Section 1. This Association, shall be known as the Suwannee Missionary Baptist Association.

Sec. 2. This Association shall be composed of Messengers elected by the several Churches connected with the Association, each Church being entitled to two Messengers, and an additional Messenger for every twenty-five, or fractional part thereof over fifty, and such members shall be received by the Association.

Sec. 3. This Association shall, at its annual meeting, elect from its members, by ballot, a Moderator, Clerk

and Treasurer, who shall serve for one year.

Sec. 4. The object of this Association shall be: First, to promote unity and brotherly love among the Churches. Second, to promote Gospel discipline. Third, to encourage the universal spread of the Gospel and practical religion throughout our bounds and elsewhere.

Sec. 5. A Missionary Committee shall be appointed by the Moderator at each annual session of the Association, subject to the approval of the Association, whose duty it shall be to diligently inquire into the destitution within our bounds, make contracts with Ministers of this Association or other Associations in correspondence with this, for ministerial labor to be supplied to the destitute, and report the result of their labor for the approval of the Association.

Sec. 6. This Association invites correspondents and visiting brethren to seats when in session, who shall be entitled to the privilege of aiding the Association with their counsel, and this Association may also withdraw from any Church that may be in disorder when the same cannot be restored.

Sec. 7. The annual meetings of this Association shall begin on Thursday before the third Sunday in October

and by appointment there shall be an Introductory Sermon preached the first day, and on the Sabbath a collection taken up for Missionary purposes.

Sec. 8. This Association shall not lord it over God's heritage nor infringe upon any of the internal rights of the Churches, but shall only act as an advisory body.

Sec. 9. This Constitution may be amended only by a two-third vote of the Messengers present, provided the amendment be reduced to writing.

# Articles of Faith.

Article 1. We believe in one only true and living God, the Father, Son and Holy Ghost, and that these three are one.

Art. 2. We believe that the Old and New Testament Scriptures are the work of God and the only rule of faith and practice.

Art. 3. We believe in Election according to the fore-knowledge of God through sanctification of the Spirit and belief of the truth.

Art. 4. We believe that the grace of God that bringeth salvation hath appeared unto all men, and that nothing prevents the salvation of the vilest sinner on earth but his own voluntary rejection of that grace.

Art. 5. We believe in the total depravity of the human heart, and that the natural state of man is such that he can not prepare himself for divine favor without the assisting grace of God, enabling him to act according to the good pleasure of His divine will.

Art. 6. We believe in justification by faith, which gives peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ.

Art. 7. We believe that the Gospel of Christ is the means of divine appointment to bring sinners to repentance and faith in Jesus Christ, and therefore should be preached to all.

Art. 8. We believe that those who are regenerated by the Spirit of God are made heirs of God and joint heirs with our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ, and that they are kept by the power of God through faith unto eternal salvation, and that not one of them will be lost.

Art. 9. We believe that baptism is the immersion of the whole body in water; that the only proper subjects are described in the preceding articles, and that the only proper administrators are those who have been regularly ordained by a Church of Christ by the imposition of hands of a presbytery.

Art. 10. We believe the Lord's Supper was instituted by our Lord Jesus Christ to be commemorated by His followers, and that none but baptised believers have a Scriptural right to partake thereof.

Art. 11. We believe that the washing of feet, according to the example recorded in the thirteenth chapter of John's Gospel, is a duty enjoined by the Lord Jesus Christ upon His followers, and should be observed immediately after the Lord's Supper, but in no case shall this article be so construed as to make it a test of fellowship.

Art. 12. We believe in a general resurrection of the righteous and the wicked, and that the wicked shall go away into everlasting punishment, but the righteous into life eternal.

Art. 13. We believe that infants and idiots are saved through the merits of our Lord Jesus Christ.

# Rules of Decorum.

1. At the first meeting of each annual session of the Association, the Moderator of the previous session shall call the Messengers to order, and, after singing and prayer, he shall declare the Association ready for business, the first item being the election of Moderator and Clerk, after the Messengers have enrolled their names. In case of the absence of the Moderator, the Messengers present shall elect a Moderator pro tem, who shall proceed as aforesaid.

2. Each meeting of the Association shall be opened and closed with singing and prayer.

3. The Moderator shall preserve order and decide all questions in debate, subject to an appeal to the body, and when speaking on any subject shall call some member to the chair, and in case of a tie may give the casting vote.

4. All committees shall be appointed by the Moderator, subject to a vote of the body.

5. The Clerk shall keep a complete record of the proceedings of each meeting, and in the absence of the Moderator, shall call the Association to order and preside until a Moderator pro tem is elected.

6. No business shall be transacted without a quorum, which shall consist of a majority of the registered members.

7. All members wishing to speak shall rise and respectfully address the Moderator, confine themselves strictly to the subject, and no unkind allusions shall be made while speaking.

8. No motion shall be debated until seconded, nor voted upon until stated by the Moderator or read by the Clerk.

9. When a question is under debate no motion shall

be received except to adjourn, lay on the table, amend, indefinitely postpone, refer to a committee, or otherwise call previous question.

10. Any member voting in the majority may move a reconsideration at any time during the session.

11. The Rules of Decorum may be amended at any annual session of the Association by a majority vote of all the members present.

#### FOREIGN MISSION REPORT.

The ideal of modern Foreign Missions is the complete realization of our Lord's commandments, "Go and disciple the nations." Our country has gone through several eras in the course of her religious development, and if your committee properly reads the signs of the times, this may be called "the era of Missionary awakening," both in that there is going on an awakening of our own Church forces which are indeed the constituency of our Foreign Mission workers, and the sleeping conscience of the adherants to false religions are being aroused by the story of the Cross as told and lived by our Missionaries in foreign fields—are being aroused

as never before in the history of Missionary enterprise. The history of our workers ten years ago was a story not only of heroes and heroines, but of martyrs who paid the price of their convictions along the lines of their duty to the lost nations of the earth with their own life's blood. It was a ceasless struggle to get a foothold in almost every country which we undertook to enter. But today how different. It is one continuous call, not only from the Missionaries themselves, but from many of the nations as well: "Come over and help us." But back to the awakening in the homeland with regard to Missionary effort, which we referred to in the beginning. There are more of our strong and noble young men and young women offering themselves for service on the foreign fields than in any period of the past, and among them are some of our own State's noblest and best. And by no means least among these is our own brother, A. Scott Patterson, a Hamilton county boy, who is rendering valuable service on one of the most hazardous fields-Africa. Florida's roll of Missionary heroes is growing at a rapid rate, and your committee urges that you shall yet "pray the Lord of the harvest that He will send forth more laborers into His harvest," for "the harvest truly is plenteous, but the laborers are few." Another indication of a new awakening among us is found in our increase in gifts to this work. The Foreign Mission contributions of the Southern Baptist Convention have grown wonderfully for the last few years, but your committee feels that the gifts from this Association to this world-wide and Heaven-planned movement have not been in keeping with, first, the increase in the number of our own workers on the field, which means that others are taking care of our own workers. Second, our gifts are not in keeping with our ability in this line, as a study of our minutes of 1910 will show. Of the thirty-two Churches of our Association accredited to us by Year Book

1910-11, of the Southern Baptist Convention, only twelve are accredited with anything for Foreign Missions, leaving twenty Churches doing nothing. These twelve contributing Churches gave the sum of \$219.09 to this cause last year, but of this amount our Church gave all but \$81.59, or in other words, thirty-one Churches in our Association, with a membership of approximately 1,800, gave the sum of \$81.59, or  $4\frac{1}{2}$  cents per capita. But this showing may be hardly fair, as there were at least 1,500 members who did absolutely nothing.

Brethren, these things ought not so to be. Our State did not receive her apportionment last year, and the large debt reported by our Foreign Board at Jackson-ville was on account of the fact that we had not done our part. Our brethren of the Foreign Board are undertaking great things this year, and your committee most heartily commends the plan of the Board in allowing Churches to subscribe for stock of \$100 per share until 6,000 shares are taken. We urge that pastors, wherever advisable or possible, arouse their Churches along this line and if possible subscribe for one or more shares of stock in this world-wide enterprise.

Adjourned for dinner until 1:30 p.m.

The Association assembled at 1:30 o'clock. Reports of State, Home and Associational Missions adopted as read.

Committee on Nominations made its report. After some discussion the report was adopted as offered by the committee.

Finance Committee made its report, which was read and adopted.

We, your committee, recommend that the Moderator suspend business for a few minutes in honor of Father Bean, and have a prayer offered for Sister Bean, his worthy wife, and for the Orphanage.

#### HOME MISSION REPORT.

Your Committee on Home Missions beg to submit the following:

Home Missions means mission work done within the bounds of the Southern Baptist Convention under the auspices of the Home Board in Atlanta. It co-operates with each State Board of Missions and makes possible vast good which would not be done without the Home Mission enterprise. The Home Mission Board conducts many departments of activity for saving the people and preparing them for lives of service, and fields, too, which would be practically untouched without this Board. It has forty-five workers among the foreigners, principally in our coast cities, Jacksonville and Tampa among them. There twenty-eight maintain schools with one hundred and twenty-seven teachers and 4,500 students maintained by our gifts to Home Missions. These schools are turning out every year scores of earnest and trained Christian young men and women. The good done is incalcuable. This good is made possible through Home Missions. The Home Board has on the field eighteen trained evangelists who last year baptized about 3,000 converts. The Board maintains thirty-five negro missionaries doing effective work among Southern negroes. We have thirty-four missionaries who supply fifty-six churches and Mission Stations in Cuba. We have five missionaries and four helpers doing a successful work in the canal zone. We have twenty missionaries among the Indians in Oklahoma, and the Home Board assisted last year in building 289 church houses. Surely such a work ought to appeal to every loval heart.

Besides all this the Home Board participates co-operating in a number of states in maintaining about 110 missionary pastors.

Your committee recommends:

1. That prayer be made in the Churches for Home

en Miller and Africa and Africa

Missions, that God may open your eyes to see and our purses to use the rich opportunities to establish our country on the everlasting Rock of Ages.

2. That regular collections throughout the year be insisted on, instead of waiting, as so many do, to the end of the year to give to this cause.

- 3. That this body provide for apportioning among the Churches the amount our Association is asked to raise.
- 4. That our pastors be requested to make an earnest effort at least once during the year to preach a special sermon on Home Missions, and the magnitude and importance of the problem involved.
- 5. That a club of subscribers be raised in each Church for the Home Field, the unusually attractive and illuminating monthly magazine of the Home Board.
- 6. That churches and pastors be encouraged to make a large use of the Home Board's informing tracts and sample copies of the Home Field, both of which are free for the asking.

#### REPORT ON STATE MISSIONS.

The work of Missions is the great work of the church. The spirit of Missions is the spirit of Christ to go into all the world and preach the gospel, is Christ's command to his church. Our Master emphasizing the begging at Jerusalem reminds us of the importance of laying a good foundation at home for a base of supplies that we may as a church be the better able to give the gospel to a lost world. What we need is more efficient preachers and more money. Our prayers should be for the Lord to send more laborers into the vineyard and for us as a church to open our hearts and pocket-books and give as the Lord has commanded us. There never was a time in the history of our state when the country was more prosperous and money more plentiful.

From a business point of view there is not a state in the Southern Baptist Convention with such varied and sundry resources as Florida. Her white cotton farms, her timber acres to her terpentine and lumber resources, her fuits and vegetable farms, together with her many other industries, makes Florida an inviting field for business men and labor of every class. Therefore her growth in population is rapid and varied, making her one of the most inviting states as a mission field. But an earnest investigation forces us to a frank confession that our growth spiritually is not as rapid as one would desire and sometimes we entertain very grave fears that our religious growth is not keeping pace with our finances. It is startling to find that we are confronted with the fact that some of the counties in our state have not as many as one resident pastor in it, and four or five having only one. These facts remind us that there is a vast area of our state in these counties referred to as well as a number of the rural districts in counties favored which is utterly destitute of the blessed

gospel. Many of the churches in the rural districts need stimulating on mission endeavor. Your committee would recommend that more attention be given this part of our work.

We also recommend that every church be asked to make a strenuous effort to raise the apportionment allotted them by the Appropriation Committee and forward same to Bro. S. B. Rodgers, our beloved Secretary.
