## COMMITTEES REPORTS

#### STATE MISSION REPORT

Our State Mission Board has been in existence for fifty years During that time it has made possible the organization and maintenance of hundreds of churches, through the support of their pastors, and assisted in the erection of many houses of worship. Through the labors of our missionary pastors, thousands of souls have been won to Christ, and other blessed results achieved too numerous to mention in this brief report.

Florida Baptists gave last year to all missions \$188,522.66, and R. was spent as follows:

To maintain the Sunday School, B. Y. P. U., W. M. U., and the Brotherhood Departments of our state.

In the maintenance of Student Secretaries in Gainseville and Tallahassee.

To help fifty-two missionary pastors and evangelist, To relieve aged preachers and widows of preachers. Helped maintain the Bible Department in Stetson Paid salaries of those who administer our state work To help support the Arcadia Children's Home. Money sent out of the state was as follows: \$ 1,836.77 for our Southwide Seminaries.

\$ 1,106.56 for our Baptist Hospital in New Orleans.

\$14,196.61 sent to Atlanta for Home Missions.

\$24,558.)1 sent to Richmond for Foreign Missions.

We, your committee, recommend that each of our churches in our Association co-operate with our Board and put over the Every Member Canvass November 29-December 5th, in a great way, that we may have more money for the above causes as well as for our individual

#### REPORT ON HOME MISSIONS

The Home Mission Board has worked itself out of a vary precarious financial condition. Some workers have been dropped, but the real mission work of the Board has been continued. This has been

done in two ways: (1) By giving to the missionaries more territory; and (2) by reducing the appropriations in Institutions. The Board is interpreting "Missione" to mean primarily the "making and baptising of disciples" and is therefore majoring on preaching the gospel to Foreigners, Indians, and Negroes in the congested centers of our Home Land, Cuba and Panama.

The Board is living within its income and paying its debts. Last year by combining departments and practicing rigid economy they paid \$141,000 on the principal of its indebtedness, and carried on its mission work. Not one mission field has been abandoned. The budget for next year at the annual meeting of the Board, June 3rd, was laid out, according to instructions from the Convention, on basis of the cash receipts of the year before. The receipts were \$413,283,96. This was \$26,510.80 less than the Board received the year before. They were, therefore forced to the necessity of cutting off \$26,500 for this year. This reduction was made by economizing in overhead expense and in reducing appropriations to institutions.

During the past year the Roard has had 252 missionaries and helpers who have given 2,162 weeks of labor, conducted 3,563 religious services, preached 3,373 sermons, held 5,857 prayer meetings, made 51,356 religious visits, received by profession and haptism 3,562 people, added to the churches 3,015 members and distributed 634,514 pages of tracts.

In its report to the Convention the Board announced some general principles by which it would be governed in its future operation, as follows: 1st. It shall be the policy of the Board to give itself primarily to strictly mission work,-the making and baptizing of disciples. (2) to work in close cooperation with all State and Southwide organizations. (3) to stand absolutely for the program adopted by the Convention. (4) to pursue a wide-open policy and to have no secrets about its affairs. (5) to live within its income. (6) to keep in tact and to faithfully administer every trust fund committed to its care. (7) to adopt a definitely defined debt-paying program. (8) to dispose of all property not used for missions. (9) to turn over to local congregations the church property now owned by the Board just as soon as the congregation is strong enough to maintain the property. (10) to make surveys of mission tasks that the Board may be assured in the work it is doing. (11) to furnish churches with information about the work, and take them into its confidence. (12) to practice every possible economy.

With the cooperation of the State Board, Southern Baptists, through the Home Board will be able to evangelize the Southland.

The prospects for the future for Home Missions is as bright as the promises of God and the faith of His people.

#### REPORT ON FOREIGN MISSIONS.

The Foreign Mission Board reports the largest number of baptisms it has ever been able to report in one year, 14,415. The Mission schools have been crowded with students and large numbers have been turned away. The present personnel of our Mission workers consists of 425 foreign missionaries, of which 19 are at home on furlough, and 3,052 native missionaries, who are operating in fourteen different countries. Fifty-eight missionaries have returned to the field during the year.

The debt of the Poreign Board was \$345,265.00 on January 1st, 1951, a net reduction of \$200,000.00 in three years. This debt is a tremendous handkeap, but is being slowly reduced. We feel constrained to call attention to another debt, of which Paul spoke when he said: "I am debtor both to tireeks and Barbarians, both to the wise and foolish. So, as much as in me is, I am ready to preach the Gospel to you also that are in Rome." If Southern Baptists will pay fully this debt the banks will be paid over-night.

It has been four years since any serious attempt at reinforcement of missionaries has been made. In the meantime there has been a total net loss of 131 foreign missionaries and 764 native missionaries, placing a double strain on the ones that remain. There are 125 on the waiting list as volunteers for foreign service as soon as Southern Baptists are willing to send them.

The Board needs \$1,250,000.00 this year to hold the lines, meet the budget and make a substantial payment on the debt. They meet this month to make appropriations for 1922, and unless they can feel assured of the above amount retrenchment will have to be made. The Southern Baptist Convention has launched a foreign mission program which cannot be supported on the present scale of income from Southern Baptists. If we be Missionary Baptist Churches ist us rise up in our might and support this work.

#### REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON BIBLE SCHOOLS

We are pleased to report that our Bible Schools are making rapid progress, both in efficiency and enrollment.

In 1922 we had 189 officers and teachers with 1917 pupils enrolled. In 1925 we had 206 officers and teachers with 2804 pupils enrolled. In 1928 we had 243 officers and teachers with 2720 pupils enrolled. Today we have 425 officers and teachers, and 4146 pupils enrolled.

Our enrollment, you will notice, has increased by 2227, or more than doubled in nine years.

A digest of these reports, at three year intervals, reveals that the greatest gains have been made in Gadsden County, and the greatest gains in this County have been made during the last three year period, to wit:

In 1922 the enrollment in Gadsden County was 699; all others 1217.

In 1925 the enrollment in Gadeden County was 1038; all others 1266.

In 1928 the enrollment in Gadaden County was 1140; all others 1580.

Today the enrollment in Gadsden County is 2076; all others 2070.

It will be noticed that in 1922 Gadeden County had just a few more than one-half as many enrolled as the other five Counties of the Association. Today she has more enrolled than all the other five Counties.

Total number of people converted and joining the churches of the Association from the Sunday Schools during last year is 236, as shown by church letters sent up to this Association. The number who joined in Gadsden County, from Sunday Schools is 191, and from all others 45.

We attribute these results largely to the Gadsden County Sunday School Association, which operates only in Gadsden County, and recommend that another similar organization be formed, or this one extended to cover our entire Association.

There are seven Standard Bible Schools in the Association, and all of them are in Gadsden County.

### REPORT ON B. Y. P. U.

Since the beginning of B. Y. P. U. work to 1886 no similar organisation, regardless of denomination, has had such a phenomenal growth. B. Y. P. U. work was officially recognized and placed under the Sunday School Board in 1998. However, the work was somewhat experimental until 1918 when Southern Baptiste awoke to a full realization of the magnitude of the work. Today we have nearly 6,000 general organisations, more than 25,000 Unions and an enrollment of nearly three-quarters of a million, with such men as Leavell, Lambdin, Finks, Lee and VanNess to direct the work.

Florida was not slow to recognize the value of the work, and today we stand near the head of the list in study course awards, with a stendy increase in Standard or A-1 Unions. We have two annual assemblies, one at Bob Jones College and one at DeLand. Also we have District Associational and County Federation meetings which are inspirational.

The first Southwide B. T. P. U. conference was held in Memphis two years ago. The next Conference will be held in Atlanta in 1932. We urge that one or more representatives from every church in this Association attend.

Your committee would urge a deeper concern on the part of all Christians for the further development of R. Y. P. U. work. We feel that Florida is faced with the following challenges:

- 1. The challenge of unparalleled achievements.
- 2. The challenge of the unfinished task.

We would recommend that the people raily to the cause of the training school of the Church, and answer the challenge of the unfinished task in B. Y. P. U. work through prayer, work and consecrated effort.

#### FLORIDA ASSOCIATION W. M. U. REPORT

The annual meeting of the Woman's Missionary Union of the Florida Association was held this year in Quincy, at the request of the state officers, a month earlier than the scheduled date, so it was impossible to secure complete reports, but the societies reporting, for the most part, show interest and effort that is encouraging.

In our 16 Woman's Missionary Societies 517 women are enrolled while the 32 junior organizations have 321 members. In all the

organizations 40 mission study classes have been held and 100 awards given. 100 subscriptions to the Baptist Witness are reported, 8 to Home and Foreign Fields and the W. M. U. publications, (Royal Service, World Comrades, and The Window) have 142 subscribers. We have the record of 91 tithers in the Woman's Missionary Societies (we trust there are many more.)

Our financial report does not compare favorably with that of last year. Our contributions for every cause, except those given during the Week of Prayer, are less than those reported in 1920. Mrs. J. O. Perkins, our Associational President, has recorded \$250 paid on apportionment, \$12 for aged ministers, \$215 (boxes) for Children's Home in Arcadia, \$245 for local and other objects, with \$652.32 as the offerings from the Week of Prayer.

We are confident the statement is incomplete and inadequate so urge upon our societies the keeping of more accurate records, also reporting with regularity and promptness, as well as striving unceasingly to carry out the command of our Lord and Master that we carry the Gospel to the end of the earth.

### REPORT OF FLORIDA BAPTIST CHILDREN'S HOME

In view of the unusual financial conditions in our state, we feel that we have a remarkable report to present.

The administration of the Home has been entirely in the hands of the Board of Trustees, meeting twice during the year. The Executive Committee of the Board of Trustees has met each month during the year to advise and confer with the Superintendent as to the details of management of the Home. The spirit of cooperation has never been finer than during the past year.

The health of the 185 children in the Home has been excellent. The Home in Arcadia has not had a death in over two years. We can indeed thank God for His providential care and can commend Dr. Trice and his matrons for the care taken of the health of the children.

The spiritual life in the Home is in no way neglected. Thirty-two children have been converted during the past year, leaving practically none of accountable age as yet unconverted. The children have their Sunday school in the Home, as well as one Senior, two Intermediate, and two Junior Unions. They also have a Sunbeam Band for the younger ones. There is a devotional service each morning at the breakfast hour.

This year the school building has been leased to the Defioto County School Board, and the county has assumed control of the school and payment of the teachers.

Financially the report from the Home is most pleasing. The response has been fine, especially from the Sunday Schools of our State. The total receipts from the Sunday Schools alone during the past year amounts to \$16,164.94. Total receipts from all sources totalled \$41,587.15—an increase of \$3,299.23 over the previous year.

In the face of steady decreases in many other lines of Christian work, this is indeed the more encouraging.

We have been forced to spend \$5,787.65 from our current support fund on old indebtedness accumulating through the past years. If we could have avoided this, we could have paid all current expenses. The greatest need of the Home at the present time is to have this old debt entirely wiped out.

### REPORT ON CHRISTIAN EDUCATION AND STETSON UNIVERSITY

Since the earliest history of our American nation, the elevating, refining and enobling influence of Christian Religion has been felt by our educational system, in fact, nearly all of our early colleges owe their existence to persons whose lives were dominated by the teachings of Christ. As our nation has become more prosperous education has been made available to people of all conditions of life and today, literally billions of dollars are being spent for education.

Most of our institutions of higher learning, not supported by endowments, are generously supported and financed by taxation. A great many of our tax supported institutions, because of the lavish wealth heaped upon them have become opulent and autocratic and instead of the holding to the fundamentals of those who sacrificed to bring about their existence, have become grossly materialistic substituting the philosophy of Neitzsche and other foreign born philosophies in place of the teachings of Christ, turning out atheists and agnostics in the main.

With these facts in mind we are forced to turn our thoughts and interests, hopes and aspirations to our denominational institutions. We as Baptists are justly proud of our Stetson University at DeLand. This institution merits more than just our pride. It is entitled to our interest, our co-operation and our prayers and until we give of these unstintedly it can never attain the emminence planned for and hoped for by those who founded this institution.

In 1876 Mr. H. A. DeLand came to Florida. He was especially delighted with that section of Volusia County and later on with some friends decided to build a town. Christianity and education had first place in their thought and plans, and shortly after founding the town of DeLand, that which is now Stetson University was started. This University has grown year by year and today stands without a superior

as a denominational college in our state. In 1887 this institution was chartered under the laws of Florida. In this charter is provided that three-fourths of the Trustees shall be Baptist. This being a self perpetuating Board insures that this institution will forever be under Baptist control.

In 1886 Mr. John B. Stateon visited DeLand, Mr. DeLand soon interested him in the school that now bears his name. He responded promptly and generously and to date he has contributed more than a million and a half dollars to the endowment of this institution. Andrew Carnegie, John D. Bockefellow, Henry Flagler and many other prominent citizens have contributed liberally along with the Southern Saptist Convention and our own State Convention. Stateon now has an enrollment of more than 456. It is amply equipped with an excellent faculty, modernly equipped laboratories, excefully selected Ebraries and commodious dormitories. Uniform credits are allowed for Bible study and allied subjects. At this time there are 24 students studying for the ministry and we have President Hully's assurance that everything is being done to instill into the lives of all their students the principles of Christianity.

Complacent pride and smug satisfaction should not characterise our attitude towards our Denominational Institution. Stateon is ours and is entitled to our active interest, our whole-hearted co-operation and our unceasing prayers, prayers that the President and Faculty will be directed and used of God, prayers that this institution will always have as its aim, the advancement of God's kingdom as well as the preparing and equipping of our boys and girls to take their places in life's battles.

#### REPORT ON PROHIBITION

For more than thirty years before the adoption of the 18th Amendment a persistent campaign of education was carried on against the liquor traffic, during which time local communities, whois counties, and states became dry, until in 1917 when Congress passed the Amendment, seven-eights of the territory of the United States, according to "Christian Century," was under dry rule. At this time the dry forces, feeling elated, happy and secure in their victory of constitutional law cented to educate the younger generation as to the awful conditions that prevailed before the adoption of this Amendment.

"Eternal vigilance is the price of liberty," and while the dry forces have been placidly asleep on the job the outlawed liquor interests, encouraged and emboldened by the unrest and unsettled conditions brought on by the war, have, through the propaganda of the wet press, by persistent assertions, insinuations and misrepresentations, falsely charged most everything bad to prohibition.

That we are in the midst of lawlessness, moral carelessness, and that a real dilemma confronts our country cannot be denied, but it can be denied that prohibition is responsible for it. President Hoover is accredited with the statement that only 20 per cent. of the prisoners in crowded jails are guilty of violating the prohibition law. It may have been unfortunate for prohibition that it was launched at this period in our history, but, certainly most fortunate for the government. Had it not been for prohibition; had the liquor traffic been legally free to ply its trade this past war would have been far worse.

All laws for the benefit of society are prohibitory, and are enacted for the sole purpose of prohibiting man from violating the provisions of said laws, his conscience to the contrary notwithstanding, and it is the duty of all people, the beneficiaries of the law, to obey the laws. Change them if they will, but let it be in a legal and orderly way; not by violating the law and saying it can't be enforced. Disobedience and disrespect for law, if not checked, will plunge the country into anarchy and chaos.

Not a single prohibitory law, divine or human, has ever been kept inviolate by man. Why argue the repeal of the prohibition law by saying it can't be enforced, and at the same time condone the violation of other laws? It is the liquor adherents; in the main the violators of the law, who are clamoring for the repeal of prohibition. Shall we, by legal sanction, let them have their way to carry out their nefarious schemes and bring back the squalor, misery and suffering of by-gone days? "Who hath woe? Who hath sorrow? Who hath contentions? They that tarry long at the wine; they that go to seek mixt wine."

To be logical we would have to repeal every law, for all have been broken. But how absurd such a thought. No law-abiding citisen, nor any one who holds dear to his heart home and loved ones would for a moment think of or advocate such a thing. Why would the liquor traffic, if legalized, be so much better now than in the past? The traffic, as before, would he a traitor to the government and an enemy to the home. To legalize the traffic would be to pave the way for moral degeneration and invite disaster.

God grant that never again may this fair land of ours behold the

day when the demon of strong drink, hiding behind the annetity of law, quietly steal its deadly coils around the unsuspecting public, and thrust its poisonous fangs into the life blood of American youth. Make the access as hard as possible for the danger is imminent. "Look not thou upon the wine when it is red, when it given his color in the cup, when it moveth likelf aright. At the last it biteth like a serpent, and stingeth like an adder."

If you would be secure. If you would protect your loved ones, fight the liquor traffic as you would smash the head of a poisonous reptile whose nearness was endangering the life of your shild. Put on a program of education, as in days gone by, and warn, warn. warn! And cease not to warn the people of hidden dangers lurking in the traffic of strong drink. Teach the people to stand by the law, the bulwark of our freedom and the safety of our future. The form of our government bequeathed to us by those who fought, hied and died that we might have a government of the people, by the people and for the people depends upon obedience to law and faith in our public officials.

Let us arouse from our lethergy, unfuri the hanner of sobriety, and fight for the sanctity of our homes, the perpetuity of constitutional government, and for God and rightsousness.

#### HISTORICAL SKETCH

OF THE

### EBENEZER BAPTIST CHURCH,

JEFFERSON COUNTY, FLORIDA

#### By R. T. FREEMAN.

Of the thirty-two Baptist churches in the Florida Association, Ebenezer, in Jefferson County, according to the best information obtainable, is the oldest. It appears to have been organized in 1828, with Rev. Benjamin Manning first pastor, and the following as members: B. Abraham Mott, Joseph Chancey, Light Townsend, James McCorde, Abraham Lamb, Sarah Burney, Nancy Townsend, Isabelle Mott, Martha Brigham, Phoeby Townsend, Mary McArdelf and Martha Lamb. The first Deacons were: B. Abraham Mott and W. H. Mathews. The first clerk was William May.

Soon after the organization the following members were added by letter: Lewis Smith, Solomon Reaves, M. H. Mathews, William Hart, John Martin, Elizabeth Bowman, Dolly Bowman, Francis Chapman and Sarah Mathews.

The names of the early pastors, following Rev. Benjamin Manning, include Henry Melton, James Connell, B. S. Fuller, H. S. Linton, N. M. Haven, George T. Leitner, W. B. Cooper, A. C. McCants, F. Beverly and F. M. Weils. The pastorate of Rev. W. B. Cooper extended over a period of twenty-five years, and deserves special mention. It is to be regretted that a more complete record of the development of the church under his leadership has not been preserved.

This old mother church of the Association has made an honorable record for soundness in the Faith.

# CONSTITUTION

## FLORIDA BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

Article 1. This Association shall be known by the same of The Florida Baptist Association. The object of this Association shall be to conduct the work of missions, colportage, Sabbath school enterprises and other work that will tend to the spread of the Gospei.

Article 2. This Association shall be composed of white members chosen by the respective churches in its union in the proportion of two members for each church of fifty or iess, and one additional delegate for every twenty-five members over fifty.

Article 2. The letters sent by the church at each session of the Association shall express their respective members in full fellowship, those baptized, received by letter, restored, dismissed, excommunicated and dead since last session.

Article 4. Believing it to be proper on account of the diversity of opinion among men as to the import of Scripture contained in the Old and New Testaments to declare our belief and understanding thereof we therefore append our belief in tweive Articles and present them with our minutes to the Baptist denomination.

Article 5. The Association when convened shall be governed by a regular and proper decorum. A Moderator and Clerk shall be chosen by the votes of the members present who shall hold their offices until next session of the body and until their successors are elected. The Moderator shall preside at the meeting of the Association and the Clerk shall record the proceedings and prepare them for the press.

Article 6. The Association thus organized shall have no power to lord it over God's heritage or infringe upon the internal rights of any church.

Article 7. Newly constituted churches may be admitted to this union on application by letter and delegates; and if, upon examination, found to be orthodox, shall be received by the Association and the right hand of fellowship extended to the delegates by the Moderator.

Article 8. The Association shall furnish the minutes of their proceedings in proportion to the funds sent up for that purpose by the churches.

Article 9. The minutes of the Association shall be publicly read

(and corrected, if necessary), and then signed by the Moderator and Clerk before adjournment.

Article 10. Any amendment or ratification of this Constitution may be made by the votes of two-thirds of the members present at any two regular successive meetings of the Association. All other matters of fellowship shall be decided by a majority vote. In matters of fellowship the Association must be a unit.

Article 11. The Association shall have power first, to provide for the general union of the churches; second, to give the churches advice in matters of difficulty; third, to inquire into the cause of any falling to be represented at the meetings of the Association; fourth, to withdraw all connection from any church or churches in this union who shall violate the rules of this Association, or shall deviate from the orthodox principles of the revealed Word of God; fifth, to appropriate the money contributed and sent up to the Association as specified by said churches, and when not specified it shall be apportioned to promote the best interests of the Master's cause; sixth, to adjourn to any future time and place they may deem most convenient to the churches in the union.

## RULES OF DECORUM OF THE FLORIDA BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

- At every meeting of the Association the Moderator shall call the members to order and cause the Clerk to read the minutes of the previous Association.
- The Moderator shall preserve order, and shall speak on any point of order with reference to the other members, and shall decide questions of order, subject to an appeal to the Association, when requested by any two members.
- 3. The Moderator shall put all questions distinctly in this form: "As many as are in favor (as the question may be) say 'Aye'," and after the affirmative vote is taken, "As many as are of a contrary opinion say 'No'." If doubtful which voice is in the majority, it shall be decided by rising and counting.
- The Moderator shall appoint the committees, except in cases of appointment by ballot.
- In all cases of ballot the Moderator may vote. In all other cases he shall not vote unless the Association be equally divided, or

unless his vote given to the minority will make the division squal. In that case the question shall be lost.

- When any member is about to speak in debate he shall rise and address the Moderator,
- If any member, while speaking or otherwise employed, transgress the rules of decorum, the Moderator shall, or any member may, call him to order.
- When two or more members shall rise at the same time, the Moderator shall decide who is first entitled to the floor.
- No member shall indulge in unkind remarks in debate, nor shall any member speak more than twice on the same question without leave from the Association, nor more than once until every one choosing to speak shall have done so.
- 16. While any member is addressing the Association, it shall be the duty of the Moderator to suppress all private discourses that may be entertained between the members, and require strict attention on the part of the members.
- 11. When a motion is made and seconded it shall be stated by the Moderator before debate.
- 12. Every motion shall be reduced to writing if desired by any member of the Association.
- 13. After a motion is made and seconded it shall be deemed in possession of the Association, but may be withdrawn at any time before being discussed or amended.
- 14. When a question is under debate no motion shall be entartained unless to amend it or refer it to a committee, or for the previous question, or for adjournment.
- 15. A motion for adjournment shall always be in order, and decided without debate.
- 16. Any member may call for a division of a question when two or more distinct propositions are set forth, and when the substance will admit of division.
- Motions and amendments may be referred to a committee at the pleasure of the Association.
- 18. Every resolution shall receive two statements or readings in the Association previous to its passage. The first shall be for information, and the second when the decision of the Association is to be made.
- These rules may be changed or amended at any full meeting of the Association.
- 10. The Association shall be opened and closed with prayer each day by the Moderator or some other member.

21. All queries shall be fairly stated in writing and approbated by two-thirds of the members present before they shall be acted on.

## ARTICLES OF FAITH OF THE FLORIDA BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

Article 1. We believe in one only true and living God, and that there are three in the Godhead—the Father, the Son and the Holy Ghost.

Article 2. We believe the Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments are the Word of God, and the only rule of faith and practice.

Article 3. We believe in the doctrine of particular and eternal election.

Article 4. We believe in the doctrine of original sin.

Article 5. We believe in man's impotency to recover himself from the fallen state in which he is by nature, by his own free will and ability.

Article 6. We believe that we are justified in the sight of God only by the imputed righteousness of Christ.

Article 7. We believe that God's elect shall be called, regenerated and sanctified by the Holy Ghost.

Article 8. We believe that the saints shall persevere in grace and never finally fall away.

Article 9. We believe that baptism and the Lord's Supper are ordinances of Jesus Christ; that nothing is baptism except immersion; that believers are the only subjects of this ordinance, and that none but baptized believers are entitled to partake of the Lord's Supper.

Article 10. We believe in a general resurrection of the dead and a general judgment.

Article 11. We believe that the punishment of the wicked shall be everlasting and the joys of the righteous will be eternal.

Article 12. We believe that no minister has a right to administer the ordinances only such as are regularly called and have come under the imposition of the hands of the Presbytery.
