CONSTITUTION.

1 This Association shall be called the Santa Fe River Baptist Association.

2 This Association shall be composed of Messengers of Baptist churches of this Association, maintaining the Gospel discipline. Such messengers are to be elected by their respective churches. In case any of the messengers, or their alternates so elected, fail to attend, Association at its own discretion can seat any other member of that church as Messenger until the pro rata share of messengers of that Church has been supplied.

 The object of this Association shall be the reunion of the Churches, the promotion of the true Gospel, and the dissemina-

tion of Bible truth.

4 This Association shall meet annually, on the first day of which meeting it shall elect, by ballot, a Moderator, a Clerk and

a Treasurer.

5 Any Baptist Church newly organized may become a member of this Association by letter petitioning for membership and giving information concerning organization and presbytery, and by whom organized. Any Church coming from another Association may become a member of this Association by presenting petitionary letter, accompanied by a letter of dismission from the Association from whence it comes.

6 This Association admits the right of any of the churches comprising it to withdraw by application for a letter without assigning any reason for so doing. At the same time, this Association claims the right to withdraw from any church which departs from the principles of this compact by becoming heterodox

in faith or disorderly in practice.

7 This Association shall be deemed an advisory council, and shall treat the Churches composing it as independent bodies in all matters of self government, and shall at no time interfere

with their rights.

8 This Association shall have an Executive Committee of five, of which the Treasurer shall be a member ex-officio. The other four members shall be elected annually by the Association, no two members being from the same Church. Three shall constitute a quorum for business. The Executive Committee shall elect its own chairman and secretary and have power to fill vacancies.

9 The Associational mission work shall be under the control and supervision of the Executive Committee and all Missionaries shall make quarterly reports to them when called upon

to do so.

10 All churches shall be entitled to two Messengers for the first fifty members, and one additional Messenger for each twenty-five additional members after the first and for the major fraction thereof.

11 It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to receive and disburse all funds of the Association, but only by order of the Asso-

ciation or Executive Committee.

12 This Constitution may be amended at any regular meeting of the Association by a two-thirds vote of the Messengers present.

ARTICLES OF FAITH.

Article 1 We believe in only one true and living God, and that there are three in the Godhead; the Father, the Son and the Holy Ghost,

Art. 2 We believe that the Scriptures of the Old and New Testament are the inspired Word of God, and the only rule of faith and practice.

Art. 3 We believe in the doctrine of original sin.

Art. 4 We believe that man is elected to salvation through faith in the Lord Jesus Christ, and is justified in the sight of God by the imputed righteousness of Christ.

Art. 5 We believe in man's inability to save himself from the fallen state from which he is, either by nature or by his own

free will.

Art. 6 We believe that man must repent to God alone for the sins he has committed.

Art. 7 We believe in the doctrine of regeneration by the Holy Spirit.

Art. 8 We believe that sanctification is the progressive work of the Holy Spirit, according to the will of God, whereby we are made partakers of His Holiness, through continued use of the appointed means, the Word of God, self-examination, self-denial, watchfulness, prayer, and the practice of all godly exercises and prayer.

Art. 9 We believe that all saints shall persevere in grace

and never finally fall away.

Art. 10 We believe that a Gospel church is a company of Christ's baptised believers, associated by covenant in the faith and fellowship of the Gospel; observing the ordinances of Christ; governed by His laws and exercising the gifts, rights and privileges invested in them by His word; that its only spiritual officers are bishops or pastors and deacons, whose qualifications claims and duties are defined in the epistles to Timothy and Titus.

Art. 11 We believe that Christian baptism is the immersion in water of a believer in Christ, by one duly qualified to administer the ordinance.

Art. 12 We believe that the Lord's Supper is a provision of bread and wine, representing Christ's body and blood, partaken of by the members of the Church assembled for that purpose, and that the Scriptural qualifications for partaking of same are regeneration, baptism, fellowship and unity and doctrine.

Art. 13 We believe that no minister has the right to administer the ordinances only such as are called, and have come

under the imposition of hands of the presbytery.

Art. 14 We believe in the general resurrection of the dead, and a general judgment.

Art. 15 We believe the punishment of the wicked everlast-

ing, and the joys of the righteous eternal.

Art. 16 We believe the first day of the week is the Lord's Day, is a memorial of Christ's resurrection, and should be kept holy, by the observance of all means of grace, both private and public, and by abstaining from all secular labor, except works of mercy and necessity.

Art. 17 We believe in the second coming of Christ, and that when He comes He will raise the dead from their graves, and judge the world righteously, appointing to the wicked endless sorrow, and to the righteous endless joy.

REPORT OF COMMITTEES.

Report on State Missions.

"Ye shall be witnesses unto me both in Jerusalem and in all Judea." These are words which came direct from the lips of Jesus. They were words of command to his disciples of whatever nationality or community in which they may be found, and in whatever age they may live. Therefore they apply directly to every church and to every member of every church within the bounds of this Association. Our obligation then is not only to our own community but also to our entire State.

Florida has many problems peculiar to itself. Because of her fertile fields and salubrious climate, her soils in some parts adapted to the production of crops equal or superior to the States just to our North; her sub-tropical climate and soils farther South, and her great play-grounds about her coasts and lakes and rivers are continually beckoning to those of less favored places to come and make this their home. And they are coming from every nation, State and clime. They are bringing with them almost all of the false doctrines taught in every community in our nation. Will the people, to whom God has given the whole truth, set quietly by and let error be taught, even to our own children? God forbid!

Villages and towns are springing up almost over night. In such places the gospel should be preached. In many of the places where opportunities are golden, it can only be preached, at the present time, by the help that we can give. This we have attempted to do. Seventy-six men have been commissioned this year to labor in as many fields, with the promise that their support, wholly or in part, would be borne by the more highly favored. How have we kept this promise? We have neglected this important matter to these closing days of the year, with the result that these same men have been asked to wait, to do without, till our brethren would come to the rescue. With heroic self-sacrifice, following the example of their Master, not one has left his post.

Now therefore, we recommend that every church represented in this body be asked to contribute regularly, either weekly or monthly, throughout the year to this cause. Let us remember that the divine command is, "Go ye into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature," but "How can they preach except they be sent?"

Report on Orphanage.

In our Orphanage at Arcadia, if properly supported, we have a distinct asset to our denomination whose influence and power will never decrease, but on the other hand will grow with the years. The value of this asset will grow because in this orphan's home we have an institution in which many homeless

children are given a home. A home in the purest sense. With Superintendent Trice at the head, with his splendid corps of assistants, these children soon learn to know what a real home is. With the advantages of school, the girls learning all things necessary to make them real home-workers, or being taught to be self-supporting in various suitable occupations; the boys are given elementary preparation so they may later complete them for professions or trades, according to their several inclinations. And best of all being taught the "Way of Life." Many of these will in years to come take their places as leaders in the respective churches into which their lives will be thrown.

We said in the beginning, if properly supported. Surely there are none so void of sympathy that they are unwilling to assist in the care of the homeless. Many would help if they only knew. There are now 94 children in the home and many more applicants. The present weekly expense is \$188.75. This will be increased as more are admitted. In our State we have 681 Baptist churches. If each church should give five cents per day the income would be \$238.35 per week. Many churches are doing much more than this. But alas! A majority of our churches are doing nothing. Let every church put the orphanage on her weekly budget and let us strive that five cents per day be our minimum. By doing this we may receive the blessing contained in our Savior's words, "Inasmuch as ye have done it unto one of the least of these my brethren, ye have done it unto me."

Report on Foreign Missions.

The present condition of the world emphasizes as never before that the peoples of the earth need the simple New Testament religion.

Our Foreign Mission work is an effort on our part to give to the nations of the world such a religion—the religion of Jesus Christ.

In this effort we seek to obey our Lord's last Command: Go, make Christians of all nations, baptising them in the name of the Father, Son and Holy Ghost. Doubtless there are present those who remember when our people were praying for open doors. We must now pray for open hearts and open purses. For the doors are wide open and the Macedonian cry is still sounding across the seas: "Come over and help us." The wide open dcors, the awakening of new Christian nations, their seeking for truth and the paths of peace challenge the Christians to give them the New Testament religion.

Our Foreign Mission Board, located at Richmond, Va., is composed of eighteen local members and eighteen State members, one from each State co-operating with Southern Baptist Convention. Through this Board we are doing Mission work in Italy, Brazil, Mexico, Argentina, China, Japan and Africa. In these countries we have 382 churches with 819 out-stations; 33,584 church members, 442 Sunday Schools, with nearly 24,000 scholars. There are 8,833 students in Mission Schools, 384 are in training for the Ministry. There are 300 missionaries with 651 native workers on these fields. Baptisms last year, 5,190. It is very needful that every church and every member consider earnestly the needs of the regions beyond and make Foreign Missions a real part of our regular and systematic giving.

Report on Temperance.

We, your Committee on Temperance, believe that no subject of political uplift and moral reform should engage the attention of right thinking people more than Temperance.

Liquor is God's worst enemy and the Devil's best friend; an enemy to the church and home.

Liquor never made a man more a man, but only helps the

brutish nature and makes a man more like a hog.

We are glad to state that during the past 12 months that prohibition has gained rapidly and men are more and more falling into line with the temperance forces.

The passage of the Davis package law in our own State is a great step forward in Florida, but the thing that should engage our attention most at this time, is the Blind Tiger element that is menacing our villages and towns and leading our boys away.

Report on Sunday Schools.

We, your Committee on Sunday Schools beg to offer the following report:

In many of our churches the teaching service of the churches is coming more and more to be emphasized. To teach the gospel is as much a part of the great commission as to preach the gospel. Hence, no church can fully carry out the commission of our Lord where there is no Sunday School. By a close study of the life of Christ we find that he devoted a large part of his time in teaching, and at the close of his ministerial career he commanded his desciples as follows:

"Go ye, therefore, and teach all nations, baptizing them in the hame of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Ghost, teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you." We find that the Apostolic churches gave attention to the teaching service of the church as we read that there were in the church at Antioch certain prophets and teachers. Hence, no church can be in line with the life of Christ and the work of the early churches where there is no Sunday School.

Your committee calls attention to the fact that much progress has been made in the Sunday Schools of this Association during the past year. Several schools have been re-organized and graded. Quite a number of superintendents, teachers and others have taken normal training and are prepared to do more efficient work.

We think it important that every Sunday School should have an ideal toward which it should strive. The higher the ideal the better the school. Below we would call attention to some of the things toward which the wide awake Sunday School should strive:

- 1. It should sustain the right relation to the church. Then, the superintendent should be elected by the church and report to the church.
- The teachers should not only be Christians and members of the church, but they should be willing to teach and know how to teach.
- The school should be graded in order to obtain the best results.
 - 4. The music should be good, lively and worshipful.
- 5. There should be a teachers' weekly meeting for the study of the lesson.
- There should be a Teachers' Training Class for the preparation of the teachers.
- The library should be supplied with the very best books; and provision made for the use of the books.
- 8. A well-organized Sunday School is organized for a purpose: to save the lost, to promote Christian growth and development, to give the right ideals of life, to increase the knowledge of the Bible.
