MONDAY, OCTOBER 15, 1962 — AFTERNOON SESSION

3:30 -Song, "Standing on the Promises."

A motion was made that all messengers from the various churches be seated to carry on the business of the New River Baptist Association, Seconded and carried. The program of the Association was presented and accepted with any chances necessary.

3:40 -Rev. Hebert called the meeting to order.

Devotion-Rev. B. W. Sweat.

The following visitors were welcomed: Speakers Team, Rev. Perry Carter, Rev. Hugh Hawkins, Rev. K. Fay DeSha, Rev. Reneau B. Dominey. Regional Missionary, Rev. Marvin V. Stedham. Rev. J. R. Smith, pastor of Keystone Heights First Baptist Church.

3:55 -The following officers were elected for 1962-63: Moderator-Rev. Leo A. Hebert. Vice Moderator- Rev. W. M. Dunagan. Clerk-Treasurer-A, Russell Norman,

4:05 -Florida Baptist Witness-Rev. Hugh Hawkins

"Through good reading we become acquainted with the wisest men of the ages . . . are kept cognizant of the affairs of our own day . . . and experience the joys of losing ourselves in other men's minds."

First and foremost in the regular reading for every Baptist should al-

ways be the Bible, God's own Word.

Close behind that first place should be the generous use of good Christian literature which has become so tremendously inportant to our Christian literature. tian living and to the growth and development of our churches and our denomination.

Southern Baptits have many of their best minds engaged in the writing, preparation and publication of literature which is second to none. It is sound in doctrine, easy to understand and attractive to the eye. Both its content and its appearance make it superb literature, and its reasonable

costs puts it within the reach of every church,

The circulation of Southern Baptist publication continues to be expanded to meet the indicated needs of our people. Last year our chief publication agency. The Baptist Sunday School Board at Nashville, Tenn., printed and distributed 110,395,424 copies of its periodicals and graded literature, 5,920,177 books, 67,217,225 preprinted church bulletins, and nearly 17,000,000 tracts.

The other agencies and auxiliaries of the Southern Baptist Convention have growing subscriber lists for their splendid periodicals such as The Commission (Foreign Missions journal), Home Missions Magazine, Brother-hood Journal, Ambassador Life, and all the Woman's Missionary Union pub-

The 28 Baptist state papers now have a total circulation of 1,495,285 copies per issue, according to the report made to the 1962 Southern Baptist Convention. Thus, the readers of these papers received a total of more than 77,500,000 copies of these papers during the last 12-month period.

Our own state paper, the FLORIDA BAPTIST WITNESS, (as of August 1, 1962) had 63,104 different persons on its paid subscription list with this many papers going into 343 different churches, 739 of which are using the budget plan for at least some portion of their membership. One hundred four other churches have small clubs of subscriptions. Each succeeding year sees more churches sending the WITNESS to every resident family. In

spite of the increased circulation over which we rejoice, however, let us remember that there are still 449 churches affiliated with the Florida Baptist Convention which are failing to provide their members and themselves with all the benefits to be gained from a group subscription to the FLORIDA

Every church which now sends the WITNESS into only part of its homes is urged to complete its subscription list by including every resident family, and every church which does not now include the WITNESS in its budget is urged to consider doing so promptly. The paper is still available through the church budget plan for the low cost of \$1.20 per year to be paid in installments of only 10c per month for each family on the subscription list.

In the campaign to reach a circulation of 70,000 by 1964, our association is asked to cooperate by electing a WITNESS representative who will serve as a contact person between the FLORIDA BAPTIST WITNESS office and

the churches of this association.

- 4:35 —Report Woman's Missionary Union Mrs. W. B. Mundy. There are six Woman's Missionary Societies with 245 members. We have 18 Auxiliary organizations with 208 members. One new Y.W.A. Auxiliary has been organized at Lawtey First Baptist Church. Two W.M.U. Societies have been reorganized. We have had two Associational Prayer Retreats with Mrs. Stroup and Mrs Kirkpatrick as leaders and one YWA Prayer Retreat, also four Prayer Retreats in the Woman Missionary Societies. The Girl's Auxiliary reported five queens, many princesses and one honor G.A. at Starke First Church. This report was adopted.
- 4:40 —Report— Florida Baptist Retirement Centers. J. Perry Carter.

Our Retirement Center program has been in operation but one year and half. The Lord has blessed us abundantly and in many ways. Since our last report we have built two more duplex cottages and added nine rooms to the main building. Also, all the porches have been screened, which has added much to the comfort and security of the residents as well as to the

general appearance of the building.

We now have twenty-two residents. Only two single rooms and one duplex cottage are available and we are expecting them to be called for within

It will be necessary for us to continue the building program perhaps for several years to come because many worthy senior citizens are knocking at our doors. Almost all of the Cooperative Program funds we have received have been used in the building program and we now have property and buildings valued at something more than four hundred thousand dolars including the property which was the gift of Mr. and Mrs. Buckingham. We are so largely dependent on mission receipts for the building program.

We are happy to report that the residents have enjoyed relatively good health during the year though three of them have had to spend just a few days each in the local ospital here in Vero Beach. Every one is also enjoying fellowship in the churches and all but two have already placed their memberships in the local Baptist churches. It will be necessary for us to continue the building program perhaps

5:10 -Business:

The clerk read a recommended change in the constitution as presented by the Executive Committee to the Association: Article VI. Section 2-last sentence which now reads, "The committee shall meet monthly and a quorum for business shall be 14 members." shall be changed to read, "The committee shall meet monthly and the members present shall conduct the business. This change would eliminate a certain number for a quorum. A motion was made and seconded that this change be accepted. After a general discussion a motion was made and seconded to table the motion. This motion was not carried. The discussion continued and generally agreed that the following amendment could be added to the motion being discussed. A motion was made to amend the motion to read, 'a quorum of six members." Seconded and carried. The motion was carried with the addition of the amendment.

Rev. H. D. Perry read the following letter from the First Baptist Church of Keystone Heights asking for admission into the New River Association.

The First Baptist Church of Keystone Heights, in regular conference on September 12, 1962, voted to make application to the New River Baptist Association for admittance to its membership. Said application was submitted to the chairman of the Executive Committee one month prior to the time of the Annual Association, as required by the Constitution, Article III. of the New River Baptist Association.

The First Baptist Church of Keystone Heights will meet all the requirements of the Constitution of the New River Baptist Association if and when accepted into the membership.

A motion was made that the First Baptist Church of Keystone Heights be accepted into the New River Baptist Association. Seconded and carried. The Moderator, Vice Moderator, Clerk and Regional Missionary gave the pastor, deacons, officers and members of the Keystone Heights Church the right hand of Christian fellowship and welcomed them into the New River Association.

5:40 —Report—United Christian Action—K. Fay DeSha:

WHAT IS UNITED CHRISTIAN ACTION, INC!

A state-wide inter-church service organisation, since 1945 serving the churches of 12 evangelical denominations in Florida, directed by a Board of Directors and Advisory Councils composed of 250 pasters and lay leaders,

for the purpose of providing service and information to assist our sponsoring churches in offering Christian solutions to the critically urgent problems being produced by alcoholic beverages, gambling, and indecency in Florida.

Our basic program and objectives include:

EDUCATION through carefully researched and documented leaflets, books, films and a monthly 8-page publication, ALERT (available to any Baptist free—just send your name and mailing address) to provide students, pastors and laymen with needed teaching aids and leadership training. Teachers' manuals are provided for all interested teachers in schools and churches. Alcohol education camps and retreats for teenagers: church and community workshops for adult leadership.

LEGISLATION. In addition to the legislative goals already suggested, we seek to secure protection for churches, schools, and communities against liquor traffic encroachment, as well as the many sordid by-products of the liquor, gambling, and obscenity rackets which seem so strongly entrenched in Florida.

REHABILITATION information and activities to help those now enslaved.

PREVENTION, especially for our youth.

UNITED CHRISTIAN ACTION, INC. is supported entirely from the gifts of concerned churches and individuals. Florida Baptists have consistently provided strong support and encouragement to the program. At present, 175 of our 1200 Florida Baptist Churches provide some special support each year through monthly or annual budget allotments, with our life-line support coming through the ANNUAL STATE MISSION OFFERING, from which UCA received \$8,250.00 in 1961 and is scheduled to receive \$8,400.00 in 1962.

With headquarters in Lakeland, the staff is composed of two Baptist ministers, both native Floridians who served in Florida pastorates prior to entering this specialized field of Christian Action Jack Eppes is Executive Secretary-Treasurer. Phil Padgett is Associate Director. We will be happy to provide any church or individual with complete finance or organizational reports upon request.

PRACTICAL PROJECTS FOR EVERY CONCERNED CHRISTIAN .

1. Be a part of OPERATION SPEAK-UP and INSIST (individually and as a group) that our Governor, and the Representatives and Senator from your local area, take whatever action is necessary, both administrative and legislative, to accomplish at least the following before or during the 1963 Florida Legislature (April and May):

(1) Remove all beer, wine and whiskey sales from grocery stores, drug stores, filling stations and other family retail shopping outlets,

(2) Eliminate, or at the very least, greatly reduce the flood of TV, Radio, Billboard, Newspaper and other advertising and promotion of all alcoholic products and outlets.

(3) Eliminate all advertising promotion of gambling now permitted through the Dog, Horse and Jai Alai legalized gambling outlets; discontinue Charity and Scholarship Days as an affront to the honesty and decency of

our people.

(4) Take whatever action is required to eliminate the flood of indecency to which our youth are subjected.

2. Be a registerel voter in the county and city in which you live. Find and encourage at least one eligible friend or neighbor to register and actively participate in every election.

3. Use your individual and group influence to place your church among the growing number whose concern is so uncompromising and clear that every leader, no matter how minor his or her office, will choose to be a personal abstainer from the use, sale, or approval of all alcoholic beverages, gambling (including the many border-line "gimmicks") and obscenity (including the border-line magazines and movies).

7:15 -Report- Cooperative Program-Rev. R. B. Dominey:

The Cooperative Program is Southern Baptists' way of saying "yes" to the Great Commission. When Jesus said "Go ye," he said it in the framework of a Biblical plan of finance, which is the tithe. Jesus made this very clear when he said, "Think not that I am come to destroy the law, or the prophets: I am not come to destroy, but to fulfill" (Matt. 5:17). Every church should give more earnest attention to the teaching of tithing as the Biblical principal of giving, and to the consistent increase in Cooperative Program

The Forward Program of Church Finance is fast becoming standard procedure for many churches in helping the leadership guide all members toward Scriptural giving. The Forward Program is tested and proven. It is no longer a question mark in the minds of our people, but is now a fi-

nance program of proven quality.

We feel that our world missions program calls for a stronger appeal than ever before. The work we are able to do through the Cooperative Pro-gram and the added strength it receives from the regular use of the Forward Program is encouraging. But the greatest uplift we can ever give it is PRAYER. In this month of October we are participating in a special program of prayer for the Cooperative Program. If your church is not already engaged in this prayer program, we recommend that you use the remaining Wednesday nights of the month to pray for Cooperative Program causes.

RECOMMENDATIONS:

We recommend:

1. That each church in New River Association plan and carry out a definite program for teaching its membership to participate in the Biblical form of giving, the tithe;

2. That each church in New River Association set up a system of reg-

ular monthly contribution through the Cooperative Program;

During the year of 1963 our churches face a great challenge in the em-During the year of 1985 our churches race a great challenge in the emphasis for the year: "World Missions." In order that every church might be reached, large or small, our Associational Music Ministry organization—because of their knowledge of the churches in their area—stand as the key to whether or not all of these churches will have the benefits of participation in the year of "World Missions." These smaller churches have definite needs in all phases of the work. Our Associational Music Ministry organizations have capable music leaders and stand ready to face the challenge of helping every church in every association with its Music Ministry.

Throughout our state in 1961-62, there were some 350 churches in music training out of 1300 churches in our state. This year we hope that our association will have every church participating in some form of music training. As an Associational Music Ministry organization, we are going to strive to reach every church in our Association. We recommend that each Pastor in the association teach the Book, MUSIC IN WORSHIP, to his people.

This past year on an associational level, the Associational Music Ministry organizations showed 37 out of 47 associations held Associational Festivals. 254 churches participated in the Festivals with 507 choral groups, totaling 10,011 choir members— 145 hymn players— 47 song leaders— 6 instrumental ensembles, with a total of 18 participants. Our Associational Festival was held at Lawtey Baptist Church January 21 1962. We are planning to have a festival during January 1963. There is a potential in our state of 329 associational music officers in the Associational Music Min-

istry organizations. This past year Florida reported in the Southern Baptist Convention for Associational Music Ministry oranizations. Again, we say thanks to you pastors, music directors, and others for your cooperation in this endeavor. Our Associational Music Ministry organization is complete with nominations for every office.

On a state level the Church Music Ministry Department continues to proon a state level the Church Music Ministry Department continues to promote a program which should best serve the needs of the majority of our churches. Ten State Music Festivals were held during 1962. There was a total of 310 choral groups with 6,622 members—94 hymn players—22 song leaders—5 instrumental ensembles with 14 participants. This gave us a grand total of 6,768 individuals participating in the State Festivals. There were 134 churches participating. 446 certificates were issued. There will be ten Festivals again this year.

We plan to encourage our churches to participate in the State Festival on March 1-2, 1963 at the First Baptist Church, Palatka, Florida.

Six churches out of 20 reported Music Ministries with an enrollment of 314 in our Association.

Two music camps were held at the West Florida Baptist Assembly Grounds in Panam City. Harmony Bay as these camps are called for Grounds in Panam City. Harmony Bay as these camps are called for Music, has a limited capacity of 120 select Intermediates and Young People for each camp. During 1963 these camps will be held August 5-11 for the first camp and August 12-18 for the second camp. Each church in our association may send 5 Intermediates to the first camp and 5 Intermediates, who have attended before, and/or Young People to the second camp. Mike Sheppard, and Jim Lewis attend Harmony Bay.

The Church Music Ministry Department will endeavor to help any church any time during the year by helping to locate capable workers for a music training school and in addition, offer financial help if needed by the church. Churches desiring a music training school during the year should request a Worker Appropriation Form from the Church Music Ministry Department. Mrs. Kathryn Cheek helped in our school this year.

Let every church in our association strive for a larger and more efficient Music Ministry this year. We stand ready to help you.

The paster's wives and wives of the laymembers are invited to come for a period of fellowship among themselves while the Executive Committee meets. Following the meeting there will be a period of fellowship among all those present with the host church serving refreshments.

The Executive Committee has discussed the possibility of an Association-wide Training School for next summer. This would mean using all of the pastors as teachers and having outside workers come in and teach other courses. There would be enough courses that a person would have a large choice as to which they would like to take. Courses could be taught for the Sunday School, Training Union, Brotherhood, W. M. U., and those of a general nature such as Bible Study.

The religious program in the Florida Division of Corrections has continued with very little significant change during the past year. There are seven Chaplains on a full time basis, serving an inmate population of nearly \$,000.

At the Florida State Prison, Chaplains Mayton and Phipps have been attempting to keep the best possible program moving. With the increase to four separate units, it is more than two Chaplains can do effectively. Another position has been cleared, and the Personnel Department is now searching for a minister who can qualify for this third Chaplain's position. It is hoped that this position will be filled in the near future.
