ARTICLES OF FAITH

1. OF THE SCRIPTURES

We believe that the Holy Bible was written by men Divinely inspired, and is a perfect treasure of heavenly instruction; that it has God for its Author, salvation for its end, and truth without any mixture of error for its matter; that it reveals the principles by which God will judge us; and therefore is, and shall remain to the end of the world, the true center of Christian union, and the supreme standard by which all human conduct, creeds, and opinions should be tried.

2. OF THE TRUE GOD

We believe that there is One, and only One living and true God, an Infinite, intelligent Spirit, Whose Name is Jehovah, the Maker and Supreme Ruler of Heaven and Earth; inexpressibly glorious in Holiness, and worthy of all possible honor, confidence and love; that in the Unity of the Godhead there are Three Persons, the Father, the Son, and the Holy Ghost; equal in every Divine Perfection, and executing distinct but harmonious Offices in the great work of Redemption.

3. OF THE FALL OF MAN

We believe that Man was created in holiness, under the law of His Maker; but by voluntary transgression fell from that holy and happy state; in consequence of which all Mankind are now sinners, not by constraint but choice; being by nature utterly void of that holiness required by the law of God, positively inclined to evil; and therefore under just condemnation to eternal ruin, without defense or excuse.

4. OF THE WAY OF SALVATION

We believe that the salvation of sinners is wholly of Grace; through the Mediatorial offices of the Son of God; Who by the appointment of the Father, freely took upon Him our nature, yet without our sin; honored the Divine law by His Personal obedience, and by His death made a full Atonement for our sins; that having risen from the dead, He is now enthroned in heaven; and uniting in His wonderful Person the tenderest sympathies with Divine Perfections, He is every way qualified to be a suitable, a compassionate, and an all-sufficient Saviour.

5. OF JUSTIFICATION

We believe that the great Gospel blessing which Christ secures to such as believe in Him is Justification; that Justification includes the pardon of sin, and the promise of eternal life on principles of righteousness; that it is bestowed, not in consideration of any works of righteousness which we have done, but solely through Faith in the Redeemer's Blood; by virtue of which faith His perfect righteousness is freely imputed to us of God; that it brings us into a state of most blessed peace and favor with God, and secures every other blessing needful for time and eternity.

6. OF THE FREENESS OF SALVATION

We believe that the blessings of salvation are made free to all by the Gospel; that it is the immediate duty of all to accept them by a cordial penitent and obedient faith; and that nothing prevents the salvation of the greatest sinner on earth, but his own inherent depravity and voluntary rejection of the Gospel; which involves him in an aggravated condemnation.

7. OF GRACE IN REGENERATION

We believe that in order to be saved, sinners must be regenerated, or born again; that regeneration consists in giving a holy disposition to the mind; that it is effected in a manner above our comprehension by the power of the Holy Spirit, in connection with Divine truth, so as to secure our voluntary obedience to the Gospel; and that its proper evidence appears in the holy fruits of repentance, and faith, and newness of life.

8. OF REPENTANCE AND FAITH

We believe that Repentance and Faith are sacred duties, and also inseparable Graces, wrought in our souls by the regenerating Spirit of God; whereby being deeply convinced of our guilt, danger and helplessness, and of the way of salvation by Christ, we turn to God with unfeigned contrition, confession, and supplication for mercy; at the same time heartily receiving the Lord Jesus Christ as our Prophet, Priest and King, and relying on Him alone as the Only and All-sufficient Saviour.

9. OF GOD'S PURPOSE OF GRACE

We believe that Election is the eternal purpose of God, according to which He graciously regenerates, sanctifies, and saves sinners; that being perfectly consistent with the free agency of man, it comprehends all the means in connection with the end; that it is a most glorious display of God's Sovereign Goodness, being Infinitely free, wise, holy and unchangeable; that it utterly excludes boasting, and promotes humility, love, prayer, praise, trust in God, and active imitation of His free mercy; that it encourages the use of means in the highest degree; that it may be ascertained by its effects in all who truly believe the Gospel; that it is the foundation of Christian assurance; and that to ascertain it with regard to ourselves demands and deserves the utmost diligence.

10. OF SANCTIFICATION

We believe that Sanctification is the process by which, according to the Will of God, we are made partakers of His Holiness; that it is a progressive work; that it is begun in regeneration; and that it is carried on in the hearts of believers by the presence and power of the Holy Spirit, the Sealer and Comforter, in the continual use of the appointed means—especially, the Word of God, self-examination, self-denial, watchfulness and prayer.

11. OF THE PERSEVERANCE OF SAINTS

We believe that such only are real believers as endure unto the end; that their persevering attachment to Christ is the grand mark which distinguishes them from superficial professors; that a special Providence watches over their welfare; and they are kept by the power of God through faith unto salvation.

12. OF THE HARMONY OF THE LAW AND THE GOSPEL

We believe that the Law of God is the eternal and unchangeable rule of His moral government; that it is holy, just, and good; and that the inability which the Scriptures ascribe to fallen men to fulfill its precepts, arises entirely from their love of sin; to deliver them from which, and to restore them through a Mediator to unfeigned obedience to the holy Law, is one great end of the Gospel, and of the Means of Grace connected with the establishment of the visible Church.

13. OF THE GOSPEL CHURCH

We believe that a visible Church of Christ is a Congregation of baptized believers, associated by Covenant in the faith and fellowship of the Gospel; observing the Ordinances of Christ; governed by His Laws; and exercising the gifts, rights, and privileges invested in them by His Word; that its only Scriptural Officers are Bishops or Pastors and Deacons, whose qualifications, claims, and duties are defined in the Epistles to Timothy and Titus.

14. OF BAPTISM AND THE LORD'S SUPPER

We believe that Christian baptism is the immersion in water of a believer, into the Name of the Father, and Son, and Holy Ghost; to show forth in a solemn and beautiful emblem, our faith in the crucified, buried, and risen Saviour, with its effects, in our death to sin and resurrection to a new life; that it is pre-requisite to the privileges of a Church relation; and to the Lord's Supper, in which the members of the Church by the sacred use of bread and wine, are to commemorate together the dying love of Christ; preceded always by solemn self-examination.

15. OF THE CHRISTIAN SABBATH

We believe that the first day of the week is the Lord's Day, or Christian Sabbath; and is to be kept sacred to religious purposes, by abstaining from all secular labor and sinful recreations, by the devout observance of all the means of Grace, both private and public; and by preparation for that rest that remaineth for the people of God.

16. OF CIVIL GOVERNMENT

We believe that Civil Government is of Divine appointment, for the interests and good order of human society; and that magistrates are to be prayed for, conscientiously honored, and obeyed; except only in things opposed to the Will of our Lord Jesus Christ, Who is the only Lord of the conscience, and the Prince of the kings of the earth.

17. OF THE RIGHTEOUS AND THE WICKED

We believe that there is a radical and essential difference between the righteous and the wicked; that such only as through faith are justified in the Name of the Lord Jesus, and sanctified by the Spirit of our God, are truly righteous in His esteem; while all such as continue in impenitence and unbelief are in His sight wicked, and under the curse; and this distinction holds among men both in and after death.

18. OF THE WORLD TO COME

We believe that the end of this world is approaching; that at the Last Day, Christ will descend from heaven, and raise the dead from the grave to final retribution; that a solemn separation will then take place; that the wicked will be adjudged to endless punishment, and the righteous to endless joy; and that this judgment will fix forever the final state of men in heaven or hell, on principles of righteousness.

CONSTITUTION

Article 1-Name

This Organization shall be known as the SUWANNEE MIS-SIONARY BAPTIST ASSOCIATION.

Article 2-Purpose

The Purpose of this Association shall be: To furnish a medium of Co-operation for the Churches of the Association in their Divinely commissioned work of Missions, Education, and Benevolences; and to this end we seek to bring into co-operative fellowship the energies of our Churches; and to secure the moral and financial support of our Churches for the Objects and Institutions fostered by the Florida Convention of Baptist Churches, and the Southern Baptist Convention.

Article 3-Churches

The Constituents of this Association shall be Missionary Bartist Churches of regular order, presenting petitionary letters from other Associations in due form; and Churches which may be constituted within the bounds of the Association, presenting proper credentials of organization and Articles of Faith, accompanied by properly accredited Messengers.

Article 4-Messengers

This Association shall be composed of Messengers holding membership in the Churches which constitute the Association; these Messengers having been duly elected by their respective Churches on the following basis; Each Church shall be entitled to Three Messengers without reference to their numerical strength; and one additional Messenger for each Twenty-five members or fraction thereof, after it has attained a membership of Fifty members.

Article 5-Officers

The Officers of this Association shall be: A Moderator, A Vice-Moderator, a Clerk, and a Treasurer; who shall be elected annually by ballot at the beginning of each Annual Meeting of the Association; and no person shall be elected Moderator for more than two consecutive years.

Article 6-Meetings

- 1. This Association shall meet Annually, Thursday and Friday after the second Sunday in October; at such Time and Place as the Association shall have selected at its last Annual Session.
- 2. In addition to the Annual Meeting, there shall be held a Union Meeting each Fifth Sunday; the Time, Place, and Program to be provided for by the Executive Committee.
- 3. In the event of an emergency, the Executive Committee is authorized to make changes in the Time and Place for the Annual Meeting, as will best serve the interests of the Association.

Article 7-Amendments

The Constitution and By-Laws of the Association may be amended at any Annual Meeting of the Association, by a two-thirds majority vote of the Messengers.

SUWANNEE MISSIONARY BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

BY-LAWS

Section 1-Duties of Officers

- 1. The Duties of the Moderator shall be to preside, preserve order, and appoint all Committees not otherwise provided for in the Constitution and By-Laws.
- 2. The duties of the Vice-Moderator shall be to assist the Moderator; and to preside in the absence of, or at the request of, the Moderator.
- 3. The Clerk shall keep a correct record of the proceedings of the Association; supervise the printing and distribution of the Minutes; keep a regular file of the published proceedings of the Association; and deliver same with other material belonging to his office to his successor.

The Clerk shall send to the clerks of the Churches of the Association the Associational Letter Form Blanks thirty days prior to the Annual Meeting; also the material to the Chairmen of the Standing Committees, who are to submit reports of our work at the Annual Session.

The Clerk shall notify after the adjournment of the Association, all Persons, Committees, and Chairmen of the Standing Committees, of their elections or appointments of service.

The Clerk shall receive remuneration for his services, the sum to be fixed by the Association at each Annual Meeting; also he shall receive additional funds from the Association for the expenses of his office.

- 4. The Treasurer shall keep a correct record of all Associational Funds received and disbursed by his Office; and shall submit a record of all transactions of his Office to the Association at its Annual Meeting. The Treasurer shall be the Chairman of the Finance Committee.
- 5. The duties of the Executive Committee shall be to transact all business of the Association between its Annual Meetings; and a written report of its work shall be submitted to the Association at its Annual Session.

The Executive Committee shall elect its own Chairman and Clerk; and fix the Time and Place for its Meetings between the Annual Sessions of the Association.

In the event a vacancy occurs in any office of the Association between the Annual Meetings; the Executive Committee is authorized to fill such vacancy for the unexpired term of office; if not otherwise provided for in the Constitution and By-Laws.

Section 5

The Association shall have an Introductory and a Missionary Sermon at each Annual Meeting, on the first and second days respectively; the hours for the sermons to be provided for in the Order of Business.

Section 6

The fiscal year of the Association shall begin October first of each year, and end September thirtieth of the following year, both dates inclusive; and all reports to the Association shall conform to these dates.

Section 7

All written reports of Committees shall be limited to a maximum of six hundred words; and the Clerk is authorized if necessary, to edit reports to conform to this word limitation.

Section 8

When a Church fails to send an Annual Letter, the Clerk shall use the report of the previous year, with reference only to record of membership of Church and organizations.

Section 9

The Association requests that Church clerks prepare and mail to the Clerk of the Association their Annual Church Letter, ten days before the Annual Meeting.

Section 10

The Parliamentary Law which shall be used by this Association in the government of its business proceedings, shall be Kerfoot's Parliamentary Law.

It is also understood, that this Association shall ever adhere to the Principles and Practices of recognized Baptist Policies in all its procedures, its methods, and its work.

Section 2-Committees

- 1. The Standing Committees of the Association shall be: 1—Executive Committee; 2—Order of Business; 3—State Missions; 4—Home Missions; 5—Foreign Missions; 6—Religious Literature; 7—Christian Education; 8—Sunday Schools; 9—Baptist Training Union; 10—Woman's Missionary Union; 11—Laymens Work—Brotherhood; 12—Florida Baptist Children's Home; 13—Ministerial Relief and Annuities; 14—Social Service. Also other Committees as the Association shall deem advisable.
- 2. The Special Committees of the Association shall be: 1—Nominations; 2—Finance; 3—Resolutions: 4—Obituaries; 5—Digest of Letters—State of Religion. Also other Committees as the Association shall deem advisable.

Section 3-Committees. Appointment Of

- 1. All Standing Committees shall consist of Three Members; who shall be appointed by the Moderator; the Chairman being selected in advance; the others at each Annual Session.
- 2. All Special Committees shall consist of not less than Three nor more than Five Members; who shall be appointed by the Moderator at each Annual Session.
- 3. The Committee on Order of Business shall consist of Three Members; Two of which shall be the Moderator and the Chairman of the Executive Committee; the third member shall be appointed by the Moderator at each Annual Meeting.
- 4. The Executive Committee of this Association shall consist of Seven Members; and the Officers of the Association, together with the Pastors serving some Church in the Association, whose membership is in some Church in the Association—shall be Ex-Officio members of the Executive Committee.

Section 4-Committees. Duties Of

- 1. The duties of the Standing Committee and the Special Committees, shall be those which are commonly understood, and observed by Baptist Associations and Conventions, as suggested by their names.
- 2. The duties of the Committee on the Order of Business shall be to prepare the Program for each Annual Meeting; and to select the Speakers not otherwise provided for in the Constitution and By-Laws.
 - 3. The duties of the Nominating Committee shall be:

To name the Time and place for the Annual Meeting.

To name the Preachers and Alternates for the Annual Introductory and Missionary Sermons.

To name the Associational Member of the State Board of Missions of the Florida Convention of Baptist Churches.

To name the Associational Messengers to the Florida Convention of Baptist Churches,

To name the Executive Committee.

All nominations subject to adoption by the Association.

18. Report on Ministerial Relief and Annuities read by J. A. Johnson, as follows:

REPORT OF MINISTERIAL RELIEF AND ANNUITIES

The Relief and Annuity Board of the Southern Baptist Convention has been operating since 1918, and in addition to paying benefits of more than two and a third million dollars has accumulated in endowments and reserves approximately four and a quarter million dollars.

The greater part of the money paid in benefits has been paid through its Relief Department, the amount being approximately \$1,750,000.00, the amount paid in annuities being more than \$630,000.00.

A total of 1271 Ministers, Missionaries, Widows and Orphans received aid.

The total relief beneficiaries on the roll as of April 30th, 1935, 1,215.

The funds used are obtained from income on the Board Relief Endowment fund and from contributions of the churches through the co-operative program.

The money received by the board through the Co-Operative Program goes to the relief fund unless otherwise designated. The Annuity department is *0 present old age dependency among the ministers and their families. They have three plans.

The Service Annuity is the major plan of the Relief and Annuity Board for the prevention of old age dependency, and your Committee commends it to the thoughtful consideration of the churches and pastors. Just as the Foreign Mission' Board, in recognition of the denomination's obligation to the missionaries who go to lands afar, has entered into an agency agreement with the Relief and Annuity Board and has thereby provided annuities for all foreign missionaries upon retirement after age 65 or earlier in case of breakdown, so the churches should act through this same Board in behalf of their ministers.

Wholly self-provided annuities may be had by the participation of ministers in either the Board's Savings Annuity or Special Annuity Plans. Information relative to these can be had upon application to the Board.

20. Report on State Missions read by Rev. E. P. Fendley, as follows:

REPORT ON STATE MISSIONS

The primary mission of the church is the evangelization of the world. 'Go ye into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature,' was the commission Jesus gave His disciples. That commission constitutes the mission of the church for all ages.

Again Jesus said, "As My father has sent Me even so send I you." No church has the right to call itself a church that is not fulfilling its mission. We will live or die as a church according to our attitude to the commission.

We are united in associations and conventions for the purpose of co-operating with each other as churches putting our gifts together for the purpose of carrying out the great commission.

Our State Mission Work was organized 54 years ago in Lake City for work among people in territory not self supporting. Our Mission Work has been carried out with a measure of satisfaction, yet there remains much to be done. Our state mission work is handicapped by the lack of sufficient funds. We have commanded our workers to make more brick than they have straw. We urge our preachers to preach on missions. We also urge our churches to practice missions, by liberal gifts to our mission work and by endeavoring to evangelize the unconverted in their territory.

Our gifts for state missions this year 8 mo, period \$113,00 a deficiency of \$182.00 based on 1931 budget the goal for 1935 as set by our State Board of Missions for this work

We urge that our Sunday Schools give an offering for State Missions on the 4th. Sunday of this month.

21. Report on Home Missions read by Mrs. J. L. McDaniel, as follows:

REPORT ON HOME MISSIONS

Fundamentally, the mission task is the making of disciples and baptizing them into Christ unto salvation. The fields are fields of spiritual needs, a world thirsty and hungry-hearted for Christ and God, but enslaved, gripped, and being destroyed by the power of evil. We do not have to leave the homeland to find these underprivileged people in industrial centers and in congested sections, as well as the shut-in and shut-out by poverty, ignorance, racial, social and economic barriers.

Missions is missions wherever it is found, whether home or abroad. These classes of people will not have a chance to know Christ unless we enlarge our missionary program. To evangelize them we need to lift up our, eyes and look on the harvest fields and do some reaping by sending the gospel to them.

In the long ago, the blessed Christ when He would arouse the interest of His disciples in the evangelization of their homeland said: Look on the fields white unto harvest. It was an appeal of spiritual need at close range. That is our appeal today. Twenty-two million souls out of Christ here in the homeland cry to us daily for the bread of life.

Our brothers in black, ten million, right at our door, are looking to us for help.

Revolution-ridden Cuba, in poverty and spiritual despair, holds to us her hands of mute appeal. On every hand, wherever we turn, there is the plea of the underprivileged, the forgotten man, the man without a chance, in the homeland gropes his way in spiritual night.

Evils are increasing, spiritual death is spreading, the clouds of spiritual darkness thickening, and even in the homeland a pagan civilization is developing.

We come to you, beloved followers of His, with a new appeal for an old cause; with an appeal to preach the old gospel in a new age; to undertake new tasks for new times in an old field of unchanging need.

The work of Home Missions has been blessed in every way. From every mission field there comes reports of gracious revivals and great ingathering of the lost. In every month of the year in all mission fields, the waters have been troubled by the burial of new born babies with Christ, in baptism.

The Board in all departments and fields has 288 missionaries with 18 additional workers in the Sanatorium, schools and good will centers. It is maintaining 598 mission stations, operating 5 Goods Will Centers, 2 rescue missions and a seaman's institute, has 29 mission schools in Panama, Cuba, and the homeland, and is furnishing property for 8 mountain schools free; it is operating the Southern Baptist Sanatorium in Texas, which has ever since 1930 paid its operating expenses. Last year 36 new missionaries were sent on the field and 76 new missions opened. The missionaries report 3,740 conversions and Baptisms, and made 39,515 personal contacts with the unsaved, visited 22,000 homes, distributed 443,225 Bibles and tracts and preached 19 538 sermons.

In 1934 the Board received \$320,030.95. This was \$81,330.42 more than in 1933. The women in the Annie Armstrong offering during the March week of prayer gave \$94,273.57 of the above amount. The budget for the past year was \$150,000.00 for missionary operations and \$170,030.95 for interest and principal on debts. The Board operated on this and met all obligations without borrowing money for current expenses.

The old frontiers of Home Missions are changing and new frontiers taking their place, but the need for the evangelization and christianization of the homeland remains. Countless millions of our neighbors know not Christ. Many influences are at work to undermine our civilization. The salvation of our country depends upon the enthronement of Christ in the life of our people. Our part in the evangelization of the world depends upon the evangelization and christianization of our own land. Christ did not overlook His homeland; let us not overlook our homeland.

REPORT ON FOREIGN MISSIONS

Ninety years ago the Foreign Mission Board was organized and on August 4th, 1845 appointed Samuel Clopton and wife as the first missionaries of the Board South China. Clopton lived but one year after reaching China but today we have in South China what some consider to be the greatest Baptist Mission in the World.

In ten years the Foreign Mission Board will celebrate its centennial of Missionary achievements. From the regions beyond there comes reports from our 388 missionaries that there has been a net gain in church membership of 21,733 souls, and that the 204,894 Baptists in these lands gave \$370,075.66 to the Master's Work last year.

From the Board in Richmond, Va. order free copy of the Spirit of Power which gives detailed report from every foreign field. It should be said to the everlasting credit of Woman's Missionary Union that the Christian Offering of 1933 in a very definite way stopped the disastrous seven years retreat in our foreign fields of Missionary Work. The objective of the W. M. U. for this offering for 1934 was \$150,000.00. Up to May 1st we had received a total of \$214,000.00. Two years ago we inaugurated Foreign Mission Work at Ridgecrest.

This work has been made possible through the generous cooperation and financial assistance of the Sunday School Board and the efficient management of Dr. R. F. Stoples.

The days at Ridgecrest are given over to information and inspirational studies and addresses, and it has already become one of the most popular gatherings among Southern Baptist.

- 28. Report on Religious Literature read by Rev. H. O. Hughes, as fellows:

REPORT ON RELIGIOUS LITERATURE

Paul, in his letter to Timothy (I Tim. 4:13) said: "Give heed to reading." Again he said to Timothy: (2 Tim. 4-13) "Bring with thee...the books, but especially the parchments." Paul realized the value of reading, and in prison, books were his companions.

In the matter of religious literature, the Bible should always have first place in our reading. Nothing else will serve as a substitute. It is stifl a lamp unto our feet, and a light unto our path; our counsellor and guide. It is a record of God's revelation of Himself to the world; and His beneficent dealings with the race. It is a book of life principles; it teaches us how to live victorious, and shows us how to die triumphant. By the word of God we were born again, and by His word our spiritual life must be sustained. It is the bread and water of life to our souls, and nothing offered in its stead will satisfy us. It is a never-failing source of strength in trials, a comfort in sorrow, and a light in doubt and perplexity. It shows us the way out of sin, into salvation and the kingdom of God. It will brighten intellects, purify emotions, and strengthen wills. It brings a message of peace and good-will, of courage and hope; and gives a hope of immortality. It is the Sword of the Spirit, our only weapon of defense; and by it we grow in grace and the knowledge of Christ. Too few people credit the word of God

as being effective in building a righteous, holy character; and still too few make the experiment. Let us read the Bible again and again; until its truths permeate our whole being, until they transform our lives according to the will of God. By obedience to the word of God, we shall find our way into fellowship with God and life eternal.

Next—let us give ourselves to reading our State Paper, The Baptist Witness. It is the only source whereby we can obtain information relative to our State work. Information will beget inspiration; and to be informed we must read. To be an intelligent Baptist, one must be an informed Baptist; and this information will best and most easily come through our State Paper. Thus we have the opportunity of knowing what our co-workers are doing elsewhere in the kingdom, at home and abroad.

Last, read good books, religious books, for they are abundant, and can be obtained from our own State Book Store, in Jacksonville. While these are not substitutes for the Bible, they contain treasures of truth and knowledge, which God has revealed to others. Let us avail ourselves of this privilege. Newspapers, periodicals, fiction, can never take the place of religious literature. We would not place a ban on all these, but they cannot aid us in growing in grace, as good as some of them may be. Only Divine food will satisfy and build up our souls.

REPORT ON CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

Southern Baptists hold that christian education is the only complete education. Dr. McCosh has said, "Christianity has been the mother of all modern education." The late Henry Watterson said, "The paramount question underlying democracy is the religion of Jesus Christ."

Florida Baptists must major in christian education. This will be done in our homes; in our Sunday Schools and in our colleges.

Parents must realize the great responsibility that is theirs in training their children to become christian men and women. Churches should put their best into their Sunday Schools. We also are to back Stetson University under the new president, Dr. Allen, giving him our loyal support. Then, too, our student workers on the State College grounds should know that we are

for them. Their force should be increased that our Baptists' boys and girls in State Schools might be reached.

34. Report on Social Service was read by S. C. Kierce, as follows:

REPORT ON SOCIAL SERVICE

In offering our report on Social Service it is necessary to say that Social service is in no way a substitute for regeneration. Social Service, like all other real service, is only the fruit of salvation, but surely if salvation is real it will produce fruit. No real christian can be unconcerned about social injustice and social and political wrong.

Motion pictures have become one of our greatest American industries in volume of business. Twenty eight million minors attend motion pictures weekly of whom eleven million are under thirteen years of age. More than any other agency the motion picture is furnishing the entertainment and thought life for our nation. That the motion picture is always vicious and harmful we would not declare; that the motion picture as it has been is vicious and harmful in the extreme in a great number of cases is apparent, no one would deny.

As a result of immoral and vicious conditions portrayed through the picture the League of Decency Movement was inaugurated for the purpose of trying to secure a general clean up in the motion picture industry. Allowing all liberty of opinion to the individual as to whether a motion picture is harmful, surely all can heartily agree that every possible thing should be done to secure the exhibition of clean and wholesome pictures only and to prevent the exhibition of pictures that are vicious and corrupting in character.

The World War was the most frightful and destructive that the world has ever seen. It took an unbelievable toll of life and treasure. It shook the very foundations of civilization. The question now confronts us whether civilization can survive another like conflict. With Italy having repudiated all parts of the World Court and now aggressively laying hands on a weaker nation, we see grim, stark war again on the horizon. The European Nations are rapidly being hurled into another conflagration of war. The sentiment of the nations of the world should be registered against Italy and her leaders in the course she is now pursuing. Let all Americans pray that peace will soon be made, and that America will in any case stay out of another war which would undoubtedly bring chaos to all.

We have now had more than 18 months of the reign of liquor since the repeal of the eighteenth amendment. We are glad to believe that the eyes of multitudes of misguided people who supported repeal, and those who were led to believe that temperance means moderate indulgence in alcoholic drinks, are being opened and that the tide of sentiment against liquor is rising.

We were told that prohibition had been productive of crime and that with its repeal crime would be diminished. On the contrary crime every where has increased. We were told by many, even the president of the United States States, that we could balance the budget with beer, and many good honest people weighed down by the burden of taxes were led to believe that we would receive enormous revenue from the liquor business and that tax burdens would be relieved. On the contrary the amount received from beer tax is a merepitance in comparison with the expenditures of the government. From every angle the liquor situation in the United States at the present time is so serious and distressing that every patriotic citizen should be deeply stirred.

The first lottery, the first game of chance, the first gamble in the annals of the Christian dispensation was conducted by those remorseless murderers of the Son of God. Gambling in its true light is "OUTER darkness." It is a very prolific source of evil. It is a very criminal expenditure of both time and money. One who gambles is continually in bad company. Gambling is a species of open theft. There is nothing more readily sustained by deception and fraud than gambling. Paul said in writing to Timothy, "Neither be partaker in other men's sins." How often our own friends and members of Christ's church join in the sins of others by our countenance of this sin of gambling. Gambling shows itself in Florida and in our own Association through the use of the lottery, the maintenance of the race tracks, and the use of certain machines called Roscoe, more commonly called "Slot machines." Let it go on record in this Association that we oppose these and all other forms of gambling. That we will refrain from entering into any of these various forms of sins ourselves, and that we will unhesitatingly avow our disapproval of these known sins.

Finally: "Whatsoever things are true, whatsoever things are honest, whatsoever things are just, whatsoever things are pure, whatsoever things are of good report: . . think on these things."

REPORT ON SUNDAY SCHOOL

We, your Committee, beg to make the following report on Sunday School:

It is here that God's word is planted in the mind and heart of both old and young in the Sunday School. Sentiment is formed, habits are built into character. It is here that many hear the Call of the Master to a higher and nobler life. It is here that many start out to follow the divine guidance of God. The human part in this is largely brought about through faithful teachers. These teachers can wield a greater influence and lead their classes into wider fields of knowledge and visions by being trained in and for their work. Our State Board is ready and anxious at all times to help our churches. We, your Committee, heartily recommend that our churches have at least one Sunday School training course a year.

The Suwannee Association has 29 churches, 27 Sunday Schools, and has 29 teachers holding teachers training awards. From the Sunday School 38 were added to the church this year.

40. Report on Florida Baptist Children's Home read by Mrs. J. H. Eubanks, as follows:

REPORT ON FLORIDA BAPTIST CHILDREN'S HOME

At the beginning of the Association year of 1935, the Home had 141 children in our Institution. The average for 1934-35 was 143. They have received in the Home 10 children and discharged 11. The applications of children, especially from half orphans is more than doubled this summer as compared with last. We have had many very sad cases of half orphans brought to our attention but the funds that we have received makes it impossible to assist them. It is our hopes that we will be able to do a better part by our distressed children who have a parent living than we have done. The need for work in this field is very urgent. The children we have placed have gone to relatives or to school. Some have secured a job. It has been very hard for the last three years to place our older children because of the scarcity of positions. We have kept in constant touch with business in this State and every time it was possible for us to do so, we have placed one or more of our children. We have requests all along that necessitates our making a place for the younger children of the State and increase the turn over. This keeps us ever on the alert for places where our children can earn their living.

We have five children in Institutions of higher learning and one in training in a hospital. Four of the five in college are in Stetson in Deland. This was made possible by Dr. Allen who has cooperated with the Home to the fullest extent in the education of its children. The Home is not paying one penny for college training of its children. This is done by friends over the State. It is impossible for us to assist a child after he finishes high school. All money sent to the Home is used for the Home and the children in the Home. If any money is sent for the higher education of any children in our Home, it must be designated.

The buildings have been improved. All dormitories, except one, have been painted. The paint was paid for by the W.W.A.'s of Florida and the boys in the Home did the work. They also repaired the buildings and as soon as the Nursery is finished and two of the dormitories are reroofed, our buildings will be in good condition.

This has been a very difficult year in our Home. The first of July we had accumulated a deficit of \$1,642.03. Our receipts for the first six months of this year as compared with the first six months of 1934 were \$2,337.66 less. Had our income been equal to that of 1934, we would have had a balance of approximately \$700.00. We believe this condition is attributed to the freeze in middle and south Florida as this is the source from which most of our income is received. It is unfortunate that our Institution receives its income from certain localities rather than state wide. If the cooperation of our Churches in Florida could be secured, there would never be any trouble about expenses.

The Sunday Schools give approximately half of our income. The Cooperative Program furnishes us with about 20 per cent and the other is divided between Individuals, W. M. U.'s, B. T. U.'s and Churches.

The farm and dairy continue to play an important part in the operation of our Institution. Each showed a balance at the close of the year. It pays to operate each of them. They have a nice canning plant on the campus from which they received 19,680 cans this spring at a cost of less than one cent per can to the Home. They are enlarging their farm this year expecting to can the vegetables they will get next summer.

The school continues very satisfactorily under the supervision of the State and County. The teachers are paid by the State and the children above the third grade go to the City school while those thru the first three grades go to school on our campus. The Management of the Home is striving to improve the education of the children. They are taking advantage of every opportunity to see that our children are given an equal opportunity with others.

The support of the Home should be more general than it is. The cooperation should be closer. The responsibility of the Institution should fall on every Baptist in Florida. The power to continue the Home lies in the Baptist Churches in this State and it is very important that each Church do something from time to time to protect its holdings and its children. Our Institution can never enlarge under the present support that it is now receiving. At times it is impossible to protect the investment that Baptists have made in our Home because of the lack of funds. This is an unwise procedure. If the cooperation of one half of the Churches and Sunday Schools can be secured, our Home can be filled to capacity and every item of expense could be paid monthly. With the calls of children coming to us as they now are, we believe that it is incumbent upon all to do something to aid our distressed children.

The Home is deeply grateful for the support given it-for the money and donations of farm produce that was so liberally given from the farming sections last year; they are profoundly grateful. It is the desire of those in charge of the Home to do more for the needy childhood of our denomination and to give them a Christian home and Christian training and to see that they have every opportunity possible in life. Let us remember them with our gifts and our prayers. Anyway always be mindful of the value and importance of rearing children.

We, your Committee, wish to recommend that the Home be given more consideration in this Association and that we take more interest in our boys and girls whom we have accepted as our very own.

REPORT ON BAPTIST BROTHERHOOD

The Baptist Brotherhood bases its activities upon the fact that the Lord intended that men should have a large place in the work of His Kingdom. This is indicated by the fact that He intrusted the official and ordained leadership of the first church to MEN. The Brotherhood is convinced that our churches in recent years have not accorded to men that degree of recognition and responsibility that characterized the early church.

The Brotherhood would undertake to supplement the pastors in leading the men to recognize their obligation to serve and support the Kingdom in a larger and more zealous way. The Brotherhood advocated and seeks to promote the Bible doctrine of stewardship, both of life and substance, Missions at home and abroad, loyalty to the adequate support of the pastor, through co-operation with the church and denominational programs, the Scriptural plan of Kingdom support, and the magnifying of the responsibilities of men in Kingdom affairs.

Suwannee Association has six organized Brotherhoods. These are at Bright Pond, Jennings, Falmouth, Philadelphia, Pleasant Hill and Live Oak. The organization at Live Oak is perhaps the most active of all. It is one of the best organizations in the State or Southland. They have an enrollment of 55 men. They meet each Sunday evening one hour before worship service for the study of the Southwide Brotherhood programs. The Live Oak Brotherhood under the leadership of their pastor, sponsored the Live Oak Pastors Conference last February, an outstanding accomplishment of ministerial education. They are co-operating with the W.M.S. in putting on a School of Missions this Fall, also are making plans to assist in the Second Institute for Pastors during the early part of 1936

We recommend and urge every pastor in our Association to encourage the men of his church to organize for active work under the Brotherhood.

REPORT ON DIGEST OF LETTERS-STATE OF RELIGION

30 Churches reported; membership 3142.

15 Sunday Schools; enrollment 1226; Gifts \$915.02.

Baptist Training Unions 11; enrollment 206.

Brotherhood organizations 2; enrollment 87.

W.M.U. organizations 18; enrollment 403.

Pastors salaries \$6198.98: All mission gifts \$1963.90-\$410.82 of this was for Co-operative Program; Designated gifts \$543.53; Gifts for local church expenses \$2545.51; Gifts from W.M.U. were \$1377.29. Total gifts \$11,991.15. Value church property \$79,850.00.

Statistics may help, but cannot determine accurately the state of religion. Perhaps the most reliable factor in determining the religious state, is to discover what is the attitude of people toward God, religion, the church. This state cannot be found in a few isolated churches, which have passed a successful year. This finding must be from general observation, information, and experiences. We have found indifference seemingly on the increase, with a still large loss from our churches, of the man power in their memberships. The attitude of church members toward moral ideals, moral issues, civic righteousness and such, is one of almost complete unconcern. The appeal of the world is strong with many, increasing worldly-mindedness on a large scale; and the result is that we are not God-consciousness as a whole.

This picture may be pessimistic, but we must face facts, if we are to find a solution. We believe the gospel is still the power of God unto salvation. We urge church members to read their Bibles, to give themselves to prayer, to Sabbath observance, church attendance and worship, and consecration to God and our mission.

Statistics coming from our churches indicate a great field for work, in evangelization, in teaching and training. We also urge that during the new Associational year, that our churches give themselves to the work of evangelizing their communities, with renewed energy and zeal; and that each church member seek the earnest cultivation of their devotional life, through all the appointed means of grace.

ANNUAL REPORT OF WOMAN'S MISSIONARY UNION OF SUWANNEE ASSOCIATION FOR 1934-1935

An introduction is always interesting. It may bring us a new friend. It may open up new avenues of pleasure and helpfulness on our part. In making this report I want to introduce first of all W. M. U. work to every member of Suwannee Association. When you know the work as we do you will love it too.

In 1888 the women from 12 southern states met at Richmond, Va., and organized Woman's Missionary Union, Auxiliary to the Southern Baptist Convention. The preamble to the first Constitution reads: "We, the women of the churches connected with the Southern Baptist Convention, desirous of stimulating the missionary spirit and grace of giving among the women and children of the churches, and to aid in collecting funds for missionary purposes to be disbursed by the boards of the S. B. C., do organize." All down thru the years the purpose of W. M. U. work remains the same—to pray for the coming of Christ's Kingdom. to give to missions, and to train our children to love missions.

The work has grown rapidly until there are societies everywhere—in city churches and in country churches. Women find the work a great joy. They delight to meet together to study God's Word and to pray.

Thru our personal service department the women try to do home mission work by telling the lost of their Savior, enlisting for church and Sunday School, strengthening and encouraging the weaker ones, and by ministering to the needy. Thru the Mission Study we study the Bible, and also the needs of mission fields and the results of the work of our missionaries. By our gifts we support many women missionaries on the foreign field and the schools conducted by them; we help in the medical work on the foreign fields; we touch every branch of home mission work in our own land and Cuba, and strengthen the hands of our state mission workers; we support several children in our Home at Arcadia. We support the Margaret Fund for the education of missionaries' children, and the Missionary Training School at Louisville, Ky., where young women are prepared to go out as missionaries. Did you know that the women of Florida last year gave over \$53,000 to missions thru the State Board? By our prayers we reach around the world. Such is a brief introduction to W. M. U. work. Will you bid us Godspeed in Suwannee Association?

The annual meeting of the W. M. U. of this Association was held at Jennings, Fla., September 24th, at 10:30 a. m. with the president presiding. Opened by singing the W. M. U. hymn "Fling Out the Banner." Mrs. Parshley of Live Oak gave the devotional from the subject "Lifting the Banner of Christ as Laborers Together with Him." Mrs. Bennett Haman of Jennings extended greetings which were graciously responded to by Miss Katie Broome.
