### ARTICLES OF FAITH

### 1. OF THE SCRIPTURES

We believe that the Holy Bible was written by men Divinely inspired, and is a perfect treasure of heavenly instruction; that it has God for its Author, salvation for its end, and truth without any mixture of error for its matter; that it reveals the principles by which God will judge us; and therefore is, and shall remain to the end of the world, the true center of Christian union, and the supreme standard by which all human conduct, creeds, and opinions should be tried.

### 2. OF THE TRUE GOD

We believe that there is One, and only One living and true God, an Infinite, intelligent Spirit, Whose Name is Jehovah, the Maker and Supreme Ruler of Heaven and Earth; inexpressibly glorious in Holiness, and worthy of all possible honor, confidence and love; that in the Unity of the Godhead there are Three Persons, the Father, the Son, and the Holy Ghost; equal in every Divine Perfection, and executing distinct but harmonious Offices in the great work of Redemption.

### 3. OF THE FALL OF MAN

We believe that Man was created in holiness, under the law of his Maker; but by voluntary transgression fell from that holy and happy state; in consequence of which all Mankind are now sinners, not by constraint but choice; being by nature utterly void of that holiness required by the law of God; positively inclined to evil; and therefore under just condemnation to eternal ruin, without defense or excuse.

### 4. OF THE WAY OF SALVATION

We believe that the salvation of sinners is wholly of Grace; through the Mediatorial office of the Son of God; Who by the appointment of the Father, freely took upon Him our nature, yet without our sin; honored the Divine law by His Personal obedience, and by His death made a full Atonement for our sins; that having risen from the dead, He is now enthroned in heaven; and uniting in His wonderful Person the tenderest sympathies with Divine Perfections, He is every way qualified to be a suitable, a compassionate, and all-sufficient Saviour.

### 5. OF JUSTIFICATION

We believe that the great Gospel blessing which Christ secures to such as believe in Him is Justification; that Justification includes the pardon of sin, and the promise of eternal life on principles of righteousness; that it is bestowed, not in consideration of any works of righteousness which we have done, but solely through Faith in the Redeemer's Blood; by virtue of which faith His perfect righteousness is freely imputed to us of God; that it brings us into a state of most blessed peace and favor with God, and secures every other blessing needful for time and eternity.

### 6. OF THE FREENESS OF SALVATION

We believe that the blessings of salvation are made free to all by the Gospel; that it is the immediate duty of all to accept them by a cordial penitent and obedient faith; and that nothing prevents the salvation of the greatest sinner on earth, but his own inherent depravity and voluntary rejection of the Gospel; which involves him in an aggravated condemnation.

### 7. OF GRACE IN REGENERATION

We believe that in order to be saved, sinners must be regenerated, or born again; that regeneration consists in giving a holy disposition to the mind; that it is effected in a manner above our comprehension by the power of the Holy Spirit, in connection with Divine truth, so as to secure our voluntary obedience to the Gospel; and that its proper evidence appears in the holy fruits of repentance, and faith, and newness of life.

### 8. OF REPENTANCE AND FAITH

We believe that Repentance and Faith are sacred duties, and also inseparable Graces, wrought in our souls by the regenerating Spirit of God; whereby being deeply convinced of our guilt, danger and helplessness, and of the way of salvation by Christ, we turn to God with unfeigned contrition, confession, and supplication for mercy; at the same time heartily receiving the Lord Jesus Christ as our Prophet, Priest and King, and relying on Him alone as the Only and All-sufficient Saviour.

### 9. OF GOD'S PURPOSE OF GRACE

We believe that Election is the Eternal purpose of God, according to which He graciously regenerates, sanctifies, and saves sinners; that being perfectly consistent with the free agency of man, it comprehends all the means in connection with the end; that it is a most glorious display of God's Sovereign Goodness, being Infinitely free, wise, holy and unchangeable; that it utterly excludes boasting, and promotes humility, love, prayer, praise, trust in God, and active imitation of His free mercy; that it encourages the use of means in the highest degree; that it may be ascertained by its effects in all who truly believe the Gospel; that it is the foundation of Christian assurance; and that to ascertain it with regard to ourselves demands and deserves the utmost diligence.

### 10. OF SANCTIFICATION

We believe that Sanctification is the process by which, according to the Will of God, we are made partakers of His Holiness; that it is a progressive work; that it is begun in regeneration; and that it is carried on in the hearts of believers by the presence and power of the Holy Spirit, the Sealer and Comforter, in the continual use of the appointed means—especially, the Word of God, self-examination, self-denial, watchfulness and prayer.

### 11. OF THE PERSEVERANCE OF SAINTS

We believe that such only are real believers as endure unto the end; that their persevering attachment to Christ is the grand mark which distinguishes them from superficial professors; that a special Providence watches over their welfare; and they are kept by the power of God through faith unto salvation.

### 12. OF THE HARMONY OF THE LAW AND THE GOSPEL

We believe that the Law of God is the eternal and unchangeable rule of His moral government; that it is holy, just, and good; and that the inability which the Scriptures ascribe to fallen men to fulfill its precepts, arises entirely from their love of sin; to deliver them from which, and to restore them through a Mediator to unfeigned obedience to the holy Law, is one great end of the Gospel, and of the Means of Grace connected with the establishment of the visible Church.

### 13. OF THE GOSPEL CHURCH

We believe that a visible Church of Christ is a Congregation of baptized believers, associated by Covenant in the faith and fellowship of the Gospel; observing the Ordinances of Christ; governed by His Laws; and exercising the gifts, rights, and privileges invested in them by His Word; that its only Scriptural officers are Bishops or Pastors and Deacons, whose qualifications, claims, and duties are defined in the Epistles to Timothy and Titus.

### 14. OF BAPTISM AND THE LORD'S SUPPER

We believe that Christian baptism is the immersion in water of a believer, into the Name of the Father, and Son, and Holy Ghost; to show forth in a solemn and beautiful emblem, our faith in the crucified, buried, and risen Saviour, with its effects, in our death to sin and resurrection to a new life; that it is a pre-requisite to the privileges of a Church relation; and to the Lord's Supper, in which the members of the Church by the sacred use of bread and wine, are to commemorate together the dying love of Christ; preceded always by solemn self-examination.

### 15. OF THE CHRISTIAN SABBATH

We believe that the first day of the week is the Lord's Day, or Christian Sabbath; and is to be kept sacred to religious purposes, by abstaining from all secular labor and sinful recreations, by the devout observance of all the means of Grace, both private and public; and by preparation for that rest that remaineth for the people of God.

### 16. OF CIVIL GOVERNMENT

We believe that Civil Government is of Divine appointment, for the interests and good order of human society; and that magistrates are to be prayed for, conscientiously honored, and obeyed; except only in things opposed to the Will of our Lord Jesus Christ, Who is the only Lord of the conscience, and the Prince of the kings of the earth.

### 17. OF THE RIGHTEOUS AND THE WICKED

We believe that there is a radical and essential difference between the righteous and the wicked; that such only as through faith are justified in the Name of the Lord Jesus, and sanctified by the Spirit of Our God, are truly righteous in His esteem; while all such as continue in impenitence and unbelief are in His sight wicked, and under the curse; and this distinction holds among men both in and after death.

### 18. OF THE WORLD TO COME

We believe that the end of this world is approaching; that at the Last Day, Christ will descend from heaven, and raise the dead from the grave to final retribution; that a solemr. separation will then take place; that the wicked will be adjudged to endless punishment, and the righteous to endless joy; and that this judgment will fix forever the final state of men in heaven or hell, on principles of righteousness.

### CONSTITUTION

### Article 1-Name

This Organization shall be known as the SUWANNEE MIS-SIONARY BAPTIST ASSOCIATION.

### Article 2-Purpose

The Purpose of this Association shall be: To furnish a medium of Co-operation for the Churches of the Association in their Divinely commissioned work of Missions, Education, and Benevolences; and to this end we seek to bring into co-operative fellowship the energies of our Churches; and to secure the moral and financial support of our Churches for the Objects and Institutions fostered by the Florida Convention of Baptist Churches, and the Southern Baptist Convention.

### Article 3—Churches

The Constituents of this Association shall be Missionary Baptist Churches of regular order, presenting petitionary letters from other Associations in due form; and Churches which may be constituted within the bounds of the Association, presenting proper credentials of organization and Articles of Faith, accompanied by properly accredited Messengers.

### Article 4—Messengers

This Association shall be composed of Messengers holding membership in the Churches which constitute the Association; these Messengers having been duly elected by their respective Churches on the following basis: Each Church shall be entitled to Three Messengers without reference to their numerical strength; and one additional Messenger for each Twenty-five members or fraction thereof, after it has attained a membership of Fifty members.

### Article 5-Officers

The officers of the Association shall be a Moderator, a Vice-Moderator, a Clerk and a Treasurer, who shall be elected annually at the beginning of each Annual Meeting and shall be installed at the close of the session and shall serve until and through the next session of the Association and no person shall be elected Moderator for more than two consecutive years.

### Article 6-Meetings

- This Association shall meet Annually at such Date, Time and Place as the Association shall have selected at its last Annual Session.
- 2. In addition to the Annual Meeting, there shall be held a Union Meeting each Fifth Sunday; the Time, Place, and Program to be provided for by the Executive Committee.
- 3. In the event of an emergency, the Executive Committee is authorized to make changes in the Time and Place for the Annual Meeting, as will best serve the interests of the Association.

### Article 7-Amendments

The Constitution and By-Laws of the Association may be amended at any Annual Meeting of the Association, by a two-thirds majority vote of the Messengers.

### BY-LAWS

### Section 1-Duties of Officers

- 1. The Duties of the Moderator shall be to preside, preserve order, and appoint all Committees not otherwise provided for in the Constitution and By-Laws.
- 2. The duties of the Vice-Moderator shall be to assist the Moderator; and to preside in the absence of, or at the request of, the Moderator.
- 3. The Clerk shall keep a correct record of the proceedings of the Association; supervise the printing and distribution of the Minutes; keep a regular file of the published proceedings of the Association; and deliver same with other material belonging to the office to his successor.

The Clerk shall send to the clerks of the Churches of the Association the Associational Letter Form Blanks thirty days prior to the Annual Meeting; also the material to the Chairmen of the Standing Committees, who are to submit reports of our work at the Annual Session.

The Clerk shall notify after the adjournment of the Association, all Persons, Committees, and Chairmen of Standing Committees, of their elections or appointments of service.

The Clerk shall receive remuneration for his services, the sum to be fixed by the Association at each Annual Meeting; also he shall receive additional funds from the Association for the expenses of his office.

- 4. The Treasurer shall keep a correct record of all Associational Funds received and disbursed by his Office; and shall submit a record of all transactions of his Office to the Association at its Annual Meeting. The Treasurer shall be the Chairman of the Finance Committee.
- 5. The duties of the Executive Committee shall be to transact all business of the Association between its Annual Meetings; and a written report of its work shall be submitted to the association at its Annual Session.

The Moderator and Clerk of the Association shall serve as Chairman and Secretary of the Executive Committee between the Annual Sessions of the Association.

In the event a vacancy occurs in any office of the Association between the Annual Meetings; the Executive Committee is authorized to fill such vacancy for the unexpired term of office; if not otherwise provided for in the Constitution and By-Laws.

### Section 2—Committees

- 1. The Standing Committees of the Association shall be: 1—Executive Committee; 2—Order of Business; 3—State Missions; 4—Home Missions; 5—Foreign Missions; 6—Religious Literature; 7—Christian Education; 8—Sunday Schools; 9—Baptist Training Union; 10—Woman's Missionary Union; 11—Laymen's Work—Brotherhood; 12—Florida Baptist Children's Home; 13—Ministerial Relief and Annuities; 14—Social Service. Also other Committees as the Association shall deem advisable.
- 2. The Special Committees of the Association shall be: 1—Nominations; 2—Finance; 3—Resolutions; 4—Obituaries; 5—Digest of Letters—State of Religion. Also other Committees as the Association shall deem advisable.

### Section 3—Committees. Appointment Of

- 1. All Standing Committees shall consist of Three Members; who shall be appointed by the Moderator; the Chairman being selected in advance; the others at each Annual Session.
- 2. All Special Committees shall consist of not less than Three nor more than Five Members; who shall be appointed by the Moderator at each Annual Session.
- 3. The Committee on Order of Business shall consist of Three Members, Two of which shall be the Moderator and the Vice-Moderator. The third shall be appointed by the Moderator at each Annual Meeting.

The Executive Committee of this Association shall be composed of:

- 1. One member from each church elected by the church and reported to the association in the regular church letter each year.
  - 2. The pastor of each and every church in the association.
  - 3. The presiding officer of each associational organization.

The Executive Committee shall meet on the Second Tuesday p. m. of each of the months of December, March, June, and September at a place that may be decided by the committee itself.

The officers of the Executive Committee, together with the presiding officers of the associational organizations, shall constitute a Steering Committee that shall have the power to transact any business of the association that may be necessary during the time between the regular meetings of the Executive Committee; providing, that in the event the association is not organized as indicated above, then the Steering Committee shall be composed of the officers of the Executive Committee and four other such members of the Executive Committee as shall be elected by the Executive Committee.

The Steering Committee shall meet once each month or as often as the Chairman may call it into session.

### Section 4-Committees. Duties Of

- 1. The duties of the Standing Committees and the Special Committees, shall be those which are commonly understood, and observed by Baptist Associations and Conventions, as suggested by their names.
- 2. The duties of the Committee on the Order of Business shall be to prepare the Program for each Annual Meeting; and to select the Speakers not otherwise provided for in the Constitution and By-Laws.
  - 3. The duties of the Nominating Committee shall be:

To name the Time and Place for the Annual Meeting.

To name the Preachers and Alternates for the Annual Introductory and Missionary Sermons.

To name the Associational Messengers to the Florida Baptist Convention.

All nominations subject to adoption by the Association.

### Section 5

The Association shall have an Introductory and a Missionary Sermon at each Annual Meeting, on the first and second days respectively; the hours for the sermons to be provided for in the Order of Business.

### Section 6

The fiscal year of the Association shall begin September first of each year, and end August thirty-first of the following year, both dates inclusive; and all reports to the Association shall conform to these dates.

### Section 7

All written reports of Committees shall be limited to a maximum of six hundred words; and the Clerk is authorized if necessary, to edit reports to conform to this word limitation.

### Section 8

When a Church fails to send an Annual letter, the Clerk shall use the report of the previous year, with reference only to record of membership of Church and organizations.

### Section 9

The Association requests that Church clerks prepare and mail to the Clerk of the Association their Annual Church Letter, ten days before the Annual Meeting.

### Section 10

The Parliamentary Law which shall be used by this Association in the government of its business proceedings, shall be Kerfoot's Parliamentary Law.

It is also understood, that this Association shall ever adhere to the Principles and Practices of recognized Baptist Policies in all its procedures, its methods, and its work.

### RESOLUTION

We, the members of the Executive Committee of the Suwannee Baptist Association, in session this 10th day of June, 1941, fraternally request all Churches of this Association to co-operate in the adoption of this resolution as a policy with regard to Ordination of candidates for the Ministry.

- 1st. That the Church of which any one desiring to enter the Ministry is a member, shall give due consideration and encouragement to the point of giving license to preach.
- 2nd. If the candidate shall be called to the pastorate of a Baptist Church and Ordination is called for, the Church of which the candidate is a member shall request the Moderator of the Association, to call an examining counsel to be composed of the pastors and others of the Association before which the Candidate shall appear and be questioned as to his understanding of the Bible Doctrines and Baptist belief and practice.
- 3rd. If the Candidate shall give satisfactory evidence to the Counsel that he is qualified for Ordination he shall be recommended to the Church and the Church shall set a date and invite the pastors to form a presbytery and Ordain the Candidate on the given date.

The above resolution was passed and recommended to our Churches as a safeguard against indiscriminate ordaining of men who are unprepared for the Sacred Ministry.

### BROTHERHOOD REPORT

October 2nd, 1941

At the time of the former meeting of our association in October 1940 there were two Baptist Brotherhoods, the Brotherhood of the First Baptist church of Live Oak and the Brotherhood of the Mount Olive Baptist church.

On September 23rd, a group of men met at New Hope and organized a Brotherhood for New Hope Church and also a Brotherhood for the Bright Pond Church. This meeting was presided over by our Associational president, Bro. J. L. McMullen, and the number of the New Hope charter members was twenty. Nine men were present from Bright Pond. They all enrolled as charter members of the Bright Pond Brotherhood and it was stated that others, who could not be present but desired to become charter members, would be added to the list.

The Brotherhood at Live Oak has a membership of 72, Mt. Olive has 15, New Hope 20, and Bright Pond 26, making a total membership of 133.

There is an inter-denominational Brotherhood at Branford. I do not know how many Baptists belong to that brotherhood.

The aim of the association is to organize, and assist in the work of getting well established for Christian service, as many Brotherhoods as is possible during

the church year we are now entering. It is hoped that all of the churches in the association will either have a brotherhood or will participate in the work of a brotherhood. However, it would be a serious mistake for any church to attempt to have a brotherhood just for the sake of having the organization. Definite Christian service should be the aim of any such organization.

# REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON BAPTIST HUNDRED THOUSAND CLUB

The Hundred Thousand Club is the debt paying plan of Southern Baptists adopted at the meeting of the Southern Baptist Convention which was held in Washington, D. C., in 1933. It was a dark day in Southern Baptist life and work when this plan was presented by Dr. Tripp, who was then pastor in St. Josephs, Mo. The debt of Southern Baptist was bewildering to the Spirit and initiative of all our Denominational agencies and stood as a great bulwark in the way of progress. We believe this plan came at the right time to strengthen the morale of our work and give Baptist a new day for service.

The object of the Hundred Thousand Club, was to enlist one hundred thousand Baptists to give one dollar per month over and above the regular gifts to apply on the debt. This goal of one hundred thousand has never been reached but a sufficient number have come into the plan to make possible for us to see the fulfillment of our dreams of "A debtless Denomination by 1945". Florida gave more than seventy five thousand dollars through this plan from June 1933 to May 1, 1941. Our Association including all 31 Churches gave last year \$203.70 toward the retirement of the debts through the Hundred Thousand Club. We are hoping that this year will show a worthy increase over last year. We heartily commend the Woman's Missionary Union of our Association for the part they are having by individual memberships and also with the Centennial gifts. We urge all of our pastors to encourage membership in the Hundred Thousand Club in order to hasten the day for a debtless Denomination.

### REPORT ON EVANGELISM

We feel honored in one sense that we are making the first report on Evangelism in our Association for a long time, yet there is a solemn indictment against our Association for neglect in the great field of Evangelism about us which is so white unto harvest. At the first meeting of the Executive Committee

following the last annual meeting a committee to promote and assist in Evangelistic work was appointed as follows: Rev. T. M. Smiley, Chairman, Rev. H. O. Hughes, Rev. W. H. Gray, and H. H. Link, who moved away and Rev. Charles Griffin was appointed in his place. Your committee has worked in close harmony with our State Evangelistic Committee, as well as with our Churches and pastors giving assistance where it was needed. We planned for and assisted in conducting a Conference on Evangelism under the direction of the State Evangelistic Committee at the First Baptist Church of Live Oak.

We feel that the work of your Committee has aroused an interest in Evangelism which has been absent in our work too long. Last year our Churches had a total of 156 Baptisms, with 26 Churches having revival meetings. This year we have but eleven months to report due to the change in the Associational year which will prevent several of our Churches reporting the revival meetings and the number of Baptisms but according to reports brought to this meeting we have Baptised 126 and 22 of our Churches have had revivals. May Evangelism be the watch word for all of our Churches. We urge every Church to plan for a revival not only in the Church but in the unchurched and out of the way places in our Association. We recommend a revival in an abandoned School House, or brush-arbor, or any where that we may reach one Soul or more. We also recommend soul winning groups be organized in every Church.

### REPORT ON CO-OPERATIVE PROGRAM

The Co-operative Program is the plan of Southern Baptists to adequately carry out the great commission of our Lord of preaching, teaching and healing. It includes the regular and organized State and Southwide work of our denomination.

It seeks to provide for our Missionary, Educational and Benevolent causes by enlisting each of our churches in a co-operative effort to support them. For information the following divisions of the funds are listed: State Missions 40 percent, Florida Baptist Children's Home 9 percent, Stetson University 9 percent, Rogers Building 5 percent, Student Aid 2 percent, Southwide objects Foreign Mission Board 50 percent, Home Mission Board 23 1-3 percent, Relief and Annuity Board 10 1-3 percent. Southern Baptist Theological Seminary 4 1-5 percent. W. M. U. Training School 8.15 percent, American Baptist Theological Seminary 1 percent, Southern Baptist Hospital 2 1-5 percent.

We recommend and urge that each of you as individuals loyally and systematically co-operate in the support of this our very worthy program.

### FOREIGN MISSIONS

Through our separate missions we are following Christ's command to go into all the world and preach the Gospel shown in this report.

Despite the threat of war and actual war, the Foreign Mission Board is able to report that the convention year just closed was one of the best of its long history of 96 years.

Through its 457 active missionaries and the nearly 3000 native workers the Board has been doing the work of teaching and preaching and healing in 16

countries of Africa, Asia, Europe and South America. 35,291 students have been taught, 136,994 patients have been ministered to and innumerable thousands have had the Gospel preached to them. The membership of the churches was increased by 18,542 who came by baptism. The 251,734 members contributed a total of \$379,896.00.

When Dr. Maddry assumed the duties of the executive secretaryship, the Board was in debt to the amount of \$1,110,000.00. At the present time the indebtedness is \$205,000.00. Since the last report was written, \$40,000.00 has been applied to debt reduction. It is confidently expected that the Foreign Mission Board will be a debtless institution when its 100th anniversary is observed in 1945.

Vitally related to the achievements mentioned herein are the women of the Southern Baptist Convention. Year by year their Lottie Moon gifts have increased until last year they reached the unprecedented height of \$363,743.30. With the Board's share of this amount, missionaries have been sent to the lands of their hearts' desires, homes have been built for these messengers of light and schools and churches and hospitals have been made possible to those who desperately needed them.

### HOME MISSIONS

The ninety-sixth annual report of the Home Mission Board reveals marked progress on every field, as shown by the following brief summary:

Total receipts from all sources, \$560,168.09; number of missionaries, 391; number of churches and mission stations, 915, new mission stations opened, 71; new pieces of property acquired, 14; number of sermons preached, 31,403; number of persons touched in personal work, 77,440; number of people making profession of faith, 5,375; number of Bibles and Testaments distributed, 4,443; number of tracts distributed, 724,505.

The most marked achievement of the year financially was the refinancing of the Board's total debt of \$850,000, interest saving alone by reducing the rate to  $3\frac{1}{4}$ % and  $3\frac{1}{2}$ % amounting to \$9,000 a year.

### Missionary Achievements

On the Cuban field, according to the report of Superintendent M. N. McCall, there are fifteen more workers than were reported a year ago. The present force of 87 missionaries in Cuba delivered last year 9.815 sermons, made 55,714 missionary visits, baptized 261, and ministered to 4,544 church members in the 57 churches on the island.

Dr. J. W. Beagle, field secretary, reports 260 workers in the department of missions in the homeland. Thirty new missionaries have been appointed. The 260 workers serve 186 churches and 498 mission stations. The 186 churches report a membership of 16,900. Our workers report 4,932 conversions, 2,468 baptisms, 21,726 contacted in personal work, 302 Sunday schools, 256 revival meetings.

### Pentecostal Results in Soul-Winning

"Marvelous and multidinous victories" in soul-winning have come from God, according to Dr. Roland Q. Leavell, superintendent of evangelism. Tentative figures indicate that approximately a quarter of a million people have been won to Christ and baptized in the past year, thus making our church membership more than 5,000,000.

### STATE MISSIONS

The Program of State Missions for the last year has been one of the best in the history of Florida Baptists—And the outlook for the future is most encouraging.

The program work carried on in Florida is varied and far-reaching. Teaching, preaching, enlistment and the care of orphans are a part of the activities. And every department of the work supports the whole program.

The student work carried on at the University at Gainesville by Brother Sabin P. Landry, and at the Woman's College at Tallahassee by Miss Billie Ruth Currin is of such nature as to not only conserve the religious work of the churches with the Baptist Students but also to increase the activities in the local churches serving the student bodies.

The Baptist Witness, Florida's denominational paper, is edited by Dr. E. D. Solomon, and is the medium of dispensing Baptist information of all Southern Baptists. This paper ought to be in every Baptist home.

The Ministers Retirement Plan is one of the finest things ever proposed for the care of aged and disabled preachers. The Executive Secretary-Treasurer, Dr. C. H. Bolton is working on a revision of the Plan whereby every pastor may be entitled to a pension upon retirement. This revised Plan will be submitted to the State Convention in January by a special committee composed of the following brethren: Wallace Rogers, Pensacola, Chairman; W. H. Rittenhouse, Melbourne; C. Roy Angell, Miami; C. E. Rodgers, Tampa and Otis Hagler, Jacksonville Beach.



### REPORT ON RELIGIOUS LITERATURE

To help combat the flood of filthy literature in our land, we as Southern Baptists should give fuller support to the denominational press.

The doubling of crimes during the past decade can be traced directly to the reading of "smutty magazines" which are bought by millions of Americans each month.

Ex-warden Lewis E. Lawes of Sing Sing, J. Edgar Hoover of the FBI and others denounce this degrading literature which evilly inflames the minds of youth, yet the news stands are filled with it.

The only force strong enough to rout these powers of evil is the Bible, and literature inspired by God's Holy Word. President W. W. Hamilton has said "The Bible needs no defense: just turn it loose, and, like a roaring lion, it will take care of itself."

Also important are those splendid Southern Baptist Publications which tell of modern acts of present day apostles.

At the forefront are the State Baptist papers, and Missionary magazines.

As Dr. Hamilton said in his last presidential address: "Having the state papers and mission publications in every Baptist home is a vision to which we cannot be disobedient-our editors and our papers are missionaries and teachers, and they are co-workers with us in all things pertaining to the cause of Christ."

The circulation of the eighteen papers, is about 240,000, but should be pushed on up to 500,000 by the convention centennial in 1945.

A list of the many splendid publications can be secured from any denominational office.

Every denominational journal should be made self-supporting at once.

The pen is mightier than the sword. Hitler has said: "I shall do more with paper and ink than Napoleon ever did with gun-powder." The power of propaganda and publicity has been exploited by forces of evil: it now should be used to promote God's world-wide kingdom. Baptist readers are Baptist leaders.

- M. E. Dodd has said:
  - "A non-reading Baptist is a non-informed Baptist;
  - A non-informed Baptist is a non-interested Baptist;
  - A non-interested Baptist is a non-cooperating Baptist;
  - A non-cooperating Baptist is just not much of a Baptist."

Certainly the members of this association will not want to be that kind of Baptists but will want to give hearty support to the denomination's program of worthwhile religious literature.

### FLORIDA BAPTIST CHILDREN'S HOME

Dr. C. M. Brittain in "RECOLLECTIONS-Baptist Work in Florida, 1901-1906", as related in the Florida Baptist Witness of October 2, 1941, says that at the convention held in Marianna in 1901, Dr. J. C. Porter read the first annual report of the Trustees of the Florida Baptist Orphanage, mentioning that the orphanage had been located at Arcadia and that the sum of \$5,450 had been subscribed towards equipping and maintaining the institution. In the convention report of 1904, it was reported that Rev. B. M. Bean and his efficient wife had been elected superintendent and household manager respectively, and that the Home was now ready for the reception of children. The Home was officially opened on the first day of February, 1904. On that opening day, an orphan was received and another the next day. By March 1, 10 had been received, and at the end of the first year Superintendent Bean was able to report 23 children-11 boys and 12 girls-had been accepted. The orphanage was officially dedicated during the convention which met in Bartow, January 17, 1906,

This year, 1941, when there was a special campaign put on to raise funds to relieve some of the indebtedness, our Association did its share by subscribing approximately \$500 as our goal. Florida Baptists contributed \$25,000.00. Our Association contributed a fine truckload of produce; Branford leading the list of Suwannee Baptists in contributions. Other contributions are sent from the various churches regularly.

Under the able supervision of Brother T. M. Johns, our children's home has developed into one of the best children's homes in the entire Southern Baptist Convention. We appreciate his leadership and cooperation.

Your committee submits the following report.

About 22 years ago a vision by many of our brethren, was put into action through the Relief and Annuity Board of the Southern Baptist Convention, and has kept growing under the wise leadership of our capable leaders until it has now 7.024 churches co-operating and 4,316 pastors participating, out of the 18 States, that are now co-operating in the ministers retirement plan. The financial 28

There are twelve plans through which the Relief and Annuity Board is rendering valuable service.

- 1-The Relief Plan for those who could not participate in the contributory Annuity plans of the Board.
- 2-The (old) Annuity Fund. This plan was closed to new members Sept. 20, 1930, but the benefits last year amounted to \$220,298.94. There are nearly 800 active paying members now.
- 3-The Service Annuity Plan: There are several beneficiaries receiving monthly checks through this plan, but it was closed to new members Jan. 1, 1938. It was superseded by other more workable plans.
- 4-The Special Deferred Annuity Plan: This plan is an individual plan based on monthly, quarterly, semi-annual, or annual payments with earned annuities payable at the end of any year, but preferably in old age.
- 5-The Special Annuity: This form of certificate is issued by the Board for those who wish to pay in lump sum payments of \$1,000, \$5,000, \$10,000 or even larger sums and receive specified Annuities at once or at a deferred date.
- 6-Age Security Plan: This plan is specifically for the unordained workers of our churches and the dues on the basis of 3% of the monthly salary are paid by the employee and also the employer. The plan will produce worthy living incomes at age 65.
- 7-Savings Annuities: This plan is for the missionaries of the Foreign Mission Board and other salaried workers of our denomination, their widows and orphans to conserve their funds for educating the children, and for hospitalization and to purchase life Annuities.
- 8-Foreign Mission Board Pension Plan: This plan is for the Missionaries of the Foreign Mission Board. Each Missionary upon retirement receives \$500.00 per year or \$1,000 for a couple, if they become permanently disabled they receive \$500.00.
- 9-Institutional Employees, Pension Plan: (a) For Orphanages: This group plan 3% is paid by the employee and 3% by the Institution. The minimum benefit is \$500.00 and a maximum of \$1,200.00 for 25 years of service and a maximum disability benefit of \$500.00 per year.
- 10-Baptist Board employees retirement plan: This plan to take care of all the State Boards and many other agencies and institutions of our Southern Baptist Convention, 3% being paid by the employee and 3% by the employer. For 25 years of service, the minimum benefit \$600.00 and the maximum is \$2.000.00. The maximum disability benefit is \$500.00.
- 11-The Convention Ministers Retirement Plan: This plan is now in operation in 18 States, 3% of the pastor's salary paid by him and 3% by the church and 2% by the State Convention. After this plan has been in operation for twelve years  $50\,\%$  of the average salary received by the minister the last  $25\,$ years of service will be paid, however \$600.00 is the maximum benefit for those who retire the first 5 years of operation of the plan. This plan is to be increased \$200.00 per year until the maximum is reached of \$2,000.00, this is the limit regardless of the salary received, no dues collected on salaries above \$4,000.00 per annum.
- 12-Gift Annuity Plan-This is the plan to take care of those who wish to make donations to the Relief and Annuity Board, other than ministers and employes of our denomination, who need the income of their gifts while they live or their dependants, the contractural Annuities will be paid with regularity, monthly, quarterly, semi-annually, or annually. Ample reserves are made to take care of the beneficiaries as long as they may live.

We believe this to be a plan that will take care of our ministers and Denominational workers in a way that will make them happy when illness and old age takes our earning capacity away from us. Therefore we urge every pastor and church who have not joined the Ministers Retirement Plan to do so at once.

### REPORT ON CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

In the Southern Baptist Convention, there are 65 Schools, Junior and Senior Colleges; Universities and Seminaries, owned and controlled by Southern Baptists. The property value of these Institutions is \$45,165,412.83. The Endowment Fund of these totals \$28,789,477.63. There was an enrollment last year in these schools of 35,661.

We may boast of ownership of our Baptist Schools and Colleges; but let us remember that ownership involves both moral and financial support. We have been rather loud and long on our boast of ownership; but too silent and short on the matter of support.

There is Education, and there is also Christian Education; which recognizes God in every realm of life; in every branch of science, and learning; for God is the God of Truth everywhere. And when we endeavor to educate ourselves or others, to discover and develop the resources of the human heart and life; to find and know truth; to liberate the powers latent within our being by knowledge which is applied; how much better to do all this in an atmosphere charged with religious influence and truth, than in an atmosphere where God is not felt or recognized.

If we are to have trained leaders in all walks of life, then we must maintain our own Institutions where our men and women can be educated and trained. In our effort to keep the Church and State separate, we have all but forgotten God; but in our own Institutions of learning, we can put God first; and consecrate all our knowledge to Him and His service, and that of our fellowmen.

We must realize that the days of ignorant leadership are over. If we are to be leaders of people, we must know at least as much, and more than they do, Now knowledge may puff one up in pride; but there is a type of ignorance that is also puffed up with pride. But Christian Education brings in something else; it is Education plus; Education plus religion and grace and consecration.

Jesus taught the people; He trained the twelve; His disciples were not wholly ignorant, blank; as some believe them to have been. Moses was an educated man; they were all great leaders; and all their knowledge and learning was consecrated to God and His service.

Baptists have a heritage of which they should be grateful. In the realms of business and commerce, science and medicine, law and government and diplomacy; Baptists have never had to play second-fiddle to anyone. And the world is still ready to hear, and to follow, the man and the woman who knows something; especially if that knowledge reveals God within the heart and life of the one who would lead.

Christian Education, consecrated and applied, would have averted World War number one and the present conflict number two. An observation of the leaders among the nations responsible for the present world carnage; shows wholly a lack of Christian knowledge and education. Christian education in the lives of the leaders and diplomats of the governments of the world, would have brought in world peace rather than another World War. But Christian education must be applied, it must be made practical in every walk of life, to be effective.

Stetson University, under the leadership of Dr. Allen during the past few years; is a concrete illustration of what Christian Education applied will do for a people. Thousands of dollars in the form of endowment gifts, have enabled many young men and women to secure an education, which will make them good leaders in society.

We may make our reports and adopt them, and endorse Stetson University; but Stetson needs more than that. Stetson needs our financial support; and if there is any truth in the saying that money talks, it would be a fine thing for more of our Baptist money to say "Stetson, here I come." That is an endorsement that everybody knows and understands and will accept. Let us stand by our Educational Institutions; and as Florida Baptists, stand by Stetson with greater moral and financial support.

### SUNDAY SCHOOL REPORT

In our Association we have 22 Sunday Schools; with an enrollment of 7421. In Florida we have in our Convention, 750 Sunday Schools; with an enrollment of 119,276. In our Southern Baptist Convention we have 23,754 Sunday Schools; with an enrollment of 3,523,853. Baptisms from S. S. in Association last year 39.

In our Association we held the past year, 1 Daily Vacation Bible School; with an enrollment of 117. In Florida in our Convention we had 122 Schools; with an enrollment of 14,519. In the Southern Baptist Convention there were 4349 of these Schools; with an enrollment of 421,377. These statistics for the State and Southern Conventions are from Southern Baptist Handbook, 1940 edition.

We will never be able to value the good work of our Sunday Schools, or estimate their worth in the teaching of the Word of God. We will never be able by statistics to evaluate the services rendered by thousands of men and women, Officers and Teachers in our Sunday Schools; who give their services to this great and noble work, of teaching classes and conducting Sunday Schools each week.

The Sunday Schools are the only organizations in our Baptist Churches where anyone can be a member from the cradle to the grave. And parents and grandparents are never too old to attend Sunday School for the teaching of the word of God. Adults are inclined to forget this; but if Sunday Schools are good for children, they are good for adults.

The Sunday School is the teaching service of the Church; and let us not forget this. We may be promoted from one class to another but we are never graduated from the Sunday school. We need a revival of Sunday School going among our Churches; especially the adults.

The claim has been made that the majority of baptisms of the Churches come from the Sunday Schools. This is beyond a doubt true. But the Sunday School is not an organization apart from the Church; it is in the church, a part of the church. All honor to whom honor is due; but if the Sunday School is responsible for the greater number of baptisms in our Churches; then who is responsible for the great multitude outside our churches and Sunday Schools; who never go to Church or Sunday School, and therefore are not baptized into the fellowship of our churches?

The responsibility rests upon the members of the Churches, regardless of whether they are members of the Sunday School, or Baptist Training Union, or the Woman's Missionary Society. For we are to exist for only one purpose:—
To evangelize; to teach and train. And our Sunday Schools afford us one of the most fruitful fields for the work of evangelization.

The Daily Vacation Bible School affords us an opportunity that we do not have in any organization of our Churches. A two weeks Daily Vacation Bible School, of three hours each day, for five days in each week; will give more time for Bible Study by the members; than the average member gets from the Sunday School in the entire year; allowing for irregular attendance. Let us give practical consideration to the Daily Vacation Bible School work.

We believe the emphasis in our Church work should be placed upon the children and young people. The church that neglects this will lack leaders and workers in the future.

We believe that it is a good work to have in addition to the regular revival meeting our churches each year; to have a week's meeting for young people; call it a revival or a conference, or what you may like. And get the Sunday School members to attend; and make it a great opportunity for decision for Christ, and His Kingdom, and His Church.
