REPORT ON CHRISTIAN EDUCATION.

We recognize the importance of the Christian education, and the sooner it is brought to bear on the youth the better. No truer proverb was ever written than "Raise a child up in the way it should go, and it will not depart therefrom when it gets old." It has been well said that "Education is Growth." Then let us strive for the right kind of Christian education, in order that we may grow spiritually. Christian education is the true guide to normal, wholesome and expanding life, and therefore it is the earnest desire of the committee that the work of Christian education may go on and continue to increase in power till its influence is felt the world over.

We congratulate the Baptists for the great part they are taking in this work. We hope the Baptists will continue in this good work, and recommend the John B. Stetson University and the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary to all Florida Youths who are seeking a Christian education.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON MISSIONS.

Missions, briefly defined, are for the work of carrying the Gospel into places where it has not been or where it cannot be preached without help. The design of God is to accomplish his purposes with the aid of human agencies. Christ, in the performance of miracles, used human aid. He commanded the blind man to wash his eyes in the pool of Siloam and the stone to be rolled from the mouth of the grave of Lazarus, using human means to all the work possible, only using divine power to do that which was beyond human effort, and showing the necessity of both, in accomplishing his ends on earth.

In the spread of the Gospel the same plan is pursued and the same order of labor exists to-day, human and divine. How, then, can we neglect to work in the fields before us? Some members of our churches, however, it would seem, are not alive to their individual duty in this matter. It is as much one Christian's duty as another's to provide for the spreading of the Gospel, not only at home, but into every civilized nation on the globe. No one can neglect it and live a life of true Christian obedience. Our churches, in agreement with the teachings of the Bible, were intended to be missionary by the very plan of their constitution. During the past year the work has been greatly blessed and also enlarged, and the newly acquired responsibilities of our government has opened vast missionary fields, which our Boards will gladly enter as rapidly as the churches supply the necessary funds. This is the great work of all the years, a work unlike any other, and sustained by the promise of God. In looking at the necessities of the foreign fields, we should not forget, or neglect, our home fields. There are places of destitution, spiritually, in our own country which need encouragement and help, at least for a time.

In urging upon the Brethren the necessity of aiding in sending the Gospel to foreign and home fields, we do so with confidence, for Christ has promised that His word shall not return void, and that "He will be with us even unto the end."

Men cannot, however, work in this day and time without money, and it is the duty of the Church to well provide for the minister in the performance of his work. Therefore your committee urge upon the Churches composing this Association to contribute to the work of missions, remembering that freely they have received and freely they should give.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON PUBLICATIONS.

Reading is a characteristic mark of man, distinguishing him from the brute creation. This is properly called the reading age, and if we, as parents, do not furnish our children with wholesome literature, they will be sure to feed their minds on the trashy, demoralizing books and periodicals which are daily being circulated in our midst by the enemies of our holy religion. Oh! that more of our Baptist people would wake up to the importance of reading Baptist literature and sound knowledge, and cease feeding on advent trash, mammon sin and Pedobaptist nonsense. The only way to drive out these pernicious books and papers which demoralize, is to flood the home and the country with sound Baptist literature.

Your committee takes pleasure in recommending to all our Baptist people the Florida Baptist Witness, published in Ocala,

Fla. It is an able defender of the faith once delivered to the saints. It is the principal, in fact the only, medium of communication between Florida Baptists, and without it we cannot keep posted on our denominational work. In order to keep posted on the work of our Home and Foreign Mission Boards, we would recommend the Home Field and Foreign Mission Journal. For our Sunday Schools, we recommend the excellent periodicals published by our Sunday School Board, at Nashville, Tenn., and also those published by the American Baptist Publication Society.

REPORT OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

Brethren of the Association, your Executive committee respectfully report that on July 29th, H. E. Braddock, T. P. Register and R. F. Rogers met pursuant to call of the Chairman and perfected the organization by electing Bro. H. E. Braddock, Treasurer, and T. P. Register, Secretary. At that meeting your committee arranged with Bro. J. E. McIntosh (the Gospel Wagon Missionary of State Board) to labor in the bounds of our Association till the annual meeting of this body. Westhought it best for Bro. McIntosh to labor with the Churches, reviving a missionary spirit, for at least half his time, thus enabling us to raise funds to meet our obligations, and the remaining half of his time to labor in the destitute places of our Association. Bro, McIntosh began work at Mt. Zion Church and remained there several days, thence to Providence Church, thence to Lake Butler Church, on Thursday, the 17th of August, remaining there till Thursday, August 24th, when he returned to Providence Village Church, remaining there preaching for several days. SATURDAY NIGHT SESSION.

Report on Temperance was presented, and after discussion by Bros. E. G. Persons, D. O. Rivers, J. E. McIntosh, E. H. Reynolds, Stephen Crockett, B. R. Moseley, G. W. S. Ware, R. F. Rogers and T. W. Getzon, adopted, as follows:

REPORT ON TEMPERANCE.

The effects of drinking, and the sale of intoxicants, upon our people, socially, politically and religiously, are so clearly recognized that we consider it a waste of time, if not a reflection upon this body, to offer any of its dreadful realities. How to lesson the sale and drinking of it is the question. We should use all means in our power to abolish the making of whiskey, if possible, or restrict the sale; then the drinking would diminish. Hence, if we could entirely do away with the sale, the drinking would be compelled to cease. To do this we have to appeal to both, the voters and legislators. In obtaining such laws, in many instances we have been successful, but in many more we have failed; and when we have been successful, we must confess that we have not always been entirely satisfied with the results brought about by such measures. We feel that the fault is not so much from defects in the laws passed, as it is in the lack of faithfulness on the part of officials to enforce, and a failure of a hearty moral support on the part of citizens to uphold them.

Therefore, Brethren, while we would in no way discourage the efforts of our people to secure such officials, but we ask all to use every ability they have to this end; yet we would suggest to our people, both preachers and Churches, to put forth all effort possible to raise the masses to such a high plane of Christian citizenship, that they will work to successfully enforce such laws, if obtained.

CONSTITUTION.

SECTION 1. This Association shall be known as the Beulah Baptist Association.

Sec 2, This Association shall be composed of Messengers selected by the several Churches connected with the Association. Each Church shall be entitled to one Messenger at large, and one for every twenty-five members or majority fraction thereof,

See. 3. Any regularly organized Baptist Church of the same faith may become a member of this Association upon application by petitionary letter and Messenger as above provided for.

Sec. 4. This Association shall at their regular meeting elect from their members by ballot, a Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer, who shall serve for one year.

Sec. 5. The object of this Association shall be:

1. To promote unity and brotherly love among the churches.

2. To promote gospel discipline.

 To encourage the universal spread of the Gospel and practical religion throughout our bounds, and elsewhere.

Sec. 6, The Moderator shall appoint at each annual session of the Association an Executive Committee composed of five members, whose appointment shall be approved by the body. Their duties shall be:

1. To diligently inquire into the destitutions within our bounds.

To make contracts with ministers of the Gospel of this Association, or other Associations in correspondence with us, to supply such destitutions with the Gospel.

3. To draw from the treasury such funds as are available for missionary purposes to meet their contracts, and to exercise general supervision in the promotion of unity and brotherly love among the churches and the universal spread of the Gospel throughout our bounds. They shall report the result of their labors at each annual session of the Association

Sec. 7. The Moderator shall invite correspondents and visiting ministers and brethren to seats with the body when in session. They shall be entitled to the privileges of aiding the Association with their counsel.

Sec. 8. This Association shall have the right to withdraw from any church that may be in disorder when the same cannot be restored by Gospel discipline to the unity of faith in the bonds of peace.

Sec. 9. The annual meetings of this Association shall be held at such time and place as may be designated by the body; and by appointment there shall be an Introductory Sermon preached the first day of the session at 11 o'clock, and on the Sabbath or last day of the session a collection taken up for missionary purposes.

Sec. 10. This Association shall not lord it over God's heritage,

Sec. 10. This Association shall not lord it over God's heritage, nor infringe upon any of the internal rights of the Churches, but shall act only as an advisory body.

Sec. 11. This Constitution may be amended at any regular session of the Association by a two-thirds vote of all the Messengers. Any amendment offered shall be in writing.

ARTICLES OF FAITH.

1. We believe in one only true and living God, the Father, Son and Holy Spirit, and that these are one. See Matthew 28;19; 2nd

We believe that the Old and New Testament Scriptures are the inspired word of God and the only rules of faith and practice. See 2nd Timothy 3:16-17.

3. We believe in election according to the foreknowledge of God, through sanctification of the Spirit and belief of the truth.

4. We believe that the grace of God that bringeth salvation hath appeared unto all men, and that nothing prevents the salvation of the vilest sinner but his own voluntary rejection of that grace.

Isa. 55:1; Rev. 22:17; Acts 17:30.

5. We believe in the depravity of the human heart, and that the natural state of man is such that he cannot prepare himself for divine favor without the assisting grace of God, enabling him to act according to the good pleasure of His divine will. Eph. 2:5; Matt. 18:11; 1st John 4:10; 1st Cor 3;5-7.

6. We believe in justification by faith, which gives peace with God, through our Lord Jesus Christ. Acts 13:39; Rom. 5:1-2.

7. We believe that the Gospel of Christ is a means of grace to bring sinners to repentance and faith in Jesus Christ, and therefore should be preached to all the world. John 3:16; Mark 16:16.

8. We believe that all those who are regenerated by the Spirit of God, are made heirs of God and joint heirs with our Lord Jesus Christ; and that they are kept by the power of God through faith unto eternal salvation. John 8:31; 1st Peter 1:5; Rom. 8:28; Phil. 1:6.

9. We beleive that Baptism is the immersion of the whole body in water; that the only proper subjects are described in the preceding section, and the only proper administrators are those who have been regularly ordained by a Church of Christ by the imposition of hands of a Presbytery. Acts 8:36; Rom. 6:4. Read Timothy and

10. We believe that the Lord's Supper was instituted by Jesus Christ to be commemorated by His followers, and that none but "baptised believers" have a Scriptural right to partake thereof. Luke 22:18-19-20; 1st Cor. 14:26-28.

11. We believe in the resurrection of the righteous and the wicked, and that the wicked shall go away into everlasting punishment, but the righteous into life eternal. Acts 24:15; Matt. 25:46.

RULES OF DECORUM.

ARTICLE 1. At the first meeting of each annual session of the Association, the Moderator of the previous session shall call the Messengers to order. In case of the absence of the Moderator, the Clerk shall call to order, when the Messengers present may elect a Moderator pro. tem., who shall preside until the letters from the Churches are read, including the petitionary letters for membership and the names of Messengers enrolled.

Art. 2. When the letters from the Churches shall have been read and the names of Messengers enrolled, they shall elect from the body, by ballot, a Moderator, a Clerk and a Treasurer, who shall serve for one year and until their successors shall be duly elected.

Art. 3. Each day's session of the Association shall be opened with prayer.

Art. 4. The Moderator shall preserve order and decide all ques-

tions in debate, subject to an appeal to the body; and when he shall speak on any subject in discussion he shall call some member to the chair, and in case of a tie shall give the deciding vote.

Art. 5. The Moderator shall appoint all committees, subject to

approval by the body.

Art. 6. The Clerk shall keep a careful record of the proceedings of each meeting, and in the absence of the Moderator shall call the body together and preside until a Moderator pro tem shall bea

Art. 7. All members wishing to speak on any subject shall arise and address the Moderator as "brother," and shall confine themselves strictly to the subject and shall not be allowed to make any unkind allusion to a brother while speaking.

Art. 8. No motion shall be debatable until seconded and stated

by the Moderator or read by the Clerk.

Art. 9. When a motion is under consideration no other motion shall be entertained except to adjourn, lay on the table, to amend, indefinitely postpone, refer to a committee or call for the previous question.

Art. 10. Any member voting with the majority on any question in debate may move a reconsideration at any time during the session.

Art. 11. Visiting brethren and Correspondents from other Associations of the same faith shall have a right to speak on any and all subjects under consideration, but shall not be entitled to vote.

Art. 12. No brother shall speak more than twice on a subject in

debate without the consent of the Association.

Art. 13. These Rules of Decorum may be altered or amended at any annual session of the Association by a majority vote of the members of the body.
