HAWTHORN, FLA., October 27th, 1886.

The Santa Fe River Association met this day with Pleasant Grove Church. The exercises opened by singing 685th hymn. Prayer by Rev. B. R. Moseley.

The Introductory Sermon was preached by Rev. B. R. Moseley. Exodus: 14th chapter, 15th verse. After sermon, prayer by Rev. J. F.

The letters from the churches were then read and the Messengers names enrolled.

The body then proceeded to permanent organization by electing W. N. Chaudoin Moderator, I. J. Halsted Clerk, and G. W. Hall Treasurer, by acclamation.

The order of business of last session was adopted.

The Committee on Publication reported as follows:

Your Committee on Publications submit the following report: We are glad to see that our paper, the Florida Baptist Witness, is constantly growing in favor and increasing in circulation. We hereby heartily recommend it to every Baptist in the State and earnestly urge every pastor and other leading members of our churches to make a faithful effort to introduce the Witness into every family in their respective churches. We therefore offer the following resolution as the unanimous expression of this Association:

Resolved: That we consider the Florida Baptist Witness a necessity as an organ of communication that Baptists in all the States be united in the glorious work of missions and education.

We also recommend to our Churches and Missionary Societies, the Foreign Mission Journal and Heathen Helper; and to Baptist families and Sunday Schools. Kind Words and the Child's Gem, published in Atlanta, Ga., and the publications of the American Baptist Publication Society. We earnestly recommend to parents the importance of supplying their children with the periodicals and books of this Society.

The Missionary sermon was preached by Rev. J. Eden and a collection taken up amounting to \$25.51.

Adjourned till 2 p. m.

2 P. M .- Association opened with prayer by Rev L. C. Moore, of Kenka.

The Finance Committee made report which was adopted.

It was voted to equally distribute the collection taken between the Home and Foreign Missions and Ministerial Education funds, which after discussion, was adopted.

The announcements were made that Rev. W. F. Wood would talk on the Cuban Mission at 7 p. m., and Rev. L. C. Music would preach at Orange Lane at same hour.

The report of the Committee on Womans' Mission Work was read. and touching remarks made on the death of Sr. Bailey by several of the brethren, and the report was adopted, viz:

Your Committee on Womans' Work would respectfully report:

First. The spread of the Gospel and the work of the churches demand the largest use of the gifts and talents with which Christian women are so liberally endowed. In all past ages they have had an important place in the cause of religion. Large fields of usefulness are continually opening before them which they only can fill. In heathen and Catholic countries the work of women is indispensible to prepare the way for the reception of the Gospel. As the large part of our church members are women, in view of what has already been done and the increasing demands for their labors and prayers, we would earnestly recommend the formation of Womens' Mission Circles where they do not now exist. The tone of society and spiritual condition of the churches will not rise above the condition of the women, therefore we may expect the best working churches where the sisters are most earnestly engaged in missionary work.

Second, Women more largely than men are moulding the minds of the children in secular and religious instruction and upon the spiritual condition of women will largely depend the future of our country.

We heartily approve the use they are now making of the press, where papers, tracts and leaflets are carrying religious truth into destitute places as well as into our own homes, and producing good results all over our land.

We would express our grateful appreciation of the department in our Florida Baptist Witness which Sister Farr has so ably conducted, with the hope that it may be continued.

We desire to express and place on record our heartfelt sympathy for our Brother N. A. Bailey in the death of his beloved wife, and our tender love for the sweet spirit and Christian life of our departed sister, who has dignified and enobled the work of women in the cause of Christ. Though Sister Bailey is dead, she still speaks, and will ever live in the grateful memory of the Baptists of Florida who knew her only to love her. S. K. LEAVITT, Chairman.

The report of Committee on Letters and Queries was read and adopted as follows: '

REPORT ON LETTERS AND QUERIES.

After careful reading all the letters from the churches composing this Association, we feel that there is cause for thanksgiving and praise to Almighty God to find such spiritual growth, and for the great harvest of souls that has been gathered into the visible kingdom of our Lord during the Association year just ended. Most of the churches have had gracious revivals of religion. One hundred and sixteen have been baptised according to the commandment of Christ, while many others have been received by letter and restoration. Thirteen of the churches report live and active Sunday Schools, many of them weekly prayer meetings, and all of them christian fellowship among the brethren.

There are two petitions for the next Association, namely, Buelah and Phillippi.

The following query was sent from Buelah:

- 1. When limited letters of dismmission are given to members that are never heard from, is it the duty of the churches to look after them?
 - 2. If they seem obstinate, what action should the church take?
- 3. Has a church the right to restore members to fellowship who have been excluded from other churches?

- 1. Yes, Whenever it is practicable to do so.
- 2. If the letter is allowed to go out of date, it is then null and void, and they are ameanable to the church as if no letter had been given.
- 3. It is discourteous to do so, and generally decidedly best not to do so. Circumstances should govern in each case.

A. P. ASHURST, Chairman. * The Special Committee on petitionary letters, report back the petition of the Windsor Church without recommendation, and wish to refer the petition to the whole body, which after discussion it was voted

to receive the church, and the Moderator gave the right hand of fellowship to the messengers.

The Special Committee to whom was referred the case of Blue Pond Church reported that they found the church to be in regular order which was laid on the table and it was voted that Blue Pond Church be referred to a Special Committee who shall report to the next session of the Association, committee to consist of Brethren Eden, King and Hall. Adjourned to meet at 7 p. m.

EVENING SESSION.

Association convened at 6 p. m. Prayer by Bro. Cone. The report of Committee on Missions was read which was followed by an address by Rev. W. F. Wood on Cuba, after which the report was adopted as follows:

The report of Committee on Sunday Schools, was read and adopted VIZ:

COMMITTEE ON SUNDAY SCHOOLS REPORT.

We believe the Sabbath School is under the banners of the Lord

and has His marching orders.

This is proved by reports from the churches. At Providence, out of ten accessions, seven were from the Sabbath School; at Waldo, out of five additions, four were from the Sunday School; at Eliam, out of thirty-five baptisms eighteen of the younger of them were from the Sabbath School.

^{*} The matter of difference arose from the fact that the church at time of organization had received two members who had lost their letters, and who produced statements to that effect instead of duplicate letters.

The same facts prevail in other churches and other associations, We deem it needless to praise the Sabbath School.

We have come to regard it no longer an ornament, only but a ne-

cessity likewise.

We think that a newly organized Baptist church would now almost naturally, and as one of the first thoughts of existence establish a Sabbath School.

For our encouragement, we would say that while much is to be lamented, and much to be hoped for, there is this to rejoice over, that Sabbath Schools are now the rule with our churches and not the exception. There is not a single church in our Association without a

Sabbath School.

Desirous of making a short report, we bring forward only one text of scripture, which applies to parents, guardians and friends, and to all who wish to do all the good they can, instead of seeking to avoid all the trouble they can: "Train up a child in the way he should go, and when

he is old he will not depart from it."

We would earnestly entreat all who conduct our Sabbath Schools, to get our denominational literature. We speak that we do know, that a few cents saved at the expense of truth is most wretched economy; and that is not all, teaching that is pernicious and reading that is hurtful, often, if not surely, come from a heedless acceptance of so-called cheap literature. We heartily endorse all the lesson helps, and question books published by Baptist book houses.

EVENING SESSION.

Association convened at 7. p. m. Prayer by Bro, Cone. The report of Committee on Missions was read which was followed by an address by Rev. W. F. Wood on the work in Cuba, and remarks made by Bros. Leavitt and Bailey, and the report adopted as follows:

1st. In the development of the missionary and the spread of the Gospel, we see the fulfillment of the prophecies of the old Testament and the promises of the new Testament. Truly "the grace of God has appeared unto all men." The religion of Christ is adapted to the needs of all the nations of the earth, which will soon be "filled with the knowledge of the glory of God." The gospel is evangelical and evangelistic, and no church can be in gospel order unless it holds forth the word of

2nd. We commend to the prayers and contributions of the churches all of our missionary societies, which are engaged in evangelizing the world, educating ministers and distributing the word of God not as a charity but as a most living service for Christ. Civilization and social order follows, but never precede christianity.

3d. The past year has been distinguished in the history of our denomination for large money contributions from the churches, and an enlargement of all branches of missionary work. Our own State work is in a most healthy condition. The Missionaries have been greatly blessed in their work and large numbers have been added to the churches. The foreign field holds out most encouraging prospects and large countries that have hitherto been closed to the gospel, are now inviting missionaries. Africa is rapidly becoming evangelized, and Ethiopa has already stretched out her hand to God. Cuba so long

priest ridden, is turning to the Lord. Upper Burmah is casting her idols to the moles and bats, and embracing the gospel of Christ. Along the line, the Lord's hosts are advancing and the song of Jubilee will soon be sung by the redeemed of all lands.

FRIDAY, 9 A. M.

Association convened pursuant to adjournment. Prayer by Bro. Lee. Minutes of yesterday read and approved. Rev. H. M. King was chosen alternate to preach introductory sermon.

The report of Committee on Education was read and discussed, after which it was adopted as follows:

We, the Committee on Education, would respectfully submit the following report:

Dear'Brethren, we feel that we cannot too strongly emphasize the importance, nay, the necessity of education. That "knowledge is power," is a truth which it does not require the argument of words to prove. Observation is the most convincing proof that may be brought to bear on this important subject. There is a need of more thorough training and discipline of both mind and heart. With the facilities for education which we now have, it is positively a crying evil and shame for the young to grow up in ignorance. And upon the training of the young now depends the weal or woe of State, Society and Church in the future. We say State, because the truly godly man is the highest type of a citizen. We say Society, because christian women elevate the moral standard of society. We say Church, because upon her depends the salvation of the world. We would urge, therefore, as Baptists are under special obligations to their children to give them as complete an education as lies within their power, that they patronize those institutions of learning which will produce the best results. We would, therefore, recommend the following as such institutions: Starke Institute, under the direction of our brother, Prof. Geo. C. Looney; Douglas Home School, at Gainesville, under the efficient management of Rev. C. V. Waugh, and DeLand Academy and College. This last named institution is emphatically our school. It opened on the 13th of October with most favorable auspices. Brother DeLand makes a proposition to the Baptists of Florida, which we will do well to consider and accept. He offers to give to us five acres of land, the college building, an excellent new domitory and ten thousand dollars as an endowment fund, on the condition that we contribute ten thousand dollars for the same purpose. Shall we have a Baptist school within our own State at which to educate our sons and daughers?

If the Baptists of Florida are interested, and they all ought to be, in the education of colored Baptists, we would recommend Live Oak Institute under the care of Bro. Fish.

And last, but most important of all, we need, and must have an educated ministry. We want men who study to show themselves approved of God, who need not to be ashamed to appear before any congregation, even of the most intelligent, and who by proper training are capable of rightly dividing the word of truth. The ministry must keep in the forefront in this matter if they are expecting to be leaders of the people. We would, therefore, urge upon the churches to take more interest in this matter and contribute more liberally of their means for the purpose of ministerial education. We heartily recommend Mercer University as a most desirable institution for the literary and theological training of those who contemplate entering the ministry, and the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary at Louisville, Kentucky, as a strictly theological school.

Your Committee on Temperance beg leave to report that, whereas, the age in which we live is one characterized by mighty efforts to suppress the evils of intemperance throughout the world, that we place ourselves upon the public record as in full sympathy with every legitimate movement, moral or social, tending to suppress the liquor traffic, or to educate the people to eschew the use of alcoholic drinks as a beverage, and that we neither recognize nor tolerate even moderate dram drinking in church members, or signing whiskey petitions; that we give our efforts to every legitimate effort to advance the cause of prohibition, whether local or general.
