ARTICLES OF FAITH

- I. We believe in one only true and living God, the Father, Son and Holy Spirit, and that they are one. (See Matt. 28-29).
- We believe that the Old and New Testament Scriptures are the inspired Word of God and the only rules of faith and practice. (2 Timothy 3-17.)
- 3. We believe in the election according to the foreknowledge of God through sanctification of the Spirit and belief of the truth. (2 Thes. 3-13.-
- 4. We believe that the Grace of God that bringeth salvation hath appeared unto all men, and that nothing prevents the salvation of the vilest sinner but his own voluntary rejection of that Grace. (Isa. 55:1: Rev. 22:17; Acts 17:30.)
- 5. We believe in the depravity of the human heart, and that the natural state of man is such that he cannot prepare himself for Divine favors without the sustaining grace of God, enabling him to act according to the good pleasure of His Divine Will. (Eph. 2:6; Matt. 18-11; John 4:10; 1 Cor. 3:5-7.)
- 6. We believe in justification of faith, which gives peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ. (Rom, 5:1-2.)
- 7. We believe that the Gospel of Christ is a means of grace to bring sinners to repentance and faith in Jesus Christ, and therefore should be preached to all the world. (John 3:16.)
- 8. We believe that all those who are regenerated by the Spirit of God are made heirs of God and joint heirs with our Lord Jesus Christ and that they are kept by the power of God through faith until eternal Salvation. (Peter 1:5; Rom. 8:22; Phi.. 1-6.)
- 9. We believe that baptism is the immersion of the whole body in water; that the only proper subjects are described in preceding section, and the only proper administrators are those who have been regularly ordained by the Church of Christ, by the imposition of hands of a presbytery. (Acts 8:36; Rom. 6:4; Read Tim. and Titus.)
- 10. We believe that the Lord's Supper was instituted by Jesus Christ to be commemorated by His followers and that none but baptized believers have a Spiritual right to partake thereof. (Luke 22:18, 19, 20; Cor. 14:25-28-.
- 11. We believe in the resurrection of the righteous and the wicked and that the wicked shall go away into everlasting punishment, but the righteous into eternal life. (Acts 25:15.)

Page Two

RULES OF DECORUM

- Article 1. At the first meeting of each session of the Association the Moderator shall call the Messengers to order; the letters from the churches shall be presented and the names of the Messengers enrolled. In case of the absence of the Moderator, the Vice Moderator or Clerk shall call to order.
- Article 2. Each day's session of the Association shall be opened with prayer.
- Article 3. The Moderator shall preserve order and decide all questions in debate, subject to an appeal of the body; and when he shall speak on any subject in discussion he shall call some member to the chair and in case of a tie shall give the deciding vote.
- Article 4. The Moderator shall appoint all committees, subject to approval by the body.
- Article 5. The Clerk shall keep a careful record of the proceeding of each meeting, prepare and edit the Minutes for printing. In the absence of the Moderator and the Vice Moderator, he shall call the body together and preside until a Moderator protein shall be elected.
- Article 6. All members wishing to speak on any subject shall rise and address the Moderator as "Brother," and shall confine themselves strictly to the subject and shall not be allowed to make an unkind allusion to any brother while speaking.
- Article 7. No motion shall be debated until seconded and stated by the moderator or read by the clerk.
- Article 8. When a motion is under consideration no other motion shall be entertained except to adjourn, lay on the table, to amend, indefinitely postpone, refer to committee, or call for the previous question.
- Article 9. Any member voting with the majority on any question in debate may move a reconsideration at any time during the session.
- Article 10 Visiting brethren of other Associations may speak on any subject, but shall not note.
- Article 11. No brother shall speak more than twice on a subject without the consent of the Association.
- Article 12. These Rules of Decorum may be altered or amended at any regular session of the Association by a majority vote of the members of the body.

CONSTITUTION

Section 1. This Association shall be known as the Beulah Baptist Association.

Section 2. This Association shall be composed of Messengers selected by the several churches connected with the Association. Each church shall be entitled to one Messenger at large and one for very twenty-five members of majority faction thereof.

Section 3. Any regular organized Baptist church of the same faith may become a member of this Association upon application by a petitionary letter and Messengers as above provided.

Section 4. On the second or last day of the Annual Session, the Association shall from its membership elect by a ballot a Moderator, Vice Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer whose terms of office shall begin with the adjournment of the body and extend through the next year and through the sessions of next year.

Section 5. The object of this Association shall be: First to promote unity and brotherly love among the churches; second to promote Gospel discipline, to encourage the universal spread of the Gospel and practical religion throughout our bounds and elsewhere.

Section 6. The Moderator shall appoint at each Annual Session of the Association an Executive Committee composed of one member from each church connected with the Association. Each church is expected and is urged to recommend its members on this committee. Resident pastors, heads of the Associational Training Union, Sunday Schools, Woman's Missionary Union, and Brotherhood departments together with the elected officers of the Association shall be ex-officio members of the committee. Their duties shall be: First to inquire into destitution within our bounds; second, to make contact with the ministers of the Gospel of this Association, or other Association, by correspondence and to supply destitution with the Gospel; third, to draw from the treasury such funds as are available for missionary purposes to meet their contract and to exercise general supervision in the promotion of unity and brotherly love among the churches and the universal spread of the Gospel throughout our bounds. They shall report the results of their labors at each annual session of the association.

Section 7. The Moderator shall invite correspondents and visiting ministers and brethren to seats with the body when in session. They shall be entitled to the privilege of aiding the Association with their counsel.

Section 8. This Association shall have the right to withdraw from any church that may be in disorder when the same cannot be restored by Gospel discipline to the unity of faith in the bonds of peace.

Section 9. The Annual Meeting of this Association shall be held at such time and place as may be designated by the body; and by appointment there shall be an introductory sermon preached the first day of the session at 11 o'clock, and a collection taken up for missionary purposes.

Section 10. This Association shall not lord it over God's heritage nor infringe upon any of the internal rights of churches, but shall act only as an advisory body.

Section 11. This Constitution may be amended at any regular session of the Association by two-thirds vote of messengers. Any amendment offered shall be in writing.

FIRST DAYS SESSION OF THE 72ND ANNUAL SESSION OF THE BEULAH BAPTIST ASSOCIATION WITH BETHLEHEM CHURCH

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION REPORT

The president of the Southern Baptist Convention, Dr. J. D. Grey, says: "What Southern Baptists believe and do in the next generation, very largely depends upon our Baptist Schools today. These schools have given us our leaders. We have supported them; they have blessed us. We must keep it like that. Our Baptist Colleges are under pressure today from two sides. On one side is state education; on the other, non-denominational, inter-denominational, or anti-denominational education. Baptist leaders will come from Baptist schools. The school administration must keep them Baptist in belief, practice and control. In doing this they lay claim to whole-hearted support of all our Baptist people. This will include adequate financial support from the State Convention, the local church and the individual members. It will include also a moral and personal support, leading Baptist parents to send their children to Baptist schools. In this matter we are at the fountain head of our Baptist life. What is done about our Baptist schools will determine what our denomination does the next twentyfive years.

Much has been accomplished. "Stetson Week" was observed in January, most of the churches observed this week as well as Christian home-week, which lays much stress on Christian education.

There were 2,078 students enrolled in Stetson 1950-51. Out of this number, 123 were ministerial students, with a similar number preparing for the mission field and other special educational work. The department of religions is staffed with able scolars of religious education, and the religious center building is of vital importance in that it is used to house: the ministerial association, Y. W. A., Voluntary Band, Vesper Services, etc.

There is growing interest in the extension courses for pastors and this extension work is being done this year in the Orlando area.

The cooperative program provides that 18% of the cooperative dollar goes to Stetson, but from an overall view of the expense of the school for a year this pays only two of the fifty-two weeks expense, and in addition to this, Seteson givees back to the convention in scholarships and aid to students more than equal the amount given by the convention.

Now a word about the Florida Baptist Foundation.

The purpose of the foundation is the investment and handling of

endowments, assets, of Baptist institutions, educational, benevolent, and missionary. Facts about the Foundation may be had by reading the charter in the 1947 copy of the Florida Baptist Annual.

Much has been accomplished in the Foundation. Many of our Associations and Churches have representatives. These are doing a good job. There is on file 634 prospective givers; 1,750.00 dollars have been received by the Foundation; nine wills have been made with approximate value of \$676,750.00. More wills are in prospect. Our objectives are' To acquaint pastors and people with the functions and service of the Foundation. To have a representative for each Association and Church. To build prospective lists of givers, to have Associational Rallies and Conferences and a sustained program of publicity.

REPORT OF FLORIDA'S BAPTIST CHILDREN'S HOME, LAKELAND, FLORIDA

The Memorial Chapel at the Home was finished January 15, of this year. Those who have seen it express themselves very favorably as to its general appearance and furnishings. It is considered the most beautiful building on the campus. It was erected in memory of the boys from the Home who gave their lives in the service of our country during World War II. It serves as a congregate meeting place for the children and workers in the Home. Chapel is held each Wednesday evening, and at other times for special occasions. They do not hold church services at the institution. The children attend the First Baptist Church and the Southside Baptist Church in Lakeland.

The cottage for junior boys has been finished and twenty children have been added to the enrollment which is now 130. This does not include those who are receiving Mother's Aid. There are 26 children who receive help from the Institution and remain in their homes. The enrollment on the campus and those receiving Mother's Aid make a grand total of 156 who are receiving assistance now. Last year we cared for a total of 169 children—148 on the campus and 21 on Mother's Aid.

A wing has been added to the Gaines Vocational Building. It provides facilities for six boys. The major part of the cost of this addition was provided from funds left over from the construction and furnishings of the main building. If the need arses for a cottage for older boys, another bulding of similar design can be easily added, which would give them the cottage and cut the cost to a minimum.

The farm and dairy are utilized in the operations of the Home. The dairy supplies milk for the entire campus. A program of dairy and beef production is carefully followed which will give them all the milk they can use and much of the beef. They have 78 cows and calves in the herd. There are 130 acres in pasture, 40 of which are improved.

The Home has given permission to ask for a special offering at

Thanksgiving. The offering will be taken Sunday, November 25. The income from this source will be used to build a cottage for small children and for the operating expenses of the Home. They are ask-

ing for one day's pay from everyone who will help.

The need for the cottage is shown by the fact that they have 32 applications pending for admission. These children need help, and because they believe in Florida Baptists, they have turned to us. We must not send them away. We must not forget that Jesus blessed little children and that he said, "Inasmuch as ye have done it unto one of the least of these, my brethren, ye have done it unto me." We can provide a cottage for these children on November 25, furnish it, and admit every child to the Home it will accommodate if we will give ONE DAY'S PAY to the Institution. Let us here and now dedicate ourselves anew to service in the Kingdom of God and help those who have appealed to us and are in distress.

The Cooperative Program provides the means of advance. Our witness for Christ can be enlarged this way. Every Baptist can have a part in that witness through the Cooperative Urogram. Through the Southern Baptist Convention's share of the cooperative dollar we support, (1) misisonary agencies, (2) educational agencies, (3) agencies of benevolencies, (4) general agencies and (5) Southern Baptist Convention promotional agencies.

Every church in our Beulah Association has had a part this year in the Advance Program. We would like to put the following question before each of our churches and each particular member of our churches: Have we done our best for the Master's caurse this year? I am sure that for the most of us the answer to this question will be in the negative. Each of us must realize that by financing the Lord's work, using God's plan (tithes and offerings), we can have a bigger share in getting the gospel to lost and dying men.

Let us adopt as our goal for 1951-52: Every church in our association increasing its gifts and contributions to the Lord's work by giving more through the Cooperative Program.

MUSIC REPORT BEULAH BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

Music in the Churches of Florida Baptist Convention and Southern Baptist Convention has had a very fine development during the past several years. The year just ended has certainly been no exception.

TEMPERANCE AND MORALS

"Abstain from every form of evil." 1st Thess. 5:22.

Total abstinance is the only safe rule to live by, not only with drink, but every form of evil. Above every evil, we should consider sin as the greatest evil. Add one letter to evil and you have Devil, the source of all evil. Shun evildoers for they are those spiders which weave their own webs and are afterwards caught in them. We should abstain from alcohol regardless what name or form it takes. "Drink is the first step of the individual away from religion." Alcohol may take the form of beer, wine, or whiskey but in contest it is the same and has practically the same effect.

Of the six great civilizations of history, we find all of them destroyed by the same evils—intemperence, immorality and gambling.

Alcohol poisons both the heart and brain, bringing death to the white corpuscles of the blood and disorganization of the nerves. This personality disorganization is the major factor in one-third of all crime.

Often you have read in your daily newspaper, "the killer had been drinking." A survey in one city revealed that either the offender or victim had been drinking in two-thirds of sex crimes.

Drunkenness has been the second leading cause for arrest in the country; exceeded only by the number of arrests for violation of traffic and motor vehicle laws. One-fifth of those arrested for drunkenness are under 25 years of age.

Not only on the highway does alcoholic beverages endanger the individual, but also in terms of morals and responsibilities.

It is the alcohol in any beverage that causes drunkenness. Americans drink more alcohol in beer annually than in whiskey, gin, and other distilled liquors which are more generally recognized for their harmful effects on the individual and sanity. Under, the commercially promoted and politically promulgated myth that it is not intoxicating, beer, including "3.2", is a major cause of drunkenness and alcoholism. Beer is the drink of many of our drunkards.

Nevertheless, brewers work continually to separate beer from other intoxicants, and to promote their idea that it belongs in our homes and in the hands of our women and youth. Thus causing road-side beer parlor nests for juvenile and adult delinquency.

We wish to commend the work done by the United Florida Drys and the Good Citizenship Leagues, especially in Orange, Polk and Hardee Counties Beulah Association should urge that such a league be inactivated in our county.

Through the cooperation of pastors and laymen throughout the State, the defeat of House Bill No. 664 was made possible, which if it had passed, would have placed all the wine and whiskey revenue in a pension fund for the support of old folks and other State pensioners, and the Bill further provided that if a county voted dry, no portion of said Pension Fund should be allocated to the county joining the dry column.

The Florida Drys were able to secure the defeat of a bill which would have removed the ban against the sale of liquor to the Florida Indians.

1. That we join hands in every good Citizenship movement.

2. That we educate our people on temperance through the use of films what can be received with no rental charge except postage one way.

REPORT OF THE RELIEF AND ANNUITY BOARD of the SOUTHERN BAPTIST CONVENTION 1951

The reports, reviewing the work of the Relief and Annuity Board, presented at the annual meeting of the Board in Dallas, on March 14th, showed 1950 to be a year of continued progress and enlarged service to our Southern Baptist custituency.

Officers of the board were re-elected: Dr. Wallace Bassett, president; Dr. Walter R. Alexander, executive secretary; Dr. Robert S.

Jones, associate secretary; Mr. Orville Groner, treasurer-investments. Total income for 1950 was \$4,824,268.72, with total benefits paid, amounting to \$1,413,885.82. Total assets of the Board as of December 31, 1950, were \$20,518,200.12.

Even withutmost care, in seeking to keep expenditures to a minimum, the relief department, for the third consecutive year, spent more for relief than was received. Only when conditions seemed to demand it, were increases granted. We had 1,443 on our relief roll on December 31, 1950, the largest number in all the history of the department. Several things have contributed to the ever increasing load which th relief department is called upon to bear: First, the sharp increase in the cost of living has forced many of those in retirement, who had thought it would never be necessary to ask for assistance, to appeal for help from the department, that they might have the necessities of life. Second, many of those on the relief roll have found the small amounts received inadequate to provide food, and that which is always needed, and in increasing quantities in old age, medicine. A third, and more important factor, is the large number of pastors who failed to join the Ministers Retirement Plan and find themselves, at retirement, with no source of income, and because of this neglect, are forced to request that their names be placed on the relief roll.

There is growing concern on the part of the Relief and Annuity Board over the ever-increasing load which the relief department is called upon to carry and the Board feels that our constituency should be acquainted with the seriousness of this problem. Pastors now in active service who refuse or neglect to join the Ministers Retirement Plan have no right to expect assistance from the relief department. It is urgently requested that the secretaries inform pastors in active service that unless they provide, with the help of their denomination, retirement benefits, there is serious doubt that the Board will be able to care for them out of relief funds.

More was spent for relief in ten states than was received. So serious has this problem become that the relief committee has given instructions that no increases be granted except in cases of dire emergency. The department spent \$14,397.11 more than Southern Baptists gave for relief. It is imperative that more of our churches take a fellowship offering for ministerial relief that the needs of our old preachers and widows of preachers may be met.

Too many of our pastors have neglected to join the Ministers Retirement Plan and the Widows Supplemental Auxiliary Annuity Plan and these pastors or their widows may suffer from this negligence. That large group of pastors who joined the Ministers Retirement Plan but are inactice because of non-payment of dues, should take care lest they come to retirement age with the annuity they should receive greatly reduced.

The report of the relief committee, at the annual meeting of the Board, showed grave concern over the large number of pastors who

are retiring and requesting that their names be placed on the relief roll who have never been members of the Ministers Retirement Plan.

The relief committee feels that pastors now in active service who refuse or neglect to join the Ministers Retirement Plan, will have no right to expect assistance from this department when they retire. The following statistical table shows that many pastors are without protection which the Ministers Retirement Plan and the Widows Supplemental Annuity Plan offer.

Are you one of those who will, because of neglect, have no regular income when you retire? If so, join the Ministers Retirement Plan.

In case of youth death, would your wife need financial assistance; If so, join the Widows Supplemental Annuity Plan.

The Southern Baptist Convention, realizing that more money is needed for ministerial relief, requests that each church take a fellowship offering for this worthy cause in June, or at such time as convenient for the church.

We would urge that the churches observe this fellowship offering as this is the only way the relief funds, received through the cooperative program, can be increased. The relief department receives four and two-third cents out of each cooperative dollar, but with the ever-increasing cost of living, this is not sufficient to meet the needs of our old preachers and widows of preachers.

Exclusive of relief funds, the Relief and Annuity Board sent check to 114 beneficiaries of the several plans in the state of Florida for a total of \$59,140.55.

STATE, HOME, AND FOREIGN MISSION REPORT

State Mission Report:

State Missions come first in our program of missions. It is our Jerusalem, the beginning place. We should engage our best efforts to enlist the people of our state for Christ, so that we may be better prepared to have a larger part in a world-wide program of winning the world to Christ through the Cooperative Program.

State Missions receive fifty cents of the Cooperative Program dollar. The State Mission dollar is spent as follows: 66c is used to finance the departments of the State Mission Board. These departments are Sunday School, Training Union, Music Brotherhood, Christian Education, Baptist Student Union and Cooperative Missions Department.

The remaining 34c of the Cooperative Program dollar is given to Baptist Children's Home, Stetson University, ministerial students, and a small amount is given to churches in college centers.

During the year weare called upon for a special State Mission offering which goes to four objects, Namely; camps and assemblies, Baptist Bible Institute, Lakeland, Florida; W. M. U. Bulding, Birmingham; Jacksonville Baptist Home for Children.

Our State Mission Board has spent \$25,000.00 to aid churches and begin new missions and has aided over one hundred ministerial students at Stetson University this year. We also have 38 full-time Missionaries on the field.

We trust that this work will be heartily supported by our pastors and churches throughout our bounds

Southern Baptist in 106 years have employed 48,134 home mis-

sionaries for one year or one missionary for 48,134 years. Home missionaries have organized 10.012 churches and reported 1,011,134 professions of faith. There has been one profession for every \$34.97 expended by the Board.

The Home Mission Board is not only doing work in our own country among French- and Latin-speaking people, the American Indians, and Negroes. We have missionaries in Cuba, Canal Zone, Panama and Alaska.

In 1950 the Home Mission Board employed 754 missionaries. These reported 32,600 conversions; conducted 3,958 revivals, opened 598 new missions, and constituted 293 new churches.

These are only a few of the outstanding things accomplished by the Home Mission Board and is not to be taken as a summary of the work of this Board.

The Home Mission Board, like the State Mission Board, obtains its finances through the Cooperative Program, therefore, the wide distribution of the Cooperative Program dollar should certainly inspire us to support our denominational program of work. Foreign Mission Report:

The Foreign Mission Board last yera made the greatest advance in its work than any previous year in history. The Board sent out 111 missionaries, making a total of 803 active missionaries distributed eign countries which serve as a very important factor in winning the in 28 countries. These missionaries reported 15,620 baptisms last year.

We also have many schools and hospitals planted in their forlost to Christ Christ's program was one of ministering to the mind and body as well as the soul.

The Foreign Mission Board in 1950 received \$6,014,909.49. This was the largest sum of money ever received before in one year. This Board is dependant upon cooperative program money. As we send out more missionaries and enter new fields and establish more schools and hospitals, our gifts must increase if we are to maintain the work already established. Therefore, as the work advances in the worldwide missionary activities our churches must continue to advance in giving.
