## MINUTES.

### FIRST DAY.

THURSDAY, October 17, 1889.

Rev. J. A. Johnson, who was appointed to preach the Introductory, failing to attend the Association, Rev. Daniel Sykes, the alternate, preached the Introductory Sermon from Matthew, 5th chapter and 14th verse: "Ye are the light of the world. A city that is set on a hill cannot be hid," after which an intermission of ten minutes was given.

The Moderator not being present, the Association was called

to order by the Clerk.

On motion, Rev. J. F. Reeves was elected Moderator pro tem. Letters from the Churches were then called for, read, and the names of messengers duly enrolled as follows:

The Committee on Religious Exercises reported that Rev. W. N. Chaudoin would preach to-day at 11 o'clock. Rev. Daniel Sykes would preach at early candle-light to-night, and that Rev. L. W. Sinmons would preach Saturday, at 11 o'clock, and Rev. Theo. Davis would preach at early candle-light Saturday night, and that Rev. W. N. Chaudoin would preach the Missionary Sermon on Sunday.

Reports of committees were called for and read, as follows:

#### ON TEMPERANCE

Your committee, to whom was referred the question of temperance, after thoughtful consideration, rejoice to report that intemperance is fast falling into contempt by the thoughtful; and we can but feel like thanking God that it is a thing soon to be numbered with the curses that have passed. Still, we regret the fact that there are yet a few professed Christians who continue to practice and encourage the cursed habit by patronizing the so-called social clubs, and we would recommend to the Churches the enforcement of rigid discipline, by withdrawing from every brother that walketh disorderly, feeling that this is the only hope of the cause of Christ for the Church and the children in the future.

Baptists of other States have the interests of their own people to look after. Our paper advocates the temporal and spiritual interest of every man, woman and child in the State. Therefore, the pastors of the churches, and all our leading brethren, should never cease their efforts until every Baptist family takes and reads the Florida Baptist Witness. We further recommend that our people take the Foreign Mission Journal, Our Home Field and the Baptist Basket, and instruct themselves in the workings of our several Mission Boards of the Southern Baptist Convention.

To our Sunday Schools we recommend Kind Wordsthe Child Gem with Kind Words quarterly. We also recommend the Sunday School periodicals of the American Baptist Publication Society. We hope the time will soon come when all our Sunday Schools will discard all literature that is not

On motion of Rev. J. F. Roeves, the \$10.70 now in the treasury is to be donated to the State Board of Missions.

PREPORT OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

Your committee beg leave to submit the following report, and regret that we sorely realize that so little has been done. When it is known that when we took charge of this Mission work there were only \$5.00 in the treasury, and no organized system by which funds for the work could be collected, you will not be surprised that during the first six months of the year very little was done. In April we secured the services of Brothers L. W. Simmons and Daniel Sykes for that part of their time which was not already occupied upon the following conditions, viz: That they do what Missionary work they could, and we, as a committee, would do the best we could for them in the shape of raising money to pay them for their services.

An appeal was then made to the Churches, and the follow-

ing responded as follows:

Thomas Creek Church, \$11.75.

Live Oak, \$10.00. Mt. Olive, \$9.46. Buford Grove, \$2.25. Camp Pinckney, \$5.00. Brandy Branch, \$3.51.

Add the \$5.00 in the treasury, and it makes a total of \$46.72 of funds collected and paid out by the committee. Brother L. River, and has traveled 625 miles, preached twenty-two sermons, delivered twelve addresses, visited twenty two families, collected in his field \$1.1.13, and we have paid him \$21.73, making a total received by him of \$32.86. Brother Sykes has labored on the Georgia side of the river, and has traveled 371 miles, preached sixteen sermons, paid sixteen family visits, made fourteen addresses, held nineteen prayer meetings. We have paid him \$22.34. Brother Simmons has received from Brother Chaudoin \$20.00. and Brother Sykes \$9.40, making a total received from the State Board of \$29.40.

The hour of 11 having arrived, Rev. L. W. Simmons preached to a large and attentive congregation from John, 17th

chapter, 20th and 21st verses.

After which, the Association adjourned for refreshments. After an intermission of one-hour the Association reassembled and resumed business.

On motion of Brother W. C. Wilds, the time of meeting of the Association was changed from Thursday before the third

Sunday in October, 1890; to Thursday before the second Sunday in the same month.

Then there were some feeling addresses made by different brethren on Missions, etc.

The Committee on Religious Exercises reported that Rev.

L. W. Simmons would preach at Hilliard to-night.

It was resolved that the sincere and heartfelt thanks of this Association be, and are hereby extended to the membership and congregation of Buford Grove Church, and especially the citizens of Hilliard station, for the generous hospitality manifested in the entertainment of this Association.

After singing and prayer, the Association adjourned to meet

Sunday.

## FOURTH DAY.

SUNDAY, October 20, 1800.

Association met at 9 o'clock for prayer before the sermon. After the prayer meeting there was an intermission before the 11 o'clock sermon, which was preached by Rev. W. N. Chaudoin,

from Matthew, 25th chapter and 40th verse.

After the sermon, a collection was taken up, amounting to \$25.00. A hymn was then sung, and the parting hand given, after which the Association adjourned in order to meet with the Ruahama Church, Candem County, Ga., Thursday, before the second Sunday in October, 1800.
