# MINUTES

Brandy Branch Church, October 8th, 1901.

Reassembled at 1.30 p. m.

The former Moderator, Bro. S. M. Scruggs, read the 84th Psalm, and F. R. Moodie led in prayer.

Minutes of the 12th Quarterly Session of the Sunday School Convention of the St. Mary's River Association, held with the Thomas Creek church, June 29th and 30th, 1901. The draft of a constitution was presented by P T. L. Queen and aftr some slight amendments was adopted.

The President appointed the following committees: Executive. J. C. Braddock, D. Sikes, Dr. C. Smith; Finance, J. M. Ogilvie, L. W. Braddock, F R Moodie; On Badge of Honor, P T. L. Queen, S. M. Scruggs, A. E. Ogilvie.

On motion the ministers and deacons of the various churches in the Association were made honorary members of the Convention.

The following subjects were discussed:

"The Sunday School as a factr in the evangelization of the world"-Addreses by L. W. Kickliter, F. R. Moodie and P. T. L.

"The missin of the Sunday Schol of the Twentieth Century"-Addresses by P. T. L. Queen, L. W. Kickliter, E. H. Rennolds, Sr., and D. C Andress.

"How to study the Bible"-Address by D. C. Andress.

"Our present Convention, and what you think of it"—Addresses by P. T. L. Queen, D. C. Andress, F. R. Moodie, W. S. Green, J. C. Braddock and W. A. Ogilvie.

P. T. L. Quen then gave some object lessons on the black, board, which were exemplified by a class of boys and girls, which

were well rendered and very impressive.

The meetings having ben changed by the constitution adopted from quarterly to annually the next session was appointed to meet at Callahan on Friday before the first Sunday in May, 1902, and Eld. E. H. Rennolds, Sr., was selected to preach the convention sermon, with Eld. D. C. Andress as alternate.

The expenses of the Convention, amounting to \$10.60, was

ordered paid from the funds sent up.

A collection to assist th First Jacksonville church to rebuild its house of worship was taken up, amounting to \$77.60.

The convention then adjourned.

Constitution of the St. Mary's River Missionary Baptist Association.

In view of the increase of fraternal love, knowledge, usefulness and efficiency which must accrue from an association of churches in cordial union upon the principles of the Gospel, we now seek to b thus united, that by individual and collective action we may subserve the objects of the Redeemer's kingdom.

Article 1. This body shall be called the St. Mary's River Mis-

sionary Baptist Association.

Artice 2. It shall be composed of such churches as hold to the doctrine of human depravity, the atonement of Christ, the election into eternal life, regeneration and perseverance of the saints, baytism by immersion administered to none but professed believers, and the Lord's Supper intended for those only who have been regularly admitted into the visible church.

Article 3. The officers of the Association shall consist of a Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer, who shall be elected by ballot.

Artice 4. We believe in one true and living God, and that there

are thre persons in the Godhead.

Article 5. We believe the Scriptures of the Old and New Testametrs to be the only rule of faith and practice, both on the concerns of religion and the general affairs of this life, and particularly in transacting the affairs of our churches.

Article 6. We believe the Church of Christ to be a congregation of baptized believers who live in felowship and have given themselves to the Lord and to one another in cordial agreement. to observe holy discipline in conformity with the requirements of the Scriptures.

Article 7.—We believe Jesus Christ to be the great Head of the Church: that spiritual discipline, with an eye to the glory of God. must greatly conduce the final prosperity and union of the churches.

#### ST. MARY'S RIVER

### RULES OF DECORUM

1. This Association shall not be dissoved without the concurrence of two-thirds of the churches composing the body, and shall have power to withdraw from any church which shall act contrary to the teachings of the Holy Scriptures.

2. Any church wishing to be admitted into this body shall petition by letter, and messengers, and upon examination if found

orthodox and orderly shall be admitted.

3. Each church shall have a right to send four messengers, and shal be entitled to one additional messenger for every fifty members in excess of one hundred, and one-fourth of the churches represented shall constitute a quorum.

4. Any query sent up to the Association by any of the churches

composing this body shall be read and duly considered.

5. Every motion made and seconded, shal come under the observation of the Association unless withdrawn by the mover:

6. Every member who speaks shall rise from his seat and address the Moderator and shall not be interrupted unless he departs dress the Moderator and shall not be interrupted unless he depart from the subject.

7. No brother shall speak more than twice upon one subject

without the permission of the body.

8. No member shall absent himself without leave of the Mod-

9. It is the duty of the Association to provide for the general union of the churches: ta provide for the restitution of the territory within its bounds by missionary aid, and to give the churches tme

best advice it can in matters of difficulty.

10. The Constitution and Rules of Decorum of this body may be altered of amended by a concurrence of two-thirds of its mem-

bers.
