Report on publication was then read and adopted, after-talks made by Rev. F. C. Edwards, explaining the mission of the Southern Witness; Rev. C. A. Ridley highly recommended the Southern Witness to be used by every church member; Rev. O. J. Frier thinks that some of the churches are using improper literature in their Sunday schools. His opinion was endorsed in very strong terms by Rev. J. A. Harris and others. The union Sunday schools were the ones referred to.

#### REPORT ON PUBLICATIONS.

We, your committee, beg to report the following:

Realizing that we are what we read, we therefore recommend that our people look well to their literature and use none but such as is outspoken in sound doctrine as we believe it. We recommend that our people use the publications of the Southern Baptist Convention and we urge the importance of our people taking and reading our own paper, "The Southern Witness," first. because it is indeed our paper and every Baptist should stand by it loyally in every way possible to make it a paper of which we may feel proud; and that it may become most efficient for the accomplishment of its work.

Second. We urge our people to support it because we recognize in it one of the most powerful agencies for the development of our people and the leading of them out to the full accomplishment of their God-given work.

Report on Sunday schools was read and made special order for 9:30 o'clock Sunday morning.

Report of the committee on temperance was submitted.

Following is the report:

We find our people, as a whole, fast realizing the evil effects of the drink habit. Not only do they cast their votes against the liquor traffic, but they are willing to lend their time and influence to our sister counties which are struggling to remove this tempter.

We believe it is our duty and privilege to keep this alcoholic drink from our boys. While it seems an impos-

sibility to stop the sale of it in some ways, still we know that the youth will not find the blindtiger nearly so often as the adults; and by keeping this temptation from our boys could we not in a generation or two colonize the nation with temperate men? We feel that God has greatly blessed us in removing from our door the barroom. We inhale no more the unpleasant odors arising from them, nor hear the vile words of a drunken man on his homeward to meet the unhappy welcome of his loved ones. Therefore, let us express our thanks and appreciation to God by petitioning our representatives at Tallahassee to so fix the state laws that we may have the privilege of voting in a state election to help our Christian friends in those counties of the state in which are placed our large towns.

Rev. E. H. Rennolds made a very earnest appeal to the Association to press the matter of state prohibition. Rev. N. B. Plummer of Marion county, asked the heartfelt prayers of the Association and of the churches composing it for the success of the dry ticket in Marion county.

Rev. J. A. Harris and Rev. G. W. S. Ware made some strong points for the temperance cause, after which the report was adopted as above.

Report of committee on Christian education was read as follows:

1. We find the Word of God very accessible to every one and in abundance in almost every home in our country and we know no reason why the child should not be reared in the nurture and admonition of the Lord, even in the rural homes.

2. Then for the bereft children of Florida we boast of an orphanage which is under the management of Brother Bean, whose life is mellowed by the love of God, and whose life-work, together with Sister Bean's, has been that of doing good to all, to the glory of God.

We have the John B. Stetson University, which is a God-send and a blessing to our Southland for the education and for the training of our youth. This is a Baptist school under the auspices of Christian influence.

4. Then in Louisville, Ky., we have access to the Baptist Seminary, a theological school, for the training of our young ministers who are called and qualified for

the promulgation of God's Word.

5. Last, but not least, we have our own Baptist press, where the Southern Witness is published weekly. This paper is devoted wholly to the cause of Christ and to the thorough information of the Baptist cause and work. Hence, with all these facts as shining lights before us we know no reason why our land and country should grope in darkness, "Ever learning and never able to come to the saving truth," as it is in Christ Jesus.

Following is the report:

Jesus Christ, the Lord of the church, made II:s journey from heaven to earth that He might, by example, as well as precept, thrust upon us the missionary idea and give us the missionary spirit. The great idea of worldwide missions was borne in the very heart of our Great God and it is only as we grow to be more like Him that we grow in the real missionary spirit. In other words, to be intensely missionary is to partake of that spirit that gave Jesus Christ to the sons of men. To To grow in grace is to grow in mission. Love is the great taproot of mission. God so loved the world that He gave, and so Christ came to bless the earth.

Paul, the magnificent preacher-apostle, said, "The love of Christ constraineth me" and so he gave his life to the guidance of the missionary spirit. And so, as long as the love of God continues to bless the heart and live in the lives of men, we will have the missionary spirit with us.

Your committee is pleased to report some advance on the part of our churches in missionary giving; but as yet we confess that it seems to us that we have not yet learned the first lesson in real giving when looked upon in the light of our duty and what we really, under the blessings of God, ought to do.

Our Association, through its executive board, has had Bro. W. F. Thompson employed as associational missionary for the past two or three months and his re-

port will speak for itself.

We wish to congratulate Bro. Thompson on the work he has been enabled to do. The Lord has indeed crowned his efforts and many have been added to our churches, while the churches themselves have received renewed strength and power.

In conclusion we would urge our church members to inform themselves along missionary lines in order that they may more fully appreciate the obligation resting upon them. Take the Bible as your chief textbook on missions,

Your Executive Committee, realizing the necessities of the field and the importance of the work, looked long and well before they employed a man to work in the field. We employed Rev. W. F. Thompson on August 14th to do evangelical work and we hereto attach his re-

port, which speaks for itself.

I have worked sixty-seven days, preached ninetyeight sermons and added to the church forty-eight members. I traveled four hundred and seventy-two miles, made one hundred and sixteen visits and delivered six lectures. I organized two Sunday schools and established three prayer meetings as a direct result of the work. The interest in all the churches where meetings were held and seed sown, we hope will bring forth a good harvest for the Master.

Following is the report:

Your committee on Sunday schools respectfully report that the Sunday school work within the bounds of our Association is not as encouraging as it should be. In some of our churches this work has received a new impetus, and we are glad to know that our zealous workers generally realize the importance of the Sunday school, and that it is one of the most important features of church activity; and yet it is sad to note the inexcusable apathy to this great work, shown by the majority of our church members.

It seems passing strange that adult church members can not realize that their presence and participation in the Sunday school is necessary as an encouragement to the young, and a means of grace to them.

Some of our largest Sunday schools in city and country are lacking in material for suitable teachers and even for the formation of a Bible class. We need more consecration to this work; and earnest acceptance of the sentiment, "I'll go where you want me to go, dear Lord," and He would have many Christians who are asleep to this line of duty, to awaken.

May God impress upon the minds of the apathetic, that here He has a work for all who possibly can attendold and young, even at the cost of real sacrifices in our prayer.

#### MINUTES W. M. U.

The Beulah Associational Union of the Woman's Missionary societies met in the Presbyterian church at Lake City at 2:30 o'clock, p. m., November 3, A. D., 1905.

Mrs. C. M. Ray, Vice-President, in the chair.

The meeting opened with singing, followed by a Bible reading, showing the commands of Christ in regard to mission work.

Prayer by Miss Jennie L. Spalding, our State Secretary.

Mrs. E. E. Cox was elected secretary pro. tem.

There are but five woman's missionary societies among the sixteen churches of Beulah Association, these being at Mt. Beulah, Elim, Providence, Lake Butler and Lake City.

Representatives were present from some of these but no written reports were made except from the Lake City society which has a membership of forty-one, who raised \$95.35 during the past year for missions and sent two boxes, valued at \$68.75 to the Baptist Orphanage.

Elim has a working society that holds regular meet-

ings.

Lake Butler has had no meetings for several months. Mt. Beulah and Providence societies were not represented.

Mt. Beulah society sent \$3.05 to be sent to the Orphanage.

Mrs. C. M. Ray and Mrs. E. A. Hickson were elected vice-presidents for the ensuing year.

A collection was taken for the Tichenor memorial

fund, amounting to \$3.10.

In conclusion Miss Spalding made an excellent address on methods and plans for the work in our societies.

#### Constitution.

Section 1. This Association shall be known as the Beulah Baptist Association.

Sec. 2. This Association shall be composed of messengers selected by the several churches connected with the Association. Each church shall be entitled to one messenger at large, and one for every twenty-five members or majority fraction thereof.

Sec. 3. Any regularly organized Baptist church of the same faith may become a member of this Association upon application by petitionary letter and messenger, as above provided for.

Sec. 4. This Association shall at their regular meeting elect from their members by ballot, a Moderator, Clerk, and Treasurer, who shall serve for one year.

Sec. 5. The object of this Association shall be: First, to promote unity and brotherly love among the churches; second, to promote Gospel discipline; third, to encourage the universal spread of the Gospel and practical religion throughout our

bounds and elsewhere.

Sec. 6. The Moderator shall appoint at each annual session of the Association an Executive Committee composed of five members, whose appointment shall be approved by the body. Their duties shall be: First, to diligently enquire into the destitution within our bounds; second, to make contracts with ministers of the Gospel of this Association, or other Associations in correspondence with us, to supply such destitution with the Gospel; third, to draw from the treasury such funds as are available for missionary purposes to meet their contracts, and to exercise general supervision in the promotion of unity and brotherly love among the churches, and the universal spread of the Gospel throughout our bounds. They shall report the result of their labors at each annual session of the Association.

Sec. 7. The Moderator shall invite correspondents and visiting ministers and brethren to seats with the body when in session. They shall be entitled to the privilege of aiding the

Association with their counsel.

Sec. 8. This Association shall have the right to withdraw from any church that may be in disorder when the same can not be restored by Gospel discipline to the unity of faith in the

bonds of peace.

Sec. 9. The annual meeting of this Association shall be held at such time and place as may be designated by the body; and by appointment there shall be an Introductory Sermon preached the first day of the session at II o'clock, and on the Sabbath or last day of the session a collection taken up for missionary purposes.

Sec. 10. This Association shall not lord it over God's herit-

age, not infringe upon any of the internal rights of the churches,

but shall act only as an advisory body.

Sec. 11. This Constitution may be amended at any regular session of the Association by a two-thirds vote of all the messengers. Any amendment offered shall be in writing.

#### Articles of Faith.

I. We believe in one only true and living God, the Father, Son and Holy Spirit, and that these are one. See Matthew 28:19, 2 Corinthians 12:4-6.

2. We believe that the Old and New Testament Scriptures are the inspired word of God and the only rules of faith and

practice. See 2 Timothy 3:16-17.

We believe in election according to the foreknowledge of God, through sanctification of the Spirit and belief of the truth. 2 Thes. 2:13-14.

4. We believe that the grace of God that bringeth salvation

hath appeared unto all men, and that nothing prevents the salvation of the vilest sinner but his own voluntary rejection of

that grace. Isa. 55:1; Rev. 22:17, Acts 17:30.

5. We believe in the depravity of the human heart, and that the natural state of man is such that he can not prepare himself for divine favor without the assisting grace of God, enabling him to act according to the good pleasure of His divine will. Eph. 2:5; Matt. 18:11; John 4:10; 1 Cor. 3:5-7.

6. We believe in justification by faith, which gives peace with God, through our Lord Jesus Christ. Acts 13:99; Romans

- 7. We believe that the Gospel of Christ is a means of grace to bring sinners to repentance and faith in Jesus Christ, and therefore should be preached to all the world. John 3:16; Mark
- 8. We believe that all those who are regenerated by the Spirit of God, are made heirs of God and joint heirs with our Lord Jesus Christ; and that they are kept by the power of God through faith unto eternal salvation. John 8:31; I Peter 1:5; Rom. 8:28; Phil. 1:6.
- 9. We believe that baptism is the immersion of the whole body in water; that the only proper subjects are described in the preceding section, and the only proper administrators are those who have been regularly ordained by a church of Christ by the imposition of hands of a presbytery. Acts 8:36; Rom. 6:4. Read Timothy and Titus.
- 10. We believe that the Lord's Supper was instituted by Jesus Christ to be commemorated by His followers, and that none but baptized believers have a Scriptural right to partake thereof. Luke 22:18-19-20; 1 Cor. 14:26-28.
- 11. We believe in the resurfection of the righteous and the wicked, and that the wicked shall go away into everlasting punishment, but the righteous into life eternal. Acts 24:15; Matt. 25:46.

#### Rules of Decorum.

Article 1. At the first meeting of each annual session of the Association, the Moderator of the previous session shall call the messengers to order. In case of the absence of the Moderator, the Clerk shall call to order, when the messengers present may elect a Moderator pro tem., who shall preside until the letters from the churches are read, including the petitionary letters for membership, and the names of messengers are enrolled.

Art. 2. When the letters from the churches shall have been read and the names of messengers enrolled, they shall elect from the body, by ballot, a Moderator, a Clerk and a Treasurer, who shall serve for one year and until their successors shall be duly

Art. 3. Each day's session of the Association shall be open-

ed with prayer.

Art. 4. The Moderator shall preserve order and decide all questions in debate, subject to an appeal to the body; and when he shall speak on any subject in discussion he shall call some member to the chair, and in case of a tie shall give the deciding vote.

Art. 5. The Moderator shall appoint all committees, sub-

ject to approval by the body.

Art. 6. The Clerk shall keep a careful record of the proceedings of each meeting, and in the absence of the Moderator shall call the body together and preside until a Moderator pro tem, shall be elected.

Art. 7. All members wishing to speak on any subject shall arise and address the Moderator as "brother," and shall confine themselves strictly to the subject, and shall not be allowed to make any unkind allusion to a brother while speaking.

Art. 8. No motion shall be debated until seconded and

stated by the Moderator or read by the Clerk.

Art. 9. When a motion is under consideration no other motion shall be entertained except to adjourn, lay on the table, to amend, indefinitely postpone, refer to a committee or call for the previous question.

Art. 10. Any member voting with the majority on any question in debate may move a reconsideration at any time during

the session.

Art. 11. Visiting brethren and correspondents from other Associations of the same faith shall have a right to speak on any and all subjects under consideration, but shall not be entitled to vote.

Art. 12. No brother shall speak more than twice on a sub-

ject in debate without the consent of the Association.

Art. 13. The Rules of Decorum may be altered or amended at any regular session of the Association by a majority vote of the members of the body.
