where he visited the missionaries at their stations, has led to a greater interest in, and given a most wonderful impetus to the work. The members of our churches are giving more largely than ever for the regeneration of lost souls in far off lands and in so doing find that the home church grows and prospers to a far greater extent as a result thereof. We do not desire to introduce in the report any statistics, but would suggest that in the report of our Foreign Mission Board, as printed in the Minutes of the Southern Baptist Convention, we have a document that is thrilling in interest, giving a complete authentic, and complete report; which

is an authority concerning the recent advances and conquests during the past year, and in our Foreign Mission Journal, each month, there are found messages from the toilers at the front and as we read their burning words of love for the salvation of those to whom they have been sent, we should feel led to offer most hearty and sincere prayers for more laborers to be sent into the ripening fields, and to give more largely than ever to this glorious work so precious to the heart of our Lord and Saviour, Jesus Christ.

The report of Committee on Ministerial Education was presented.

MINISTERIAL EDUCATION.

In every department of life the demand is for educated men. Our present school facilities make it possible for all classes to receive a practical education and the country is advanced in intelligence to where it is imperative that those who lead or teach must be educated. The preacher is God's under shepherd, the shepherd must lead not follow the flock.

His work is to "elicit," combine and direct the forces over which the Holy Spirit has placed him for the bringing in of the Kingdom. The character of his work makes it necessary that he should be educated.

Moses was qualified for the work of leading Israel out of bondage, by being "instructed in all the wisdom of the Egyptians." The Apostle to the Gentiles, the greatest preacher of the ages, was prepared for his work while studying at the feet of Gamaliel. The preacher

must be a man of brain power and heart power to be able to protect his people from the wiles of the devil. Our pioneer preachers have wrought nobly against great odds for which we hold them in grateful remembrances and bless God for their lives and work, but if we fail to build on this foundation so well laid by them and to take advantage of our present opportunities, we will prove unworthy sons of noble sires.

We have in this state Columbia College at Lake City, where seventeen young preachers studied last year. Fourteen have enrolled this year, and Dr. G. A. Nunnally informs us that he is looking for six more. Stetson University, at DeLand, a great school belonging to the Baptist and the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary at Louisville, Ky., the greatest Theological school on the continent. These schools are for the special work of educating young preachers, and equipping them for their work. To all of these let us give our prayers, our boys and our means.

The missionary sermon was preached at 7:30 p. m. by Rev. A. J. Kroellinger, subject "The Local Church

and Missions." A Missionary collection was taken, amounting to \$8.82.

The moderator was requested to write an article on The History of The Florida Association, the same to be published in our minutes and to be read at the next meeting of the Association.

WEDNESDAY MORNING.

At 9 o'clock the moderator read Psalm 91 and led in prayer.

The minutes were read and adopted.

The report of Committee on State Missions was passed for the present by vote of the Association.

The report of Committee on Home Missions was read and adopted, after being ably discussed by the following named brethren: J. E. Clements, S. Pasco, J. B. Pruitt, W. F. Moore and W. D. Levy.

REPORT OF HOME MISSIONS.

There is no more gratifying development in the denomination than the growing interest of Southern Baptists in their Home Mission work. Leading men among us have of late freely expressed the opinion that this department of our work is of great importance and should be enlarged without delay.

The Southern Baptist Convention at its last session put itself on record to the same effect and unanimously recommended to the denomination that contributions be doubled for this object this year.

First—Home Mission has already done great things for Southern Baptists. Missionaries of the Home Mission Board, have made hundreds of thousands of converts, constituted thousands of churches, organized numbers of Sunday Schools, and assisted in establishing the Baptist cause in every State in the South. Every State,

and almost every community, has felt the direct or indirect influence of the work and received benefits from it.

Second—The South presents great Home Mission need to-day, Southern cities are multiplying and growing in size and wickedness; floods of foreigners are coming in who must be saved or they will lower our standard of civilization.

What answer will this Association make to these appeals; what will it do with this opportunity and sacred duty? Your Committee recommends, first, that we as an Association endeavor this year to increase our contributions to Home Missions in proportion to the advance recommended by the Southern Baptist Convention, which will be 50 per cent. over what we did last year. Second, that we recommend that our pastors and members who constitute this Association be requested to exercise great interest in this part of the work.

It is helpful, spiritually, by uniting its members in a closer christian communion; it is helpful to the Pastor in assisting him to advance the material prosperity of the church; it is exceedingly helpful to the body at large by teaching its members to "earnestly contend for the faith once delivered to the Saints," and also by instilling in the young mind a desire to each make a unit in the grand army that is eventually to take the world for Christ.

DUTY OF THE CHURCH TO ITS PASTOR.

In this advanced age of Christian civilization and culture in which we are living, in this enlightened day and in a Christian nation like ours, a report on the duty of a church to its pastor should not be necessary. But the very fact that such a subject has been assigned, shows

that we must have a need for education along this line within the metes and bounds of our Association. That our preachers should be supported liberally is certainly evident to all true Christians.

The pastor whose full time is taken in one or more churches has little time to devote to making a living. We expect our preachers to be learned in the Scriptures and filled with the spirit, and that preacher is best qualified along this line who spends much time daily in studying his old Bible and in communing long with his Lord in secret prayer.

We expect them also to take a deep interest in all matters that pertain to the temporal welfare of their people. We expect them to be, and they should be, leaders, in educational matters in their communities, and they should be posted on the current thought of the day. This requires time for general reading and a library well stocked with the best books, papers and magazines.

Again, their pastoral calls when all goes well with us, must be attended to regularly. And where great joy or trouble comes to us to whom can we turn so readily as our beloved pastors. They rejoice with us in our success and weep with us in our days of sorrow. But if our pastors had time from their great duties they could not care on successfully a secular business. The very nature of their work incapacitates them from other business.

The pastor should teach his flock to give liberally towards the support of God's cause and kingdom and His divinely appointed ministers, and he himself should lead the way, and so far as we have been able to ascertain, our pastors give most liberally of their often limited means. Our duty is plain here. Our pastors should be supported comfortably in a manner befitting the field where they are laboring.

But we owe our pastor a great deal more than mere temporal support. We call on him for sympathy in our troubles and find him ever ready. We should never forget that he too, has his times of depression when many

cares weigh heavy on him. The true pastor is concerned about the spiritual condition of his people, and at all times the burden of the unsaved souls of his community lies heavy on him. Often poverty oppresses through our neglect, and sometimes great sorrows come to his home as well as ours. Then we should be ready to offer comfort and cheer to one from whom we have received so much, not only in words of sympathy but in the substantial things of this world, "Even as the Lord has prospered us." We should indeed be "living epistles known and read of all men," and we should be ready to co-operate with our pastor, in all movements towards the spread of the gospel and the salvation of immortal souls.

When we reach this high plane, then can our churches say: "We have prospered because the Lord was with us."

The Moderator, addressing Bro. S. Pasco, presented the report of the Executive Committee, and in connection with this the report of our Missionary was read and, spoken to by Bro. F. M. Wells and Stephen Crockett, the reports were adopted.

REPORT OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

Dear Brethren:

Your committee received intimation in the early spring that Lloyd and Mays were without the Gospel, as we understand it, and therefore missionary grounds. We had a meeting therefore on the 24th of April to consider the advisability of placing a missionary at those

points. And after duly considering the matter, we employed Bro. Stephen Crockett to preach once a month at these places, at a salary of \$12.50 per month. We have been able to pay him for his first quarter's service, but we are still owing him for two months' services.

We refer you to his report for results of his work. All of which is respectfully submitted.

I have preached ten times, traveled fifty-five miles, collected \$4.75.

Your Committee on Temperance reports: That it is our conviction that we should take a square stand against intemperance in all of its many forms. That as an Association we should go on record as favoring every legitimate effort to banish intoxicating liquors from our State and county. That as we have done in the past,

we should so do in the future until this great curse should be destroyed. That we approve of the work and aims of the Florida State Anti-Saloon League, and give our hearty support to the cause of temperance and the moral welfare of every home and individual.

BY THE COMMITTEE.

The report of the Committee on Orphanage was read and adopted.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON ORPHANAGE.

We your Committee on Orphanage would report as follows: We believe the Orphanage to be an institution of God, and we believe that the Orphanage at Arcadia is a step in the right direction to take care of the orphan children. They are to be fed and clothed and cared for and in so doing we are serving God and our fellow creatures. And we would recommend that each pastor of the different churches would take up as much as one collection per year for the Orphanage.

We will give you a statistical report of the Orphanage.

The Home was opened February 1st, 1904. Since it was opened seventy children have been cared for in the Home. Number boarders in the Home sent home after the first twelve months, 4; to mothers marrying again have been sent 7. To mothers becoming able to care for their children, sent 10. Re-committed to the Insane Asylum at Chattahoochee, 1. Whole number sent away, 22. Number now in the Home, 48. Number of meals served in the Home during last twelve months, 1,090. Spent for food for the Home, including 2 horses and 3 cows, during the last twelve months, \$1,040.00. Cost of new building, \$5,228.77. Twenty-eight of the children have joined the church. I am expecting four others next week.

And now we believe that Bro. Bean is doing his duty

and that we should all do all we can to help him on with the good work.

WOMAN'S WORK.

The right of a religious organization to exist ought to be measured by its ability to meet some distinct need in the Master's work. In this respect your committee feel that organized Woman's Work has passed the experimental stage and has taken its place among the permanent departments of the churches.

Organized in May, 1818, at Richmond, Va., the Woman's Missionary Union, auxiliary to the Southern

Baptist Convention, has steadily "advanced in wisdom and stature, and in power with God and men." It has increased in cash and box contributions from \$30,000.00 to almost \$200,000.00.

Under the able leadership of Miss Jennie S. Spalding, the work in Florida shows a steady increase in interest and contribution. We deplore the fact that so few of our churches in the Florida Association have local Unions. We would recommend that their Association make every effort possible to increase the number of Unions and that we give all the encouragement possible to the women in their work. The report on Aged Ministers was read by Bro. S. Pasco, and being spoken to by J. B. Pruitt, S. Pasco, Stephen Crockett, W. R. Ivey and H. C. Billingsley was adopted. A collection was taken amounting to \$10.73 to help buy a horse for one of the aged preachers, which was on motion turned over to Bro. Stephen Crockett to be turned over to the worthy brother.

The Committee on Aged Ministers have no data upon which to base a report later than the annual report for last year made by the Corresponding Secretary to the State Convention in January last. This department of the Convention work was then languishing, while progress was being made in all others. The amount raised during the previous year has been \$321.00, a reduction from former receipts which had never been liberal. This meagre sum was divided equally between eight of our honest brethren who had borne the banner of the cross in the days when they could rejoice in their strength; it amounted to about \$40.00 for each, less than \$3.50 per month.

The total receipts from all our Baptist organizations during the year amounted to nearly \$50,000.00 for all

purposes, so that it is evident that our aged ministers received but an insignificant proportion of the contributions of their brethren throughout the State.

The minutes of this Association for 1907 show that eleven of our thirty churches contributed \$47.80 to this cause, much less than should have been raised, but, if the twenty-four Associations in the State had averaged as much, the total amount would have been nearly four times as large as was raised.

There are 524 Baptist churches on our Convention rolls and, if each church would contribute but \$5.00 annually, the total amount would gladden the hearts of these venerable men of God.

It cannot be that the Baptists of Florida are wanting in respect to these pioneers and early workers in this part of the Lord's vineyard or that they are indifferent to their wants and comfort in their declining years, while the shadows of night are falling upon them. Your committee would rather believe that the present conditions are due to a lack of information upon the subject and because of a lack of systematic effort to raise funds for this special cause.

No general plan can be made effective by a single Association, but the committee recommend that the matter be brought to the attention of the State Convention, so that some recommendations may be agreed upon and sent out to the Associations and churches.

The committee suggests that an annual letter sent out by our Corresponding Secretary stating the number and the special wants of the beneficiaries and fixing a time for a collection for their relief would result in increased contributions.

It is practicable to enlarge the purposes and operations of the Baptist Ministers Assurance Association so as to establish an Annuity Fund for its contributing members when they reach a certain age or are no longer able to labor because of disability caused by accident or disease.

These suggestions look to the future, but we suggest that the churches in this Association should not wait for the adoption of some new plan before giving additional relief to our aged and needy ministers; and we recommend that a collection be taken up in each church before Christmas for their benefit.

Brethren, these venerable men have worn themselves out in the Lord's work and a sacred duty rests upon the members of the Baptist churches throughout Florida to support them comfortably and generously. Let us resolve to discharge this duty in the future in a spirit of greater liberality than we have in the past.
