THURSDAY, OCTOBER 15, 1891.

The twentieth annual session of the Suwannee Missionary Baptist Association convened today with Hatch Bend church.

The introductory sermon was preached by Elder T. J. Kelly from 2nd, Corinthians, 9th chapter, 3rd verse.

The body was then called to order by the former clerk.

Elder B. D. Harrell was appointed Moderator pro tem.

The hour of meeting was fixed at nine o'clock a.m., and adjournment at four o'clock p.m.

SECOND DAY, OCTOBER 16, 1891.

A motion to limit each speaker to fifteen minutes was adopted. Report of the Committee on Education was received, and after being ably discussed was adopted, see Exhibit B.

On motion took a recess until 1:30 p. m.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

The body was called to order by the Moderator.

Letters were received from the following named churches, and names of Messengers enrolled, to-wit:

The Committee on Preaching reported Eld. O. J. Revels to preach to-night and Eld D. F. Ward to-morrow at 11 o'clock.

Motion to have articles of faith, rules of decorum and the constitution printed in the minutes was adopted.

On motion J. O. Ross was placed on the Sabbath School Cemmittee, in place Eld. T. J. Kelly.

Call for reports of committees.

Committee on Temperance reported, and after being ably discussed was adopted, see Exhibit C.

Appointed to State Convention-Elds, B. D. Harrell, T. J. Kelly and C. L. Mills.

Messengers to Hamilton Association-Elds. B. D. Harrell, J. W. Grantham and Brothers D. R. Roberson, H. C. Sealey.

On motion the Clerk was instructed to notify Eld. W. P. High, the former Treasurer of this Association, of the election of a new Treasurer and to turn over funds on hand to said Treasurer, and report to the Clerk of this Association.

On motion adjourned until 9 o'clock Saturday morning

THIRD DAY, OCTOBER 17, 1891.

Met pursuant to adjournment, called to order by the Moderarator; prayer by Elder J. W. Grantham; minutes of the previous day read, corrected and adopted.

Letter received, read and name of delegate enrolled from Bethel, Lafayette county.

The Committee on Deceased Ministers and Deacons made their report. The Association then bowed in prayer and thanksgiving unto God for sparing of His servants, and that more laborers may be sent in His vineyard. Prayer was offered by Eld. B. R. Moseley, after which the report was adopted. See Exhibit D.

Report of Committee on Sabbath Schools read, and after being ably discussed, was adopted. See Exhibit E.

On motion the Clerk was instructed to give a letter of dismission to any church asking dismission from this Association.

Report of Committe on Finance read, and on motion was adopted. See Exhibit F.

Committee on preaching made the following report: Eld. B. D. Harrell to preach to-night, Eld. J. N. Reid to-morrow at 11 o'clock.

Motion to give Moderator the right to appoint place for holding next session of this Association. Motion withdrawen.

Motion to have churches insert the names of their officers in their letters to Associations was adopted.

Motion to have Association to meet on Friday instead of Thursday was tabled.

On motion the Clerk was given the right to have the minutes printed wherever he thought best.

On motion the following named brethren were elected a Missionary Board: Eld. O. J. Revels, H. C. Sealy, of Suwanee county, W. C. Johnson, R. P. Langston, of Lafayette county.

Motion to change constitution, so as to allow a Clerk to be elected outside of delegation. Motion tabled.

Motion to strike out the fifth section of constitution. Motion tabled.

On motion the Clerk was allowed ten dollars for his services. The Clerk donated five dollars of his fees to the Association. On motion the same was donated to Hatch Bend Church. On motion the balance of associational funds (\$3.85) was donated to Hatch Bend Church.

On motion of Bro. Sealey, the thanks of this body were tendered the brethren, sisters and friends of Hatch Bend Church for the hospitable manner in which they entertained this Association.

On motion Eld. B. D. Harrell was appointed to preach the next Introductory Sermon; Eld. J. J. Holmes, alternate.

On motion adjourned to meet with Mt. Pisgah Church, in Suwannee county, on Thursday before the 3d Sunday in October, 1892.

EXHIBIT E. SABBATH SCHOOLS.

Your Committee on Sabbath Schools beg leave to make the following report:

That out of twenty-three churches represented at this Association, we find but one Sabbath School reported. We would ask in the name of God is this all the Baptist Sabbath School that exist in the bounds of this Association? If it is, then your committee would further say: God pity the religious zeal that exists in the churches and Baptist leaders in this Association.

Your committee believes the Sabbath School is the hand maiden of the church when properly conducted.

The prosperity of Pedo-Baptist and Catholic Churches is mainly due to their thorough system of Sabbath School training. If Baptists would have their children embrace the true faith of the Gospel they must be educated in the fundamental principles of the Gospel; and we ask you, brethren, where else can this training be given except at the fireside and in the Sabbath School.

It is with deep regret that your committee find a disposition on the part of Baptists in this Association to compromise with error by using union literature, because it is cheap, and because they can have larger attendance in certain localities.

Perhaps, brethren, in these localities, think they are doing best but they are not from this fact. Pedo-Baptists claim that it is not right to preach from the pulpit, those fundamental doctrines of the New Testament, that distinguish Baptists from other denominations, and those fundamental principles are excluded from the union literature, consequently in the use of union 1 terature Baptists are permitting their children to be educated for membership in Pedo-Baptist societies your; committee beg leave to say to Baptists everywhere that such a course is abominable in the sight of God. The Baptist Publication Society proposes that we as good

terms as any publishing house in America, and we had better have a small Sabbath School with pure literature than a large Sabbath School with trashy stuff.

We earnestly recommend to the churches of this association to organize at once a Sabbath School in each church with pure Baptist literature, and mark the difference in the result in the future.

CONSTITUTION.

SECTION 1. This Association shall be known as the Suwannee Baptist Association.

SEC. 2. This Association shall be composed of Messengers, elected by the several churches connected with the Association, each church being entitled to two Messengers, and one additional Messenger for every twenty-five members, or, fractional part thereof over fifty, and such members shall be received by the Association.

Sec. 3. This Association shall at their annual meeting, elect from their members by ballot, a Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer, who shall serve for one year.

SEC. 4. The object of this Association shall be:

1st. To promote unity and brotherly love among the churches.

2nd. To promote Gospel discipline.

3rd To encourage the universal spread of the Gospel and practical religion throughout our bounds and elsewhere.

SEC. 5. A Missionary Committee shall be appointed by the Moderator at each annual meeting of the body, subject to the approval of the Association, whose duty shall be to dilligently inquire into the destitution within our bounds, make contracts with ministers of this Association, or other Associations in correspondence with this, for ministerial labors to be supplied to these destitutions, and report the result of their labors for the approval of the Association.

Sec. 6. This Association shall invite correspondents and visting brethren to seats when in session, who shall be entitled to the privilege of aiding the Association with their counsels; and this Association may also withdraw from any church that may be in disorder, when the same cannot be restored.

SEC 7. The Annual meeting of this Association shall begin on Thursday before the third sunday in October, and by appointment there shall be an introductory sermon preached the first day, and on the Sabbath a collection taken up for missionary purposes.

SEC 8. This Association shall not lord it over (4od's heritage, nor infringe upon any of the internal rights of the churches, but

shall only act as an advisory body.

SEC. 9. This Constitution may be amended only by a twothirds vote of the Messengers present, provided the amendment be reduced to writing.

*ARTICLES OF FAITH.

1. We believe in one only true and living God, the Father, Son and Holy Ghost, and that These Three are One.

2. We believe that the Old and New Testament Scriptures are

the work of God, and the only rules of faith and practice.

3. We believe in election, according to the foreknowledge of God, through sanctification of the spirit and belief of the truth.

4. We believe that the grace of God that bringeth salvation hath appeared unto all men, and that nothing prevents the salvation of the vilest sinner on earth but his own volutary rejection of

that grace.

5. We believe in the total depravity of the human heart, and that the natural state of man is such that he cannot prepare himself for Divine favor without the assisting Grace of God, enabling him to act, according to the good pleasure of His Divine Will.

6. We believe in justification by faith, which gives peace with

God, through our Lord Jesus Christ.

7. We believe that the Gospel of Christ is a means of divine appointment, to bring sinners to repentance and faith in Jesus

Christ, and therefore should be preached to all

8. We believe that all those who are regenerated by the Spirit of God are made heirs of God and joint heirs with our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ; and that they are kept by the Power of God through faith unto eternal salvation, and that not one of them will be lost.

9. We believe that baptism is the immersion of the whole body in water; that the only proper subjects are described in the preceding article, and the only proper administrators are those who have been regularly or lained by a Church of Christ by the imposition of hands of a Presbytery.

10. We believe that the Lord's Supper was instituted by our Lord Jesus Christ, to be commemorated by His followers, and that none but "baptized believers" have a scriptural right to partake

thereof.

11. We believe that the washing of feet, according to the example recorded in the 13th Chapter of John's Gospel, is a duty enjoined by the Lord Jesus Christ upon His followers, and should be observed immediately after the Lord's Supper, but, in no case shall this article be so construed as to make it a test of fellowship.

12. We believe in a general resurrection of the righteous and the wicked, and that the wicked shall go away into everlasting punishment, but the righteous into life eternal.

13. We believe that infants and idots are saved through the

merits of our Lord Jesus Christ.

RULES + OF + DECORUM.

ARTICLE 1. At the first meeting of each annual session of the Association, the Moderator of the previous session shall call the Messengers to order, and, after singing and prayer, he shall declare the Association ready for business; the first item being the election of a Moderator and Clerk, after the Messengers have enrolled their nam s. In case of absence of the Moderator, the Messengers present shall elect a Moderator pro tem., who shall proceed as aforesaid.

ART. 2. Each meeting of the Association shall be opened and

closed with singing and prayer.

ART. 3. The moderator shall preserve order and decide all questions in debate, subject to an appeal to the body, and when speaking on any subject, shall call some member to the chair, and in case of a tie. may give the casting vote.

ART. 4. All committees shall be appointed by the Moderator,

subject to a vote of the body.

ART. 5. The Clerk shall keep a careful record of the proceedings of each meeting, and, in the absence of the Moderator, shall call the Association to order and preside until a Moderator pro tem. is elected.

ART. 6. No business shall be transacted without a quorum, which shall consist of a majority of the registered members.

ART. 7. All members wishing to speak shall arise and respectfully address the Moderator, confine themselves strictly to the subject without asking leave of the chair, and no unkind allusions shall be made while speaking.

ART. 8. No motion shall be debatable until seconded, nor voted upon until stated by the Moderator or read by the Clerk.

ART. 9. When a question is under debate, no motion shall be received except to adjourn, lay on the table, to amend, indefinitely postpone, refer to a committee, or otherwise call for the previous question.

ART. 10. Any member voting in the majority may move a re-

consideration at any time during the session.

ART. 11. The rules of decorum may be amended at any annual session of the Association by a majority vote of the members present.
