CONSTITUTION

ARTICLE I - NAME

This Association shall be called the Florida Baptist Association.

ARTICLE II - MEMBERSHIP

Section 1. This Association shall be composed of messengers, duly elected annually by the churches cooperating with this body, who shall present church letters certifying evidence thereof.

Section 2. Each church shall be entitled to three messengers, and one additional messenger for every fifty members over one hundred.

ARTICLE III - HOLDING POWER

Section 1. The Association shall have power to accept all gifts, such as land, personal property or money, and to approve purchase and develop all property that may be deeded to or purchased by the Association. It shall also have the power to sell or trade property as it may be recommended by the Executive Committee for approval of the members of the Association at the annual meeting or at a called meeting.

Section 2. Beginning in 1961, the Association at its annual meeting shall elect three of its members to serve as trustees of the Association. All three must be lay members. One shall be elected for one year, one for two years and one for three years. Each year thereafter one will be elected for a three year term to replace the retiring trustee. A trustee may succeed himself if the Association so directs. In the event of a vacancy during the year, the Executive Committee shall appoint someone to fill the vacancy until the next annual meeting.

Section 3. The trustees shall hold in trust all property of the Association. They shall have no power to buy, sell, mortgage, lease or transfer any property without a specific vote of the Association authorizing such action. They shall have the responsibility of improvement and maintenance but shall not expend monies without the approval of the Executive Committee or the Association.

ARTICLE IV - OFFICERS

Section 1. The officers of this Association shall be a Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, Assistant Clerk, and a Treasurer, who shall be elected annually on the first day of the Association meeting, and they shall begin serving at the close of the session and continue in office until their successors are elected.

Section 2. Method of election shall be by nomination from the floor. In the event that two or more are nominated for the same office, election shall be by ballot. Otherwise, they shall be elected by acclamation or designated ballot.

Section 3. Duties of officers.

(1) Moderator. He shall preside at all meetings of the Association and shall preserve order at the sessions. He shall decide all questions on order and propriety. He shall appoint all committees as designated in this constitution or as directed by the body.

(2) Vice-Moderator. He shall preside in the absence or at the request of the Moderator.

(3) Clerk. He shall see that messengers are enrolled and that a regular record of all business of the Association shall be made and preserved. He shall have the minutes of the annual meeting printed and distributed to each church.

(4) Assistant Clerk. He shall aid the clerk in whatever way he is requested.

(5) Treasurer. He shall receive and keep an accurate account of all monies contributed by the churches in the Association and of any other monies received. He shall disburse monies at the instruction of the Association or its Executive Committee. He shall make written report of the same at the annual meeting or at the request of the Executive Committee.

Section 4. In the event that the Moderator should resign or remove from the Association, the Vice-Moderator shall succeed to the position of Moderator and a new Vice-Moderator shall be elected by the Executive Committee.

ARTICLE V - PURPOSE

The objects of this Association are missionary, educational and benevolent, together with a closer fellowship and larger usefulness of all who cooperate with it.

ARTICLE VI - REPORTS

All churches cooperating with this Association shall send up by its messengers on the first day of each annual meeting a statement of all work done by them during the preceding year, giving in full such statistical information as is called for by blanks currently in use for such purpose, unless such information has previously been mailed to the Clerk of the Association.

ARTICLE VII - MEETINGS

Section 1. This Association shall meet twice a year at such time and place as may have been agreed upon at the preceding session, or by its Executive Committee.

Section 2. The first meeting will be held at mid-year, in lieu of an Executive Committee meeting, for the purpose of electing department heads, emergency business, progress reports by incumbent heads of departments, and an inspirational message.

Section 3. When convened it shall be governed by a regular and proper decorum. The Moderator shall preside and the Clerk shall record the proceedings and prepare them for the press. This report will be published in conjunction with the Annual Minutes. The second meeting will be held in October, the month which begins the Associational year.

ARTICLE VIII - EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

Section 1. Membership. The Executive Committee shall consist of all pastors of churches and missions cooperating with the Association; one lay person from each church and mission cooperating with the Association; the heads of departments of the Association (Sunday School, Training Union, Brotherhood, Woman's Missionary Union, Music and Evangelism) and the officers of the Association. Associate pastors, ministers of education and music shall be honorary members and all state Baptist employees with membership in the churches of the Association shall serve as advisory members.

Section 2. Election. The Nominating Committee will nominate the members of the Executive Committee during the annual association, and fill vacancies which occur between meetings of the Association. It shall drop from its roll (1) any member who shall move from the Association within the year, or any pastor who is released from his church unless the Nominating Committee shall recommend to retain him, and (2) any member who dies during the year.

Section 3. Meetings. This Committee shall meet as often as it may desire. A number equal to half the number of churches shall constitute a quorum. It shall transact such business as is delegated to it by the Association and shall act for the Association when it is not in session.

ARTICLE IX - NOMINATING COMMITTEE

Prior to the mid-year meeting, the Moderator shall appoint a Nominating Committee who shall nominate the Heads of the Departments as may be recommended by the departments or in the absence of recommendations, to nominate suitable heads for all departments. This committee shall continue to function in assisting the department heads, if they desire, in staffing their departments. They shall nominate the members of the Executive Committee and the Trustees.

ARTICLE X - ASSOCIATION OFFICE

The Association shall establish an Association Office and appoint a qualified salaried person to be secretary for the Association. A committee composed of the Moderator, the Treasurer and the Clerk shall make the selection of the location of the office and of the secretary. They shall report to the Executive Committee for approval of their selection.

ARTICLE XI - SCOPE OF WORK

This Association shall have no power to lord it over God's heritage or to infringe upon the internal rights of any church.

Section 1. The Association shall have power to provide for the general union of the churches.

Section 2. It may counsel with any church in difficulty.

Section 3. It may inquire into the cause of any church failing to be represented at any annual meeting or failing to furnish statistical reports to such, or failing to be co-operative with the denominational program.

Section 4. It may withdraw from any church found to be unorthodox or violating the spirit or purpose of this Association.

Section 5. It may accept into this union other Baptist churches which are found to be orthodox and co-operative with the denominational program, and providing sixty days have elapsed after a request for examination and entry into the Association has been given to the Executive Committee or to the Association in annual meeting.

Section 6. It may grant a letter of dismission to any church wishing such and having requested such letter by writing, provided said church is in good standing and the application can be approved by the Executive Committee prior to the annual meeting.

Section 7. It may appropriate money contributed by churches or individuals as specified and when not specified, to the best interest of the Master's cause.

Section 8. It may adjourn to any future time and place deemed most beneficial to the churches comprising this union.

ARTICLE XII - AMENDMENTS

This Constitution may be amended at any annual meeting by a two-thirds vote of members present, provided that notice of such change shall have been given to the Executive Committee at least thirty days prior to such meeting, and that notice of such change be given to the Association on the first day of such meeting.

ARTICLES OF FAITH

ARTICLE I. We believe in one only true and living God, and that there are three in the Godhead, the Father, the Son and the Holy Ghost.

ARTICLE II. We believe the Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments are the Word of God, and the only rule of faith and practice.

ARTICLE III. We believe in the doctrine of original sin.

ARTICLE IV. We believe in man's impotency to recover himself from the fallen state in which he is by nature by his own free will and ability.

ARTICLE V. We believe that we are justified in the sight of God only by the imputed righteousness of Christ; that we rely solely upon the Holy Spirit for guidance.

ARTICLE VI. We believe that the saints shall persevere in grace and shall never finally fall away.

ARTICLE VII. We believe that baptism and the Lord's Supper are ordinances of Jesus Christ; that nothing is baptism except immersion; that believers are the only subjects of this ordinance, and that none but baptized believers are entitled to partake of the Lord's Supper.

ARTICLE VIII. We believe in a general resurrection of the dead, and a general, final judgement.

ARTICLE IX. We believe that the punishment of the wicked shall be everlasting and the joys of the righteous shall be eternal.

ARTICLE X. We believe that no minister has a right to administer the ordinances only such as are regularly called and have come under the imposition of the hands of a Baptist Presbytery.

ARTICLE XI. We believe that the first day of the week is the Lord's Day. It is a Christian institution for regular observance. It commemorates the resurrection of Christ from the dead and should be employed in the exercises of worship and spiritual devotion, both public and private, and by refraining from worldly amusements. Works of necessity and mercy are excepted.

ARTICLE XII. We believe that God alone is Lord of the conscience and He has left it free from the doctrines and commandments of men which are contrary to His Word or not contained in it. Church and state should be separate. The state owes to the church protection and full freedom in the pursuit of its spiritual ends. In providing for such freedom no ecclesiastical group or denomination should be favored by the state more than others. Since civil government is ordained by God, it is the duty of Christians to render loyal obedience thereto in all things not contrary to the revealed will of God. The church should not resort to civil powers to carry on its work. The Gospel of Christ contemplates spiritual means alone for the pursuit of its end. The state has no right to impose taxes for the support of any form of religion. A free church in a free state is the Christian ideal and this implies the right of free and unhindered access to God on the part of all men, and the right to form and propagate opinions in the sphere of religion without interference by the civil power.

RULES OF DECORUM

1. The sessions of this Association shall be opened and closed with prayer.
2. Visitors and corresponding messengers, after they shall have been accepted by the Association and enrolled as such, shall have the privilege of speaking.
3. The right to speak on any subject and the length of time is left with the Association at the direction of the Moderator.
4. Unbrotherly remarks or personal reflections must be avoided by all speakers.
5. The Parliamentary proceedings of this Association shall be governed by Mell's Parliamentary Practice.
6. These rules may be changed or amended at any full session of the Association by a majority vote.

ASSOCIATION RECOMMENDATIONS

on

ESTABLISHING MISSIONS - ORDINATION OF MINISTERS

ORGANIZING CHURCHES - ORDINATION OF DEACONS

I

ESTABLISHMENT OF MISSIONS

Too often churches are ineffective due to their location, leadership and lack of purpose.

Missions should be sponsored by churches and should the zeal of some individuals give conception to a mission, they should be encouraged to seek proper sponsorship.

It is recommended that the following policies of guidance be carefully considered and adhered to in order that we may have an effective mission program in our Association.

1. Let the Associational Missions Committee serve as a point of clearance to avoid duplication of work.
2. The nearest church to the proposed locale of the mission should be approached and asked to sponsor the mission. If this fails, the cooperation of this church with the next nearest church who would sponsor it should be sought.

3. The Mission Committee of the sponsoring church, the Steering Committee of the mission itself, and -- when desirable -- the Associational Missions Committee should work together to make this mission a success.

The suggested plan of the Home Mission Board makes for a good working relationship between mission and sponsoring church (copies of this plan are on file in the Association office).

The gist of this plan is:

1. That the sponsoring church will, in the spirit of guidance, aid the mission to obtain consecrated, effective leadership during the time it is a mission and certainly before its constitution into an autonomous church.
2. That the sponsoring church will help the mission to find and to practice a sound financial policy in order that the mission may be self-sustaining at the time of organization into a church.
3. That the mission be taught and led into a sound doctrinal position before organization into a church.
4. That the mission be led by the sponsoring church to be a strong evangelical and missionary organization which will involve:
 - a. Proper organization to get the work done;
 - b. A systematic cooperative plan of supporting associational and world-wide missions;
 - c. Proper observances of the ordinances of a Southern Baptist Church.

II

ORGANIZATION OF A CHURCH

1. Any group of Baptists desiring to organize a new Baptist church within the bounds of the Florida Baptist Association, and expecting to apply for membership in the Association, are respectfully asked to follow a consistent form of organization.

a. The first consistent step, after setting a time and place for the organization meeting, is to invite the pastors and deacons of at least three churches in good standing within our denomination to provide a Council to assist with the said organization.

b. It seems good taste and sound wisdom to include the moderator of the Association and the Field Secretary of the Association in this Council whenever possible as he has usually been in touch with the proposed work from the time of its inception.

2. The Council assembled for the purpose of aforesaid organization should organize itself by the election of a moderator and clerk before any further procedure, then the following order is suggested:

a. The roll of the proposed membership should be submitted to the Council for its approval. This may be done either in writing or by reading the list of names.

b. The Articles of Faith of a Baptist Church should be read and adopted by the proposed members or a statement made that it has been previously done.

c. The Church Covenant should be adopted by the same procedure.

d. The Council should then retire and approve or disapprove of the organization of the said church.

e. Upon favorable recommendation of the Council, the Moderator should call for a motion from the membership constituency to declare themselves a church. The adopting of a name for the church would be in order. A motion by the new church to call a pastor and to elect necessary officers would be expedient, i.e., at least a moderator (generally the new pastor), a clerk and a treasurer, or to vote a continuation of the term of those who had been serving if the church had been a mission. Election of officers other than the three mentioned may be held at a future business meeting of the church.

f. The Moderator of the new church would preside at this point and after a formal declaration as to the plan of the missionary program the church is to follow, an offering for World Wide Missions is usually taken.

g. After the organizational sermon is preached the hand of Christian fellowship would be then extended by the moderator of the Council, for the Council, to the moderator or members of the new church.

h. The benediction may be a prayer or a song.

3. Application to become a member of the Florida Baptist Association should be made in writing at the time of organization stating that the above order of procedure has been followed and application will be considered by the Association or its Executive Committee.

4. If any applicant church has been in another fellowship of Baptists, or if there is any question as to whether the applicant has met all the conditions stated above, the application shall be automatically received and referred to the Petitionary Letter committee elected for that purpose.

This committee shall make full investigation, and offer all aid possible in helping the applicant to meet the required conditions, and the application shall be considered at the next session of the Association.

III

ORDINATION OF A MINISTER

With the desire that the pastors and churches of our Association shall have fellowship, and that the form of ordination of our pastors shall be regular, we suggest the following order of ordination.

1. Any man, feeling the call to preach the Gospel, who is a member of a Southern Baptist Church, and has been called by a church to serve as its pastor, should ask the church of which he is a member to arrange for his ordination.

2. The following is the regular and accepted procedure:

a. The church desiring the ordination should invite several ordained ministers in good standing within the denomination, from neighboring Baptist churches, to sit together as a Presbytery, for the examination of the candidate. There is less chance of embarrassment if the examination is private and can be held prior to the setting of the date of ordination.

b. The candidate should be examined as to his conversion, his call to the ministry and his belief in Scriptural doctrines.

c. After a thorough examination the candidate may be asked to retire and the Presbytery approve or disapprove of his ordination.

d. If approved, recommendation is made to the church to proceed with the ordination. It is customary to have a sermon, a charge to the candidate and a charge to the church. Many churches present the candidate with a Bible. Special prayer is offered with the laying on of hands by the Presbytery, after which the right hand of fellowship is given and the service concluded with prayer.

3. The ordination of ministers other than pastors should be left to the discretion of the local church.

IV

ORDINATION OF DEACONS

Realizing that this matter is solely one which concerns the local church, the following suggestions are made relevant to deacon ordination.

The same general procedure applying to ordination of the minister seems to be a good one except that the Council should consist of ministers and deacons.

In the event ordination services are to be held at a time when pastors and deacons of churches of like faith and order cannot attend, it is suggested that the ordaining church may invite retired ministers who hold membership in churches of like faith and order and any Denominational Workers who have ordination to assist the pastor and deacons of the church in this service.

These suggestions are made that both the deacon and any other church which may elect him to serve as a deacon may feel that his ordination was both sound and in good order.

"MISSIONS INVESTORS"

1. Name: Missions Investors of the Florida Baptist Association.

2. Purpose:

1. To enlist individual contributors to create a fund to establish new missions in the Florida Baptist Association.

2. To use these funds in the purchase of mission property.

3. To assist in the development (building) of missions established by churches cooperating with the Florida Baptist Association.

3. Policies:

1. That the Executive Committee of the Florida Baptist Association instruct the Treasurer to set up a "Missions Investors Fund" (formerly known as the Revolving Property Fund) to receive all designated monies and the pro-rata share of the monies received through the Associational Budget on a monthly basis.

2. A. These monies shall be expended only upon recommendation of the Associational Missions Committee and action of the Executive Committee or the Florida Baptist Association in Regular Session.

B. All properties, stocks, bonds, securities, interests or other valuables received by the Trustees of the Association, designated for Missions Investors, be expended only upon recommendation of the Associational Missions Committee and action by the Executive Committee or the Association in Regular Session.

C. At no time will any of the monies, properties, stocks, bonds, securities, interests or other valuables be expended for any work of the Association except for the establishment and development of new missions within the Association.

3. Property and/or buildings used in the development of missions in the Florida Baptist Association, purchased with Missions Investors funds, will be an outright gift to the sponsoring church complying with the suggested procedure of the establishment of missions as recorded in the Annual of the Association.

4. Promotion:

1. A. To enlist 500 or more individuals who will give at least \$1.00 or more each month, over and above their regular giving to the local church, designated through the local church and/or to the Treasurer of the Florida Baptist Association for Missions Investors.

B. Individuals may also give, without encumbrance, properties, stocks, bonds, securities, interests, or other valuables, to the Treasurer of the Florida Baptist Association and/or through the local church designated for Missions Investors. Proper acknowledgement will be given to the individual or individuals by the Association.

2. To enlist pastors to lead their churches to participate.

3. To get each church to select a Church Missions Committee whose chairman or elected person will work with the pastor in enlisting individual contributions.

4. That the Association, each year, set a date or time to begin the enlistment of contributors for the New Year.

5. That the Missions Committee be responsible for having "Commitment Cards" and envelopes to distribute to the churches each year.

6. That the 1963-64 Budget item listed as "Purchase of Missions Property" be changed to read "Missions Investors Fund."

PROCEEDINGS

of the

The 122nd session of the Florida Baptist Association was called to order by the Moderator, W. M. Scruggs, Sr., at 3:00 P.M., Thursday October 22, 1964 at First Baptist Church of Monticello, Florida.

1. The messengers and visitors were led in singing, "To the Work," "The Churches One Foundation" and "One Day," by George Starke, Associational Music Director. Mrs. Pat Bicknell, organist for First Baptist Church, Tallahassee, accompanied.

2. The moderator introduced W. L. Shepherd, past chairman of the Board of Deacons of First Church, Monticello, who brought the devotional message from the Gospel of Matthew. He led in prayer.

3. The messengers and visitors were welcomed by LeRoy Curry, pastor of First Baptist Church, Monticello, the host church.

4. The vice-moderator, Harold Johnson, responded to the welcome.

5. Frank Johnson, clerk, moved that the messengers already present constitute the organization of the body, along with those who might register throughout the session. The motion was seconded by Claude Sapp and carried.

6. The moderator asked that all visitors introduce themselves. There were several visitors from the Middle Florida Association present.

7. E. W. Perryman moved that the program be adopted as outlined in the Book of Reports. Mr. Perryman requested that everyone remain seated at all times, except to make or second motions. Millard Hancock seconded the motion. It carried.

8. Moderator Scruggs announced committee appointments:

Committee on Nominations: Claude Sapp, Chairman, Harold Johnson, W. F. Gray, Max Hannon, James Williams; Committee on Committees: R. P. Tomberlin, Jr., Chairman, Mrs. Earl Lambert, Mrs. Leo Hebert, S. A. Coxwell, M. E. Hatcher; Resolutions Committee: Hugh R. Kinsey, Chairman, H. C. Meador, Franklin Wooten, Mrs. George Clark, Mrs. George Russ; Time, Place, Preacher Committee: D. W. Padgett, Chairman, Ray C. Tindall, Mrs. G. T. DeVane, Mrs. Jack Stokley, O. G. Hall.

9. The moderator asked for nominations for moderator for 1964-65. C. A. Alexander was nominated by Charlie Mercer and John Temoshchuk was nominated by Jimmy Miller. Harold Johnson moved that nominations cease. Claude Sapp seconded the motion. C. A. Alexander was elected by secret ballot. Millard Hancock moved that John Temoshchuk be elected vice-moderator. William Flury seconded the motion, which carried. Harold Johnson nominated Earl Lambert for treasurer; Frank Johnson was nominated for clerk by Claude Sapp; Mrs. Hugh Kinsey was nominated by S. A. Coxwell for assistant clerk, and C. A. Alexander requested that Millard Hancock serve as parliamentarian. These nominations were seconded, and each was elected by acclamation.

10. The vice-moderator took the chair and the moderator made the report of the Executive Committee and moved its adoption. E. W. Perryman seconded the motion, which carried.

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE REPORT

The Executive Committee held the meetings each month at the Immanuel Baptist Church, except the September meeting, which was held in the home of the moderator in Monticello, Florida.

This past year saw the committee with good attendance, both pastors and lay members. The departments of the association have all been most active and from reports the work has progressed in a very satisfactory manner.

We have continued to publish the Baptist Views, and in that way more of our members have been able to learn more about the work of the association.

The outstanding part of our association has been two main subjects: Missions - Our Missions Committee has set up a plan (Not many churches have adopted it) that we hope in the near future will provide funds so that we can begin at least one mission each year. Then our very efficient treasurer adopted a plan that each item in the budget will get its share of the funds and in this manner the Mission Committee will have received its just share of the receipts.

13. Millard Hancock made the Constitution and By-Laws Committee report and asked that the report in the Book of Reports be read and voted on the following day. The motion carried.

14. Leo Hebert made the Associational Missions report and moved its adoption. The motion was seconded and carried.

MISSIONS COMMITTEE REPORT

At the direction of the Executive Committee the Missions Committee set up and put into effect the "Missions Investors" program. A complete copy of this action as voted by the Executive Committee is included in this report.

Partial surveys have been made of two communities. One group has stated a definite interest in beginning a mission in the area of the Perry Highway. This was referred to the Missions Committee of the Parkway Baptist Church since they are the church located nearest this area.

Florida Baptist Association has just completed a five and one half year period in which no new missions have been started. During this time the population in the Tallahassee area alone has increased greatly. There is a definite need at this time for missions in no less than 10 areas within the greater Tallahassee community. This means that we should double our churches.

The projected population growth for Tallahassee in the next 15 years shows that we will need to build twenty-five new Southern Baptist churches if we are to keep up with the growth. This does not include communities outside of Tallahassee.

The committee finds churches that are interested in missions but they do not have the financial means of taking care of a full mission. The "Missions Investors" program will serve to facilitate the beginning of new work by the churches working on a cooperative basis. We highly recommend that the churches do more to support the "Missions Investors" program.

15. Millard Hancock moved that miscellaneous business be dispensed with until after Gary Meadows spoke on behalf of Stetson University. The motion carried.

The emphasis this year was on Bible study and handcraft. Rev. Ray Tindall led our handcraft period and the response was wonderful.

The camp resulted in six conversions, fourteen rededications, and thirteen commitments to Full Christian Service.

The results were so gratifying that your committee is considering the possibility of having two camps this coming year, one for the juniors and one for the intermediates. To do this successfully will necessitate the cooperation of all our churches, and the results will richly repay all the efforts and energies expended.

FIELD SECRETARY REPORT

The State Board of Missions of the Florida Baptist Convention realigned three districts in North Florida this year. District 6 (4 associations) and District 3 (4 associations). This action became effective January 27, 1964.

District Three is comprised of four associations, Florida, Gadsden County, Middle-Florida and Taylor, 81 churches, 28 missions.

New churches constituted 1. Building planning conferences 4, new buildings begun 9, church improvements made 10, dedications of buildings 1, ground breaking services 3. State meetings 3, workshops 2, association meetings 62, assembly planning meetings 1, department conferences 4, special conferences 4, other services 94. Classes taught 10, Study Courses taught 4, School of Missions 1. Pastor contacts arranged 42. Ordinations 5. Dedications 81, volunteers for special service 1. Associations served 6. Tracts distributed 1,350, letters and bulletins 583. Attended School of Prophets (Panama City and Picketts Lake), State Sunday School Planning Conference, State Evangelism Conference, Florida Baptist Convention, Church Programming Conference and Home Mission Conference (Ridgecrest).

Helped plan and implement the Pilot Gadsden County Sunday School Stewardship Conference.

District goals for constituting new churches and establishing new missions for 1964-65, 1 new church, 4 full missions and 10 partial missions.

Florida (1 new church, 2 full missions, 4 partial missions), Gadsden County (1 full or permanent mission, 2 partial missions), Middle Florida (2 partial missions), Taylor (1 full or permanent mission, 2 partial missions).

30. W. G. Stracener, editor of the Baptist Witness, spoke on behalf of that state Baptist publication.

31. N. B. Langford set forth the importance of supporting the Cooperative Program. He is pastor of North Central Baptist Church in Gainesville.

32. Speaker for the Retirement Center was Allison Banks, pastor of Holiday Hill Baptist Church in Jacksonville.

33. Frank Johnson, who along with D. W. Padgett, is a member of the State Board of Missions, made the report and moved the adoption of the State Board of Missions report. D. W. Padgett seconded the motion, which carried.

STATE BOARD OF MISSIONS

Our State Executive Secretary-Treasurer used as the subject of his Convention address one year, "Florida Is a Mission Field." There is no question about this because we must provide all types of Southern Baptist ministries to an ever increasing population. We need to constantly strengthen our present witness as well as add new missions, new churches, and new activities.

The strength of our work is dependent upon the response of the churches to cooperative giving. The hearts of men may be touched by God, but they will never be able to go unless we supply the means for going.

All missions wait on our giving.

The one major project demanding our attention at the present is the Lake Yale Assembly. The G.A. Camp is under construction with the R.A. Camp to follow soon. Both of these programs should be ready for use in 1965. The State Board of Missions voted in May to proceed with the assembly program at Lake Yale, also. The first expenditure will be approximately \$500,000. When completed, the retreat will take care of some 1,000 people.

The Convention has, also, voted to start a junior college program. Plans are being made by the Education Committee to bring a definite report to the State Convention Meeting in Tampa in November. Other matters of importance will continue to claim our attention as Florida grows. One thing we should never forget, however, is the matter of winning the lost to Christ. No program is important, and no institution is necessary, when it stands in the way of evangelism in its most elementary form. Missions revolve around the command of Christ to "Go ye" to preach, and teach in order that men might be won unto Himself.

EVANGELISM

Our hearts are made to rejoice to see that Florida Baptist Association had a wonderful increase of 21% in the number of baptisms this year. Last year 29 churches and 1 mission reported 400 baptisms, whereas this year the Lord gave 28 churches and 1 mission 482. There were 13 churches with an increase,

11 with a decrease, and 5 with no change. Last year there was a ratio of 1 to 33, whereas this year the ratio is 1 to 27.

We realize that our objective is to see all men (not just a few) live for and like Jesus, but there must be a beginning which is receiving Jesus as Lord and Saviour. If our churches are spiritual in depth, warm in love, active in compassion, enthusiastic in service, and living for Jesus, there will be perennial visiting, perennial witnessing, and perennial soul-winning.

Fruit is always the natural result of a good healthy tree growing under the right conditions. (See Table A, page 36)

39. D. W. Padgett moved that miscellaneous business be postponed until department reports were heard. The motion carried.

40. Mr. Padgett made the Sunday School report and encouraged the departments to work together in combined plans and efforts for a better association. These reports were made as a unit. George Starke presented the Music report and encouraged churches which need music directors to consider young men from the F.S.U. Music Department. Miss Roumelle Bowen, assisted by Mrs. W. C. Reeves, gave the Training Union report. The Woman's Missionary Union report was made by Mrs. G. W. Barwick, Sr. A Girl's Auxiliary emphasis was given by Mrs. Larry Britt. Frank Johnson brought the Brotherhood report. The motion to adopt the reports carried.

SUNDAY SCHOOL

The outstanding event in our 1963-64 Sunday School program was the Sunday School Witnessing Campaign in January, 1964. It is reported that every association in the state participated in the campaign. It is our hope and prayer that as a result of this campaign and the follow-up program in the churches, the downward trend in Sunday School enrolment and baptisms has been halted.

The outstanding feature of the 1964-65 program is the "Adult Thrust" emphasis.

What Is It? - A strategy for advance toward reaching 10,000,000 Sunday School members by 1970. Advance on all fronts waits on advance on the adult front.

Is It Needed? - Last year 33,000 churches reported a total net Sunday School enrolment gain of 40,000. Gains in all other church organizations declined proportionately. For the first time in the history of the nation, the increase in church membership did not total the increase in population. Baptisms were at a new low. As the Sunday Schools go - so go the churches - is a truth demonstrated year after year.

What Are Its Features? -

1. Special Lesson Unit - Special lesson unit entitled "Sharing Christ's Concern for Persons." The lessons are to be used by the adult and young people's classes.

2. Helps for Prospect Visitation - Prospect Cultivation leaflets will be used in the intensive visitation of all prospects for the church.

3. Correlated Study Program - Training Union programs in the adult unions will include a study on visitation.

We urge every church to give prayerful attention and emphasis to the "Adult Thrust" phases of our 1964-65 Sunday School program. We believe this is the right place to begin reaching all the prospects for your church.

The associational Sunday School department stands ready to assist in building a Standard Sunday School.

HOME AND FOREIGN MISSIONS

A digest of the Foreign Missions report for this year indicates we have 1,803 missionaries, 3,943 churches, 41,147 baptisms, 1,076 schools with 170,536 enrollment, 60 hospitals-clinics with 34,897 in-patients and 332,259 out-patients, 198,150 Bibles, 4,246,083 periodicals, 965,224 books and 7,556,428 tracts distributed.

Dr. Cauthen says, "A study of this report shows 1963 to be the best year we have known in foreign mission service, not only from the stand point of the appointment of missionaries, but from the stand point of decisions for Christ and baptisms in the churches."

A grand total of \$15,409,893 dollars was the cost of operating our foreign mission program last year. Worth it? Jesus thought so when He said, "What is a man profited when he gains the world and lose his soul." (paraphased). He died to back up His conviction.

On the Home Mission field we spent \$5,202,890 dollars in underwriting the following ministries:

A program of the Chaplaincy, a program of urban-rural mission ministries, a program in Pioneer Areas, a program of metropolitan missions, a program of mission centers, a program of Jewish work, a program of associational administrative missions, a program of surveys and special studies, a program of church extension, a program of work with National Baptists (Negro), a program of language groups missions, a program of evangelism, a program of special ministries and a program of church loans.

What we could and would not do alone we can and are doing together.

For detailed study of the work of our Home and Foreign Mission Boards consult the 1964 Annual of the Southern Baptist Convention.

49. Because several church letters were late, the clerk's report could not be compiled for presentation.

50. The Memorial Service was conducted by C. A. Alexander, who read selected scripture. The list of deceased was read by Harold Johnson. H. C. Meador led in prayer. (See "In Memoriam," 31-32)

51. Moderator Scruggs recognized the officers for 1964-65 and asked that the association support them in prayer and effort. Frank Johnson spoke words of appreciation on behalf of the association to the retiring moderator, C. A. Alexander, the newly elected moderator, spoke briefly to the body, asking for prayer, support and good will. ANNUITY BOARD

For over 45 years the Annuity Board of the Southern Baptist Convention has been providing retirement income, widow protection and disability benefits to pastors, church staff workers, missionaries, and denominational workers. At the Southern Baptist Convention this year a new Life Benefit Plan was offered which provides term protection for those who participate. The plan became effective October 1st with around 6,000 in the initial enrollment.

This program, which provides large benefits for low cost, is designed to give added protection for wives and children in the event of the death of the husband. Any person who is in a salaried relationship with a church or agency cooperating with the Florida Baptist Convention is eligible for participation.

The Southern Baptist Protection Plan is the basic program offered by the denomination, with over 75% of the churches in Florida cooperating with our convention enrolled.

In Florida Association 20 churches have taken advantage of the excellent benefits offered in the Protection Plan.

In 1963 some parts of the Bible was published in 1,216 languages, full Bible in 231, New Testament 1,290. Yet, there are over a thousand languages in which no book of the Bible has been published.

Southern Baptist churches gave \$167,498 to the Society while the Methodists gave \$172,771 during 1963.

Baptists can do better than this by smaller churches giving \$10 to \$60, larger churches giving \$60 to \$300, and great city churches giving \$300 to \$600 or more.

FLORIDA BAPTIST CHILDREN'S HOME

The number of applications to our Children's Home during the spring and summer indicate a turn for the worse in family relations.

The Children's Home has four caseworkers, each of whom has graduated from an accredited school of social work. It is their business to counsel with children and parents, and in every case where good family life can be maintained, to keep them together. Their success is shown by the fact that 94 applications were withdrawn and 55 children were returned to their families or near relatives. 75 children were admitted to the Homes in Lakeland and Miami for a total of 188 in residential care and 64 assisted through the Mother's Aid program. 1,094 counseling sessions were held with children and 682 with relatives.

If the members of our churches would give 2 cents a week for child care, we could double the number we are now helping, and who knows but that some of those children might be ours.

60. Millard Hancock continued the report of the Constitution and By-Laws Committee. The suggested change in Article VIII was discussed and the motion on the floor to adopt this change carried.

61. The final worship period opened with George Starke leading the association in "Saviour, Like A Shepherd Lead Us." George Clark shared thoughts from Acts 4:13, after which Ray C. Tindall preached the inspirational sermon.

62. Moderator Scruggs presented the gavel to C. A. Alexander, who will lead the Florida Baptist Association in the new year. The 1964 session closed with prayer for God's continued guidance.
