CONSTITUTION

ARTICLE I. This Association shall be called the Florida Baptist Association.

ARTICLE II. This Association shall be composed of messengers elected annually by Baptist Churches cooperating with this union.

ARTICLE III. The officers of this Association shall be a Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, Assistant Clerk, and a Treasurer, who shall be elected as the last item of business and just prior to adjournment each year, and they shall continue in office until their successors are elected.

ARTICLE IV. The objects of this Association are Missionary, Educational, and Benevolent, together with a closer fellowship and larger usefulness of all who cooperate with it.

ARTICLE V. Each church shall be entitled to three messengers, and one additional messenger for every fifty members over one hundred.

ARTICLE VI. All churches cooperating with this Association shall send up by its messengers on the first day of each annual meeting a statement of all work done by them during the preceding year, giving in full such statistical information as is called for by blanks currently in use for such purpose, unless such information has previously been mailed to the Clerk of the Association.

ARTICLE VII. This Association shall meet once each year at such time and place as may have been agreed upon at the preceding session, or by its Executive Board. When convened it shall be governed by a regular and proper decorum. The Moderator shall preside and the Clerk shall record the proceedings and prepare them for the press.

ARTICLE VIII. A. On the first day of the annual meeting, the Moderator shall appoint a committee who shall nominate the members of the Executive Committee and such heads of departments as may be recommended by the departments or in the absence of recommendation, to nominate suitable heads for all departments.

B. That the officers of the Association, as listed in Article II, shall be nominated from the floor on the second day of the Associational Meeting, and in case two or more persons are nominated for an office they shall be elected by ballot. Otherwise, they shall be elected by popular vote. They shall take charge at the close of the last session of the annual meeting. The officers of the Association shall be members of the Executive Committee, and the Moderator shall serve as chairman of this committee.

C. The Executive Committee of the Association, shall consist of all pastors of churches and missions cooperating with the Association; one lay person from each church and mission cooperating with the Association; the heads of the departments of the Association (Sunday School, Training Union, Brotherhood, Woman's Missionary Union, Music); the officers of the Association.

The Committee on Nominations will name the members of the Executive Committee during the Annual Association, or the Nominating Committee of the Executive Committee shall name them ad interim, filling vacancies which occur between meetings of the Association. It shall drop from its roll (1) any member who shall move from the Association within the year, or any pastor who is released from his church unless the Nominating Committee shall vote to retain him, and (2) any member who dies during the year.

This Committee shall meet as often as it may desire; eight (8) shall constitute a quorum; and it shall transact such business as is delegated to it by the Association, and shall act for the Association when it is not in session.

ARTICLE IX. The Association shall furnish minutes of its proceedings in proportion to the funds set up for that purpose by the churches.

ARTICLE X. This Association shall have no power to lord it over God's heritage or to infringe upon the internal rights of any church.

ARTICLE XI. This Association shall have power: first, to provide for the general union of the churches; second, to counsel with any church in difficulty; third, to inquire into the cause of any church failing to be represented at any annual meeting or to furnish statistical reports to such meeting; fourth, to withdraw from any church found to be unorthodox or violating the rules of this Association; fifth, to accept into this Union other Baptist Churches which are found to be orthodox and cooperative with the whole denominational program, and providing sixty days have elapsed after a request for examination and entry into the Association has been given to the Executive Committee or to the Association in Annual meeting; sixth, to appropriate money contributed by churches or individuals as specified and when not specified to the best interest of the Master's cause; seventh, to adjourn to any future time and place deemed most beneficial to the churches comprising this Union.

ARTICLE XII. This Constitution may be amended at any annual meeting by a two-thirds vote, provided that notice of such change shall have been given to the Executive Committee at least thirty days prior to such meeting, and that notice of such change be given to the Association on the first day of such meeting.

ARTICLES OF FAITH

ARTICLE I. We believe in one only true and living God, and that there are three in the Godhead, the Father, the Son and the Holy Ghost.

ARTICLE II. We believe the Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments are the Word of God, and the only rule of faith and practice.

ARTICLE III. We believe in the doctrine of original sin.

ARTICLE IV. We believe in man's impotency to recover himself from the fallen state in which he is by nature, by his own free will and ability.

ARTICLE V. We believe that we are justified in the sight of God only by the imputed righteousness of Christ; that we rely solely upon the Holy Spirit for guidance.

ARTICLE VI. We believe that the saints shall preserve in grace and shall never finally fall away.

ARTICLE VII. We believe that baptism and the Lord's Supper are ordinances of Jesus Christ; that nothing is baptism except immersion; that believers are the only subjects of this ordinance, and that none but baptized believers are entitled to partake of the Lord's Supper.

ARTICLE VIII. We believe in a general resurrection of the dead, and a general, final judgment.

ARTICLE IX. We believe that the punishment of the wicked shall be everlasting and the joys of the righteousness will be eternal.

ARTICLE X. We believe that no minister has a right to administer the ordinances only such as are regularly called and have come under the imposition of the hands of a Baptist Presbytery.

RULES OF DECORUM

1. The sessions of this Association shall be opened and closed with prayer.
2. Visitors and corresponding messengers, after they shall have been accepted by the Association and enrolled as such, shall have the privilege of speaking.
3. The right to speak on any subject and the length of time is left with the Association at the direction of the Moderator.
4. Unbrotherly remarks or personal reflections must be avoided by all speakers.
5. The Parliamentary proceedings of this Association shall be governed by Mell's Parliamentary Practice.
6. These rules may be changed or amended at any full session of the Association by a majority vote.

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE REPORT

The Executive Committee met each month during the past year. Ten of these meetings were held at the regular time, 10:00 A. M. on Monday after the last Sunday of each month. These meetings were held at the East Hill Baptist Church where the pastor, Ray Tindall, served coffee and doughnuts. The December meeting met at Immanuel Baptist Church for a special program of the Relief and Annuity Board, under the direction of the Florida Field Secretary, Phil Maxwell. The January meeting was held at East Hill Baptist Church in connection with the Annual Associational Leadership Conference.

The Executive Committee has the responsibility of transacting the business of the Association between Annual Sessions. The Committee now consists of all active pastors of cooperating Baptist Churches and Missions, heads of Departments (Sunday School, Training Union, Brotherhood, Woman's Missionary Union, and Music), one lay person from each church and Mission and the officers of the Association. The attendance has been good with the exception of many of the lay members who could not attend because of the time of day the Committee meets.

Some of the accomplishments and work of the Association and the churches for the past year includes: 1. The regular work of the Departments---the Sunday School directed by D. A. Avant, Training Union under the direction of R. P. Tomberlin, Jr., Woman's Missionary Union led by Mrs. Robert Wilson, Brotherhood under the leadership of Claude Sapp, and Music directed by Mrs. A. B. Simmons. We commend these leaders for their fine work. 2. The Sunday School Training Clinic held November 1958. We are grateful for the leadership of D. A. Avant and Tom Draper. 3. The free showing of "This is the Answer", 30-minute television series of the Baptist Radio and Television Commission, for thirteen weeks over WCTV, Channel 6, Tallahassee. This is the second year for the series. We are grateful to Dr. Harold Sanders for his leadership in securing this time. 4. The Simultaneous Evangelistic Crusade where 25 Churches and 2 Missions participated. We appreciate the leadership of John Hunt who was the general chairman for the campaign. 5. Silver Lake Baptist Assembly where there was an unusual amount of interest this year. We appreciate the leadership of H. C. Meador and Earl Lambert for a very successful Assembly. 6. The development of a new and improved Program for our Annual Association Meeting. For this we commend John Martin and the Program Committee. 7. It is a joy to report that two new Missions were established this past year, Thorpe Street Mission by Immanuel Church and Heyward Cates Mission by First Baptist, Tallahassee.

REPORT ON ASSEMBLIES

The declaration by the Psalmist----"I will lift up mine eyes unto the hills from whence cometh my help" is so realistic of Baptist People. Certainly all of the camps and Assemblies of our denomination bring inspiration, information, consecration and dedication to thousands of Southern Baptist every year.

There are two southwide assemblies, namely, Ridgecrest and Glorieta. Each state will have from one to several assemblies and many of the associations provide local assemblies for their constituents.

Assemblies provide a high hour for our people and they offer so many wonderful opportunities both social, physical, and spiritual.

Our association, for several years, has provided the members of our churches with one of the best Associational Assemblies. It had its beginning in 1946 and has become affectionately known as "Silver Lake Assembly".

Silver Lake Assembly offered 25 different courses of study this year, embracing Juniors, Intermediates, Young People, and Adults. From one to three awards were earned by all who attended. Among the 25 courses of study this year we offered five music courses which were very popular. Other areas were Training Union, Sunday School, Missions.

Words of appreciation are due Mr. Earl Lambert, registrar, Mrs. Hazel Fowler, dietician, and each faculty member and other staff members for their cooperation and splendid help in promoting and climaxing the Assembly this year.

The day the assembly opened 195 were registered. One hundred and seventy-one were bedded down on the first night. Many were disappointed because their registrations were returned because of the camp was full and running over. Unfortunately some who were registered did not show at the last minute and our attendance was fewer than we could have actually taken care of. Our attendance was composed of 25 Intermediate girls, 68 Junior girls, 39 Junior boys, and 20 Intermediate boys. Besides the faculty who stayed at the ground several commuted and helped in the instruction.

FOREIGN MISSION REPORT

Baker James Cauthen, Executive Secretary, Foreign Mission Board, Southern Baptist Convention, said, "At this stage in advance it is wise for us to remember that the basic requirement for winning the people of the world to our Lord is nothing less than unlimited surrender to the will of Christ. We must press ahead with missionary personnel. It is only as Southern Baptists see a challenging response of life to the Call of the World-Need that our maximum efforts will be put forth."

Appointments totaling 137 during 1958 and 36 from January 1959, brings the number of active foreign missionaries to 1,305. The appointment goal for 1959 is 140, with a goal of 2,000 missionaries under appointment by the close of Baptist Jubilee Advance in 1964.

When 1958 ended 742 urgent requests for new missionaries were in hand. Among the most pressing needs are those for people in field evangelism, church development, theological education, nursing, student work and religious education.

Elmer West, who printed the above statement of needs and achievements, also said, "Let not our gratitude for 140 men and women who may be appointed in 1959 blind us to the fact that there will still be 600 unfilled requests for missionaries."

Pastors on mission fields include 122 missionaries and 1,953 nationals. Most of the churches have Sunday Schools, and many have other church affiliated organizations. The 3,229 churches and 6,116 chapels and mission points report 4,384 Sunday Schools, enrolling 341,151 pupils. Baptisms were 29,990 in 1958 and church membership reached the 416,750 mark. (These figures include 123,000 members, 392 churches, 410 chapels and mission points estimated for China). These churches work hand in hand with schools, hospitals, publication plants and good-will centers, and their goal, as is ours, World Evangelism the ultimate goal.

Foreign Mission offerings for 1958 amounted to \$15,334,738.58, and Lottie Moon as of May 1, 1959 totaled \$6,762,448.63. The Advance Section of the Cooperative Program (75% of funds after convention-wide budget is reached) came to \$1,922,932.10 in 1958.

Four thousand nine hundred ninety-five Nationals and 305 Missionary teachers serve in the 887 Baptist Schools. One hundred twenty-nine thousand, two hundred and ten students are enrolled. Among these schools are 28 theological institutions and 4 women's training schools.

Our hospital and medical work reports 17 hospitals and 58 clinics and dispensaries, with a total of 124 buildings and 854 beds. There are 46 missionary and 54 national physicians, plus 55 missionary and 182 national nurses.

Southern Baptists now have missionaries in 39 countries and separate entities. Remember to pray for these missionaries and their work, for they are those people who went when some of us could not and would not go.

HOME MISSION REPORT

There has been striking advancements in our Home Mission work, in 1958 and 1959. This has been accomplished by Southern Baptist Churches working together with the Home Mission Board.

Dr. Courts Redford, Executive Secretary, reports that on May 1, 1959 the number of Mission Personnel reached an all time high of 1,386. In addition to about 450 Student Missionaries worked ten weeks under the direction of Home Missionaries, and 382 Southern Baptist Chaplains were on active duty.

During 1958 your Home Missionaries saw 41,859 Professions of Faith, and the Chaplains reported 11,203 Professions of Faith.

Home Missionaries led in constituting 399 new churches, and 564 new Missions during the year.

Your Home Missionaries entered 30 new fields in Language Missions, and the Home Mission Board is increasing its cooperation with the State Boards in a new plan of full cooperation in language missions. This was adopted by the Home Mission Board in Texas.

Cuba and Panama continue to make progress toward self-support.

The Church Loan Fund has been increased to push forward the Home Mission Board's Participation in the 30,000 Movement, extended by the Board is a key factor in the establishment of New Missions and Churches.

Our Home Mission Board is making strides in many channels of our Home Mission Work, such as City Missions, Pastoral Aid, loans to new church buildings and many other channels of work.

The Home Mission work is our's and the greater need of the Board is our Prayers, pray for our Mission work and our workers, as well as support it through the Cooperative Program.

As of September 30, 1959, there were 3 missions in operation in the association: The Crawfordville Road Mission on the Crawfordville Highway, the Haywood Cates Memorial Mission on the Woodville Highway. CHRISTIAN WITNESSING - A YEAR OF PRAYER - was the emphasis for 1958-1959. Woman's Missionary Union Third Jubilee Advance Goals were promoted during the year.

Woman's Missionary Union of this association has a membership of 2,582. There are 27 societies with 1,423 members, 11 Young Woman's Auxiliaries with 145 members, 37 Girls' Auxiliaries with 542 members, and 31 Sunbeam Bands with 472 members. Two societies were organized Concordia and Tharpe Street Chapel and Aeon Society disbanded. A Girls' Auxiliary and a Sunbeam Band was organized at Crawfordville, and a Young Woman's Auxiliary at Havana.

The first quarterly meetings were held at Fellowship Baptist Church on October 16, at 10:30 A.M. and 8 P.M. with 171 attending the meetings. The theme was "Liberty and Light for the Whole World" and the Third Jubilee Advance Goals for 1959-1964 were presented.

The second quarterly meetings were held at Havana Baptist Church on January 23, at 10:30 A.M. and 8 P.M. with 150 attending the meetings. "Christian Witnessing" Was the theme and Miss Elizabeth Provence, Youth Secretary of Florida Woman's Missionary Union, spoke on, "My Part in Christian Witnessing". After a letter was read, telling of the need for a treadle type sewing machine, for Mr. and Mrs. Francisco Diaz (Frank Wilburs), the members voted to send such a machine to the San Blas Islands for their use. Mission Study Institute was held in the afternoon.

The third quarterly meetings were held at Immanuel Baptist Church on April 9, at 10:30 A.M. and 8 P.M. with 121 attending the meetings. The theme was "As the World Unfolds Through Books" and featured the fundamental and youth directors.

The fourth quarterly meeting was held at First Baptist Church, Quincy on July 23, at 10:30 A.M. and there were 258 attending the meeting. The theme was "Youth and Missions" and members of the auxiliaries were featured on the program. Miss Lila Watson, missionary from China and Hong Kong, was the speaker.

The president, stewardship, community missions and prayer directors attended the state Leaders' Conference at Stetson University, Deland on September 8-11, 1958. Those attending the 65th Annual Session of Woman's Missionary Union Auxiliary to Florida Baptist Convention in Tampa, April 21-22, 1959 were the president, who served on the state nominating committee and was appointed chairman of 1961 Time and Place committee; Mrs. J. Crouch, mission study director. MUSIC REPORT

During the year of 1960 our churches face a great challenge in the emphasis of the year of Teaching and Training. In order that every church might be reached, large or small, our associational organizations--because of their proximity to the churches in their area--because of their knowledge of the churches in their area--stand as the key to whether or not all of these churches will have the benefits of participation in this year of Teaching and Training. These smaller churches have definite needs in all phases of the work. Our associational music organizations have capable music leaders and stand ready to face the challenge of helping every church in every association.

Throughout our state in 1958 and 1959 there were 350 churches in music training out of the 1,200 churches in our state. This year we hope that our association will have every church participating in some form of music training. As an association music organization we are going to strive to reach every church in our association.

This past year on an associational level the Associational Music Organizations again made great progress. Thirty-eight out of 46 associations held Associational Festivals this past year. One hundred and seventy-six churches participated in these festivals with 407 choral groups, totaling 7,500 choir members - 136 hymn players - 55 song leaders - 5 instrumental ensembles. Our Associational Festival was held at Seminole, Tallahassee, January 30-31, 1959. We are planning to have a festival this year, February 5-6, 1960, at Carrabelle.

On a state level the church music department continues to promote a program which should best serve the needs of the majority of our churches. Seven state music festivals were held during 1959. There was a total of 254 choral groups with 5,009 members - 105 hymn players - 39 song leaders - 4 ensembles with 116 churches participating. There will be ten state festivals in 1960. The choirs participating in the Associational Festival may attend the State Festival at First, Marianna, February 19-20, 1960 or at First, Perry, February 26-27, 1960.

Two music camps were held at the West Florida Baptist Assembly Grounds in Panama City. Harmony Bay as these camps are called for music has a limited capacity of 120 select Intermediates and Young People for each camp. During 1960 the camps will be held August 8-14 for the first camp and August 15-21 for the second camp. Each church in our association may send five Intermediates and Young People to each camp. This year the summer worker program has been expanded to a year round program. The Church Music Department will endeavor to help any church any time during the year by helping to locate capable workers for a music training school and in addition offer financial help if needed by the church. Churches desiring a Music Training school any time during the year should request a Worker Appropriation form from the State Music Department.

On a Convention-Wide level the Ridgecrest and Glorieta Music Leadership Assemblies again were a great success. The registration at Ridgecrest was just under 3,000 with 292 officially registered from Florida. Your State Secretary, Mr. W. G. Stroup and your Associate, Mr. Joe Abrams represented the Church Music Department at Ridgecrest. The Resurrection Story which was composed by the late Dr. Claude Almand of Stetson University was performed at Ridgecrest and Glorieta as the Choral work for the two weeks. This was the first cantata ever published by the Broadman Press and the presentation was a great milestone in Southern Baptist music history.

29. Seminaries: Rev. Ray C. Tindall, Chairman, gave his report and moved its adoption, and the report was approved.

SEMINARIES

For the 1958-1959 session our six Southern Baptist theological seminaries reported a total enrollment of 6,025.

Our oldest seminary is Southern, located in Louisville, Kentucky, and established one hundred years ago in Greenville, S. C. The James P. Boyce Centennial Library, a \$1,750,000 building, is the latest evidence of the seminary's advancement. Dr. Duke K. McCall is president of the institution's 1,428 students.

Southwestern, located in Fort Worth, Texas, is only half as old as Southern but has almost twice as many students. Dr. Robert E. Naylor is president of this evangelism-and-mission-minded seminary. There were 491 students who volunteered for mission service. The Foreign Mission Board appointed 48 graduates for service. A long-range \$10,000,000 building and endowment program is underway.

Dr. H. Leo Eddleman is the new president of the rapidly growing New Orleans Seminary. The student body has reached 950. Capable ministers, educational directors and musical leaders are filling our churches from this seminary. One out of every 9 graduates since 1918 has gone to the foreign field.

Golden Gate Seminary moved to its new campus this year on Strawberry Point, Mill Valley, California. With only a \$3,000 endowment, the seminary depends upon the Cooperative Program for its life. There are 350 students enrolled. Dr. Harold K. Graves is president.

Southeastern, located in Wake Forest, North Carolina, has climbed to a student body of 752 under the capable leadership of Dr. Sydnor L. Stealey, president. Rapid progress has been made but the needs increase.

The youngest seminary, Midwestern, Kansas City, Missouri, has operated for a year with a student enrollment of 150. The basic courses were taught. Splendid progress has been made but its needs are urgent. The capable president is Dr. Millard J. Berquist.

THE BAPTIST BIBLE INSTITUTE REPORT

The Baptist Bible Institute began its first session in September 1942. The Institute moved to its new location at Graceful Florida in 1953, and became an agency of the Florida Baptist Convention in 1957. At the close of the 1959 session the enrollment of the school was 138.

The purpose of the Baptist Bible Institute is to educate and to train men for the Gospel ministry. The Institute has the facilities of meeting the needs of the college graduate and the man who has not had the opportunity of completing high school. The courses offered cover the fields of English Bible, homiletics, Church administration, theology, music, English and religious education.

The Institute is owned and operated by the Florida Baptist Convention and receives financial assistance from the Cooperative Program. These funds are not sufficient to meet the financial needs of the Institute. It becomes necessary to depend upon churches and individuals to contribute to meet budget needs. Thirty thousand dollars will be necessary from the churches and individual gifts. It is urged that the churches put the Institute in their budgets. An administration building, a music building, a woman's dormitory, faculty residences, and student apartments are needed.

The future of the Baptist Bible Institute depends upon Florida Baptists to keep the school in their hearts through prayer and financial assistance.

The school has a place in world missions and should be accepted heartily by all Baptist people. Every effort should be made to strengthen it and give it their best.

Baptist work in Florida has been strengthened and enlarged because of the leadership of the men who have been trained there. Surely, there is a place for the Baptist Bible Institute in Baptist life.

STEWARDSHIP AND COOPERATIVE PROGRAM

The Cooperative Program is best.

In work; in getting all Baptist working in unison to carry out the whole commission of God. More people have a part in Christian ministry through this medium.

In strength; strong because it leads all Baptist to sit, to pray and to work together in finding out God's will in carrying out His commission to the world.

In growth; because cooperatively we help one another by adding our mites to theirs which enlarges the ministry. Florida has grown from \$645, 361. 55 in 1948 to more than three times that much, or \$2, 148, 865. 93 in 1958.

The Cooperative Program offers the best way for Baptists to do the most for missions.

We, therefore, recommend:

1. That each church in the association shall give loyal support to all our Baptist mission work through the Cooperative Program through its budget ON A PERCENTAGE BASIS.

2. That each church familiarize itself with the 2 Plus Plan, ascertaining what percentage of its total budget it is now giving to world missions through the Cooperative Program, and undertake to increase its gifts through the Cooperative Program at least 2 per cent of its total budget each year.

3. That a continuous program of stewardship and missions education be carried on in each church, teaching the New Testament plan of giving and missions.

4. That each church be urged to cooperate in the Forward Program Clinics, giving careful consideration to the adoption of this program.

5. That pastors and members of the local churches be urged to attend Florida's first World Missions Conference at Daytona Beach, April 5-7, 1960.

EVANGELISM REPORT

This associational year marks a real advance in the area of evangelism. The Lord has been good to us and we give Him the praise.

During the past year our association had a total of 816 baptisms with a total of 1, 408 additions by transfer of letter. This compares with last year when we reported 808 baptisms and 1, 487 transfer of letters. Let us pray for a continuing warm evangelistic spirit.

Baptismless churches! A rather strange combination of words--hardly a New Testament expression. There were 4 churches that reported no baptisms last year. Let us pray for this problem in our evangelism advance. Your committee would offer the following recommendations:

1. That the churches be encouraged to set up a Church Council on Evangelism.

2. That the Chairman of Evangelism and the Steering Committee be officially elected at this meeting.

3. That we continue to pray much for revival for a deeper concern for souls.

4. That we begin planning now to attend our state-wide evangelistic conference at the First Baptist Church in Jacksonville next January 12-14.

FLORIDA BAPTIST FOUNDATION REPORT

The foundation continues its emphasis upon the long range aspects of our stewardship plans. Kingdom responsibilities are on the increase at a rapid rate and every victory in the field involves a fresh responsibility at the home-base. We rejoice over the victories in the field, but, at times the rejoicing changes to apprehension when we are called upon to vastly increase our support of the field campaigns with added funds for the conserving of field results.

The foundation seeks by all means at its disposal to suggest ways in which our people may give added support to our field operations but sometimes find those who bow out because of the many demands made on their finances.

But there are ways the Christian can make a substantial offering and yet bring no added hardships upon the daily money needs.

Few would consider the great impact in the financial picture a small insurance policy, naming the foundation as beneficiary would make, unless

it were multiplied by thousands of such Southern Baptists that are, not only able, but eager to share in this manner if pointed to the way. In this way for a contribution of less than \$25.00 (Age 25 and Under); \$35.00 (Age 35); \$45.00 (Age 45) and a one-thousand dollar gift could be made, to the Kingdom work with no hardship created. There are many ways we can share if we care enough. Certainly this is the day of opportunity and it will not last forever.

BAPTIST STUDENT UNION REPORT

Last year the Baptist Student Union at Florida State University reached its Standard of Excellence, "First Magnitude", for the fourth straight year. It is still the largest state university in the Southern Baptist Convention to receive this honor.

First Baptist Church, Tallahassee and the Baptist Student Union of F. S. U. were host to the State Baptist Student Union Convention in the Fall of 1958. Many of our students were involved in program planning and presentation.

The annual Hobo Project (where students do odd jobs for summer mission funds) was again a success in spite of bad weather during scheduled time of operation. The goal of \$500.00 for State Baptist Student Union summer missions was reached plus approximately \$200.00 for visual aid equipment for the Student House.

Three F. S. U. students were elected to the State Baptist Student Union Executive Council at the Spring Retreat in Leesburg. They were: Sara Barnes, Enlistment Vice President; Barbara Bevis, Social Chairman and C. B. Rhinehart, Music Chairman.

During the summer of 1959 several students served in leadership roles:

1. Four out of the six State Baptist Student Union Revival Team members were from F. S. U.; preacher, Al Meador, Song Leader, Ernest Stoutamire, and two seminar leaders, Kay Jernigan and Pat Manning.

2. Rite Edwards, a Junier at F. S. U., was the state Baptist Student Union Missionary to Hawaii. In the past four years three students from F. S. U. have served as summer missionaries to Hawaii.

3. Ann Maxwell and Bethany Blumer were state Baptist Student Union missionaries to California.

4. Several others worked for the Home Mission Board in various states, served on staff at Ridgecrest and many more served in their home churches.

September 1959 seems to indicate that the school year is one of the best in terms of enlistment and interest.

REPORT ON BAPTIST PAPERS

Unbelievers may claim the right to remain ignorant but obedient Christians cannot.

Christians not only have the right to know--they have the obligation to know, and to continue to add to their knowledge. We are instructed to "grow in grace and in the knowledge of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ." Without increasing knowledge of the Scriptures it is largely impossible to keep this sacred instruction. Hence, we believe in regular reading of our Bible as our first and most important piece of Christian Literature.

Surely if we are to grow in the knowledge of our Lord we will also need to grow in the knowledge of His kingdom's witnessing, working and winning. Hence, we also believe in the fullest possible use of our good Baptist literature. It is of good content, sound in doctrine, easy to be understood and safe to follow.

Southern Baptist are expanding the circulation of all their publications as fast as our people will use them. Last year the Sunday School Board mailed out 92,200,000 copies of its periodicals, 6,333,026 books, some 60,000,000 printed church bulletins and more than 16,000,000 tracts. The circulation of the Commission is now 118,429, Home Mission Magazine 808,635, Brotherhood Journal 115,000; 80,000 for Ambassador Life, and 589,000 W. M. U. publications.

There are now 26 Baptist State Papers with a reported combined circulation 1,365,711 copies. This means of course that a total of more than 68,000,000 of these papers were mailed out last year.

Our very own state paper, the FLORIDA BAPTIST WITNESS, as of September 1, this year, has a total of 54,112 subscribers from 739 different churches. Some 643 of these churches are using the Church Budget Plan for at least some portion of their membership.

There are 23 churches sending the WITNESS into the homes of their membership this year. We hope that every church will take advantage of the economical Church Budget Plan in order to get the information contained in the FLORIDA BAPTIST WITNESS into every home of its membership.

With all the GOOD CHRISTIAN LITERATURE available to us, there is no valid reason for our Baptist people to be uninformed or ignorant of what is going on in our GREAT DENOMINATION.

BAPTIST MEMORIAL HOSPITAL REPORT

After four years of dedicated hospital personnel efforts, our Baptist Memorial Hospital is now considered a "grown-up" institution which offers a full range of medical and related services to its patients. In addition to its general service, it has a school of Medical Technology and a school of X-Ray Technology, a medical research program of vast proportions and two new medical services - Occupational Therapy, the Orthoptic Center, and the Artificial Kidney Service.

Of special interest to Baptists is the CHARITY FUND to which 14 of our Florida Baptist Association's churches contributed \$728.24 on Mother's Day Hospital Offering this year. Harold G. Sanders is the Associational Charity Chairman, and he congratulates the Association on the increased interest and gifts. Our goal was not reached, however, the total State Charity goal was 75,000 and we got about 50,000. Next Mother's Day, May 8, let each Sunday School and Church make this worthy offering.

This year 438 patients were admitted for charity medical service. Four thousand seven hundred and four visits to the Outpatient Clinics were made.

A total of \$96,008.26 was spent during the year on bills of charity patients. Baptists should pay this entire bill - and we could by doubling last year's gifts.

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION REPORT

The Baptist people through the years have given evidence of their profound belief in Christian Education. Because the Bible is our guide in all matters religious, our people must know how to read and interpret it. Because our churches operate on the democratic principle, our members must intelligently informed. Because we must effectively lead others to an understanding of God's plan for the world, we must educate both Christian leaders and followers.

Southern Baptists have shown great foresight in providing for Christian Education through our seminaries, our colleges and junior colleges, and our Bible schools and institutes. The 71 Southern Baptist Colleges and school enrolled 61,086 regular students and 6,437 students in extension classes in 1958-59. This represents a substantial increase over any previous year. We also operate six seminaries with an enrollment of 6,025 students.

Not only are our colleges, schools and seminaries serving more students than ever before, but they are receiving larger financial support from Baptists everywhere.

Florida Baptists may well rejoice because of the work of our own institutions of learning. Our Stetson University continues to maintain a high standard of academic excellence and of Christian influence. Stetson provides not only the preliminary training for our ministers and special religious workers, but it educates thousands of our finest Baptist young people who

will provide leadership in our Baptist churches everywhere. We are deeply grateful for the fine, dedicated Christian men and women who constitute the faculty and administrative offices of this great institution.

The Baptist Bible Institute, after many vicissitudes, has not become a regular part of the program of Florida Baptists. This institution provides special training that is not afforded by any other Baptist institution in our area. It is well managed and is served by consecrated men and women who believe in its program. It should be provided with additional facilities as demands for expanded services may arise.

Florida Baptists have shown their desire to give adequate support to our educational institutions by their gifts. As the scope of the work expands, and as costs of higher education advance, the needs will be far greater than they have ever been. We cannot afford to operate on anything less than the highest academic standards. Nothing that is Baptist should be less than first class. This means that we must make every possible effort to provide the necessary financial support.

We rejoice over the results of our Christian Education efforts and of the results that have been achieved in the lives of multitudes of fine Christian leaders. We call on our Baptist people everywhere to support with their prayers those who are in charge of our Christian Colleges, schools and seminaries, to the end that the "good news" may, indeed be carried to the uttermost parts of the world.

The Baptist's of Florida must meet the CALL and provide more FUNDS to care for the Children that need our help. To do this we must as CHURCHES and CHURCH MEMBERS act on the following items.

1. Every church budget to carry an item ear marked for the Home.
2. Make our THANKSGIVING OFFERING a real offering for the Home.
3. When the Truck comes to our Association for more churches take part in this great work. Fill; Yes, over Fill the Trucks with food and farm products. Last year only 20 churches gave to the home in this manner.

This new program brings to five the major productions produced weekly for radio. Total number of stations broadcasting these programs will soon run to 800.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON MISSIONARY EDUCATION

For some time there has been the feeling in our Association that a Missionary emphasis was greatly needed. Several years ago our Association voted to plan and conduct a School of Missions to meet this need. Because of the nature of the School, plans have been in the making for several years and the School of Missions for the Florida Association will be held April 24-29, 1960.

The plan for the School of Missions is to have a missionary speaker in each church from Sunday morning through Friday evening. Each speaker will be different and the different emphases will be given. Thirty two of our thirty nine churches have agreed to enter this program, and we are anticipating a great victory in our Association during this week of Mission emphasis.

One of the things we must do to insure success in this program for our Lord is to acquaint our people with the plans and be faithful in our prayers for this week.

RELIEF AND ANNUITY- Rev. Homer Duggar gave the report and moved that the report be approved. Report was adopted. Rev. Duggar introduced Rev. L. G. Irwin, Panama City, who spoke on the Relief and Annuity Plan and urged all Pastors, and Churches to join in the program.

RELIEF AND ANNUITY BOARD REPORT

In its 41 years of service the relief and annuity board has paid benefits to more than 5,300 retired or disabled ministers and denominational workers or widows. Approximately 1,300 of these are on the relief rolls and receive a share of the \$325,000 from the Cooperative Program designated for this work. The others receive a monthly check provided through their participation in one of the Board's protection plans. Total benefits paid out in 1958 were \$2,414,767.90.

Certificates were issued to 3,113 new members in all the Board's protection plans in 1958. This is a 27% increase over the previous year. The Southern Baptist Protection Plan showed the largest increase, 1,548 new members. A total of 1,047 new churches and employers were enlisted during 1958.

Even with the increases in new members as recorded above, there are still more than 60% of our Southern Baptist pastors not covered by the Annuity Board's protection program. Until this percentage is greatly reduced or eliminated completely, the Board is not fulfilling its purpose of providing security and protection for every Southern Baptist minister and church. During 1958, officers of the Board met with leaders of every state convention seeking a solution to this problem. As a result of these meetings, the Annuity Board is asking the local church's help in seeing that every pastor and church has this protection. Each church is being asked to enroll its pastor in the Protection Plan, paying two-thirds of the cost of the plan. The State Convention has already agreed to pay the other one-third for every pastor in its state.

When every church does this, the Board's ministry will be what it is meant to be, a protection program for the entire Southern Baptist ministry, and not just for a small percentage of pastors.

The soundness of the Board's financial structure is reflected by the report from its Investment Department. Income from investments in 1958 totaled \$2,424,377.92. Of the Board's assets, 98.25% was invested in income producing investments in 1958. The Board's newest investment endeavor is a 15-story office building in downtown Dallas completed last June. Two full floors and part of a third floor are being used for the Board's headquarters.

The remaining space has been leased to business firms. Income from the building will be added to protection plan reserves.
