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CONSTITUTION

Section 1. This Association shall be known as the Beulah Baptist Association.

Section 2. This Association shall be composed of Messengers selected by the several churches connected with the Association. Each church shall be entitled to one Messenger at large and one for every twenty-five members or majority fraction thereof.

Section 3. Any regularly organized Baptist Church of the same faith may become a member of this Association upon application by a petitionary letter and Messenger as above provided.

Section 4. This Association shall at a regular meeting elect from their members by ballot, a Moderator, Vice Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer, who shall serve for one year.

Section 5. The object of this Association shall be: First, to promote unity and brotherly love among the Churches; second, to promote Gospel discipline; to encourage the universal spread of the Gospel and practical religion throughout our bounds and elsewhere.

Section 6. The Moderator shall appoint at each annual session of the Association an Executive Committee composed of eight members whose appointment shall be approved by the body. Their duties shall be: First, to inquire into destitution within our bounds; second, to make contracts with the Ministers of the Gospel of this Association, or other Associations in correspondence with us; to supply such destitution with the Gospel; third, to draw from the treasury such funds as are available for missionary purposes to meet their contracts, and to exercise general supervision in the promotion of unity and brotherly love among the Churches and the universal spread of the Gospel throughout our bounds. They shall report the results of their labors at each annual session of the Association.

Section 7. The Moderator shall invite correspondents and visiting ministers and brethren to seats with the body when in session. They shall be entitled to the privilege of aiding the Association with their counsel.

Section 8. This Association shall have the right to withdraw from any church that may be in disorder when the same cannot be restored by Gospel discipline to the unity of faith in the bonds of peace.

Section 9. The annual meetings of this Association shall be held at such time and place as may be designated by the body; and by appointment there shall be an introductory sermon preached the first day of the session at 11 o'clock, and on the Sabbath, or last day of the session, a collection taken up for missionary purposes.

Section 10. This Association shall not lord it over God's heritage nor infringe upon any of the internal rights of churches, but shall act only as an advisory body.

Section 11. This Constitution may be amended at any regular session of the Association by a two-thirds vote of all messengers. Any amendment offered shall be in writing.

ARTICLES OF FAITH

- We believe in one only true and living God, the Father, Son and Holy Spirit, and that these are one. (See Matt. 28:19.)
- 2. We believe that the Old and New Testament Scriptures re the inspired Word of God and the only rules of faith and practice. (2 Timothy 3:17.)
- 3. We believe in election according to the foreknowledge of God, through sanctification of the Spirit and belief of the truth. (2nd Thea. 3:13.)
- 4. We believe that the Grace of God that bringeth salvation hath appeared unto all men, and that nothing prevents the salvation of the vilest sinner but his own voluntary rejection of that Grace. (Isa. 55:1; Rev. 22:17; Acts 17:30.)
- 5. We believe in the depravity of the human heart, and that the natural state of man is such that he cannot prepare himself for divine favor without the assisting grace of God, enabling him to act according to the good pleasure of His Divine Will. (Eph. 2:5; Matt 18:11; John 4:10; First Cor. 3:5-7.)
- 6. We believe in justification by faith, which gives peace with God, through our Lord Jesus Christ. (Romans 5:1-2.)
- 7. We believe that the Gospel of Christ is a means of grace to bring sinners to repentance and faith in Jesus Christ, and therefore should be preached to all the world. (John 3:16.)
- 8. We believe that all those who are regenerated by the Spirit of God are made heirs of God and joint heirs with our Lord Jesus Christ, and that they are kept by the power of God through faith unto eternal Salvation. (1 Peter 1:5; Rom. 8:28; Phi. 1:6.)
- 9. We believe that baptism is the immersion of the whole body in water; that the only proper subjects are described in the preceding section, and the only proper administrators are those who have been regularly ordained by a church of Christ, by the imposition of hands of a presbytery. (Acts 8:36; Rom. 6:4; Read Timothy and Titus.)
- 10. We believe that the Lord's Supper was instituted by Jesus Christ to be commemorated by His followers and that none but baptized believers have a Scriptural right to partake thereof. (Luke 22:18, 19, 20; I Cor. 14:26-28.)
- 11. We believe in the resurrection of the righteous and the wicked, and that the wicked shall go away into everlasting punishment, but the righteous into eternal life. (Acts 24:15.)

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FIFTY-FIFTH SESSION

RULES OF DECORUM

Article 1. At the first meeting of each session of the Association, the Moderator of the previous session shall call the Messengers to order, when the Messengers may elect a Moderator pro tem, who shall preside until the letters from the churches are read, and the names of the Messengers are enrolled. In case of absence of the Moderator the Clerk shall call to order.

Article 2. When the letters from the Church shall have been read and the names of the Messengers enrolled, they shall elect from the body, by ballot, a Moderator, a Clerk, and a Treasurer, who shall serve for one year and until their successors shall be duly elected.

Article 3. Each day's session of the Association shall be opened with prayer.

Article 4. The Moderator shall preserve order and decide all questions in debate, subject to an appeal to the body; and when he shall speak on any subject in discussion, he shall call some member to the chair, and in case of a tie, shall give the deciding vote.

Article 5. The Moderator shall appoint all committees, subject to approval by the body.

Article 6. The Clerk shall keep a careful record of the proceedings of each meeting, and in the absence of the Moderator shall call the body together and preside until a Moderator pro tem shall be elected.

Article 7. All members wishing to speak on any subject shall arise and address the Moderator as "Brother," and shall confine themselves surictly to the subject and shall not be allowed to make an unkind allusion to any brother while speaking.

Article 8. No motion shall be debated until seconded and stated by the Moderator or read by the Clerk.

Article 9. When a motion is under consideration no other motion shall be entertained except to adjourn, lay on the table, to amend, indefinitely postpone, refer to committee, or call for the previous question.

Article 10. Any member voting with the majority on any question in debate may move a reconsideration at any time during the session.

Article 11. Visiting brethren of other Associations may speak on any subject, but shall not vote.

Article 12. No brother shall speak more than twice on a subject without the consent of the Association.

Article 13. These rules of Decorum may be altered or amended at any regular session of the Association by a majority vote of the mem-

THURSDAY, SEPTEMBER 27-FIRST DAY

10:00 A. M. Devotional was conducted by Rev. W. N. Cone.

10:15 A. M. The Association was called to order by

- 1. Rev. W. T. Halstead, Vice-Moderator. Messengers were en-
- All Associational officers were re-elected by acciamation: Rev. John Dicks, Moderator, Rev. W. T. Halstead, vice-Moderator, C. M. Ray, Clerk, and E. A. McColskey, Treasurer.
- 3. Visitors were recognized, and welcomed, as follows: Dr. C. M. Brittain, Secretary Baptist State Board of Missions, Jacksonville, Fla.; Rev. J. E. Evans and Rev. B. F. Brooks of Wellborn, Fla.; Rev. T. O. Reese, State Evangelist, and Dr. E. D. Solomon, Editor of the Florida Baptist Witness.
- 4. The acting Moderator read the printed program, and appointed the following a committee on Revision: Rev. T. W. Allen, Mrs. E. A. McColskey and T. A. Fellows. Later this committee reported no change.
- 5. Prof. T. W. Johns, Supt. of the Children's Home in Arcadia, was recognized at this time.
- Rev. T. W. Allen was called, to the chair to preside while Rev.
 W. T. Halstead read the report on the Co-Operative Program.
- (On account of a shortage of funds to pay for printing only a synopsis of this, and other committee reports, can be printed in the minutes.)

As shown in the Report on the co-operative, or Unified Program, this is the method planned, and fostered by Southern Baptists in our organized work. It provides for the collection, and the most reasonable and practical division of our mission and benevolent funds. The Baptist Co-Operative Program is the best plan yet devised for supporting all of the causes fostered by Southern Baptists. It calls for God's people to bring to God's house, on God's day, for God's Work, a minimum of one-tenth of the net income of everybody.

The every member canvass is advised and urged for all of our churches.

The report was adopted.

8. The report on missions—State, Home and Foreign—was read by Mrs. H. W. Markham.

This report presented the cause of missions in our state, in the homeland, and in foreign fields, and shows the duty of every Baptist to support Missions in every field. Indeed missions by whatever name should be supported by all of our people, and a fair distribution of our offerings is made through the Unified Program. The report was adopted.

- 9. Dr. Brittain was given the floor to discuss the foregoing reports. This he did, and also gave an interesting and instructive account of the Baptist World Alliance which he and Mrs. Brittain attended recently in Berlin, Germany.
- At the conclusion of Dr. Brittain's mission address an offering was taken for the Unified Program amounting to \$19.27.
- 11. Dr. E. D. Solomon asked to be given time to speak on Prohibition, and on motion he was given 30 minutes, to begin at 1:30 p. m., today.

Adjourned for lunch.

- 1:30 p. m. Rev. John Dicks, Moderator, presiding.
- 12. Dr. Solomon made an earnest plea for all Baptists and Christians to unite against the efforts of the wets to repeal the 19th Amendment to our State Constitution, and prevent the legalization of the sale of hard liquors in Florida.
- 13. At this time leaflets were distributed containing brief statements of results of the repeal of the 18th Amendment—a true and convincing presentation.
 - 14. Committees were appointed as follows:

Committee on Nominations: Rev. W. T. Halstead, J. J. Swails and E. A. McColskey.

Committee on Resolutions: J. J. Swails, Rev. C. R. Roberts, Rev. T. W. Allen.

- The report on the Children's Home was called for, but that report was not ready.
- 16. On motion, Prof. Johns, Superintendent of the Children's Home at Arcadia, spoke of the conditions at the home, and expressed appreciation for our help.
- The Report on the Woman's Missionary Union was read by Mrs. J. W. Bowden.

18. After a motion to adopt, Mrs. Bowden gave an interesting talk on the organized work of our women.

Summary of report:

"We have five societies with a membership of 143, and we feel that new interest has been aroused that will show results; however, we are leaving the results to the Lord.

"During the past year, we have had the whole-hearted co-operation of some of our pastors, and we can't say how much we appreciate this. We will have a complete report at our annual meeting in Lake City, October 6th. This report does not include the personal service by the different societies, but quite a bit has been done, and we are sure much good has been accomplished through personal service."

Report was adopted.

19. Mrs. C. M. Brittain was recognized, and by invitation spoke on the W. M. U. work, and Mrs. C. M. Ray read minutes of the first W. M. U., when the Associational Union was organized at Elim (this church) thirty years ago.

20. A committee was named on the 100,000 Club, report to be read Friday morning: B. H. Groover, chairman; D. C. Albritton and Rev. W. N. Cone.

Adjourned.

FRIDAY, SEPTEMBER 28TH

10:00 A. M. Devotional was led by Rev. C. L. Clements.

21. Other Messengers were enrolled.

22. The Report on Resolutions was read by J. J. Swails. This report contains five important recommendations, which were considered

"Report of the Committee on Resolutions.

"We, your committee, recommend as follows:

"First, that as many of our Sunday Schools as possible adopt the plan of giving a liberal offering each month to the Orphans' Home.

'Second, that the Executive Committee perfect an Association-wide organization for gathering a truck-load of needed supplies for the home to be sent in January.

"Third, we recommend that a Committee be appointed to arrange an Association-wide rally in the interest of Prohibition and Temperance at the earliest date possible."

"Fourth, we recommend that all of our Churches co-operate in the Every-Member canvass in November.

Fifth, we also recommend for more favorable consideration the One Hundred Thousand Club."

 These several resolutions were discussed by T. E. Getzen, Rev. W. T. Halstead, Rev. John Dicks and J. J. Swails.

Report adopted.

24. The report on the One Hundred Thousand Club, prepared by B. H. Groover, was read by Rev. W. T. Halstead, and pending adoption was discussed by Rev. W. T. Halstead and Rev. John Dicks.

Summary of Report:

"The debt of the Foreign Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention slightly exceeds \$1,000,000.00, and other agencies of this Board owe considerable amounts.

"The Baptist Hundred Thousand Club is a movement to pay all of this indebtedness, the plan being to enlist 100,000 individuals to pledge, and pay \$1.00 per month until said indebtedness shall have been paid. The movement is well under way, and deserves careful consideration and support in every Association.

"To ignore the movement is not a worthy course for any Baptist Church."

26. The report on Sunday Schools was read by C. G. Campbell, Superintendent of the Lake City Baptist Sunday School, and with motion pending to adopt, the report was discussed by th eauthor.

Summary of report:

"The importance of Christian Education is very obvious. It is more effective and far-reaching if attained in early life. The Bible is the foundation of that education. The Sunday School is the most important activity of the Church. Our Church leadership must be from the Sunday School.

"Of the 23 Churches in Beulah Association, nine report no Sunday

School. We urge that our Churches begin now to promote a determined effort to build our Sunday Schools up to the standard to which they are entitled."

27. The Committee on a Temperance Rally was announced. Rev. W. T. Halstead, C. M. Ray, J. J. Swails, O. L. Carver, Rev. W. N. Cone, E. A. McColskey, and C. G. Campbell.

28. The Report of the Committee on Nominations was read by Rev. W. T. Halstead, and adopted.

(This report is embodied in our Associational Directory.)

The invitation of Mt. Beulah Church to the Association for the next annual meeting was accepted by a rising vote.

29. The report on the B. Y. P. U. by A. J. Rountree was read by Rev. C. L. Clements. After motion to adopt, the report was discussed by Rev. C. L. Clements, and Rev. John Dicks.

Summary of report:

"The greatest asset that our Churches possess is our young people. We believe that the B. Y. P. U. develops the Church and denominational loyalty. In training in giving, Bible study Missions and devotional living the B. Y. P. U. does an important work.

"We have some 1342 Unions, with 22,000 young people being trained for church membership and work. Last year there was an increase of nine percent in the territory of the Southern Baptist Convention.

"It is our conviction that the lack of organization in Association and in the Churches, should put us to shame, and cause action among all who love young people." Report was signed, A. J. Rountree. Ad-

30. The Report on Temperance and Prohibition was read by Rev. C. L. Clements. After motion to adopt the report was discussed briefly by Rev. C. L. Clements, Rev. John Dicks, C. M. Ray and T. E. Getzen.

Summary of report:

"I think that every Christian should think more strongly about the coming election, November 6th, and vote dry, as it is every Christian's

"Many states have tried repeal, and have found it a failure. Drunkenness has increased 50 percent in Florida on beer alone. What if we

"The Baptists have organized a Prohibition Committee to help make this fight. Florida Baptists should support their efforts, and the Florida Baptist Witness will be a great help in this cause." Signed, C.

Report adopted.

31. The Report on Christian Education, by Rev. J. R. Eubanks (in the absence of Bro. Eubanks on account of sickness) was read by Rev.

The report was adopted without discussion.

Some of the points in this report are: Commendation of our Baptist schools, where our children get the best in spiritual and physical training.

Our Kingdom program cannot be complete without Christian Education.

America needs Christian Education as never before,

For higher education Stetson University is especially commended.

"Let's rally to the support of Christian Education!"

The report was signed by Rev. J. R. Eubanks.

32. The Report on Ministerial Relief and Annuities was prepared by T. A. Fellows, and read by Rev. C. L. Clements. The report was discussed by Rev. John Dicks and adopted.

Some points in this report are: "The Ministerial Relief and Annuity Board was organized by the Southern Baptist Convention in 1918. Its purpose is to help aged ministers and their needy wives and widows of Baptist ministers.

"Gifts to this Board worthy of special mention are, \$100,000 given by the Sunday School Board the first year, and John D. Rockefeller has given \$1,000,000.00.

"The assets of the Board now amount to over \$4,000,000.00. This is endowment, and the interest is disbursed to needy beneficiaries.

"All of the money now given by the Churches goes to relief purposes except the small overhead expense.

"Money that goes to this Board through the Co-operative Program is used only for the relief of aged ministers and their widows, none of it being used for annuities.

"The hope is expressed that other wealthy friends can be found who will contribute large amounts as a few have in the past, and thus enlarge the benefits.

"The suggestion is made to Churches that they might want to give eight percent of their budgets or some other small amount for the benefit of aged ministers."

Report was signed, T. A. Fellows,

- 33. A Resolution of Thanks was extended to Elim Church, also to Fort White and Shiloh Churches (associated) for their generous hospitality. Approved by rising vote.
- 34. A Resolution was read coming from Bethlehem Church, suggesting that the Churches of this Association adopt some means of financial aid for Rev. J. R. Eubanks.

- 35. The Moderator appointed Rev. S. F. Young, Lee Edenfield and Ott Carver a committee to consider and act on the matter.
- 36. The Report on Obituaries was read by Rev. W. N. Cone. This shows that twenty members of our Churches have been called to their reward, and recommends that a Memorial Page be set apart in our minutes to their memory. (See Memorial Page.)
- 37. After the song, "Blest Be The Tie," and Prayer, the Association adjourned to meet with the Mt. Beulah Church, September 26-27, 1935.
