Constitution

- 1. This Body shall be known as the Alachua Baptist Association of Florida.
- 2. It shall be composed of messengers from Southern Baptist Churches of the same faith and gospel order, voluntarily banded together for missionary, educational and benevolent service.
- 3. The officers of this Association shall be Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, and Treasurer. The Moderator and Vice-Moderator shall be nominated from the floor and elected by ballot, and by a majority vote, on the first day of the Annual Meeting; but the Association may, by a manimous vote, instruct the Clerk to cast the ballot of the body as a whole. Officers elected shall assume office at the close of the Annual Session which elects them. No person elected Moderator shall hold office for a longer period than two consecutive years, not counting an unexpired term. The Association in annual session, shall elect or approve all departmental heads for the ensuing year.
- 4. Each Church shall be entitled to two messengers, and shall be entitled to one additional messenger to every twenty-five additional members over the first fifty, provided no church may have more than ten messengers. These duly elected messengers who are present shall constitute the Association in annual session.
- 5. The Executive Committee of this Association shall be composed of the following: the Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, Superintendent of the Associational Sunday School, Director of the Associational Training Union, President of the

Associational Woman's Missionary Union, President of the Associational Brotherhood, Director of the Associational Music Department, the President of the Youth Organization, together with all pastors who hold membership within the Association and one other member from each cooperating Church.

- 6. This Association shall meet annually at such time and place as may be agreed upon by the Body. When necessary, the time and/or place of any meeting may be set or changed by the Executive Committee.
- 7. The Association shall recognize the independence of Churches and shall not in any wise seek to exercise jurisdiction over them, yet shall have power to drop from its connection any Church found to be unorthodox in faith or practice.
- 8. Churches may be admitted into this Body by petitionary letter provided they shall have been found orthodox and of a cooperative spirit. Each Church, before being admitted, must make application through the Moderator or the Executive Committee at least three months before the annual or semi-annual Associational meeting, provided however, that the Association may waive the three months period by three-fourths vote of the members present. The Church making petition shall set forth in writing their doctrinal belief and willingness to conform to the rules and regulations by which the Association is governed. Upon reception, the Moderator shall, for the Association extend to the messengers the hand of fellowship.
- 9. Any Church shall be at liberty to discontinue its connection with the Association if desired, by giving proper notice of such intention. If any Church fails to be represented in annual meetings for three years in succession, it may be dropped from active membership.
- 10. The Association in annual or semi-annual session, may alter or amend this constitution by a three-fourth vote of members present and voting.

By-Laws

- 1. All sessions of this Body shall be opened and closed reverently in duly approved form.
- 2. The Moderator shall preside over the deliberations of this Association, keep order, present for discussion and vote all motions properly ordered, and perform all other duties usually appertaining to this office. He shall not vote except in the case of a tie. The Vice-Moderator shall preside in the absence of the Moderator or when asked by the Moderator to preside.
- 3. Robert's Rules of Order shall be recognized as authority in all matters of parliamentary procedure.
- 4. It shall be the duty of the Clerk of the Association to keep a fair and correct record of the proceedings, prepare the manuscript for the press, have minutes printed, and distribute them to the churches as early as possible after the annual meetings and shall keep a complete file of minutes for use of the Association.
- 5. The Treasurer, who also may be Clerk, shall keep an accurate record of all moneys received and disbursed, shall pay out money only upon instruction from the Body and shall make an itemized report of all receipts and disbursements to the Association in annual session. If requested, the Treasurer shall make a monthly statement to the Executive Committee.
- 6. The Executive Committee, which is the Association ad interim, shall have general supervision of all work initiated and fostered by the Association. It shall meet monthly to plan for the promotion of all phases of the work, the time and place of meeting to be set by the Executive Committee. It shall use its best efforts to stimulate the spirituality and activities of the Churches and shall report its work

to the Association in annual session.

- 7. The Vice-Moderator shall be program Chairman for all Annual Sessions of the Association. Upon a vacancy occurring in the office of Moderator, the Vice-Moderator shall assume all duties of the Moderator. The Executive Committee shall then select another person to be the Vice-Moderator. It shall also select persons for any other vacancies that may arise,
- 8. The Clerk, Treasurer, Visual-Aids Librarian, Music Director, Historian, Chairman of Evangelism, the Missions Committee and the Trustees of the Assembly Grounds will be nominated by a committee appointed by the Moderator.
- 9. These By-Laws may be altered or amended by a two-thirds vote of the Body in annual session.

During the Associational year 1967-68 our theme has been "Helping Each Church Fulfill Its Mission through Ministry," We have sought to accomplish this by stressing the need for greater efforts to reach people, and improved Bible Teaching in our Sunday Schools. Our efforts have not been all together successful since we were only able to get 25 churches in the Association to participate in the training efforts. So far as I know we had only 10 Vacation Bible Schools, I am concerned with this number as this is less than one third of our total churches. I believe that we should have done better.

I want to take this means of thanking all who have had a part in making the work what it has been through this year and with your help and prayers we will endeavor to show improvement through this new year.

I am attaching hereto a copy of our program for the year starting with Oct. 1, 1968 through the year of 1969.

With the Crusade of the Americas now in full swing we will need to be much in prayer for our work. This will not be an easy year for any of us who try to keep pace with the Crusade however this is a must if we expect to do our best for the Kingdom's work. So far we have not had a definite committal of all of the churches to take part in this great movement.

I covet your prayers and help in this coming years work.

REPORT ON TRAINING UNION

Our first major effort last year was the Group Training School held at the Floral City Baptist Church. The State T.U. Department assisted, and nearly 80 awards were earned from studies in each age group study. This was the first such study school for Training Union in seven years. Training workers who serve in the Training Union is indispensable.

"M" Night attendance exceeded the previous year by over 130 when 373 came for services at Wildwood, to witness an outstanding drama presented by local talent.

Each month in the past year we held a YOUTH RALLY. Some were highly successful, and others almost died for a lack of attendance; but it was worth all the effort. I appreciate the privilege to serve as Youth Director for the coming year.

Miss Virginia Guisto (from the First Church of Brooksville) was the Sword Drill winner. David Burgher (from the Masaryktown Baptist Church) was the winner of the Better Speakers Tournament. There were more participants this year than the year previous, but still only 4 churches were represented. What a joy it would be to see all the churches represented in the forthcoming year.

Our largest Youth Rally (with an attendance between 150 and 200) was held on June 1st at the Hernando County High School when the Riverside Baptist Church of Tampa presented the new musical "GOOD NEWS". We purchased nearly 350 New Testaments to give to all High School graduates from Hernando, Citrus and Sumter Counties. We helped to sponsor David Burgher and Gene Putters to the Baptist World Youth Conference in Berne, Switzerland, from private funds costing \$560.00.

One new Training Union was started this year at the Hebron Baptist Church. Our enrolment at the present time is 1523.

I believe that our monthly Youth Rally should be emphasized this year because they are the instrument of the Lord and can be used to spearhead the Crusade of the Americas within our Association. We will need money for this program and our only funds are from a free-will offering that is taken on the spot to pay for the immediate expenses. Pray that God's will may be done in this matter.

WOMAN'S MISSIONARY UNION REPORT

"Inasmuch as ye have done it utno one of the least of these....ye have done it unto me" has been the watchword of Woman's Missionary Union during this year of Denominational Emphasis on ministry. With a stronger program of mission action than ever before, women and young people in Florida have attempted to broaden their area of concern for and participation in missions. Mission action groups, made up of women who are willing to go beyond the mere routine of missionary service,

have come to the front this year. The emphasis on mission action has been good preparation for our participation in the Crusade of the Americas plans.

Following the Seventy-Fourth Annual Session of Florida Woman's Missionary Union, we moved into the celebration of the seventy-fifth anniversary of organized WMU work in our state. The climax to this celebration will come in February, 1969, when the annual session will be held at First Church, Tallahassee, Highlight of the anniversary year has been the move by the women to become a regular department of work of the Florida Baptist Convention, rather than an auxiliary, a relationship that has been maintained through the years. Completion of this step will be by October 1, 1969.

"Geared to Change" has been the motto of our organization this year, as we have made plans to move into the new WMU program. Associational WMU leaders participated in an interpretation meeting in Orlando. This was followed by a meeting in our own association in the Center Hill Church, attended by ninety-four. We were represented at the area leadership schools in Gainesville and Clearwater by thirty. Our association held a school on May ninth at the First Church, Bushnell with Forty-six attending. Seventy-four cards of accreditation in the new manuals were received from these schools.

In our association there are six churches without organized WMU work. The new WMU plans provide for a WMU Director in churches where there is no WMU work. This director will work with the pastor in providing for mission study and mission action in the church. We will seek, during the coming year, to begin some kind of WMU work in each church in our association.

REPORT OF YOUR FIELD SECRETARY FOR DISTRICT 7 FOR THE CHURCH YEAR 1967-1968

Your Field Secretary spent 321 days on the field this past year, traveling a total of 30,577 miles in the work.

Two new churches and four new missions have been established and at the present time there—are ten churches sponsoring missions.

I have made 293 church visits and 26 mission visits. Your missionary had the priviledge of assisting in four revivals including one Stewardship revival. I have delivered 226 sermons and addresses and conducted 25 prayer meetings. I have made 106 personal soul winning visits and have seen 39 additions to the churches when I have preached, 22 of these have come for baptism and 17 by letter. I have assisted in 6 ordination services. During the past church year I have distributed 701 Bibles and portions of Bibles, 11,300 tracts and pieces of literature. I assisted in one School of Missions with 21 churches participating. I have mailed out approximately 7,500 letters, cards and newsletters this year. I have had conferences with 121 groups, committees and 1,071 individuals.

Tracts, New Testaments and portions of Scriptures have been placed in Migrant Camps and Hospitals. Several boxes of clothing have been placed in Migrant Camps.

I have made 16 surveys. This past year I attended Southern Baptist Convention, State Convention, one State Mission Board meeting, Home Mission Conference at Ridgecrest, Pastors Retreat at Lake Yale and many other associational, district and state conferences.

This past year has been one of the few in which every church in the district did not give to World Missions through the Cooperative Program.

Please pray for your District Missionary and feel free to call on me any time I am needed.

EVANGELISM COMMITTEE REPORT

This past year the churches of our Association baptized 178 persons. This represents a ratio of one baptism for every 30 members. THE RADIO AND TELEVISION COMMISSION REPORT

Walter H. Markham

When the world's population is measured against the potential audience of a given religious radio program, the task which lies before the Christian world takes on positive aspects. The most promising path to any form of world evangelism lies in radio and television and with the professional experts who have learned to wield them successfully. During the past decade, no field of Southern Baptist endeavor has grown so rapidly as that in which the Radio and Television Commission is engaged.

During 1967, the Commission was on the front lines of our nation's spiritual warfare. A higher value was placed on the Commission's programs by station managers and owners, with time segments improving by 18 per cent. Thus, the largest audience in the agency's history was reached with the gospel of Christ. This was reflected in an increased volume of mail response.

Another major development in the daily rontine of the agency came with the discontinuation of BEAM, INTERNATIONAL, the Commission's monthly magazine of religious radio and television. The name of the publication is being retained for use with a newsletter to be aimed at the broadcasting industry, and state Baptist paper advertising, both of which are considered new directions for the material formerly issued in magazine format. THE BAPTIST HOUR sermons which were featured each month in BEAM, INTERNATIONAL will be offered separately in a quarterly compilation.

Southern Baptists' Radio-TV Commission now claims approximately 20 per cent of all religious public service time on stations scheduling one or more Radio and Television Commission programs. The potential audience for this time each week is estimated at 60 to 75 million, with programs in every state and major city in America and some 40 other countries.

The relationship with the broadcasting networks was especially fruitful in 1967, with almost \$850,000 worth of time and production cost donated to the work of the Commission and thus to the Southern Baptist Convention.

The outlook for network television time in 1968 is excellent. An extra half-hour program has been offered by NBC-TV, bringing the annual total of 5 half-hours, or 10 per cent of all that network's religious time.

The American Broadcasting Company in December, 1967, gave Southern Baptists a weekly quarter hour segment on its new contemporary radio network for 1968, in Sunday morning spots on a total of 107 stations.

Two new specialty programs, one radio and one television, were launched for local consumption the early part of 1968. JOT, five minute television animated cartoon with a scriptural message, was begun on 10 stations.

OMNISCOPE, aimed at the college age group through campus radio stations, was begun on 14 stations with plans for increased coverage late in 1968.

Plans were approved by the Home Mission Board and the Radio-TV Commission

late last year for production of three television programs to be used in connection with the Crusade of the Americas in March, 1969.

The gross number of stations carrying syndicated programming during the year totaled 2645. The estimated commercial value of the public service time given to these programs was \$3,246,900.

The primary follow-up in spiritual counseling performed by the Commission is through letters, scripture portions, and other printed materials designed to present the gospel of Christ in greater depth than the programs. As often as possible, the names and addresses of those who write in are sent to pastors and/or associations for personal follow-up and witness.

Wider distribution of the scriptures, and Bible reading encouragement, continued throughout the year. A special correspondence course entitled, "The Profile of Christian Experience," to introduce the New Testament to radio listeners, was written by Dr. Ralph Herring, executive secretary of the Seminary Extension Department. Text for this course will be the paperback New Testament, GOOD NEWS FOR MODERN MAN. Initial testing of this course on radio audiences will begin during the second quarter of 1968.

During 1967 the Commission provided radio and television production assistance for more than 150 churches in 40 states. Help was given through the mail, by telephone, conferences at the Communications Center in Fort Worth, and by personal visits to various church fields. More than 300 radio/tv spot announcements and format scripts for local use were written in these efforts.

IMPORTANT DATE FOR ALL, NEW MEMBERS IN PLAN "A"

The three-plan Southern Baptist Protection Program has one provision in Plan "A" that will affect all prospective new members soon; this provision is called "Delayed Participation," commonly known as a "grace period," The grace period provision will become effective on January 1, 1969. The provision states that the grace date is established in one of three ways: (1) as of January 1, 1969; (2) on the member's 26th birthday; or (3) one year from the date he first becomes eligible, whichever is the latter. This simply means that if a member joins Plan "A" of the Protection Program later than his grace date, the disability, widow, child, education and dependent parent benefits will be proportionally reduced. The reduction will be the ratio which such years of delay bear to the total years from the grace date

to the normal retirement date. Therefore, it is important that all who are now eligible join the Program before January 1, 1969.

Response to the new Program has been good. During 1967, 3,146 members joined some part of the three-plan Program. The plans in the Protection Program are: Plan "A," formerly called the Southern Baptist Protection Plan, and the plan in which benefits were increased and new ones added; Plan "B," the Age Security Plan; and Plan "C," the Variable Benefit Plan.

ANNUITANTS RECEIVE "13th" CHECK

For the second consecutive year, all persons receiving a life benefit were mailed a "13th" check. Each check was for an amount equal to 12 per cent of his annual benefit. These checks were made possible because of interest earnings in excess of what the plans required. The trustees approved, two years ago, the issuance of the "13th" checks, providing the Board realized such excess interest earnings.

DUES ON TOTAL SALARY ENCOURAGED

Inflation continues to affect the buying power of the dollar for everyone, including those who have retired. No sign of a leveling off period of the inflationary trend is indicated. The Protection Program is designed to help any church provide as much retirement income for the minister and staff as it desires. Many churches are moving to ten per cent dues on total salary, recommended as a minimum by the Annuity Board and state convention secretaries.

REPORT FOR 1967

As of December 31, 1967, 1,202 new members had been issued certificates in Plan "A" of the Protection Program. A total number of 17,400 churches were providing the Program for their ministers.

Of the 174 agencies in the state conventions and the Southern Baptist Convention, 145 were providing the Program. The total number of employes covered in the agency programs was 7,140.

Rev. Phil Maxwell promotes the Protection Program in Florida. He is jointly employed by the Annuity Board and Florida Baptist Convention. REPORT ON CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

In 1967 the Education Commission experienced one of the busiest years of its history. The big news was the completion of the Baptist Education Study Task (BEST). The first printing of the report was soon sold out and another printing was ordered. Over 21,000 copies of the completed report and 15,000 copies of the chapter entitled "Analysis and Interpretation" were printed. Approximately 8,000 persons participated in this study.

Among the suggestions coming out of the BEST report is that additional colloquiums be held in each state having colleges and in any other states wishing to do so.

The Southern Baptist Convention Education Commission is promoting the fifteenth Annual Emphasis on Christian Higher Education and Baptist Schools in 1968. The emphasis is designed to assist the colleges to enroll top students and help students and parents in selecting a suitable college. Instead of having a general theme this year, the schools themselves are being promoted.

The Commission is in its third year of sponsoring the Cooperative College Registry. Every reasonable effort is continuing to be made to find teachers for Baptist

schools.

Southern Baptists now operate 38 senior colleges, 15 junior colleges, 7 academics, 4 Bible schools, and 6 seminaries. Baptist schools show an enrollment of 98,695 for 1967-68. A gain over 1966-67 of 554 students. From September 1965 to August 1966, graduates from the schools were 12,604, compared to 13,596 from September 1966 to August 1967.

State conventions and the Southern Baptist Convention gifts to the schools for the year increased \$307,984, for a total of \$19,304,199 compared to \$18,996,215

in 1966-67.

Reports from the seminaries, colleges, and schools show that ministerial students declined only 35 for the year. Home and foreign mission volunteers showed a gain of 43, a loss of 102 in ministers of education, a loss of only 2 in church music,

a gain of 211 in other vocation volunteers.

The third Sunday in February is becoming more frequently observed as Baptist College and Seminary Day. COLLEGE AND CAREER subscriptions are used by some schools for recruitment mailing, Helpful materials on college planning and career choices are distributed at Ridgecrest, Glorieta, and other assemblies. The problem today is not the lack of students but rather the selection of those who should attend Baptist colleges.

ASSOCIATIONAL REPORT ON SEMINARIES (OR, ON THEOLOGICAL EDUCATION)

Last year Southern Baptists had almost 5,000 men and women in our six seminaries.

Eight degree programs are available in our seminaries.

At the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary in Louisville the enrollment increased for the sixth consecutive year, an unmatched trend among denominational seminaries in the United States. Plans are going forward for the Billy Graham Chair of Evangelism and Southern will be the official depository for all the Graham records.

Southwestern Seminary in Fort Worth is our largest school with 1,926 enrolled. Five new faculty members were added this year. Several new courses in social work

will be offered next year,

The New Orleans Seminary is celebrating its 50th anniversary this year, Emphasis is on supervised mission work for all students, EuroHunent was 835, Five new degrees are being offered.

Southeastern Seminary devotes primary attention to study leading to the basic theological degree. Three new professors were added, 145 students were graduated. A new student center has been constructed.

Golden Gate Seminary, just north of San Francisco, enrolled 279 students, 4 of whom were from Florida. The first annual Urban Church Institute was held this year.

Midwestern Baptist Theological Seminary entered her tenth year and had an enrollment of 262 students. One new professor was added. An outstanding Family Life Conference was held. 48 new married student apartments were completed and occupied.

A call to the ministry is a call to preparation and our seminaries are doing an excellent job in training worthy ministers to share the mind and life of Jesus Christ with our generation.

UNITED CHRISTIAN ACTION

It is far better to light a candle than to complain about the darkness. If at times it seems the tiny candle of genuine moral concern in Florida is hopelessly inadequate, let us recall that the flame has never flickered out. At every step in history, there have been men and women of courage and conviction to stand against evil.

We who boldly oppose the exploitation of human souls by the promoters of alcohol, gambling, obscenity and their fellow travelers, have tremendous human and

spiritual resources at our command. We must continue the battle.

What is United Christian Action, Inc.? Simply stated, it is a fellowship of concerned Christians in Florida who are willing to pray hard and work hard in a determined fight to improve the moral environment in which we live and serve our fellow men.

Florida Baptists through the years have provided the strong leadership and major financial support needed to insure the effective work of the organization. Through the annual State Missions Offering, major life-line support has come from all the participating churches to guarantee the continuation of UCA's determined battle against those who exploit people for profit. 280 churches demonstrated a deeper concern by placing UCA in their monthly or annual budgets for additional support.

Why is UCA needed? Recause Florida has become a major target of those willing

to put money before morals, profit before the Golden Rule.

A look at what is happening in Florida in 1968 is frightening, 20,000 licensed alcoholic drink outlets produced a steady stream of hopeless alcoholics, problem drinkers, drinking drivers, broken families and crime breeding grounds too numerous to list. Drinkers spent over \$550 million to purchase and consume over 110 million gallons of whiskey, wine or beer.

The organized gambling menace is reaching unbelievable depths of depravity. Legalized gambling is now promoted at 16 dog tracks, six Jai Alai gambling frontons, six horse tracks. Thus, with half the dog tracks in America, the only Jai Alai frontons, and enormous horse track gambling, the gambling profiteers manipulated the Florida legislature into legalizing Bingo gambling on a statewide, unlimited, unsupervised, literally uncontrolled scale. The few other states where Bingo is permitted at least have some realistic controls. But not in Florida.

The narcotics problem, especially among children and teenagers, is a deadly serious threat, almost of epidemic proportions. The traffic in pornography is wide-

spread and unbelieveably vile, in both magazines and movies.

Every whiskey, wine or beer outlet every Bingo gambling hall, or race track, or bolita gang every theater or newsstand or grocery store that peddles pornography every promoter of narcotics these are deadly enemies of our churches. And because they exist and must be fought, UCA must continue to engage the enemy on every front.

Combining the pollution of legalized liquor, legalized gambling, legalized obscenity, with an amazing apathy on the part of some churchmen, public officials and community leaders, we face a bleak and uncertain future. Yet we must not fall into the pit of despair. As never before, God's faithful few must marshall courage, wisdom and determination to plant the seeds of righteousness and depend upon His

promise to bring the harvest of the new life for the souls of the perishing.

UCA now serves it's sponsoring churches through Education, Legislation, Rehabilitation and Personal Commitment to Abstinence. Publishing and distributing free to churches, schools, communities and interested individuals, over two and a half million pieces of carefully researched literature, UCA unites the concern and efforts of 12 denominations in a determined bidto win and protect the lives, hearts and souls of the boys and girls, men and women of Florida. ANNUAL STATE MISSIONS REPORT

D.S. Smith

Outstanding changes have materialized this year in our State Missions program. The proposed changes that will have the most far reaching effect are primarily in two areas.

For many years the Florida Baptist Convention has had no organic relationship with the Home Mission Board. We have been carrying on a program of State Missions primarily through the field secretaries, and the Home Mission Board has been supporting a large number of missionaries who were doing work in our state. The areas of activity are language missions, mission centers, juvenile rehabilitation, migrant missions, deaf work, National Baptist work, Jewish work, and Indian missions. A working arrangement has been worked out and is to be presented to this convention for approval. If it is approved, then it will be possible for us to pursue new areas of mission activity in the state. Areas that have never been considered before, Expansion into these new areas will allow us to speak to new people in many new ways.

Two areas that have already claimed our attention is a Week Day Ministry in the Jacksonville Association. In this program we are seeking to establish a ministry to the inner city. Thousands of people live in these areas, and are not presently being reached through conventional means. It is our purpose to approach them in new and varied ways.

We are also searching for ways to minister to people during their leisure time. Since there is no established philosophy of leisure time ministry, we are planning to spend some time studying the subject and working out basic principles that will allow us to approach these needs. It will take time, but our state has more open fields

to be explored than probably any other in the United States.

The other major change is from the Committee of 15 Chairman, Dr. Henry A. Parker, in his report to the State Board of Missions made this proposal which the

Board passed.

"That the State Board of Missions vote to change the present field secretary program from a system of associational support with state assistance, if requested, the associations employing and directing their superintendents of missions, and that the executive secretary-treasurer be asked to present a plan to the Board for implementation of the change which would assure a minimum of hardship for personnel involved in the change,"

This means we will be pursuing a new area of associational missions.

Changes are forthcoming. Many of them will take many months to put into effect. Others will take years, but no day could have a greater challenge than ours. If we meet the challenge, it will take the cooperation of everyone, and a prayerful determination to work to fulfill our responsibility inherent in the Great Commission.

REPORT OF THE FLORIDA BAPTIST FOUNDATION

The Florida Baptist Foundation has had another good year of service. Every agency and institution supported by the Convention has been named in wills where the Foundation gave assistance, and again the total amount is considerable.

From reliable sources we are told that Baptist causes have been included in two wills now under probate, and that the total expected from these two wills amounts to between \$75,000 and \$100,000. Additional funds have increased by gifts of more

than \$15,000 since the last report.

The audit of September 30, 1967 shows \$725,357,97 held by the Foundation under trust agreements or under the conditions of wills. The Foundation owns none of this money, but holds it in trust for the various causes favored by the trust agreement or the will.

All funds are held by the trust department of one of Florida's largest banks, and investments are made upon the recommendation of the Investment Committee of our Trustees after receiving recommendations from that bank. Investments are made with a view to reasonable returns on investments and with a view to growth of securities. This conforms with good investment practices of other such Foundations.

The Trustees of the Foundation are elected annually by the Florida Baptist Convention. At present there are fourteen laymen and one minister serving as Trustees. Five of these men serve on the Executive Committee, which is also the Investment Committee, and the remaining Trustees serve on the Promotion or the Audit Committee. The books of the Foundation are audited annually by the Convention's auditor.

In addition to specified duties, the Foundation has, as in the past, engaged in the raising of capital funds for our Baptist institutions. In the past The Florida Baptist Retirement Centers, Inc., and Stetson University have benefited from the services of the Foundation to a considerable extent. This year Baptist Bible Institute has received several thousand dollars with the assistance of the Foundation.

The Executive Secretary-Treasurer is available to meet with anyone who wishes to leave anything by will to any Baptist cause, or to discuss life-income agreements with anyone who would like to establish a living trust.

FLORIDA BAPTIST RETIREMENT CENTERS Edmond Burgher

Florida Baptist Retirement CENTERS is continuing the rapid progress and development of a complete program of GERIATRIC care. The Center emphasizes a three-phase program including nursing care, custodial care, and duplexes on the TWENTY-THREE ACRE CAMPUS IN VERO BEACH.

The past year has been a year of transition. Mr. Leo Roberts, the director for the past five years, was forced into early retirement because of illness. I was appointed by the Board of Trustees to succeed Mr. Roberts, effective MAY 1, 1968. The extended care facility which was constructed under Mr. Roberts' administration was opened and the first resident was received the 8th of August.

On September 1, 1968, there were thirty-two residents in the custodial unit, thirteen in the duplexes, and eight in the extended care facility (nursing home), for a population total of FIFTY-THREE.

The age span in the home runs from 65 to 95 years. The average age is 81.7 YEARS.

Great strides in medical science are giving us a rapidly increasing population of older people. Even though we are aware of the demands this will bring for expanded service and space in the years ahead, our present concern is for the people in our care and the problems that accompany the aging process. Every effort is being made

to help them look forward to these added years with pleasure, instead of with dread, frustration and anxiety. In our homes we seek to do this with a carefully trained staff and a well balanced program that ministers to the physical, social, spiritual, mental and emotional needs of each resident.

CHRISTIAN LIFE COMMISSION REPORT

In 1967, Southern Baptists moved forward in their concern for social issues and relating the Bible to everyday life. With a sound theology, a zealous concern for evangelism and a deeper and greater interest in ministry and an awakening social consciousness, Southern Baptists stand on the threshold of greater things. With these developments, the work of the Christian Life Commission is increased. Greater demands are placed on the Commission to make its work more effective in all areas of denominational life.

Last year the Christian Life Commission disseminated a new series of pamphlets entitled "Issues and Answers," dealing with critical issues of our day. This series, along with the others, has more than doubled the distribution of any previous year.

The Christian Life Commission has widely distributed articles, study guides, photographs, sermons and addresses. Various channeled materials through denominational magazines and periodicals have been utilized. Each one making an impact for applied Christianity in its area.

These things, especially, seem to stand out in this year's efforts. First, two successful summer conferences at Glorieta and Ridgecrest where held. A significant book, MORALITY AND THE MASS MEDIA, written by Kyle Haselden from his Ridgecrest lectures, was produced by Broadman Press. The book, PEACE, PEACE, compiled by Dr. Foy Valentine, is a compilation of messages from the Glorieta Assembly.

Second, support was secured to guarantee the free distribution of more than 50,000 copies of RESOURCE GUIDE TO CURRENT SOCIAL ISSUES. These copies will be distributed to Southern Baptist pastors, ministers of education and denominational workers. It has been especially designed and developed to provide practical help on the most important moral issues of the day.

Third, a most significant Christian Citizenship Seminar was held in Washington, D.C. during March of this year. Some 200-250 Southern Baptist thought leaders from across the Convention came to discuss "Christian Action In a Disordered Society."

The Christian Life Commission also serves in a Program of Specialized Service and Co-ordination. Baptist work is strengthened by the Commission's responsibility with the Southern Baptist Counseling and Guidance Conference. The Southern Baptist Social Service Association and the Association of Executives of Homes for the Aging.

MUSIC REPORT

1968 Preston Devall

The objective of the Church Music Department of the Florida Baptist Convention is to assist churches and associations in establishing, conducting, enlarging, and improving the music program in the churches.

The year 1969 is the year that Southern Baptists are promoting "A CHURCH FULFILLING ITS MISSION THROUGH EVANGELISM AND WORLD MISSIONS." The associational Music Ministry is the key to the promotion of this program. Every association is expected to cooperate fully in the promotion of the "CRUSADE OF THE AMERICAS."

There were some 400 churches in music training out of approximately 1500 churches in the state during 1967-68. The associational organization and the Church Music Department of the Florida Baptist Convention stand ready to assist every church with its music training needs.

This past year the associational music ministry organization showed 42 out of 46 associations held Associational Festivals. 215 churches participated in the festivals with 470 choral groups, totaling 18,469 choir members--80 hymm players--19 song leaders--20 instumental ensembles with a total of 214 participants.

The 1968 report of the State Festivals is as follows: There were 142 choral groups with 4,090 participants. A grand total of individuals participating in the State Festivals was 5,292, 84 churches participated and 191 awards were issued.

In 1969 State Festivals for choral groups, instrumental ensembles and bell choirs will be held each week-end in February and the first week-end in March. Two separate festivals will be held for hymn players and song leaders on April 26. Please check your state calendar or diary for exact dates. In order to participate in the State Festival it will be necessary for every church to participate first in an Associational Festival.

Harmony Bay Youth Music Camps were held at both West Florida Assembly Grounds and at Lake Yale Baptist Assembly Grounds. One week each for Intermediates and Young People at both camps and one Junior Camp was held at Lake Yale. Please check your state calendar or diary for 1969 dates.

There were 915 churches out of 1357 reporting Music Ministries through the Church Letter to the Association with an enrolment of 61,160. Every church is urged to realize that if it has adults and children, uses music in its worship services and in its organizations, elects a music director and has regular rehearsals, it has a Music Ministry.

The Church Music Department of the Baptist Sunday School Board and the Church Music Department of the Florida Baptist Convention will jointly sponsor two Methods and Materials Clinics. The first will be September 15-16, 1969 at First Baptist Church, Lakeland and the second September 18-19, 1969 at First Baptist Church, Panama City.

The associational music organization and the State Church Music Department wish to thank each church and its music leaders for a very fine year and wish for you another good year for "more and better music by more and better musicians, singing with grace in their hearts to the Lord."

CHRISTIAN LITERATURE AND THE FLORIDA BAPTIST WITNESS

We live in a day of confused and misguided thinking. It is more necessary than ever before for our people to be accurately and regularly informed. In order to do this, our Baptist publishers have had to expand both their facilities and circulation. Last year the Baptist Sunday School Board filled orders for 105,874,440 copies of periodicals and special items, 5,477,631 books and 83,200,067 church bulletin items. There were 29 state papers reported to the Southern Baptist Convention with a total circulation of 1,587,776 in 1968.

Our own State Paper the Florida Baptist Witness, as of August I, 1968 had a circulation of 66,897. Nine hundred sixty seven churches are now using the Church Budget plan or the club plan to get our state paper into the hands of our people.

The new rates effective October 1, 1968 are (budget \$1.50 per subscription) (club subscription \$1.75) (individual \$2.25) per year.

It is requested that every Church prayerfully consider putting the Florida Baptist Witness in the home of every resident Church family,

SOUTHERN BAPTIST HOSPITALS REPORT

There are times when the unbelievable is taken for granted. There has been much advance in the field of medical care in ten short years. The potential of healing and prevention has far surpassed the imagination of even the medical men. Drug therapy, treatment of cardiac arrest, heart, kidney transplants stagger the imagination.

During the year 1967-68, the two hospitals at New Orleans and Jacksonville have serviced 38,148 in-patients. 6,383 babies were born in the hospitals. 64,238 out-patients were serviced.

There were 221 persons trained in our educational programs. The cost of this

program to train nurses, technicians of all fields was \$846,248.

1,408 people were treated in the charity program of our hospitals. 632 babies were born, and 7,125 visits of out-patients were recorded. The cost of these services was \$355,537. Our special Mother's Day offering goes to offset this ex-

Our hospitals have a wonderful opportunity to minister to suffering humanity in the Name of our Saviour, and the need is becoming greater as the years go on. Let us pray for and support these dedicated people who minister to the suffering. This is Christian ministry.

Will you set a goal to give more this year than last year? What we do as Southern Baptists depends greatly on how we give.


