Taken recess for preaching.

At 2 o'clock p. m. the body was called together by the Moderator. Prayer by J. H. Dixon.

Report of the Executive Committee read, discussed by various brethren and adopted.

Your Executive Board appointed at the last Association, met at Pinemount October, 1885, and organized by electing Elder A. E. Kitchen Chairman, B. D. Harrell, Secretary, and W. B. High Treasurer.

Upon the examination of the finances of the Association we found in the hands of the Treasurer \$40.90 in cash and \$17.60 in pledges due, making a total of \$58.50. With this as a basis, your committee determined, if possible, to employ a Missionary for all his time. We corresponded with the State Board of Missions in view of obtaining State aid. The State Board agreed to supplement our means dollar for

of obtaining State and. The State Board agreed to supplement our means donar for dollar, provided we would report our actions and doings in our Missionary work to the State Board, to which we agreed.

The next thing in order was to secure the services of a faithful and efficient man to do the work; and from among the applicants for the work your committee employed Elder Z. Dees for all his time at the rate of \$250 per annum, to be paid quarterly, one half by the Association and one-half by the State Board, Said Missionaay did not take the field until after the expiration of the first quarter. He has labored eight months, having lost no time since he commenced the work, except one round, which was caused by sickness of himself and family, which

he made good in the month of October.

His work has been exclusively in the destitution of LaFayette county. Your committee did not allow him to preach regularly to any organized church except

where the organization had gone down.

While the conversion of souls has not been as perceptably large as we would wish, yet we have great cause to thank God, and be encouraged, that it is even as large as it is, for it is reported that the people downlon the coast have been imposed upon by unfaithful and designing men claiming to be ministers of the Gospel, then taking advantage of the people's confidence, commit crimes and leave the

country.

All their prejudices had to be overcome and confidence restored in the minds of the people before the Missionary could make much headway in the work. As soon as this was done, the congregations began to increase and an increasing interest manifested at every appointment. We might truthfully say that the ground has just been prepared, and the seed sown the past year for a rich and glorious harvest of souls in the future. If the Association can be able to keep an efficient Missionary in the field all the time, much good may be done. But can this be done? We confidently assert that it can, if the membership of the Association will do their duty.

Nineteen churches last Association reported an aggregate of 581 members. Taking that number as a basis, at twenty-five cents each, and it foots up \$144.25; add to that the same amount from the State Board, and we have \$290.50, a sum sufficient to keep a Missionary in the field all the time. The labors of your Missionary for eight months of his work as Missionary will be seen by referring to his

report,
Your committee have done all in their power to raise funds to pay off said Missionary by begging here and pleading there, but their appeals have not been re

s ponded to sufficiently to enable them to pay the Missionary in full. Brethren, we are yet due \$23.07. We appeal to you to help us pay up. Respectfully submitted.

Since the adoption of the above report of the Executive Committee, we are glad to say the Association has responded to the appeal, and the Missionary has been paid -- CLERK.

Report of Missions read, discussed by various brethren and adopted:

God in His providence has, through His children as instruments in His hands, arranged for the perpetuation of His Gospel, hence, the matter is of great impor-

Seemingly we do not comprehend really what the term Mission implies. The advent of our Saviour is a mission that, reduced to a fact, is but means by which men are saved from utter ruin. Let us realize that God's purpose is to use as instruments in His hands to reconcile the world unto Himself. God has said, the harvest is great, &c. God has said, go preach My gospel, &c. God has said, he that believes shall be saved, and he that believes not shall be damned.

We look around in our own bounds, to say nothing away from home. We are credibly informed that there is a destitution in the bounds of this Association with an estimate of one thousand souls over ten years of age, of which there are but about one hundred that profess to know God in the forgiveness of their sins. Taking under consideration the ruggedness of that country, the disadvantages to contend with in divers respects, our conviction is that no ordinary effort on our

God says, go and possess the land. Shall we refuse to obey God and let the souls of our fellow man sink into hell, and the blood of that people be on our skirts? Brethren, this people should have the Gospel. We should contribute

for the support of the Gospel in that destitution.

We number in this Association about six hundred. Fifty cents each will raise three hundred dollars. The State Board will aid in about the same amount, and we are then enabled to give the people the Gospel. There is now a good work begun among that people. The past eight months experience has taught us that that people now begin to help themselves. We are informed by our late Missionary that they have already pledged themselves to the amount of sixty dollars, and the probability is they will give one hundred, for the ensuing year for the support of the Gospel among them. It is manifest that this people want the Gospel. Brethren, let us go and help them. Paul says, we are laborers together with God. Soldiers of the Cross, arise and gird our armour on for the salvation of souls.

STATE MISSIONS. .

While we would thus speak of the need of our own Association, we would call the attention of our churches to the destitution of other parts of our State, and especially to the Cuban work. God in His providence has sent them among us to

receive the Gospel, and they are receiving it.

At Key West our State Board has had Missionaries laboring among the Cubans for two years, and a number of them have been baptised, and now Cuba itself has been opened to us, and over hundred have been baptised in Cuba since the first of January last. Now there are between one and two thousand Cubans at Tampa who are ready to receive the Gospel. It is imperative on us to aid in this work.

THE FOREIGN FIELD.

Whatever may be said of the destitution at home, it is nothing when compared to the appalling ignorance and superstition in heathen lands, China, India, Africa, South America, Europe, Mexico and Cuba have opened their doors to the preaching of the word of Life, and God is calling on us to go and carry to these perishing millions the Gospel. He that calleth on the name of the Lord shall be saved. But how shall they call on Him in whom they have not believed? And how shall they believe on Him of whom they have not heard? And how shall they hear without a preacher? And how shall they preach except they be sent? This question is for us to answer and say in how much are we responsible for the death of those who perish without the knowledge of Christ?

We would recommend that each member of this Association raise one dollar. Use one-half at home and send the other half to the State Board to aid in furnishing the Gosnel in other destitute places, and among the heathens.

Report on Sabbath Schools read, discussed and adopted;

We beg leave to report that we regret that there are so few Sabbath Schools in operation, and so little interest taken in the matter. We earnestly advise the brethren of the various churches to hold meetings for the instruction of children, and that a suitable brother be selected to conduct those meetings, and that the sisters join in and encourage their children to attend. We cannot train up our children properly without action upon our part in this direction. We also advise the churches to secure li-

braries, and especially song books, for the purpose of teaching their children to sing as well as the Scriptures. The good results that follow well conducted school has already been attested. We recommend immediate action on the part of the churches.

Your committee to whom was referred the subject of Woman's Missionary work in the bounds of this Association have nothing of a definite character to report. We find but little disposition on the part of the sisterhood to organize themselves into societies for the purpose of raising funds for Missionary purposes. But your committee are aware of the fact that the work is new to most of the ladies in this Association, but we feel confident that once they are educated to the great and good work before them, and the immense good that can be accomplished by a little effort on their part that they will readily engage in the work of raising means to send the Gospel, not only to the destitute in our lands, but to the heathen.

Everything to be done decently and in order must have a system. The ladies in each church must organize themselves into a Missionary Society with proper officers and make their collections either monthly or quarterly. By adopting such a plan of operation they will be astonished at the end of the year to see how much they can raise.

We would recommend that Pastors of churches use their efforts to encourage and assist the ladies in the churches they serve to organize.

And we would further recommend that this Association select some sister within its bounds to take hold of this work.

ARTICES OF FAITH.

5 We believe in the total depravity of the human heart, and that the natural state of man is such; that he cannot prepare himself for Divine favor without the assisting Grace of God enabling him to act according to the good pleasure of His divine will.

6 We believe in justification by faith, which gives peace with God,

through our Lord Jesus Christ,

7 We believe that the Gospel of Christ is a means of Divine appointment to bring sinners to repentance and faith in Jesus Christ, and there-

fore should be preached to all.

8 We believe that all those who are regenerated by the Spirit of God are made the heirs of God and joint heirs with our Lord Jesus Christ and that they are kept by the power of God through faith unto eternal salvation and that not one of them will be lost.

9 We believe that baptism is the immersion of the whole body in water; that the only proper subjects are described in the preceding article, and the only proper administrators are those who have been regularly ordained by a church of Christ by the imposition of hands by a Presbytery.

10 We believe that the Lord's Supper was instituted by our Lord Jesus Christ to be commemorated by His followers, and that none "but

baptised believers" have a Scriptural right to partake thereof.

11 We believe that the washing of the Saints' feet according to the example recorded in the 13th chapter of John's Gospci is a duty enjoined by the Lord Jesus upon His followers, and should be observed immediately after the Lord's Supper.

12 We believe in a general resurrection of the righteous and the wicked, and the wicked shall go away into everlasting punishment, but the

righteous into life eternal.

13 We believe that infants and idiots are saved through the merits of the Lord Jesus Christ.

But the Bible, the great mag, na charter of the followers of Christ teach us that no drunkard hath eternal life abiding in him, and therefore, the sin of intemperance from strong drink is of greater magnitude than any other sin of intemperance, because of the evil influence that results from, and the effects produced by strong drink. Of all the professing christians on earth, Baptists ought to be the most temperate in all things, because they claim to be the light of the world. The Scriptures positively teach that Heaven is a prepared place for a prepared people, and your committee is of the opinion that any member of the Baptist church who is guilty of drunkeness, or who aids and abets, or votes for the perpetuation of the whiskey saloon, is unregenerated and should be excluded from the fellowship of the church, and we earnestly recommend to churches of this Association that when any of its members are guilty of these things that they apply the rod of discipline, and drive them out, that the house of God may be purged of the leaven of intemperance, for the time has come when judgment must begin at the house of God. As we believe that there should be a more thorough consecration of God's people to the cause of temperance, we would recommend the adoption of the following

PREAMBLE AND RESOLUTIONS.

WHEREAS, We, as Missionary Baptists, regard the liquor trafic as one of the greatest evils that this or any other country was ever cursed with, and that nothing but a determined opposition on the part of the friends of temperance will succeed in stamping out the evil, therefore be it

2. That we are opposed to the manufacture and sale of all intoxicating liquors of any kind, and that we will use our utmost efforts to crush out

3. We hereby brand the theory of license, be it high or low, as satanic

in nature and damnable in practice.

4. That we, as an Association of Baptists, hereby declare to the world that we have no fellowship with any Association organization that does

not antagonize and seek the suspension of this trade.

5. We further declare that henceforth we will be more constant and persistent in our efforts to turn all men away from the support of the rum power; and devoutly calling upon Almighty God to help us in our unyielding opposition to this dreadful foe. Z. DEES, Chairman.
