#### Report on Orphanage

We are told in God's word that "Pure and undefiled religion before God and the Father is this: To visit the fatherless and the widows in their affliction and to keep himself unspoted from the world."

Our home for the unfortunate children was founded in Arcadia nineteen years ago. This institution sprang from a twofold purpose: (1) To relieve necessities by furnishing them food, clothing and shelter. (2) To train them in hearts, mind and bodies. Sustenance without training to meet and discharge the duties of life would be useless. We are told to "train up the child in the way he should go and when he is old he will not depart from it. This work can only be accomplished by an organized efforts on the part of the Baptists of the State. Therefore, we recommend:

1. That we support this institution by our love, sympathy and co-operation.

2. That we urge our pastors to keep this worthy object before their people and urge them to contribute cheerfully to this great institution because of what we may do for them and the blessing they may be to us when trained and developed for our denomination and the cause of Christ.

#### Report on Sunday Schools

Since the days of Robert Rakes and William Fox, the Sunday School has hald an important place in our religious life and activities for the training and developing of our youths into a systematic study of the word of God. It now occupies an important place in the work of the kingdom. Last year was the greatest in the history of our denomination, and yet, we fell far short of our privileges and opportunities. We should not be content until we have enlisted every boy, girl, man and woman in this noble uplifting and inspiring work. We should not be content until we have elisted every church, and see to it that they maintain a school each month in the year. We recommend, therefore:

 That our pastors and churches endeavor to maintain and suport a Sunday School throughout the entire year.

2. We suggest and urge the pastors and superintendents to have training classes at leat once during the year under the direction of the pastor, or some one suggested by our State Superintendent, Rev. W. W. Willian.

We further recommend, that our churches adopt, and use, whenever possible, the graded series published by our Sunday School Board located at Nashville, Tenn.

4. We further recommend that the schools observe when possible special days in order to promote and encourage our people to study and support the different objects fostered by our denomination.

5. We also recommend that a yearly canvass be made by the churches in order to enlist every man, woman, boy and girl in a study of the word of God, whether members, or those who should be reached for Christ.

#### Report on Publications

It is incumbent upon the Baptists of the South to give to the people the truth as to the teaching of Jesus Christ, and one of the greatest factors in giving this truth is thru the printed page. Equally true is the printed page a means of flooding Christendom with all forms of unsound religious literature, causing the faith of many to become uncertain, and this evil perils the nation today.

The Baptist Boards, under the direction of our great denominational leaders, have provided literature sound in teaching, attractive in form within easy reach of everybody; and a great many tracts furnished free by the Sunday School Board, and other departments of our work.

The "Home and Foreign Fields" published by the two boards is an illustrated magazine, considered by many as the greatest Mission Magazine ever published. Royal Service published by the Woman's Union is necessary to every member of the Woman's Organization, if they expect to keep informed as to the mission work and to enjoy the inspiration that comes from knowing the conditions and needs.

The Baptist Witness, our state paper, is a great paper and should be in the home of every Baptist in Beulah Association if we want to know of the great work of our own state.

The Committee recommends the extension of circulation of our denominational magazines and papers, and the Beulah Association urge its constituency to support them.

## Annual Report of President W. M. U. Beulah Association.

In a recent letter from Miss Mallory, she wrote of the beautiful fall foliage in Missouri. She said that just as God is with 12

Oh! that we might learn anew that God will go with us all the way in our work with the women and children and He will crown all that is right with splendid success. As we look over our year's work we feel encouraged that the work has gone forward and God has been with us and blessed the little we have been able to do.

It seems that the call to service was never clearer than now. Never was more imortant tasks awaiting us and the year ahead is overflowing with opportunities. We can be "laborers with God," if we are willing and have the same purpose with Him-the advancement of his Kingdom on earth. At the close of the second year as your W. M. U. President of Beulah Association, I do rejoice and thank our Father for some real progress in our work, but I realize how much more might have been done. I would emphasize again the resolutions of our W. M. U. Auxiliary to the S. B. C. She visited six churches, teaching Mission Study for both the women and children, except Ft. White, weather conditions preventing the work there. I went with her to Mt. Beulah and Ft. White teaching and heling to organize the Sunbeams at the former. Later on the Lake City W. M. S. assisted the Ft. White and Elim women to get organized. At our rally there, a Sunbeam Band was planned. Mrs. Baer taught ten classes giving 33 W. M. S. certificates and seals; 68 Sunbeams, 1 R. A., 3 G. A.'s and 3 Y. W. A.'s Miss Juliette Mather, our Young Peoples' Leader of the South gave two very interesting addresses in Lake City. Mrs. Peelman was indeed helpful at our first Rally at White Springs. I feel that another step forward has been our W. M. U. rallies. The first White Springs June 8, the other Sept. 30th at Ft. White. Many of our women have expressed how they enjoyed them. We hope to have one each quarter including our Associational Meeting. I do trust we can

get all the churches interested and to send delegates. Let us not forget to get all we can to subscribe to "Royal Service," the "Baptist Witness" and "Home and Foreign Fields," and tell all our young people and their leaders about their magazine, "World Comrades." I feel if we could get our people to reading these we would feel sure of their interest in all lines of work.

#### Report on Our Foreign Mission Work

The Foreign Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention conducts all of our Foreign Mission Work. With headquarters in Richmond, Va., its work of evangelism, teaching and of building chappels and churches extends beyond our own land to sixteen foreign countries. But our forces are small compared with the needs. In foreign lands 462 missionaries are employed, 253 of whom are in China, 28 in Japan and 98 in Brazil. The others-only 83-are laboring in the other 13 countries. Twothirds of the provinces of China are in the complete darkness of heathen ignorance, and the proportion of the people in China to each missionary is about as one preacher would be to each of our Southern states. On these foreign fields we have 624 churches and 64251 members. We have 694 schools with 26507 students, 971 Sunday Schools with 53691 scholars are reported. Reports also show nearly 8,000 baptisms on foreign fields, about 1000 more than ever before.

In view of the distressing needs, and with thought of the many unpaid pledges the situation is distressing, but enlargement of this work seems impossible unless our people make greater sacrifices.

During the year 1921 receipts of this board from Campaign pledges were nearly \$750,000.00 less than during the year before, when the total was nearly \$2,500,000, and it will be a dreadful situation if duplicated this year. We must not faulter in our mission to give the gospel to all the world.

"Behold the fields, they are white unto the harvest," is as true now as in the time when Jesus ministered on earth and gave the memorable command, "Go ye into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature."

#### Report on Home Missions

The Home Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention is the great inter-State Missionary Agency which works in co-operation with the various State Boards, in supplementing work that the State Boards find beyond their scope or ability.

The great cities, such as Birmingham, St. Louis, Baltimore,

New Orleans, and Tampa with their growing foreign populations; the country churches where Baptists are strong numerically, but where much development work is needed, and the work in Panama and Cuba is conducted by the Home Board.

The evangelistic work for this Board has been greatly blessed resulting in nearly 20000 baptisms among natives and foreigners.

The church extension work of the Board has aided with loans or gifts 824 churches while for lack of funds more than 1,000 calls for help were deferred.

The work of the Board was planned for 100 per cent enlargement in view of the pledges to the 75 Million Campaign, but on account of the financial depression and failure to collect on these pledges the Home Board now faces an indebtedness of over \$700,000.

It will take a greater realization of the need of sacrifices to pay these pledges, to save or relieve the Board from this distressing situation. Let us urge our churches and people to be loval and do their best.

#### State Missions

In making this report I shall quote some facts from the minutes of our last conventional year.

"According to the lastest figures available the population of Florida is 966,299. Of this number 324,856 belong to the various religious organizations, including Jews and Catholics. But in defining our territory for evangelistic efforts we must include both Jews and Catholics. We, therefore, find that we have in Florida a vast army of 688,775 souls who would be spoken of by the Apostle Paul as being "dead in trepasses and sin."

As we have 72,208 white Baptists in the State, we can readily see by a simple mathematical calculation what the individual task becomes. If each one should bring one individual to Christ each month during the year the entire South would be evangelized in twelve months.

We had last year 763 white Baptist churches in the State, with about 400 active pastors endeavoring to carry on the work

of the kingdom. The fruit and work of the pastors and Missionaries is tabulated as follows: Total membership reported last year, 65,094; Baptisms, 6,405; total membership last year 72,208; a net gain of 7,114.

We are grateful to God for what He has done for us in our various fields of activities. We realize when it comes to missions we cannot draw a line between home and foreign missions, for in the realm of moral obligations distance is not a factor. Therefore, we recommend:

1. That the pastors and churches of Beulah Association endeavor during the coming year to make great advances over all previous years in gifts to State Missions.

 That the pastors preach on Missions and the 75 Million Campaign, and endeavor to enlist every member in a systematic giving to this great cause.

3. That we may be more diligent in practicing and preaching on the "Stewardship of Life" as set forth by our Lord that we may hasten the day "When the kingdoms of this world shall become the kingdom of our Lord and His Christ."

Resolution Read by C. M. Ray

We, the Messengers attending Beulah Baptist Asso-

ciation express our sympathy and regret to Bro. J. R. Eubanks that he could not be with us and pray for his speedy recovery. Adopted.

After singing "God Be With Us Till We Meet Again" the Association adjourned.

#### V Constitution

Section 1. This Association shall be known as the Beulah Baptist Association.

Section 2. This Association shall be composed of Messengers selected by the several churches connected with the Association. Each church shall be entitled to one Messenger at large and one for every twenty-five members or majority fraction thereof.

Section 3. Any regularly organized Baptist Church of the same faith may become a member of this Association upon application by a petitionary letter and Messenger as above provided.

Section 4. This Association shall at their regular meeting elect from their members by ballot, a Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer who shall serve for one year.

Section 5. The object of this Association shall be: First, to promote unity and brotherly love among the Churches; second to promote gospel discipline; to encourage the universal spread of the Gospel and practical religion throughout our bounds and elsewhere.

Section 6. The Moderator shall appoint at each annual session of the Association an Executive Committee composed of six members, whose appointment shall be approved by the body, Their duties shall be: First, to inquire into destitution within our bounds; second, to make contracts with the Ministers of the Gospel of this Association, of other As ociations in correspondence with us, to supply such destitution with the Gospel; third, to draw from the treasury such funds as are available for missionary purposes to meet their contracts, and to exercise general supervision in the promotion of unity and brotherly love among the Churches and the universal spread of the Gospel throughout our bounds. They shall report the result of their labors at each annual session of the Association.

Section 7. The Moderator shall invite corresondents and visiting ministers and brethren to seats with the body when in ses-

sion. They shall be entitled to the privilege of aiding the Association with their counsel.

Section 8. This Association shall have the right to withdraw from any church that may be in disorder when the same cannot be restored by Gospel discipline to the unity of faith in the bonds of peace.

Section 9. The annual meetings of this Association shall be held at such time and place as may be designated by the body; and by appointment there shall be an introductory sermon preached the first day off the session at 11 o'clock, and on the Sabbath; or last day of the session, a collection taken up for missionary purposes.

Section 10. This Association shall not lord it over God's heritage nor infringe upon any of the internal rights of the churches, but shall act only as an advisory body.

Section 11. This Constitution may be amended at any regular session of the Association by a two-thirds vote of all messengers. Any amendment offered shall be in writing.

Amendment 1. This Association shall take an offering during its sessions to defray the expenses of the Executive Committee, for printing, postage, etc. Approved October 1920.

Amendment 2. The Executive Committee of this Association shall hereafter be composed of eight members. Approved November 1921.

#### Articles of Faith

- We believe in one only true and living God, the Father Son and Holy Spirirt, and that these are one. See Matthew 28:19.
- 2. We believe that the Old and New Testament Scriptures are the inspired Word of God and the only rules of faith and practice. 2 Timothy 3-17.
- 3. We believe in election according to the fore-knowledge of God, through sanctification of the Spirit and belief of the truth. 2nd. Thes. 2:13.
- 4. We believe that the grace of God that bringeth salvation hath appeared unto all men, and that nothing prevents the salvation of the vilest sinner but his own voluntary rejection of that grace. Isa. 55:1; Rev. 22:17; Act 17:30.
  - 5. We believe in the depravity of the human heart, and that

the natural state of man is such that he cannot prepare himself for divine favor without the assisting grace of God, enabling him to act according to the good pleasure of His Divine Will. Eph. 2:5; Matt. 18:11; John 4:10; First Cor. 3:5-7.

6. We believe in justification by faith, which gives peace with God, through our Lord Jesus Christ. Rom. 5:1-2.

7. We believe that the Gospel of Christ is a means of grace to bring sinners to repentance and faith in Jesus Christ, and therefore should be preached to all the world. John 3:16.

8. We believe that all those who are regenerated by the Spirit of God are made heirs of God and joint heirs with our Lord Jesus Christ, and that they are kept by the power of God through faith unto eternal salvation. 1 Peter 1:5; Rom. 8:28; Phi. 1:6.

9. We believe that baptism is the immersion of the whole body in water; that the only roper subjects are described in the preceding section, and the only proper administrators are those who have been regularly ordained by a church of Christ, by the imposition of hands of a resbytery. Acts 8:36; Rom. 6:4; Read Timothy and Titus.

10. We believe that the Lord's Supper was instituted by Jesus Christ to be commemorated by His followers and that none but baptised believers have a Scriptural right to partake thereof. Luke 22:18, 19, 20; 1. Cor. 14:26-28.

11. We believe in the resurrection of the righteous and the wicked, and that the wicked shall go away into everlasting punishment, but the righteous into eternal life. Acts 24:15.

#### Rules for Decorum

Article 1. At the first meeting of each annual session of the Association, the Moderator of the previous session shall call the Messengers to order. In case of the absence of the Moderator, the Clerk shall call to order, when the Messengers present may elect a Moderator pro tem, who shall preside until the letters from the churches are read, and the names of the Messengers are enrolled.

Article 2. When the letters from the Churches shall have been read and the names of Messengers enrolled, they shall elect from the body, by ballot, a Moderator, a Clerk and a Treasurer, who shall serve for one year and until their successors shall be duly elected.

Article 3. Each day's session of the Association shall be opened with prayer,

Article 4. The Moderator shall preserve order and decide all questions in debate, subject to an appeal to the body; and when he shall speak on any subject in discussion, he shall call some member to the chair, and in case of a tie, shall give the deciding vote.

Article 5. The Moderator shall appoint all committees, subject to approval by the body.

Article 6. The Clerk shall keep a careful record of the proceedings of each meeting, and in the absence of the Moderator shall call the body together and preside until a Moderator protem shall be elected.

Article 7. All members wishing to speak on any subject shall arise and address the Moderator as "brother," and shall confine themselves strictly to the subject and shall not be allowed to make an unkind allusion to a brother while speaking.

Article 8. No motion shall be debated until seconded and stated by the Moderator or read by the Clerk.

Article 9. When a motion is under consideration no other motion shall be entertained except to adjourn, lay on the table, to amend, indefinitely postpone, refer to a committee, or call for the previous question.

Article 10. Any member voting with the majority on any question in debate may move a reconsideration at any time during the session.

Article 11. Visiting brethren and correspondents of any other associations of the same faith shall have a right to speak on any and all subjects under consideration, but shall not be entitled to vote.

Article 12. No brother shall speak more than twice on a subject in debate without the consent of the Association.

Article 13. These rules of Decorum may be altered or amended at any regular session of the Association by a majority vote of the members of the body.
