CONSTITUTION.

SEC. 1. This Association shall be known as the

SUWANNEE BAPTIST ASSOCIATION.

SEC. 2. This Association shall be composed of messengers elected by the several churches connected with the Association, each church being entitled to two messengers, and an additional messenger for each twenty-five members, or fractional part thereof over fifty, and such members shall be received by the Association.

SEC. 3. This Association shall, at its annual meeting, elect from its members, by ballot, a Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer, who shall serve for one year.

SEC. 4. The object of this Association shall be: First, to promote unity and brotherly love among the churches; second, to promote Gospel discipline; third, to encourage the universal spread of the Gospel and practical religion throughout our bounds and elsewhere.

SEC. 5. A Missionary Committee shall be appointed by the Moderator at each annual meeting of the body, subject to the approval of the Association, whose duty it shall be to diligently inquire into the destination within our bounds, make contracts with ministers of this Association, or other Associations in correspondence with this, for ministerial labors to supply these destitutions, and report the result of their labors for the approval of the Association.

SEC. 6. This Association shall invite correspondents and visiting brethren to seats when in session, who shall be entitled to the privilege of aiding the Association with their counsel, and this Association may also withdraw from any church that may be in disor-

der, when the same cannot be restored.

SEC. 7. The annual meeting of this Association shall begin on Thursday before the third Sunday in October, and by appointment there shall be an Introductory Sermon preached the first day, and on the Sabbath a collection taken up for missionary purposes.

SEC. 8. This Association shall not lord it over God's heritage, nor infringe upon any of the internal rights of the churches, but shall only act as an advisory body.

SEC. 9. This Constitution may be amended only by a two-thirds vote of the messengers present, provided the amendment be reduced to writing.

ARTICLES OF FAITH.

1. We believe in one only true and living God—the Father, Son and Holy Ghost; and that these three are one.

2. We believe that the Old and New Testament Scriptures are the work of God, and the only rule of faith and practice.

3. We believe in election according to the fore-knowledge of God, through sanctification of the Spirit

and belief of the truth.

4. We believe that the grace of God that bringeth salvation hath appeared unto all men, and that nothing prevents the salvation of the vilest sinner on earth but his only voluntary rejection of that grace.

5. We believe in the depravity of the human heart, and that the natural state of man is such that he can not prepare himself for divine favor without the assisting grace of God, enabling him to act according to the good pleasure of His divine will.

6. We believe in justification by faith, which

gives peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ.
7. We believe that the Gospel of Christ is the means of divine appointment to bring sinners to repentance and faith in Jesus Christ, and therefore should

be preached to all.

8. We believe that all those who are regenerated by the Spirit of God are made heirs of God and joint heirs with our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ, and that they are kept by the power of God, through faith, until eternal salvation; and that no one of them will be lost.

9. We believe that baptism is the immersion of the whole body in water; that the only proper subjects are described in the preceding articles, and the only proper administrators are those who have been regularly ordained by a Church of Christ by the imposition of hands of a presbytery.

10. We believe that the Lord's Supper was instituted by our Lord Jesus Christ to be commemorated by His followers, and that none but baptized believers

have a Scriptural right to partake thereof.

11. We believe that the washing of feet, according to the example recorded in the thirteenth chapter of John's Gospel, is a duty enjoined by the Lord Jesus upon His followers, and should be observed immediately after the Lord's Supper, but in no case shall this

article be so construed as to make it a test of fellow-

ship.

12. We believe in a general resurrection of the righteous and the wicked, and that the wicked shall go away into everlasting punishment, but the righteous into life eternal.

13. We believe that infants and idiots are saved

through the merits of our Lord Jesus Christ.

RULES OF DECORUM.

Article 1. At the first meeting of each annual session of the Association, the Moderator of the previous session shall call the messengers to order, and, after singing and prayer, he shall declare the Association ready for business, the first item being the election of a Moderator and Clerk, after the messengers have enrolled their names. In case of the absence of the Moderator, the messengers present shall elect a Moderator pro tem., who shall proceed as aforesaid.

Art. 2. Each meeting of the Association shall be opened

with singing and prayer.

Art. 3. The Moderator shall preserve order and decide all questions in debate, subject to an appeal to the body, and when speaking on any subject, shall call some member to the chair, and in case of a tie, may give the casting vote.

Art. 4. All committees shall be appointed by the Moder-

ator, subject to the vote of the body.

Art. 5. The Clerk shall keep a careful record of the proceedings of each meeting, and, in the absence of the Moderator, shall call the Association to order and preside until a Moderator pro tem is elected.

Art. 6. No business shall be transacted without a quorum, which shall consist of a majority of the registered members.

Art. 7. All members wishing to speak shall arise and respectfully address the Moderator, confine themselves strictly to the subject, and no unkind allusions shall be made while speaking.

Art. 8. No motion shall be debated until seconded, nor voted upon until stated by the Moderator or read by the Clerk.

Art. 9. When a question is under depate, no motion shall be received, except to adjourn, lay on the table, amend, indefinitely postpone, refer to a committee, or otherwise call for the previous question.

Art. 10. Any member voting in the majority may move a

reconsideration at any time during the session.

Art. 11. The Rules of Decorum may be amended at any annual session of the Association by a majority vote of the members present.

REPORT ON STATE MISSIONS.

In reporting on State Missions we do not disregard the teachings of our Lord when he said, "Ye are the Light of the World," "The World is the Field," "Go Ye into all the World and Preach the Gospel," "Go Ye Therefore and Teach all Nations," "Ye Shall be my Witnesses in Jerusalem and all Judea, Samaria and the Uttermost Parts of the Earth." It is in regard to the Judean part of the command that we referespecially to in this report. Our State is growing in wealth and population wonderfully indeed. There are great stretches of country in Florida without the Gospel. Thousands of foreigners are pouring in upon us yearly, and thousands of Americans are coming into our State; colonies are being planted, farms cleared and people settling down with us. Shall we not give them the Gospel? Let us see to it that our churches adopt a systematic plan of giving, whether it be little or much, give it regularly and it will mean great things for the advancement of our Lord's Kingdom. We urge upon our pastors the importance of this work and ask that they insist upon their people giving regularly and systematically.

AFTERNOON SESSION, FRIDAY.

Cailed to order by the Moderator. Prayer by Dr. H. W. Tribble, of Columbia College. The report on General Education and Columbia College was read, and Dr. H. W. Tribble given the right-of-way to speak to said report, who made an able address on Education, after which an offering of \$25.55 was given to the college. Report follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON GENERAL EDUCATION AND COLUMBIA COLLEGE.

Your Committee appointed at this session to report upon General Education and Columbia College beg leave to report that but few questions are now more important to the Baptists of Florida than that of general education. When we recall that our numerical strength as a denomination is now approximately 40,000 members who are daily confronted with problems that only

trained minds can well solve, and that much is expected of us and that we owe much to the people among whom we live, we are at once led to the conclusion that in order to acquit ourselves as we should we must insist upon general education and dissemination of knowledge among our people. The greatest achievements can only come from the educated mind, and as general education spreads among the people they will not, and ought not, tolerate ignorance on the part of those who should lead in thought and action. The educated head is now absolutely essential. The State realizes the importance of this, but owing to our peculiar institutions we cannot find in our State institutions of learning that kind of education which is peculiarly essential to our denominational life. The State and Church must be kept separate. Therefore, we of necessity, in order to provide for a full rounded education, one that gives us not only cultured minds but cultured and Christian hearts as well, must look to the Christian school, and above all to our own denominational schools. This leads us to present for your consideration our beloved Columbia College as worthy of our hearty and material support. This college, a gift to the Baptists, princely in its magnitude, now firmly established and grand in its glorious possibilities and destiny is the "Child of the Florida Baptist Convention." Coming to us as a splendid gift from the people of Lake City, where it is located, comprising an acreage of some 355 acres, equipped with property worth \$225,000, now officered by that giant intellect and Christian preacher, Dr. H. W. Tribble, provided with a faculty the equal of any college in Florida, and having a student body now of 125, with students entering almost daily, and our Baptist people in other parts of the State rallying to its support, can we, will we do less than our very best for this college? This college was accepted as a donation, and under the most solemn obligation to maintain it. Our trustees are doing all in their power to carry out the instructions of Florida Baptists. We must help them by contribution of our means, by patronizing when sending boys and girls to college, and by our prayers. The State Convention at DeFuniak pledged this college \$5,000 per year for a fixed period to help carry ministerial students until sufficient endowment can be raised which, with tuition, will render the college self-sustaining. The Baptists within the Suwannee Association must carry their part 12

of this burden if we hope to rejoice in the success it shall attain.

We recommend that each church in the Association take a prompt collection to aid in raising the amount pledged by the Convention, and that this college thereafter become a regular object of our systematic giving. Respectfully submitted,

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON ORPHANAGE.

We believe the subject on which we report to be one that should be much upon our hearts, and that the very mention of our Florida Baptist Orphanage ought to enlist the attention and interest of all of our people who desire to do God's will. We believe that the care we bestow upon the fatherless is one of New Testament tests of the purity of our religion. God in His great wisdom has ordained that the strong should ever help the weak. As the needs have increased the love of God and of humanity has constrained Christian people to provide homes where dependant orphan children may be cared for and trained for lives of usefulness. The Baptists of Florida have reason to be proud of their orphanage located at Arcadia. We have a good home and two of God's noblest children, Brother and Sister Bean, in charge. God has certainly set the seal of His approval on the work there. The institution is not vet six years old and ninety children have been received and cared for. Their minds are being trained, they are being taught to work, and their hearts are not overlooked. Many of them have become Christians. Who can conceive of a greater and more enduring work? This is our Home. It is entirely dependent on our gifts for support. We have the glorious privilege of being father and mother to these children in the way of support to the glory of God. We insist that as individuals, Sunday schools and churches ever keep the noble work before us and give it our faithful and constant support. They need at all times the things that are needed in our homes, food, clothing, bed clothes, etc., and money for running expenses. It is our work because it's God's work. It is a work that ought to touch a tender and responsive chord in every heart. and ought to occupy a place second to none in our convention work and prayers.

REPORT ON HOME MISSIONS.

Dear Brethren:—By investigating the work of the Home Mission Board we note that there is much being done through our Home Mission Board. There have been several missionaries employed by our Home Mission Board and sent to the various parts of the Home Mission territory.

Dear Brethren, we as Baptists, are responsible for

the support of the Gospel in destitute places.

In looking over the report of the Secretary of our Home Board we note that much interest has been taken for the spread of the Gospel. We find from this report that our Home Mission Board has about twenty Home Mission workers working in Oklahoma, and is working in Cuba and several other places. The statistics show that the number of baptisms reported by our Home Mission Board last year was 25,109, a gain of 2,707. The number of additions to mission churches was 47,808, a gain of 7,391. The number of churches organized by missionaries was 146, a gain of 12. In the Evangelistic department there were 4,932 professions of faith, an increase of 1,949. The number of churches built or improved was 368, an increase of 30. On the financial side the \$283,436 raised was an increase of \$35,298 over the year preceding.

But while we know that there has been a great interest taken by our Home Mission Board and workers. we also note with much regret that there was only \$187.11 sent up to the Home Mission Board from our Suwannee Association last year, and brethren, we urge that each of us take a greater interest in pushing forward the great work of Home Missions in the future than we have in the past.

We earnestly pray that the spirit of dissension and division cease to exist amongst us and that we liberally contribute to and co-operate with our committee for the great cause of missions.

We recommend that our Executive Committee become affiliated with our State Board and that our Associational Mission work be done by said board, i. e. That the State Board appoint a missionary to work in our bounds and through our committee supervise the

the work. That the money now on hand and all future contributions for this purpose be paid to the corresponding secretary of State Board of Missions. We further recommend that our Fifth Sunday meetings in the future be auxiliary to the Association, and that all contributions sent to said meetings be paid to the Treasurer of this Association and held by him subject to the order of our Executive Committee.

REPORT OF STANDING COMMITTEE ON SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

Your Committee on Sunday Schools in making its report feels that it should say by way of explanation for the lack of details as to the condition of the work within the bounds of the Suwannee Association, that on account of limited notice it has been unable to obtain data of the actual work being done in our Association, and, therefore, this report must be confined to urging the importance of this work upon the churches and the adult members within the Association.

First—There must be active and general co-operation on the part of the parents if we shall attain the highest success. Much must come from the parent by precept and example. There is too prevalent the idea that the Sunday School is an institution intended exclusively for the child. No greater error could be made. The Sunday School is primarily the place for teaching the Bible and leading the pupil into the light that never fadeth, and until our adult members have become graduates, as it were, of the word of God and adepts in handling "the Sword of the Spirit," no shadow of excuse, much less reason, can be given for non-attendance upon their part, nor, till parent can truthfully say that his negligence in this respect does not harmfully effect the child, should be ever undertake to excuse himself from the performance of this duty. Complete knowledge of the Bible is not supposed, even, in fact, ever attainable. Yet we venture the assertion that a large majority of the adult church members absent themselves from the Sunday School, leaving this vital work to the children and a few faithful teachers. Never can the child be made to see the necessity for or duty of attending the school until father and mother are found in the classes on the Sabbath. The nature of the child is to believe that the action of father and mother in any given case is right, and in no way can we better lead them into the error of minimizing the value of Sunday Schools than by our failure to attend. We are frank to say that we can conceive of no answer the parent can give when the little child inquires why he should attend if father and mother do not. This question cannot be answered satisfactorily either to the child or deep in our consciences to our God.

Second-We would impress the fact that the Sunday school is the great feeder of the church, to which it should be strongly anchored. As the Academy in literary effort furnishes material for the college, and the latter for our Universities, so the properly conducted Sunday school should be, and is, the greatest factor in increasing not only the membership, but the real spiritual growth of our churches, and the church which fails to cultivate wisely this important auxiliary field of Christian endeavor and power is signally neglecting to perform a sacred duty it owes to the community, to itself and to God. Our motto should be "All the Church in the Sunday school, and all the Sunday school in the Church." Statistics show that about eighty (80) per cent of the church membership comes through the Sunday schools. With this overwhelming proof of the value of such work before us, the church that does not spend its utmost effort in strengthening this base of supply must not be disappointed if disintegration and death enter its doors and it be left shorn of its spiritual locks in the presence of the enemy of righteousness.

We rejoice that much needed work is being done by our Field Secretary, Brother Louis Entzminger, and we urge upon our Board the necessity of keeping Bro. Entzminger in the field. To this end we recommend to our churches and Sunday schools the importance of rallying to the assistance of the Board and supporting the work by generous contributions. Bro. Entzminger has already held one Sunday school institute within the bounds of this Association. It was held at Clayland church and we expect to see much good come from this work. Other churches should make application to the Board for the services of this consecrated brother.

We take from the last minutes the following Sunday school statistics: Number churches, 30; total membership, 2,222; No. Sunday schools, 9; No. teachers, 36; No. pupils, 535.

From the twenty churches from which letters have been sent up to the present session: No. churches reported, 20; total membership, 1,700; Sunday schools, 8;

pupils, 550.

We recommend that all churches not now maintaining Sunday schools organize this work without delay, and believing that much good will come by exchange of ideas and closer relations among the Sunday schools in this Association, we suggest the wisdom of providing for periodical Sunday school rallies or institutes to be held at convenient times and places within our Associational territory. This plan is being successfully followed in some portions of our State, and we strongly recommend its adoption here.

REPORT ON FOREIGN MISSIONS.

The people of these countries and of most of the islands of the sea are either bound in the lifeless forms of Catholicism and cursed with the deadly influence of priestcraft, or blighted with the idolatrous superstitions of heathen religion. They are sinners just like we and the only hope of their salvation is through faith in the atoning death of the Lord Jesus Christ. But as the Scriptures say (Rom. 10:15), "How can they believe on Him of whom they have not heard, and how can they hear without a preacher, and how can they preach except that they be sent?" If these things be true, then, unmistakably, the obligation is upon us as churches and individual believers to do all in our power to give them the Gospel of Jesus.
