CONSTITUTION

Article I. This Association shall be called the Florida Baptist Association.

Article II. This Association shall be composed of messengers elected annually by Baptist Churches cooperating with this union.

Article III. The officers of this Association shall be a Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, Assistant Clerk, and a Treasurer, who shall be elected as the last item of business and just prior to adjournment each year, and they shall continue in office until their successors are elected.

Article IV. The objects of this Association are Missionary, Educational, and Benevolent together with a closer fellowship and larger usefulness of all who cooperate with it.

Article V. Each church shall be entitled to three messengers, and one additional messenger for every fifty members over one hundred.

Article VI. All churches cooperating with this Association shall send up by its messengers on the first day of each annual meeting a statement of all work done by them during the preceding year, giving in full such statistical information as is called for by blanks currently in use for such purpose, unless such information has previously been mailed to the Clerk of the Association.

Article VII. This Association shall meet once each year at such time and place as may have been agreed upon at the preceding session, or by its Executive Board. When convened it shall be governed by a regular and proper decorum. The Moderator shall preside and the Clerk shall record the proceedings and prepare them for the press.

Article VIII. On the first day of each annual meeting the Moderator shall appoint a committee who shall nominate the officers of the Association and the members of the Executive Committee for the ensuing year. Nominations may also be made from the floor. All officers of the Association shall be ex-officio members of the Executive Committee, and the Moderator shall serve as chairman of this committee. The Executive Committee shall have power to fill vacancies occurring in the committee between meetings of the Association. It shall drop from its roll, (1) any member who moves from the Association within the year, (2) any member who dies during the year, and (3) any member who is absent from the regular or called meetings of the Committee for three consecutive times without giving a written reason for such absence. This committee shall meet as often as it may desire; shall set up a quorum of not less than eight of its number; shall transact such business as is delegated to it by the Association, and shall act for the Association when it is not in session.

Article IX. The Association shall furnish minutes of its proceedings in proportion to the funds sent up for that purpose by the churches.

Article X. This Association shall have no power to lord it over God's heritage or to infringe upon the internal rights of any church.

Article XI. This Association shall have power: first, to provide for the general union of the churches; second, to counsel with any church in difficulty; third, to inquire into the cause of any church failing to be represented at any annual meeting or to furnish statistical reports to such meeting; fourth, to withdraw from any church found to be unorthodox or violating the rules of this Association; fifth, to accept into this Union other Baptist Churches which, after examination, are found to be orthodox; sixth, to appropriate money contributed by churches or individuals as specified and when not specified to the best interest of the Master's cause; seventh, to adjourn to any future time and place deemed most beneficial to the churches comprising this Union.

Article XII. This Constitution may be amended at any annual meeting by a two-thirds vote, provided that notice of such change shall have been given to the Executive Committee at least thirty days prior to such meeting, and that notice of such change be given to the Association on the first day of such meeting.

ARTICLES OF FAITH

Article I. We believe in one only true and living God, and that there are three in the Godhead, the Father, the Son and the Holy Ghost.

Article II. We believe the Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments are the Word of God, and the only rule of faith and practice.

Article III. We believe in the doctrine of original sin.

Article IV. We believe in man's impotency to recover himself from the fallen state in which he is by nature, by his own free will and ability.

Article V. We believe that we are justified in the sight of God only by the imputed righteousness of Christ; that we rely solely upon the Holy Spirit for guidance.

Article VI. We believe that the saints shall persevere in grace and shall never finally fall away.

Article VII. We believe that baptism and the Lord's Supper are ordinances of Jesus Christ; that nothing is baptism except immersion; that believers are the only subjects of this ordinance, and that none but baptized believers are entitled to partake of the Lord's Supper.

Article VIII. We believe in a general resurrection of the dead, and a general, final judgment.

Article IX. We believe that the punishment of the wicked shall be everlasting and the joys of the righteousness will be eternal.

Article X. We believe that no minister has a right to administer the ordinances only such as are regularly called and have come under the imposition of the hands of a Baptist Presbytery.

RULES OF DECORUM

1. The sessions of this Association shall be opened and closed with prayer.

2. Visitors and corresponding messengers, after they shall have been accepted by the Association and enrolled as such, shall have the privilege of speaking.

3. The right to speak on any subject and the length of time is left with the Association at the direction of the Moderator.

4. Unbrotherly remarks or personal reflections must be avoided by all speakers.

5. The Parliamentary proceedings of this Association shall be governed by Mell's Parliamentary Practice.

6. These rules may be changed or amended at any full session of the Association by a majority vote.

THURSDAY, OCTOBER 14, 1948

MORNING SESSION

1. At ten o'clock on the morning of October 14, 1948, Mr. A. Frank O'Kelly, Moderator of the Florida Baptist Association, called the messengers to order in the Immanuel Baptist Church at Tallahassee, Florida, and Mr. Truett Farmer led the congregation in singing "All Hail the Power of Jesus' Name."
2. Rev. E. F. May, Pastor of the Greensboro and Gretna churches led the devotions by reading the 90th Psalm and leading in prayer.
3. A motion by D. A. Avant prevailed that the messengers now present and those who later should enroll constitute the working body of the Association.
4. Rev. James T. Barber, Pastor of the hostess Church, in a few well-chosen words, extended a hearty welcome to all the messengers present.
5. Upon invitation of the Moderator the following new Pastors and their wives, and the following named visitors, came to the front: Pastors—Rev. and Mrs. James T. Barber of the Immanuel Church, Rev. and Mrs. Nat H. Brittain of the newly organized East Hill Sunday School of Tallahassee, Rev. H. F. Jelks of Crawfordville, Rev. C. M. Langston, of Panama and Ebenezer, Leon, Rev. T. J. Larkin, Missions Pastor of the First Church, Tallahassee, and Rev. H. B. Lytle of Lake Mystic. Visitors—Dr. Ed G. Caldwell, of Knoxville Tennessee, Rev. Leon Gambrell of the Baptist Bible Institute, Lakeland, and Messrs. J. D. Smith and Ed. Fenn of Wilma, Florida. For many years it has been the privilege of the venerable E. H. Garrott, retired Minister of Quincy, to extend a welcome to these new servants of the Lord, so again this year, at the request of the Moderator, he performed this duty in a very acceptable manner.
6. The report of the Executive Committee was read by A. Frank O'Kelly and adopted.

REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

During the year 1947-1948 the Executive Committee held regular monthly meetings.

The Committee adopted as a guide and program of work the resolution adopted by the Florida Baptist Association on October 11, 1947, outlining eleven specific goals to be sought or tasks to be performed.

The work of the Committee was carried out largely through its officers, through Associational Directors for W.M.U., Sunday School, Training Union, and Brotherhood, and through the following committees: Committee on Calendar and Co-ordination, committee on Evangelism, Budget committee, Missions committee, Constitution and By-Laws committee, Silver Lake Assembly committee, West Florida Assembly committee, Clothing for Relief committee, Baptist Book Store for Tallahassee committee, and Children's Home committee.

At the monthly meetings of the Committee, reports were heard from Department directors concerning the work in various churches, in the Association, in the State, and elsewhere throughout the course of the Southern Baptist Convention. The Executive Committee and the churches were advised of the work in the various fields and plans were made for carrying on or rendering assistance for the entire program.

REPORT ON EVANGELISM

REPORT OF BAPTIST STUDENT UNION

The Baptist Student Union in its broadest sense is the voluntary religious activity of the Baptist Students in the colleges and universities of Florida. It is in reality the enrolling agency for the Sunday Schools, Training Unions,

Y.W.A.'s, and Worship Services of the local Baptist Churches in our college centers. It presents a church-centered program and serves as the connection which ties the student to the local church, and seeks to undergird our denomination with adequately trained leadership for the future.

In Florida we have B.S.U. work on seven campuses, viz.: Stetson, University of Florida, University of Miami, Florida State University, University of Tampa, Florida Southern, and St. Petersburg Junior College, and at the first four named we have full time Directors.

Annually there are three meetings of state-wide significance, (1) State B.S.U. Convention, (2) Spring Retreat (held at Camp O'Lena each April), and (3) Student week at Ridgecrest.

Other activities that have proved helpful in the spiritual development of the students include Vocational Emphasis Week, Student Evangelistic Week, Schools of Missions, Summer Work, Vespers, Morning Watch, Bible Discussion Groups, Recreational Activities, Mission Projects, Student Choirs, Musical Groups and various phases of extension work.

With an ever increasing enrollment in our schools of higher learning the membership in the Baptist Student Union continues to grow, but the most marked advancement is in the fine spirit which has developed among the students. This esprit de corps has resulted in enthusiasm for the advancement of our Lord's work on the several campuses. Yes, B.S.U. work is moving forward and will continue to do so as you undergird it with your prayers, interest and support.

13. On motion duly made and seconded, and by a rising unanimous vote, the following amendments were made to the Constitution: First, That we delete from Article VIII the words: "They shall also nominate the members of the Board of Trustees of Baptist Memorial Hospital and recommend their term of office;" Second, That the Executive Committee shall be empowered to fill vacancies occurring in the Committee between meetings of the Association; and, Third: That the Executive Committee shall drop from its roll 1st, any member who moves from the Association within the year, 2nd, any member who dies during the year, and third, any member who is absent from the regular or called meetings of the Committee for three consecutive times without giving a written reason for such absence.
14. A motion was made by H. O. Hughes that we eliminate from Article VIII of the Constitution all reference to a Quorum in the Executive Committee. After considerable discussion a substitute motion by Earl Lambert prebort prevailed that we postpone action on this until a later date.
15. The moderator stated that the hour had arrived for the Annual Sermon, and Dr. H. G. Sanders of Tallahassee preached, using for his text Matthew 16:18: "And I say also unto thee, That thou art Peter, and upon this Rock I will build my church; and the gates of hell shall not prevail against it." Prayer was led and benediction pronounced by Dr. Sanders.

AFTERNOON SESSION, OCTOBER 14, 1948

16. Promptly at two o'clock the messengers reassembled and devotions were led by Dr. Ed. G. Caldwell of Knoxville, Tennessee, Rev. H. O. Hughes of Monticello acting as moderator in the absence of the moderator A. Frank O'Kelly.

17. Rev. H. G. McLeroy read a petitionary letter from the Wilma Baptist Church, and stated that the Committee on Petitionary Letters, composed of G. T. Hunt, E. F. May, C. H. Darsey, T. J. Barnett and H. G. McLeroy had carefully examined the application for membership into the Association made by this Church and had found it to be regular and in order; that the church was duly constituted on July 15, 1948, with Rev. Jesse Pollock as Pastor and Mrs. J. D. Smith as Clerk.
18. Upon motion made by H. G. McLeroy the Wilma Baptist Church was unanimously received into the fellowship of the Florida Baptist Association and the hand of fellowship was extended by the acting Moderator to two messengers, namely, Ed Fenn and J. D. Smith.
19. An application from the newly organized church at Bristol was read by H. B. Lytle, and on motion made by E. H. Garrott this was referred to the Committee on Petitionary Letters.
20. A motion by E. H. Garrott prevailed that the Executive Committee be empowered to receive into the fellowship of the Association the Bristol Baptist Church, or any other newly organized church, as soon as its application is approved by the Committee on Petitionary Letters.
21. The report on Baptist Memorial Hospital was read by Dr. Doak S. Campbell and adopted, including the resolution.

BAPTIST MEMORIAL HOSPITAL REPORT

The Baptist Memorial Hospital, a creature of the Florida Baptist Association, was chartered as a corporation not for profit on the 13 day of April 1945. At the request of a number of agencies, including the City Commission, the Corporation attempted to secure by donation the sum of \$350,000 to apply on the construction of a hospital in Tallahassee. In a little more than a year cash and pledges in the sum of \$222,440.41 had been raised for this purpose.

In the meantime, with the cooperation of the City, the Hospital at the former Dale Mabry Air Base was secured and plans were developed for its operation temporarily, pending the construction of a new and modern plant. The temporary hospital was opened July 1, 1946.

In 1947, plans were developed whereby the City of Tallahassee would secure public funds in excess of a million dollars for the construction of a modern Hospital. At that time it was understood that the Baptist Memorial Hospital Corporation might be requested to operate the new hospital for the City. However, early in 1948, it was decided by the City Commission that the Hospital would be managed by a Board appointed by the Commission. Whereupon, the Baptist Memorial Hospital turned over the property to the new Board and discontinued its management as of April 23, 1948.

When it was decided that the City would build the new Hospital, the Baptist Memorial Hospital Board sent a communication to all who had made donations requesting that they indicate their wishes as to the disposition of their donations. Advice was received from many of the donors. However, a large number made no reply to the Board's communication. To those who requested the return of their gifts remittances were sent to cover. Others requested that their gifts be held by the Corporation pending further developments. Still others requested that their donations be used by the Corporation for operating expenses and for charitable services.

Now that the major purpose for which the Corporation was founded has been discontinued, the Board of Trustees proposes the attached resolution which empowers the officers of the Corporation to proceed to liquidate the Board's affairs.

The Association, through its Board of Trustees and its Board of Directors provided for this geographic area, hospital services for more than a year and a half that were desperately needed. Hundreds of indigent patients received treatment and other charitable services. The financial affairs of your board have been solvent at all times. All donated funds have been returned where proper request has been made.

Your Board is happy to report that its task has been concluded except for the necessary legal procedures for liquidation. We extend our sincere thanks for the splendid support we have received. We especially thank the many persons who have given of their time and money, for the ministry of healing under the name of this Association.

Resolution of Florida Baptist Association

WHEREAS, plans developed by the City of Tallahassee for the construction of a large and modern hospital rendered impracticable the plans for the construction of a permanent hospital in Tallahassee Florida, by the Baptist Memorial Hospital Corporation, and thereupon the Trustees of the Corporation ceased plans for construction of a permanent hospital and sent a communication to all who had made donations, requesting that they indicate their wishes as to the disposition of their donations, and remittances were sent to those donors who requested the return of their gifts, funds were used for operating expenses and for charitable services as requested by certain donors, and other funds were held by the Corporation on the request of donors pending further developments as to the operation of the permanent hospital to be constructed by the City, and

WHEREAS, a decision was later made by the City of Tallahassee for the City to operate the new hospital proposed to be constructed, which rendered inadvisable the further operation by the Corporation of the temporary hospital at former Dale Mabry Air Base, and thereupon by agreement with the City of Tallahassee, the Corporation turned over to the City the Hospital property and concluded the management of the temporary hospital as of April 23, 1948, and when the purpose for which the Corporation was founded was thus otherwise fulfilled, the Board of Trustees of the Corporation authorized, empowered and instructed the Officers of the Corporation to liquidate its affairs, including the disposition of any property held by the Corporation and the settlement of any and all just claims against it, and

WHEREAS thereupon, the officers of the Corporation sent another communication to donors requesting advice as to the disposition of funds which had been left with the Corporation pending further developments, and funds were returned to the donors pursuant to their request, and there remains on hand with the Treasurer of the Corporation the sum of \$28,012.56 for which the donors have not yet indicated any disposition, and it is impracticable or impossible to locate such donors,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE FLORIDA BAPTIST ASSOCIATION, as follows:

1. That the Trustees of Baptist Memorial Hospital are authorized to apply to one of the Circuit Judges of the Second Judicial Circuit, in and for Leon County, Florida, for a dissolution of the Corporation, and to take all necessary action to accomplish the dissolution of the Corporation;
2. That the Trustees of Baptist Memorial Hospital are authorized to continue to make remittance to any donors upon receipt of requests therefor and upon determination of their validity, and are authorized to pay any claims or debts against the Corporation which may be determined to be valid;
3. That any funds remaining in the hands of the Corporation at the time of dissolution shall be transmitted to the Treasurer of this Association to be used for hospitalization and charitable purposes as may be decided upon from time to time by the Association, after the dissolution shall have been effected.

22. The report on Associational Missions written by H. O. Hughes, was read by T. J. Barnett and adopted.

ASSOCIATIONAL MISSIONS

The only work or organization in which your committee participated during the year was that of helping to constitute the Wilma Baptist Church at Wilma, Florida, in Liberty County.

By request three members of your committee, Dr. H. G. Sanders, T. J. Barnett and H. O. Hughes, went to Wilma on July 15, 1948, and there met fourteen persons with letters from Baptist Churches, desiring to organize a new church. A Council was formed with Dr. H. G. Sanders as moderator, and after a full investigation the Wilma Baptist Church was duly constituted. Rev. Jesse Pollack was called as Pastor, and they immediately received into their fellowship five other members, two by statement and three on profession of faith.

Other missionary activities in the Association during the year include the establishment of two missions by the First Church, Tallahassee: University Heights and Thomasville Road; some effort on the part of the First Church, Quincy, to establish a mission there; and the organization of three new Sunday Schools by the Florida Sunday School Association: one at Arran, one at Newport and one on the Miccosukee Road in Tallahassee known as East Hill.

BAPTIST TRAINING UNION

During the year three new Training Unions were organized making 27 in all. This leaves nine churches yet without a Training Union. During the year a total of 2,015 training awards were issued to 24 of the Unions, a gain of 837 over the previous year. A highlight of the year was the mass meeting held at First Church, Tallahassee, on December 8th with an attendance of 520, the second largest mass meeting in the State. In April of this year we had an Association-wide enlargement campaign with 18 churches participating. The State furnished 34 special workers, and 125 new workers in the local churches were enlisted, organizing 21 new departments and 44 new unions.

28. Devotions were conducted by Rev. R. C. Rittenhouse, pastor of the Sopchoppy Church.
29. A musical program was rendered under the general direction of Truett Farmer. Special numbers were sung, including duets, trios, quartets, sextets, and choruses from several of the churches.
30. A report on the Silver Lake Assembly was read by H. B. Lytle and adopted.

SILVER LAKE ASSEMBLY

Our third annual Associational Assembly was held at Silver Lake, eleven miles southwest of Tallahassee, July 5-10, 1948, and all who attended were most jubilant in praise for the week's activities. Rev. Dewey Mann of Perry, Florida, was the evening Bible Speaker and Mrs. A. A. Greene of West Point, Mississippi, directed the recreational program. A wide variety of courses were offered, including eight classes in Training Union, two in Sunday School, three in music and eight in Missions. Our total registration was 207, there being nine of our own churches represented. Nine churches from outside the Association were represented, mainly by faculty members.

REPORT ON FLORIDA BAPTIST CHILDREN'S HOME

1948 will be a memorable year in the history of our Home. We have completed and occupied four modern cottages for children on our campus in Lakeland. We have also built a dairy barn and a laundry. We have moved 100 children into the cottages. We have twenty-one children in the Nursery at Arcadia, but these will be moved when the Nursery cottage at Lakeland is completed. We have begun construction of this cottage and hope to have it finished by January 15, 1949. When this group is transferred we shall have all our resident children in Lakeland. We are assisting twenty-three children through our Mother's Aid Program. We have given direct help to 71 children this year.

Our Building Program will require another year for completion. We must have an Administration building, a Chapel, a Junior Boys' cottage and a Junior Girls' cottage at the earliest possible time. These buildings can quickly and easily be made a reality if our churches will give the building fund of the Home consideration in their financial programs. Ten cents a member per month for twelve months from all our churches will provide the funds to complete the job and give us a Children's Home second to none.

Applications

Applications continue to pour in at an unprecedented rate. From September 15, 1947, to September 15, 1948, we received 249 requests for admission to the Home. The chief cause of these applications was desertion, which in most cases leads to divorce. Selfishness and refusal of family responsibility have come to grips with family loyalty and duty and are winning the battle. The only cure for these dreadful destroyers of the homes and happiness of boys and girls is the teachings of Christ embedded in the hearts of the people. This constrains us to a more vigorous program of home missions that more fathers and mothers might accept Christ as their Savior. Let us carry the gospel to those about us; and while we are doing this let us minister to the children of our denomination through our Children's Home that it may alleviate all the suffering possible by its services to those who call on us and need us.

Our Brotherhood work is progressing slowly but surely. Through our Associational meetings our men have come to realize that if their church is to be a power for God that power must be generated in the hearts and minds of our men, as well as our women. Many of our men have done fine jobs, leading men and boys, women and girls into all departments of our organized work. Such work can only be recorded by the Divine Bookkeeper.

We had five Associational meetings. The largest attendance was at Lakeview with 128 present, and at the smallest 68 were present. Excellent programs were rendered at each meeting, but special mention should be made of the April program when Mr. J. Ivey Boggs of Dallas, Texas, founder of the Man and Boy movement brought an inspiring message on that subject. Many pledged to adopt this plan and we feel much good has been accomplished. At least one man a member of Calvary Church, Monticello led one boy to Sunday School with the final result of winning twelve people to Christ and to church membership.

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

The meaning and purpose of Christian Education is not found in a philosophy of life, but in the revelation of God in Christ. The founders of Harvard University taught that "The main end of life is to know God and Jesus Christ which is life eternal." Many students of this day are tormented by anxieties, enslaved by fears and torn by strife. It is the responsibility of Christian Education to help him find freedom and peace within by introducing him to the matchless Teacher and Prince of Peace.

Our 64 Baptist schools and seminaries have just completed one of the best years in their history, enrolling more than 54,000 students. More than 5,000 of these were ministerial students and 2,000 others volunteered for special full time Christian work at home or abroad.

In Florida our own Stetson University enrolled more than 2,700 students, a majority of whom were Baptists, many of them ministerial students and missionary volunteers. A few years ago we pledged to raise \$1,000,000 for this very worthy institution, \$600,000 of which has been contributed. This year we propose to complete this campaign with special offerings, and with emphasis on the William Sims Allen Memorial Religious Center Building. We hope that each of our churches will have a part in this offering. May we suggest (1) that our pastors present the cause of Christian Education from their pulpits, (2) that our people remember Stetson in their wills, and (3) that our leaders point out the value of attending Stetson for the double purpose of acquiring knowledge and building Christian character. We recommend that all churches observe Stetson Day on Sunday, January 30th, and make a worthy offering, that the goal for each church be not less than an amount equal to 50 cents per member.

FLORIDA SUNDAY SCHOOL ASSOCIATION

At its first monthly meeting the Florida Baptist Sunday School Association adopted a part of the fourth verse of the fifth chapter of Luke, "Launch Out Into the Deep," as a motto for the year. Just how well this injunction has been followed is revealed in the records.

Early in the year a Planning Meeting was held in each church, resulting in the organization of many new Sunday School classes and departments, and the enlistment of a number of new workers, the result being an increased enrollment in every school except four. Under the sponsorship of the Florida Baptist Sunday School Association, three new Sunday Schools have been established, as follows: (1) "Newport," in a community where there was no church organization of any kind, (2) "Arran," a church which for several years has had no Sunday School, and (3) "East Hill," on the Miccosukee Road in Tallahassee. One mission Sunday School, "Thomasville Road," has been established as a branch of the Tallahassee, First Church. The total enrollment of these four schools is 214, which, added to the Sunday School additions in the whole Association, makes a net increase in enrollment of 846.

During the summer 20 Vacation Bible Schools were held, enrolling 1,802, as against 15 schools last year with an enrollment of 1,520, making a gain of 5 Vacation Bible Schools and 282 pupils.

For these significant gains we bless the Lord and take courage, at the same time recognizing the untiring efforts of many of our teachers and officers, and a few of our noble pastors. We solicit the continued effort and prayers of the Christian leadership in the Association, and pray that in our day we may see a well organized Sunday School, not only in every church, but in every community in the Association.

50. Report on Missions was read by Homer Duggar and adopted.

MISSIONS

We thank our Heavenly Father that the day has arrived when we think of Missions in its original meaning — world-wide. We pray God that this thinking shall become a part of our vocabulary, and that the Holy Spirit shall give us such a deep conviction as to our responsibility that we will carry out the last command of our Lord.

Our Mission program, for convenience, is executed by three Boards, State, Home and Foreign, all cooperating in the one great task.

State Missions. The program of world-wide Missions begins with State Missions, and is the foundation of our mission program. Our entire mission program can be no stronger than State Missions, and State Missions can be no stronger than our churches make it. The very heart, then, of world-wide missions lies within our churches. Just how missionary are we? During the year 1946-47 Florida Association gave \$2.08 per capita to the Cooperative Program, a very small amount for so great a task. May God help us to double that amount next year. The funds sent to our State Board are divided on a 50-50 basis, and the 50% remaining in the State is divided as follows: Ministerial Education 2%, Stetson University 14%, Children's Home 16%, Field Missions 68%. Field Missions include Sunday School, Training Union, B.S.U., Music-Brotherhood, Missions-Evangelism-Stewardship, Pastoral Aid, Emer-

agency Fund, Benevolent Aid, Repairs and Equipment, Retirement, Hospitalization, Annuities, United Florida Drys, National Temperance, and a worthy-miscellaneous program.

Home Missions. Our Home Board, with headquarters in Atlanta, co-operates closely with our State Boards. It has 720 full time workers and last summer employed 286 students, or a total of 1,006 workers. They delivered during the year 68,425 sermons and addresses, made 255,388 visits and reported 24,221 conversions with 12,814 additions to the churches. They distributed 52,651 Bibles and New Testaments, 1,125,132 pages of tracts, taught 10,709 classes in mission study, and conducted 1,135 revivals. In the field of Missionary Education it is reported that 1,979 churches participated in schools of missions, using 227 speakers and conducting 2,718 classes, with a total of 749,155 participating in these schools. Their work covers the entire territory of the Southern Baptist Convention, and God is richly blessing their efforts.

Foreign Missions. The need, physical and spiritual, on the foreign fields today is most challenging. Our Foreign Board has four objectives, (1) to strengthen our 119 centers in 25 countries, (2) to open additional centers in strategic areas, (3) to support centers and projects undertaken by native Baptist Conventions and (4), to increase our resources and personnel until we have approximately 1,750 missionaries, an annual operating budget of \$7,000,000, and an annual capital needs budget of \$3,000,000.

Communism is blocking the work in China and the Balkan States, and in Spain and Italy, Catholic persecution is an obstacle, but in Africa, we have a bright spot. We need to strengthen our forces in Latin America and in Japan. May we call upon Him who can and will supply all our needs according to His riches in glory by Christ Jesus.

REPORT ON WEST FLORIDA ASSEMBLY

The West Florida Baptist Assembly opened last July in its new quarters on East Bay, Panama City, with a successful Assembly. Many other Baptist groups are making use of the Assembly Grounds and facilities for a small per capita fee, and it is open to all Baptist groups. The Assembly 1949 will be held from July 14-22, at a total cost of \$17.00 per person. Mr. O. K. Radford will be the Director and a strong assembly program is being planned.

With the aid of the churches (about \$14,000) and the State Mission Board (\$25,000), we have erected five cottages and the main kitchen-dining room-assembly hall. Furthermore, we have plans now to cover the new and enlarged assembly hall, and erect more cottages. The Board of Trustees is asking the people of West Florida, including Florida Association, for \$15,000 for this purpose during the year. Dr. E. D. Daniel of Panama City heads the campaign.

Believing that West Florida Assembly will be one of the important factors in the growth of our Baptist churches in the years to come, we urge that each church of this association make a contribution to the Assembly, and that each church plan to send its people to the Assembly July 14-22.
