ARTICLES OF FAITH

1. OF THE SCRIPTURES

We believe that the Holy Bible was written by men Divinely inspired, and is a perfect treasure of heavenly instruction; that it has God for its Author, salvation for its end, and truth without any mixture of error for its matter; that it reveals the principles by which God will judge us; and therefore is, and shall remain to the end of the world, the true center of Christian union, and the supreme standard by which all human conduct, creeds, and opinions should be tried.

2. OF THE TRUE GOD

We believe that there is One, and only One living and true God, an Infinite, intelligent Spirit, Whose Name is Jehovah, the Maker and Supreme Ruler of Heaven and Earth; inexpressibly glorious in Holiness, and worthy of all possible honor, confidence and love; that in the Unity of the Godhead there are Three Persons, the Father, the Son, and the Holy Ghost; equal in every Divine Perfection, and executing distinct but harmonious Offices in the great work of Redemption.

3. OF THE FALL OF MAN

We believe that Man was created in holiness, under the law of his Maker; but by voluntary transgression fell from that holy and happy state; in consequence of which all Mankind are now sinners, not by constraint but choice; being by nature utterly void of that holiness required by the law of God; positively inclined to evil; and therefore under just condemnation to eternal ruin, without defense or excuse.

4. OF THE WAY OF SALVATION

We believe that the salvation of sinners is wholly of Grace; through the Mediatorial office of the Son of God; Who by the appointment of the Father, freely took upon Him our nature, yet without our sin; honored the Divine law by His Personal obedience, and by His death made a full Atonement for our sins; that having risen from the dead, He is now enthroned in heaven; and uniting in his wonderful Person the tenderest sympathies with Divine Perfections, He is every way qualified to be a suitable, a compassionate, and all-sufficient Saviour.

5. OF JUSTIFICATION

We believe that the great Gospel blessing which Christ secures to such as believe in Him is Justification; that Justification includes the pardon of sin, and the promise of eternal life on principles of righteousness; that it is bestowed, not in consideration of any works of righteousness which we have done, but solely through Faith in the Redeemer's Blood; by virtue of which faith His perfect righteousness is freely imputed to us of God; that it brings us into a state of most blessed peace and favor with God, and secures every other blessing needful for time and eternity.

6. OF THE FREEDOM OF SALVATION

We believe that the blessings of salvation are made free to all by the Gospel; that it is the immediate duty of all to accept them by a cordial penitent and obedient faith; and that nothing prevents the salvation of the greatest sinner on earth, but his own inherent depravity and voluntary rejection of the Gospel; which involves him in an aggravated condemnation.

7. OF GRACE IN REGENERATION

We believe that in order to be saved, sinners must be regenerated, or born again; that regeneration consists in giving a holy disposition to the mind; that it is effected in a manner above our comprehension by the power of the Holy Spirit, in connection with Divine truth, so as to secure our voluntary obedience to the Gospel; and that its proper evidence appears in the holy fruits of repentance, and faith, and newness of life.

8. OF REPENTANCE AND FAITH

We believe that Repentance and Faith are sacred duties, and also inseparable Graces, wrought in our souls by the regenerating Spirit of God; whereby being deeply convinced of our guilt, danger and helplessness, and of the way of salvation by Christique turn to God with unfeigned contrition, confession, and supplication for mercy; at the same time heartily receiving the Lord Jesus Christ as our Prophet, Priest and King, and relying on Him alone as the Only and All-sufficient Saviour.

9. OF GOD'S PURPOSE OF GRACE

We believe that Election is the Eternal purpose of God, according to which He graciously regenerates, sanctifies, and saves sinners; that being perfectly consistent with the free agency of man, it comprehends all the means in connection with the end; that it is a most glorious display of God's Sovereign Goodness, being Infinitely free, wise, holy and unchangeable; that it utterly excludes boasting, and promotes humility, love, prayer, praise, trust in God, and active imitation of His free mercy; that it encourages the use of means in the highest degree; that it may be ascertained by its effects in all who truly believe the Gospel; that it is the foundation of Christian assurance; and that to ascertain it with regard to ourselves demands and deserves the utmost diligence.

10. OF SANCTIFICATION

We believe that Sanctification is the process by which, according to the Will of God, we are made partakers of His Holiness; that it is a progressive work; that it is begun in regeneration; and that it is carried on in the hearts of believers by the presence and power of the Holy Spirit, the Sealer and Comforter, in the continual use of the appointed means—especially, the Word of God, self-examination, self-denial, watchfulness and prayer.

11. OF THE PERSEVERANCE OF SAINTS

We believe that such only are real believers as endure unto the end; that their persevering attachment to Christ is the grand mark which distinguishes them from superficial professors; that a special Providence watches over their welfare; and they are kept by the power of God through faith unto salvation.

12. OF THE HARMONY OF THE LAW AND THE GOSPEL

We believe that the Law of God is the eternal and unchangeable rule of His moral government; that it is holy, just, and good; and that the inability which the Scriptures ascribe to fallen men to fulfill from which, and to restore them through a Mediator to unfeigned obedience to the holy Law, is one great end of the Gospel, and of Church.

13. OF THE GOSPEL CHURCH

We believe that a visible Church of Christ is a Congregation of baptized believers, associated by Covenant in the faith and fellowship of the Gospel; observing the Ordinances of Christ; governed by His Laws; and exercising the gifts, rights, and privileges invested in them by His Word; that its only Scriptural officers are Bishops or Pastors and Deacons, whose qualifications, claims, and duties are defined in the Epistles to Timothy and Titus.

14. OF BAPTISM AND THE LORD'S SUPPER

We believe that Christian baptism is the immersion in water of a believer, into the Name of the Father, and Son, and Holy Ghost; to show forth in a solemn and beautiful emblem, our faith in the crucified, buried, and risen Saviour, with its effects, in our death to sin and resurrection to a new life; that it is a pre-requisite to the privileges of a Church relation; and to the Lord's Supper, in which the members of the Church by the sacred use of bread and wine, are to commemorate together the dying love of Christ; preceded always by solemn, self-examination.

15. OF THE CHRISTIAN SABBATH

We believe that the first day of the week is the Lord's Day, or Christian Sabbath; and is to be kept sacred to religious purposes, by abstaining from all secular labor and sinful recreations, by the devout observance of all the means of Grace, both private and public; and by preparation for that rest that remaineth for the people of God.

16. OF CIVIL GOVERNMENT

We believe that Civil Government is of Divine appointment, for the interests and good order of human society; and that magistrates are to be prayed for, conscientiously honored, and obeyed; except only in things opposed to the Will of our Lord Jesus Christ, Who is the only Lord of the conscience, and the Prince of the kings of the earth.

17. OF THE RIGHTEOUS AND THE WICKED

We believe that there is a radical and essential difference between the righteous and the wicked; that such only as through faith are justified in the Name of the Lord Jesus, and sanctified by the Spirit of Our God, are truly righteous in His esteem; while all such as continue in impenitence and unbelief are in His sight wicked, and under the curse; and this distinction holds among men both in and after death.

18. OF THE WORLD TO COME

We believe that the end of this world is approaching; that at the Last Day, Christ will descend from heaven, and raise the dead from the grave to final retribution; that a solemn separation will then take place; that the wicked will be adjudged to endless punishment, and the righteous to endless joy; and that this judgment will fix forever the final state of men in heaven or hell, on principles of righteousness.

CONSTITUTION

Article 1-Name

This Organization shall be known as the SUWANNEE MISSIONARY BAPTIST ASSOCIATION.

Article 2-Purpose

The Purpose of this Association shall be: To furnish a medium of Co-operation for the Churches of the Association in their Divinely commissioned work of Missions, Education, and Benevolences; and to this end we seek to bring into co-operative fellowship the energies of our Churches; and to secure the moral and financial support of our Churches for the Objects and Institutions fostered by the Florida Convention of Baptist Churches, and the Southern Baptist Convention.

Article 3—Churches

The Constituents of this Association shall be Missionary Baptist Churches of regular order, presenting petitionary letters from other Associations in due form; and Churches which may be constituted within the bounds of the Association, presenting proper credentials of organization and Articles of Faith, accompanied by properly accredited Messengers.

Article 4-Messengers

This Association shall be composed of Messengers holding membership in the Churches which constitute the Association; these Messengers having been duly elected by their respective Churches on the following basis: Each Church shall be entitled to Three Messengers without reference to their numerical strength; and one additional Messenger for each Twenty-five members or fraction thereof, after it has attained a membership of Fifty members.

Article 5-Officers

The officers of the Association shall be a Moderator, a Vice-Moderator, a Clerk and a Treasurer, who shall be elected annually at the beginning of each Annual Meeting and shall be installed at the close of the session and shall serve until and through the next session of the Association. The offices of Clerk and Treasurer shall be held by the same person.

Article 6-Meetings

- 1. This Association shall meet Annually at such Date, Time and Place as the Association shall have selected at its last Annual Session.
- 2. In addition to the Annual Meeting, there shall be held a Union Meeting each Fifth Sunday; the Time, Place, and Program to be provided for by the Executive Committee.
- 3. In the event of an emergency, the Executive Committee is authorized to make changes in the Time and Place for the Annual Meeting, as will best serve the interests of the Association.

Article 7-Amendments

The Constitution and By-Laws of the Association may be amended at any Annual Meeting of the Association, by a two-thirds majority vote of the Messengers.

BY-LAWS

Section 1—Duties of Officers

1. The Duties of the Moderator shall be to preside, preserve order, and appoint all Committees not otherwise provided for in the Constitution and By-Laws.

- 2. The duties of the Vice-Moderator shall be to assist the Moderator; and to preside in the absence of, or at the request of, the Moderator.
- 3. The Clerk shall keep a correct record of the proceedings of the Association; supervise the printing and distribution of the minutes; keep a regular file of the published proceedings of the Association; and deliver same with other material belonging to the office to his successor.

The Clerk shall send to the clerks of the Churches of the Association the Associational Letter Form Blanks thirty days prior to the Annual Meeting; also the material to the Chairmen of the Standing Committees, who are to submit reports of our work at the Annual Session.

The Clerk shall notify after the adjournment of the Association, all Persons, Committees, and Chairmen and Standing Committees, of their elections or appointments of service.

The Clerk shall receive remuneration for his service, the sum to be fixed by the Association at each Annual Meeting; also he shall receive additional funds from the Association for the expenses of his office.

- 4. The Treasurer shall keep a correct record of all Associational Funds received and disbursed by his Office; and shall submit a record of all transactions of his Office to the Association at its Annual Meeting. The Treasurer shall be the Chairman of the Finance Committee.
- 5. The duties of the Executive Committee shall be to transact all business of the Association between its Annual Meetings; and a written report of its work shall be submitted to the association at the Annual Session.

The Moderator and Clerk of the Association shall serve as Chairman and Secretary of the Executive Committee between the Annual Sessions of the Association.

In the event a vacancy occurs in any office of the Association between the Annual Meetings; the Executive Committee is authorized to fill such vacancy for the unexpired term of office; if not otherwise provided for in the Constitution and By-Laws.

Section 2—Committees

- 1. The Standing Committees of the Association shall be: 1—Executive Committee; 2—Order of Business; 3—State Missions; 4—Home Missions; 5—Foreign Missions; 6—Religious Literature; 7—Christian Education; 8—Sunday Schools; 9—Baptist Training Union; 10—Woman's Missionary Union; 11—Laymen's Work—Brotherhood; 12—Florida Baptist Children's Home; 13—Ministerial Relief and Annuities; 14—Social Service. Also other Committees as the Association shall deem advisable.
- 2. The Special Committees of the Association shall be: 1—Nominations; 2—Finance; 3—Resolutions; 4—Obituaries; 5—Digest of Letters—State of Religion. Also other Committees as the Association shall deem advisable.

Section 3-Committees. Appointment Of

- 1. All Standing Committees shall consist of Three Members; who shall be appointed by the Moderator; the Chairman being selected in advance; the others at each Annual Session.
- 2. All Special Committees shall consist of not less than Three nor more than Five Members; who shall be appointed by the Moderator at each Annual Session.
- 3. The Committee on Order of Business shall consist of Three Members, Two of which shall be the Moderator and the Vice-Moderator. The third shall be appointed by the Moderator at each Annual Meeting.

The Executive Committee of this Association shall be composed of:

- 1. One member from each church elected by the church and reported to the association in the regular church letter each year.
 - 2. The pastor of each and every church in the association.
 - 3. The presiding officer of each associational organization.

The Executive Committee shall meet on the Second Tuesday p. m. of each of the months of December, March, June, and September at a place that may be decided by the committee itself.

The officers of the Executive Committee, together with the presiding officers of the associational organizations, shall constitute a Steering Committee that shall have the power to transact any business of the association that may be necessary during the time between the regular meetings of the Executive Committee; providing, that in the event the association is not organized as indicated above, then the Steering Committee shall be composed of the officers of the Executive Committee and four other such members of the Executive Committee as shall be elected by the Executive Committee.

The Steering Committee shall meet once each month or as often as the Chairman may call it into session.

Section 4—Committees. Duties Of

- 1. The duties of the Standing Committees and the Special Committees, shall be those which are commonly understood, and observed by Baptist Associations and Conventions, as suggested by their names.
- 2. The duties of the Committee on the Order of Business shall be to prepare the Program for each Annual Meeting; and to select the Speakers not otherwise provided for in the Constitution and By-Laws.
 - 3. The duties of the Nominating Committee shall be:

To name the Time and Place for the Annual Meeting.

To name the Preachers and Alternates for the Annual Introductory and Missionary Sermons.

To name the Associational Messengers to the Florida Baptist Convention.

All nominations subject to adoption by the Association.

Section 5

The Association shall have an Introductory and a Missionary Sermon at each Annual Meeting, on the first and second days respectively; the hours for the sermons to be provided for in the Order of Business.

Section 6

The fiscal year of the Association shall begin September first of each year, and end August thirty-first of the following year, both dates inclusive; and all reports to the Association shall conform to these dates.

Section 7

All written reports of Committees shall be limited to a maximum of six hundred words; and the Clerk is authorized if necessary, to edit reports to conform to this word limitation.

Section 8

When a Church fails to send an Annual letter, the Clerk shall use the report of the previous year, with reference only to record of membership of Church and organizations.

Section 9

The Association requests that Church clerks prepare and mail to the Clerk of the Association their Annual Church Letter, ten days before the Annual Meeting.

Section 10

The Parliamentary Law which shall be used by this Association in the government of its business proceedings, shall be Kerfoot's Parliamentary Law.

It is also understood, that this Association shall ever adhere to the Principles and Practices of recognized Baptist Policies in all its Procedures, its Methods and its Word.

CHILDREN'S HOME REPORT

To Every Member of Suwannee Association:

Your committee makes the following report:

The Mission effort in our churches depends in a large measure upon the amount of financial support we give to Kingdom causes. Much is said in the Old and the New Testaments about supporting the work with our substance. A direct obligation is placed on us, as well as the opportunity, to relieve suffering and want among the poor. Hearing the Word brings comfort and peace to our souls, but this is not enough for we must follow the impulses which the Word

brings, and supply the physical needs of those in distress. We are reminded by James that we are to be doers of the Word and not hearers only.

Supporting our Children's Home at Arcadia is an important part of our denominational work. The opportunity for helping children and bringing hope and vision to them anew reaches into every Baptist home and church in this State. Many of our Sunday Schools give their wholehearted support to this cause. Twenty-five per cent of our Schools giving once each month provide forty-one per cent of the operating income. Some other schools give on special occasions and for special causes which is helpful.

The second largest part of the income for the Home is from the Co-Operative Program. Nine per cent of Program receipts is allotted to the Home. This provides twenty-five per cent of the total income. This is a sizeable amount, but it is impossible for Florida Baptists to care for their children through this meaus only.

The third source of income is from the churches. Eighteen per cent of the total receipts come from those churches who make offerings on special days; and from the churches that have adopted the Unified Budget plan of financing their work. These gifts are usually liberal.

Individuals have always been interested in our work, and thirteen per cent of the total gifts to the Home come from them. Some have set up trusts, and others make regular offerings. Some of the finest gifts we have received for our work have come from persons who were not Baptists.

The W. M. U.'s contribute three per cent through the sponsoring of children. They purchase the clothing for a particular child and are given credit for these purchases. Sponsoring does not make a difference among the children as every child is treated alike and each child has the same quality of clothing in similar amounts. The W. M. U. organizations also give coupons which are redeemed for cash. The income from this source is used in repairing the kitchen equipment and in buying needed replacements.

Most of us are familiar with many facts concerning our Home; that it is under the capable management of Mr. T. M. Johns.

Every effort is made at the Home to keep down living costs; much of the food is grown on the farm and fruit grown; about 800 gallons of beans and tomatoes were canned this year; milk and much of the meat comes from the dairy herd and the hogs.

The children attend the public schools of Arcadia. Every child who is old enough to go to school does so every day. The Student Loan Fund assists some of the children through Vocational Schools and Colleges. We have three in Stetson University this year. All of the children attend services at the First Baptist church each Sunday.

At the present time there are 113 children who call this place "Home"; two girls being from Hamilton county. There are about 30 applications pending, some of whom must be taken at the earliest possible time.

The finances of the Home are in fine condition, but this does not relieve anyone of us of our duty and our obligation to support this cause of the Master. If thirty-three per cent of our churches and Sunday Schools give fifty-nine per cent of the operating funds, we could double the amount of children we are caring for by doubling the number of Sunday Schools who give regularly to the work. This is a goal worthy of our best efforts. If we are to reap the full benefit of God's promises to us, we must help those in need. Jesus in teaching of the Judgment told of a number of things that the redeemed had done for the people about them, and then He added, "Inasmuch as ye have done it unto one of the least of these my brethren, ye have done it unto me."

Christian helpfulness is embedded in the heart of Christianity, and if we are to be like Him we must render service to His children.

STATE MISSIONS

Florida Baptists have many reasons for rejoicing as we come to the annual meetings of our Associations in this year of 1943,

GIFTS

For the first eight months of 1943—January through August—the total receipts through the State office in Jacksonville amount to \$311,648.02. Of this amount \$164,310.30 was given through the Co-operative Program and goes to the support of every phase of the work of Southern Baptists. The goal for Cooperative Program receipts for the year, as set by the Convention last January, is \$175,000. The gifts for September added to the gifts for the other eight months will put us over our goal with three months remaining. It looks now that our Cooperative receipts for the year will go well beyond the two-hundred thousand dollar mark.

\$24,605.77 has been given through the Hundred Thousand Club and \$122,731.95 to other objects including the gifts by the W. M. U. and other organizations of the churches, of more than fifteen thousand dollars for the Mendoza church building in Argentina. Gifts for all causes in 1943 far exceed those for the same months in 1942.

BAPTISMS

While we have reason for rejoicing that last year we increased the number of baptisms over the preceding year, yet we have too many unsaved and unchurched people in our midst to allow us to slacken our efforts one whit. Last Associational year Florida Baptists reported 8,239 baptisms.

FUTURE PROGRAM

We are glad to report that plans have already been worked out for what will be the largest State Mission program in the history of the Convention. Rev. Dewey Mann, Field Secretary for the State, is assisting the Executive Secretary in an effort to form fields where every quarter-time and half-time church can be so grouped with other churches as to make possible a full-time pastor on the field of these different groups. Some pastors are dividing their time, serving half time as pastor and assisting in the State Board half-time, in carrying out this program and thus helping the smaller churches in the rural sections of the State. In certain sections of the State where there has been a large influx of people, special workers are being employed in an effort to provide religious services for these people. The State Board is cooperating with the Home Mission Board in special work in four of our largest cities; namely, Jacksonville, Miami, Tampa and Pensacola. While the Home Board pays the salary and expenses of a man to work in each of these cities, the State Board has voted to assist this year in the sum of \$7,000.00 to help provide places in which to establish missions in the crowded sections where mission stations are needed.

HOSPITAL

It looks now that the first Baptist Hospital in Florida is certain to be built. The Baptists in Pensacola decided on building such a hospital and called on both the city of Pensacola and the Baptists in the eight Associations west of the Chattahoochee River to raise the money for the buildings. The State Convention volunteered to assist in this worthy undertaking by making a gift of ten thousand dollars when the gifts from other sources reach \$90,000.00.

COOPERATIVE PROGRAM

The method adopted by Southern Baptists for the support of all the work is the "Cooperative Program". This channel makes it both easy and effective

HOME MISSIONS

The romance of Home Missions is the romance that clusters around the toil and struggle and sacrifice of devoted, consecrated, heroic men and women who have labored for a nation's spiritual regeneration.

DEBTS PAID

Occasion for universal rejoicing among Southern Baptists is the fact that for the first time since 1920 the Home Mission Board is out of debt, the final note of the Board's indebtedness being paid on May 12, 1943. When the final \$55,000 note was paid on that date it terminated a struggle against debt for fifteen years during which time the Home Mission Board paid a total of \$2,425,531.91 on debts. Since 1933 the Hundred Thousand Club has furnished \$636,900.21 which was over one-fourth of the total amount of debts paid by the Home Mission Board, the other three-fourths being paid by the Board from Cooperative Program and general denominational receipts.

OVER 400 WORKERS

The Board's report shows a total of 435 workers on all fields. During the year thirteen new missionaries were added, forty-three mission stations opened and six churches constituted.

The missionaries distributed 14.445 Bibles and Testaments and 672.093 tracts. They preached 37.657 sermons, and led 15.928 to profess faith in Christ.

During the year the Board enlarged its work on all fields and also added new departments. Notable among these was the city mission department of which Dr. Solomon F. Dowis is superintendent.

The Board is also planning to create a department for the revitalization of the country church. A program is being worked out which will, when carried into effect throughout the land, re-establish the country church as a potent factor in denominational life.

Total offerings for the year amounted to \$767,371.41. This total included \$333,785.71 from the Co-operative Program, \$224,910.38 from the Annie Armstrong offering, \$112,312.34 from the Hundred Thousand Club, and \$53,068.83 from general designations. The Bottoms Trust Fund yielded an income of \$33,663.05.

FOREIGN MISSIONS

To the Foreign Mission Board 1943 is indeed "the year of liberty" from the bondage of debt. The generosity of Southern Baptists coupled with the Board's competent leadership, wise management, and rigid economy have broken the shackles and, on March 12, 1943, the financial obligation which, ten years before had reached the distressing height of \$1,621,643.56, was removed. It is with humble gratitude that a triumphant Board now faces a challenging future.

While struggling against the bondage of debt, the Foreign Mission Board did not fail to carry on its regular program of service throughout its several mission fields—caring for its 481 active missionaries and its seventy-eight noble workers now on the emeritus list, supporting the work of its churches and hospitals, its schools and publication houses, its evangelists and colporteurs, and attending to the upkeep of its property in its widely scattered mission lands.

RELIEF WORK

Nor has the Board been unmindful of the suffering people in war-stricken countries. Between January 1, 1942 and April 5, 1943, the Baptists of the South have given through the Foreign Mission Board \$887.802.66 to our World Emergnecy Relief Program. This includes \$200,000.00 given to aid the British Baptist

Foreign Mission Board; another \$200,000.00 to Chinese Relief; the sum of \$15,000.00 designated for the purchase of Bibles for Russian prisoners of war in German camps; and \$45,500.00 was sent for European Relief. These and other appropriations have enabled Southern Baptists to experience the joy of sharing with God's needy ones.

OUR GENEROUS ALLIES

Great indeed is the Foreign Mission Board's gratitude to the Woman's Missionary Union of the South who, through their generous co-operation, make possible the realization of many of the hopes and prayers of our consecrated and unselfish missionaries. Outstanding among the gifts from the women is the Lottie Moon Christmas Offering which this year has reached the record-breaking peak of \$558,672.63.

At the April meeting of the Board several new missionaries were appointed to reinforce the work already being done in Latin America.

"The field is the world"; the missionaries are the workers; Southern Baptists are the home base of supplies, supporting by their gifts, their prayers and their personal service the great undertaking of world evangelization.

 $17.\,$ An offering for State Missions was made which amounted to \$35.59.

REPORT ON CO-OPERATIVE PROGRAM

The Co-operative Program is the tried, true, and increasingly successful plan of Southern Baptists for enlisting all our people in the support of all our work.

THE PURPOSE OF THE PROGRAM IS—(1) to include all our denominational work in one comprehensive plan; (2) to enlist all our people in the intelligent, cheerful, systematic, and adequate support of this plan; and (3) to distribute the funds to the several causes in proportion to their relative importance and needs as determined by the denomination itself.

HOW IT WORKS—(1) The individual member contributes through his church for both the local expenses of his church and the causes included in the Co-operative Program. (2) The church treasurer sends the co-operative funds to the state secretary-treasurer. (3) The State secretary-treasurer retains a portion to care for the expenses of his office and divides the balance into two parts: State and Southwide, according to the percentages agreed upon.

Our State divides the co-operative program dollar on the 40-60 basis. Forty percent goes to Southwide causes, 60 percent being kept in the State for State work. The institutions of our State receiving percentages are: Florida Baptist Children's Home, Stetson University, Student Work, Loans to Churches, Support of weak churches, Evangelism, Field Work and other phases of work. Some of the Southwide agencies receiving co-operative funds: Foreign Mission Board, Home Mission Board, Relief and Annuity Board, Seminaries, W. M. U. Training Schools, and the Southern Baptist Hospital.

We, therefore, recommend:

That thorough and systematic study be given to all the causes included in the program of our Lord and to the Bible teaching on the subject of Christian Stewardship.

That all of our Churches adopt the budget plan of finance and in making their budgets see that proper proportions are observed between local expenses and the Co-operative Program.

For about a year and a half, Rev. J. E. Dupree served as our Associational Missionary and Evangelist. He served in this capacity until the first of March, this year. Brother Dupree did an outstanding work visiting the Churches in the Association, conducting Revival Meetings, Bible Conferences, Study Courses, and other work as occasion demanded. Other Pastors of the Association have shown

a willingness all through the year to assist in the work of Evangelism in the various Churches, without a thought of being adequately compensated.

During our associational year 221 additional members united with the various churches in our association.

In spite of all the good work which has been done along the line of Evangelism, the fields are still white unto harvest, and we urge that all Churches make Evangelism their main business throughout this coming year. . . We therefore charge the Ministers of our Association in the words of the beloved Apostle Paul, Watch thou in all things, endure afflictions, do the work of an Evangelist, make full proof of thy ministry." II Timothy 4:5. . . And to the Christians of our Association: May we ever remember the words of the Apostle James . . "Let him know, that he which converteth the sinner from the error of his way shall save a soul from death, and shall hide a multitude of sins." James 5:20.

REPORT ON RELIEF AND ANNUITIES

During the last nine years, Southern Baptists have made great strides in the direction of a worthy and dependable provision for their ministers, missionaries, and all other denominational employees, after they have been rendered incapable of efficiently continued active service, due to advanced age or early physical incapacity.

This report sets forth in an illuminating way, and in well ordered detail, how the vitally important work committed, now twenty-five years ago, to a newly created agency of the Southern Baptist Convention, namely, the Relief and Annuity Board, has been carried steadily on to new heights of worthy achievement, year after year. It is one of the most impressive stories in the annals of Southern Baptists.

At this time when the Relief and Annuity Board is celebrating its Silver Anniversary, it is true that even a casual perusal of the record of its service impresses one with its superlative quality and value.

There are, at this time, 9.172 memberships in Retirement Annuity Plans. The 18 states of the Southern Baptist Convention are all participating in the work of this Board. The total assets are \$6,031,213.80. The percentage of Churches and Pastors in Florida participating in the plan is too small. We urge the Churches and Pastors, which are not participating members, to consider carefully the value of this plan in providing for our Pastors when they become superannuated because of age or disability because of physical breakdowns while yet young men.

REPORT ON CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

Our State Institutions offer to our youth many valuable advantages in preparation for the various fields of service, and we commend our citizens in making such preparations, through the tax system, and because of this fact, we have men and women trained to fill the various positions of our government in a worthy manner, but because of our form of government, we believe in keeping the church and State educational systems separated, and rightly so.

Therefore, the Christian training is left to the Christian people of our Nation, and we are happy to know that we are working at this worthy task, in a limited way. In 1942 we reported 5,367,129 members in the S. B. C. with only 26 schools and colleges, 3 Theological seminaries, and one Training school for women, with a total enrollment of 16,791. We should have at least three times this number enrolled in these Institutions.

Recommendations:

First-That we as members of this Session of the Suwannee Association, urge our members to send their boys and girls to our own Stetson University, where the Christian ideals of our Lord and our Denomination, are taught and practiced, and urge our young ministers and those preparing for special Christian work, to continue their preparation by attending at least one of our Seminaries, and our young women the W. M. U. Training school.

Second-That those who cannot attend these Colleges and Seminaries, attend our Assemblies at DeLand and West Florida and Ridgecrest, also our Associational meetings, and study courses, where we can sit at the feet of those who have had the above advantages, so that we may learn how to carry on our work in the most effective manner possible.

Third-That we also urge our people to take our Baptist paper, send for the many helpful tracts, and purchase good books and supply the home with the kind of literature that will enable us to send out into all the world Christian workers to win the lost to Christ.

REPORT ON BAPTIST HUNDRED THOUSAND CLUB

The Baptist Hundred Thousand Club is still going strong. The receipts of the Club (July 15) are double what they were at this time last year. Every state shows a large increase in Club receipts. We have reduced our Southwide debt more than \$1,000,000 in the last year. Our Foreign Mission Board is entirely out of debt for the first time in forty years. Our Home Mission Board paid the last dollar upon its old \$2,500,000 debt on May 12. The Baptist Bible Institute, one of our three great seminaries, has paid out of debt-paying the last dollar during August. The other seminaries are paying off their debts rapidly, as a result of the fine support being given the Hundred Thousand Club by our Churches. The balance of the old Southwide debt of \$6,500,000 is now less than \$300,000. Since the last reports published on the progress of the Hundred Thousand Club, good news comes that the Southern Baptist Hospital of New Orleans is also debt-free.

The Hundred Thousand Club has paid enough on this debt to pay the salaries of 2,853 foreign missionaries for a year, or a hundred missionaries for twenty-eight years. (Aren't you glad you helped?) If we can keep up the present pace we shall be debt-free in '43.

We, therefore, recommend that every church make a special effort to help reach our goal of a Debtless Denomination in 1943:

By increasing its memberships in the Hundred Thousand Club seeking as a minimum one Club membership for every twenty-five church members.

By making a special cash contribution on Layman's Day, October 17.

Certainly every church and every member ought to want to help his denomination to be Debt-Free in '43.


