

# Recommendations of the Committee on Constitution and By-laws.

Recommended changes will involve both the form and content of our present Constitution and By-Laws. Therefore, it would be as follows:

## CONSTITUTION

of Wekiwa Baptist Association

Article I, Name

The Name of this Association is the Wekiwa Baptist Association.

Article II, Object

The Object of this Association shall be the promotion of fellowship among the churches; the extension of the kingdom of our Lord Jesus Christ by the thorough evangelization of its territory; and the providing of a convenient means for the cooperation of the churches in their work and an efficient agency for their enlistment in missions, education, and benevolences as expressed in all the work of the Florida Baptist Convention, and of the Southern Baptist Convention.

\*Article III, Doctrines

The Doctrines of the Association, which shall be the basis of fellowship and cooperation, are those in the Statement of Faith adopted by the Southern Baptist Convention in Kansas City on May 9, 1963.

#### BY-LAWS

#### Article I, Membership

Section 1. The Association shall be composed of messengers from Baptist churches of Orange County and from Baptist churches of contiguous counties that wish to cooperate in carrying out the object of the Association as set forth in Article II of this Constitution.

\*Section 2. Each member church shall be entitled to six (6) Messengers for the first one hundred (100) or fraction thereof of its resident members, one of whom may be its pastor, and one (1) Messenger for each fifty (50) of its resident members, or fraction thereof, above the first one hundred (100) resident members. No member church shall be entitled to more than fifteen (15) Messengers. The individual church, according to its own rules and methods, shall elect and shall certify these Messengers to the Association in its Annual Letter to the Association.

Section 3. New churches applying for admission into the Association

shall furnish satisfactory evidence of being sound in doctrine and orderly in practice through the Committee on Petitionary Letters to the Executive Committee on or before October 1 of the year in which such such application is to be considered. They are encouraged to present their petition prior to the September Executive Committee Meeting. If upon examination, they are found to be sound they may be admitted to membership. These petitions along with information, in writing, as to their doctrinal views and practice may be presented to the Executive Committee at any regular meeting between annual meetings of the Association prior to October 1. After a petition is presented the pastor of the petitioning church may be made a member of the Executive Committee, by a majority vote of the Committee, until the petitioning church, the Committee shall give assistance to the church in putting its petition and credentials in order for presentation to the Association.

Section 4. The Association shall have no power to control or interfere with the rights of the churches, but may act in an advisory capacity to the churches if requested by the local churches involved. It shall have power to refuse seats to messengers from any church which is found to be unsound in faith or practice.

Section 5. Any church which fails to be represented for three consecutive years at the annual meeting may be denied continual representation in the Association upon recommendation of the Executive Committee.

Section 6. In case of special meetings the messengers of the last preceding meeting shall constitute the body, except where churches elect and certify new messengers.

#### Article II, Meetings

Section 1. The Association shall meet annually at such time and place as it may select. If the Association should fail to select the time and place of its next annual meeting, the Executive Committee shall act for the body. If it should be necessary to change the time or place the Executive Committee is authorized to act for the body.

Section 2. The Association shall meet in a one night semi-annual meeting in April or May for the purposes of spiritual inspiration, electing organizational leaders for the next year, and for any other business necessary. This meeting is to be held in lieu of the regular organizational meetings in April or May.

Section 3. In cases of emergency the moderator, in consultation with the Executive Committee, may call special meetings of the Association.

#### Article III, Officers

Section 1. The officers of this Association shall be Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, and Associate Treasurer, who shall be elected annually from the messengers of the Association. Their terms of office shall begin immediately at the close of each

annual Associational Meeting, and they shall serve until their successors are elected and qualified. (See Section 4 below.) Election shall be by ballot, except when there is only one nominee for a given office. In such case the election shall be by acclamation, or designated ballot. No person shall be elected more than twice in succession to the office of Moderator of this Association.

Section 2. In addition to the general officers, the Association shall elect heads of the various Departments, namely: Sunday School Superintendent, Training Union Director, Woman's Missionary Union President, Brotherhood President, Music Director and such other department heads as may be authorized by the Association.

Section 3. Vacancies occurring between the annual and semi-annual meetings of the Association shall be filled by the Executive Committee.

Section 4. The Associational Clerk shall be elected at the semiannual meetings of the Association and will assume his duties immediately.

#### Article IV, Duties of the Officers

Section 1. It shall be the duty of the Moderator to preside over the deliberations of the Association, Executive Committee, and to discharge such other duties as are generally incumbent on such office in deliberative bodies; and to appoint such special committees as will facilitate the work of the Association.

Section 2. The Vice-Moderator shall perform all the duties of the Moderator in the absence of the Moderator; he may also preside over the deliberations of the Association when requested to do so by the Moderator.

Section 3. The Treasurer shall take charge of all money for Associational purposes, holding the same subject to the orders of the Association, for the Executive Committee, and make a full report of all receipts and disbursements at each annual meeting of the Association, and to the regular meetings of the Executive Committee.

Section 4. It shall be the duty of the Clerk to:

1. Make, correct, and superintend the printing and distribution of the Minutes of the Association, for which labor and responsibility he shall receive a fair compensation as agreed upon by the Association;

2. Collect and keep on file the minutes of the annual Association Meeting, and any other data in the Associational Minutes, the Historical Tables of the Association from its beginning:

3. The Clerk is empowered to appoint an assistant by common con-

sent of the Executive Committee.

\*Section 5. The Associate Treasurer shall have the responsibility of assisting the Treasurer in the fulfilling of his duties as outlined in Article IV, Section 3.

#### Article V, Executive Committee

Section 1. The Executive Committee shall be composed of:

The officers of the Association, general and departmental,
 All pastors of churches and missions cooperating with the Asso-

ciation, provided they hold membership in some church cooperating with the Florida Baptist Convention,

3. One lay-member from each church,

4. Any church that is sponsoring a mission or missions shall be authorized to send the mission pastor or pastors to become in every respect a full participating and voting member of the Executive Committee,

5. The Executive Committee shall conduct the business of the Association between the annual meetings according to the Program of

Work approved by the Association in its annual session.

Section 2. Meetings of the Executive Committee shall be held on

the Monday after the second Sunday of each month.

Section 3. Quorum - At all regular and special meetings, fifteen (15) members shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business. Section 4. The Executive Committee shall:

1. Carry out the will of the Association as expressed by that body in regular session.

2. Transact all business of the Association ad interim.

3. Coordinate and correlate, as far as possible, all Associational activities, and

4. Lead the Association in a constructive and aggressive Missionary program at all times.

#### Article VI. Committees

Section 1. \*The new Moderator of the Association shall appoint a Committee on Committees at the annual association meeting in which he is elected and their duties shall be to:

1. Nominate the following Committees and their Chairman.

(1) Place and Preacher - It shall be their responsibility to recomment the place and preacher for semi-annual and annual meetings.

(2) Resolutions - All resolutions submitted to the body shall be referred to this committee for consideration and recommendations, unless otherwise ordered by the Association.

(3) Nominations - It shall be the duty of this committee to nom-

inate:

A. The heads of departments who shall bring a slate of their officers for the approval of the Association in their annual report to the Association.

B. A person to present a written report at the next meeting on each of the various objects fostered by the Association for which there is no designated committee.

C. Trustees of the Wekiwa Baptist Association Holding Company and Angebilt Baptist Home, Inc.

D. Any other such officers as may be designated by the Association.

(4) Program - The Program Committee shall be the Moderator, Clerk, and Pastor of the entertaining church or churches.

\*(5) Calendar - The Calendar of Activities Committee shall be

responsible for preparing and publicizing a coordinated calendar of Associational activities each year. The heads of the Associational organization; Sunday School, Training Union, W.M.U., Brotherhood, and Music; shall submit proposed schedules of their meetings for consideration by the committee. Decisions of the committee shall be binding upon the organizations. Quarterly meetings which may be adjusted so as to enable missionaries and state workers to address them, provided this does not conflict with other scheduled meetings. Other organizations may change their meeting dates if the change does not conflict with other scheduled meetings and if pastors and other leaders are notified two weeks in advance. Decisions of the Calendar Of Activities Committee may be appealed to the Executive Committee prior to the Associational Meeting.

\*(6) Personnel - this committee shall be composed of five (5) members. The committee shall screen all of those nominated to them by the appropriate committee for employment by the association. It shall recommend the employment, or dismissal of employed personnel to the Executive Committee or the

Association in annual session.

It shall be requested to: A. Make and revise as needed a job study and evaluation of

B. Write and revise as needed a job description for each paid position in the association.

C. Write and revise as needed a manual of office procedures, policies, and salary structures for all employees.

D. If any individual has a suggestion regarding an employee of the association, it is requested that it be put in writing and given to this committee.

(7) Evangelism - The Evangelism Committee shall be in keeping with State and Southwide plans for such committees.

\*(8) Missions - The Missions Committee shall be composed of SIX (6) members, elected for three (3) years, with one third retiring each year. The responsibility of this committee shall be: To establish points of mission need, to encourage churches to sponsor Missions, and promote such other mission programs within the Association as the need may require. The Missions Committee may appoint any necessary committees in order to expedite the work.

(9) Memorial - The Committee on Memorials shall consist of three (3) members. It shall list all deceased members of the churches during the year and make preparations for suitable memorial services during the annual meeting of the

Association.

(10) Stewardship - The Stewardship Committee shall be in keeping with State and Southwide plans for such committees and promote Christian Stewardship in the Association.

(11) Budget and Finance - The Budget Committee shall be com-

posed of:

A. Three (3) members elected for three (3) years, with onethird retiring each year-(Rotation).

B. The Associational Clerk and Treasurer are ex-officio

members of the Budget Committee.

The duties of the Budget and Finance Committee are: \*A. To draw up, recommend and present an annual proposed budget to the Executive Committee in its April meeting,

with full adoption of the proposed budget at the annual meeting of the Association.

B. To Guide the Association in raising the proposed budget. C. To give guidance to all of the Association finance during

the vear.

D. The heads of the departments, and any committee chairman with budget needs, will turn in a proposed budget of their particular needs, in writing, to the Budget Committee at the time of the Executive Committee meeting in March.

(12) Office Committee - The duties of this committee shall be to cooperate with the Field Secretary in the supervision of the associational office. The duties of this committee does not include the supervision of office personnel.

(13) Petitioning Letters

2. Fill Committee vacancies that may occur during the year through

the Executive Committee.

\*Section 2. The above named committees, including the Committee on Committees, shall assume office at the close of the annual session at which they were elected and shall serve until replaced.

#### Article VII, Parliamentary Procedures

Section 1. Roberts Rules of Order, Revised, shall be the parliamentary authority for the Association and for the Executive Committee.

Section 2. The Association may adopt special rules, if desired, not in conflict with this Constitution or generally accepted parliamentary procedure.

Section 3. All questions shall be determined by a majority vote unless otherwise directed by the Constitution.

#### \*Article VIII, Amendments

This Constitution and By-Laws may be amended at any annual

meeting of the association by a two-thirds (2/3) vote of the members present and voting provided that notice of such change shall have been given to the Executive Committee meeting at least thirty days previous to the Associational meeting and that notice of such change be given to the Association on the first day of such meeting.

# Articles Of Incorporation

#### I. NAME

The name of the corporation shall be WEKIWA BAPTIST ASSOCIATION, INC., and it shall maintain its office in Orange County, Florida.

#### II. OBJECT AND PURPOSE

The general object and purpose for which the corporation is organized is to provide a medium through which autonomous Baptist churches cooperating with the Florida Baptist Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention and maintaining New Testament principles located in the counties or portions thereof known as WEKIWA BAPTIST ASSOCIATION AREA in Orange. Seminole and Osceola Counties, may:

(a) Promote fellowship and cooperation among the Baptist Churches, who are members hereof;

(b) Promote the cause of Missions generally and, particularly, to assist in the establishment of new churches, Sunday schools, missions, schools, good-will centers, retirement centers, camps, assemblies, hospitals, and such other institutions and agencies for education, evangelism, benevolence and charity, as shall advance the cause of Christ in all of its member churches and missions and in the community;

(c) To promote and encourage cooperation in the programs and work fostered by WEKIWA BAP-TIST ASSOCIATION, FLORIDA BAPTIST CON-VENTION, and SOUTHERN BAPTIST CONVEN-TION, particularly in the field of evangelism,

education and missions.

#### III. MEMBERSHIP

THE WEKIWA BAPTIST ASSOCIATION, a non-profit corporation, as presently constituted, consists of the following member Baptist Churches, whose names are commonly referred to as:

each of which shall become members under these Articles of Incorporation.

Other Baptist churches may be admitted to membership in this Association by making application through the Executive Committee of the Association on or before October 1st of the year in which such application is to be considered. Upon the favorable recommendation of said Committee, such application shall then be considered on the first day of the annual meeting of the Association, and, if such application for membership is approved by a majority vote of the Messengers present, said Baptist Church shall be entitled to full membership in the Association.

All member churches shall be entitled to representation and mem-

bership by and through their Messengers.

Each member church shall be entitled to six (6) Messengers for the first one hundred (100) or fraction thereof of its resident members, one of whom may be its pastor, and one (1) Messenger for each fifty (50) of its resident members, or fraction thereof, above the first one hundred (100) resident members. No member church shall be entitled to more than fifteen (15) Messengers. The individual church. according to its own rules and methods, shall elect and shall certify these Messengers to the Association in its Annual Letter to the Association.

Membership in the Association shall be completely voluntary on the part of Baptist Churches, and such membership may be withdrawn by action of a church upon written notice of such withdrawal filed with the Moderator. However, a church that has been extended the privilege of membership in the Association and desires to withdraw shall be requested to give in writing to the Moderator its reasons for withdrawal of membership. The Association through its Executive Committee, shall seek to reclaim or reconcile any such circle.

Should any church of this Association become unfaithful and disloyal in matters of practices, conduct, or preaching of doctrines contrary to those acceptable to the churches composing the Wekiwa Baptist Association, it shall be the duty of the Executive Committee to inquire concerning the unfaithfulness and disloyalty endeavoring to reclaim or reconcile such church, and failing to accomplish this objective, shall recommend such action to the Association as it deems necessary, in keeping with Article III of the By-Laws. Any action on the part of the Association shall require a two-thirds (2/3) majority vote of those present and voting.

#### IV. TERM OF EXISTENCE

This corporation shall have perpetual existence.

#### VI. MANAGEMENT OF CORPORATION AND TIME OF ELECTION OR APPOINTMENT

The affairs of the corporation shall be conducted and managed between the annual meetings by the Executive Committee.

The offices named in the foregoing paragraph, together with all of the pastors of the member churches and missions, one (1) Baptist layman from each Baptist Church, and such others as may be provided in the By-Laws, shall constitute the Executive Committee.

The Executive Committee shall meet as provided by the By-Laws.

#### VII. TIME OF ELECTION

The Moderator, Vice-Moderator, and Treasurer shall be elected annually at the annual meeting of the Association in October of each year.

The Clerk, Associate Clerk, and organizational department heads shall be nominated at the March Executive Meeting of the Association, by the nominating committee and presented to the semi-annual meeting of the Association in April or May of each year. The Clerk and Associate Clerk shall take office at the close of the semi-annual meeting.

The heads of departments shall bring a slate of their officers for the approval of the Association, in their annual reports to the Association in October of each year and they, with all other officers except the Clerk and Associate Clerk, shall take office at the close of the annual meeting of the Association.

The members of the Executive Committee shall be elected at the annual meeting and shall take office at the close of the annual meeting. All elective and appointive officers shall be for a term of one (1) year, ending at the close of the annual meeting of the Association, unless otherwise provided for in the By-Laws.

The officers named in Paragraph V. together with the first Executive Committee elected at the annual meeting, the pastors of the member churches and the pastors of their missions, and the laymembers, as provided in Article VIII., shall constitute the first officers under these Articles of Incorporation and shall serve until the next semi-annual or annual meeting, as provided for in these Articles.

#### VIII. CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICERS

The Moderator, or in his absence or incapacity, the Vice-Moderator, together with the Clerk, or in his absence or incapacity, the Associate Clerk, shall be the Chief Executive Officers of the Corporation, who shall have the autority to sign and execute all legal documents authorized by the corporation.

#### IX. ANNUAL MEETINGS AND SEMI-ANNUAL MEETINGS

Annual meetings of the Association shall be held in October of each year, as provided in the By-Laws.

Semi-annual meetings of the Association shall be held in April or

May of each year, as provided by the By-Laws.

The purpose of the semi-annual and annual meetings shall be to elect the officers of the Association for the next ensuing year, as provided herein; elect the members of the Executive Committee; consider applications for membership of new Baptist churches; approve Messengers; receive reports of all of the agencies and departments of WEKIWA BAPTIST ASSOCIATION, FLORIDA BAPTIST CONVENTION, SOUTHERN BAPTIST CONVENTION, and other institutions and agencies fostered by the Wekiwa Baptist Association; appoint standing and special committees; consider amendments to the By-Laws or Certificate of Incorporation; make plans for the cooperative efforts of the member churches for the future, and do all other things considered necessary and proper to promote the spiritual growth and interest of the Baptist churches.

#### X. SPECIAL MEETINGS

The Moderator shall have authority to call a special meeting of the Executive Committee provided written notice of the time, place and purpose of such special meeting is mailed to each member of the Executive Committee at least five (5) days prior to such meeting.

The Executive Committee shall have authority to call a special meeting of the Association provided written notice stating the time, place and purpose of such special meeting is mailed to each church and mission at least thirty (30) days prior to such meeting.

## XI. BY-LAWS, CHARTER, AND AMENDMENTS THERETO

The present Constitution and By-Laws of WEKIWA BAPTIST ASSOCIATION as approved at the 1957 meeting of said Association and/or as later amended, shall constitute the By-Laws of this Association upon the Articles of Incorporation becoming effective.

The By-Laws may be made, altered or rescinded, and the Articles of Incorporation may be amended by a two-thirds (2/3) vote of the Messengers present and voting at any annual meeting. Any proposed changes in the By-Laws or Articles of Incorporation shall be read at a meeting of the Executive Committee at least thirty (30) days prior to the annual meeting.

## ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION

### OF WEKIWA BAPTIST ASSOCIATION HOLDING COMPANY

We, the undersigned as representative members of Baptist Churches belonging to the Wekiwa Baptist Association, Inc., hereby form ourselves and our successors into a corporation not for profit under the corporate name of WEKIWA BAPTIST ASSOCIATION HOLDING COMPANY, of Orlando, Florida, and hereby adopt the following articles of incorporation:

#### ARTICLE I.

The name of this corporation shall be WEKIWA BAPTIST ASSO-CIATION HOLDING COMPANY, and it is located at Orlando, Orange County, Florida.

#### ARTICLE II.

To issue bonds, notes, debentures and evidences of indebtedness, and to secure the same by mortgage, deed of trust or otherwise.

This corporation is organized primarily for the purpose of holding the title to such property or properties as the said WEKIWA BAPTIST ASSOCIATION HOLDING COMPANY shall, from time to time, purchase or acquire, and it shall have power, from time to time, to make such contracts and to do such things as shall be authorized and directed by the said Wekiwa Baptist Association, Inc. - 11. Our associational treasurer, Bob New, presented his mimeographed report and moved for its adoption. Seconded and so adopted. He cited the need for all of our churches to participate in our as-

sociational program.

12. Bro. Rudy Fagan moved that we accept all other reports listed under our departmental heads even though their leaders weren't

present to give them. Seconded and so moved.

13. Bro. Edgar Cooper moved that the Moderator recognize our visitors and that it would be up to the discretion of our Moderator in regards to their participation in the discussions on the floor. Seconded and so moved. Walter B. Knight, one time pastor of the Miller Memorial Baptist Church, introduced himself, stating that he had been Clerk in our association 1926-28.

14. Bro. Forrest Thompson led us in singing "Are Ye Able? Said

the Master", accompanied by Bro. W. H. Baker.

- 15. Bro. James Haskins introduced Bro. Rudy Fagan, Chairman of the Retirement Center Committee, who in turn distributed mimeographed materials concerning their progress in striving to carry out the wishes of the Executive Committee in regards to having a Retirement Center. He asked us to study this as we would be considering this matter at the evening session.
- 16. Also during the time of announcements and miscellaneous business, the need for two churches to turn in their church letters was cited by the clerk. Bro. Haskins recognized a new Minister of Education, Richard R. Sparks of North Park; and Richard Milham, the new pastor of Powers Drive.

17. Bro. R. D. Gregg moved for the adoption of his report on Baptist Hospitals. Seconded and so adopted. Bro. Gregg mentioned the work of our newest Baptist Hospital in Miami, which is owned and

operated by the Baptist Churches in and around Miami.

18. Bro. Ted Brocksmith read his report on the American Bible Society and moved for its adoption. Seconded and so adopted. It will be included in our Annual.

19. Bro. Ted Brocksmith also called our attention to the Report of the Committee on the Calendar of Activities as found in the Book of Reports, and stated that if there should be any changes to be

made, they should be called to the committee's attention.

20. Bro. Edgar Cooper moved for the adoption of his report on United Christian Action as found in the Book of Reports. Seconded and so adopted. He spoke briefly on this report stating that each church should get the monthly magazine put out by United Christian Action, entitled: ALERT. We should foster programs of education in our churches against the evils of alcohol, narcotics and pornographic literature.

21. In the absence of Jerry Glaze, who was to give the report on Baptist Literature, Bro. Girod Cole moved for the adoption of this report as given in the Book of Reports. Seconded and so adopted.

22. Bro. Girod Cole took a count of the number of Messengers

staying for the noon meal, which was about 170.

- 23. Harold Epperson, Chairman of the Committee on Constitutional Changes, had mimeographed copies of the proposed changes distributed to the Messengers and he moved that we should consider these changes one at a time. Seconded and so ordered.
  - 1. Bro. Epperson moved that we adopt the change in its form.

Seconded and so adopted.

2. Harold Epperson moved that we adopt the changes that would help our constitution to conform to the same things as found in

The Articles of Incorporation. Seconded and so changed.

3. Bro. Epperson moved that we adopt the change suggested by the committee in regards to Sec. 2 of Art. I to read; Each member church shall be entitled to six (6) Messengers for the first hundred (100) or fraction thereof of its resident members. (The rest of it remains the same as before.) Seconded and so adopted. This would make it the same as in the Articles of Incorporation.

4. Harold Epperson moved that we change the language in Art. III, Sec. 2, naming the various departmental leaders' titles. Instead of Sunday School, state Sunday School Superintendent, etc.

Seconded and so named.

5. Bro. Epperson moved for the addition of the office of an Associate

Treasurer under Art. IV, Sec. 5. Seconded and so added.

6. Harold Epperson moved for the change of provision under Art. VI. Committees, Sec. 1, to read: The NEW Moderator of the association shall appoint a Committee on Committees at the annual meeting in which he is elected and their duties shall be to: Seconded and so changed.

7. Bro. Epperson moved that we add to Ar. VI, Sec. 1, B-A person to present a written report at the next meeting on each of the various objects fostered by the Association for which there is no

designated committee. Seconded and so changed.

- 8. Harold Epperson moved that under Art. VI, Sec. 1 (3) C. to read: Trustees of the Wekiwa Baptist Association Holding Company and Angebilt Baptist Home, Inc. Seconded and after some discussion, so moved.
- 9. Bro. Epperson moved that we delete the words: except in the case of the W.M.U. Quarterly meetings, as found under Art. VI, Sec. 1, (5) Seconded and so changed.

10. Harold Epperson moved that under Art. VI, Sec. 1, we add (6)

a Personnel Committee. Seconded and so added.

11. Bro. Epperson moved that we delete under Art. VI, Sec. 1, (8) The committee shall annually elect their own officers. Seconded and

12. Harold Epperson moved that we change the language under Art. VI, Sec. 1 (9) from Obituaries to Memorial. Seconded and so

changed.

13. Bro. Epperson moved that we delete: by the Executive Committee in the March meeting upon recommendation of the Nominating Committee. It will be done at the annual meeting. Under Art. VI, Sec. 1, (11) Seconded and so moved.

14. Harold Epperson moved that under Art. VI, Sec. 2 to read: The above named committees, including the Committee on Committees, shall assume office at the close of the annual meeting at which they were elected and shall serve until replaced. Seconded and so moved.

15. Bro. Epperson moved that in Art. VIII we add: And By-Laws, and have the language brought in line with that of the Art. of Inc. Seconded and so added.

16. Harold Epperson moved that we delete the 12 By-Laws as found in the old Constitution. Seconded and so stricken.

17. Bro. Epperson moved that we adopt the constitution with all of these approved changes. Seconded and so adopted in toto.

24. Forrest Thompson called our attention to his report on Radio and T.V. as found in the Book of Reports, and moved for its adoption. Seconded and so adopted.

25. Bro. Clyde Spear moved for the adoption of his report on Evangelism as found in the Book of Reports, seconded and so adopted.

26. Harold Dann presented Col. William Lynes report on the Stetson Extension Center as found in the Book of Reports. Seconded and so moved. Bro. Dann stated that Bro. Lynes was leaving our state, so

he would have to be replaced.

27. (1) Bro. Rudy Fagan suggested that we proceed with the election of our officers. Bro. Edgar Cooper nominated our present Moderator, James S. Haskins to be Moderator, seconded. Bro. Haskins called on the Clerk, Bro. Bob Mcallister to come to the platform and act as our Moderator, which he did. Bro. Fred Farris moved that nominations cease and that we elect Bro. - 31. William Hickman read from the 10th. chapter of Matthew beginning with verse 32. Our people don't want to be disturbed, so we don't preach against sin enough. We should preach God's Word, no matter what the cost to the preacher. Preach with the principle of God's love in our hearts.
- 32. Bro. Hickman led in our closing prayer asking God's blessing on the food and the fellowship. Our first session closed at 12:35.

THURSDAY EVENING SESSION - SECOND SESSION

33. James Haskins, our Moderator called our second session to order at 7:30 P.M. having our Host Pastor, Girod Cole, lead us in our opening song - "To God Be The Glory" accompanied by Mrs. Jane McInvale at the piano.

34. Donald Jones of Tangelo led us in our worship service reading from the 17th chapter of John, the Lord's Prayer, and then led us in

our opening prayer.

35. Bro. Haskins called for the introduction of new Ministers and the following men introduced themselves: C. N. 'Speed' Bryen, Minister of Education at Delaney Street; Sherman C. Hart, Jr., Mission Pastor of Trinity's Mission; Jimmy Curry, Pastor of the Lake Whippoorwill Baptist Church; Johnny Blair, Minister of Music at Friendship; Mary Lib Morris, Educational Secretary at PineCastle, First. Recognized Chaplain Jolly from McCoy AFB. Bob McAllister called our attention to one of our former Clerks, R. M. Moore, who served in our association in 1919.

36. Girod Cole moved that we ask Alvin G. Hause of Florida Shores

to serve as our Parliamentarian, seconded and so ordered.

37. Our Wekiwa Ministries:

(1) IN HOSPITALS: Our Hospital Chaplain, Bro. T. W. Page, described his ministry of hospital visitation stating that he had made 2,483 visits during the year. He shared some of his rich experiences in helping those in need of spiritual help. Moved for its adoption, seconded and so adopted.

(2) TO THE MIGRANTS: Our Migrant Coordinator, L. E. McRae explained his ministry to the various Migrant Camps in our association. His report is added to the Book of Reports. He moved for its adoption, seconded and so adopted. Bro. McRae recognized his wife and stated that they had recently celebrated

their Golden Wedding Anniversary.

(3) THROUGH CAMP JOY: Howard Long of Plymouth and Chairman of this Committee spoke on the improvements at the camp and stated that as time went on more churches were making use of the camp. He showed a slide of the property with the various buildings, and where other buildings will be located. He moved for the adoption of his report, seconded and so approved.

(4) ON THE AIR: Our Director, Forrest Thompson, had a recording he had made presented over the public address system. His report was adopted at the morning session.

B. FUTURE MINISTRIES?:

(1) TO YOUTH IN TROUBLE: Tom Ellington, Chairman of the Committee on Juvenile Rehabilitation, reported on the progress being made in our association in regards to this great need. He stated that there were over 800 cases before the court during the Summer months. He mentioned our beginning the Pastor's Day in Court this month and that the Juvenile officials were very much impressed and pleased with the help of our Pastors and this type of work will continue even after we should have a full time director of this work. Bro. Ellington moved that we hire a

full-time Director for our Juvenile Rehabilitation program in our association, seconded and so carried unanimously.

Bro. Fagan moved for the approval of the recommendation from the Executive Committee which states that upon the approval of this type of work at this annual meeting, the Trustees would be given the opportunity of continuing their negotiations for this property. Angebilt Hotel, for a Retirement Center and that after they had carefully examined all of the details in reference to the purchase of this property and felt that they had arrived at a favorable proposal they would bring this proposal to the Executive Committee and if the Executive Committee felt that we should proceed with this matter the Executive Committee would call a special meeting of the Association for their acceptance or rejection of such proposal. Hause, the vote was taken and it was carried by 119 to 63.

39. Bro. Tom Ellington moved that we extend our time again for 15

minutes, seconded and so extended.

40. Girod Cole, Chairman of the Budget and Finance Committee, moved for the adoption of this report as found in the Book of Reports approving this to be our new Budget. Seconded and after one question raised about the Clerk's Honorarium, the report was adopted.

41. Girod Cole led us in the singing of "Stand Up, Stand Up For

Jesus."

- 42. The College Park Choir under the direction of Warren Barrett and accompanied by Mrs. Jane McInvale at the piano and Mrs. Lenore Wassenaar at the organ, brought our special music. The Fifty-first Psalm.
- 43. Our Moderator introduced our speaker, A. R. Fagan, of Delaney Street who brought the annual sermon preaching from the 9th Chapter of Matthew verses 35 through 38. Bro. Fagan pointed out to us the need for us to have the right perspective of the needs of the lost world we are in. We need to see the world and the people in the world as Jesus saw them and be willing to move at Christ's command.

44. Bro. Haskins had Bro. Fagan lead us in our closing prayer of

dedication to the cause of Christ.

45. Our Moderator invited the Pastors of our newly admitted churches to our association, to come to the front and then for their members present to come to the front and stand with their Pastor, which they did. The following Pastors and their members of these six new

churches were presented: Bethany and their Pastor J. M. Flowers; Dover Shores and their Pastor O. J. Morgan; Friendship and their Pastor V. N. Maggard; Laurel Hill and Pastor L. A. Jennings; New Hope and Pastor Eldred White; Lake Whippoorwill and their Pastor Jimmy Curry.

46. Bro. Edgar Cooper of North Park led in our closing prayer asking God's blessings upon the Pastors and the people of these new

churches.

47. Bro. Haskins declared our second session ended at 9:50 p.m. and announced the starting time of our third and final session Friday at 9 a.m.

FRIDAY, MORNING SESSION - THIRD SESSION

48. Our Moderator, James S. Haskins called our third and final session to order at 9:00 A.M., having W. H. Baker of Kissimmee to lead us in our singing of "I Am Thine O Lord."

49. Bro. Haskins introduced J. W. Keen, Pastor of New England Heights Baptist Church, Apopka, who in turn brought our devotional thought from the 27th Psalm and led us in our opening prayer.

50. Alvin G. Hause presented the Annunity Report for Fred Farris and moved for its adoption. Seconded and so adopted, as found in the Book of Reports. Bro. Hause introduced our visiting speaker, Bro. J. C. Walters, Jr. who spoke on the report of the place of C. A. Roberts who was called back to his church at Tallahassee.

51. Milton Russ of Barton Shores moved for the adoption of his report on Children's Home as Found in the Book of Reports, seconded and so adopted. Bro. Russ introduced our visiting speaker, Bro. B.G. Brown, Pastor of the Central Baptist Church in Lakeland. Many of the children from the Children's Home are members of Bro. Brown's church and he has had the privilege of baptizing 16 of these young people who have accepted the Lord Jesus Christ. He told of some of his experiences in helping meet the spiritual needs of these children.

He moved that we have our semi-annual meeting at the Dover Shores Church, located on the Gaston-Foster Road and the Preacher to be Girod Cole. The Annual Meeting to be with the First Church at Pine Castle with Edgar R. Cooper the Preacher. Seconded and so moved.

55. Alvin G. Hause read the report of the Committee on Resolutions listing 7 items as found in this annual. He moved for their adoption,

seconded and so adopted.

56. Girod Cole, Chairman of the Committee on Nominations, read

the names of the peope to serve as the heads of our various organizations; John C. Boyles - Brotherhood President; Ed Smith - Training Union Director; Forrest Thompson - Music Director; Mitchell P. Maddox - Sunday School Superintendent. Also the names of those who are to give reports at the next annual meeting. Bro. Cole moved that we consider these in-to-to, seconded and so ordered. He moved for the adoption of this report, seconded.

57. A. R. Fagan made an amendment to this motion stating that the Committee on Nominations is to have the responsibility of setting the time schedule for the Trustees, seconded and so ordered. The origi-

nal motion was passed.

Time for Miscellaneous Business -

58. Edgar Cooper moved that the Treasurer be recommended to us by the Committee on Nominations, seconded and so moved.

59. Bro. Bob McAllister moved that we ask Mrs. Jordan to continue to serve as our Associate Treasurer, seconded and so moved.

60. Harold Dann of Trinity moved that the Clerk be instructed to send a letter to the Association where Col. Lyens has moved to, commending him. Seconded.

61. Edgar Cooper moved to refer this matter to the Executive Com-

mittee, seconded and so referred.

- 62. The Clerk asked for comments by church clerks and pastors in regards to the use of the new type of church letter. The general opinion is that overall it is an improvement, but needs some improvements, namely:
  - (1) Printing should be darker color than the green used.

that the recommendation to establish a Junior College to the Convention was presented the second time last year and not first. Also add Present Convention and to delete the last sentence in next to the last

paragraph. Seconded and so changed.

68. Bro. Girod Cole, Chairman of the Committee on Nominations, presented the names of the Trustees to serve for the Retirement Home and their time schedule of services: 3 for one year - Clayborn Landers, Trevis Messer, Don Mott; 2 for two years - Bob New, Wally Sanderlin; 2 for three years - J. T. Gurney, Sr., A. R. Fagan.

69. Bro. C. E. Patch moved that we rescind our previous action concerning the naming of these Trustees and their schedule of service and accept these nominations now. Seconded and so adopted. These names with their schedule of tenure of service was added to

this committee's report.

70. The Moderator called on the Clerk, Bob McAllistet to present the newly elected officers of our association whih he did recognizing the splended record of Bro. Haskins' service during the past year and presenting him as continuing Moderator. Also recognized Bro. Alvin G. Hause our newly elected Vice-Moderator and his fine cooperation during our sessions as our Parliamentarian. Recognized our efficient Associate Treasurer, Mrs. Sarah Jordan who serves our association well as Secretary too. Bro. Haskins recognized his wife and Bro. Hause's wife.

71. Our Moderator named the following men to serve on the Committee on Committees: Chairman - Edgar Cooper, Tom Wenig, Tom Broomall, Fred Farris, and Clarence Eiland. They begin service now,

and continue through the year.

72. F.W. Brocksmith, Chairman of the Calendar of Activities Committee called our attention to some changes in the Calendar and moved for the adoption of this including these few changes. Seconded. The Clerk noted that the date for our next annual meeting should be included, which is Oct. 14, 15, 1965. Bro. Cole made this amendment to Bro. Brocksmith's motion, seconded and so passed along with the previous motion.

73. Girod Cole led us in singing "Amazing Grace," accompanied

by W. H. Baker.

74. Bro. Haskins introduced Bro. Richard Schaffer, Music Director at Killarney, and he brought us a stirring message in song; "Tell Me Why." He was accompanied by his wife, Carolyn, at the piano.

75. A. R. Fagan called our attention to his report on Cooperative Program as found in the Book of Reports and moved for its adoption. Bro. Fagan introduced J. C. Walters, Jr., Pastor of the Lake Worth Baptist Church who spoke on this report. His message was based on Mark 16:15 and he pointed out the five different looks at the world: (1) Indifference, (2) Curiosity, (3) Pride on the accomplishments you see, (4) Disgust, and (5) The look of love, compassion like that of Christ. After a second this report was adopted.

76. Our Moderator, James S. Haskins, declared our Annual meeting

ended.

77. Bro. Girod Cole stated that he and his church were delighted

to have the opportunity of entertaining our annual meeting and recognized the fine work of Bro. Dewey Stone who took care of the lighting and sound equipment - visual aids during our sessions. Bro. Cole moved for our adjournment, seconded and so moved.

78. Our newly elected Vice-Moderator, Alvine G. Hause led in our

closing prayer, and we ended our third session at 11:55 A.M.

## ANNUAL BIBLE SOCIETY REPORT 1964

If the people of the world are to know Jesus Christ, who alone can give true freedom to men and nations, they must have the Bible. Each person must have the Bible in his own language because it speaks to his heart as no other language can speak. But, in many countries, people cannot afford even the cost of printing the Scriptures.

The Bible is the essential tool of missions and evangelism. The missionary uses it in all his work. The Bible itself is a missionary. It can go where the human missionary cannot go. It can stay on after

he must leave -- and keep on speaking to a person's heart.

In 1963 the American Bible Society carried forward its task of putting the Word into the hands and hearts of men in more than 120 countries and 300 languages.

The American Bible Society, with its twenty-two sister national

Bible Societies, has embarked upon a great new program, "God's Word for a New Age," which will reach its high point in 1966. The program of advance was approved at the Advisory Council in 1963 by the representatives of fifty-five denominations in this country which support the work of the Society. The major target of "God's Word for a New Age" will be the increase of total Scripture distribution around the world, through the United Bible Societies, to 150, 000,000 copies annually by 1966. This goal is more than three times present global distribution. The ultimate objectives are:

A Bible for every Christian home

At least a New Testament for every Christian

At least a Portion for all who can read

An opportunity for every Christian to distribute Scriptures

in personal witness.

The American Bible Society has pledged itself to a goal of distributing 75,000,000 copies of Scripture annually by 1966. This is one half of the world goal of the United Bible Societies and is more than 100 per cent increase over the Society's circulation in 1963, the highest in its history.

# REPORT TO THE ASSOCIATIONS OF BAPTIST BIBLE INSTITUTE 1964

Baptist Bible Institute students average age 32, have a wife and two or three children, and usually have been deacons or other Baptist church leaders.

For such mature students we have a highly trained, experienced faculty. These men and women teach classes which parallel those in SBC seminaries, but without Hebrew and Greek. Chapel services, and field guidance classes led by visiting state and SBC denominational leaders, combine with classwork to produce both informed and loyal leaders for the churches.

Students must take 100 semester hours of class work, usually taking three years to graduate. One may choose a special emphasis in either pastoral training, religious education, or sacred music. Certain colleges now allow two years credit for work done at the Institute.

We enrolled 232 last year, and 215 for the first semester of this year. This is 30 more than the first semester of last year. We confidently expect more students this year than ever before when both semesters of non-duplicating students are counted. We entered the new administration building in September, having occupied the new classroom building last March.

Dr. Lewis Curtis (A.B., B.D., Th. D.) has joined the faculty and will teach Biblical Theology. Miss Dorothy Wamble (A.B., M.S.M.) is the new Professor of Piano. Dr. E. W. Ware has resigned as Professor of New Testament; Mrs. Sanders Watford resigned from

the music department.

1. HOW DID THE INITIAL PLANNING BEGIN?

A group of dedicated Baptist ministers and laymen were concerned about providing a well-conceived living experience for senior men and women that would provide good living accommodations and services in a pleasant environment and among Christian friends. The opportunity for such a facility has been accented by the attractive possibilities of the Angebilt Hotel, both in location, and feasibility.

2. IS THERE A NEED FOR SUCH HOMES?

Yes. There are many indications apparent: (1) Government interest in the retirement home field; (2) Private enterprise has shown a growing interest; (3) Increasing life expectancy has made our present population consist of approximately 11% over 65 years old, or 33,000 in Orange County; (4) Those homes built to meet this need are rapidly filled and have waiting lists; (5) These homes are designed to meet the needs of the aging.

3. IS THERE A NEED FOR BAPTISTS TO PROVIDE SUCH A HOME? Yes. Again there are many apparent reasons: (1) The need and the

## BAPTIST LITERATURE

In this day when the average citizen seems in danger of drowning in a sea of propaganda under waves of misinformation, it becomes more important than ever that Baptists have information which is correct from sources which are trustworthy. To be uninformed is bad; to be misinformed is worse. The work of the churches is often greatly handicapped both by lack of information and by misinformation among the membership. Today's average Baptist is provided with some kind

of information all right, but too many times the information comes from sources which are critical of and frequently openly opposed to our Baptist work. Too often it comes from sources which are not trustworthy.

The circulation of Southern Baptists publications continues to grow. For example, the reports show that during the past year the Sunday School Board produced and sent to users in 50 states and numerous foreign countries 86,126,772 copies of its periodicals; 1,697,954 copies of new books; 3,800,863 reprints of old books; 67,149,640 church bulletins and more than 13,000,000 free tracts. All other boards, agencies and auxilliaries of the Southern Baptist Convention have their own specialized publications of which the distribution is

also increasing.

The Baptist state papers, of which there are 28, reported to the Southern Baptist Convention in Atlantic City this year a total circulation per issue of 1,521,958 copies as of January 1, 1964. While this is still an increase over the previous year, the rate of increase has slowed down perceptibly. Our own state paper, the FLORIDA BAPTIST WITNESS, has also experienced this slowdown in the rate of growth. As of August 1, 1964, the paper is going to 65,643 subscribers each week. The Church Budget Plan is being used by 758 churches for at least a part of their membership, while 135 churches have clubs of subscribers. The number of churches sending the paper to every resident family is slowly but surely increasing, although there are still 460 churches affiliated with the Florida Baptist Convention which are making no effort to keep their members informed through the use of their very own Baptist state paper. Full use of the BAPTIST WITNESS will result in a better informed, more interested, better enlisted, more generous, better cooperating, more missionary membership in any Florida Baptist church.

## FLORIDA BAPTIST FOUNDATION

The Florida Baptist Foundation, an agency of the Florida Baptist Convention, concerned with the support of all causes supported by the Convention, has had another good year of service. Again, every agency and institution supported by the Convention has been named in wills prepared by the Foundation, and again this total amounts goes over a million dollars.

The Foundation is concerned with assisting in the preparation of wills favoring Baptist causes, setting up trusts, and establishing endowments. We work in two fields. First, we seek to acquaint our Baptist people with the advantages of wills, trusts, and direct gifts. Second, we invest the funds coming to us with regard to safety and

return on investment.

The audit of September 30, 1963, shows \$863,825.68 held by the Foundation in various funds. The Foundation owns none of this money, but holds it in trust for the various institutions favored in wills or by gifts. All of this money must be handled as specified in the will or agreement.

The trust department in one of Florida's largest banks is custodian of a large part of our investments, and makes recommendations concerning investments to our Investment Committee of the Trustees. The Investment Committee reviews the recommendations in the light of other information and makes the final decision on investments.

The Trustees of the Foundation are elected by the Convention. At present we have thirteen outstanding business men and two pastors. The Trustees meet annually to receive reports from committees, and determine general policies, or can be called at any time as necessary. The Executive Committee, which is the Investment Committee, serves in operational matters, and meets quite regularly. The Trustees serve without compensation and pay their own expenses in connection with all meetings.

At present, the Foundation has been assigned the job of raising \$1,500,000 for Stetson University and \$500,000 for Baptist Bible Institute. The Stetson money will be matched by Ford Foundation and again by the Trustees of Stetson, making a total of \$4,500,000

for Stetson. Good progress has been shown.

Serving with the Executive Secretary of the Foundation are Dr. James A. Sawyer, pastor of First Baptist Church of Cocoa, chairman of the Church Committee, and Cecil B. Carroll of Jacksonville, chairman of the Laymen's Committee. Regional chairmen have been selected by these chairmen.

## STATE, HOME AND FOREIGN MISSIONS

If Florida Baptists are to fulfill their task in this needy mission field, we must constantly strengthen our present witness as well as add new missions, new churches and new ministries. The ministry to our youth is being expanded through the development of Lake Yale Assembly. The plans now are for these facilities to be available by the summer of 1965. To meet the ever increasing need for additional college facilities will call for more prayer and faithful stewardship practices by our people. In the midst of the many things we are doing we must never lose sight of our first responsibility to win the lost to Christ. Our first duty is to win the lost to Jesus! All our work moves along in proportion to our faithfulness in keeping Jesus' command, "Go Ye".

Dr. Arthur B. Rutledge will assume the duties of Executive Secretary of the Home Mission Board, January 1, 1965. Home Missions are carried on by its personnel of 2,299 missionaries, 645 student summer missionaries, and 750 Baptist chaplains. These dedicated workers led 46,226 to accept Christ as Saviour and reported 355,325 Baptisms. There are fourteen programs of work through which the Board seeks to fulfill its task. They are church extension, associational administration services, pioneer missions, language missions, church loans, chaplaincy, metropolitan missions, rban-rural missions, Jewish work, mission center work, National Baptists, evangelism,

survey and special studies, and special mission ministries.

The Foreign Mission Board has 1850 missionaries under appointment serving in 54 nations. Working with these are 2,822 national pastors. Much of the mission work is done through the educational and medical programs, and of course, the printed page is of prime importance. Eighteen publishing centers produced 12,965,885 copies of literature.

We urge all of our people to subscribe for and read the three mission periodicals: FLORIDA BAPTIST WITNESS, HOME MISSION MAGAZINE, and THE COMMISSION.

## FLORIDA BAPTIST CHILDREN'S HOME

The break-up of homes and the desertion of children has become altogether too common in our society. The sense of responsibility which should be felt by parents towards their children has fled, and hundreds of children are deserted by one or both parents who feel little if any remorse for what they have done to their children. The increased number of applications to our Children's home during the spring and summer of this year is indicative of things becoming worse rather than better as far as family relationships is concerned.

The Children's Home has four caseworkers, each of whom has graduated from an accredited school of social work. It is their responsibility to counsel with children and parents who come to our homes for help, and in every case where good family life can be maintained, these workers urge the families to stay together. These caseworkers have been very successful, proven by the fact that 94 applications were withdrawn and 55 children were returned to their families or near-relatives through the efforts of these workers. Seventy-five children were admitted to the homes in Lakeland and Miami for a total of 188 in residential care. And, 64 were assisted through the Mother's Aid program.

It is the responsibility of every parent to care for his child to the best of his ability. When children are admitted to the Home, parents are asked to contribute toward the support of the child if it is at all possible. When parents are unable to care for their children financially, it becomes our privilege at the Children's Home to help these children. Let us remember that the needs are very great at our Children's Homes and if the members of our Baptist churches would give two cents per week each for child care, we could double the number of children we are now assisting. Let us remember them in our prayers and most of all in our giving.

New "Life Benefit Plan" is offered to Church and Denominational Employees. Every pastor, church, and denominational employee is eligible for the plan. The board hopes to have the plan in operation by October 1 of this year.

MEMBERSHIP IN RETIREMENT PLANS: As of May 1, 1964, there were 16,251 or 50% of the total churches in the Southern Baptist Convention participating in the Annuity Board's retirement program with their pastors. Out of 174 institutions of S.B.C., 118 are enrolled in the Annuity Board plan with their employees. Total membership in the Board's retirement plans is approximately 25,000.

BENEFITS PAID: More than 43-1/4 million have been paid in relief and annuity benefits since its beginning in 1918. Last year

these benefits were \$3-1/4 million.

ANNUITY SECRETARY: Phil Maxwell is the Annuity Secretary for Florida. He conducts a program of promotion and education regarding all phases of the Board's protection ministry. He seeks first to enlist those pastors not in the plan. Secondly, he helps those who are in the plans to know more about the financial provisions they are entitled to, and advises them in seeking additional protection through the Board's supplemental plans.

### **EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE**

Your Executive Committee again has sought to fulfill its role between the annual sessions of the Wekiwa Association of Baptist Churches. We are grateful for the excellent cooperation of the pastors and the laymen who comprise the Committee and for the service rendered the Association by its officers and staff.

In addition to the administration of existing programs, your Committee dealt with several new matters:

1. An associational Personnel Committee was appointed and its sphere of activity defined.

2. The Budget and Finance Committee was set up on a rotating basis as directed by the Associational meeting.

3. Rules governing the use of Camp Joy were formulated together with a schedule of fees.

4. The Metropolitan Mission Plan was adopted as a goal for future planning. As a step toward this goal it was agreed we should move toward the securing of a full-time Juvenile Rehabilitation Director who might also implement a Jewish Work. A step was taken in this direction in the September meeting when Rev. Boheler presented the Pastor's Day in Court program. The plan was accepted here and pastors were to begin taking their place in the Juvenile Court beginning October 1st.

5. According to a request made at the last Annual Associational Meeting, a special committee was appointed to study our Constitution and Articles of Incorporation. Brother Harold Epperson was to lead the committee in bringing both documents into agreement, and in clarifying statements felt to be inadequate. After diligent work by the special committee and thorough discussion in the Executive Committee, proposed changes are to be brought before the 1964 Annual Meeting.

6. Interest was revived in establishing a local Retirement Center

with a fresh approach to the problem. Dr. Decker of the Temple Foundation of Kansas City, Mo., and Dr. Gruber, President of Retirement Home Planners, visited our Executive Committee meeting. After a presentation of the growing need for such a ministry, the Committee was advised that ideal downtown facilities were available for purchase should our Association choose. Afterpreliminary investigation a Corporation was formed to explore the feasability of such a project to scrutinize suggested plans of operation, and to negotiate possible terms of purchase. All actions were, of course, to be subject to the will of the Association in session.

7. The Executive Committee voted to have a Director-led Enlarge-

ment Campaign in March, 1965.

8. The requests for admission into the Association by the following churches were discussed and approved for recommendation to the Annual Meeting:

Friendship New Hope Laurel Hill

Lake Whippoorwill (formerly Barton Lake Mission)

Dover Shores (formerly Forrest Park Baptist)

Several items of general interest to be found in this last year's record:

1. Rev. Bill Jones resigned his pastorate of the Powers Drive Bantist Church to enter Foreign Mission Service.

2. This Association began a regular radio ministry under the dir-

ection of Brother Forrest Thompson.

3. Brother B. D. Locke was guest of honor at a banquet held at the Delaney Street Baptist Church in recognition of his 20th Anniversary of missionary service. Most of this time was spent in our district.

4. Wekiwa Association ranked second in the entire Convention in

the number of libraries established.

5. The Forrest Park Baptist Church sold its property and buildings to the city of Orlando and disbanded. A group of the members relocated in Dover Shores and organized the Dover Shores Baptist Church.

### SOUTHERN BAPTIST HOSPITALS

The Christian impulse to befriend and help the sick and the troubled has flowered in church-related hospitals, of which Southern Baptists now have 51. Within the year covered by this report more than a half-million individuals have been cared for in these hospitals. Many of these could pay only a portion of the cost of their care yet they have been ministered to with competence, skill and dignity. The cost of their care has been borne only fractionally by support from the denomination; the remainder was provided from other sources, chiefly operating income.

Because the Southern Baptist convention operates two hospitals directly, every Southern Baptist participates in some measure in the life and work of these institutions. Twenty-five thousand Cooperative Program dollars were channeled through the Southern Baptist Convention and through the Convention's two hospitals; in New Orleans, Louisiana, and in Jacksonville, Florida, to the service of caring for those who otherwise could not be cared for. Care for 1148 was received through the two institutions, and without charge by staff physicians, costing \$463,478 for the year.

The expansion program in New Orleans, including a parking facility-laundry-power plant and a new ten-story apartment building for house staff was initiated (completed and put to use early in 1964). Under pressure for more medical and surgical beds in Jacksonville, a crash program created nearly 90 new such beds in a temporary structure attached to the present hospital. Long range plans for the Jacksonville institution are about complete and the first phase of actual construction should begin before the next report is made to the Associations.

The Southern Baptist Convention elects the 40-member Board of Directors of Southern Baptist Hospitals, the Convention agency. A word of commendation and gratitude to these elected directors is in order. Without their unstinting and unselfish service the progress of the institutions would have been impossible; with their continued interest, Southern Baptists can well be proud of the two service institutions through which they extend a compassionate hand and heart in the care of the sick and troubled. The hospital personnel along with the responsible Board of Directors solicits the continued and earnest prayers of Southern Baptists everywhere.

### CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

Southern Baptists have invested \$416,207,080 of which \$102,091,461 is for endowment in 73 schools; 6 seminaries, 37 senior colleges, 17 junior colleges, 7 academies and 5 Bible schools.

The enrollment in these schools is 83,589. In our 6 theological seminaries are 5,192 students - Southern 1,114; Southwestern 2,031; New Orleans, 857; Golden Gate 314; South eastern 669; and Midwestern 207.

State conventions and the Southern Baptist Convention increased gifts to the schools from \$15,514,770 to \$16,863,416 during the past year.

THE FLORIDA BAPTIST EDUCATIONAL INSTITUTIONS are (1) STETSON UNIVERSITY, the oldest university in Florida with 1,820 students enrolled last year. Five hundred and twenty-six of these were Baptists. Students committed to some church-related vocations were 129 but there were only 43 Ministerial students, 16 Missions volunteers, 42 studying to be Ministers of Education and 28 to be Ministers of Music. At last year's State Convention, Florida Baptists

voted to attempt to raise \$1,500,000 for Stetson and \$500,000 for our second (2) institution, the BAPTIST BIBLE INSTITUTE. The trustees of Stetson will raise \$1,500,000 which will give us the \$3,000,000 for Stetson to match the gift of the Ford Foundation to Stetson. The gift from the Ford Foundation of \$1,500,000 was awarded, provided we raise \$3,000,000. All Florida Baptist Churches are urged to give \$2.00 per resident member each year for three years.

THE BAPTIST BIBLE INSTITUTE at Graceville offers special training for students in church-related vocations who do not qualify for college training. The total enrollment for the 1963-'64 session was 232, with 169 of these students for the Ministry.

Notice that there were only 43 Ministerial students in Stetson while there were 169 at the Bible Institute.

Baptists believe in CHRISTIAN EDUCATION, but we should insist that it be Christian.

At the meeting of the State Convention last year in Jacksonville, the convention voted second approval on the establishing of a Junior College in Florida. The Education Commission was instructed to seek offers of land and money, and to present to the Convention a recommendation as to location.

We have said that Baptists believe in Christian Education - but we should insist that it be genuinely Christian and Baptistic. Why should we endeavor to send our young people to our Baptist schools, paying more to do so than in state supported schools, if our young people a not return to us strengthened in their faith and more Baptistic in their convictions? In far too many of our Baptist schools our young people do not find any more of a Spiritual atmosphere than in the State related schools. The text books are the same, many of the teachers are the same and yet we must pay much more to send our young people to our own Baptist schools. Perhaps that is the reason why we have only 83,589 students in all of our Baptist schools and 219,034 Baptist students in Non-Baptist schools, most of them in state controlled schools.

### UNITED CHRISTIAN ACTION

United Christian Action is a State-Wide inter-church service organization, since 1945 serving the churches of 12 evangelical denominations in Florida, directed by a Board of Directors and Advisory Councils composed of 250 pastors and lay leaders, for the purpose of providing service and information to assist sponsoring churches in offering Christian solutions to the critical urgent problems being produced by alcoholic beverages, gambling and indecency in Florida.

The program is threefold - Education, Legislation and Rehabilitation. Through carefully researched and documented leaflets, books, films, and a monthly eight page publication "Alert," information and training is provided all interested teachers, students, pastors, and laymen without charge. In addition UCA seeks to aid churches, schools

and communities in the endless fight against moral corruption and sin. Understanding and help for those already addicted, round out the

program of service.

United Christian Action is supported entirely from the gifts of concerned churches and individuals. Florida Baptists have consistently provided strong support and encouragement to the program. Every local church which shares in the annual State Missions Offering is helping provide life-line support to this organization. The work of UCA is carried on very economically but the needs are great. The financial support must be increased if UCA survives and continues to spearhead an adequate program. The forces of evil are gigantic and they grow bigger every day. There are 18,600 legalized liquor outlets selling annually 80 million gallons of beer, wine and whiskey for over \$500 million dollars per year. Our state has already licensed 16 Dog Tracks, 6 Horse Tracks and 6 Jai-Alai Frontons which takes from the pocket of the people \$400 million dollars a year. Florida today is a mecca for those who traffic in pornographic literature which in turn breeds filthy minds and violent crimes. Also suicide, illegitimacy, and delinquincy on the part of our young folks is fast turning favored Florida into a Sodom and Gomorrah. So what we do we had better do quickly for we are loosing ground rapidly. We must let the people know where we stand and where our churches stand on these critical moral issues.

Jack Eppes, Executive Secretary of United Christian Action, is one of the most gifted men in this field in the United States. Do not hesitate to seek his help when needed. Likewise, do not hesitate to support him in the work we have asked him to do. Use your influence to furt'er

### RADIO AND TELEVISION

"Growth" is the key word in any conversation concerning Southern Baptists' Radio and Television Communion. Annual expansion in all areas of endeavor is now accepted as a characteristic of this

Thus, breaking ground for a new and functional headquarters building in Fort Worth in June proved a highlight of 1964 for the Commission and for all Southern Baptists. The structure will be dedicated during the 1965 Convention to be held in Dallas, with completion ex-

pected the following October.

The high quality of radio and television programming carried on by the Commission has resulted in increased acceptance of Southern Baptist programs, with a net gain of 73 stations for the first six months of 1964. The agency now services with its programs an all-time high of 1450 radio and television stations each week.

The commercial value of air time given Southern Baptists by U.S. Stations expected to reach close to an estimated \$4 million this year.

And this doesn't include 121 overseas stations which broadcast the denomination's programs.

This year sees an increase of more than 60 per cent in the time allocation made to the Commission and hence to Southern Baptists

b. the three major networks, NBC, CBS and ABC.

Of the 13 programs produced and distributed by the Commission, "The Baptist Hour" is the oldest and is on the largest number of stations - 522. "Master-Control," a variety program of interviews, music and gospel, is on 299. "The Answer" on television is aired

by an average of 103 throughout the year.

Other programs and the number of stations are: "Patterns" - 170; "International Sunday School Lesson" - 89; "La Hora Bautista" - 63; "Moments of Meditation" - 30; "Momentos de Meditacion" - "Control Central" - 41; "Music To Remember" - 46 monaural, 39 stereo; "Voice of Hope" (Chinese) - 15; "Voice of Peace" (Russian) - 4; "The Living Water" (Navajo) - 4.

New television programs to begin this year are: "Jot," a children's program; "Journey To Adventure," 15 minute Bible land films; "The Secret Place," a children's program; "A.D.," variety format;

and a series of one-minute gospel capsules on film.

### MUSIC

The year 1965 is the year that we are going to promote WORSHIP. The associational music ministry is the key to the promotion of this program. We hope that every association will work to promote the training of people in the churches to read, sing, play and teach music for the glory of God. To this end many things are planned in which each church may participate such as music festivals, hymn sings, school of training, music work shops, carol sings and general promotion of better music.

The past year the associational music ministry organization showed 42 out of 47 associations held Associational Festivals - 260 churches participated in the festivals with 617 choral groups, totaling 12,865 choir members - 159 hymn players -- 36 song leaders -- 6 instrumental ensembles with a total of 39 participants. (Our Associational Festival was held at Winter Park First in January. We are planning

to have a festival during January 1965.)

Florida was fourth in the Southern Baptist Convention in reporting through the Church Letter to the Association in 1963. There were 945 churches out of 1510 reporting music ministries with an enrolment of 55,963. This is an increase over 1962 of 43 churches reporting and a difference in the enrolment of 2834. Every church is urged to realize that if it has adults and children, which uses music in its worship services and in the organizations and which elects a music director and has regular rehearsals it has a Music Ministry.

The associational music organization and the State Music Department wish to thank each church and its music leaders for a very fine

year and wish for you another good year for "more and better music by more and better musicians, singing with grace in their hearts to the Lord."

Hardy Hayes of WXIV was our

guest speaker.
