#### CHURCH COVENANT

"Having been led, as we believe, by the Spirit of God, to receive the Lord Jesus Christ as our Saviour, and on the profession of our faith, having been baptised in the name of the Father. And of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost, we do now in the presence of God, angels, and this assembly, most solemnly and joyfully enter into Covenant with one another, as one body in Christ.'

"We engage therefore, by the aid of the Holy Spirit, to walk together in Christian love; to strive for the advancement of this Church in Knowledge, holiness, and comfort; to promote its prosperity and spirituality, to sustain its worship, ordinances, discipline, and doctrines; to contribute cheerfully and regularly to the support of the ministry, the expenses of the Church, the relief of the poor, and the spread of the gospel through all nations."

"We also engage to maintain family and secrete devotion; to religiously educate our children; to seek the salvation of our kindred and acquaintances; to walk circumspectly in the world; to be just in our dealings, faithful in our engagements, and exemplary in our deportment; to avoid all tattling, backbiting, and excessive anger. To abstain from the sale and use of intoxicating drinks and beverages, and to be zealous in our efforts to advance the kingdom of our Saviour."

"We further engage to watch over one another in brotherly love; to remember each other in prayer, to aid each other in sickness and distress; to cultivate Christian sympathy in feeling and courtery in speech; to be slow to take offense, but always ready for reconciliation, and mindful of the rules of our Saviour to secure it without delay."

"We moreover engage that when we move from this place, we will as soon as possible unite with some other church, where we can carry out the Spirit of this covenant and the principles of God's Word."

# ARTICLES OF FAITH

#### 1. OF THE SCRIPTURES

We believe that the Holy Bible was written by men Divinely inspired, and is a perfect treasure of heavenly instruction; that it has God for its Author, salvation for its end, and truth without any mixture of error for its matter; that it reveals the principles by which God will judge us; and therefore is, and shall remain to the end of the world, the true center of Christian union, and the supreme standard by which all human conduct, creeds, and opinions should be tried.

#### 2. OF THE TRUE GOD

We believe that there is One, and only One living and true God, an Infinite, intelligent Spirit, Whose Name is Jehovah, the Maker and Supreme Ruler of Heaven and Earth; inexpressibly glorious in Holiness, and worthy of all possible honor, confidence and love; that in the Unity of the Godhead there are Three Persons, the Father, the Son, and the Holy Ghost; equal in every Divine Perfection, and executing distinct but harmonious Offices in the great work of Redemption.

#### 3. OF THE FALL OF MAN

We believe that Man was created in holiness, under the law of his Maker; but by voluntary transgression fell from that holy and happy state; in consequence of which all Mankind are now sinners, not by constraint but choice; being by nature utterly void of that holiness required by the law of God; positively inclined to evil; and therefore under just condemnation to eternal ruin, without defense or excuse.

#### 4. OF THE WAY OF SALVATION

We believe that the salvation of sinners is wholly of Grace; through the Mediatorial office of the Son of God; Who by the appointment of the Father, freely took upon Him our nature, yet without our sin; honored the Divine law by His Personal obedience, and by His death made a full Atonement for our sins; that having risen from the dead, He is now enthroned in heaven; and uniting in his wonderful Person the tenderest sympathies with Divine Perfections, He is every way qualified to be a suitable, a compassionate, and all-sufficient Saviour.

#### 5. OF JUSTIFICATION

We believe that the great Gospel blessing which Christ secures to such as believe in Him is Justification; that Justification includes the pardon of sin, and the promise of eternal life on principles of righteousness; that it is bestowed, not in consideration of any works of righteousness which we have done, but solely through Faith in the Redeemer's Blood; by virtue of which faith His perfect righteousness is freely imputed to us of God; that it brings us into a state of most blessed peace and favor with God, and secures every other blessing needful for time and eternity.

# 6. OF THE FREEDOM OF SALVATION

We believe that the blessings of salvation are made free to all by the Gospel; that it is the immediate duty of all to accept them by a cordial penitent and obedient faith; and that nothing prevents the salvation of the greatest sinner on earth, but his own inherent depravity and voluntary rejection of the Gospel; which involves him in an aggravated condemnation.

# 7. OF GRACE IN REGENERATION

We believe that in order to be saved, sinners must be regenerated, or born again; that regeneration consists in giving a holy disposition to the mind; that it is effected in a manner above our comprehension by the power of the Holy Spirit, in connection with Divine truth, so as to secure our voluntary obedience to the Gospel; and that its proper evidence appears in the holy fruits of repentance, and faith, and newness of life.

#### 8. OF REPENTANCE AND FAITH

We believe that Repentance and Faith are sacred duties, and also inseparable Graces, wrought in our souls by the regenerating Spirit of God; whereby being deeply convinced of our guilt, danger and helplessness, and of the way of salvation by Christ, we turn to God with unfeigned contrition, confession, and supplication for mercy; at the same time heartily receiving the Lord Jesus Christ as our Prophet, Priest and King, and relying on Him alone as the Only and All-sufficient Saviour.

#### 9. OF GOD'S PURPOSE OF GRACE

We believe that Election is the Eternal purpose of God, according to which He graciously regenerates, sanctifies, and saves sinners; that being perfectly consistent with the free agency of man, it comprehends all the means in connection with the end; that it is a most glorious display of God's Sovereign Goodness, being Infinitely free, wise, holy and unchangeable; that it utterly excludes boasting, and promotes humility, love, prayer, praise, trust in God, and active imitation of His free mercy; that it encourages the use of means in the highest degree; that it may be ascertained by its effects in all who truly believe the Gospel; that it is the foundation of Christian assurance; and that to ascertain it with regard to ourselves demands and deserves the utmost diligence.

#### 10. OF SANCTIFICATION

We believe that Sanctification is the process by which, according to the Will of God, we are made partakers of His Holiness; that it is a progressive work; that it is begun in regeneration; and that it is carried on in the hearts of believers by the presence and power of the Holy Spirit, the Sealer and Comforter, in the continual use of the appointed means—especially, the Word of God, self-examination, self-denial, watchfulness and prayer.

# 11. OF THE PERSEVERANCE OF SAINTS

We believe that such only are real believers as endure unto the end; that their persevering attachment to Christ is the grand mark which distinguishes them from superficial professors; that a special Providence watches over their welfare; and they are kept by the power of God through faith unto salvation.

# 12. OF THE HARMONY OF THE LAW AND THE GOSPEL

We believe that the Law of God is the eternal and unchangeable rule of His moral government; that it is holy, just, and good; and that the inability which the Scriptures ascribe to fallen men to fulfill its precepts, arises entirely from their love of sin; to deliver them from which, and to restore them through a Mediator to unfeigned obedience to the holy Law, is one great end of the Gospel, and of the Means of Grace connected with the establishment of the visible Church.

# 13. OF THE GOSPEL CHURCH

We believe that a visible Church of Christ is a Congregation of baptized believers, associated by Covenant in the faith and fellowship of the Gospel; observing the Ordinances of Christ; governed by His Laws; and exercising the gifts, rights, and privileges invested in them by His Word; that its only Scriptural officers are Bishops or Pastors and Deacons, whose qualifications, claims, and duties are defined in the Epistles to Timothy and Titus.

# OF BAPTISM AND THE LORD'S SUPPER

We believe that Christian baptism is the immersion in water of a believer, into the Name of Father, and Son, and Holy Ghost; to show forth in a solemn and beautiful emblem, our faith in the crucified, buried, and risen Saviour, with its effects, in our death to sin and resurrection to a new life; that it is a pre-requisite to the privileges of a Church relation; and to the Lord's Supper, in which the members of the Church by the sacred use of bread and wine, are to commemorate together the dying love of Christ; preceded always by solemn self-examination.

#### 15. OF THE CHRISTIAN SABBATH

We believe that the first day of the week is the Lord's Day, or Christian Sabbath; and is to be kept sacred to religious purposes, by abstaining from all secular labor and sinful recreations, by the devout observance of all the means of Grace, both private and public; and by preparation for that rest that remaineth for the people of God.

#### 16. OF CIVIL GOVERNMENT

We believe that Civil Government is of Divine appointment, for the interests and good order of human society; and that magistrates are to be prayed for, conscientiously honored, and obeyed; except only in things opposed to the Will of our Lord Jesus Christ, Who is the only Lord of the conscience, and the Prince of the kings of the earth.

#### 17. OF THE RIGHTEOUS AND THE WICKED

We believe that there is a radical and essential difference between the righteous and the wicked; that such only as through faith are justified in the Name of the Lord Jesus, and sanctified by the Spirit of Our God, are truly righteous in His esteem; while all such as continue in impenitence and unbelief are in His sight wicked, and under the curse; and this distinction holds among men both in and after death.

#### 18. OF THE WORLD TO COME

We believe that the end of this world is approaching; that at the Last Day, Christ will descend from heaven, and raise the dead from the grave to final retribution; that a solemn separation will then take place; that the wicked will be adjudged to endless punishment, and the righteous to endless joy; and that this judgment will fix forever the final state of men in heaven or hell, on principles of righteousness.

# CONSTITUTION

#### Article 1-Name

This Organization shall be known as the SUWANNEE MIS-SIONARY BAPTIST ASSOCIATION.

#### Article 2—Purpose

The Purpose of this Association shall be: To furnish a medium of Co-operation for the Churches of the Association in their Divinely commissioned work of Missions, Education, and Benevolences; and to this end we seek to bring into co-operative fellowship the energies of our Churches; and to secure the moral and financial support of our Churches for the Objects and Institutions fostered by the Florida Baptist Convention, and the Southern Baptist Convention.

#### Article 3—Churches

The Constituents of this Association shall be Missionary Baptist Churches of regular order, presenting petitionary letters from other Associations in due form; and Churches which may be constituted within the bounds of the Association, presenting proper credentials of organization and Articles of Faith, accompanied by properly accredited Messengers.

#### Article 4—Messengers

This Association shall be composed of Messengers holding membership in the Churches which constitute the Association; these Messengers having been duly elected by their respective Churchs on the following basis: Each Church shall be entitled to Three Messengers without reference to their numerical strength: and one additional Messenger for each Twenty-five members or fraction thereof, after it has attained a membership of Fifty members.

#### Article 5-Officers

The officers of this Association shall be a Moderator, a Vice-Moderator, a Clerk and Treasurer; who shall be elected annually on the second day of each Annual meeting of the Association. The Moderator and Vice-Moderator shall serve from the close of one Annual Session to the close of the next Annual Session. The Clerk and Treasurer, however, shall take office sixty days from the close of the Annual Session and serve until sixty days after the close of the next Annual Session. The offices of Clerk and Treasurer shall be held by the same person and no person shall be elected Moderator for more than two consecutive years.

#### Article 6-Meetings

- 1. This Association shall meet Annually at such Date, Time and Place as the Association shall have selected at its last Annual Session.
- 2. In addition to the Annual Meeting, there shall be held an Inspirational Meeting each Fifth Sunday; the Time, Place, and Program to be provided for by the Executive Committee.
- 3. In the event of an emergency, the Executive Committee is authorized to make changes in the Time and Place for the Annual Meeting, as will best serve the interests of the Association.

#### Article 7—Amendments

The Constitution and By-Laws of the Association may be amended at any Annual Meeting of the Association, by a two-thirds majority vote of the Messengers.

# RY-LAWS

# Section 1-Duties of Officers

- 1. The Duties of the Moderator shall be to preside, preserve order, and appoint all Committees not otherwise provided for in the Constitution and By-Laws.
- 2. The duties of the Vice-Moderator shall be to assist the Moderator; and to preside in the absence of, or at the request of the Moderator.
- 3. The Clerk shall keep a correct record of the proceedings of the Association; supervise the printing and distribution of the minutes; keep a regular file of the published proceedings of the Association; and deliver same with other material belonging to the office to his successor.

The Clerk shall send to the clerks of the Churches of the Association the Associational Letter Form Blanks thirty days prior to the Annual Meeting; also the material to the chairmen of the Standing Committees, who are to submit reports of our work at the Annual Session.

The Clerk shall notify after the adjournment of the Association, all Persons, Committees, and Chairmen and Standing Committees, of their elections or appointments of service.

The Clerk shall receive remuneration for his service, the sum to be fixed by the Association at each Annual Meeting; also he shall receive additional funds from the Association for the expenses of his office.

- 4. The Treasurer shall keep a correct record of all Associational Funds received and disbursed by his office and shall submit a record of all transactions of his office to the Executive Meeting at their quarterly meeting and to the Association at its Annual Meeting. The Treasurer shall be the Chairman of the Finance Committee.
- 5. The duties of the Executive Committee shall be to transact all business of the Association between its Annual Meetings; and a written report of its work shall be submitted to the association at the Annual Session.

The Moderator, Vice-Moderator, and Clerk of the Association shall serve as Chairman, Vice-Chairman and Secretary of the Executive Committee between the Annual Sessions of the Association.

In the event a vacancy occurs in any office of the Association between the Annual Meetings; the Executive Committee is authorized to fill such vacancy for the unexpired term of office; if not otherwise provided for in the Constitution and By-Laws.

#### Section 2—Committees

1. The Standing Committees of the Association shall be: 1—Executive Committee; 2—Order of Business; 3—Missions; 4—Religious Literature; 5—Christian Education; 6—Florida Baptist Children's Home; 7—Ministerial Relief and Annuities; 3—Social Service; 9—Bible Conference; 10—Evangelism; 11—Music. Also other Committees as the Association shall deem advisable.

2. The Special Committees of the Association shall be: 1—Nominations; 2—Finance; 3—Resolutions; 4—Obituaries; 5—Digest of Letters—State of Religion. Also other Committees as the Association shall deem advisable.

#### Section 3-Committees. Appointment of

- 1. All Standing Committees shall consist of Three Members: who shall be appointed by the Moderator; the Chairman being selected in advance; the others at each Annual Session.
- 2. All Special Committees shall consist of not less than Three nor more than Five Members; who shall be appointed by the Moderator.
- 3. The Committee on Order of Business shall consist of the Moderator, Vice-Moderator, and Clerk.
- 4. The Executive Committee of this Association shall be composed of:
- One member from each church elected by the church and reported to the association in the regular church letter each year.
  - 2. The pastor of each and every church in the association.
  - 3. The presiding officer of each associational organization.

The Executive Committee shall meet quarterly, at a time and place that may be decided by the committee itself.

The officers of the Executive Committee, together with the presiding officers of the associational organizations, shall constitute a Steering Committee that shall have the power to transact any business of the association that may be necessary during the time between the regular meeting of the Executive Committee; providing, that in the event the association it not organized as indicated above, then the Steering Committee shall be composed of the officers of the Executive Committee and four other such members of the Executive Committee as shall be elected by the Executive Committee.

The Steering Committee shall meet once each month or as often as the Chairman may call it into session.

#### Section 4—Committees. Duties Of

- 1. The duties of the Standing Committees and the Special Committees, shall be those which are commonly understood, and observed by Baptist Associations and Conventions, as suggested by their names.
- 2. The duties of the Committee on the Order of Business shall be to prepare the Program for each Annual Meeting; and to select the Speakers not otherwise provided for in the Constitution and By-Laws.
  - 3. The duties of the Nominating Committee shall be:

To name the Time and Place for the Annual Meeting.

To name the Preachers and Alternates for the Annual Introductory and Missionary Sermons.

All nominations subject to adoption by the Association.

#### Section 5

The Association shall have an Introductory and a Missionary Sermon at each Annual Meeting, on the first and second days respectively; the hours for the sermons to be provided for in the order of Business.

#### Section 6

The fiscal year of the Association shall begin October first of each year, and end September thirty of the following year, both dates inclusive; and all reports to the Association shall conform to these dates.

#### Section 7

All written reports of Committees shall be limited to a maximum of six hundred words; and the Clerk is authorized if necessary, to edit reports to conform to this word limitation.

#### Sectin 8

When a Church fails to send an Annual letter, the Clerk shall use the report of the previous year, with reference only to record of membership of Church and organizations.

#### Section 9

The Clerks of the Churches are requested to get their letter to the Associational Clerk as early as possible.

#### Section 10

The Parliamentary Law which shall be used by this Association in the government of its business proceedings, shall be Kerfoot's Parliamentary Law.

It is also understood, that this Association shall ever adhere to the Principles and Practices of recognized Baptist Policies in all its Proceedings, its Methods and its Word.

9. Rev. Marshall G. Mines, Live Oak, presented the report on Christian Education, which was adopted as follows:

#### CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

Our one Baptist college in Florida is John B. Stetson University, located at Deland. With 2615 enrolled last year, there were 118 ministerial students and an equal number preparing for full time Christian service. This fiscal year Stetson paid out \$1,348,297.30 in operating expenses with the Florida Baptist Convention contributing \$43,332.35 of this amount. Tuition assistance was granted to some 300 students at a cost of \$62,917.29 and work was provided for 223 students or their wives at an expense of \$47,176.27.

The Department of Bible is making a great impact on the spiritual life on the campus and through the work of the Baptist Student Union in vespers,. prayer groups and the ministerial association, the Spirit of Christ is being felt more and more among the students. Let us pray for the continued increase of this Christian zeal.

It is recommended (1) that every church observe Stetson week, January 22-29, 1950; (2) that we urge our people to visit the Stetson Campus at Deland: (3) that we send our sons and daughters to Stetson; and (4) that we place Stetson in our wills.

Southern Baptists own and operate the finest Religious Schools in the world. The Southern Baptist Theological Seminary in Louisville, Kentucky; the Southwest Baptist Theological Seminary in Fort Worth, Texas; the New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary in New Orleans, Louisiana, and the W. M. U. Training School in Louisville, Kentucky. Each of these schools provides for our

ministers and missionaries the best education available anywhere. Each is growing by leaps and bounds. Each has great need for new buildings, broader facilities and more money. It is recommended that we remember these schools in our prayers, that we support them with gifts to the cooperative program and that we commend them to our ministers and workers.

Education is more than schooling and one of the strongest forces in Christian education is the printed page. Through the distribution of Christian reading materials every individual Baptist may have a part in promoting the cause of Christian education. Let us do all that we can to put down unchristian literature. Let us do more than our best to increase the use of our own Baptist publications. Southern Baptists must not hesitate in their stride toward the Christianization of education and the education of Christians.

#### REPORT OF FLORIDA BAPTIST CHILDREN'S HOME

Our Children's Home is now located at Lakeland, Florida. With most of the buildings completed, we have one of the most beautiful Homes in the South. Our new buildings provide the children with the most home-like atmosphere in the history of the home. Each room is built to accommodate two or not more than three children, which experience has proven is the most ideal for the children.

The children attend the Baptist Churches of Lakeland and the public school of Polk County.

Twenty-one of our churches gave \$739.61 worth of produce, \$179.25 worth of clothing, and \$268.43 in cash, or a total of \$1,187.29 to our home last March. The only regretable part of this is that only two-thirds of our churches had a part in it.

We recommend that next March 6th be designated as Children's Home Day in our Association and that each and every church be urged to make a gift of produce on that day.

17. Rev. W. T. Newsome, Mt. Olive, presented the Report on Cooperative Program and moved its adoption. Rev. Clifford Walker, Superintendent, Cooperative Missions, Florida Baptist Convention, was introduced and gave an address on the Cooperative Program. Report was adopted as follows:

#### REPORT ON COOPERATIVE PROGRAM

Jesus had a program which was worldwide and age-long (Matt. 4:11; Luke 4:17-21). Jesus commanded his followers to promote this program and assured them of his presence (Matt. 28:18-20). His program was a real cooperative program.

Southern Baptists' program is based upon the program of Jesus. Our program seeks to carry out His plan. His program has become our program. This program must be promoted for His sake, and for the sake of a lost world.

The Cooperative Program is our plan by which we finance, foster and carry on the mission work of Southern Baptists. The Cooperative Program is our Missions Budget. There is not one item in this program that any loyal Baptist would object to if he thoroughly understood it. We must lovingly, ratiently, consecratedly present our Cooperative Program that our people may understand and be constrained to give.

This is the way each Cooperative Program dollar is divided:

50c of the dollar stays in Florida for State Misson work. 16 per cent of this 50c is sent to the Baptist Children's Home at Lakeland. 14 per cent is sent to John B. Stetson University. 2 per cent of the 50c is used for Ministerial Education, helping young men in Stetson University prepare for the ministry. The other 68 per cent of this 50c is used for State Mission work which includes Sunday School work, Training Union work, Baptist Student Union, Cooperative Missions (which includes City Missions, Rural Missions, Evangelism and Stewardship) Music and Brotherhood work, and some 20 other items of Missions, Education and Benevolence here in our own beautiful Florida.

The other 50c of this dollar is sent to the Executive Committee of the Southern Baptist Convention in Nashville, Tennessee, for missions around the world.

We respectively recommend that each pastor present to his church the full facts about our Baptist Cooperative Program, and urge the church to support World Missions through this medium.



#### REPORT ON MISSION RALLIES

During the week from January 30 to February 4, 1949, Suwannee Association sponsored 34 single service mission rallies. One was held in each of our 31 churches and one each in the Smiley Chapel, the Magnolia Church (Lafayette Association) and the Wellborn Church (Beulah Association). In addition to the rallies, Missionary messages were delivered in the Jasper High School, the White Springs School and the Live Oak Rotary Club. The Missionaries who spoke were Rev. and Mrs. C. A. Leonard and Miss Violet Long of the Foreign Mission Board and Miss Vena Augillard and Miss Bertha Wallis of the Home Mission Board. A total of 2,289 persons attended the meeting and \$448.17 was received in mission contributions. Every church gave an offering through the Cooperative Program. Subscriptions received were 60 for the Commission and 88 to Home Missions.

We are grateful that our State Mission office has arranged for similiar mission rallies again this year. In keeping with their itinerary, it is suggested that the Branford, Philadelphia, O'Brien, Union, Mt. Pisgah, Pinemount, Beulah and Orange Churches be asked to have Mission Rallies on Friday night, March 24, 1950 and that the Bright Pond, Clayland, Cornith, Divonia, Friendship, Hamilton, Suwannee, Jasper, Jennings, Live Oak, Luraville, Mary Belic, Mt. Gilead, Mt. Olive, New Hope, Pine Level Pleasant Hill, Rocky Sink, Rosemary, Shady Grove, Suwannee, Tiger Lake and Westwood Churches be asked to have Mission Rallies on Sunday morning, March 26, 1950. The churches are not asked to pay any of the expense of the tour but it is requested that each missionary have the privilege of taking an offering for the cooperative program, every cent of which will be created to the church.

#### BROTHERHOOD REPORT

The Baptist Brotherhood is the fastest growing organization in Baptist life. This statement is based on statistics gathered and published by Porter Routh, statistician of the Southern Baptist Convention. On a convention-wide basis, in the past two years the number of Brotherhoods has more than doubled and the number of men enrolled is up about 125%.

In Florida, the work has kept pace. In the last twelve months there have been nearly one hundred new Brotherhoods set up and the total enrollment as shown by the churches this fall is expected to be increased by about 50% in this one year alone.

In our own Association, we have at the present time eight Brotherhood organizations with approximately 317 men enrolled. This is a gain of one organization and a gain of 51 in enrollment.

#### REPORT OF THE RELIEF AND ANNUITY BOARD

The reports reviewing the work of the Relief and Annuity Board presented to the Board in its annual meeting in Dallas on March 9 clarly showed 1948 to be a year of splendid achievement in service rendered and in increased assets.

The total income for 1948 was \$3,888,740.40, with total benefits paid amounting to \$1,292,841.84. Total assets of the Board as of December 31, 1948, were \$15,094,093.60.

There were 2,297 new certificates issued in all the plans of the Board, 774 of them being in the Ministers Retirement Plan.

The Widows Supplemental Annuity Plan is now in force in all the states of the Southern Baptist Convention with the exception of Tennessee.

There is much need for greater promotion in all of the states. As yet, there are too many pastors and lay workers who do not have the protection the Board offers. Every person gainfully employed in denominational work, whether pastor, missionary, employee of state or southwide board, institution, or agency, and every lay worker such as educational director, church secretary, janitor, etc., should be enrolled in one of the plans fostered by the Board, that when retirement age is reached or ill health impairs there may be some income provided by membership in one of the plans.

We would urge every church in the association to follow the Calendar of Denominational Activities of the Southern Baptist Convention and take a fellowship offering, preferably at the observance of the Lord's Supper, or at such time as convenient for the church. Unless this is done no increases can be granted in 1949 and few new names can be added to the roll.

38. Mr. J. Q. Boatright presented the Report on Social Service. Report spoken to by J. Q. Boatright, Rev. W. H. Gray and Rev. M. G. Mines. Report adopted as follows:

# REPORT ON SOCIAL SERVICE

We note with deep concern the increase in the amount being spent by the American people for alcoholic beverages, the amount for 1948 being \$9,-640,000— an amount equal to nine dollars for every minute since Jesus was born in Bethlehem. Converted into silver dollars and laid flat on the ground edge to edge, this amount would make a line 228,000 miles in length, or more than nine times around the globe. We also note with alarm the fact that Florida has practically doubled its per capita consumption of alcoholic beverages during the past few years, and that for 1946-47, our capita consumption of hard liquor was 2.26 gailons, while the national average was 1.58 gallons.

We report with regret that House Bill No. 583, making the Sunday Law apply to beer saloons and House Bill No. 596 making the 2,500 feet law apply to beer saloons, outside incorporated towns and cities, were reported unfavorable by the House Committee on Business Regulations, to which they were referred. No one in or out of the Legislature gave one valid reason why beer soloons should be exempted from the operation of the Sunday Law and the 2500 foot law.

During the past year there has been four local option elections held in the state. Wakulla and Hamilton counties voted to stay dry Highlands County, dry throughout its entire history, voted wet. DeSoto County voted to stay wet on April 26, 1949.

With our counties now numbered with the Drys, we feel that there is a definite decrease in drunkenness and all crimes to which liquor is a contributing factor. We commend the law and enforcement officers in Hamilton and Suwannee counties for their efforts in enforcing the laws of our counties. However, we feel there is a definite need for an active "Good Citizenship League" in each County.

CONSTITUTION

ARTICLE 2. PURPOSE

The Purpose of this Association shall be: To furnish a medium of Cooperation for the Churches of the Association in their Divinely commissioned work of Missions, Education and Benevolences; and to this end two seek to bring into co-operative fellowship the energies of our Churches; and to secure the moral and financial support of our Churches for the Objects and Institutions fostered by the Florida Baptist Convention, and the Southern Baptist Convention.

ARTICLE 5. OFFICERS

The officers of this association shall be a Moderator, Vice-Moderator, A Clerk and Treasurer; who shall be elected annually on the second day of each annual meeting of the Association. The Moderator and Vice-Moderator shall serve from the close of one Annual Session to the close of the next Annual Session. The Clerk and Treasurer, however, shall take office sixty days from

the close of the Annual Session and serve until sixty days after the close of the next Annual Session. The offices of the Clerk and Treasurer shall be held by the same person and no person shall be elected Moderator for more than two consecutive years.

BY-LAWS

SECTION 1.

- 4. The Treasurer shall keep a correct record of all Associational Funds received and disbursed by his Office; and shall submit a record of all transactions of his office to the Association at its Annual Meeting, and to the Executive Meeting at their quarterly meeting. The Treasurer shall be the Chairman of the Finance Committee.
- 5b The Moderator, Vice-Moderator, and Clerk of the Association shall serve as Chairman, Vice-Chairman and Secretary of the Executive Committee between the Annual Sessions of the Association.

#### SECTION II

1. The Standing Committees of the Association shall be: 1—Executive Committee; 2—Order of Business; 3—Missions; 4—Religious Literature; 5—Christian Education; 6—Florida Baptist Children's Home; 7—Ministerial Relief and Annuities; 8—Social Service; 9—Bible Conference; 10—Evangelism; 11—Music Also other Committees as the Association shall deem adviseable.

#### SECTION III

- All Special Committees shall consist of not less than Three nor more than Five Members; who shall be appointed by the Moderator.
- 3 The Committee on Order of Business shall consist of the Moderator, Vice-Moderator, and Clerk.
- 3b The Executive Committee shall meet quarterly, at a time and place that may be decided by the committee itself.

The Clerks of the Churches are requested to get their letters to the Associational Clerk as early as possible.
