Church Covenant

"Having been led, as we believe, by the Spirit of God to receive the Lord Jesus Christ as our Saviour, and on the profession of our faith, having been baptised in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost, we do now in the presence of God, angels, and this assembly, most solemnly and joyfully enter into Covenant with one another, as one body in Christ."

"We engage therefore, by the aid of the Holy Spirit, to walk together in Christian love; to strive for the advancement of this Church in Knowledge, holiness, and comfort; to promote its prosperity and spirituality, to sustain its worship, ordinances, discipline, and doctrines; to contribute cheerfully and regularly to the support of the ministry, the expenses of the Church, the relief of the poor, and the spread of the gospel through all nations."

"We also engage to maintain family and secret devotion; to religiously educate our children; to seek the salvation of our kindred and acquaintances; to walk circumspectly in the world; to be just in our dealings, faithful in our engagements, and exemplary in our deportment; to avoid all tattling, backbiting, and excessive anger. To abstain from the sale and use of intoxicating drinks and beverages, and to be zealous in our efforts to advance the kingdom of our Saviour."

"We further engage to watch over one another in brotherly love; to remember each other in prayer, to aid each other in sickness and distress; to cultivate Christian sympathy in feeling and courtesy in speech; to be slow to take offense, but always ready for reconciliation, and mindful of the rules of our Saviour to secure it without delay."

"We moreover engage that when we move from this place, we will as soon as possible unite with some other church, where we can carry out the Spirit of this Covenant and the principles of God's Word."

ARTICLES OF FAITH

1. OF THE SCRIPTURES

We believe that the Holy Bible was written by men Divinely inspired, and a perfect treasure of heavenly instruction; that it has God for its Author, salvation for its end, and truth without any mixture of error for its matter; that it reveals the principles by which God will judge us; and therefore is, and shall remain to the end of the world, the true center of Christian union, and the supreme standard by which all human conduct, creeds, and opinions should be tried.

2. OF THE TRUE GOD

We believe that there is One, and only One living and true God, an Infinite, intelligent Spirit, Whose Name is Jehovah, the Maker and Supreme Ruler of Heaven and Earth; inexpressibly glorious in Holiness, and worthy of all possible honor, confidence and love; that in the Unity of the Godhead there are Three Persons, the Father, the Son, and the Holy Ghost; equal in every Divine Perfection, and executing distinct but harmonious Offices in the great work of Redemption.

3. OF THE FALL OF MAN

We believe that Man was created in holiness, under the law of his Maker; but by voluntary transgression fell from that holy and happy state; in consequence of which all Mankind are now sinners, not by constraint but choice; being by nature utterly vold of that holiness required by the law of God; positively inclined to evil; and therefore under just condemnation to eternal ruin, without defense or excuse.

4. OF THE WAY OF SALVATION

We believe that the salvation of sinners is wholly of Grace; through the Mediatorial office of the Son of God; Who by the appointment of the Father, freely took upon Him our nature, yet without our sin; honored the Divine law by His Personal obedience, and by His death made a full Atonement for our sins; that having risen from the dead, He is now enthroned in heaven; and uniting in his wonderful Person the tenderest sympathies with Divine Perfections, He is every way qualified to be a suitable, a compassionate, and all-sufficient Saviour.

5. OF JUSTIFICATION

We believe that the great Gospel blessing which Christ secures to such as believe in Him is Justification; that Justification includes the pardon of sin, and the promise of eternal life on principles of righteousness; that it is bestowed, not in consideration of any works of righteousness which we have done, but solely through Faith in the Redeemer's Blood; by virtue of which faith His Perfect righteousness is freely imputed to us of God; that it brings us into a state of most blessed peace and favor with God, and secures every other blessing needful for time and eternity.

6. OF THE FREEDOM OF SALVATION

We believe that the blessings of salvation are made free to all by the Gospel; that it is the immediate duty of all to accept them by a cordial penitent and obedient faith; and that nothing prevents the salvation of the greatest sinner on earth, but his own inherent depravity and voluntary rejection of the Gospel; which involves him in an aggravated condemnation.

7. OF GRACE IN REGENERATION

We believe that in order to be saved, sinners must be regenerated, or born again; that regeneration consists in giving a holy disposition to the mind; that it is effected in a manner above our comprehenson by the power of the Holy Spirit, in connection with Divine truth, so as to secure our voluntary obedience to the Gospel; and that its proper evidence apears in the holy fruits of repentance, and faith, and newness of life.

8. OF REPENTANCE AND FAITH

We believe that Repentance and Faith are sacred duties, and also inseparable Graces, wrought in our souls by the regenerating Spirit of God; whereby being deeply convinced of our guilt, danger and helplessness, and of the way of salvation by Christ, we turn to God with unfeigned contrition, confession, and supplication for mercy; at the same time heartily receiving the Lord Jesus Christ for our Prophet, Priest and King, and relying on Him alone as the Only and All-sufficient Saviour.

9. OF GOD'S PURPOSE OF GRACE

We believe that Election is the Eternal purpose of God, according to which He graciously regenerates, sanctifies, and saves sinners; that being perfectly consistent with the free agency of man, it comprehends all the means in connection with the end; that it is a most glorious display of God's Sovereign Goodness, being Infinitely free, wise, holy and unchangeable; that it utterly excludes boasting, and promotes humility, love, prayer, praise, trust in God, and active imitation of His free mercy; that it encourages the use of means in the highest degree; that it may be ascertained by its effects in all who truly believe the Gospel; that it is the foundation of Christian assurance; and that to ascertain it with regard to ourselves demands and deserves the utmost diligence.

10. OF SANCTIFICATION

We believe that Sanctification is the process by which, according to the Will of God, we are made partakers of His Holiness; that it is a progressive work; that it is begun in regeneration; and that it is carried on in the hearts of believers by the presence and power of the Holy Spirit, the Sealer and Comforter, in the continual use of the appointed means—especially, the Word of God, self-examinatoin, self-denial, watchfulness and prayer.

11. OF THE PERSEVERANCE OF SAINTS

We believe that such only are real believers as endure unto the end; that their persevering attachment to Christ is the grand mark which distinguishes them from superficial professors; that a special Providence watches over their welfare; and they are kept by the power of God through faith unto salvation.

12. OF THE HARMONY OF THE LAW AND THE GOSPEL

We believe that the Law of God is the eternal and unchangeable rule of His moral government; that it is holy, just and good; and that the inability which the Scriptures ascribe to fallen men to fulfill its precepts, arises entirely from their love of sin; to deliver them from which, and to restore them through a Mediator to unfeigned obedience to the Law, is one great end of the Gospel, and of the Means of Grace connected with the establishment of the visible Church.

13. OF THE GOSPEL CHURCH

We believe that a visible Church of Christ is a Congregation of baptized believers, associated by Covenant in the faith and fellowship of the Gospel; observing the Ordinances of Christ; governed by His Laws; and exercising the gifts, rights, and privileges invested in them by His Word; that its only Scriptural officers are Bishops or Pastors and Deacons, whose qualifications, claims, and duties are defined in the Epistles to Timothy and Titus.

14. OF BAPTISM AND THE LORD'S SUPPER

We believe that Christian baptism is the immersion in water of a believer, into the Name of Father, and Son, and Holy Ghost; to show forth in a solemn and beautiful emblem, our faith in the crucified, buried, and risen Saviour, with its effects, in our death to sin and resurrection to a new life; that it is a pre-requisite to the privilege of a Church relation; and to the Lord's Supper, in which the members of the Church by the sacred use of bread and wine, are to commemorate together the dying love of Christ; preceded always by solemn self-examination.

15. OF THE CHRISTIAN SABBATH

We believe that the first day of the week is the Lord's Day, or Christian Sabbath; and is to be kept sacred to religious purposes, by abstaining from all secular labor and sinful recreations, by the devout observance of all the means of Grace, both private and public; and by preparation for that rest that remaineth for the people of God.

16. OF CIVIL GOVERNMENT

We believe that Civil Government is of Divine appointment, for the interests and good order of human society; and that magistrates are to be prayed for, conscientiously honored, and obeyed; except only in things opposed to the Will of our Lord Jesus Christ, Who is the only Lord of the conscience, and the Prince of the kings of the earth.

17. OF THE RIGHTEOUS AND THE WICKED

We believe that there is a radical and essential difference between the righteous and the wicked; that such only as through faith are justified in the Name of the Lord Jesus, and sanctified by the Spirit of Our God, are truly righteous in His esteem; while all such as continue in impentitence and unbelief are in His sight wicked, and under the curse; and this distinction holds among men both in and after death.

18. OF THE WORLD TO COME

We believe that the end of this world is approaching; that at the Last Day, Christ will descend from heaven, and raise the dead from the grave to final retribution; that a solemn separation will then take place; that the wicked will be adjudged to endless punishment, and the righteous to endless joy; and that this judgment will fix forever the final state of men in heaven or hell, on principles of righteousness.

CONSTITUTION

Article 1-Name

This Organization shall be known as the SUWANNEE MISSIONARY BAPTIST ASSOCIATION.

Article 2-Purpose

The Purpose of this Association shall be: To furnish a medium of Co-operation for the Churches of the Association in their Divinely commissioned work of Missions, Education, and Benevolences; and to this end we seek to bring into co-operative fellowship the energies of our Churches; and to secure the moral and financial support of our Churches for the Objects and Institutions fostered by the Florida Baptist Convention, and the Southern Baptist Convention.

Article 3—Churches

The Constituents of this Association shall be Missionary Baptist Churches of regular order, presenting petitionary letters from other Associations in due form; and Churches which may be constituted within the bounds of the Association, presenting proper credentials of organization and Articles of Faith, accompanied by properly accredited Messengers.

Article 4-Messengers

This Association shall be composed of Messengers holding membership in the Churches which constitute the Association; these Messengers having been duly elected by their respective Churchs on the following basis: Each Church shall be entitled to Three Messengers without reference to their numerical strength; and one additional Messenger for each Twenty-five members or fraction thereof, after it has attained a membership of Fifty members.

Article 5-Officers

The officers of this Association shall be a Moderator, a Vice-Moderator, a Clerk and Treasurer; who shall be elected annually on the second day of each Annual meeting of the Association. The Moderator and Vice-Moderator shall serve from the close of one Annual Session to the close of the next Annual Session. The Clerk and Treasurer, however, shall take office sixty days from the close of the Annual Session and serve until sixty days after the close of the next Annual Session. The offices of Clerk and Treasurer shall be held by the same person and no person shall be elected Moderator for more than two consecutive years.

Article 6-Meetings

- This Association shall meet Annually at such Date, Time and Place as the Association shall have selected at its last Annual Session.
- In addition to the Annual Meeting, there shall be held an Inspirational Meeting each Fifth Sunday; the Time, Place, and Program to be provided for by the Executive Committee.
- 3. In the event of an emergency, the Executive Committee is authorized to make changes in the Time and Place for the Annual Meeting, as will best serve the interests of the Association.

Article 7—Amendments

The Constitution and By-Laws of the Association may be amended at any Annual Meeting of the Association, by a two-thirds majority vote of the Messengers.

BY-LAWS

Section 1-Duties of Officers

- The Duties of the Moderator shall be to preside, preserve order, and appoint all Committees not otherwise provided for in the Constitution and By-Laws.
- 2. The duties of the Vice-Moderator shall be to assist the Moderator; and to preside in the absence of, or at the request of the Moderator.
- 3. The Clerk shall keep a correct record of the proceedings of the Association; supervise the printing and distribution of the minutes; keep a regular file of the published proceedings of the Association; and deliver same with other material belonging to the office to his successor.

The Clerk shall send to the clerks of the Churches of the Association the Associational Letter Form Blanks thirty days prior to the Annual Meeting; also the material to the chairmen of the Standing Committees, who are to submit reports of our work at the Annual Session.

The Clerk shall notify after the adjournment of the Association, all Persons, Committees, and Chairmen and Standing Committees, of their elections or appointments of service.

The Clerk shall receive remuneration for his service, the sum to be fixed by the Association at each Annual Meeting; also he shall receive additional funds from the Association for the expenses of his office.

- 4. The Treasurer shall keep a correct record of all Associational Funds received and disbursed by his office and shall submit a record of all transactions of his office to the Executive Meeting at their quarterly meeting and to the Association at its Annual Meeting. The Treasurer shall be the Chairman of the Finance Committee.
- 5. The duties of the Executive Committee shall be to transact all business of the Association between its Annual Meetings; and a written report of its work shall be submitted to the association at the Annual Session.

The Moderator, Vice-Moderator, and Clerk of the Association shall serve as Chairman, Vice-Chairman and Secretary of the Executive Committee between the Annual Sessions of the Association.

In the event a vacancy occurs in any office of the Association between the Annual Meetings; the Executive Committee is authorized to fill such vacancy for the unexpired term of office; if not otherwise provided for in the Constitution and By-Laws.

Section 2—Committees

1. The Standing Committees of the Association shall be: 1—American Bible Society; 2—Associational Missions; 3—Brotherhood; 4—Christian Education; 5—Christian Literature; 6—Cooperative Program; 7—Digest of Letters; 8—Evangelism; 9—Finance; 10—Florida Baptist Children's Home; 11—Ministerial Relief and Annuities; 12—Missions; 13—Music; 14—Nominations; 15—Obituaries; 16—Radio; 17—Resolutions; 18—Social Service; 19—Sunday School; 20—Training Union; 21—Vacation Bible School; 21—Woman's Missionary Union.

Section 3—Committees. Appointment of

- All Standing Committees shall consist of Three Members: who shall be appointed by the Moderator; the Chairman being selected in advance; the others at each Annual Session.
- All Special Committees shall consist of not less than Three nor more than Five Members; who shall be appointed by the Moderator.
- 3. The Committee on Order of Business shall consist of the Moderator, Vice-Moderator, and Clerk.
- 4. The Executive Committee of this Association shall be composed of:
- 1. One member from each church elected by the church and reported to the association in the regular church letter each year.
 - 2. The pastor of each and every church in the association.
 - 3. The presiding officer of each associational organization.

The Executive Committee shall meet quarterly, at a time and place that may be decided by the committee itself.

The officers of the Executive Committee, together with the presiding officers of the associational organizations, shall constitute a Steering Committee that shall have the power to transact any business of the association that may be necessary during the time between the regular meeting of the Executive Committee; providing, that in the event the association is not organized as indicated above, then the Steering Committee shall be composed of the officers of the Executive Committee and four other such members of the Executive Committee as shall be elected by the Executive Committee.

The Steering Committee shall meet once each month or as often as the Chairman may call it into session.

Section 4—Committees. Duties Of

- 1. The duties of the Standing Committees and the Special Committees, shall be those which are commonly understood, and observed by Baptist Associations and Conventions, as suggested by their names.
- The duties of the Committee on the Order of Business shall be to prepare the Program for each Annual Meeting; and to select the Speakers not otherwise provided for in the Constitution and By-Laws.
 - 3. The duties of the Nominating Committee shall be:

To name the Time and Place for the Annual Meeting.

To name the Preachers and Alternates for the Annual Introductory and Missionary Sermons.

All nominations subject to adoption by the Association.

Section 5

The Association shall have an Introductory and a Missionary Sermon at each Annual Meeting, on the first and second days respectively; the hours for the sermons to be provided for in the order of Business.

Section 6

The fiscal year of the Association shall begin October first of each year, and end September thirty of the following year, both dates inclusive; and all reports to the Association shall conform to these dates.

Section 7

All written reports of Committees shall be limited to a maximum of six hundred words; and the Clerk is authorized if necessary, to edit reports to conform to this word limitation.

Section 8

When a Church fails to send an Annual letter, the Clerk shall use the report of the previous year, with reference only to record of membership of Church and organizations.

Section 9

The Clerks of the Churches are requested to get their letter to the Associational Clerk as early as possible.

Section 10

The Parliamentary Law which shall be used by this Association in the government of its business proceedings, shall be Kerfoot's Parliamentary Law.

It is also understood, that this Association shall ever adhere to the Principles and Practices of recognized Baptist Policies in all its Proceedings, its Methods and its Word.

REPORT ON BAPTIST LITERATURE AND THE FLORIDA BAPTIST WITNESS

The past year has seen an awakened consciousness throughout our nation to the tremendous dangers in the wrong kind of literature, the wrong use of the printed page. More bills than ever before have been introduced into state legislatures with a view to controlling the rising tide of obscene literature. As grateful as we are for the success which has been achieved in some quarters, we must all recognize that this is still very much the negative approach to the problem. We must not only try to stop the flow of the wrong kind of reading material—we must supply the readers with something Christian to take its place.

In their publication efforts Southern Baptists are trying to do this for their people. For example, last year the Sunday School Board printed and distributed more than 50 million copies of its periodicals, plus 3,459,076 books, plus more than

200 million tracts.

The publications of various agencies and auxiliaries of the Southern Baptist Convention have a total circulation of 770,099 copies per issue.

Baptist State Papers reported to the Convention this year for the first time a total circulation in excess of one million, 1,044,819 to be exact.

Our own state paper, the Florida Baptist Witness has shown a net increase of 3.494 during the past year to bring the present total circulation (as of August 1, 1953) to 33,244. The Witness Commission has set a goal of 36,000 by the time the Southern Baptist Convention meets in St. Louis next June, and urgently requests the co-operation of every church in reaching it.

One of the finest investments that can be made is to send the Baptist Witness to every family in the church membership through the simple Church Bud-

get Plan, to be paid in easy monthly installments.



REPORT OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

We Baptists need to realize the importance of education that is Christ-centered. To accomplish this there must be a program of educating the parents of future students

The most important feature of the southwide emphasis on Christian education planned for April, 1954, is the new responsibility to be placed upon adults in Southern Baptist Churches-the responsibility for active guidance of our high school-age young people in the matter of choice of and preparation for college. This will be achieved by establishing a College Counseling Committee in each church. These committees are to lead our young people to an informed, intelligent consideration of our Baptist Colleges; to encourage financial preparation for college through savings or educational insurance; and to secure commitment to a full, active program of Christian living in whatever college is attended.

The number of ministerial students in the colleges, seminaries and academies increased to an all-time high of 8,993. The total investment in endowment and property values, as of March 1953 was \$144,560,783. Endowment totals increased roughly a half a million. Property values increased about five million.

Now a brief word about Stetson University. During the past convention year, Florida Baptists provided \$145,347.85 for current operations and \$78,077.54 for capital improvements-a total of nearly a quarter of a million dollars to their only convention agency engaged in higher education-Stetson University.

Nevertheless, the Trustees of Stetson University reported their operational expenses of 1951-52 exceeded all receipts, including the Convention contributions, by \$133,170.79.

President Edmunds reports that because of the increased generosity of old and new friends of the University throughout the State, the operational deficit for 1952-53 was almost eliminated. He predicts a balanced budget in 1953-54, but he insists that even this increase in gifts will not enable Florida Baptists to match the job being done in most other Southern Baptist States.

President Edmunds was happier to report, however:

That approximately three-fourths of all Baptist students attending Stetson moved their church letters to a Deland church and are actively engaged in Sunday School, Training Union and other church organization work in Deland,

That Stetson students conducted 13 week-end revivals during the year in which 33 professions of faith were made,

That two Stetson youth revival teams worked in the State throughout the

That both candidates for the presidency of the Student Government Association were Baptist ministerial students,

That Stetson Baptist students contributed \$325 (over and above their regular church contributions) to world-wide mission projects during the year, that Spiritual life at Stetson is deeper and more meaningful than ever before, for this is most significant.

Let's encourage our young people to consider Stetson first. This will enable us to have education that is Christ-centered.

VACATION BIBLE SCHOOL

The Vacation Bible School work has grown some in this Association this year We had thirteen Vacation Bible Schools which was an increase of five over last year.

The Vacation Bible School Clinic was held at the First Church of Live Oak, April 28, 1953. There were twelve churches represented. An attendance of sixty with eight pastors present,

This year in our Association we had 1,082 boys and girls enrolled in Bible Schools. Fifteen of these boys and girls were won to Christ. Sixty-five had never enrolled in any Sunday School before.

Two hundred and twenty-five teachers and workers enjoyed the rich experience of teaching these boys and girls.

Cost of these schools was \$725.98

\$130.59 was given to World Mission through the cooperative program by these schools.

Dear Friends:

Thank you for accepting our invitation and for the help that I am sure you will give Baptist Bible Institute as we begin our new term. Here is how you can help, and here is how it will be used.

Ten students arrived on the campus with no financial support. These are earnest young people who want to work their way through school. On faith I have accepted them, believing that many of our friends will help us keep them in school.

Three Seminole Indians have arrived and need help. We will have to provide work and scholarships. We owe a great debt to the Indians. Perhaps you will help us do the right thing by these prospective Seminole Preachers.

At least a dozen married students, and each with some family, are barely getting by. I hope that during the year we will be able to hlep them. Perhaps this need appeals to you?

During the summer our business manager reported that the hot water system in our married couples quarters was in bad condition and functioning only part time. When I ask how much it would cost, he said at least \$600.00. When I advised him to procede with repairing it, he asked where we would get the money. I could only reply that I still had faith to believe that it would be forth-

Someone asked if I was not exhibiting a great deal of faith. My reply is simply this. The only way this school can operate is by faith, and by that I mean faith in such friends as you that have in the past, and that now, will assist us in making this a successful year.

Every student is a loss. Our extremely low charges are not sufficient to pay the expenses of the school. It is not our intention to make B.B.I, self-supporting. We endeavor to provide theological education at the lowest possible cost.

You might also see about putting Baptist Bible Institute in your church budget for some small monthly donation. Please know that your personal gifts will be carefully and prayerfully used to provide education for these many young men and women called of the Lord who are our responsibility. Yours will be a blessing extending into eternity.

AMERICAN BIBLE SOCIETY

The world must have the Bible, It is the one primary source of knowledge of Christ.

Travel to Africa and see a group of people in central Congo, gathered about a missionary reading from the Bible in their own Luba-Lulua language. Listen to a small boy say to him, "May I have that book? Those words made holes in my heart! I want to read it to the people of my own village far off in the forest." That boy expressed a missionary principle true in all lands: Every person must have the Bible in his own native language if the Word of God is to speak to his

The Bible is the missionary's chief tool. He uses it in every form of mission work. The Bible itself is a missionary. It can go where the human missionary cannot go, stay when he must leave and keep on working in a man's heart.

Giving the Bible to the people of the world in their languages is a missionary task. Someone must translate it, publish it, send it to the people wherever they may live and make it available at a price they can afford to pay (far below cost in most countries) or without charge in cases of special need,

The American Bible Society serves as that "Someone". It aids in Bible translation, publishes the Scriptures without note or comment and distributes them, without profit and usually below cost, for mission work around the world. For the Blind, it supplies Scriptures in raised-letter systems and on Talking Book records.

The American Bible Society is an active partner of Southern Baptists in their worldwide mission work. The Society serves every form of missions at home and abroad

During 1952 The American Bible Society

- -distributed throughout the world more than 13 million volumes of Scriptures. -helped the Japan Bible Society to distribute some 3 million Scripture volumes. making a total of more than 13 million volumes distributed in Japan since V_J
- -aided the Korean Bible Society in supplying Scriptures for civilians, South Korean and other UN forces, and North Koreans and Chinese in prisoner_of_ war camps.
- -provided 904.753 Scripture volumes for our own Armed Forces, bringing the number supplied since 1940 to almost 11 million volumes.
- -received gifts which made possible its largest budget-and adopted for 1953 an even greater program to meet expanding needs for Scriptures around the world.
- -but faced other requests for urgent needs on many fields, especially Japan, Korea, Hong Kong, India, Burma and Brazil, again emphasizing the fact that missionary advance, through increased Scripture distribution, waits only for needed funds!

Southern Baptists Can Lead In Providing Enough Bibles For World Needs Now! In 1952 Southern Baptist churches gave \$102,872 to the American Bible Society. Gifts from churches of all denominations totaled \$750,147. Southern Baptist gifts stood in second place.

It is my conviction and belief that the Southern Baptist can and will do more for this great work in the spread of God's word.

All Southern Baptist Churches are being encouraged to take part in supporting this great effort, and to give their gifts for this cause through the Southern Baptist Cooperative Program,

REPORT ON RADIO

The year-round Baptist Hour is now being carried by more than 350 stations all over this country and in seven foreign countries, with an actual listening audience of some five million each week, and a potential audience of well over one hundred million. In addition to this broadcast, the Commission is constantly building up its transcription library with a variety of types of religious programs. Just during the past year a sizeable music library has been built up with many transcriptions now available of recordings of music by the Baptist Hour Choir.

A significant step was made recently, in the naming of Rev. Paul M. Stevens as Director of the Radio Commission. Mr. Stevens has taken up his new duties at the Baptist Radio Center, as of the first of October.

Rev. Dupree Jordan Jr., has been Acting Director and has now resigned to return to the pastorate.

We are most grateful that the Suwannee Baptist Association has embraced the Baptist Hour in it's budget for the past year. The hour of broadcast was changed to 8:45 - 9:15, Sunday Mornings. This change enabled many people to get ready for worship and service in their own churches. It has been a great spiritual factor and force in the area covered by Station WNER. We feel that it has been a missionary enterprise and has given a sane and sensible gospel message into this area. We pray God's blessings upon this radio ministry and feel that it will be long-lasting.

CHURCH MUSIC REPORT

During the past year, interest in Church Music has grown as never before in our 'Association and in the Southern Baptist Convention, as a whole. Since the death of Dr. B. B. McKinney, the Church Music Department of the Baptist Sunday School Board has changed and has been greatly enlarged. Dr. Hines Sims has been elected to head this work, Dr. Loren R. Williams and Mr. Clifford Holcomb are his Associates. Florida Baptist have Mr. W. G. Stroup as Director of Church Music. Churches, large and small, rural and city, are developing a greater music program. Pastors and Churches are becoming more and more aware of the need for developing greater music programs in the churches and in the association,

Due to an awakened interest on the part of Pastors and Leaders, we have discovered much musical talent who are being trained in the churches of our association. Churches are realizing that a church-centered, church-controlled, and Christ honoring music program is a real need and should be included as a part of the program of the church. As in Sunday School and Training Union, the Music Program should be on a graded basis, according to age and including all ages in the church.

Special emphasis has been placed on the importance of selecting and electing a Music Director in each Association, to assist in the musical needs of the association. Suwannee Association has been one of the Associations who have elected such a person for a number of years. According to recent reports, only four associations of the State failed to elect a Music Director last year.

On January 13, 1953, a Music Conference was held for these Directors, in

On January 13, 1953, a Music Conference was held for these Directors, in the Chapel of the Florida Baptist Building, Jacksonville. In this Conference, we received training and helpful suggestions for carrying on a better music program in our own association. Your Director was present for this Conference. Plans are being made for another such meeting in January, 1954.

The monthly or quarterly Hymn Sing is becoming more and more popular and beneficial, throughout the State. Churches participating are receiving information and inspiration for better music programs in their local churches. These Hymn Sings should be planned by the Music Committee, elected by the Association. To date, this association has not had a Hymn Sing.

REPORT OF THE RELIEF AND ANNUITY BOARD OF THE SOUTHERN BAPTIST CONVENTION

The 35th Anniversary of the Relief and Annuity Board was at the Southern Baptist Convention, Houston, Texas. The Board was organized May 16th, 1918 in the Convention meeting Hot Springs, Ark.

This infant Board has grown to be one of the major Boards of the Convention 1953.

As was shown from the reports presented at the Annual Meeting of the Board in Dallas, March 11, 1952, was a great Year for the Relief and Annuity Board.

We get these figures from the report made to the State Convention last year. The report showed 31,000 certificates of participation had been issued in the various retirement plans. The report also revealed that 15,000 churches were cooperating in the Ministers Retirement Plan. And that 2,486 individuals were receiving regular Annuity checks. Of this number 1,126 were ministers retired under the Retirement Plan.

The Board reported total earnings Assets of \$23,333,014.10. Total income of the board was \$5,144,134.29, with total expenditures \$2,086,514.02.

The Relief part of the work has a time to meet all the calls, last year the income was \$257,282,26. Expenditures were more \$268,204.37, so we see the need of more money for those who get help from this Department of our work.

All our churches ought to take an offering every year and the Board is asking all the churches to make this special offering in June.

SOCIAL SERVICE

The Christian conscience of America has been shocked at the proposal to sell package liquor on the Air Force Base, and thousands of protests have been filed with the House and Senate Armed Services Committees, of which Hon. Dewey Short and Hon. Leverett Saltonstall, are chairmen, respectively.

It is well to remember that the Anti-Canteen Law of 1901, which prohibits the sale of all intoxicating liquors on any military reservation, has never been repealed. It is well to remember also that Secretary of Defense, Charles E. Wilson. has authority, under the Cole amendment to the Selective Service Act, to bar all liquor from the army camps of the United States.

It is disturbing to know that Northwest Air Lines DC-4 flights, except coaches are now serving liquor. This is the first time an air line has served liquor on its flights. It is also to be regretted that the New York and New Haven Railroad commuter trains are being fitted up with club cars for the serving of liquor—a practice followed up to this time only by through trains.

We rejoice in the announcement that President Eisenhower will not serve liquor in the White House during his administration, although we stand amazed and disappointed at the application of the Capitol Hill Club for a liquor license, where intoxicants will be served to members of the Republican Party who are also members of the Club. The liquor club will be situated directly across the street from the Congressional Library and one half block from the House Office Building.

We would urge our pastors and laymen to take advantage of those provisions of the state law which give city and county commissioners the right to create "dry zones". Remembering that Florida does not have precinct local option, but only local option on a county-wide basis, the zoning power gives an opportunity to remove from residential, school, and church areas the contaminating influence of the saloon.

Our efforts thus far to secure uniform closing hours throughout the state have not been successful. The city commissioners and the county commissioners, however, have the right, under state law, to independently regulate hours of sale. It is unfortunate that most of the regulation thus far has been in the direction of extending the hours of sale for week-days and Sundays, United effort on the part of the Christian forces should result in restricting these hours of sale.
