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CONSTITUTION

Section 1. This Association shall be known as the Beulah Baptist Association.

Section 2. This Association shall be composed of selected by the several churches connected with the Each hurch shall be entitled to one Messenger at large and one for every twenty-five members or majority fraction thereof.

Section 3. Any regular organized Baptist church of the same faith may become a member of this Association upon application by a petitionary letter and Messengers as above provided.

Section 4. On the second or last day of the Annual Session, the Association shall from its membership elect by ballot a Moderator, Vice Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer whose terms of office shall begin with the adjournment of the body and extend through the next year and through the sessions of next year.

Section 5. The object of this Association shall be: First to promote unity and brotherly love among the churches second to promote Gospel dicipline, to encourage the universal spread of the Gospel and practical religion throughout our bounds and elsewhere.

Section 6. The Moderator shall appoint at each Annual Session of the Association an Executive Committee composed of one member from each church connected with the Association. Each church is expected and is urged to recommend its members on this committee. Resident pastors, heads of the Associational Training Union, Sunday Schools, Woman's Missionary Union, and Brotherhood departments together with the elected officers of the Association shall be exoffico members of the committee Their duties shall be: First to inquire into destituton within our bounds; second to make contact with the Ministers of the Gospel of this Association, or other Association, by correspondence to supply destitution with the Gospel; third, to draw fro mthe treasury such funds as are available for missionary purposes to meet their contract and to exercise general supervision in the promotion of unit and brotherly love among the churcches and the universal spread of the Gospel throughout our bounds. They shall report the results of their labors at each an-

nual session of the association.

Section 7. The Moderator shall invite correspondence and visiting ministers and brethern to seats with the body when in session They shall be entitled to the privilige of aiding the Association with their counsel.

Section 8. This Association shall have the right to from any church that may be in disorder when the same cannot be

restored by Gospel discipline to the unity of faith in the bonds of peace.

Section 9. The Annual Meeting of this Association shall be held at such time and place as may be designated by the body; and by appointment there shall be an introductory sermon preached the first day of the session at 11 o'clock, and a collection taken up for missionary purposes on Sunday or the last day.

Section 10. This Association shall not lord it over God's heritage nor infringe upon any of the internal rights of churches, but shall act only as an advisory body.

Section 11. This Constitution may be amended at any regular session of the Association by t two-thirds vote of messengers. Any ammendment offered shall be in writing.

RULES OF DECORUM

Article 1. At the first meeting of each session of the Association the Moderator shall call the Messengers to order; the letters from the churches shall be presented and the names of the Messengers enrolled. In case of the absence of the Moderator, the Vice Moderator or Clerk shall call to order.

Article 2. Each, day's session of the Association shall be opened with prayer.

Article 3. The Moderator shall preserve order and decide all questions in debate, subject to an appeal of the body; and when he shall speak on any subject in discussion he shall call some member to the chair, and in case of a tie shall give the deciding vote.

Article 4. The Moderator shall appoint all committees, subject to approval by the body.

Article 5. The Clerk shall keep a careful record of the proceedings of each meeting, prepare and edit the Minutes for printing. In the absence of the Moderator and the Vice Moderator, he shall call the body together and preside until a Moderator pro tem shall be elected.

Article 6. All members wishing to speak on any subject shall rise and address the Moderator as "Brother." and shall confine themselves strictly to the subject and shall not be allowed to make an unkind allusion to any brother while speaking.

Article 7. No motion shall be debated until seconded and stated by the moderator or read by the clerk.

Article 8. When a motion is under consideration no other motion shall be entertained except—to adjourn, lay on—the table, to amend, indefinitely postpone, refer to committee, or call for the previous question.

Article 9. Any member voting with the majority on any question in debate may move a reconsideration at any time during the session.

Article 10. Visiting brethren of other Associations may speak on any subject, but shall not vote.

Article 11. No brother shall speak more than twice on a subject without the consent of the Association.

Article 12. These Rules of Decorum may be altered or amended at any regular session of the Association by a majority vote of the members of the body.

ARTICLES OF FAITH

1. We believe in one only true and living God, the Father, Son and Holy Spirit, and that they are one. (See Matt. 28-29)

2. We believe that the Old and New Testament Scriptures are the inspired Word of God and the only rules of faith and practice. (2 Timothy 3:17.)

3. We believe in the election according to the foreknowledge of God through sanctification of the Spirit and belief of the truth. (2

4. We believe that the Grace of God that bringeth salvation hath appeared unto all men, and that nothing prevents the salvation of the vilest sinner but his own voluntary rejection of that Grace. (Isa. 55:1; Rev. 22:17; Acts 17:30.)

5 We believe in the depravity of the human heart, and that the natural state of man is such that he cannot prepare himself for divine favors without the assisting grace of God, enabling him act according to the good pleasure of His Divine Will. (Eph. 2:6; Matt. 18'11; John 4:10; 1 Cor. 3:5-7.)

6. We believe in justification of faith, which gives peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ. (Rom 5:1-2).

7. We believe that the Gospel of Christ is a means of grace to bring sinners to repentance and faith in Jesus Christ, and therefore should be preached to all the world. (John 3:16.)

8. We believe that all those who are regenerated by the Spirit of God are made heirs of God and joint heirs with our Lord Jesus Christ and that they are kept by the power of God through faith unto eternal Salvation. (Peter 1:5; Rom 8:22; Phil, 1-6).

9. We believe that baptism is the immersion of the whole body

in water; that the only proper subjects are described in preceding section, and the only proper administrators are those who have been regularly ordained by a Church of Christ, by the imposition of hands of a presbytery. Acts 8:36; Rom 6:4; Read Tim. and Titus.)

16. We believe that the Lord's Supper was instituted by Jesus Christ to be commemorated by His followers and that none but baptised believers have a Spiritual right to partake thereof. (Luke 22:18, 19, 20; Cor. 14:26-28.)

11. We believe in the resurrection of the righteous and the wicked, and that the wicked shall go away into everlasting punishment, but the righteous into eternal life. (Acts 25:15.)

REPORT ON STATE, HOME AND FOREIGN MISSIONS . EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

In giving this report we will offer it as listed in divisional order.

STATE MISSIONS

Our state mission work in Florida, no doubt, has been hindered in many respects because of man power shortages and vacancies that has been made because of these trying days through which we are all passing. Workers are as hard to secure in our denominational program as they are in the industrial world. No doubt, our greatest loss sustained in our mission work in our state was the loss of our executive seccretary and treasurer of our state mission board, Dr. C. H. Bolton, who resigned his honorable position to go back into the pastorale. However, we feel that God is wonderfully blessing this work and we are looking forward to a great record at the end of the year when our gifts and our evangelistic successes, our Sunday School, B. T. U. work, and Extention work in Kingdom building report. Therefore, we feel that our people should be greatly encouraged and that we shall set ourselves to greater achievements as we face the future with its widening opportunities.

HOME MISSIONS

As it is impossible and impractical to give a report of this work that would cover its many phases to our association, we, therefore, can only hope to impress you with the sacred responsibility of this

This is our masters command that we witness for Him in our Judea and to the utermost parts of the earth. Certainly we should

be true to this chance at all times, in season and out of season; but especially at this time when we think of the vast opportunities that we now have and the greater ones that are on the way. May we try to connect ourselves personally with this work and accept a personal responsibility in our home mission task. We are not to think of it as the work of Dr. J. B. Lawrence or the work of a board but it is God's work assigned to us and as christians we have an individual responsibility.

We would recommend that our churches make much of the special Educational day in our Sunday Schools so that our people may be instructed and inspired to rally to the support of our home missions work, especially at this time when we are planning to win a million souls to Christ next year. As an expression to God for a hundred years of his divine guidance and blessing. May we all have a part in this work.

FOREIGN MISSIONS

Foreign missions should lay more heavily on our hearts than ever before and we should be more impressed than ever of its importance. We have been taught the lesson by this cruel war that nations cannot live to themselves any more, that seas tinents do not form barriers between nations but that they connecting corridders that ties the world together. The war has done much to hinder missionary work in many parts of the world but like Paul's infirmaties, when this war is over, we believe that if we are prepared to take care of our opportunities that we can ithas turned out for the furtherence of the gospel.

Our people today are planning post war programs to keep the world from suffering after the war, such as industrial extention, employment, social, and economical programs. Many plans are in the making, therefore, we too, should be on the alert for the children of light should be wiser than the children of the world.

Our foreign mission board which is entirely out of debt is planning to put forth the greatest missionary program of service that the world has ever known. When these awful days are over and the call comes to heal humanity's hurt, we must be in a position to answer the callange and meet the needs of a stricken humanity. It is necessary in order to accomplish the task to enlist every church and very pastor and all our people and their resources both spiritual and material. May we all get the vision and then transform it into life.

ASSOCIATIONAL REPORT OF THE FLORIDA BAPTIST CHILDREN'S HOME, 1944

Our Home at Arcadia has had two excellent years in its financial program. In keeping with many of our denominational agencies it has been laying aside all surplus for a post war program. We must remodel two of our dormitories at the earliest possible time and involved in remodeling and building will be more than fifty thousand dollars. These improvements will be made as soon as possible. It is the hope of our Superintendent to make these repairs and erect the new buildings without a special campaign.

We have one hundred eighteen (118) children in the Home. The increased earning power of our people has made it possible for relatives to keep more of our dependent children in their homes. This should be an incentive for us to give more now and keep giving, as it shows that people will take care of children when they can, and when they find it impossible we should be ready to step in and help prevent any child in our edenomination coming to want.

The educational program, both secular and religious, is paramount in our Home. Our children go to the city schools and to the First Baptist Church in Arcadia. They make their contribution to the life of the school and community. We have three young people in Stetsen this year.

The Home always does its utmost to develop leadership in our boys and girls. They teach Sunday School classes, work in Training Union and assist in all phases of church life. A program for the development of our children and young people that majors on the scholastic ability of the child and the spiritual developmeent of his soul is worthy of the support of every Christian organization as well as every individual everywhere.

2. Report of Committee on Christian Education and Literature was read by its Chairman, Rev. Hugh Walters, who moved the adoption of the report. Bro. Walters made a few pertinent remarks and was followed by Dr. W. S. Allen, President of Stetson University, who gave a splendid account of the work being done by Stetson and giving some idea of their plans for the future. He made an appeal for funds for the endowment and urged that Baptist homes send their children to Stetson.

The Report was adopted.

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION AND LITERATURE

It is with the dark dismal war clouds that hover over us today that cause us to look out in the future for our world of tomorrow.

As we think of the growth, development, and vast increase in knowledge, machinery and our social world we are caused to pause and bow in reverence and thanksgiving to God for our freedom of religion and growth in religious education.

It is through our Christian Schools, colleges, and universities and seminaries that we as Baptists and Christians place our hope and trust for the generation to come to develop fine Christian ideals, principals, and goals for life and the development of Christian character.

Surely if as Baptists we do not give our whole hearted support to these Christian institutions, such as our own dearly beloved Stetson University of DeLand, Florida, where will they get their support?

In these Christian colleges and universities your boys and girls are under Christian leaders who make for better character and life. And surely our Christian literature has a large part to play in giving to us that well rounded and steadfast Christian faith and character. Literature such as our own State paper, The Florida Baptist Witness."

Let us support these agencies of christian education and character. And as our Stetson University has now launched a million dollar campaign for the purpose of enlarging their buildings and equiping them with proper equipment. It gives us the privelige of sharing with them their growth and expansion.

May I take this opportunity to humbly and reverently most ferverently solicit your help and cooperation with us in this and

other movements to increase the development of Christian Education.

3. At this time Bro. Report of Committee on Brotherhood work was read by Bro.T. Wattles who moved its adoption.

Dr. J. Harrison Griffin, State Brotherhood Secretary told of thir work and urged that all the Churches in this Association organize and maintain active Brotherhoods for better Church work.

The report was adopted.

6. Miscellaneous Business.

Rev. S. F. Beard offered a motion that a Committee be appointed to set up a camp for an Associational Assembly (Suggesting Camp O'Lena). Such Assembly to be conducted ten days. Five days to be given to Sunday School work and five given to B. T. U. work. The nights to be used for an inspirational program.

That the Committee be empowed to set the time, prepare a program, select a study course, contact the Churches for delegates, contact the State Board for State workers, appoint a manager for the Assembly and work out a financial plan to bear the expense of the Assembly.

Bro. Beard accepted an amendment to allow the W. M. U. and Brotherhoods to send delegates if they so desired.

The motion was adopted—the Committee to be appointed later.

Supt. Johns of the Orphanage told of the various ways the Churches could help in the orphanage work.

A telegram was read by the clerk from Bro. C. R. Roberts,

Moderator of the Association, expressing his regrets at not being able to attend the meeting and offering his prayers and best wishes for a successful meeting.

WEDNESDAY NIGHT-8:15 P. M.

Meeting called to order by Moderator.

- After a song service the Devotional Service was led by Bro.

- Bro. J. G. Parnell, Associational Sunday School Superintendent, gave the report on Sunday School work and moved the adoption of the report.

REPORT ON SUNDAY SCHOOLS

The state of the world and the state of our churches at this time suggests as never before the need of the Sunday School in its work of teaching the Word of Life and in its ministery of re-enforcing the spiritual and moral life of this generation with the divine truth. We have perhaps held our own in the Beulah Association the past year but we have made no very noteworthy gains. Five of our Churches have no Sunday School. None of our schools is a standard school. During the year at least six Associational Sunday School Conferences were held and an organization of the Association on a Departmental basis was effected. Credit should be given these leadrs for the efforts which they made to keep the work going.

Two outstanding needs appear uppermost. First, it would seem that our churches generally need to be impressed with their responsibility for maintaining a program of Bible teaching and training such as the Sunday School carries out. They need to hear the words of the Master when He said: "TEACHING them to observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you."

And Second, There is the continueing acute need teachers and workers for Sunday Schools. We believe that the first step forward is that of a worthwhile program of training in every church. Our Sunday School Board has such a program. It is the best in the world. Our trouble is we have not adopted it and worked it in our churches of the Association.

We therefore recommend: That at the earliest date possible—a class of study in the book, "The Church Using Its Sunday School" be provided at Lake City or some central location to—which all our churches will be urged to send workers. Then following this these workers will be asked to go to every church in the Association and teach this same book to the Sunday School forces of the church inviting the deacons and other church leaders to attend the classes.

- 3. Dr. Halstead made a motion which was adopted, extending the time for report of Committee on Temperance and Morals 15 minutes.
- 4. Rev. S. F. Young read the report of the Committee and moved its adoption and asked Dr. Halstead to introduce Bro. Fred T.

Barnett, who is State leader of a Cooperative Society for the suppression of the use of alcoholic beverages. His speech was educational and informative. He asked for a united effort of the Churches and pastors in carrying on this work.

REPORT ON TEMPERANCE AND MORALS

16 REASONS WHY AN AMERICAN YOUTH CHOOSES NOT TO DRINK

- 1. Alcohal is a habit-forming narcotic drug.
- Alcohal is destructive of the brain structure. Unfortunately,
 I do not have more brain than I need.
- 3. I object seriously to anything that impairs my personal liberty. Alcohol, by establishing a habit very difficult to control, deprives me of my liberty of decision.
- 4. My observation is that men and women have enough troubles in life without hunting it. Alcohol, by causing functional disorders or organic changes, lays the drinker liable to the attack of diseases where his powers of resistance are weakened.
- 5. I have a slight, but real resentment against the presented attempted social compulsion to drink and this gives me a real pleasure in saying "no" when I am offered an alcoholic beverage. I have a right to be different if I want to be.
- 6. It has always seemed to me that a real source of human happiness is to be found in good physical condition. I like to feel fit and no man who used alcohol can long continue to feel that way.
- 7. Men of great experience in the commercial and industrial world tell me that nothing will make me more likely to fail in life than contracting the habit of drinking alcoholc liquors. Life is hard measure of success which will provide not only for my own living and comfort, but a competence for my family.
- 8. I don't like to be fooled and alcohol is the great "MOCKER" of the age. It tells a man he is strong when he is really weak; wise when he is foolish. Maybe weaklings need that sort of encouragement, but I had rather just be as strong as I can and let it go at that.
- 9. I obstain from alcholic liquors because I feel that this is notthe age for drinking. The problems of the world which I must help to solve requires steady hand and a clear eye. I may not be able to solve all these problems, but I know that drungeness will nt help in the process.
 - 10. I know that the drink habit has, thru the ages, been one of the

great problems of the human race. By refusing to be a party to this traffic, I am lodging my personnal protest against this great enemy, of my fellow man.

- 11. I cannot drink without encouraging others to drink, and I refuse to take that responsibility. Maybe I can control my appetite, but some of the best and strongest men I have ever known, have not been able to control theirs. I do not want to help start someone in the path which may end in disgrace.
- 12. If I drink bootleg liquor I am contributing to the general fortunes and war chests of racketeers, If I drink legal liquor I help support an industry which profits by creating and perpetuating human weakness.
- 13. There are so many stimulating and helpful interests in the world that I don't need to resort to the false stimulation of intoxicating liquors. I prefer music, dramatic and sports.
- 14. The Church is against drink and it is against the Church and my Church deserves my loyalty in its conflict with this great evil.
- 15. I know that alcohol has no place in our mechanistic civilization. It makes the automobile driver an unsafe driver, the machine liable to serious accidents, the man of great responsibilities unequal to them. An obstainer helps make his city a sober place in which to live. An intoxicated person today, as always, is a menace not to be tolerated by the drinking people.
- 16. Alcholic beverages, including whiskey, beer and sabotage the war effort by decreasing the fighting efficiency of men in the armed forces, the working efficiency of men in the defense industries, and by misusing raw materials and transportation. I do not drink because I want my personal conduct to contribute to victory over the greatest menace the world has known in modern times.

Lastly, I don't drink because I don't like it.

The report was adopted.

7. Dr. Halstead preached the Missionary Sermon. His subject, "Our Imperial Commission" based on the Great Commission as given in the last chapter of Matthew. A collection for Missionswas taken amounting to \$36.70— the South Side Church getting credit for the collection.
