CONSTITUTION

Article 1. This Association shall be known by the name of The Florida Baptist Association. The object of this Association shall be to conduct the work of missions, colportage, Sabbath school enterprises and other work that will tend to spread the Gospel.

Article 2. This Association shall be composed of white members chosen by the respective churches in its union in the proportion of two members for each church of fifty or less and one additional delegate for every twenty-five members over fifty.

Article 3. The letters sent by the church at each session of the Association shall express their respective members in full fellowship, those baptized, received by letter, restored, dismissed, excommunicated and dead since last session.

Article 4. Believing it to be proper on account of the diversity of opinion among men as to the import of Scripture contained in the Old and New Testaments to declare our belief and understanding thereof we therefore append our belief in twelve Articles and present them with our Minutes to the Baptist denomination.

Article 5. The Association when convened shall be governed by a regular and proper decorum. A Moderator and Clerk shall be chosen by the votes of the members present who shall hold their offices until the close of the next session of the body and until their successors are elected. The Moderator shall preside at the meeting of the Association and the Clerk shall record the proceedings and prepare them for the press.

Article 6. The Association thus organized shall have no power to lord it over God's heritage or infringe upon the internal rights of any church.

Article 7. Newly constituted churches may be admitted to this union on application by letter and delegates; and if, upon examination, found to be orthodox, shall be received by the Association and the right hand of fellowship extended to the delegates by the Moderator.

Article 8. The Association shall furnish the Minutes of their proceedings in proportion to the funds sent up for that purpose by the churches.

Article 9. The Minutes of the Association shall be publicly read (and corrected, if necessary), and then signed by the Moderator and Clerk before adjournment.

Article 10. Any amendment or ratification of this Constitution may be made by the votes of two-thirds of the members present at any two regular successive meetings of the Association. All other matters of fellowship the Association must be a unit.

Article 11. The Association shall have power first, to provide for the general union of the churches; second, to give the churches advice in matters of difficulty; third, to inquire into the cause of any failing to be represented at the meetings of the Association; fourth, to withdraw all connection from any church or churches in this union who shall violate the rules of this Association, or shall deviate from the orthodox principles of the revealed Word of God; fifth, to appropriate the money contributed and sent up to the Association as specified by said churches, and when not specified it shall be apportioned to promote the best interests of the Master's cause; sixth, to adjourn to any future time and place they deem most convenient to the churches in the Union.

RULES OF DECORUM

By order of the Association, Section 18, the Rules of Decorum and Articles of Faith are not printed in the Minutes.

The parliamentary proceedings of this Association are governed by Roberts "Rules of Order."

PROCEEDINGS

ONE HUNDREDTH ANNUAL SESSION

of the

FLORIDA BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

Held with the

EBENEZER BAPTIST CHURCH

Jefferson County, Florida

Morning Session, October 15, 1942

1. At historic Ebenezer Church, Jefferson County, Florida, where the Florida Baptist Association was organized October 16, 1843, the Association convened for its hundredth annual session. The Moderator, the Reverend Mr. G. T. Hunt, pastor of Lake Mystic Church, called the meeting to order at eleven o'clock Thursday morning, October 15, 1942.
2. The Devotional was conducted by B. A. Roth, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Monticello.
3. In the absence of the Clerk, Mrs. D. A. Avant was elected clerk pro tem, upon nomination by Dr. Pierce S. Ellis.
4. Roll of churches was called by the Clerk, and thirty churches responded by letter or messengers or by both.
5. O. N. Revell announced that the name of Mount Besor had been changed to First Baptist Church of Sopchoppy, and K. P. Puffer stated that Salem was now called First Baptist Church of Carrabelle.
6. A motion by H. S. Davis that messengers present and those arriving later compose the acting body of the Association was passed.

7. The Moderator recognized Dr. C. H. Bolton, Executive Secretary of the Baptist State Mission Board, Dr. E. D. Solomon, Editor of the Florida Baptist Witness, and T. M. Johns, Superintendent of the Florida Baptist Children's Home, as visitors.

8. A motion by B. A. Roth prevailed that a committee be appointed to consolidate the Program in order to finish the business of the Association in one day on account of the lack of transportation facilities due to shortage of gasoline and tires.

9. The Moderator appointed A. Pichard, Dr. Pierce S. Ellis, Dr. H. A. Parker, and H. F. Jelks, as a committee to revise the Program and report as soon as possible.

10. The Moderator appointed the following as Nominating Committee, instructing them to make their report today: T. J. Barnett, W. G. Durrance, P. W. Shelfer.

11. The report of the Executive Committee was adopted as read by H. B. Jamieson.

REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

The Executive Committee met in regular session four times during the year. The meetings were held in December, at the State Hospital at Chattahoochee with Dr. J. H. Therrell, Superintendent, as our host. The March meeting was held at Crawfordville, and the May and September meetings were at Tallahassee. The December meeting was probably the most important held this year. At this meeting the Executive Committee was organized with G. T. Hunt as Moderator, O. N. Revell, Vice-Moderator, and H. B. Jamieson, Secretary. Appeals were made for State aid for two churches. Though there were no applications from these churches the Secretary was authorized to approve the applications when and if they were sent in to him. Both applications were approved by the Secretary when they reached him later. At the December meeting plans were made and Committees were appointed to make preparations for the Association meeting to be held at the Ebenezer Baptist Church October 15.

At the three later meetings routine business was discussed such as, Emphasis on Evangelism, Brotherhood Work, Preachers' Revival in Blountstown, Anniversary plans and the appointment of a preacher each year by the Association to preach a Missionary Sermon.

There were 32 members of the Committee with an average attendance of 12 at the four meetings.

H. B. JAMIESON

12. Dr. Solomon spoke in the interest of the Florida Baptist Witness.

13. New pastors, E. E. Earnest, of Providence and Antioch churches, and Joe W. Hough, of Greensboro and Gretna churches, were recognized.

14. The Moderator appointed the following committees: Time, Place and Preacher—Dr. H. A. Parker, C. E. Blount, J. J. Shuman; Finance—Ira L. Gatlin, O. N. Revell, H. S. Davis.

15. H. B. Jamieson announced that churches desiring state aid must use regular application blanks obtained from Dr. C. H. Bolton, Baptist State Mission Board, Jacksonville, and present these forms complete in every detail to the Executive Committee of the Association for approval. This should be done by January 1st.

16. As there was a short time to spare, T. M. Johns was allowed to speak for ten minutes concerning the Children's Home.

17. The committee to revise the program so that it might be rendered in one day made a report which was adopted.

18. A motion prevailed to omit the printing of the Rules of Decorum and Articles of Faith in the Minutes.

19. T. J. Barnett, pastor of Lake View Church, Tallahassee, preached the Annual Sermon, reading John III, 1-16, and using as a text, "Ye must be born again."

20. The Moderator named as Committee on Resolutions—Mrs. J. E. Robinson, Mrs. Hayden Bateman, Mrs. W. H. Rugeley.

21. The morning session closed with prayer by W. G. Durrance.

Afternoon Session, October 15, 1942

22. As the pianist played "The Church in the Wild-wood," the Association convened for the afternoon session. The Rev. Mr. G. T. Hunt, Moderator, called the body to order. "Tell Me the Old, Old Story" was sung by the congregation.

23. R. A. Reed, supply pastor of Ebenezer Church, Jefferson County, conducted the Devotional.

24. In the absence of the W.M.U. president, Mrs. J. E. Robinson made a verbal report.

25. Motion by Dr. H. A. Parker prevailed that the Clerk record in the Minutes the report to be submitted later by the new president of the W.M.U.

REPORT OF W. M. U.

It is with grateful hearts that we give the report of our work for 1941-42. We realize that all the glory is due our God who giveth all blessings to His Children.

26. Report on Florida Baptist Children's Home made by H. F. Jelks, and spoken to by T. M. Johns, was adopted.

REPORT ON BAPTIST CHILDREN'S HOME

In the Minutes of the Florida Association, dated October 14-16, 1864, Baptists of Florida are first mentioned as giving some aid to orphan children. In the Minutes of the Association for the year 1908, we find this item: The Orphan's Home was open February 1st, 1904. At this report there were 48 children in the Home. They had two horses and three cows. The cost of the new building was \$5,228.77. In the report of 1922, the assets of the Home had reached \$61,000.00. In 1932, the value was \$100,000.00. In the Minutes of the Florida Baptist Convention of 1941, the assets were shown to be \$179,723.11—in thirty-seven years an

increase from \$6,000.00 to \$180,000.00, and from 48 children to 173 children. These are the physical facts. But it would be a long story to tell of the moral and spiritual value to the thousands of boys and girls who have passed through the Home.

Under the guidance of Mr. T. M. Johns the Florida Baptists are doing a great work for orphan children and for the Kingdom of Christ.

We quote from a letter from Mr. Johns. "I think the best thing that any Association can do is to enroll its churches as givers to the Children's Home. The amount of the gift and the kind of gift does not matter so much as the importance of the habit of giving. If churches would believe, as some individuals do, 'that it is more blessed to give than to receive,' they would be better off, and so would we."

REPORT ON CHURCH AUXILIARIES

Sunday Schools

Of the 34 churches last year there were 29 Sunday schools reported, with a total enrollment of 5,085, with an average attendance of 2,290. In all these churches there were only 6 Vacation Bible Schools reported. Of the 33 churches reporting this year there are 28 Sunday Schools reported with an average attendance of 2,100. This year there were 6 Vacation Bible Schools reported.

The Sunday School work in our Association was in the early part of the year fairly well organized, with an Associational on each side of the river. The organization on the west of the river, known as the Gadsden County Sunday School Association, is made up of 13 churches. On the Leon County side, the Sunday School Association is at present inactive, due to traveling conditions, but is fully organized. The chief function of these organizations is to encourage the starting of Sunday Schools in churches where none is reported, a more intensive study of Sunday School work by all Sunday School workers, and better Sunday Schools in churches where Sunday Schools are functioning.

B. T. U.

There were 19 Training Unions reported in Florida Association last year with total enrollment of 1,337. This year there are 15 Training Unions reported with an enrollment of 984. The Associational organizations of the Training Union are functioning rather poorly on both sides of the Association. Three things have contributed to this inactivity. (1) A lack of interest. (2) War conditions with a limitation of travel. (3) Interested B.T.U. workers have gone into military service or having engaged in war work. It is to be hoped that each church will keep alive Training Union work and that our Associational organizations, which we now have in name, will soon be revived.

Men's Brotherhood

Florida Association has an active Brotherhood organization, of which Mr. Gay of Quincy is the President. There are only 3 churches in our Association reporting a Brotherhood. It would seem from the interest taken in the two Associational Brotherhood meetings already held this year that there should be considerable growth in this organization in the months that lie ahead.

33. Report of Committee on Time, Place and Preacher was read by H. A. Parker and adopted with amendments as follows:

REPORT ON TIME, PLACE, AND PREACHER

The next meeting of the Association will be held with Providence Baptist Church, Gadsden County, Florida, at ten o'clock a.m., October 14, 15, 1943, at which time the Centennial of the founding of Providence Church will be observed. If conditions arising at the time limit the session to one day, E. E. Earnest will preach the annual sermon, with H. A. Parker as alternate. In case of a two-day session, Brother Parker will preach a missionary sermon the second day if he has not already served as alternate the first day.

34. The report on Missions made by Dr. Pierce S. Ellis and spoken to by Dr. C. H. Bolton was adopted.

REPORT ON MISSIONS

Our Foreign Mission Board has 464 missionaries and thousands of natives at work in the fields of education, evangelism, and healing in Africa, Asia, Europe, South America, and the Hawaiian Islands. Work in two new fields, Colombia and the Hawaiian Islands was recently launched. The Lottie Moon Christmas offering, larger than it has ever been before, amounted to \$449,162.48. The Commission, a journal devoted solely to news about our Foreign Mission Board, approximates the 40,000 mark. Due to a global war it has been necessary to withdraw many missionaries from certain areas in Europe and the Near East. We regret to announce that some of our laborers are in prison and interned in their homes. Our work, however, not overlooking the many obstacles, has been carried on superbly and with gains of which we may be justly proud. Several years ago the Board's debt was \$1,100,000. The Board now owes only \$128,000. It is believed that the entire indebtedness will be liquidated by the end of 1943. Over 19,101 baptisms were reported last year. The following mission study books featuring World Missions are available at our Book Store in Jacksonville: "Baptists Budding in Brazil," "Wings Against the Blue," "Friends Down Under," "Neighbors We Would Like to Know," etc.

Our Home Mission Board now employs 424 workers. The Board was never more prosperous, progressive and popular than now. Last year 31 missionaries were added to our force, 64 mission stations were opened, 13 new churches were organized, 17,258 Bibles were distributed, 785,000 tracts, and 35,100 sermons were preached. Over 7,000 were led to Christ, and 2,863 members received into the churches. The Gospel is being preached to Indians, Mexicans, Spaniards, Jews, Italians, French, Cubans, Chinese, the underprivileged in industrial sections, in the slums of the cities, in neglected mountain areas, to negroes in the homeland, to camps by representatives of the Board. Last year the Home Mission Board paid \$355,000 on the principal of its debt. It now owes \$455,000. At the present rate of debt payments the Board expects to be out of debt before the end of 1943. "Southern Baptists' Home Missions," the Board's monthly magazine, now has a circulation of 53,673.

Our State Mission Board, without meaning to boast, enjoyed a prosperous year. Total gifts were larger than those of the previous year. Our receipts amounted to \$317,306.75. Of this amount, \$144,266.48 came through the Cooperative Program, including \$19,112.33 which came through the Hundred Thousand Club. Our special gifts to State Missions amounted to \$12,258.02. Our goal for State Missions on October 25 is \$15,000. Surely Florida Baptists can and will go over the top. There were fewer baptisms last year, a decrease of 1,160. Our objective this year is 12,000 baptisms. Of course, the Florida Children's Home, Stetson University, Florida Baptist Witness are all a part of our work, and will make separate reports to the State Convention later. The following are responsible for State Mission Work in Florida, and each is rendering admirable service in his respective field: Dr. C. H. Bolton, Ex-Secretary; W.M.U., Miss Louise Smith, Ex-Secretary; Dr. W. W. Willian, Sunday School Department, General Secretary; Mr. O. K. Radford, Training Union, General Secretary; Dr. J. Harrison Griffin, Brotherhood, Secretary; Department of Evangelism, Dr. T. O. Reese; two field secretaries, Rev. Dewey Mann and Rev. T. H. Farr.

Evening Session, October 15, 1942

38. At eight o'clock p.m., the final session of the Association was called to order by the Moderator in the First Baptist Church of Monticello.

39. After the hymn, "How Firm a Foundation," by the congregation, E. H. Garrott offered prayer.

40. The report on Christian Education was adopted as read by B. A. Roth, who stated that Dr. Doak S. Campbell would speak to this report when the time for his address arrived.

REPORT ON CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

In these critical days every phase of our lives is being affected by the war and adjustments are being made by all institutions. Of course, our church and denominational life is feeling the pressure of war demands. In none of our Baptist institutions is this more keenly felt than in our Christian schools and colleges. This is true because young people of school and college age are those most vitally demanded by war. It is true, also, because Christian colleges are called upon to render services which cannot be rendered by any other institution.

In this past year, the schools, colleges and universities of the country have made vital adjustments in their programs. Many young men have had to go into some form of Armed Service. Since this is a war unlike any other in all history, in that it is a war of highly trained technicians of all kinds, the government has developed various plans by which young men can stay in college to receive needed training for larger service after graduation as specialists in various fields. The great majority of our Baptist colleges have adjusted to these various types of service plans and are thus enabled to keep many young men students up to graduation, and thus made direct contributions to the All-Out War Effort. Florida Baptists can have pride in the work our own Stetson University is doing.

We have several reasons for hope and encouragement in the field of Christian education. The records for the past year show great progress in the number of students attending Baptist schools and colleges, in the fine quality of work being done, and in the increasing interest which Baptists are showing in the work of these schools. Our Baptist people are beginning to see the vital and necessary place which their schools and colleges have in denominational life and in the plans for the reconstruction of the world after World War Two.

Never in all history has there been such a real need for Christian leadership—the kind which only Christian colleges can develop—as we have now and will have in the next few years. Without this leadership we cannot go forward. These leaders will come primarily from Christian colleges. We must win peace! Christian education along realistic and creative lines is basic to that task. Herein lie the reasonable challenges of Peace on Earth and Good Will Among Men.

In the days following the present world crisis and emergency, regardless of the terms of peace, "The reorganization of society after the mind of Christ" will be the supreme need of the world in the immediate future. We dare not let the lights go out today or tomorrow in the Christian college, the lighthouse of civilization!

The schools are making honest and unselfish efforts to meet the stirring challenges of the hour. In this spirit they "carry on." We appeal to Florida Baptists to give every help and encouragement to our own Baptist University, namely Stetson University. We make the following recommendations:

1. That pastors and laymen throughout the state cooperate with their school executives in discovering the best type of students and using their influence in getting them to attend our own John B. Stetson University.
2. That all Baptists give their sympathetic and prayerful consideration of all her problems to the end that God may guide in the affairs of our only Baptist school in Florida.
3. That all Baptist parents give careful and prayerful consideration as they contemplate the choice of college for their children. No Baptist in Florida should make this decision without carefully and prayerfully and honestly facing the question of, "What about Stetson?"
4. That we support John B. Stetson University not only with our sympathy and prayers, but with our money also. Stetson belongs to us. Stetson is our child, and we have no right to forsake her in these days of great need by holding back our financial support.

May God help us to do the fair thing about Christian education—and about our own Stetson University.

41. The report on Benevolences was read by K. P. Puffer and adopted.

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REPORT ON BENEVOLENCES

Contributions to our benevolences by the churches of the Florida Association continue to show an over-all gain. Our offerings in this Association for the fiscal year ending September 30 to the Cooperative Program increased from \$5,916.53 to \$7,120.18, or a gain of \$1,203.65 over last year. The H.T.C. offerings increased \$205.51, or from \$729.39 to \$934.90. Miscellaneous Gifts however show a loss of \$353.58, or from \$5,920.03 to \$4,566.45. Thus the over-all gain in the Florida Association was \$1,055.58, or from \$11,565.95 to \$12,621.53. Even though we deplore the loss in Miscellaneous Gifts, such over-all increase gives us some satisfaction and a determination to continue year by year on the upward trend. The totals for the State are: Cooperative Program, \$174,026.00; H.T.C., \$20,642.02; Miscellaneous Gifts, \$108,757.32; or a grand total of \$303,425.43.

So much for the picture in dollars and cents. A study of the work accomplished gives us a better conception. In our Southern Baptist Hospital in New Orleans, which has 364 beds, \$77,031.02 was spent on charity patients alone during the year 1941. Surely this is worthwhile. In our 20 Baptist Hospitals in the Southern Baptist Convention there is a total of 4,141 beds and the combined charity expenditure was \$1,019,554.00 during 1941. This is but one phase of the splendid work of these institutions.

The Minister's Retirement Plan grows in momentum, slowly it is true, but a growth nevertheless. 249 preachers in the State are now actively participating, plus 28 retired and over 357 churches enlisted. This is indeed gratifying but many are still unenlisted. This matter ought to be placed before our people in order that more Baptists may have an opportunity to share in honoring the aged minister who has spent his life in service and who most certainly is worthy of security upon reaching the age of retirement.

The H.T.C. shows a slight gain. With the worthy goal of "A Debtless Denomination by 1945," we should continue to emphasize this phase of our work. We are reminded that Florida's H.T.C. funds are divided fifty-fifty, half kept in the State for our own debts and half sent to South-wide headquarters for Southwide debts.

Such is our report. The need is great. The opportunity presents itself to rise to meet our obligations as followers of the Lord Jesus. Let us go forward.

REPORT ON SOCIAL SERVICE

A year has passed since our last Association meeting; nearly a year since terrible Pearl Harbor. Many things have happened, mainly bad, physically, morally, financially, and spiritually. Millions are physically incapacitated because of social diseases, dissipation, wild life, turning night into day, burning the candle at both ends in prodigal disregard of the consequences. Financial chaos exists, our nation spending in excess of five billions per month on war, one and a third billions per month on crime, and a half billion each month on alcoholic beverages. Millions of mechanics receive three, four, five times their normal wages, most of which is spent over the week ends in revelry, drunkenness, and debauchery.

Compare the Sunday night church congregations with the pleasure-seeking mobs at the theatres, ball games, and other unholy Sabbath revelries. Consider the lack of reverence and spiritual fervor in many of the pulpits and most of the pews. Consider the utter indifference of most of the professed Christians when urged to take up some definite work in our churches.

It used to be that people were known by the company they kept. Today, they must be judged by the books they read, the pictures they stand in line waiting to see, the filthy jokes they enjoy. Go to the corner drug store or the news stand and see what our people are feeding their minds with. Lurid pictures and books, all types of magazines filled with filth and sex inflaming matter not fit for the mature mind and poison to young minds. Consider the breakdown of the American home. There are 169 divorces to every 1,000 marriages, resulting, in part, from our easy divorce laws. Two years ago there was nearly one divorce to each marriage in Florida. In a city the size of Tallahassee there is an average of nearly ten divorces each week. It is high time that we take literally the words of Jesus when he said, "Whosoever shall put away his wife, except it be for fornication, and shall marry another, committeth adultery; and whoso marrieth her which is put away doth commit adultery." There is not one word in the Bible that justifies re-marriage of divorced persons, and the minister who participates in the re-marriage of divorced persons becomes a party to the crime. Brother Pastors, you are our leaders. Lead us in the right. Stand four-square against all sin and unrighteousness. Be strong! Quit ye like men!

We are celebrating our Centennial today. For one hundred years, through all of our records there is a continual protest against the awful consequences of the liquor traffic. Years ago it was sold at every cross-road store, but only the rougher element indulged in it to excess. As a boy, the most popular slogan with the girls and young women was, "The lips which touch liquor will never touch mine"; but all of that is changed today. Horrible as it may seem, drunkenness is increasing more rapidly among women than men. It is stated on good authority that there are more girls and young women serving as hostesses and bar maids in saloons, cocktail parlors, and road houses than are in colleges and high schools. If this is true, what can we expect of the future womanhood of America?

Alcohol contributes more to crime than any other influence or agency, costing us more than fifteen billions each year. A prominent jurist says that crime in America has attained such appalling proportions that no home is free from the shadow of crime. Robbery, theft, arson, rape, felonious assault, or murder is annually visited on one of every sixteen homes. In 1940, there was a minimum of 12,000 murders and an estimated total of 1,445,581 major crimes, or one out of 84 of us are criminals. Our own State held the unenviable record of two and one-half times the national average for homicides. Crime and alcohol go hand in hand. In our national Capitol, during the first six months of 1940 there were more than 100 criminal assaults on white women. Washington, the place where our laws are made, the wettest spot in the world, there were more than 56,000 jailed for drunkenness in that year, all of this in the city where our very existence is dependent on sobriety, careful thinking, good judgment and honesty.

It is nearly a year since Pearl Harbor. Thousands of our young men have given their lives, their bodies lying in watery graves or blasted to nothingness. Multiplied billions of property have been destroyed. We are fighting for our very existence and yet we, a Christian nation, go complacently on with rum-guzzling, beer-drinking, jooking, and harlotry. We have a long way to go, experiencing untold sorrow, misery, hunger, and suffering, before we come to our senses and knees. And that is where we will have to be before we can merit God's mercy. We have more than 5,000,000 of the world's finest young men in our training camps and the battle fronts of the world. What are we doing for them? Are we safe-guarding their bodies, their morals, their spiritual welfare? It is true that we have a chaplain to every 1,200 men, but what can they do against a liquor-controlled government?

During World War No. 1, General Pershing, who set out to build an efficient army said, "Banish the entire liquor business in the United States, close every saloon and brewery, suppress drinking by severe punishment to the drinker, and the nation will be amazed at its efficiency." "I shall not go slow on prohibition, for I know that it is the greatest foe to my men, greater even than the bullets of the enemy." We spend millions to trace down and punish saboteurs while the greatest saboteur of all is allowed full freedom and every encouragement to destroy our army, our liberty, our very existence. We can not win with alcohol, and God is going to hold Franklin D. Roosevelt, our leaders, you preachers, and all of us responsible. May God give us righteous leaders. May He give us strength and courage to do what we know is right.

47. Dr. Doak S. Campbell, formerly a member of the Sunday School Board of the Southern Baptist Convention, and a member of the Executive Committee of that Board, Nashville, Tennessee, now President of the Florida State College for Women, at Tallahassee, spoke to the report on Christian Education.

48. Dr. Campbell then delivered the Centennial Address, his subject being "A Great Century." The main points of his address were: The World in 1842, America in 1842, Florida in 1842, Florida Baptists in 1842, A Century of Achievement, and Looking Ahead.

49. The Hundredth Session of the Florida Baptist Association then adjourned with prayer and benediction by the Moderator, the Reverend Mr. G. T. Hunt.
