#### CONSTITUTION

**Article 1.** This Association shall be known by the name of The Florida Baptist Association. The object of this Association shall be to conduct the work of missions, colportage, Sabbath school enterprises and other work that will tend to spread the Gospel.

**Article 2.** This Association shall be composed of white members chosen by the respective churches in its union in the proportion of two members for each church of fifty or less and one additional delegate for every twenty-five members over fifty.

**Article 3.** The letters sent by the church at each session of the Association shall express their respective members in full fellowship, those baptised, received by letter, restored, dismissed, excommunicated and dead since last session.

**Article 4.** Believing it to be proper on account of the diversity of opinion among men as to the import of Scripture contained in the Old and New Testaments to declare our belief and understanding thereof we therefore append our belief in twelve Articles and present them with our Minutes to the Baptist denomination.

**Article 5.** The Association when convened shall be governed by a regular and proper decorum. A Moderator and Clerk shall be chosen by the votes of the members present who shall hold their offices until the close of the next session of the body and until their successors are elected. The Moderator shall preside at the meeting of the Association and the Clerk shall record the proceedings and prepare them for the press.

**Article 6.** The Association thus organized shall have no power to lord it over God's heritage or infringe upon the internal rights of any church.

**Article 7.** Newly constituted churches may be admitted to this union on application by letter and delegates; and if, upon examination, found to be orthodox, shall be received by the Association and the right hand of fellowship extended to the delegates by the Moderator.

**Article 8.** The Association shall furnish the Minutes of their proceedings in proportion to the funds sent up for that purpose by the churches.

**Article 9.** The Minutes of the Association shall be publicly read (and corrected, if necessary), and then signed by the Moderator and Clerk before adjournment.

**Article 10.** Any amendment or ratification of this Constitution may be made by the votes of two-thirds of the members present at any two regular successive meetings of the Association. All other matters of fellowship shall be decided by a majority vote. In matters of fellowship the Association must be a unit.

Article 11. The Association shall have power first, to provide for the general union of the churches; second, to give the churches advice in matters of difficulty; third, to inquire into the cause of any failing to be represented at the meetings of the Association; fourth, to withdraw all connection from any church or churches in this union who shall violate the rules of this Association, or shall deviate from the orthodox principles of the revealed Word of God; fifth, to appropriate the money contributed and sent up to the Association as specified by said churches, and when not specified it shall be apportioned to promote the best interests of the Master's cause; sixth, to adjourn to any future time and place they may deem most convenient to the churches in the union.

#### **RULES OF DECORUM**

Roberts Rules of Order are henceforth to be used by order of the Association.

## **PROCEEDINGS**

### **Ninety-ninth Annual Session FLORIDA BAPTIST ASSOCIATION**

**Held with the  
Immanuel Baptist Church  
Tallahassee, Florida**

#### **FIRST DAY**

**Morning Session, October 16, 1941**

1. The Ninety-ninth Annual Session of the Florida Baptist Association was called to order by the Moderator, Rev. Charles E. Lamb, at ten o'clock A. M. The Congregation sang, "All Hail the Power of Jesus Name," and prayer was led by Rev. G. E. Von Hagen of Jacksonville.
2. The Devotion was conducted by Rev. E. W. Anderson of Thomasville, Ga., using for his Scripture James 1:22.
3. The Clerk called the roll and thirty-three churches were represented by Letter and practically all of them by messengers also.
4. A motion prevailed that the messengers present and those who should arrive later compose the Association.
5. The Report on Order of Business was read by Rev. Charles E. Lamb and was adopted as the program for the two-day session of the Association with such changes as may later become necessary.
6. The Moderator recognized the following pastors who had moved into the Association since the last session: H. F. Jelks of Immanuel Church, Tallahassee, H. E. Parker of Quincy, B. A. Roth of Monticello and W. L. Strawn of Telogia.
7. The following visitors were recognized by the Moderator: Dr. J. Harrison Griffin, Dr. E. D. Solomon and Dr. C. H. Bolton of Jacksonville, Mr. T. M. Johns of Ar-

cadia, M. D. Jackson of Middle Florida Association, E. H. Beall of Jackson County Association, S. E. Tucker of Miami, Rev. and Mrs. E. H. Garrott of the West Coast Association, T. F. Calloway and T. W. Tippet of Georgia.

8. The report of the Executive Committee was adopted as read by Rev. H. B. Jamieson.

#### REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

The committee met three times during the year, viz: Dec. 10, 1940 with First Church, Tallahassee; March 25, 1941 with Lake View, Tallahassee, and June 24, 1941 with Havana, with an average attendance of 14 at these meetings. The members of the committee were entertained at luncheon by the women of the Lake View and Havana churches, and by Bro. A. Pichard at the First Church, Tallahassee meeting.

At the first meeting Bro. C. E. Lamb was chosen as chairman, and Bro. W. E. Wood as secretary. At the second meeting Bro. H. B. Jamieson was chosen as secretary to succeed Bro. W. E. Wood who had moved away.

The chief items of business transacted at these meetings were: Approved application for aid to Second Church, Monticello; appointed A. Pichard, D. A. Avant and S. R. Doyle as a committee to draft suitable resolutions to be sent to all law enforcement officers in this Association, asking every possible protection against unnecessary social evils around army camps; discussed and adopted a program of Evangelism for the Association; appointed D. P. Lee, S. R. Doyle and L. E. Goodgame as a committee to determine to what extent we observe the 100th anniversary of the Association, and drew up a suggested program for the 99th session of the Association.

9. The Moderator stated that Dr. C. H. Bolton, Executive Secretary of the State Mission Board, could not be present during the afternoon or evening session. A motion prevailed that we hear Dr. Bolton now. After singing "Higher Ground" Dr. Bolton brought an inspiring message on Missions.

10. The Rev. Charles E. Lamb, pastor of the Chatahoochee Church, preached the Associational sermon, using as a text Second Peter 3:18, having as his subject "God's Unfolding Revelation."

11. The Rev. H. F. Jelks, hostess pastor, announced that dinner would be served on the grounds and that ample

provision had been made for all who would to spend the night in the city.

12. Dr. H. A. Parker of Quincy offered the closing prayer and the body adjourned for lunch.

#### First Day—Afternoon Session

13. The Moderator called the Association to order, after which Brother W. G. Durrance, messenger from the Lake Ellen Church led the opening devotion.

14. The report on Benevolences was read by A. Frank O'Kelley, Jr., and adopted.

#### REPORT ON BENEVOLENCES

It is encouraging to note substantial increases in our contributions to all phases of our benevolent work this year as compared with last year.

Total contributions to the Cooperative Program and the Hundred Thousand Club are shown below, this year as compared with last. Then we note the total contributed for "all other" benevolences as compared with last year. We regret that we are unable, from the information thus far in hand, to show each item separately in "other benevolences."

Yet when we break it down, comparing our total contributions of \$12,565.95 for the year with our total church membership of 7,144 we note that the average contribution per church member was only \$1.76 for the entire year. 15. Brother T. M. Johns, Superintendent of the Baptist Children's Home at Arcadia was recognized by the Moderator and given an opportunity to speak. A very encouraging and gratifying report was made, at the conclusion of which a motion prevailed that we take an offering for the Home. There was contributed \$41.25 and handed to the treasurer.

16. Dr. J. Harrison Griffin of Jacksonville, Director of the State Brotherhood Movement, was recognized, and he gave an inspiring address. Among other things he recounted the accomplishments and set out certain aims as follows:

18. Mr. Alphonse Pichard read the report on Missions which was ably discussed by Dr. E. D. Solomon and adopted.

#### REPORT ON MISSIONS

##### Foreign Missions:

Despite wars and rumors of war the Foreign Mission Board has just concluded one of the best of its long history of 96 years. They have 457 active missionaries, with 3,000 native workers in 16 countries, who during the past year taught 35,291 students, ministered to 136,994 physically ill and preached the Gospel to multiplied thousands. The membership of the churches increased by 18,542 and the total membership of 251,734 contributed \$379,896.00 to the work. In very recent years the Foreign Board debt has been reduced from \$1,110,000.00 to \$205,000.00, and it is confidently expected it will be out of debt by 1945.

##### Home Missions:

Marvelous victories in soul winning have come from God in the Home Land. Tentative figures indicate that approximately a quarter million have been won to Christ and baptized into the churches during the past year, thus making our membership more than 5,000,000. The Home Board has 391 missionaries and 915 churches and mission stations. During the year they opened 71 new mission stations, acquired 14 new pieces of property, distributed 4,443 Bibles and Testaments and 724,505 tracts. A notable achievement was refinancing the \$850,000.00 debt, reducing the interest rate to 3¼ and 3½%, thus saving \$9,000.00 a year in interest alone.

##### State Missions:

The program of preaching, teaching and enlisting in Florida during the year has been one of the most successful in history. the W. M. U. under the direction of Miss Louise Smith, Sunday Schools under Dr. W. W. William, B. T. U. under Mr. O. K. Radford, Evangelism under Dr. T. O. Reese and the State Committee, and the Brotherhood under Dr. J. Harrison Griffin are all making rapid progress. Student work at Gainesville under Mr. Sabin P. Landry and at Tallahassee under Miss Billie Ruth Currin is doing much to conserve the religious life and power

of the churches back home. We recommend the Every Member Canvass as the best means of enlisting our membership in stewardship, and the Cooperative Program as the best method of supporting every phase of our denominational program.

21. In the auditorium of the First Baptist Church, beginning at 7:30 P. M. Rev. T. J. Barnett of the Lake View Church conducted the devotion, and Dr. E. D. Solomon of Jacksonville, Editor of the Florida Baptist Witness, preached a sermon. At the conclusion of the sermon Dr. Solomon recognized Dr. Doak S. Campbell who recently assumed his duties as President of the Florida State College for Women. Dr. Campbell made a few appropriate remarks.

22. The meeting adjourned until 9:30 next day at the Immanuel Church, Rev. W. L. Strawn offering the closing prayer.

#### SECOND DAY

##### Morning Session, October 17, 1941

23. Promptly at 9:30 A. M. Mr. S. R. Doyle, Vice Moderator, called the Association to order, in the absence of the Moderator, and Mr. Ira Gatlin of the Lake View Church conducted the devotion.

24. A motion prevailed that we confirm the election of Miss Roumelle Bowen as Director of the Eastern Division of the B. T. U. Federation.

25. The report on Church Auxiliaries, written by C. T. Timmons, was read by Mr. Ira Gatlin, in the absence of Mr. Timmons. It was fully discussed and adopted as read.

#### REPORT ON CHURCH AUXILIARIES

##### Sunday School:

Last year we had enrolled in our Sunday Schools 5,151 persons with an average attendance of 2,361. This was a gain of 200 new pupils with no gain in the average attendance which was 45% during both years. This year we report an enrolment of 4,432, a loss of 719 pupils and a loss of 429 in average attendance. We feel this is one of our weakest points when more than half of our enrolment is not in Sunday School on Sunday morning.

We feel that we are making gains in our work but we need to face our responsibility more earnestly because as Baptists we have 29% of the Sunday School enrolment in the south in our denomination. This is our opportunity and responsibility faced by every Baptist Church.

In order to reach our prospects we need more trained workers, better equipment, more rooms in our buildings and a more consecrated effort on the part of our Sunday School workers to win these prospects.

To promote our work we already have the best agency possible for carrying on our Sunday School work. This is our associational organization of which we have two divisions, the eastern half under the direction of Rev. T. J. Barnett, Superintendent, and the Gadsden County Sunday School Association with Rev. C. M. Warren, as Superintendent.

The Gadsden County Association has sponsored during the year two associational training classes with 13 of the 15 churches cooperating. These 13 churches have received a total of 369 awards. Their goal for the year was 500 awards. In the Gadsden County Association we have two schools which have reached the standard, Gretna and Little Sycamore.

The Eastern side of the association has not sponsored an associational training class but five of the churches have had classes receiving 93 awards.

The Gadsden County Association began an annual training workers banquet last year which we plan as a permanent feature of our training work.

A few suggestions we would like to make are: First, we need to intensify our training program. This is the key to greater Sunday School work. Our two associational organizations can be our greatest help in this. Much of the training work of the Gadsden County division is due to this organization. Second, we need to provide opportunity for service for more of our people. The enlargement of our Sunday Schools will fill this need and also increase the capacity of our Sunday Schools. Third, we need to help our workers through our associational organizations. We know most of them never get to meetings out of the association and this is where our associational organizations can help, by planning monthly meetings that will meet the needs of our workers. Under our Four Year Plan

of work we will have two all day meetings in our association, the week of February 2-6. In these meetings we will have our best Sunday School workers. Fourth, we need to hold up a higher standard of Sunday School work. Our Standards will meet these needs. Reaching these standards will bring greater results than any other thing we can do, and Fifth, Our Sunday Schools are our greatest soul winning opportunities. If we study our Standards we find the heart of them to be Evangelism. Last year we had 440 baptisms with 294 from the Sunday Schools.

#### B. T. U.:

Last year in our Training Union we reported 1,416 members, a gain of 346 members. Twenty-three Churches reported B. T. U. organizations, a gain of 5 Churches.

This year we have made a good increase. Of the 35 Churches in our Association, 28 Churches report Training Union work, a gain of five Churches over last year. Last year we had 98 Unions and 5 Story Hours. This year we have 103 Unions with 8 Story Hours. Last year only 12 Churches had study course work, receiving 187 awards. This year we had 17 Churches receiving 436 awards. This leaves 18 Churches which had no B. T. U. study courses.

We also have two Associational Training Union organizations. In Gadsden County we have a complete organization under the direction of Rev. C. E. Lamb. This organization follows the plan of meetings as suggested by our B. T. U. headquarters in Nashville. The Eastern side of the Association has for its director Miss Roumelle Bowen.

We are delighted with the progress being made in our Association. We feel that every Church should provide a place of training for every member. We win many converts during the year, but we do not encourage them to enter a school of training to become useful Christians. We would like to urge every Church to be represented in our Associational Training Union Conferences the week of March 16-20, 1942, that every Church in our association be represented in our associational Intermediate Sword Drill contest and Better Speaker's Tournament next March and that every Church in our association hold a Training School this year.

#### Baptist Brotherhood:

Our Brotherhood movement is growing. Florida Baptists are showing their interest in our Brotherhood work. The enlistment of our men is the greatest need of the hour.

We have a state organization which is three years old. Of the thirty-six associations we have twenty-two organized with 246 local Brotherhoods with a total enrolment of around 4,000.

In our Association we elected officers one year but they never did function so at the present, we have no associational Brother-

hood. Last year we had two brotherhoods reported, Monticello and Immanuel, with an enrolment of 50. This year we have three new brotherhoods, Tallahassee First Church, Lakeview and Providence with a total enrolment in the five of 109.

We trust that some plan will be worked out to have a functioning Brotherhood in our association as we need the work that an organization of our men can do. As the Associational Brotherhood holds its meetings quarterly it seems that this could be made a great asset to our associational work. We urge our men to attend the brotherhood session at our state convention in Panama City in January.

#### REPORT ON W. M. U. WORK

There is something fascinating and challenging about comparing reports of work done with that of preceding years. It is with sincere gratitude to our Heavenly Father and appreciation to our co-workers—the women of the Florida Association W. M. U.—that we again report a year of progress in missionary endeavor.

Out of the thirty-four churches there are twenty-two missionary societies; thirty-six auxiliaries; one Ann Hasseltine Y. W. A. and one Grace McBride Y. W. A., with a total membership of 1,442 or more. Five of these societies are full grade, namely: Tallahassee, First; Tallahassee, Immanuel; Tallahassee, Lake View; Quincy and Chattahoochee.

Our contributions this year to all causes amounted to \$5,469.10, which exceeded last year's contributions by \$1,051.27.

Before the Brantleys left for Nigeria (in January) we presented them with a portable organ, and we have reports of good use it is being put to.

Even though we have made progress we can truthfully say, in the words of Joshua of old, "There is yet much land to be possessed." We trust and pray that during 1942 we shall take new courage and face our ever increasing task with greater faith, "That we may be laborers together with God," and that His way may be known upon the earth and His salvation come to all nations.

### SOCIAL SERVICE REPORT

World conditions today make it imperative that Christians take a decisive part in the social affairs of their community life. Those of us who love the Lord cannot afford to sit idly by, while the Devil uses every modern device available to attract men, women, boys and girls into paths where unrighteousness prevails.

Sin has never been so attractive, and the way of sin made so easy to travel, as now. Homes, where the spirit of love and purity should be a protection to our society, have been turned into cocktail lounges and smoking parlors. Our schools and colleges where growing youth should be trained in all things to help in character building, in many instances, are places of mass planning for social activities that are a detriment to truth and virtue. Many of our churches, eager to hold the interest of society groups, have winked at the questionable amusements engaged in by the larger part of our membership.

In my humble judgment there are three great social evils that are sapping the spiritual life of our churches and holding back the advancement of the Kingdom of our Christ: Smoking, drinking, and dancing. No man or woman can habitually indulge in these things and grow a strong, useful christian character. Women smoke and sip cocktails until they are silly. Men smoke and drink until they are daring. Then throw silly women and daring men together and anything may happen. The smoking craze, the drinking craze, and the dancing craze, have all but killed the home life of today, and wrecked the possibility of a Godly home life for tomorrow.

What can the church do about all this? Frankly, very little we think, as the situation now stands. Jesus said "Ye are the salt of the earth. But if the salt have lost its savor wherewith shall it be salted. It is henceforth fit for nothing but to be cast under foot of men." To a large degree, the salt has lost its savor. There is too little difference between the man and woman of the church and the man and woman of the world. If the pastor, with his church, would repent in sack cloth and ashes until we are sure God has forgiven us, then go before the world with an unquestionable life, we could put some seasoning and savoring qualities in the society of our day.

We pastors must pray more and preach less. Do more and talk less. Lead the way instead of pointing the way. Not long ago we saw on the streets of a certain town a pastor with his pipe and his wife with her cigarette. What can God do with an undershepherd like that? The day has come when we need a revival in the pulpit.

But pastors alone cannot change the social evils. Church members must do their part. They need convictions and courage about these social evils. Church members do not have to be fanatics, but they should be faithful witnesses of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. Surely it is not asking too much that they live clean, useful lives for the Christ that died to save them.

The true spirit of Christ sanely exemplified in the lives of every professed Christian would solve all of our social problems. Legislation helps very little, if any. Moral uplift movements get us nowhere fast. Society needs a new birth, the ingrafted word of God working its way out through consistent lives of our people.

We pray that God may help us to so live as to add something of a seasoning and savoring quality to our social order.

Campbell, who was prepared to speak to the report, was present. A motion prevailed that Dr. Campbell be allowed to speak on the subject, and that the written report, when received by the clerk, be incorporated in the minutes. Dr. Campbell delivered a very informative and inspiring message, emphasizing the value of Christian Literature, especially that produced by our own Sunday School Board.

#### REPORT ON CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

The principle of education is one of the most essential factors of civilization. Not only is it necessary for the development of the young and for their preparation to live the fullest possible life, but it is also essential to the transmission of an accumulated culture and civilization from preceding generations. Today, as never before, Christian educators are recognizing the necessity of educating the hearts of young people as well as their minds. Remember the wise words of the Duke of Wellington that "To educate children apart from religion is to make them clever devils." We place our whole-hearted approval upon a progressive and dynamic program of religious education for the development of the youth of our land.

In these trying times, we will do well to remember that all the early efforts in the American Colonies, and in the United States, were deeply rooted in religious motives and principles. In those pioneer days education was Christian before it was anything else. Some of the largest universities and colleges in America today, attribute their founding to the fires of religious zeal which challenged our forefathers. These facts are basic to early constructive planning of Christian education today, and for the future.

The Commission which Christ gave to our churches is; go ye, make disciples, and teach them. Teaching is a specific obligation of the Christian church, equal in importance with going and making disciples. Many commendable efforts have been put forth during the past year by the churches of our Association in an effort to fulfill this supreme command of our Saviour.

We recognize as the supreme duty of the Sunday School the evangelization of the lost, and of the B. T. U. as training for church membership. The Woman's Missionary Union has also done a splendid work in the missionary education of the youth of our churches. Our churches have made commendable progress through the work of these organizations. But at the same time, we feel that the need is far greater than the organiza-

tions of our churches are now answering. Our churches need to point out and put in the hands of our young people such wholesome literature as will develop their faith in God and at the same time strengthen their faith in His church. Our State paper, the Baptist Witness, is very commendable as a "must" in the reading lists of all of our people. We feel that a generation of right reading, thinking, and teaching will make a great deal of difference in the religious temperament of the State and Nation.

During the year 1940 and '41 our denominational seminaries and colleges have had normal enrollments. Gains in equipment have been realized. Constant reports flow in to us of the wonderful work being done by our Seminary at Louisville, at Seminary Hill, at New Orleans and at the Negro Seminary in Nashville. In our own state we have Stetson University at DeLand, of which all Florida Baptists are justly proud. Dr. W. S. Allen, President, deserves our praise for the solid growth Stetson has made in recent years. It has well lived up to its motto: "For God and Truth," and a superb campus environment has been provided the great student body which is consistent with Christian ideals and principles. Because of the present international crisis, there will likely be some enrollment losses. For several years Stetson, as well as most of our Baptist schools, has been operating on a budget far too small. Financial worries try the souls and test the faith of all of our Baptist Christian Educational Leaders. Therefore, it becomes imperative that Baptists must act quickly in providing added funds, in large amounts at once available to our State School and to our Seminaries. If every Baptist gives to Christian education with some slight measure of sacrifice, this raising of big money for a worthy educational program will prove an easy task.

With the world aflame and in a titanic struggle over vital issues, Christian education and Christian schools face an acid test. With us the heroic traditions of Christian education are a priceless heritage. Ours is the challenge to "Carry on" this part of the Kingdom work in a worthy fashion. In the days following the present crisis and emergency, regardless of the terms of peace, "The reorganization of Society after the mind of Christ" will be the supreme need of the world in the immediate future. We dare not let the lights go out today or tomorrow in our program of Christian education, the light-house of civilization!

On Nov. 12th, at Havana, a Methods Clinic was held with Mrs. J. B. Boatwright, South Carolina, Miss Elsie Renfro, State Young People's Leader and Miss Louise Smith, State Secretary, in charge. During the last week in April Miss Mary Wilson was in our Association for mission study work, and taught in five different churches, ten churches represented, and she taught one class for the Grace McBride Y. W. A. at Chattahoochee. Approximately 150 attended these classes. Miss Wilson also taught a correspondence course at Quincy for two days during the week of February 2nd; nine churches represented; fifteen taking the work.

Four quarterly meetings were held, as follows: At Immanuel, January 30th, Miss Mary Wilson, W. M. U. Field Worker, taught "The Trail of the Seed," with 137 attending. The second quarterly meeting was held at Providence with 97 present. The theme for the day was "An Urgent Gospel—The World's Dire Need." Dr. Pierce S. Ellis of Tallahassee brought an inspiring message on Missions. The third quarterly meeting was held with Mount Besor July 30 with 71 present. The theme being "Thy Kingdom Come." The Rev. H. B. Jamieson of Havana brought a helpful message. At this meeting the ingathering of Centennial gifts was made. \$534.81 was reported on goal of \$800.00 during the period May 8th to July 30th. The fourth quarter or Annual meeting was held with Olive Church on Sept. 24 with 142 in attendance. The theme of the meeting was: "Are We Trained for Defense?" Miss Louise Smith, State W. M. U. Secretary and Miss Pearl Johnson, China, were guest speakers. At this meeting the statistical report showed the following: Number of subscribers to: Royal Service 177; The Commission 34; Home Missions 70; Florida Baptist Witness 166. Number of tithers 288; number engaged in directed personal service 2,141; number of Mission Study Classes held 42; awards 413; number of coupons to Children's Home 10,190.
