CONSTITUTION

Article I. This Association shall be called the Wekiwa Baptist Association.

The Association shall be composed of Messengers from Baptist Churches affiliated with this Association. Each Church shall be entitled to its Pastor and three messengers, and one additional messenger for each 50 members or fraction thereof over 100, provided that no church shall be allowed more than twenty-five messengers.

Article III. The objects of this Association are: Missionary, Educational, and Benevolent, together with a closer fellowship and larger

usefulness of all who cooperate with it.

Article IV: The officers of the Association shall be a Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer, who shall be elected annually. The terms of office shall begin at close of session. The Moderator shall not serve more than two consecutive terms.

Article V. Other churches of the same faith and order wishing to become affiliated with this association must send messengers and a petition for membership, along with information as to their doctrinal views and practices, to any annual meeting of the Association. If upon examination, they are found to be sound, they may be admitted to membership. These petitions along with information as to their doctrinal views and practice may be presented to the Executive Committee at any regular meeting between annual meetings of the Association. After a petition is presented, the pastor of the petitioning church may be made a member of the Executive Committee, by a majority vote of the Committee, until the petition can be acted upon at the annual meeting of the Association. At the request of the petitioning church the Committee shall give assistance to the church in putting its petition and credentials in order for presentation to the Association.

Article VI. There shall be an Executive Committee composed of: (a) Article VI. There shall be an executive Committee composed of the Association, (b) All pastors of churches cooperating with the Association, provided they hold membership in some church cooperating with the Florida Baptist Convention, (c) Association Sunday School Superintendent, (d) Association Training Union Director, (e) Association W. M. U. President, (f) Association Brotherhood President, (f) Association Brotherhood President, (g) Associa (g) One member from each church; which shall conduct all business of Association between the annual meetings.

the Association between the annual meetings.

Article VII. The Association shall hold its sessions annually at such time and place as the Association may elect. The executive Committee, however, shall be authorized to make such changes in either time or place of meeting as may be found to be expedient.

Article VIII. The doctrinal statement representing in general the Biblical beliefs of the Baptists constituting this Association, as its ground of common faith and practice, shall be the New Hampshire

Confession of Faith (or its like).

Article IX. This Constitution may be amended at any annual meeting by a two-thirds vote, provided that notice of such change shall have been given to the Executive Committee not later than the last Executive Committee meeting previous to the Association meeting and that notice of such change be given to the Association on the first day of such meeting.

BY-LAWS

In order to carry out the provisions of the Constitution, the following By-Laws are adopted for the government of the Wekiwa Baptist

Association.
Article I. Kerfoot's Parliamentary Law, so far as applicable shall

be followed.

Article II. The fiscal year shall run from October 1—September 30. Article III. The Moderator of the Association shall appoint at the beginning of each annual meeting a Committee on Committees, whose duty shall be to nominate the following Committees to report at the present meeting.

1. Committee on Time, Place and Preacher for next meeting.
2. Committee on Applications for Membership and Dismissal, when

needed.

Committee on Resolutions.

4. Committee on Nominations whose duty shall be to nominate A person to present a written report at the next meeting on each of the various objects fostered by the Association. (b) One person from each church for membership on the Executive Committee, which person

shall be elected by the church as a nominee to the Association.

Article IV. The Clerk shall keep records of proceedings, print and distribute minutes; keep file of minutes, which shall be turned over to

successor.

Article V. The officers of the Association shall be the officers of the

Executive Committee,
The Executive Committee shall meet monthly, except when it feels there is no need for a meeting, at which time written reports from dif-ferent officers and committees shall be presented.

The Executive Committee shall appoint the following standing committees on: Sunday School, Training Union, Evangelism, Woman's Missionary Union, Brotherhood, Calendar of Activities, and such other commit-

ary Union, Brotherhood, Calendar of Activities, and such other committees as it needs to carry out its work.

The Associational Executive Committee at its June meeting, in cooperation with the standing committees of Sunday School, T. U., Brotherhood, etc., will nominate the Associational Sunday School Superintendent, Training Union Director, the Brotherhood President, etc., subject to the full approval of the Wekiwa Baptist Association expressed at its The Calendar of Activities Committee shall be responsible for preparing and publicizing a cordinated calendar of Associational Activities each year. The heads of the Associational organizations, Sunday School, Training Union, Woman's Missionary Union and Brotherhood shall submit proposed schedules of their meetings for consideration by the committee. Decisions of the committee shall be binding upon the organimittee. Decisions of the committee shall be binding upon the organizations except in the case of the W. M. U. quarterly meetings which may be adjusted so as to enable missionaries or state workers to address them, provided this does not conflict with other scheduled meetings. Other organizations may change their meeting dates if the change does not conflict with other scheduled meetings and if pastors and other leaders are notified two weeks in advance. Decisions of the Calendar of Activities Committee may be appealed to the Executive Committee. The committee shall present the Calendar of Activities not later than the last meeting of the Executive Committee prior to the Association meeting.

The Executive Committee shall appoint a Committee to prepare a budget, including all expenditures of all departments of the work and submit same to the Association for its approval.

The Program Committee shall be the Moderator, Clerk,

and Pastor of the entertaining church.

Article VII. These By-Laws may be altered or amended in the same years. manner as the Constitution.

THE PROCEEDINGS OF THE EIGHTY-FIFTH SESSION OF THE WEKIWA BAPTIST ASSOCIATION THURSDAY MORNING, OCTOBER 13, 1955

1. The eighty-fifth session of the Wekiwa Baptist Association was called to order by the Moderator Rev. V. Miles Patterson at 9:30 a.m.

2. Rev. Robert McAllister led the congregation in singing "All Hail the Power of Jesus' Name." Dr. J. Powell Tucker welcomed the Association and spoke of Pentecost, after which Brethren Bookhart, Music and Brown led in prayer.

3. Brother Vassar moved that the messengers present and those who might come later constitute the body of the Wekiwa Baptist Association to carry on whatever business necessary for the ongoing

5. Rev. McAllister moved that we adopt the printed program

for the Association.

Also weekly story papers: Upward, The Sentinel and Storytime. They also publish Church Bulletins. The grand total circulation of all publications for 1954, was 59, 644, 633. They also published over 3,000,000 volumes of books. The Home Mission Board had an average circulation of 122,375 copies of their monthly magazine, Home Missions.

The Foreign Mission Board had an average monthly circulation of

93, 580 copies of The Commission,

Besides this each state has its own Baptist Paper, either monthly or weekly. In Florida, we have The Florida Baptist Witness, a weekly paper of inspiration and information, showing the work of the churches in our state and around the world. Every Church should try to have this fine Baptist paper in its Church Budget, and have it sent to every Baptist family.

Most of our Baptist Literature is published for the purpose of promoting more personal Bible study by every individual Baptist for spiritual growth, knowledge, and missions, so we may strive to keep the Bible as our main text book in the Sunday School Class, Training Union and the home. WEKIWA ASSOCIATION ON BROTHERHOOD REPORT 1954-1955

We are happy to report that we have made a gain of 13 new Brotherhoods, and an increase of about 500 members in our Association this past year. We have held four regular, one special, and four executive meetings. We had an average attendance of 261 at our regular meetings. We now have Brotherhoods in 31 Churches and Missions with a total enrollment of around 1000 members.

The Brotherhoods were active in Cottage Prayer Meetings prior to our 1955 Evangelistic meetings. We are enlisting men to be leaders of our R.A.s so we will know how to lead them when the time comes for us to take over the R.A.s in 1957.

We had over 400 men and boys at our last quarterly meeting at

Camp Joy, the place was just bursting at the seams.

The Brotherhood work in Weikiwa continues to grow as well as the

work in Florida.

As of August 1, 1955, there were 620 churches in Florida reporting active Brotherhoods, according to the records in the State Brotherhood office. This is 75 new Brotherhoods in Florida this year.

Thirty-six of the 41 associations have active organizations, this

is an increase of 4 over last year.

The Brotherhood meeting on the eve of the Centennial Celebration of the Florida Baptist Convention at Daytona Beach, last year, was well attended. We are looking forward to a much larger attendance this year at Lakeland, on November 8.

Goals for 1956. In Florida.

A Brotherhood Clinic for our officers will be held on November 15, at Holden Heights Baptist Church, at 7:00 p.m. An invitation to the Seminole Association to join with us was extended to their officers.

30 Brotherhood sponsored revivals.

5000 Brotherhood Journals per quarter.

100 men from Florida to attend the Brotherhood Conferences at Ridgecrest in 1956.

Our plans for the future include the following.

1. In cooperation with the Florida Baptist Convention ten-year plan. 1000 Brotherhood orginizations. This means 56 new Brotherhoods per year net increase. We are running much ahead of this increase. 2. Every Association fully organized for Brotherhood work.

3. Thirty thousand men enrolled in Brotherhoods, or an increase

of 2 per-cent of the enrollment each year.

4. Every Brotherhood member tithing through the church.

In order that Florida men may serve our Lord more effectively, we further recommend that a Brotherhood organization be in every church.

That the men of Florida make plans to attend the Brotherhood conference at Ridgecrest, North Carolina, August 16-22, or the Florida Baptist Assembly at DeLand, June 7-14 where Brotherhood work will be offered nightly.

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

Southern Baptist are convinced of the essential importance of Christian Education in the world. Prompted by this ever-growing what other denominations are doing in their support of Christian

mission fields. What they are doing now compares favorably with conviction they have greatly increased their support of their seminaries and other educational institutions in this country and on Education.

Great strides in advancing the cause of Christian Education are as well as Alabama are among those states. Advances, not so striking being made in some of our southern states. North and South Carolina perhaps, are being made in other states in the South.

Florida Baptists in recent years have greatly increased their support of Christian Education, but they still lag far behind all other southern states in this respect. There is critical need at Stetson University for new buildings, a new, fireproof library building, a new Fine Arts building, a new science building, a new auditorium and chapel, new classrooms and new equipment. There are other vital needs which must be met if the University is to maintain its high standing among educational institutions.

Denominational colleges and universities must meet required educational standards if they expect to survive. Failure in this matter is a way of committing institutional sucide with all denominational loss invoived. Considering the vital importance of Christian Education in the kind of world in which we live, and the needs of our Baptist colleges and Stetson University, the future depends to a large extent on what the churches do now for these institutions.

REPORT OF CO-OPERATIVE MISSIONS

The State Board of Missions has assigned to the Co-operative Missions Department four parts of our work.

The promotion of Evangelism. Each year the Evangelistic Conference is held in Jacksonville at the First Baptist Church. Our next conference is scheduled for January 10-12, 1956. The out of state speakers are Dr. H. Leo Eddlemen, Dr. Fred F. Brown, and Dr. E.Y. Dossey.

The promotion and direction of a Program of City Missions. There are four areas, in which, we maintain a program of City Missions directed by the City Mission Superintendent.

Promote the Rural Mission Program. There are eleven such Districts with a missionary living in that area carrying on the work needed to project the full work of Florida Baptist.

The promotion of a sane program of Stewardship. This is done through the distribution of Tracts, Associational and Church Stewardship Revivals. We seek to keep our Stewardship Church centered and Bible centered.

Promote a program of Missionary Education. Emphasis is put on Mission Studies and reading our Missionary Journals, The Florida Baptist Witness, Home Mission Magazine, and the Commission. The churches are encouraged to put these Journals in their budgets.

During the past year the sixteen workers in this department reported 25 churches organized and 134 Missions now in operation. Twenty of these are in Eighth District, Eleven are in Wekiwa, 6 in the Seminole, and 6 in the Lake County.

We would like to suggest that our churches began thinking in terms of putting the item of associational mission in their local church budgets for at least 2 per cent of all undesignated receipts.

Let us increase our gifts to missions by starting that new unit of work.

5. That every church include gifts to missions through the Cooperative Program in its budget for a certain percentage of the total budget, rather than a certain number of dollars.

6. That every church prayerfully consider increasing the percentage

going to missions through the Cooperative Program.

REPORT ON THE FLORIDA BAPTIST CHILDREN'S HOME

The addition of two cottages in 1954 made it possible for Florida Baptists to increase the enrollment of the Home for the past Associational year. The report for 1953-54 stated that the total enrollment for the twelve month period was 168. The report for 1954-55 shows an increase of 24 children cared for on the campus of the Children's Home over the report of the previous year. The total number cared for this year in the Institution was 192. Twenty-two children received assistance through Mother's Aid, and one was taken care of in a boarding home. This gives a total of 215 under the supervision of the Home last year.

It has always been the policy of the administration of the Home to produce as much food as possible. They have an excellent dairy, which provides all the milk the Home needs. The beef herd supplies the meat, and the farm a high percent of the vegetables. They have caged hens which supply the eggs and the orange grove produces all

the fruit needed.

The increase in enrollment at the Home focuses attention on the necessity of an increase in income. The Home for 1954-55, received approximately 40 per-cent of its income from the Cooperative Program. This shows that 60 per-cent of the income must be gotten from other sources. These sources are Sunday Schools, church budgets, W.M.U., and non-church groups.

Income from wills, gifts from individuals, etc., are uncertain. They cannot be depended upon in the preparation of budgets or the admission of children. This makes it necessary that we emphasize the Thanksgiving Offering in every church. Our Children's Home must have a liberal offering at Thanksgiving if it is to keep the cottages filled to capacity and give assistance to the many children that need it.

We sincerely ask that you give prayerful consideration to helping the Home through your Sunday Schools, church budgets, birthday offerings, and the special offering at Thanksgiving. We must increase our income if we are to keep the buildings filled.

The above information is vital to the relationship of the Baptists

of Florida to the Childrens home in Lakeland, Florida.

Although the finance involved each year in the operation of the Home is small, it is second to none among the projects or objects of our affections.

The same Bible that teaches us to make believers of all nations also tell us to provide for the Fatherless as a gesture of pure religion and undefiled. James 1:27.

Our aim is to give these children all that is needed to grow them up physically into fine men and women with the best standards of moral and Christian training.

We urge the Thanksgiving offering, which will be made on November 20, 1955 to be more generous than ever before. \$100,000.00 from a thousand Churches would be fine.

We also urge the messengers to the Florida Baptists Convention meeting in Lakeland, November 8-10 to visit the Home and see our fine family of Children.

THE MOTHERS' DAY HOSPITAL FUND

Baptist Hospitals of Florida

Mothers' Day throughout the area of the Southern Baptist Convention has been proclaimed as Hospital Charity Day. For the first time the Baptist Hospitals of Florida Co-operated in a Mothers' Day charity Fund. The Mothers' Day Hospital Fund Committee was organized in Jacksonville on March 26, 1955. The Churches of Florida were asked to aid charity with their offering.

One hundred thirty-three Churches participated in the offering with a total of \$3,963,68. The estimate need for charity service, with the opening of the Baptist Memorial Hospital in Jacksonville, was \$75,000 per year.

The Mothers' Day Offering reported by thirty-eight Baptist Hospitals operating was \$562,375.69. The amount of charity service rendered by the same Hospitals amounted to \$2,258,162.80.

Baptist Hospitals are your instruments to administer the Lord's Command in the parable of the "Good Samaritan." Honor Mother by giving to this Charity Offering on Mothers' Day, May, 1956.

RELIEF AND ANNUITY BOARD 1954

Associational Report

As the year 1954 began with a tragedy for the Relief and Annuity Board in the death of Orville Groner, treasurer of the Board for over years, so it closed with another great loss in the passing of the executive secretary, Dr. Walter R. Alexander, on December 31. (He was succeeded by Dr. R. Alton Reed on March 9, 1955.)

Even so, it was a year of change and expansion in all departments of our work. Dr. R.S. Jones, associate secretary, was elected Supervisor of Investments; Mr. Owen Henley was elected Assistant Supervisor of Investments, and Mr. Fred W. Noe was elected Treasurer during the year.

The Ministers Retirement Plan was closed to new members and the Ministers Security Plan inaugurated in all states except North Carolina, as of July 1. The new Southern Baptist Protection Plan was inaugurated in all states except North Carolina, and the Baptist Boards Security Plan was promoted.

Assets increased \$4,888,919.88, to \$35,091,515.37. With such tremendous changes taking place, all departments experienced the effects of this growth. During the year, 15,554 certificates were issued.

The Relief Department, for the fourth consecutive year, failed to receive enough from the states to meet expenditures. If more money is not received in the future, the Board will be forced to curtail relief payments in those states where the relief offering was not sufficient to care for the needs.

Probably the most important news to the younger preachers of the Convention was the inauguration of the Southern Baptist Protection Plan. The benefits of this Plan are similar to the Ministers Security Plan, and the cost is the same. However, there is no ceiling on the annuity the pastor may earn, or on the annuity his widow may draw, whether his death occurs before or after retirement. The annuity is based on a one and one-half per-cent credit for each year of participation, and the widow annuity is a percentage of this. The Plan also has a lump sum death benefit, which is twice the amount of the annuity. The member may pay on a reduced salary basis should unforeseen difficulties arise. By "reduced salary", we mean that the member may pay dues on a much smaller salary than he actually receives.

There are at present some 29,000 churches in the Southern Baptist

Convention and over 26,000 active preachers. To many, the Relief and Annuity Board seems like a wealthy agency, but when we think of it in relation to the size of our Convention, the number of persons involved in the finances, the money invested in other boards, and the annuity funds of other denominations, we realize that the opportunities to grow are so vast that it is yet a day of small beginnings.

It is the goal of the Relief and Annuity Board to enlist new members and enroll all Southern Baptist Churches, to fund its retirement plans, to keep its present membership active, to enlist understanding among the seminary students, and to lead the preacher to an awareness of the importance of his denominational retirement program. It should be the goal of every association to strive to enlist every church and every pastor as a member of the retirement program.

REPORT ON SEMINARIES

Like all other phases and organizations of our Southern Baptist Convention, our five theological seminaries are steadily growing with a total enrollment during the 1954-55 session of 5,619. This enrollment is divided as follows:

This is an increase of 295 over the previous year. The great problem in all five of our seminaries is to provide enough buildings, equipment, and competent faculty members to meet the needs of the rapidly increasing student bodies.

SOUTHERN- LOUISVILLE, KENTUCKY

Immediate building needs include an office wing on the administration building to accomodate a growing faculty, and adequate library, and a women's dormitory (made necessary by the recent admission of women to the Seminary's Schools of Religious Education and Church Music.) The Seminary has established forty mission Sunday schools and churches during the past two years through its Mission Work Grant Fund. Four new faculty members were added to the staff during the past year. Sixty-three students were registered from Florida last year, forty-two of whom were graduates of Stetson University.

SOUTHWESTERN- FORT WORTH, TEXAS

Southwestern, the largest of our seminaries, is expanding with a \$5,000,000 building program and a renewed emphasis on an endowment program calling for \$5,000,000 by 1958. Library space has already been doubled. More classrooms and offices will soon be provided. Eight new faculty members were added to the staff during the year. Mission volunteers numbered 402.

The acute needs of Southwestern are additions to the faculty, enlargement of teaching facilities, addition of the student union and a small clinic for first aid nursing care to students and their building, erection of a nursery for the care of children of students, children.

NEW ORLEANS - NEW ORLEANS, LOUISIANA

This Seminary has completed its second session on its new seventy-five-acre campus, with the blessings of God on its training of His ministers. The School of Religious Education has recently entered a new building and now offers the finest training possibilities in this field. New Orleans Seminary ranks with the best in faculty, building, maintained for those wishing to take refresher work, or for Seminary credit. An extension department is maintained for those who cannot go to a seminary, and courses may be taken through extension classes or through correspondence.

GOLDEN GATE- BERKELEY, CALIFORNIA

Four students were appointed by the Foreign Mission Board and one appointed by the Home Mission Board during the spring months, bringing the total to twelve graduates under appointment by the Foreign Mission Board and sixteen by the Home Mission Board. Under the Practical Activities program, six missions were started, 17 new churches were organized, and 378 rescue mission and street services were held. Plans and specifications for the grading of the new campus site have been completed. Actual construction plans of buildings will begin in 1957, and the Seminary plans to occupy the new campus by 1959. The Seminary now has seventeen faculty members.

SOUTHEASTERN- WAKE FOREST, NORTH CAROLINA

This Seminary has completed its fourth year of operation. Religious Education courses sufficient for the degrees of Bachelor of Divinity and Master of Theology are now offered. Southeastern Seminary will have full use of the complete campus after June, 1956, when the remaining part of Wake Forest College will be removed. A program of renovation and remodeling will then be started. Apartments and a cafeteria must be built and equipped. By September, 1956, it is hoped that all qualified students who apply may be accepted. Twenty students from Florida were enrolled during the past term.

The seminaries continue to be grateful for the confidence of fellow Baptists, expressed by their prayers and financial support through the

Cooperative Program.

REPORT ON TEMPERANCE

Are we at war with the liquor traffic? In 1954 more than 50 million gallons of beer, 5 million gallons of legal whiskey, and 2 million gallons of wine were drunk, or an amount equal to 21 gallons of Alocholic Beverages for every man, woman, and child in the state of Florida.

This has cost wage earners over 206 million dollars. Think of this amount of money being passed over the counters of bars, liquor stores, grocery stores, and many other, respectable stores, selling beer,

going into the greedy hands of the liquor crowd.

From this 29 million dollars were collected for taxes, and some of it used to care for indigent people, as well as some of the aged folks, is the claim of the liquor crowd. This amount of taxes pays only about one-fifth of the mounting institutional and welfare cost in Florida, not counting the broken homes, in body and spirit, damaged lives and damned souls of its victims.

We Baptists gave \$6500.00 or an average of less than 2 pennies per member for the support of this work during 1954. While we were working and giving with all our strength for the various causes such as, Red Cross, Red Feather, Polio, Heart Fund, Cancer, however important these may be liquor has been responsible for more deaths

directly and indirectly, than all the others combined. Yet, we go down to the polls and vote to unloose hell upon our children, by licensing the liquor traffic. Are we at war?

There are over 90 thousand Alocholics in the State of Florida now. If we knew that we had this number of T. B. patients, would we try to do any thing about it? We are doing everything possible to stamp out these dreadful things, but nothing is being done about the liquor as we ought to do.

WEKIWA W. M. U. REPORT FOR 1955

It is my happy privilege as Associational W. M. U. president to bring together the facts and figures relating to all phases of our work and thus present a comprehensive report of the Women's Missionary Union. Each fact and figure tells a story of the thirty-five missionary societies in Wekiwa Assocation consisting of 1494 women and 1031

young people, totaling 2525 members. It has been said, "Missions wait upon stewardship" - if the gospel of Jesus Christ is to reach to the uttermost part of the earth, christian people must be faithful stewards. Our records show 677 women and 316 young people tithed this year, a gain of 254 tithers over last year, Also, there were 1644 contributing to the cooperative program. Reports on special offerings reveal a total of \$5,103.84 was given to Lottie Moon Christmas offering, \$2,404.81 to Annie Armstrong offering and \$512.48 to state mission offering.

Jesus told his followers to "Go home to thy friends and tell them how great things the Lord hath done for thee"- is not this the command to community missions? 981 of our members took part in directed community missions and 330 family altars were established.

The keen interest in missions, and the sincere desire to know the needs around the world, is shown by the fact that 1293 women were enrolled in mission study classes during the year. 1229 reported as having read at least one mission book. There were 117 mission classes held for our young people and 415 of them read a mission book.

Cash gifts of \$185.00 and 93,356 redeemable coupons have been

sent to the Children's Home in Lakeland.

The Florida girls attending our training schools have been re-

membered with fruit and cards.

The camp committee feel fortunate in securing Rev. and Mrs. C. K. Byerley to take over the management of the physical properties of Camp Joy. A cottage has been renovated for them and a phone installed so that all reservations for use of the camp may be made directly to them. Many improvements have been made to the buildings and grounds, namely: Rest rooms and showers with hot and cold water, \$2,000.00 Retaining wall around the swimming pool, \$600.00 New kitchen equipment, \$400.00 Screened porch and jalousy windows to cottage for new camp superintendent,\$600.00. Trees and grass planted.

Let us keep the welfare of the camp on our hearts, for in so doing we are providing wholesome recreation and spiritual training of our

youth.

There is increasing interest in the White Cross work which provides surgical supplies and medicines to the Baptist hospitals in Eku and Shaki, Nigeria, and most recently to Asuncion, Paraguay. An estimated \$7000.00 worth of supplies have been shipped since last October.

The challenge of those immortal words, "Go ye into all the world and tell the story of Jesus' love, rings loud today amidst the clamor of confusion and unrest! May we be alerted to our responsibilities and determined to march on for the glory of God!

REPORT OF THE WEKIWA ASSOCIATIONAL W. M. U. YOUTH LEADER. 1954-1955

As we stand on the threshold of a new year working with Young People, and looking back over the past year truly we can say with the Master, "The harvest is white but the laborers are few, pray ye the Lord of the harvest that He will send forth laborers into His harvest."

We are gratified by the work done by those who have been faithful to His calling and urge each and everyone to continue in the

work this year.

Not only do we need workers but also we need for them to stay in the work until the Lord shows them He needs them elsewhere. With Counselors and Directors changing each year we are continually in the beginning state. I sincerely believe when a Director or Counselor is doing good work, they should be asked to continue building on the foundation laid previously.

During the year we have had 83 reporting auxiliaries, with a total membership of 1031. Of this number,64 are Sunbeam babies. We have had 19 auxiliaries to follow the Stewardship plans as laid out in their auxiliary magazines for the full year. The average number present when these plans were studied was 402 per quarter. We had 316 tithers for the year and 664 giving to the Co-operative Program.

In Community Missions 15 auxiliaries carried out the directed work for the full year with an average number of 339 participating

each quarter.

By 22 Auxiliaries were observed all the three Seasons of Prayer. There were 117 Mission Study classes and 415 mission books read.

The summer Associational Camp program was extented to four wecks, one each for Junior girls and boys and Intermediate girls and boys. There was a total of 185 attending these weeks with twelve conversions and 57 dedications or re-dedications. Junior and Intermediate books on Baptist beliefs were taught. Our missionaries were; Dr. and Mrs. D. F. Stamps, Miss Bonnie Jean Ray, Rev. B. D. Locke and Rev. and Mrs. W. A. Hickman. The mission offering was \$70.00, which went to Rev. Hickman's work in Paraquay.

In the Association there are 16 churches having a Sunbeam and one other auxiliary. There are 4 W. M. U.s with at least one each auxiliary. These are Kissimmee, North Park, Killarney and Orlando,

In girls Auxiliary we have, 84 Maidens, 40 Ladies-in-waiting,

Princesses, 13 Queens and 1 Honor Queen.

In Royal Ambassadors we have, 45 Pages, 23 Squires, 20 Knights, 14 Ambassadors, 1 Honor Ambassador, 2 Ambassador Extra-Ordinary and 1 Ambassador Plenipotentiary.

During the year we have had, 4 R. A. Conclave meetings, 3 R. A. Advisory meetings, 1 G. A. & R. A. "Hi Rankers" dinner, 1 Sunbeam day camp with 134 present, 1 Associational R. A. Recognition Service with 13 recognized, 1 Young People's Rally with Marshall KU as speaker, 4 quarterly reports to W. M. U., 4 Counselor's Conferences, 4 weeks of Associational camps and a ten hour Leadership Course.
