#### MINUTES.

#### FIRST DAY.

Friday, September 24, 1886,

Rev. Theodore Davis, who was appointed to preach the Introductory Sermon, not being present, the Introductory Sermon was preached by the Rev. G. A. Mallette, followed by the Rev. L. C. Music, from 1st Samuel, 7th chapter and 12th verse—"Then Samuel took a stone, and set it between Mizpeh and Shen, and called the name of it Ebenezer, saying, Hitherto hath the Lord helped us;" after which an intermission of ten minutes was given. The Moderator not being present, the Association was called to order by the Clerk, and, after religious exercises, proceeded to business.

On motion, Major E. A. McWhorter was elected Moderator pro tem. Letters from the churches were then called for, read and the names of messengers duly enrolled, as follows:

Petitionary letters were called for, none being presented.

The Association then proceeded to the election of officers for the ensuing year, which resulted in the selection of E. A. McWhorter as Moderator, G. H. Peeples as Clerk and W. C. Wilds as Treasurer. Visiting brethren were then invited to seats, when Elder G. W. Hall, of the Santa Fe Association of Florida and Children's Missionary for the State of Florida; Elder L. C. Music, of Missouri; Elder G. A. Mallette and Daniel Sikes, of Georgia, were welcomed by the Moderator, and requested to take part in the deliberations of the Association.

Correspondence from sister Associations called for. None presented.

On Religious Exercises—W. B. McKendree, W. F. Allen, A. B. Brown, J. B. Jones.

The Committee on Religious Exercises were requested to report at as early an hour as possible. It was then announced that Elder G. W. Hall would preach to-night at early candle light. After singing and prayer, the Association adjourned to meet on Saturday at 9 o'clock a. m.

SECOND DAY.

SATURDAY, September 25, 1886.

The Association was called to order, and, after singing and prayer by the Moderator, business was resumed.

#### ON SUNDAY-SCHOOLS.

Hall, the Children's Mission-

ary, who has visited the churches and Sunday-schools of this Association during the past year.

#### ON MISSIONS.

Your Committee feels the want of information and cannot make an accurate report, the churches having made but little or no note of the contributions during the last year. We note with gratitude to almighty God that the cause of missions is receiving more attention from the churches than in former years. We would, therefore, recommend that this Assoiation reappoint the Executive Board of Missions, consisting of seven brethren, and that they have power to appoint union mission meetings and take up collections for the purpose of supplying the destitution within our bounds, asking each church to take up quarterly collections and forward to the unions, which shall be held each fifth Sabbath in the year. We would also recommend that the churches take up collections for Home and Foreign Missions and forward to this Board, whose duty it shail be to transfer the same through the proper channels.

We regret the painful necessity of noting that very few of the members of the churches read our Baptist literature. We heartily recommend to all the Baptist families of this Association the Florida Baptist Witness as the organ of communication between us. We also recommend the Christian Index and Baptist Flag as able advocates of gospel truth and Christian instruction. As Sunday-school literature we would first of all earnestly recommend Kind Words and the Child's Gem; also the publications of the American Baptist Publication Society. We also recommend the Foreign Mission Journal to all our churches.

#### ON STATE OF RELIGION IN THE CHURCHES.

From the imperfect statistics accessible to your committee, no definite comprehension can be had of the state of religion in the churches. There are, however, a few facts of so favorable a nature as to deserve some notice. In all the churches the tendency is upward. Progress has been slow, but with a degree indicating some life in the churches. Twenty-seven have been baptized during the year, and the contributions larger. For this we thank God and take courage. While we have done something, we are ashamed and ought to be humbled in the dust that we have not done more with the field for influence and the importance of the work before us. Christ has set an open door before our churches, and we ought to go in and possess the land in his name. We notice with sorrow and humiliation that one-half of our churches have no prayer-meetings and some make no contributions for missions or any religious cause. In some of the churches there is a great want of good and wholesome discipline, which, we hope, will receive more attention in the future. It is hoped that each church will organize a Sabbath-school and prayer-meeting, and thus cultivate the field as well as the talent that they have before them.

Resolved, That this Association request the churches to instruct their clerks when they receive members from other churches to notify the clerks of the churches granting the letter upon their reception; also that the churches limit the time of letters of dismission when granted to three, six or twelve months.

After a spirited discussion of the above resolution by Elders G. W. Hall and L. C. Music, and by the Moderator, E. A. McWhorter, for, and Elder L. W. Simmons against, it was passed.

The Association then appointed the following Executive Board of Missions, viz: E. A. McWhorter, J. M. Higginbotham, A. E. Ogilvie, Thomas Haddock, G. H. Peeples, L. W. Simmons and W. C. Wilds.

As this Association, at its last session, resolved to unite with the Florida Baptist Convention, it was moved that the clerk prepare a Petitionary Letter for admission to membership in that body, and that the following-named brethren be appointed messengers to said Convention, viz: E. A. Mc-Whorter, G. H. Peeples, W. C. Wilds, L. C. Music, A. B. Brown, L. W. Simmons, J. Mills, Jr., W. F. Allen, A. Cogilvie and J. S. Braddock.

It was moved that the collection taken up on Sunday after the Missionary Sermon be equally divided between the

State Board of Missions for Florida and the Home and Foreign Mission Boards. Motion carried.

It was resolved that the thanks of the messengers and visitors attending this Association be given to the members of Ruhamah Church and surrounding country for their kind hospitality in the entertainment of the Association, and that the thanks of the Association be tendered to the Savannah, Florida & Western Railroad for courtesies shown the messengers of the Association. Adopted.

After singing and prayer, adjourned to meet on Sunday morning at 9 o'clock for prayer-meeting before the sermon.

#### THIRD DAY.

The Association assembled for prayer. After the prayer-meeting the Rev. G. W. Hall preached the Missionary Sermon to a large and attentive audience from 2d Corinthians, 2d Chapter and 15th verse, after which a hymn was sung and a collection taken up, amounting to \$18.35, for missionary purposes. There was an intermission of one hour for dinner, when the Rev. G. W. Hall held a very interesting service for the children, interspersed with singing and short talks by him, which had a manifest effect upon the children, causing many of them to weep.

The Association adjourned to meet with the Brandy Branch Church, Nassau County, Florida, on Thursday before the fourth Sunday in September, 1887.

After the parting hand had been given, a hymn sung, and prayer and the benediction by Brother Hall, the Association closed in order.
