Because we believe this, we do earnestly ask every pastor here to give this line of work a part of his time and try to get the ladies of his church started to work. We also ask each sister who has tried and met with failure and become discouraged to remember, If ye sow, ye also shall reap', so let us not be weary, but labor on, knowing God will crown our efforts after a while

"We believe the best work the sisters can do just now, is to distribute m ssion literature and create an interest in missions, and then be ready to meet that inte est, when awakened, with information as to the work each one can do, for there is a work all can do and should do.

"Sisters! let us go about it with the same enthusiasm we do our home work. If we do, when we meet a year from now at our Association, our report will not be, of necessity, as doleful as this.

"Let us work and not go home and neglect, but do our best to spread the tidings, and "Lo, I am with you even to the end of the world.' Our reports this year show a contribution of \$118.70. #### ON MINISTERIAL S PPORT.

"We, as Baptists, profess to take the Bible as the only rule of faith and practice, but brethren, is it not a sad fact that many of our churches are ignoring the teachings of God's word upon this subject? In consequence of this our ministers are greatly crippled in their usefulness and the churches are suffering for lack of proper pastoral service. If our brethren wish to obey their Lord we beg them to study the teaching of his Word upon this subject. We refer to the following Scriptures: Jesus says, 'The laborer is worthy of his hire,' Luke

:: . Read the 9th. chapter of st. Cor.; the 11th. chapter of 2nd. for.; and 2nd. Cor. xii: 13; and many other passages. There is nothng more clearly taught in the Bible than that churches should suport their pastors, and the pastor that does not teach the church its uty in this respect is not faithful as a pastor and is doing the churchs a great injury."

## TEMPERANCE REPORT.

"We, your committee on temperance, beg leave to make the folowing as our report: First, we beliave that intoxicating liquors are ne of the greatest evils of the land. We gather from practical lesons the following, even from the pen of Ingersoll, the great light of afidelity and opposer of christianity. He says intemperance cuts own youth in its vigor, manhood in its strength, and age in its weakess. It breaks the father's heart, bereaves the doting mother, blights arental hope and brings mourning age to the grave, death, not life. makes wives widows, children or hans, fathers fiends, and all of nem paupers and beggars. It covers the land with idle ess, misery nd crime. It fills jails, supplies alms-houses and demands asylums. f sters quarrels and cherishes riot. It crowds penetentiaries and irnishes victims for the scaffold.

"Oh, if christians those who are born of God, would do as they e commanded to do the great burden of taxation to run the courts our country would be lightened and the money, thus expended, suld be used to send the Gospel of a blessed Savior to the dying peoe in foreign lands. Our sons and daughters, instead of bringing our ey hairs in sorrow to the grave, would be shining lights an! better repared to enter into that rest that remains for the people of God. rethren, those who profess to be lovers of the Lord, there is very litgood accomplished to meet once a year and write up reports, pay a erk ten dollars, a printer twenty dollars, and get our work in mine form, carry them home and lay them away merely for reference, r the next Association. For Heaven's sake let us pray the Lord to lp us get aroused from our lethargy and put our works in action, d we urge the churches of this Association to use stricter discipline regard to intemperance. And we further recommend that our Baptist people, as far as possible, procure Baptist books and literature for our children to read and study, and to studiously avoid all trashy literature that is so dangerous in poisoning the minds of the young. We would urgently recommend the Baptist denomination to patronize our Southern and Northern Baptist Publication Societies, and our Baptist Witness, published at Ocala, Fla., as the organ of our denomination. # CONSTITUTION.

Section . This Association shall be known as the Suwannee Baptist Association.

Section 2. This Association shall be composed of messengers elected by the several churches connected with the Association, each church being entitled to two messengers, and one additional messenger for every twenty-five members, or fractional part there of, over fifty, and such members shall be received by the Association.

Section 3 This Association shall, at their annual meeting, elect from their members, by ballot, a Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer, who shall serve for one year.

Section 4. The object of this Association shall be: First, to promote unity and brotherly love among the churches. Second, to promote Gospel discipline. Third, to encourage the universal spread of the Gospel and practical religion throughout our bounds and elsewhere.

Section 5. A Missionary Committee shall be appointed by the Moderator at each annual meeting of the body, subject to the approval of the Association, whose duty it shall be to diligently inquire into the destitution within our bounds, make contracts with ministers of this Association, or other Associations in correspondence with this, for ministerial labors to supply these destitutions, and report the result of their labors for the approval of the Association.

Section 6. This Association shall invite correspondence and visiting brethren to seats when in session, who shall be entitled to the privilege of aiding the Association with their counsels; and this Association may also withdraw from any church that may be in disorder, when the same cannot be restored.

Section 7. The annual meeting of this Association shall begin on Thursday before the third Sunday in October, and by appointment there shall be an Introductory sermon preached the first day, and on the Sabbath a collection taken up for missionary purposes.

Section 8. This Association shall not lord it over God's heritage, nor infringe upon any of the internal rights of the churches, but shall only act as an advisory body

Section 9. This constitution may be amended only by a two-thirds

ote of the messengers present, provided the amendment be reduced owriting.

# ARTICLES OF FAITH.

- 1. We believe in one only true and living God, the Father, Son and Coly Ghost, and that these three are one.
- 2. We believe that the Old and New Testament Scriptures are Vord of God, and the only rules of faith and practice.
- 3. We believe in election, according to the foreknowledge of God, brough sanctification of the spirit and belief of the truth.
- . We believe that the grace of God that bringeth salvation hath opeared unto all men, and that nothing prevents the salvation of the elest sinner on earth but his own voluntary rejection of that grace.
- 5. We believe in the total depravity of the human heart, and that he natural state of man is such that he cannot prepare himself for evine favor without the assisting grace of God, enabling him to act ecording to the good pleasure of His divine will.
- 6. We believe in justification by faith, which gives peace with God, prough our Lord Jesus Christ.
- 7. We believe that the Gospel of Christ is a means of divine appointment, to bring sinners to repentance and faith in Jesus Christ, and therefore should be preached to all.
- 8. We believe that all those who are regenerated by the Spirit of od are made heirs of God and joint heirs with our Lord and Savior esus Christ; and that they are kept by the power of God through with unto eternal salvation, and that not one of them will be lost.
- 9. We believe that baptism is the immersion of the whole body in ater; that the only proper subjects are described in the preceding arcles, and the only proper administrators are those who have been egularly ordained by a church of Christ by the imposition of hands a presbytery.
- 10. We believe that the Lord's Supper was instituted by our Lord esus Christ, to be commemorated by his followers, and that none but aptized believers have a spiritual right to partake thereof.
- 11. We believe that the washing of feet, according to the example

recorded in the thirteenth chapter of John's Gospel, is a duty enjoined by the Lord Jesus Christ upon His followers, and should be observed immediately after the Lord's Supper, but in no case shall this article be so construed as to make it a test of fellowship.

# RULES OF DECORUM.

Article 1. At the first meeting of each annual session of the Association, the Moderator of the previous session shall call the messengers to order, and, after singing and prayer, he shall declare the Association ready for business; the first item being the election of a Moderator and Clerk, after messengers have enrolled their names. In case af the absence of the Moderator, the messengers present shall elect a Moderator pro tem, who shall proceed as aforesaie.

Article 2. Each meeting of the Association shall be opened with singing and prayer.

Article 3. The Moderator shall preserve order and decide all questions in debate, subject to an appeal to the body, and when speaking on any subject, shall call some member to the chair, and in case of a tie may give the casting vote.

Article 4. All committees shall be appointed by the Moderator, subjet to vote of the body.

Article 5. The clerk shall keep a careful record of the proceedings of each meeting, and, in the absence of the Moderator, shall call the Association to order and preside until a Moderator pro tem. is elected.

Article 6. No business shall be transacted without a quorum, who shall consist of a majority of the registered members.

Article 8. All members wishing to speak shall arise and respectfully address the Moderator, confining themselves strictly to the subject, and no unkind allusion shall be made while speaking.
