ARTICLES OF FAITH

1. OF THE SCRIPTURES

We believe that the Holy Bible was written by men Divinely inspired, and is a perfect treasure of heavenly instruction; that it has God for its Author, salvation for its end, and truth without any mixture of error for its matter; that it reveals the principles by which God will judge us; and therefore is, and shall remain to the end of the world, the true center of Christian union, and the supreme standard by which all human conduct, creeds, and opinions should be tried.

2. OF THE TRUE GOD

We believe that there is One, and only One living and true God, an Infinite, intelligent Spirit, Whose Name is Jehovah, the Maker and Supreme Ruler of Heaven and Earth; inexpressibly glorious in Holiness, and worthy of all possible honor, confidence and love; that in the Unity of the Godhead there are Three Persons, the Father, the Son, and the Holy Ghost; equal in every Divine Perfection, and executing distinct but harmonious Offices in the great work of Redemption.

3. OF THE FALL OF MAN

We believe that Man was created in holiness, under the law of his Maker; but by voluntary transgression fell from that holy and happy state; in consequence of which all Mankind are now sinners, not by constraint but choice; being by nature utterly void of that holiness required by the law of God; positively inclined to evil; and therefore under just condemnation to eternal ruin, without defense or excuse.

4. OF THE WAY OF SALVATION

We believe that the salvation of sinners is wholly of Grace; through the Mediatorial office of the Son of God; Who by the appointment of the Father, freely took upon Him our nature, yet without our sin; honored the Divine law by His Personal obedience, and by His death made a full Atonement for our sins; that having risen from the dead, He is now enthroned in heaven; and uniting in his wonderful Person the tenderest sympathies with Divine Perfections, He is every way qualified to be a suitable, a compassionate, and all-sufficient Saviour.

5. OF JUSTIFICATION

We believe that the great Gospel blessing which Christ secures to such as believe in Him is Justification; that Justification includes the pardon of sin, and the promise of eternal life on principles of righteousness; that it is bestowed, not in consideration of any works of righteousness which we have done, but solely through Faith in the Redeemer's Blood; by virtue of which faith His perfect righteousness is freely imputed to us of God; that it brings us into a state of most blessed peace and favor with God, and secures every other blessing needful for time and eternity.

6. OF THE FREEDOM OF SALVATION

We believe that the blessings of salvation are made free to all by the Gospel; that it is the immediate duty of all to accept them by a cordial penitent and obedient faith; and that nothing prevents the salvation of the greatest sinner on earth, but his own inherent depravity and voluntary rejection of the Gospel; which involves him in an aggravated condemnation.

7. OF GRACE IN REGENERATION

We believe that in order to be saved, sinners must be regenerated, or born again; that regeneration consists in giving a holy disposition to the mind; that it is effected in a manner above our comprehension by the power of the Holy Spirit, in connection with Divine truth, so as to secure our voluntary obedience to the Gospel; and that its proper evidence appears in the holy fruits of repentance, and faith, and newness of life.

8. OF REPENTANCE AND FAITH

We believe that Repentance and Faith are sacred duties, and also inseparable Graces, wrought in our souls by the regenerating Spirit of God; whereby being deeply convinced of our guilt, danger and helplessness, and of the way of salvation by Christ, we turn to God with unfeigned contrition, confession, and supplication for mercy; at the same time heartily receiving the Lord Jesus Christ as our Prophet, Priest and King, and relying on Him alone as the Only and All-sufficient Saviour.

9. OF GOD'S PURPOSE OF GRACE

We believe that Election is the Eternal purpose of God, according to which He graciously regenerates, sanctifies, and saves sinners; that being perfectly consistent with the free agency of man, it comprehends all the means in connection with the end; that it is a most glorious display of God's Sovereign Goodness, being Infinitely free, wise, holy and unchangeable; that it utterly excludes boasting, and promotes humility, love, prayer, praise, trust in God, and active imitation of His free mercy; that it encourages the use of means in the highest degree; that it may be ascertained by its effects in all who truly believe the Gospel; that it is the foundation of Christian assurance; and that to ascertain it with regard to ourselves demands and deserves the utmost diligence.

10. OF SANCTIFICATION

We believe that Sanctification is the process by which, according to the Will of God, we are made partakers of His Holiness; that it is a progressive work; that it is begun in regeneration; and that it is carried on in the hearts of believers by the presence and power of the Holy Spirit, the Sealer and Comforter, in the continual use of the appointed means—especially, the Word of God, self-examination, self-denial, watchfulness and prayer.

11. OF THE PERSEVERANCE OF SAINTS

We believe that such only are real believers as endure unto the end; that their persevering attachment to Christ is the grand mark which distinguishes them from superficial professors; that a special Providence watches over their welfare; and they are kept by the power of God through faith unto salvation.

12. OF THE HARMONY OF THE LAW AND THE GOSPEL

We believe that the Law of God is the eternal and unchangeable rule of His moral government; that it is holy, just, and good; and that the inability which the Scriptures ascribe to fallen men to fulfill its precepts, arises entirely from their love of sin; to deliver them from which, and to restore them through a Mediator to unfeigned obedience to the holy Law, is one great end of the Gospel, and of the Means of Grace connected with the establishment of the visible Church.

13. OF THE GOSPEL CHURCH

We believe that a visible Church of Christ is a Congregation of baptized believers, associated by Covenant in the faith and fellowship of the Gospel; observing the Ordinances of Christ; governed by His Laws; and exercising the gifts, rights, and privileges invested in them by His Word; that its only Scriptural officers are Bishops or Pastors and Deacons, whose qualifications, claims, and duties are defined in the Epistles to Timothy and Titus.

14. OF BAPTISM AND THE LORD'S SUPPER

We believe that Christian baptism is the immersion in water of a believer, into the Name of Father, and Son, and Holy Ghost; to show forth in a solemn and beautiful emblem, our faith in the crucified, buried, and risen Saviour, with its effects, in our death to sin and resurrection to a new life; that it is a pre-requisite to the privileges of a Church relation; and to the Lord's Supper, in which the members of the Church by the sacred use of bread and wine, are to commemorate together the dying love of Christ; preceded always by solemn self-examination.

15. OF THE CHRISTIAN SABBATH

We believe that the first day of the week is the Lord's Day, or Christian Sabbath; and is to be kept sacred to religious purposes, by abstaining from all secular labor and sinful recreations, by the devout observance of all the means of Grace, both private and public; and by preparation for that rest that remaineth for the people of God.

16. OF CIVIL GOVERNMENT

We believe that Civil Government is of Divine appointment, for the interests and good order of human society; and that magistrates are to be prayed for, conscientiously honored, and obeyed; except only in things opposed to the Will of our Lord Jesus Christ, Who is the only Lord of the conscience, and the Prince of the kings of the earth.

17. OF THE RIGHTEOUS AND THE WICKED

We believe that there is a radical and essential difference between the righteous and the wicked; that such only as through faith are justified in the Name of the Lord Jesus, and sanctified by the Spirit of Our God, are truly righteous in His esteem; while all such as continue in impenitence and unbelief are in His sight wicked, and under the curse; and this distinction holds among men both in and after death.

18. OF THE WORLD TO COME

We believe that the end of this world is approaching; that at the Last Day, Christ will descend from heaven, and raise the dead from the grave to final retribution; that a solemn separation will then take place; that the wicked will be adjudged to endless punishment, and the righteous to endless joy; and that this judgment will fix forever the final state of men in heaven or hell, on principles of righteousness.

15

CONSTITUTION

Article 1-Name

This Organization shall be known as the SUWANNEE MIS-SIONARY BAPTIST ASSOCIATION.

Article 2-Purpose

The Purpose of this Association shall be: To furnish a medium of Co-operation for the Churches of the Association in their Divinely commissioned work of Missions, Education, and Benevolences; and to this end we seek to bring into co-operative fellowship the energies of our Churches; and to secure the moral and financial support of our Churches for the Objects and Institutions fostered by the Florida Convention of Baptist Churches, and the Southern Baptist Convention.

Article 3-Churches

The Constituents of this Association shall be Missionary Baptist Churches of regular order, presenting petitionary letters from other Associations in due form; and Churches which may be constituted within the bounds of the Association, presenting proper credentials of organization and Articles of Faith, accompanied by properly accredited Messengers.

Article 4-Messengers

This Association shall be composed of Messengers holding membership in the Churches which constitute the Association; these Messengers having been duly elected by their respective Churches on the following basis: Each Church shall be entitled to Three Messengers without reference to their numerical strength; and one additional Messenger for each Twenty-five members or fraction thereof, after it has attained a membership of Fifty members.

Article 5-Officers

The officers of the Association shall be a Moderator, a Vice-Moderator, a Clerk and Treasurer. The Moderator shall at the beginning of each Annual Session, appoint a Nominating Committee of five to report on the second day of the Annual Meeting, nominees for the offices herein set forth. Following election, the officers shall be installed at the close of the Session to serve until and through the next Annual Session. The offices of Clerk and Treasurer shall be held by the same person.

Article 6-Meetings

- 1. This Association shall meet Annually at such Date, Time and Place as the Association shall have selected at its last Annual Session.
- 2. In addition to the Annual Meeting, there shall be held a Union Meeting each Fifth Sunday; the Time, Place, and Program to be provided for by the Executive Committee.
- 3. In the event of an emergency, the Executive Committee is authorized to make changes in the Time and Place for the Annual Meeting, as will best serve the interests of the Association.

Article 7-Amendments

The Constitution and By-Laws of the Association may be amended at any Annual Meeting of the Association, by a two-thirds majority vote of the Messengers.

BY-LAWS

Section 1-Duties of Officers

- 1. The Duties of the Moderator shall be to preside, preserve order, and appoint all Committees not otherwise provided for in the Constitution and By-Laws.
- 2. The duties of the Vice-Moderator shall be to assist the Moderator; and to preside in the absence of, or at the request of, the Moderator.
- 3. The Clerk shall keep a correct record of the proceedings of the Association; supervise the printing and distribution of the minutes; keep a regular file of the published proceedings of the Association; and deliver same with other material belonging to the office to his successor.

The Clerk shall send to the clerks of the Churches of the Association the Associational Letter Form Blanks thirty days prior to the Annual Meeting; also the material to the Chairmen of the Standing Committees, who are to submit reports of our work at the Annual Session.

The Clerk shall notify after the adjournment of the Association, all Persons, Committees, and Chairmen and Standing Committees, of their elections or appointments of service.

The Clerk shall receive remuneration for his service, the sum to be fixed by the Association at each Annual Meeting; also he shall receive additional funds from the Association for the expenses of his office.

- 4. The Treasurer shall keep a correct record of all Associational Funds received and disbursed by his Office; and shall submit a record of all transactions of his Office to the Association at its Annual Meeting. The Treasurer shall be the Chairman of the Finance Committee.
- 5. The duties of the Executive Committee shall be to transact all business of the Association between its Annual Meetings; and a written report of its work shall be submitted to the association at the Annual Session.

The Moderator and Clerk of the Association shall serve as Chairman and Secretary of the Executive Committee between the Annual Sessions of the Association.

In the event a vacancy occurs in any office of the Association between the Annual Meetings; the Executive Committee is authorized to fill such vacancy for the unexpired term of office; if not otherwise provided for in the Constitution and By-Laws. Section 2—Committees

- 1. The Standing Committees of the Association shall be: 1—Executive Committee; 2—Order of Business; 3—State Missions; 4—Home Missions; 5—Foreign Missions; 6—Religious Literature; 7—Christian Education; 8—Sunday Schools; 9—Baptist Training Union; 10—Woman's Missionary Union; 11—Laymen's Work—Brotherhood; 12—Florida Baptist Children's Home; 13—Ministerial Relief and Annuities; 14—Social Service. Also other Committees as the Association shall deem advisable.
- 2. The Special Committees of the Association shall be: 1—Nominations; 2—Finance; 3—Resolution; 4—Obituaries; 5—Digest of Letters—State of Religion. Also other Committees as the Association shall deem advisable.

SUWANNEE MISSIONARY BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

Section 3-Committees. Appointment Of

- 1. All Standing Committees shall consist of Three Members; who shall be appointed by the Moderator; the Chairman being selected in advance: the others at each Annual Session.
- All Special Committees shall consist of not less than Three nor more than Five Members; who shall be appointed by the Moderator at each Annual Session.
- 3. The Committee on Order of Business shall consist of Three Members, Two of Which shall be the Moderator and the Vice-Moderator. The third shall be appointed by the Moderator at each Annual Meeting.

The Executive Committee of this Association shall be composed of:

- 1. One member from each church elected by the church and reported to the association in the regular church letter each year.
 - 2. The pastor of each and every church in the association.
 - 3. The presiding officer of each associational organization.

The Executive Committee shall meet on the Second Tuesday p. m. of each of the months of December, March, June, and September at a place that may be decided by the committee itself.

The officers of the Executive Committee, together with the presiding officers of the associational organizations, shall constitute a Steering Committee that shall have the power to transact any business of the association that may be necessary during the time between the regular meeting of the Executive Committee; providing, that in the event the association is not organized as indicated above, then the Steering Committee shall be composed of the officers of the Executive Committee and four other such members of the Executive Committee as shall be elected by the Executive Committee.

The Steering Committee shall meet once each month or as often as the Chairman may call it into session.

Section 4-Committees. Duties Of

- 1. The duties of the Standing Committees and the Special Committees, shall be those which are commonly understood, and observed by Baptist Associations and Conventions, as suggested by their names.
- 2. The duties of the Committee on the Order of Business shall be to prepare the Program for each Annual Meeting; and to select the Speakers not otherwise provided for in the Constitution and By-Laws.
 - 3. The duties of the Nominating Committee shall be:

To name the Time and Place for the Annual Meeting.

To name the Preachers and Alternates for the Annual Introductory and Missionary Sermons.

To name the Associational Messengers to the Florida Baptist Convention.

All nominations subject to adoption by the Association.

Section 5

The Association shall have an Introductory and a Missionary Sermon at each Annual Meeting, on the first and second days respectively; the hours for the sermons to be provided for in the Order of Business.

Section 6

The fiscal year of the Association shall begin September first of each year, and end August thirty-first of the following year, both dates inclusive; and all reports to the Association shall conform to these dates.

Section 7

All written reports of Committees shall be limited to a maximum of six hundred words; and the Clerk is authorized if necessary, to diet reports to conform to this word limitation.

Section 8

When a Church fails to send an Annual letter, the Clerk shall use the report of the previous year, with reference only to record of membership of Church and organizations.

Section 9

The Association requests that Church clerks prepare and mail to the Clerk of the Association their Annual Church Letter, ten days before the Annual Meeting.

Section 10

The Parliamentary Law which shall be used by this Association in the government of its business proceedings, shall be Kerfoot's Parliamentary Law.

It is also understood, that this Association shall ever adhere to the Principles and Practices of recognized Baptist Policies in all its Procedures, its Methods and its Word.

- 1. The seventy-fourth annual session of the Suwannee Baptist Association convened with the Rocky Sink Baptist Church, Suwannee County, Florida, Thursday, October 4th, at 10:00 A.M.
- 2. The Moderator, Rev. T. M. Smiley called the meeting to order, $\ensuremath{\mathsf{T}}$
- 3. After singing "Revive Us Again," Rev. I. T. Carter led the devotional, reading Scripture from Psalms 85:1-7. Prayer by Rev. N. R. Stone.
- 4. A motion and second that all messengers present and those to come later, compose this session of the Association.
- A motion and second to adopt tentative order of business as presented.
 - Recognition of visitors.
- 7. New pastors recognized were Revs. C. A. Martin, M. N. Pearson, I. T. Carter, and A. W. Tampling.
- 8. Report of Executive Committee read by the clerk and approved.

The Executive Committee has held regular meetings during the year as specified in the by-laws of the Association.

All routine matters of business were attended to and we submit herewith only recommendations for action by the Association in this session.

3. We recommend the adoption of the Special Bible Conference Report, Rev. T. M. Smiley, Chairman, which calls for the organization and establishment of a permanent Conference somewhere on the Suwannee River.

We also recommend the adoption and use of the eleven point Church Standard, adopted by the Executive Committee, March 13, 1945.

During the year the Committee supervised the collection of produce for the Children's Home, also the Suwannee Baptist Bible Conference and Fifth Sunday Meetings. Offerings taken at the Fifth Sunday Meetings amounted to \$136.12, which has been remitted to the Florida Baptist Convention for the aged Ministers Relief.

The Committee has endorsed three applications to the Florida Baptist State Mission Board for Student aid for some of our Student Ministers. The Committee has assisted in securing aid for the Widow of one of our deceased pastors. Rev. J. E. DuPre, since resigning the pastorate of the Jasper Baptist Church, has, by the committee, been reimpowered to serve as an unpaid Associational Missionary.

STATE MISSIONS

State missions is the work of the Baptists of Florida carrying on the grea-mission and benevolent work of our Lord Jesus Christ.

The promotional departments foster in every way this work of our church program, but there is also much general mission work done.

Such as, assisting pastors with needy churches, making loans to churches that need to be rebuilt, outright gifts are given to churches that must have aid, educational missionary work is carried on among the Negroes and Indians, good will center work is done among our many foreigners, aid is given to Stetson, also to all Baptist hospitals.

The importance of state missions lies in the fact that it is the only agency charged with the responsibility of promoting all of the causes and interests of our whole program.

It is vital to Florida Baptists to co-operate with their state mission because Florida is one of the greatest missionary fields in the United States.

Here we are advantaged by climate and resources, by five different races of people amongest which to work, by a donominational program that challenges the best that is in us, by having a definite need to meet such as one million three hundred and forty thousand people who are unchurched, by Florida Baptists outnumbering all other faiths in the state.

Considering our field let us pledge ourselves unto God for His Glory to $\ensuremath{\text{pray}}$ more, give more, do more for Christ.

HOME MISSIONS

A survey of home mission fields and home mission work reveals that our homeland is not evaluatelized. There is greater need today for missionaries to go to the waste places than ever before. The fields are greater and the needs are more imperative than at any time in our history.

Half of the population of the United States is wholly unreached by any protestant or catholic

There are 25,000,000 unchurched people in the territory of the Southern Baptist Convertion and at least 12,000,000 in Home Mission fields in Cuba, Panama and Central America.

There are tens of thousands of people living in the territory of the Southern Baptist Convention today without a chance. They are cut off by language barriers, by economic conditions, and by the fact that there are no churches anywhere in their reach. The most notable examples of these spiritually neglected groups are the tenant farmers and migrants.

The Home Mission Board will need in its operating mission budget not less than \$1,500,000. If we are going to evangelize the unevangelized in the territory of Home Mission fields we will have to double our Home Mission force and greatly increase our budget for equipment.

In the face of these facts many rural country churches have become depleted and in many instances inactive.

Five thousand Eaptist churches in the country have fewer members than they had ten years ago. Six thousand three hundred had no conversions last year. Three thousand are without pastors, Four thousand gave nothing to missions. Changed conditions due to war has played a major part in bringing about this condition. Let us now set ourselves to readjusting our churches

During the past year the Board added 153 missionaries to its force, opened 82 mission stations, acquired 54 pieces of mission property. During the year the missionaries distributed over 29,000 Bibles, Testaments, and portions of the Scripture. They gave out more than 1,900,000 tracts; they delivered over 53.000 sermons and addresses; they led more than 15.000 people to Christ and received into the fellowship of the churches 11.911 members.

FOREIGN MISSIONS

A war-weary world is hungry for physical and spiritual bread which American christians can supply. Millions have fallen in the terrible conflict or have perished from famine. Other millions are homeless. We are under inescapable obligation, to a greater degree than ever before, to minister to the needy multitudes around the world.

Great old China, with desolation on every hand, will welcome the good news. We shall have unprecedented missionary opportunities in that land of more than four million people. We quote from a recent description of conditions in the Orient: "Children drop by the roadside in China and die of starvation because there is not enough rice to mix with the mud they eat to keep their bellies full. Children wander the highways of India, begging at every orphanage and hospital, waiting before mission stations to see if one more handout of wheat or bowl of soup may come."

Japan needs the Christian message for there is no hope for the land of Shinto or Buddha.

Europe is prostrate on the battlefields. Baptist mission boards in European lands will need our sympathetic reinforcement.

Syria and Palestine have problems that only The Son of God, not Mohammed, can solve.

As a result of this war we have enlarged opportunities and imperative obligations, not only in Nigeria, but in bordering provinces wth the millons who know only pagan deities.

Latin America needs the Living Christ rather than a lifeless crucifix. The Bible is the only Good Neighbor policy that is effective. With restrictions being lifted for the most part against our missionaries let us be true to our God given mission.

Hawaii is one of the most, strategic points on the maps of spiritual strategy.

We no longer can be isolationists because airplanes have made us nearneighbors to all nations. What kind of neighbors shall we be especially to those in desperate need?

Southern Baptists now have approximately 540 active missionaries under appointment, this means, there is only one missionary to every 10,000 Baptists

SUWANNEE MISSIONARY BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

We are averaging a little above fifty cents per capita for foreign missions: Can we call ourselves Missionary when our response in life and money, is so meager and insignificant in comparison with the blessings we have received?

The need for missionaries for critically undermanned mission stations is appalling. The personal secretary Dr. J. W. Marshall has made urgent appeals for preachers, doctors, nurses, teachers, who are needed at once.

According to the financial needs of the Foreign Mission Board we find that our available funds inadequate by several million dollars to meet the minimum needs of a missionay program which is far too small to be worthy of a great constituency such as Southern Baptists.

We suggest that the Commission be placed in the church budget the same as the witness and Sunday school training and teaching literature, in as much as this is the most practical plan for giving Southern Baptists information concerning world missions.

REPORT ON FLORIDA BAPTIST CHILDREN'S HOME

We should evaluate our work among our dependent children. For almost half a century we have been conducting a children's Home as a benevoient and Christian service of our denomination. During this time hundreds of boys and girls have come and gone from our institution. Hundreds went out as substantial citizens and all had Christian training. The work we have done is commendable, but it is time for us to re-think our program of sustenance to the unfortunate children in our state.

The problem of the half orphan is becoming alarmingly acute. The four D's of dependency, which are: desertion, divorce, disease and death; are making many problems for our social and church life. If we are to meet our full obligation in this field of service we must enlarge our program of child caring. We can no longer shift a responsibility so appealing as this by denying the half orphan a home and a chance in life. We shall face up to this condition. Let us do it as Christians.

To meet the new demands brought about by the war and changed social conditions we must enlarge our program of child caring in contacts with the child in his community, and in his family. If he is committed to our Home then we assume full account of his care and training. Easy divorce laws, rapid changes in the attitude of parents toward their children which often ends in desertion and poverty in thousands of homes that will not permit proper medical care, brought many applications to us that we could not contact during the war. Since the war has closed we can offer but one excuse to those who should have a home in our institution and that excuse would be based on a lack of finances to care for the child. Cooperation and prayer will meet the need.

A greater service in Christian social work at the Home must first be preceded by an enlarged institution. The management of our Home has made careful and extended study in this field and is ready to build a modern institution as soon as ample funds are provided. The cottage plan will be followed throughout with due consideration to economy. Each building for children will have its own dining room kitchen, and the number of children in each will be kept to a point that will be fair to the denomination and to the child when we have much of the funds and the chance to build a Home that will equal the best in our country and at the same time provide for more children than we can care for in our present buildings. The buildings we have were adequate and acceptable at the time they were erected, but times have changed, houses have deteriorated and knowledge has increased. We shall cooperate to put into effect a housing program second to none.

The finances at the Home are in good condition. The gifts have been larger but not more universal that, in previous years. If every Sunday School should make a monthly offering to the Home there would be no need for campaigns or drives to re-build, or to take care of the needy applicants who come to us for help. A gift from every church, every month will put us in the front ranks in Christian service to children. Let us urge you to make a contribution each month to our Home.

RECOMMENDATIONS


- Since the co-operative program is the best method for supporting the current work of our denomination, state and Southwide, we recommend that all our agencies and all our people support this plan.



ANNUAL REPORT OF WOMAN'S MISSIONARY UNION

Of the 29 Churches of the Association, only 12 have any W. M. U. Work. We have had reports from all of these Societies during the year, however, some have reported only for one quarter.

Based upon the repots we have had, there have been a total of 62 members of the Societies and Auxiliaries engaged in Community Missions. Sixty others were reported in the Societies and 30 in the Auxiliaries. Total gifts through were reported in the Societies and so in the Auxiliaries.
the Co-operative Program, for the Societies, was \$706,12. To Home Missions, \$183.95. To Foreign Missions, \$113.51. The Auxiliaries reported \$10.76 to Home Missions and \$16.15 to Co-operative Program.

The Societies reported 4 Mission Study Classes and the Auxiliaries 13. These reports cover a period of 9 months from September 1, 1944 through June 30, 1945. The last quarter's reports have not been received from all the Societies, so we are unable to report the full year's work. There have been no new societies organized during the year. It is quite obvious that this report is very much incomplete.

The Mid-Year Meeting was held with the O'Brien Church in April. Guest Speakers were Miss Josephine Jones, Florida W. M. U. Executive Secretary, Mrs. Edwin Harwell, State Vice-President, Supt. and Mrs. T. M. Johns of the Florida Baptist Children's Home, Col. F. N. Bailey, Chairman Board of Trustees, Florida Baptist Children's Home, and the Host Pastor, Rev. W. H. Gray.

Our Annual Meeting was held on Tuesday of last week at the Clayland Baptist Church. Our guest speakers were Miss Elsie Renfroe, Florida W. M. U. Young People's Leader, Miss Irene Chambers, Field Representative for the Home Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention. REPORT ON RELIGIOUS LITERATURE

Dr. Wallace Bassett tells the following incident in the October 1945 issue of "The Teacher":

We usually find out things by reading. How one reads determines how much one knows. A fifteen-year-old girl in another state, some years ago, was operated on for stomach disorders. The physician found in her stomach 1200 metallic objects, including coins, metal washers, chains, safety pins, crucifix, brooches, and bolts. When I read this in the daily press I thought of a similar tragedy of people who will fill their minds with injurous thoughts by reading the wrong things.

Our denomination publishes many periodicals, all of which are of a high type. If we will buy and use the ones that we need we will avoid the tragedy that Dr. Bassett warns about as related above. Our minds will be filled with good thoughts if we will read and ponder over the great truths presented in Christian literature and in the Bible.

The American Bible Society is one of the largest publishers of Bibles. Our denomination is a contributor to the work of the Society. Also, we are the largest user of its products. Figures released by the Society in the past showed that Baptists purchased from the American Bible Society more Bibles than all other denominations combined.

Each Church in our Association should be a contributor to the above named organization, and we recommend that each do something definite along

- 14. The Association was called to order by the Moderator. Rev. T. M. Smiley, with the congregation singing "Blessed Jesus Hold My Hand." Devotional was led by Rev. I. T. Carter, Scripture reading John 6: 32-39. Prayer by Rev. J. E. DuPree.
 - 15. The Minutes of the previous day were read and adopted.
- 16. Report on Ministerial Relief and Annuity, read by Rev. J. E. DuPree. Spoken to by Rev. DuPree, who urged that every Pastor and Church participate in the Annuity Plan. Report adopted.

The Relief and Annuity Board will close its 28th fiscal year on December 31, 1945. During the past seven years its progress has been indeed phenomenal. In this report we deal very briefly first with the work in the Southern Baptist Convention, and secondly with the work in Florida.

In 1938 the Ministerial Retirement Plan was inaugurated in South Carolina. In that year the income of the Board was \$539,000; in 1944 (the latest figures we have) the Board's income exceeded \$2,000,000. In 1939 the excess of income over expenditures was \$180,218 while in 1944 it was approximately \$1,100,000. At the end of the first year of the Board's history, April 30, 1919. the assets of the Board were \$106,000. At the end of 1944 they were approximately \$7,842,000. During this same period, the Board has paid in benefits over \$7,000,000.

The number of Florida participating beneficiaries in the various relief plans of the Board on December 31, 1944 was 138. Amount received annually by these beneficiaries was \$36,944.34. The number of Retirement certificates issued in Florida to the above date 416. Churches cooperating, 444. There were 39 annuitants receiving total benefits of \$16,860.40.

The financial condition of the Board is thoroughly sound, and should command the confidence and support of all our Baptist people.

- The Report on Social Service was read by S. C. Kierce, spoken to by Rev. T. M. Smiley. Report adopted.

Your committee wishes to reiterate the position accepted so widely these days that the Christian Church, collectively and individually, must share heavily in the establishment of a righteous world order.

We have just come to the end of the most colossal war in the history of mankind. Millions have been killed; it has also left millions of widows and orphans. We need to concentrate our attention upon the discovery of a basis for a just and enduring peace. The whole social structure of the world has been multilated, and, in many respects broken and left as an open wound as a result of this global war.

Race Relations

We deplore the presence of race prejudice among our people. We emphasize the essential unity of the race, as proclaimed by the Apostle Paul, that "God hath made of one blood all nations of men to dwell upon the face of the earth". It is inconsistent for us to boast that we have been fighting for democracy throughout the world, when we are denying fundamental rights to the negro within our own borders.

Juvenile Delinquency

Moral delinquency among the people—both young and old—during the years of the war, has shown an alarming increase. Juvenile delinquency has risen in Jacksonville 37 percent during the last two years. Judge Criswell says that in nine out of ten cases coming before the Juvenile Court of the City, liquor is a factor. Two-thirds of the youth crime and delinquency can be traced to beer parlors, taverns and the famous "Jook-Joints". Approximately 30

percent of illegitimate births in the country result from acquaintances formed in these places.

Liquor and Gambling

These two evils have become colossal monstrosities throughout our country. Race track gambling, slot machines and other gambling devices have become as common in our State as the sunshine and flowers. The old style bar-room where drunkenness and immorality is born and practiced—infest our cities and towns in such large numbers that decent people can hardly park the family car on the streets without stopping in front of one of these dives of vice and crime. In the city of Live Oak, there are six saloons in two blocks of the down-town section, and, as this report is being prepared another one in this section is being established. Almost, without exception, boys and girls on their way to Sunday School must pass by one of these places from which the Sunday morning air is filled with the most obnoxious odors, and swarms of filthy flies are on the sidewalks consuming the nausea left there by the drunks of the night before.

We deplore the recent blasphemous effort of the liquor forces of Live Oak, in trying to force a negro Baptist Church to move its Church, so that two barrooms could be licensed to do business in that respective negiborhood. Underhanded political manouvering on the City Council, bribery of State officials, and threats and offers of large sums of money are some of the methods used by the liquor crowd to effect this act of infamy against this Church.

We call upon the Churches of the Suwannee Baptist Association to rise up and give full cooperation in a move to stamp out and crush these raging evils of our Association.

RECOMMENDATION:

We recommend the election of a standing committee to prosecute a plan to promote an election to banish the liquor evil from our Association.
