ARTICLES OF FAITH

- I. We believe in one only true and living God, the Father, Son and Holy Spirit, and that they are one. (See Matt. 28-29).
- 2. We believe that the Old and New Testament Scriptures are the inspired Word of God and the only rules of faith and practice. (2 Timothy 3-17.)
- 3. We believe in the election according to the foreknowledge of God through sanctification of the Spirit and belief of the truth. (2 Thes. 3-13.-
- 4. We believe that the Grace of God that bringeth salvation hath appeared unto all men, and that nothing prevents the salvation of the vilest sinner but his own voluntary rejection of that Grace. (Isa. 55:1: Rev. 22:17; Acts 17:30.)
- 5. We believe in the depravity of the human heart, and that the natural state of man is such that he cannot prepare himself for Divine favors without the sustaining grace of God, enabling him to act according to the good pleasure of His Divine Will. (Eph. 2:6; Matt. 18-11; John 4:10; 1 Cor. 3:5-7.)
- 6. We believe in justification of faith, which gives peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ. (Rom. 5:1-2.)
- 7. We believe that the Gospel of Christ is a means of grace to bring sinners to repentance and faith in Jesus Christ, and therefore should be preached to all the world. (John 3:16.)
- 8. We believe that all those who are regenerated by the Spirit of God are made heirs of God and joint heirs with our Lord Jesus Christ and that they are kept by the power of God through faith until eternal Salvation. (Peter 1:5; Rom. 8:22; Phi.. 1-6.)
- 9. We believe that baptism is the immersion of the whole body in water; that the only proper subjects are described in preceding section, and the only proper administrators are those who have, been regularly ordained by the Church of Christ, by the imposition of hunds of a presbytery. (Acts 8:36; Rom. 6:4; Read Tim. and Titus.)
- 10. We believe that the Lord's Supper was instituted by Jesus Christ to be commemorated by His followers and that none but baptized believers have a Spiritual right to partake thereof. (Luke 22:18, 19, 20; Cor. 14:25-28-.
- 11. We believe in the resurrection of the righteous and the wicked and that the wicked shall go away into everlasting punishment, but the righteous into eternal life. (Acts 25:15.)

RULES OF DECORUM

Brotherhood Leader—G.W. Bridges. State, Home and Foreign Missions—Brother W. H. Brown. Children's Home—Rev. T. E. Ellerbe. Ministers Retirement—John Dicks.

- Article 1. At the first meeting of each session of the Association the Moderator shall call the Messengers to order; the letters from the churches shall be presented and the names of the Messengers enrolled. In case of the absence of the Moderator, the Vice Moderator or Clerk shall call to order.
- Article 2. Each day's session of the Association shall be opened with prayer.
- Article 3. The Moderator shall preserve order and decide all questions in debate, subject to an appeal of the body; and when he shall speak on any subject in discussion he shall call some member to the chair and in case of a tie shall give the deciding vote.
- Article 4. The Moderator shall appoint all committees, subject to approval by the body.
- Article 5. The Clerk shall keep a careful record of the proceeding of each meeting, prepare and edit the Minutes for printing. In the absence of the Moderator and the Vice Moderator, he shall call the body together and preside until a Moderator pro tem shall be elected.
- Article 6. All members wishing to speak on any subject shall rise and address the Moderator as "Brother," and shall confine themselves strictly to the subject and shall not be allowed to make an unkind allusion to any brother while speaking.
- Article 7. No motion shall be debated until seconded and stated by the moderator or read by the clerk.
- Article 8. When a motion is under consideration no other motion shall be entertained except to adjourn, lay on the table, to amend, indefinately postpone, refer to committee, or call for the previous question.
- Article 9. Any member voting with the majority on any question in debate may move a reconsideration at any time during the session.
- Article 10. Visiting brethren of other Associations may speak on any subject, but shall not vote.
- Article 11. No brother shall speak more than twice on a subject without the consent of the Association.
- Article 12. These Rules of Decorum may be altered or amended at any regular session of the Association by a majority vote of the members of the body.

CONSTITUTION

Section 1. This Association shall be known as the Beulah Baptist Association.

Section 2. This Association shall be composed of Messengers selected by the several churches connected with the Association. Each church shall be entitled to one Messenger at large and one for very twenty-five members of majority faction thereof.

Section 3. Any regular organized Baptist church of the same faith may become a member of this Association upon application by a petitionary letter and Messengers as above provided.

Section 4. On the second or last day of the Annual Session, the Association shall from its membership elect by a ballot a Moderator Vice Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer whose terms of office shall begin with the adjournment of the body and extend through the next year and through the sessions of next year.

Section 5. The object of this Association shall be: First to promote unity and brotherly love among the churches; second to promote Gospel discipline, to encourage the universal spread of the Gospel and practical religion throughout our bounds and elsewhere.

Section 6. The Moderator shall appoint at each Annual Session of the Association an Executive Committee composed of one member from each church connected with the Association. Each church is expected and is urged to recommend its members on this committee. Resident pastors, heads of the Associational Training Union, Sunday Schools, Woman's Missionary Union, and Brotherhood departments together with the elected officers of the Association shall be ex-officio members of the committee. Their duties shall be: First to inquire into destitution within our bounds; second, to make contact with the ministers of the Gospel of this Association, or other Association, by correspondence and to supply destitution with the Gospel; third, to draw from the treasury such funds as are available for missionary purposes to meet their contract and to exercise general supervision in the promotion of unity and brotherly love among the churches and the universal spread of the Gospel throughout our bounds. They shall report the results of their labors at each annual session of the association.

Section 7. The Moderator shall invite correspondents and visiting ministers and brethren to seats with the body when in session. They shall be entitled to the privilege of aiding the Association with their counsel.

Section 8. This Association shall have the right to withdraw from any church that may be in disorder when the same cannot be restored by Gospel discipline to the unity of faith in the bonds of peace.

Section 9. The Annual Meeting of this Association shall be held at such time and place as may be designated by the body; and by appointment there shall be an introductory sermon preached the first day of the session at 11 o'clock, and a collection taken up for missionary purposes.

Section 10. This Association shall not lord it over God's heritage nor infringe upon any of the internal rights of churches, but shall act only as an advisory body.

Section 11. This Constitution may be amended at any regular session of the Association by two-thirds vote of messengers. Any amendment offered shall be in writing.

MINUTES OF THE SEVENTY-THIRD SESSION

OF THE

BEULAH BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

HELD AT LULU BAPTIST CHURCH, OCTOBER 7 AND

ELIM BAPTIST CHURCH, OCTOBER 8, 1952

WITH VICE MODERATOR REV. C. R. ROBERTS PRESIDING

The first day's session at Lulu started at 10:00 a.m. with song service led by Brother Pasco Weeks. Rev. Otis L. Page, pastor of the host church gave the devotional using Scripture found in Genesis 28-5.

Hospital Report SOUTHERN BAPTIST HOSPITAL

STATISTICS FOR THE YEAR 1951

A total of 31,764 patients were admitted to the hospital during the year. Of this number, 15,207 were bed patients, 13,202 out patients and 3,355 new born infants. A total of 125,394 Patient Days of Service were rendered. This was the largest number of patients admitted to the institution in its history.

It is interesting to note that the total number of admissions to the hospial during its 26 years of service is greater than the population of

New Orleans.

NEW ADDITION COMPLETED

During the year the new South Wing Addition was completed at a cost of \$2,250,000.00. The new facilities, completely air conditioned and modern in every respect, increase the total bed capacity to approximately 550 beds and 80 bassinets.

Also housed in the new addition are a new Laboratory, Blood Bank, an Auditorium seating 200 people, a new Medical Records Department, a new Cafeteria for student nurses and employees, additional administrative offices, storage facilities and a new lobby.

OTHER IMPROVEMENTS

A program of expansion and renovation is underway in the older sections of the building and will be completed as rapidly as funds are available. These improvements include renovation and remodeling of the Main Kitchen, the moving of the Pharmacy to a new location, the

enlargement of the Out Patient Department, and numerous other improvements.

JACKSONVILLE, FLORIDA HOSPITAL

Several years ago the hospital Board accepted the responsibility of establishing a hospital at Jacksonville, Florida in cooperation with the Baptists and other interested citizens of that city. A beautiful site has been purchased and the plans for the first buildings to be constructed are well underway.

The Jacksonville Project has received the approval of the Convention and it is expected that the institution will be completed within

the next two years.

RELIGIOUS PROGRAM

The Southern Baptist Hospital maintains the services of two full time chaplains, Dr. W. W. Hamilton, former President of the Southern Baptist Convention and of the Baptist Bible Institute, and Rev. J. Don Corley, his associate.

In addition to the chaplains, there is a full-time Director of Student Activities, who devotes her services to the religious, social and

recreational life of the student nurses.

The hospital day begins with a devotional service for the patients, conducted over the radio facilities with a speaker at every bedside. The student nurses and other membrs of the House Staff conduct prayer meetings and vesper services both in the hospital building and in the dormitories.

SCHOOL OF NURSING

Several years ago the hospital School of Nursing was named for Miss Harriet Mather, who has served as its Director for a number of years.

Young women who are graduates of an accredited high school, in good health, and of good moral character are eligible for admission to the school. One of the greatest services Baptists can render to the hospital is that of assisting in the recruitment of young women for training as professional nurses. A substantial number of scholarships are available to those who can qualify. We urge upon our people to assist in interesting our fine young women in our training program by sending their names and addresses to the Director of the School.

Those who believe in the great ministry of healing in a Christian atmosphere would do well to consider the hospital in their wills and in memorial gifts. We are confident that the Southern Baptist Hospital will continue to have a place in the prayers of our people and that an increasingly large number will make it possible for us to fulfill our mission in America's most interesting city in the great business of HEALING HUMANITY'S HURT.

RECOMMENDATION COMMITTEE

We your committee present the following recommendations:

1. Whereas every church in our association is a cooperating church with the Florida Baptist Convention and the Southern Baptist Conven-

tion, we recommend that each church provide for their pastor's expenses to and from the State Convention and the Evangelistic Conference each year, and that they endeavor to arrange for his expenses to the Southern Baptist Convention.

- 2. Whereas our Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer are constantly needed to be communicated with, we recommend that their addresses be placed in the minutes.
- 3. Whereas our great task is evangelism, we recommend that our Association instruct the Executive Committee and Pastors to make plans for an Association-Wide Evangelistic Crusade in 1953.
- 4. Whereas we are stewards of God's bounty, we recommend that our Association heartily co-operate in 1953 with the Southrn Baptist program of Advanc in Stewardship.
- 5. Whereas we are zealous for holding to God's instructions regarding ordination of ministers, we recommend and present to the Association a plan for voluntary co-operation by the churches for licensing and ordaining ministers. This plan to be further studied by the executive committee and presented to the Association in 1953 for adoption.

REPORT OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

The Committee held three regular and two called meetings during the year.

At the first meeting a calendar of events for the various departments of the Associational work was planned and adopted and the clerk instructed to include this calendar in the Associational Minutes.

At the January Meeting, the Committee accepted the resignation of Brother M. E. Tompkins as Associational Sunday School Superintendent. Upon motion Brother W. T. Newsome was appointed as Superintendent.

Brother Pasco Weeks, Music Director, gave his plans for the quarterly Hymn Sings and it was agreed that the March meeting be with Olustee Church.

Brother Barnes read a letter he had received from Bro. S. M. Rhodes, Pastor of the Watertown Church, stating they were withdrawing fellowship from the Association and the Southern Baptist convention. The matter was discussed but no action taken.

The Committee approved an application from Hopewell Church asking Pastors Aid from the State Board.

Brother Pearce, District Missionary was invited to do some work in Lake City and vicinity.

At the Meeting in June the resignation of Brother Hubert Barnes as Moderator was accepted and Brother C. R. Roberts as Vice-Moderator was asked to carry on the work.

At a called meeting in August, Brother W. H. Brown, Pastor of

White Springs church presented an application to the State Board for help in establishing a Mission at Bellmount, Fla. Amount of Application—\$500.00. The application was approved.

Upon motion a change in the reporting of the Nominating Committee at the Annual Meeting was adopted.

A motion was adopted recommending the same budget for the year '52-'53 as for '51-'52.

At the September meeting Brother Weeks told of his plan for a Music School for the coming year and asked that the Budget Committee recommend an increase in funds for the Music Department. An increase of \$100.00 was approved.

Report On

FLORIDA BAPTIST CHILDREN'S HOME

Applications for admission from October 1, 1951 to September 1, 1952, have exceeded those of any similar period for which there are records. The total number of applicants for the 11 months was 478. This indicates a feeling on the part of many people throughout the state that they can help at the Children's Home, and it also shows a need for better care than the child can receive in his local situation. They admitted 92 children during the year which left 386 applications that were withdrawn, dropped because of a lack of interest on the part of those making them, and for a lack of space in the Institution. They turned away some children who should have been admitted because they did not have the room. Mother's Aid was given in some cases, if there were wholesome family ties, and the child was permitted to stay with his parent.

They admitted 92 and discharged 52 children during the year. The total number under the care of the Institution during the past Associational year was 168.

Your Committee wishes to call to your attention the Special Offering which will be taken for the Home November 23. This is in keeping with the spirit of Thanksgiving and is the time when most of the Children's Homes in the Southern Baptist Convention ask for special gifts. They are not asking for funds for buildings this year. They want us to help feed and clothe our children. We want every church in this Association to give something for the care of the children in the Home. The increase in enrollment, the Mother's Aid Program, and Boarding home care will require more funds. If your church cannot make an offering at the suggested time, set a date that will be convenient for you and make it then. It is important to you and to the Home that you have a part in it. If you give to children, you will get a blessing; the child will get a blessing; and your church will be spiritually stimulated.

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION AND LITERATURE REPORT

It is important here to make a proper evaluation of the status of Christian Education among Southern Baptists. It is not difficult to give evidence of the tremendous contributions of these institutions to the life of our denomination. The Christian College, Seminary and Training School has given to our denomination 806 of the 827 missionaries now serving on the foreign field. More than 70% of our college trained, denominational leaders received their schooling in our denominational colleges. Our progress will be measured in all fields of Christian endeavor in proportion to our college trained leadership. Our 69 institutions of learning are valued at one hundred forty-five millions of dollars in terms of endowment and property values. In all of our schools there is an upsurge of interest with a program of expansion and enlargement. Why do we not make full use of our splendid colleges? Why do we invest our monies in them and send our sons and daughters elsewhere? Because we know so little about them that many of us think their only function is the training of denominational leaders. Southern Baptist Colleges, Seminaries and Training School enrollment 1951-52: 47,626. Ministerial Students and Volunteers for Full-Time Christian Service: 11,429.

Our own Stetson University located in DeDLand has a total of endowment of \$1,284,246.65; Value of Property: \$1,744,407.44; Total Income 1950-51; \$1,170,937.03; Total expenses: \$1,310,693.48; Deficit: \$139,754.45. Students enrolled 1951-52: 1,784; Graduates: 339; Ministerial Students: 110; those preparing for the mission field and special services: approximately 90.

In checking the records of the student body of Stetson University we find that 70% were actively engaged in some form of church work in the local churches during the school year. The B. S. U. is very active. There was a representative group of students attending Vespers, Morning Watch services; Y.W.A. meetings, prayer groups and Ministerial Association. Focus Week was like an old fashioned revival. Allen Hall, the Religious Center has truly become the center of religious activity on the campus of Stetson. Florida Baptists should never cease to rejoice in the great service and ministry of this center of culture creating a Christian atmosphere for the entire campus. Orientation Week for Ministerial students brought an awakened interest in the institutions, agencies and work of our denomination.

The Florida Baptist Convention has cooperated to the fullest in promoting every interest of Christian Education and Stetson University during 1950-51. 20% of the Florida Cooperative Program Dollar has gone to Stetson in the amount of \$76,924.01 for current operations. \$5,671.52 was designated by churches for current operations. The Florida Baptist Convention Endowment fund earned \$28,488.09, also for current operations. Florida Baptists gave for Ministerial Aid through the Cooperative Program \$8,212.65, and for capital improvements the sum of \$39,921.40 earmarked for the Sampson Library Building. Income for Stetson University for 1950-51 from Florida Baptists:

Through the Department of Christian Education we have kept before our people throughout the year special feature articles on many phases of Christian training and work. Stetson Sunday was observed with most pastors bringing Stetson to the attention of their people. The School of the Prophets of DeLand and West Florida was well attended with splendid teachers and preachers. We have never had so many preachers and leaders interested and co-operating in the vast program of Christian Education. With strong preaching, teaching, reflecting through example and conduct the high principles of Christian training, something is bound to happen. As a result more sons and daughters of Baptist families are coming to Stetson. This is as it should be.

The Florida Baptist Foundation was designed and incorporated to handle investments of Christian stewards. It is an agency of the State Convention, to serve any person who wishes to contribute to any Baptist Institution or agency by gifts of money, stocks, bonds or property or by bequests through wills.

Funds placed in the Foundation will be rigidly protected and managed in strict accord with the wishes of the donors. Under the charter, trust funds cannot be misused. Security of funds is insured by combined forces of the state laws and the highest moral integrity and honor of the Baptist denomination.

State laws give you the right to make a will, providing for the disposition of your property as you desire at death. However small your estate, it is wise to have a will. It is strange for a Christian to die leaving a will in which there is no thought of God and His Kingdom. Put the will of God in your will by bequeathing a portion of your estate

to the Florida Baptist Foundation, with some Christian cause as benefactor.

MUSIC REPORT TO BEULAH ASSOCIATION

Church music has gained momentum the past year as never before. The Church Music Department of the Baptist Sunday School Board has been enlarged to care for the increasing services there. The Florida Church Music Dpartment is coming to the close of its seventh year. Its services and opportunities have never been greater. Calls made upon it by the churches and associations have increased even though personnel of the department has never been sufficient.

This increase is due to the awakening of our churches in several respects:

- Our church leaders see more than ever the value of a Church-Centered, Church-Controlled and Christ-Honoring music program.
- They see possibilities in the Graded Choir plan where all ages are used.
- They realize the importance of Music Education as part of the over-all religious education program.

Of particular interest this past year has been the emphasis on the Association. Each Association in the state has been urged to select a Music Director. The Beulah Association has done this. Twenty-four associational music directors met in Jacksonville last February for a period of training and help. Our own associational director was present. Another such meeting is planned for January, 1953, immediately preceding the Evangelistic Conference.

One of the greatest needs we have in the churches in this association is a Training Program in music. There are now several training course books available for which credit may be given. Others are being written. An Association-wire School of Music was held in Beulah Association this past year. Another such school will be held at Lake City, Southside Church, December 1,5, 1952. It is hoped that every church in the association will be represented in this school.

The Associational Music Director along with four others of Beulah Association attended Music Week at Ridge Crest this past year. I feel that each church in the Association should help pay the expenses of one or more of your church workers to Ridge Crest this year. The Sunday School Board along with our own association helped pay the expenses of this trip to Ridge Crest.

STATE, HOME, A'ND FOREIGN MISSIONS REPORT

Our Florida Baptists divide their co-operative program dollar on 50-50 basis. Half of each dollar for mission work here in our state and the other half for world wide missions.

. . . Ye shall be witnesses unto Me both in Jerusalem, and in all Judea, and in Samaria, and unto the uttermost part of the earth.—Acts 1:8.

STATE MISSIONS

Why do we Southern Baptists believe so strongly in state missions anyway? The answer is:

 IT IS SCRIPTURAL. Jesus said, you shall be My witnesses, here in Jerusalem, Judea, Samarie. Without question State Missions is Scriptural.

2. BECAUSE STATE MISSIONS IS PRACTICAL. State Missions strengthens the home front, and without State Missions world-wide causes would perish.

State Missions build the home base through its program of building churches, hence: The strong churches of Judea sent the Gospel to Macedonia and the strong churches of Macedonia helped in sending the Gospel to the rest of the world. What could be more practical?

3. WE GET THE JOB DONE, and we Florida Baptists are

3. WE GET THE JOB DONE, and we Florida Baptists are not alone either, for we have millions of Baptists all over Southern Baptist Convention eagerly joining hands and hearts to GET THE JOB DONE, having a three-fold task:

A. Establishing new churches.

B. Nurture churches and

C. Enlist churches.

From 1947 through 1951 the Southern Baptist Convention added 1888 new churches, and this is the fruit of State Missions.

Florida Baptists gave to all causes \$1,122,863.12, of this \$561,677.13 for State Missions.

HOME MISSIONS

Last year home missionaries reported 36,390 professions of faith in response to their 99,033 sermons.

The meeting of the Southern Baptist Convention in San Francisco in June of 1951 focused attention upon the Home Mission Board's work in the West. Besides great increases in Convention states of the West.—Kansas, New Mexico, Arizôna, California, Oregon, and Washington—There has been an overflow of Baptist emphasis resulting in 150 Southern Baptist churches in Utah, Wyoming, Nevada, Idaho, Colorado, Indiana, Ohio, West Virginia and Michigan, affiliated with border states.

A total of 1,170 missionaries including 305 students served the Home Mission Board last year. The board has work among the Chinese, the deaf, the French, Indians, Italians, Japanese, Spanish-speaking, and serves the good will centers, Rescue homs and the Emergency Home in the field of direct missions. In other departments the Board has ministry among the Jews the Negroes, ranchers, and migrants. Through the department of Co-operative Missions the Board serves in mountain missions, the rural church program and city missions.

We recommend that the churches consider the budget plan of subscribing for the magazine: 'SOUTHERN BAPTIST HOME MISSIONS,' and send it to all church families. We further recommend that in this 1953 year we join with the Home Mission Board in its five-year Crusade emphasis upon ministering to minority groups.

CHECKING ON FOREIGN MISSION ADVANCE

The Advance Program goal set in 1948 is 1,750 foreign missionaries and an annual budget of \$10,000,000. Southern Baptists had 625 missionaries on the foreign field and a budget of \$3,782,800 at the beginning of 1948. At the beginning of 1952 we had 832 foreign missionaries and a budget of \$5,180,000.

The Advance Program goal set in 1948 is 1,750 foreign missionaries and an annual budget of \$10,000,000. Southern Baptists had 625 missionaries on the foreign field and a budget of \$3,782,800 at the beginning of 1948. At the beginning of 1952 we had 832 foreign missionaries and a budget of \$5,180,000.

Since the beginning of 1948 our missionaries have entered sixteen additional countries. The newest field is Indonesia. Three former China missionaries landed on the island of Java on Christmas Day of 151 and in February this year were granted permission by the Ministry of Religion in Indonesia to begin mission work. Other countries in the

Orient entered since ADVANCE began are: Philippine Islands, 24 missionaries in five centers on Luzon and Mindanao islads; Malaya, four, in two centers; Thailand, 13 in the capital city; Formosa, 15 in six centers; Korea, three in the city of Pusan.

Most of this new work in the Orient has been projected among Chinese populations in those countries by China missionaries evacuated from China. For the first time in more than a hundred years we have no missionaries on the China mainland, although nine are in English Hong Kong and Portuguese Macao. However, the Orient staff has increased, during the years of ADVANCE, from 257 to 291. Most of the new missionaries are in Japan, where 82 are working in 13 centers (five of the centers opened in 1951; six more centers are assigned to missionaries now in language school). Others have gone in Hawaii, where 42 missionaries are located in seven centers.

As many new countries have opened in Latin America as in the Orient. In South America are Venezuela, with three centers, and Ecuador and Peru with one each; in Central America are Costa Rica and Guatemala with one center each, and Honduras, to which missionaries are under appointment; and a China missionary couple are in the Bahama Islands in an advisory capacity.

Manwhile, older mission areas in Latin America—Argentina, Chile, Colombia, and Brazil—have maintained their work. A great many new centers have been opened in Portuguese Brazil. The mission staff in Latin America has advanced from 237 to 346.

Three other countries have been entered in other parts of the world. Medical personnel has been appointd for one of them, Southern Rhodesia, where evangelistic work began in 1950. Lebanon, new field in the Near East, has evangelistic work and a school in Beirut. Opening of the Switzerland international seminary, where 39 students from twenty countries are enrolled this year, gives Baptists a new approach to the mission task in Europe.

Older mission fields in the Africa-Europe-Near East area also show advance. A second center was opened in the Gold Coast in 1951, and the Nigerian Mission is launching into its second century with 144 missionaries in 19 centers. New ventures in the Near East include a co-operative farm in Israel and a hospital in Jordan. Work continues in Spain and Italy under the handicap of Catholic-controlled governments. The missionary staff in the area advanced from 131 to 195.

During the year 1951 the foreign mission fields reported a membership of 189,225 in 1,913 organized churches. Missionaries also worked with 3,668 outstations, 22 medical units, 405 schools, five publication houses, three orphanages, and seven good-will centers. Among the results were 18,372 baptisms, 49,271 enrolled in schools, 6,865,372 pieces of literature published 99 orphan children cared for, and 1,766 people contacted in the good will centers.

Southern Baptists are keeping up with foreign mission advance through THE COMMISSION, their foreign mission journal. t is recognized increasingly as an indispensable aid in being well informed about all of our overseas work.

The 1951 foreign mission receipts from the Co-operative Program totaled \$6,900,000. The Lottie Moon offering totaled \$2,668,051.30.

REPORT OF THE RELIEF AND ANNUITY BOARD OF THE SOUTHERN BAPTIST CONVENTION

1952

The reports, reviewing the work of the Relief and Annuity Board, presented at the annual meeting of the Board in Dallas, on March 12, showed 1951 to be a year of continued progress and enlarged service to our Southern Baptist constituency.

Officers of the Board were re-elected; Dr. Wallace Bassett, president; Dr. Walter R. Alexander, executive secretary; Dr. Robert S. Jones, associate secretary; Mr. Orville Groner, treasurer-investments.

Total income for 1951 was \$5,144,134.29, with total benefits paid, amounting to \$1,559,438.69. Total assets of the Board as of December 31, 1951 were \$23,333,014.10.

In spite of more intensive promotional work on the part of the several states and of the Relief and Annuity Board, there is yet much to be done to broaden the protection of the Ministers' Retirement Plan. Far too many pastors are retiring without any source of income and thus adding to the burden of the relief department. In 1951, the relief department spent more in ten states than it received. The deficit in these states could only be met by drawing upon the relief reserves. The relief department cannot continue to meet these deficits by reducing the relief reserve fund. This situation can and must be corrected. Two suggestions are made which should help in overcoming these deficits.

First, more of the churches should follow the recommendation of the Southern Baptist Convention and take a Fellowship Offering for ministerial relief on the first Sunday in June, or at such time as convenient to the church.

Second, each state should consider setting a date after which time no pastor would be eligible for assistance from the relief department who had not been a member of the Ministers Retiremnt Plan. A pastor who refuses to join the plan has no right to expect the denomination to provide for his needs when he is forced into retirement because of ill health or old age when he refuses to make some effort to provide, with the help of his denomination, something for himself. Unless something like this is done, the relief load will continue to increase when it should decrease from year to year.

The retirement boards of the other major denominations require that a pastor be a member of some contributory retirement plan before he is considered eligible for assistance from relief funds.

A pastor who lacks three to five years of reaching retirement age, can join the Ministers' Retirement Plan and enjoy an age annuity on

retirement, far beyond what he would receive if he wer placed on the relief roll. Every active pastor should take advantage of the opportunity which his denomination has provided that he may not face a penniless old age.
