### CONSTITUTION

Of The Sunday School Convention and Missionary Union of The New River Baptist Association.

ARTICLE 1. This organization shall be known as the Missionary and Sunday School Union of the New River Baptist Association.

ART. 2. This body shall be composed of Pastors, Superintendents of Sunday schools and Messengers appointed by the churches and Sunday schools of this Association.

Section 2. Each church and Sunday school shall be entitled to three Messengers each.

ART. 3. The officers of this Union shall be a Moderator and Clerk. who shall be elected by ballot annually at the first meeting in each associational year.

ART. 4. At the first meeting in each associational year there shall be appointed or elected three Standing Committees, consisting of three or more members each; first, a Committee on Nominations; second, a Committee on Ways and Means; third, a Committee on District Superintendents.

ART. 5. It shall be the duty of the Committee on Nominations to select subjects for discussion, and to nominate who shall open each subject.

ART. 6. It shall be the duty of the Committee on Ways and Means to carefully survey and convass our mission field and churches, encourage and take collections for mission work, confer and co-operate with the Executive Committee of the New River Association in our mission cause, and also to look after and encourage Sunday school work within our bounds, and to report the interest of the same to each meeting of this body.

ART. 7. The Association shall divide into four Sunday School Districts, and each district shall have a District Supertintendent elected once a year.

ART. 8. It shall be the duty of the District Superintendent to organize, superintend and see after the Sunday school cause.

ART. 9. All funds collected at each meeting shall be transmitted (through the Clerk) to the Committee on Ways and Means.

ART. 10. This Constitution may be amended only in the following manner: Any proposed amendment must be made in writing at one meeting, and if the majority shall vote in favor of the same it shall lie over until next meeting for final action; if then a majority vote in favor of it, then the Constitution shall be so amended.

### ARTICLES OF FAITH.

ARTICLE I. We believe that the Holy Bible was written by men divinely inspired, and is a perfect treasury of heavenly instruction. That it has God for its author, salvation for its end, and truth without any mixture of error for its matter. That it revea s the principles by which God will judge the world in righteousness; and, therefore, it is, and shall forever remain, the true center of Christian union and the supreme standard by which all conduct, creeds and opinions shall be tried.

ART. 2 We believe that there is one, and only one, living and true God, whose name is Jehovah, the Maker and Supreme Ruler of the universe, inexpressively glorious in holiness, worthy of all possible honor, confidence, obedience and love That in the unity of the Godhead there are three persons—the Father, the Son and the Holy Ghost—equal in every divine perfection, but executing distinct and harmonious offices in the great work of redemption.

ART. 3. We believe in the total depravity of the human heart, and that the natural state of man is such that he cannot prepare himself for divine favor without the assisting grace of God enabling him to act according to the good pleasure of God's divine will.

ART. 4 We believe in the election according to the foreknowledge of God through sanctification of the sprit and belief of the truth.

and that God by his spirit through His Son, and with His word re-

ART. 5. We believe that the great Gospel blessings which Christ accures to such as believe in Him, is Justification by Faith, which gives peace with God, the Father, through our Lord Jesus Christ, His Son.

ART. 6. We believe the Gospel of Christ is the power of God unto salvation to every one that believeth, and, therefore, should be preached to every creature, that the purpose of God according to election might stand.

ART. 7 We believe that all who obey the Gospel, and are regenerated by the power of God, are elected to eternal life in Christ, and are made heirs of God and joint heirs with the Lord Jesus Christ; and that they are kept by the power of God, through faith unto salvation, ready to be revealed at the last time, and that not one of them will be lost

ART. 8 We believe that baptism and the Lord's Supper are ordinances of Jesus Christ, and spiritually designed to exemplify the death and suffering, burial and resurrection of Him, and that in baptism there are three essentials, viz: First, a proper subject; second, a proper mode; third, a proper administration, and that a proper subject is one who has been begotten by the word and born of the spirit; and that the only proper mode is by immersion of such subjects in the name of the Father, Son and Holy Ghost; and proper administrators, only those who have been duly called and come under the imposition of the hands of the presbytery.

ART. 9. We believe that the Lord's Supper was instituted by our Lord Jesus Christ to be commemorated by His followers, and none but baptized believers have any Scriptural right to partake thereof.

ART. 10. We believe that a "visible church" of Christ is a congregation of baptized believers, associated by a covenant in the faith and fellowship of the Gospel, observing the ordinance of Christ, governed by His laws and exercising the gifts, rights and privileges vested in them by His word.

ART II. We believe and acknowledge Jesus Christ to be the great head of the church, and the only law giver; that the government under Him is with the body, and in the privilege of each individual member; that spiritual discipline, with an eye single to the glory of God, must greatly conduce to the final prosperity and union of the church.

ART. 12 We believe that idiots and infants are saved, and saved alone by the mediation of Christ.

ART. 13 We believe that the first day of the week is the Lord's Day, or the Christian Sabbath, and is to be kept sacred to religious duties by abstaining from all secular labor and sinful recreation, by devout observance of all the means of grace, both public and private, and by preparation for the rest that remaine h for the people of God.

ART 14. We believe that the end of this world is approaching; that, at the last day, Christ will descend from heaven and raise the dead from their graves for final retribution; that a solemn separation will then take place; that the wicked will go away into everlasting punishment and the righteous into life eternal.
