CONSTITUTION

Section 1. This Association shall be known as the Beulah Baptist Association.

Section 2. This Association shall be composed of Messengers selected by the several churches connected with the Association. Each church shall be entitled to one Messenger at large and one for every twenty-five members or majority fraction thereof.

Section 3. Any regular organized Baptist church of the same faith may become a member of this Association upon application by a peti-

tionary letter and Messengers as above provided.

Section 4 On the second or last day of the Annual Session, the Association shall from its membership elect by a ballot a Moderator. Vice Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer whose terms of office shall begin with the adjournment of the body and extend through the next year and through the sessions of next year

Section 5. The object of this Association shall be: First to promote unit and brotherly love among the churches; second to promote Gospel discipling, to encourage the universal spread of the Gospel and practical

religion throughout our bounds and elsewhere,

Section 6 The Moderator shall appoint at each Annual Session of the Association an Executive Committee composed of one member from each church connected with the Association. Each church is expected and is urged to recommend its members on this committee. Resident pastors, heads of the Associational Training Union, Sunday Schools. Woman's Missionary Union, and Brotherhood departments together with the elected officers of the Association shall be ex-officio members of the committee. Their duties shall be: First to inquire into destitution within our bounds; second, to make contact with the ministers of the Gospel of this Association, or other Association, by correspondence and be supply destitution with the Gospel; third, to draw from the treasury such funds as are available for missionary purposes to meet their contract and to exercise general supervision in the promotion of unity and brotherly love among the churches and the universal spread of the Gospel throughout our bounds. They shall report the results of their labors at each annual session of the association.

Section 7 The Moderator shall invite correspondents and visiting ministers and brethren to seats with the body when in session. They shall be entitled to the privilege of aiding the Association with their

Section 8 This Association shall have the right to withdraw from any church that may be in disorder when the same cannot be restored by Gospel discipline to the unity of fath in the bonds of peace

Section 9. The Annual Meeting of this Association shall be held at such time and place as may be designated by the body and by appointment there shall be an introductory sermon preached the first day of the session at 11 o'clock, and a collection taken up for missionary surposes on Sunday or the last day.

Section 10. This Association shall not lord it over God's neritage toor infringe upon any-of the internal rights of churches, but shall act

only as an advisory body.

Section 11. This Constitution may be amended at any regular session of the Association by two-thirds vote of messengers. Any amendment offered shall be in writing

RULES OF DECORUM

Article I. At the first meeting of each session of the Vs. quation the Moderator shall call the Mossengers to order; the letter of the churches shall be presented and the names of the Messenger of the absence of the Moderator, the Vice Moderator. Clerk shall call to order.

article 3. The Moderator shall preserve order and decide an enations in debate, subject to an appeal of the body; and when he shall some with the chair and in case of a te shall give the deciding vote.

Article 4. The Moderator small appoint all committees subject approval by the body.

Article 5. The Clerk shall keep a careful record of the proceeding of each meeting prepare and edit the Minutes for printing. In the absence of the Moderator and the Vice Moderator, he shall call the body together and preside until a Moderator, pro tem shall be elected.

Article 6 All members wishing to speak on an applied a a rise and address the Moderator as "Brother," and shall confine the selves strictly to the subject and shall not be allowed to make an unking allus on to any brother while speaking.

Article 7. No motion shall be debated until seconded and stated the moderator or read by the clerk.

Article 8. When a motion is under consideration no other motionshall be entertained except to adjourn, lay on the table, to amend, it definitely postpone, refer to committee, or call for the previous quest of

Article 9. Any member voting with the mapority on any question idebate may move a reconsideration at any time during the sassion.

Article 10. V siting brethren of other Associations may speak on an subject, but shall not note.

Article 11. No brother shall speak more than twice on a subject without the consent of the Association.

Article 12. These Rules of Decorum may be altered or ametided any regular session of the Association by a majority vote of the ore bers of the body.

ARTICLES OF FAITH

- We believe n one only true and living God, the Father, Son and Holy Spirit, and that they are one (See Matt. 28-29).
- 2. We believe that the Old and New Testament Scriptures are the napired Word of God and the only rules of faith and practice. (2 Timothy 3:17.)
- 3. We believe in the election according to the foreknowledge of God through sanctification of the Spir t and belief of the truth. (2 Thes. 3:13.)
- 4 We believe that the Grace of God that bringeth salvation hath appeared unto all men, and that nothing prevents the salvation of the vilest sinner but his own voluntary rejection of that Grace. (Isa. 55:1; Rev. 22:17; Acts. 17:30.)
- We believe in the depray ty of the human heart, and that the natural state of man is such that he cannot prepare himself for Divine tavors without the ass staning grace of God, enabling him to act according to the good pleasure of Hs Divine Will. (Eph. 2:6: Matt. 18:11; John 4:10; 1 Cor. 3:5-7.)
- 6. We believe in justification of faith, which gives peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ (Rom. 5:1-2).
- 7 We believe that the Gospel of Christ is a means of grace to bring sinners to repentance and fa th in Jesus Christ, and therefore should be reached to all the world. (John 3:16.)
- 8. We believe that all those who are regenerated by the Spirit of God are made heirs of God and joint heirs with our Lord Jesus Chr st and that they are kept by the power of God through faith until eternal Salvation. (Peter 1.5; Rom. 8:22; Ph l. 1-6).
- 9. We believe that baptism is the immers on of the whole body in water; that the only proper subjects are described in preceding and the only proper admin strators are those who have been regularly ordained by the Church of Christ, by the imposition of hands of a presbytery. (Acts 8:36; Rom. 6:4; Read Tim. and Titus.)
- 10. We believe that the Lord's Supper was instituted by Jesus Christ to be commemorated by His followers and that none but baptized believers have a Spiritual right to partake thereof. Luke 22:18, 19, 20; Cor. 14:25-28.
- 11. We believe in the resurrection of the righteous and the wicked, and that the wicked shall go away into everlasting pun shment, but the righteous into eternal life. (Acts 25:15).

This year is the sixtieth anniversary of Woman's Missionary Union

of the Southern Baptist Convention. It is "Our Comemoration Year", a year of praise, thanksgiving and reconsecration. As the children were led to The Promised Land they were led and constrained by their leaders to pause often and praise God and to "remember" what great things God had wrought for them and through them. The word "femember" has thundered down through the years in God's Word. We too, must pause "remember" what God has done and can do through us if we consecrate and ded cate our lives completely to Him.

The theme for this year is "For God and Home and Every Land". W. M. U. Has placed special emphasis upon reading the Bible and family worship this year. How badly these are needed today when there are many broken homes. To W. M. U. members "home" begins within the iam by circle and reaches out into homeland. We need more "ciristian homes. The hymn for the year is "Jesus Shall Reign Wher'er the Eun" and the watchword is "That at the name of Jesus every knee should bow." Phil 2:10. We quote our permanent watchword "Laborers Together With God." 1 Cor. 3:9 for without God is with us our efforts are in vain.

The following churches have a W. M. S.: First Church, Southside, Wellborn, Olustice, Eethlelgem, White Springs, and Fort White. Our records for this year are

334 W. M. S. members, 106 tithers, 157 doing community messions 3 mission study classes with 79 completing the classes and 34 reading a mission book of some kind, 2878 coupons to the Children's Home, 435 subscriptions to the following magazines: Royal Service: The Commission, Southern Baptist Home Missions, and The Baptist, Witness Two W. M. S. discontinued.

The cash gifts were as follows: 7 W. M. S. observed Foreign Mission Season of Prayer in December, offering \$262.95, seven observed Home Mission Season of Prayer in March—offering \$81.82, five observed State Mission Season of Prayer in September—offering \$91.10; Gifts to W. M. U. Tra hing School. \$47.27, gifts to Margaret Fund or the Burney Gift \$5.20, Gifts to Children's Home \$139.97, Gifts to other mission objects \$147.74. Grand total \$875.85.

Our greatest increase this year was with our young people under the line leadership of Mrs. Clarence Sm th of Olustee. W. M. U. is the mether organization to these aux-liaries for young people ages 4 through 25 years. The number of auxiliaries have doubled from 7 to 14. They are as follows. White Springs, 1 R. A. and 1 G. A., Southside 1 R. A. ? G. A's, I Sunbeam Band; Olustee I R. A., I G. A. Fort W ite I Sunbeam Band, First Church 1 Sunbeam Band, 1 Y. W. A. Except for Y. W. A. all goals for the year for increase in auxiliaries were existenced. There are about 170 young people enrolled in these auxiliar es. The G. A.'s have been working on their forward steps and now have 17 maidens Tue R. A.'s have also made advances in their ranks having 11 pages and 1 squire, Paul Beauchamp of White Springs participated in the State R A. recognition service held in Ocala in March, five other boys and the 2 counselors also the pastor from White Springs attended the R. A Banquet preceding the service. 7 girls attended the State G. A. Camp held at Silver Lake near Tallahassee and 6 boys attended the R. A. State Camp

at Panama City. A number of these young people were honor campers. The auxiliaries gave \$13.85 to Foreign thissions, \$10.43 to Home missions and \$32.10 to other mission objects making a total of \$56.43. Two special meetings were held for the young people. The first a New Year's Eve watchinght service at Souths de with 7 churches represented and 98 enrolled in mission study classes held for each age group. A social hour was held at the close of the classes followed by a song service, message by Rev. John Pierce, our Regional Miss onary. The climax of the service was conducted by Rev. Hugh H. Walters from 11.45 to 12.01 o'clock.

Another service was held at White Springs Church in June when Rev. Clay Gibson, a 20-year old Choctaw Indian from Miss ssippi and a student at Florida Baptist Institute at Lakeland was the guest speaker. Sprinal recognition was given each aux liary and to those who had made advances in their study. About 130 were there with an offering of \$32.90 taken and given to Rev. Gibson to promote work among his people. Refreshments were served at the close of the service.

Mrs. M. W. F. Miller the W. M. U. Treasurer made the following verily report: On hand October 1, 1947, \$17.10, monies received this year \$118.10; total amount \$135.20. Disbursements were: \$12 to Sem nary in Nashville, Tennessee, \$32.90 to Rev. Clay Gibson, Choctaw indian, \$20 for medicine for overseas relief, \$16 our part on the cost of enlarging W. M. U. Headquarters at 1111 Comer Building, B rmingham, Alabama, and \$38.75 for local expenses in the association.

Total disbursements \$119.65 making amount on hand October 1, 1948, \$15.55.

The president and the Young People's Leader attended the State Leaders conference held in Orlando last November also the State Convention. The president attended the State W. M. U. Executive Committee Meeting and State W. M. U. Convention in Ocala in March.
