CONSTITUTION

FLORIDA BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

Article 1. This Association shall be known by the name of The Florida Baptist Association. The object of this Association shall be to conduct the work of missions, colportage, Sabbath school enterprises and other work that will tend to the apread of the Gospel.

Article 2. This Association shall be composed of white members chosen by the respective churches in its union in the proportion of two members for each church of fifty or less, and one additional delegate for every twenty-five members over fifty.

Article 2. The letters sent by the church at each session of the Association shall express their respective members in full fellowship, those baptised, received by letter, restored, dismissed, excommunicated and dead since jast session.

Article 4. Believing it to be proper on account of the diversity of opinion among men as to the import of Scripture contained in the Old and New Testaments to declare our belief and understanding thereof we therefore append our belief in twe've Articles and present them with our minutes to the Baptist denomination.

Article 5. The Association when convened shall be governed by a regular and proper decorum. A Moderator and Clerk shall be chosen by the votes of the members present who shall hold their offices until next session of the body and until their successors are elected. The Moderator shall preside at the meeting of the Association and the Clerk shall record the proceedings and prepare them for the press.

Article 6. The Association thus organized shall have no power to lord it over God's heritage or infringe upon the internal rights of any church.

Article 7. Newly constituted churches may be admitted to this union on application by letter and delegates; and if, upon examination, found to be orthodox, shall be received by the Association and the right hand of fellowship extended to the delegates by the Moderator.

Article 8. The Association shall furnish the minutes of their proce-dings in proportion to the funds sent up for that purpose by the churches.

Article 9. The minutes of the Association shall be publicly read (and corrected, if necessary), and then signed by the Moderator and Clerk before adjournment.

Article 10. Any amendment or ratification of this Constitution may be made by the votes of two-th-rds of the members present at any two regular successive meetings of the Association. All other matters of fellowship shall be decided by a majority vote. In majters of fellowship the Association must be a unit.

Article 11. The Association shall have power first, to provide for the general union of the churches; second, to give the churches advice in matters of difficulty; third, to inquire into the cause of any falling to be represented at the meetings of the Association; fourth, to withdraw all connection from any church or eburches in this union who shall violate the rules of this Association, or shall deviate from the orthodox principles of the revealed Word of God; fifth, to appropriate the money contributed and sent up to the Association as specified by said churches, and when not specified it shall be apportioned to promote the best interests of the Master's cause; sixth, to adjourn to any future time and place they may deem most convenient to the churches in the union.

RULES OF DECORUM OF THE FLORIDA BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

- At every meeting of the Association the Moderator shall call the members to order and cause the Clerk to read the minutes of the previous Association.
- The Moderator shall preserve, order, and shall speak on any point of order with reference to the other members, and shall decided questions of order, subject to an appeal to the Association when requested by any two members.
- 3. The Moderator shall put all questions distinctly in this form: "As many as are in favor (as the question may be) say "Aye"," and after the affirmative vote is taken, "As many as are of a contrary opinion say "No"." If doubtful which voice is in the majority, it shall be decided by rising and counting.
- The Moderator shall appoint the committees, except in cases of appointment by ballot.
 - 5. In all cases of hallot the Moderator may vote. In all other

cases he shall not vote unless the Association be equally divided, or unless his vote given to the minority will make the division equal. In that case the question shall be jost,

- When any member is about to speak in debate he shall rise and address the Moderator.
- If any member, while speaking or otherwise employed, transgress the rules of decorum, the Moderator shall, or any member may, call him to order.
- When two or more members shall rise at the same time, the Moderator shall decide who is first entitled to the floor.
- 9. No member shall indulge in unkind remarks in debate, nor shall any member speak more than twice on the same question without leave from the Association, nor more than once until every one choosing to speak shall have done so.
- 10. While any member is addressing the Association, it shall be the duty of the Moderator to suppress all private discourses that may be entertained between the members, and require strict attention on the part of the members.
- When a motion is made and seconded it shall be stated by the Moderator before debate.
- Every motion shall be reduced to writing if desired by any member of the Association.
- 13. After a motion is made and seconded it shall be deemed in possession of the Association, but may be withdrawn at any time before being discussed or amended.
- 14. When a question is under debate no motion shall be entertained unless to amend it or refer it to a committee, or for the previous question, or for adjournment.
- A motion for adjournment shall always be in order, and decided without debate.
- 16. Any member may call for a division of a question when two or more distinct propositions are set forth, and when the substance will admit of division.
- Motions and amendments may be referred to a committee at the pleasure of the Association.
 - 18. Every resolution shall receive two statements or readings in

the Association previous to its passage. The first shall be for information, and the second when the decision of the Association is to be made.

- 19. These rules may be changed or amended at any full meeting of the Association.
- The Association shall be opened and closed with prayer each day by the Moderator or some other member.
- All queries shall be fairly sigted in writing and approbated by two-thirds of the members present before they shall be acted on.

ARTICLES OF FAITH OF THE PLORIDA BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

Article 1. We believe in one only true and living God, and that there are three in the Godhead—the Father, the Son and the Holy Ghoat.

Article 2. We believe the Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments are the Word of God, and the only rule of faith and practice.

Article 3. We believe in the doctrine of particular and sternal election.

Article 4. We believe in the doctrine of original sin.

Article 5. We believe in man's impotency to recover himself from the fallen state in which he is by nature, by his own free will and ability.

Article 6. We believe that we are justified in the sight of God only by the imputed righteousness of Christ.

Article 7. We believe that God's elect shall be called, regenerate 1 and sanctified by the Holy Ghost.

Article 8. We believe that the saints shall persevere in grace and never finally fall away.

Article 2. We believe that baptism and the Lors's Supper are ordinances of Jesus Christ; that nothing is baptism except immersion; that believers are the only subjects of this ordinance, and that none but baptized believers are entitled to partake of the Lord's Supper.

Article 10. We believe in a general resurrection of the dead and a general judgement.

Article 11. We believe that the punishment of the wicked shall be everlasting and the joys of the righteous will be eternal.

Article 12. We believe that no minister has a right to administer the ordinances only such as are regularly called and have comounder the imposition of the hands of the Presbytery.

- 1. In the absence of the moderator, Dr. W. M. Vines, the meeting was called to order by the clerk, D. A. Avant.
- 2. Dr. S. A. Campbell was nominated and elected to serve as temporary moderator.
- 3. A roll call of churches was made, and motion made and carried that all messengers present and those who should come later constitute the Association.
- On motion of Rev. E. H. Garrott the clerk was instructed to cast a unanimous ballot for Dr. S. A. Campbell as permanent moderator.
- 5. Motion by W. H. Rugley that D. A. Avant be reelected clerk. Motion carried.
- 6. Motion by C. L. Wattenbarger that J. E. Shelfer be re-elected Treasurer. Motion carried.
- 7. Committee on Finance and Digest of Letters appointed by moderator as follows: J. E. Shelfer, O. E. Mc-

Keown and C. L. Timmons.

- 8. A suggested program was read by clerk, and motion made and carried that we adopt this program with such changes as we find necessary.
- Visitors were recognized, as follows: Rev. E. D. Solomon of Jacksonville, T. M. Johns of Arcadia and F. E. Etheridge of Atlanta, Ga.
- Report on Bible Schools was read by Mrs. D. S. Parkman, discussed by C. L. Wattenbarger and D. A. Avant, and adopted.

SUMMARY OF REPORT ON BIBLE SCHOOLS

The Committee on Bible Schools submits the following report:

There are 23 Sunday Schools in the Association with an enrollment of 4492, a gain during the year of 96 Baptisms from the Sunday Schools were 172

Officers and teachers number 484 compared with 456 of last year.

SUMMARY OF REPORT ON FOREIGN MISSIONS

In 1906 we had 214 churches with 12,894 members. By 1931 these had grown to 2,681 churches with 169,311 members, a most remarkable growth in twenty five years. 1,868 of these churches are now self-supporting. It is worthy of note that we baptized more people last year than we had members in 1906. The churches on the foreign fields gave for the support of the work last year \$145,000.00 more than all Southern Baptists gave for Foreign Mission work in 1906.

With such a spirit as this manifested in the fields abroad we are not surprised to get the glad tidings that last year we battiged 16,568. This is the largest number ever reported on our foreign fields.

This has been a year of great revivals. One Missionary in Africa reports: "A whole village won to Christ. 1,444 baptized in one meeting, and another thousand seeking baptism. They have left their idols and are seeking a true and living God, but do not know how to go about finding him." Will not we, as Missionaries, ponder this closing sentence: "They do not know how to go about finding Him",

The Board is at the cross roads. They can borrow no money from the banks. They can only look to us. Shall we fall our Lord in this most critical and opportune hour?

SUMMARY OF REPORT ON CHILDREN'S HOME

We have eight buildings. The entire plant and grounds is worth about \$100,000.00. We have 134 children in the Home. Mr. T. M. Johns is the Superintendent. We have a printing press, general farming and a dairy. The boys work on farm, in dairy and at printing press. The girls do cooking, sewing and cleaning. We endeavor to give them all a high school education. The Home is partially supported through the Cooperative program but the income from this source is insufficient and special offerings need to be made by the Churches and Sunday Schools. We would urge that every Sunday School in this Association send one Sunday's collection each month to the Home.

SUMMARY OF REPORT ON PROHIBITION

Of all the false explanations of the present depression the chief one is that given by those who advocate the destruction of probabition, and the return of the licensed liquor traffic. It is charged by the friends of liquor that our depression in the United States is due to prohibition. But at the same time they do not assign a cause for the depression in other countries where liquor flows like a river. They fail to recognize that economic conditions here are incomparably better than in any other country. They ignore the fact that alcoholic drink is a destructive force and that lestruction cannot bring prosperity. I would like here to give some excerpts from a specific made by a great governor of a great State.

"I bear no malice toward those engaged in the liquor business, but I hate the traffic. I hate its every phase. I hate it for its arrogance, its hypocrisy, its cant, craft and false pretense. I hate it for its commercialism, greed, and avirice, for its sordid love of gain at

any price. I hate it for its domination of politics, its corruption of civic affairs, its incessant effort to debauch the sufferage of the country, and for the cowards it makes of our public men".

May the people hear, through present conditions, the voice of God calling us back to a deeper devotion to Him and His cause, and teaching us that the only aure basis of prosperity is to do justly, love mercy and walk humbly with God.

SUMMARY OF REPORT ON STEWARDSHIP

The doctrine of Stewardship is founded on ownership. We all think in terms of creation. We accept the fact that God is the maker of all things. He has hidden away in the bowels of the earth great treasures for man's use. He has filled the universe with power that man may harness it for his happiness and wellbeing. But the non-Christian has the same opportunity of using these rescurces as the Christian. Stewardship then must find its force in the Christian life; not on the foundation of creation but on redemption. "Ye are not your own, for you are bought with a price." It is not God's creative ownership that moves the hearts of men to sacrific all living and giving, but the "Amazing Grace" of God which reached down and plucked Him as a bran from the burning.

There is nothing that will kindle in the hearts of Christians a true sense of Stewardship as will the doctrine of Redeeming Love. To me a tithe has never half pail the interest on God's Redeeming Love. The thought of how little will please God as a profit on His grace invested in me has not been the question, but how much can my life yield, and how great a dividend will it pay?

For 1931 he reports 26,976 Unions, with an increase in membership of 13,-399, total membership in 1931 being 546,948. In 1931 there were 3,902 Unions reported Standard, a gain of 119 over 1930. Increases are reported not only in membership, but in tithers, systematic givers,

study course awards, and in number of leaders absorbed in other church work.

REPORT ON STATE MISSIONS

Last year Florida Bartists gave to all missionary and benevolent objects \$174,585.78 or \$13,643.88 less than previous year. Of this amount the cooperative program received \$95,954.19—\$28,182.97 went to Foreign Missions and \$9,255.10 to Home Missions. There were in designated funds \$78,643.49. The total amount for State Missions was \$66,905.79.

Your committee joins the State Mission Board in orging the churches to put on the every member canvass Nov. 27 to Dec. 4th, and by so doing seek to onlist the membership of the churches in a more adequate support of our Denoshinational program. And since the Co-operative Program appears to be the best plus for taking care of all Kingdom interests, we urge that pastors and churches give it their hearty support so that State Missions may have sufficient memory with which to meet the pressing needs of our work.

SUMMARY OF REPORT ON HOME MISSIONS

Since its organization eighty seven years ago the Home Mission Board has employed 41,062 missionaries, organized 8,570 churches and baptized 785,500 souls at an average cost of \$25.00 each. No local church we know of has made such a glorious record.

Even though the receipts for last year were \$110.851.00 less than the previous year the Board paid \$81,896.00 on the principal of its debt and lived within its income. No mission fields were abandoned, and the work was blessed of the Lord. Among the foreigners, Indians and Negroes we had this year 1574 conversions as compared with 1,543 last year. The schools and Good-Will centers reported 1,644 conversions, making a total of 2,618 in this department. in the Mountain School Work we had 158 conversions, and in Cuba 352, making a total of 3,128 in all fields.

The Board is interpreting Missions to be primarily the making and baptizing disciples. Its policy is to major on preaching the Gospel in Cuba and Panama and to the foreigners, the Indians, the Negroes and in the congested centers in our home land.

It is for this task the Board asks Southern Baptists to enlarge their gifts. There was never a greater need, or greater opportunity than now. It is Christ or Chaos.
